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THE WELSH TERRIER

A Few Words About the Breed Which Went Best in Show at Westminster

By PHYLLIS ROBSON

In its general appearance the Welsh Terrier might be mistaken for an undersized Airedale, as it has the same colouring in its wire-haired coat. In type and size, however, it more closely resembles the Fox Terrier, with the same proportions as to the length of

body and limb and the same carriage of ears and tail. Its weight, too, is about the same—20 lbs. being the average in working condition. The colour should be black with tan markings, or black, grizzle and tan, free from black pencillings on the toes, and any admixture of white is objectionable.

It is reputed to be a very old breed There are people living in and about Cardiganshire who aver that Welsh Terriers have been kept by their ancestors from a hundred to two hundred years ago, and there are records showing that such Terriers have been regularly used with the Ynsfor Otterhounds from the year 1760 down to the present day. It seems probable that what is now known as the Welsh Terrier was the original source from which the old black-and-tan English Terriers were evolved, and that it contributed to the production of all other varieties of the sporting Terrier. The breed, in any case, was carefully cultivated in Wales and kept pure in strain, although the early breeders were more particular about preserving the sporting qualities than in concerning themselves about their good looks.

It was about 1884 that the Welsh Terrier was first introduced to the English public as a show dog, and recognized by the Kennel Club. Naturally, good shoulders, sound hindquarters and good legs and feet were to be found in abundance among the early specimens exhibited, but in general there was a feeling that while the colour was no recommendation for a sporting dog, there were no very marked merits in the Welsh Terrier which could not equally well be claimed by the Wirehaired Fox Terrier or his own compatriot of Sealyham. Many improvements in type and character have been achieved, but it cannot be said that the variety has ever been widely popular in England, and since the war period there has been a regrettable decline in public favour. Nevertheless, Welsh Terriers are decidedly desirable dogs. By nature game and energetic, they are not quarrelsome, show very little jealousy of one another, and can be used, exercised and kennelled together under peaceful con-ditions. They are at the same time amenable to discipline and they make excellent companions for either town or country.

Rumour had it that Mrs. Alker intended to retire her famous Ch. Flornell Rare-Bit of Twin Ponds after his great triumph at the Westminster, but this is not so. Rare-Bit will be shown at some of the forthcoming U.S. fixtures.

This is a story of a devotion and comradeship between men and dog—a story of how a Boston Terrier has shared and taken part in the many thrilling accounts of this World War, who has already made history as a veteran of the air-ways. Also this Boston has made headlines on the front page with his picture and write-up, not only in the leading San Francisco newspaper, but also with similar headlines in a Washington, D.C., daily.

We all know that any letter on military business must open with a statement on the subject, with the name of the adressee and paragraphs numbered. In this way a letter was received by Major William R. Millikin of the San Francisco Port of Embarkment Special Service Officer, by a Lieutenant in by plane from New Guinea.

This letter ran as follows:
SUBJECT: Transportation of "Rebel".

TO: Whom it may concern.

(1) The dog Rebel, a Boston Terrier, came to New Guinea as a mascot of a bomber squadron from the United States. He flew with the crew of the plane on which his master served on many bombing missions. When the entire crew was killed due to enemy action, "Rebel" was left alone. It was the wish of the Commanding Officer of the squadron and of his men that Rebel be returned to the States to his late master's wife.

(2) And service you can render in this matter would be very deeply appreciated by the entire squadron.

(This letter bears the signature of the Special Service Officer.)

The Lieutenant who brought Rebel back across the Pacific from New Guinea, told of how this little American Gentleman had accompanied his master and crew on at least a score of bombing missions.

According to Major Millikin, Rebel tells his own story, for his coat is very sleek and trim, with a slim but firm and muscled body, showing that he had plenty of exercise and the very best of both care and chow. He is a confirmed rider, because when he rides in an auto he insists on sitting on the lap of someone. There is a definite reason for this—for as Rebel says, "That's the way I always rode in a bomber, there was no room for me otherwise."

His ears snap very sharply erect and his eyes have a very restless expectancy at the sound of an airplane motor, irregardless of how distant, and for a time Rebel takes on the air of expecting someone. This restless expectancy must have been very painful to Rebel's mind back in New Guinea, since that tense Army letter quotes:

"Rebel was left—alone—, so that all the men in the squadron thought he should be sent home to his dead master's wife."

It is not known just why Rebel was left at the base when his comrades and master went on that last final fatal mission. It might have been an 'intuition' or perchance the gravity of the risk that last mission involved, that decided his master to wish Rebel to live and go back home in the advent of his non-return, and give some comfort to his wife. If the latter is so, then that wish is realized, for the United States Army will see to it that Rebel reaches his mistress' home in comfort and safety.

So it can be told that a Boston Terrier is

So it can be told that a Boston Terrier is a veteran of at least twenty bombing mis-

sions and holds the title of: A Winged Hero, a Dog of War.

His master was Staff Sergeant Raymond Katz of Washington, D.C., who as a machine gunner failed to return November 11th from a bombing mission in the South Pacific.

Our grand Boston hero comes from some of the best American bloodlines and is registered in the American Kennel Cub as "Rebel Stonewall Jackson". His dam was Jim's Toby and his sire Freda's Prosperity Boy, who was the son of the grend winner Ch. Katinka Show Man. So Rebel was also the grandson of another great winner, Ch. Katinka Show Boy.

Rebel not only represents one of the truly two American breeds, but has made history in this war in his own doggie way of helping and taking part by being in the service of Uncle Sam against the enemy with the Fifth Air Force overseas. By the giving of his love, devotion and the many ways that our Boston Terriers have of making themselves beloved, and there is no doubt but that his absence is keenly felt amongst the squadron at that New Guinea base. We are told that Rebel's wardrobe all bears his name, with the insignia of the Fifth Air Force, also his oversea stripes.

Now that Rebel is back in the States, he can be likened as a monument to those valiant comrades of his, and we are sure that Rebel in his own doggie manner will give his love and devotion to Mrs. Katz as a living, sweet memory of his beloved master.

Such devotions between men and canines touches the innerward centre of one's heart. Trying to put one's imagination into those very dangerous, hazardous missions that all servicemen of the Allies are taking part in for the safety of their countries, makes our share of this war on the various home-fronts seem very small and inadequate. There seems to be one way that clearly stands out for those at home to do,: that is to buy more and more of the bonds, thus helping to bring us closer to the victory that is surely to be ours.

This club created a precedent by giving a \$50.00 gold piece at the C.N.E. for the best Airedale irrespective of ownership. This was won by Perrins imported Tintern Royalist.

Mr. Perkins has at different times owned and shown the following champion Airedales: Ch. Silver Birch Banker and one of the most advertised dogs in the world; Sh. Treavour Corrigan; also the Wire Fox Terriers, Ch. Hawes Broom, who went to his title undefeated and won the Francis Redmond Cup for the best Terrier any breed at the C.N.E., and Ch. Leeds Waltz Dream; Bull-dogs—Ch. Cheetham Squire and Ch. Layham Pride; Field Spaniels—Ch. Wardleworth Molly and Ch. Lord Bertie.

The most important wins he considers he ever made, were winning Best Bulldog under the late Sam Crabtree, and Best Terrier the same day at the C.N.E. and taking the Bull-dog Breeders' Cup for the Best Puppy to be won three times under three different judges in one year with three different dogs bred by exhibitor. This almost impossible feat was achieved by Mr. Perkins with puppies from one litter sired by Ch. Cheetham Squire ex Ch. Layham Pride.

WHY I LIKE SEALYHAMS

When I am asked to tell you why I like Sealyhams, I am indeed in a quandary, for my reasons for so doing are really so many and so varied that I am quite at a loss just where and how to begin. Strictly speaking, I suppose that, fundamentally, it is because he is such a loyal, lovable, impudent little devil, but it goes so very much further than that as anyone who has been fortunate enough to own one so very well knows. He is, at all times, full of delightfully pleasant surprises and seems

is the gamest of the game, I know of no dog, of similar size, that has such powerful, punishing jaws, or such strong teeth, he does not look for trouble, but should any come his way, he will glory in it, and I might add, very thoroughly take care of it. When I started breeding, I encountered a certain amount of trouble with difficult whelpings, this, I now know, was largely due to my own lack of experience of the breed, but when I learned the correct way of handling the in whelp bitches, with regard to both feeding and exercise, I had no further trouble, and since that time I have never had to resort to surgery, or

able to trot out some new and amusing little trick anytime he feels like it, his sweet disposition, although he is all Terrier, makes him an ideal companion either in town or country, or be he the pet of the household or kept in a kennel, he is equally at home, and always a very real pal.

He is a hardy, healthy fellow and is no wise difficult to feed, bad "doers" among Sealyhams are few and far between, and I have never had the misfortune to have one in my kennels. Many people, I am afraid, are under the impression that our breed is very hard to keep trim and neat, but I can assure my readers, that this is quite a mistaken idea, for of any dog, in whose coat the predominating colour is white the Sealyham is the one who shows more returns for grooming, and he pays, with interest, for all time and trouble spent in turning him out to look the little aristocrat that he most definitely is.

In the show-ring he is a perfect joy, as he enters into the spirit of the thing with every ounce of his ardent little soul, helping his handler to the utmost, I always know that whenever a dog of mine is put down by a judge, if there be anyone to blame, it is not the dog but myself.

I trust that I have not given the impression, in anything I have said, that this splendid little dog, with his sweet disposition and his consumate showmanship, is just ornamental, if I have, I hasten to assure my readers that such is most definitely not the case, for where there are facilities for working him, he

afterwards to the use of a foster mother. The Sealyham bitch is, almost without exception, an excellent mother, and will bring along her family with a minimum of worry to her owner, and for any little spot of worry, one is amply repaid, for Sealyham puppies are just too sweet for words.

My first Sealyham came to me in 1910, that was the year before the breed was officially recognized by the A.K.C., however it was not until some years later that I got my first good one, for in 1925 I bought from Mrs. Charters, "James of St. Margaret's," I showed this dog at numerous Maritime Shows where he quickly made his title, and if ever an individual dog made a breed popular he did, he stayed with me, as my chief companion until he slipped quietly away in his sleep at the age of thirteen years. During this time I owned a most lovely bitch "St. Margaret's May Queen" who I showed fearlessly both in Canada and the United States, she unfortunately died during whelping having been mated to Int. Ch. "St. Margaret Surprise' Then came to my kennel "St. Margaret Mirth", a very beautiful bitch, all white. bred by Mr. Hedley Peek. She had done a good deal of winning in England and would have done equally well in this country I am sure but I had the mis-fortune to lose her, also while whelping, these two cases were the whelping troubles that I spoke of earlier, and although these setbacks were very disheartening but I have kept at it, and now I am happy to say that, I believe I have found the answer to my problems, as these are the only two bad cases that I have had since I started breeding, 19 years ago.

With 1930 came my first outstanding stud dog in Ch. "St. Margaret Serial", he sired some wonderful puppies and was altogether a sensational little dog, a grand showman, really making a place for me in the Show-ring for, on many occasions he went Best in Show. Soon after I bought him came "St. Margaret Sequin", another lovely bitch, bred by Mrs. R. Crichton. She was not shown to the same extent as my dog for she became my best brood bitch having given me, in all, 35 puppies and I am happy to say that she is still with me, and completely runs my small and very simple kennel.

But it was in 1935 that I procured the dog with which I gained the greatest number of wins as well as the one who has sired some most outstanding puppies, this was when I imported from England, "Netheridge Nickle", a glorious dog, bred by Mrs. V. Saunders, his sire was "Peter Dolland", and his dam was "Netheridge Penny", he was a real "flyer" and very quickly made his championship, "Nicki" had pretty nearly everything, one of the most perfect heads I have ever seen, strong and broad but in no wise coarse, beautifully carried ears and most gorgeous eyes, a long clean neck, perfect front and shoulders, and a grand coat, but there, I could rave for hours about "Nicki", but alas, he came to a tragic and untimely end, being killed in a kennel accident while still in his prime, leaving behind him an impressive record of winnings that included, four times Best in Show and five times Best Terrier in Show

Taking the place of "St. Margaret Sequin" as a brood bitch I have "St. Margaret Springtime", a very sweet person, sired by "St. Margaret Snowman". Soon after the war started Mrs. Charters sent out to me a beautiful young dog "St. Margaret Sinful", bred by herself, he shows great promise but unfortunately, owing to war conditions I have been unable to devote the amount of time to bringing him along that I would wish to.

I trust that my fellow devotees of this grand breed will keep pegging along so that when happier times come we can feel that we have kept the Sealyham flag flying in a manner benefitting this gallant little Terrier.

I find that I have used all the space I have, but there is still sufficient to tell you of all the shortcomings that the Sealyham has for he just HASN'T ANY.

PUGS

Their History and Characteristics By WINIFRED M. STEGGALL

Many moons ago ye Editor in inaugurating one of her many improvements in Dogs in Canada asked me why,

I as a breeder of Pugs for the past 15 years, preferred this delightful little As a lover of man's best friend, pure-bred and often otherwise, the Pug, for his inimitable qualities appeals to me above all other, and I have had ample opportunities to get to know most breeds both large and small.

The Pug is one of the oldest breeds on record, claimed by many to yield pride of place only to the Greyhound in antiquity. According to the Zoological Society of London he originated in China some 700 years B.C. From far-off Cathay he was taken by Dutch traders to Holland where he became very popular. In 1572, William I, Prince of Orange and his wife and his Pug "Pompey" who sleeping on the Prince's bed gave the alarm of the approach of the Span-ish near Williams' encampment at Termigny in time for the Prince to escape. After this the Pug became the favourite of the House of Orange. When William III of Nassau landed in Torbay to be crowned King of England, 1688, among his retinue were his beloved Pugs. He was never without one sleeping on his bed and where he sleeps in effigy in Delft Cathedral one lies at his feet

Later about 1790 the popularity of the Pug spread to France and to the French Court. One Fortuné being the constant companion of Josephine Beuhaernais when she was incarcerated in Les Carmes Monastery. He used to be the bearer of messages to her from Na-poleon Bonaparte secreted under his

collar. Later when she became Empress Josephine her affection for Fortuné almost led to the parting of the ways between her and the Emperor but happily a compromise was arranged. It was not long after his divorce from Joseph-It was ine and the separation from her and her Pugs that Napoleon's fortunes waned and Elba and St. Helena followed.

During the later part of the 19th Century in Britain the Pug enjoyed great popularity and is sometimes re-ferred to as the Victorian Pug because of Queen Victoria's affection for the breed. It was about this time that Lady Brassey popularized the black Pug. Hitherto there had been mainly the two varieties of the fawn, namely the Willoughby or silver fawn and the Morrison or apricot fawn. Unfortunately today the distinction between the two types of fawns is not very clear due to inbreeding of the two strains. About this time there was a marked increase

in the Pug population on the North American continent and fanciers such as Dr. M. H. Cryer, Al Eberhart and Mrs. Ford, mother of the late Dr. C. Y. Ford, of Montreal and Kingston, did much to further the breed.

There is no breed that can compare with the Pug in general intelligence and good disposition especially in understanding the moods of his owner, and accommodating himself to them-For either a tramp in the country or a siesta in front of the fire he is ever ready when you are. His short, smooth, glossy coat, with an absence of "doggie odor" requires a minimum of attention -quite a boom these days! He is clean in his habits, has an aversion for wet ground, etc., and does not track in gobs of mud on his feet as do some of the "fine feathered" breeds.

Although classified as a Toy he is hardy and can stand our Canadian climate well. He is very good natured with children, sometimes and to his dis-

advantage, quiet and not given to incessant yapping yet he does warn one of the approach of strangers. Happily his bark is not of the "soul piercing" variety found in some breeds. A factor that most people appreciate.

There has been a decided upswing in the popularity of the Pug on this continent in the past decade and at the larger shows he usually ranks within the first three in point of numbers in

his group.
All in all I think the Pug can be summed up as the big little dog-Multum in Parvo with personality plus and the fact that the breed has survived and flourished since 700 years before the Christian era, is proof enough of his admirable qualities-just ask the man who has owned one.

SAVE YOUR PROMISING **PUPPIES**

By a Practical Breeder

There is a great mortality among newly born puppies. Curiously enough, it usually occurs in an old fancier's kennel. The new dog person, nine times out of ten. rears the litter. This is simply novice's luck, because if anything did go wrong the novice would not notice it in the initial stages and if he did would not know what to do.

In some cases healthy puppies are born and the whelping has been a normal one. They nurse right away. The owner will soon notice that one or more are starting to cry. When those are discovered it will be found that they look longer and thinner than their fellows. On being put on to nurse, they will do so in a half-hearted way for a minute or so and then turn away whimpering continuously. Very soon they will be found dead, and in all probability the whole litter will go the same way. As they get nearer to death so they get limper and more flabby to the touch.

I consider it is acidity in the bitch's milk. The way to find out is to test it with blue litmus paper. The redder the paper gets the greater the acidity. As bi-carbonate of soda is an anti-acid, it is a good plan to put one level teaspoonful in every pint of the bitch's drinking water at least a week before she is due to whelp and to continue it the whole time she is nursing the litter.

Here and there one puppy will die. He looks perfectly fit and sound. He also whimpers, does not feed and is continually crawling up his dam's flanks and ribs. Instead of feeling flabby, he feels curiously stiff. His hind legs are always working stiffly backwards and forwards, and his front clawing upwards.

I have two theories as to the cause of this both connected with the lungs. When an

I have two theories as to the cause of this, both connected with the lungs. When an adult dog has pneumonia, he always sits up with one or both front legs spread sideways from chest. It relieves the pressure on the lungs. A new-born puppy can't sit up, so to relieve the pressure he does the only thing he can do, stretches his forelegs up his mother's sides. He appears to be round and plump. This he can't be if he doesn't feed. It is because he is breathing as low as he can, because his lungs are not working properly.

My idea is that is some cases it is because the lungs, immediately after birth, are never properly inflated. A really useful brood bitch whelps easily and quickly, unpacks the pupples, and hurriedly licks and bowls them about until they give forth lusty yells. With the yells and bumping so the lungs properly inflate. Get an idle bitch, one which is a sluggish whelper, which leaves the puppy packed up unnecessarily long, or leaves the unpacking for you to do, and then the youngster starts behind scratch and often appears to be dead and can, after tapping his chest, working the forelegs up and down and gently, breathing into his open mouth, be made to breathe, but a proper inflation is occasionaly, not achieved and death such as I have described ensues.

The other cause I am inclined to think is liquid on the lungs. A lusty puppy and a greedy feeder owning a dam with a big milk flow, gets it too freely, and it goes the wrong way and so enters the lungs, and the previous one.

The next time you have a puppy declining

The next time you have a puppy declining in this way, press his chest against your ear and if you don't hear a crackling in the lungs then my ideas are wrong.

British Bred Dogs of the Future

While our minds and thoughts are mainly concerned with the grave conflict that is raging, one cannot help but think of the future as affecting the world of dogs. When victory is achieved and peace comes again to our beloved land there will be many, both old-timers with their wealth of knowledge and experience, and new adherents to the cult of the pedigree dog.

The British Empire cannot fail in the fight for freedom—a freedom that gives to us those precious leisure hours when we may enjoy our sports and pastimes. We are not a people whose thoughts and actions are continuously engaged in war, and that is the reason why we were unprepared to meet and promptly dispose of the mechanical ruthlessness of the Nazi hordes. We were preoccupied with peaceful endeavours.

We followed adventure in every sphere of sport. We bred our dogs and cattle with various objects in view. Speed and stamina in horses, utility as well as quality in our agricultural live stock; the science of selection also engaging our thoughts in the many lovely varieties and types of dogs whose perfection commanded the attention and admiration of all countries in every part of the world.

At present strenuous efforts are being made to maintain valuable blood lines in our canine stock, so that when the opportunity comes a high standard will be achieved with the least possible delay. Much may happen before then, but it will not be without interest if an attempt is made to predict what dog or dogs will be the popular favourites.

Many will recollect the extraordinary boom after the last war, when the German Shepherd dog, then dubbed, and still recognized as the Alsatian. Today there are few of this variety that do not possess the kindly and affectionate temperament of our native breeds, due mainly to the fact that the British people are dog lovers in every sense of the word. But in its earlier days, when a great many specimens came from Germany, they were suspicious and aloof, even after many had been bred in this country. It took years of patient breed-

ing to eradicate temperamental imperfections.

Looking forward to a resumption of activity one wonders, therefore, if some foreign breed will capture the imagination of those who engage in the sport of breeding and exhibiting. We are still the same people as of yore, but there will be an improved outlook. It is my

fervent hope that at least we will be more British than at any period in our history. Consequently in the Terrier breeds I select the coloured Bull Terrier as likely to be a firm favourite.

If you were to ask for my reasons for this choice it would be difficult to give them. Rather it is more of a "hunch" than anything else. It may also be due to my observation of the progress of the breed prior to the outbreak of war.

Now the Bull Terrier is a splendidly built dog, powerful and active. He is an excellent guard, yet biddable and affectionate. His coat is short and requires no trimming, and is, therefore, in this respect, trouble free. My preference is for the coloured variety, especially in head markings, as colour over the eyes takes away the "piggish" look often seen in many all-white dogs.

It may offend the ideas of some breeders, but I would like to see a smaller ear in this variety, not the size of a Scottie, by any means, but just a shade smaller than the average existing at present. Of all breeds I have heard that the Bull Terrier is less troubled with hysteria, and if this is correct it will make a strong appeal to many people.

Among the Terrier tribe I vote for the coloured variety of the Bull Terrier—a British breed.

As a group Gundogs will maintain their popularity. The Cocker Spaniel, with its many lovely and varied colour markings, has had a following greater than any other, and there was evidence that the red or golden was coming along fast, with an ever-growing demand for puppies. They had not reached the high standard of excellence achieved by the blue roan and the black, but its equality and possible victory over them was in sight.

My selection of the Gundog breeds goes to the English Springer Spaniel. Here we have a dog of superlative merit and with great possibilities when improvement has been secured. He is a sizable dog but not too big for the modest home, and as a shooting dog to fulfil almost every requirement on a shooting day is unequalled.

I do not say that the Springer will displant the Pointer and Setter breeds for their specialized work on the moors,

where thick heather would seriously interfere with the capabilities of the Springer.

In this sphere the Springer will not be thoroughly at his best, although he can scent birds and point them just as well as the speedier and longer legged breeds. Where driven birds are shot from butts the Springer will equal the steadiness of the Retriever, and when the drive is over the birds down he will find them unerringly.

The Springer has proved himself the ideal dog for rough shooting, retrieving from land or from water in a way that will give satisfaction.

It is not my intention to make a selection or prophecy what breed will be leaders in the non-sporting or Toy groups, except, perhaps to say that the Collie may once again come into his former glory. As a lover of the breed the wish is father to the thought.

Is Dog Judging Scientific or Pseudo-Scientific?


Pseudo-Scientific?

Dear Editor:
As an exhibitor, and breeder of Great Danes, despite the fact that it is merely one of my hobbies, (not commercial), as are horses, I have a great appreciation for the pure bred and the thoroughbred animal and, above all, I, like many others, am desirous to develop what is termed "the perfect Great Dane".

Now, Madam, the point in question is, and I will endeavour not to digress one iota from this point—how can I or any breeder aim at the acme of perfection if there are so many differences of opinion especially amongst judges, and this I mean literally?

For instance, at the Westminster Show a dog called Ch. Fergus of Daynemouth was placed best of breed over many other Danes, including Ch. Jansen of Brae Tarn, Ch. Neili of Brae Tarn, to say nothing of King von Loenheart, in addition to which, two Danes were placed over my Canadian Ch. Dulcy in her class.

Now, to commence with, I have read articles on Great Danes (the perfect specimen) in Dog World for the past six years and, indeed, I have read Dogs In Canada with equal interest for the same period of time. My reason for stating six years is due to the fact that previous to that time I was doing research work (tuberculosis) in China, India, and Great Britain. I have followed the almost phenomenal success of



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

This outstanding three-years-old Dane won her title in three wins, completing her championship at last Toronto show. Her recent wins are B. B. and Best Working Group at London, September 4th; B. B. and Best Working Group at Toronto Woodbine Show. September 6th and 7th; and at the recent Westminster Show in New York she was placed third in Open Class, despite the fact that she had given birth to eighteen puppies eleven weeks previously. For breeding she can't be beaten, as her sire, Champion Muldoon, made a sensation at Westminster in 1942. On her sire's side (Ch. Muldoon), Dulcy has the famous Odin von Birkenhof as her grandsire, who was written up in Dog World as one of the great dogs of all time. This in turn makes King von Loenheart Dulcy's uncle. King von Loenheart holds the world's record for Best in Show winnings for Great Danes and is second to Jansen of Brae Tarn, who holds world's record and Best of Breed.

At the recent Westminster Show, Dulcy's nine-months' daughter, Honey, won first prize for best senior Great Dane puppy. Honey's sire is King of Roxdane and his grandfather was the famous Champion Duke of Roxdane, who won the Best of Breed at Westminster Show in 1940.

Champion Dulcy's grandmother is Champion Allure of Brae Tarn.

Dulcy is the mother of three litters, one of nine; the second 15, and the third, 18, which is considered the world's record by dogdom. This type of breeding can scarcely be improved upon. I think any breeder will agree with me that I have endeavoured for the past six years to produce the "perfect Great Dane". Dulcy's daughter, Honey, won Best of Breed over five other Great Danes, won Best of Working Group, and Best Puppy in Show in January, 1944, at the Kerry Blue Terrier Club, 1st all breed sanction show in Hamilton, Ont. David Fingard.

Czardas von Eppelsprung-Noris, and his illustrious son, Ch. Jansen of Brae Tarn and, indeed, I have read of the ancestry of Ch. Czardas as well which makes interesting biographical-fiction reading. (Thanks to Dog World.)

Now, with reference to Ch. Fergus of Daynemouth, he is unquestionably an outstanding Great Dane, but from letters I have received following the Westminster Show from numerous persons (Dane breeders), he is not to be compared with some of the other Danes exhibited in that show. I have noted in Dog World records that Ch. Jansen holds the world's record for past and present Great Dane winnings.

It has also been mentioned by several knowledgeable persons that my bitch, Ch. Dulcy, should have been awarded a higher placing in that show, namely, third in the Open Class.

The question is, is dog judging scientific or pseudo-scientific? Is a judge obliged to be guided by the standard as laid down by the Great Dane Club of America, or is it a judge's prerogative to merely judge as he so desires?

I have noted in Dog World that King von

I have noted in Dog World that King von Loenheart has the greatest record of any Dane past or present for winning best in shows. Would this not indicate that he is a better specimen of perfection than either Ch. Fergus, Ch. Jansen, or Ch. Neill of Brae Tarn? In other words, in the vernacular of the street—is dog judging just "eye wash"?

I would ask you, at my expense, to publish the referred to drawings, and the pictures of Ch. Fergus, Ch. Jansen, Ch. King von Loenheart, and my Ch. Dulcy, and leave it to your readers to send in their opinions which of these compare the closest with the standard of "the perfect Dane" as drawn by Enno Meyers. I think it might be most interesting to take a vote on it and to publish the results accordingly. Believe me. I am not endeavouring to belittle any judge or any dog—on the contrary, I am out to spend an unlimited amount of mone (within reason), to bring about a better standard of judging and to help breeders, including myself, to produce the "perfect Great Dane". This can only be accomplished through the intelligent, scientific, honest dog judges who lay aside politics in dog judging and accept the true standard—and when I say honest, this also applies to the judge who is called an "all-rounder", who frequently admits that he is not competent to judge all specific breeds.

As previously written, I consider your magazine a splendid contribution to civilization, as dogs, indeed, fulfil a great part in the present-day life of most humans. You have accomplished much good for improving the breed of dogs, and educating human beings to be more susceptible to the finer sensitivities of the dog. Indeed, I feel I am not alone in the following opinion and that is—were it not for the excellent work that Dogs In Canada is doing for dogdom in general, no doubt the Canadian government would be obliged to spend enormous sums of monies through humane societies.

In closing, may I wish you and your competent staff continued success.

Perhaps it is because of my specific type of work which warrants continuous research investigation, or perhaps some might prefer to call me "a meddler". Be it as it may, I am most anxious at almost any price to see proper judging by a proper standard which would be acceptable especially to those who are most desirous of procuring through scientific breeding "the perfect specimen", for when one does procure such a perfect specimen (comparatively speaking), he or she finds it very hard and disagreeable to abide by the decision of the judge when in known instances an unqualified judge places inferior specimens over that dog which represents (comparatively speaking) perfection.

While on this subject I wish to go on eccord by stating I am in thorough agree-

While on this subject I wish to go on record by stating I am in thorough agreement with Dr. Wilfred Shute, who, at the last meeting of the C.K.C., suggested that dog judges should refrain from becoming Directors of the Kennel Club.

To my knowledge there has never been any precedent where a judge predominates

We all know the amateur breeders and seasoned breeders an more often than not guided in their breedir programme by the judge's placement of do at shows.

Some person or persons who objected ability (the judges) to fill a dual capacity of Dr. Shute's suggestion made a statement i effect.—that the electors voted for the judge and thereby expressed their belief in the Judge-Director. There is no question in mind, and I am sure in even the moskeptical or prejudiced mind that this is no literally true.

It has been known in many clubs when the President and, in numerous instance the Directors, have refrained from exhibiting their dogs so that there would be no in pression that they were seeking favors to their highly esteemed positions. A notable case in the States is Mrs. Geraldine Dodg who never exhibits at her own show—the biggest in the world, the Morris and Essenor does Mrs. Hoyt exhibit at the Nort Westchester show, of which she is the head and which is today the biggest outdoor show We have similar cases in Canada of which do not wish at the moment to make mention This is most admirable; however, I ame book stretch of imagination suggesting the either Presidents or Directors act accordingly; but this opinion does not apply it Judge-Directors, for as I have endeavoured it point out in this letter, their case is quidifferent.

I have no disagreement to make as to this statement, meaning, that if these particular Director to whom I refer were not permitted i judge, indeed we would lose valuable judge However, it could hardly be said that these particular directors resigned from the directorate that men of equal integrity and of equal knowledge and, perhaps from business point of view, even more knowledge able, could replace the loss of these Judge-Directors. In such circumstances, would not the C.K.C. gain considerably? Therefor these Judge-Directors would be free from any embarrassment by such a feeling as,—"Well, I am a Director as well as a judg and my opinions and words are final. Tak them or leave them."

As herein stated, with such an arrangement you could add to the dog world through the C.K.C. by replacing these Directors by two or three capable outstanding business men who are also dog lovers. Then, if and whe an argument or arguments arise betwee exhibitor and judge, both parties concerne would stand alike on equal grounds, an would receive an equal hearing and, in doubt, a fair and more equitable decisio would be given than under the preser Judge-Director arrangement.



THE SPRINGER SPANIEL IN ENGLAND

In most breeds, if not all, the fanciers interested have found that two conditions usually obtain:

(1) The breed owes its start to a few dogs of either sex who have, by their contribution to the particular breed, been recognized as "pillars" of the breed.

(2) From time to time additional "pillars" are added and these dogs are generally recognized by the only basis available, i.e., their ability to set up one or more strains whose stock are prominent and consistent winners at the shows.

The Springer Spaniel is no exception in this writer's opinion and most, if not all of the winning lines today can trace in some way or another, through various recognized pillars of the breed, their descent to what is probably the fountain head of the breed, namely the male, "Mop," who was born about 1812 and owned by Sir Thomas Fenton Fletcher Boughey, Bart. Of this dog The Sporting Magazine, in December, 1831, had this to say:

"That faithful attachment which is proverbial with the Spaniel, Mop, the old dog possessed in the highest degree. This was joined to all those essential qualities which make a Spaniel valuable: a good nose, under excellent command, versatile in pursuit, and equally good at either woodcock, pheasant, hare, rabbit, snipe or mallard. On land, or in water, it was a matter of indifference to Mop which, if it was his master's wish, guided by the hand, checked by the whistle, indefatigable in his labours; his end regretted, being accidentally killed."

The Springer fancier of today no matter how limited his knowledge of the breed may be can usually identify several of those dogs which have contributed largely to the present popularity of his favourite breed. Canadian Springer fanciers are well informed in regard to their breed both in Canada and the United States and this article has been prepared with a view to increasing their knowledge of the winning Springers in England for an 11-year period beginning 1929 up to the last championship show in England before the present conflict commenced.

In this period a total of 44 Springers (26 males and 18 females) completed their championships and in all earned a total of 269 challenge certificates. those not familiar with the procedure of earning a championship in England, it should be pointed out that The Kennel Club (in England) grants championship status to certain shows providing certain conditions are met. Challenge certificates may be offered at these shows in specified breeds in both sexes and to earn its championship a dog must win three challenge certifi-cates under three different judges. The challenge certificate in effect is a similar award to Winners at a Canadian show. No breed of gundog, such as a Springer, has, however, the right to be called a champion unless it has been awarded a certificate of merit which he must earn in the field. For the nine years preceding the war an average of 36 challenge certificates for Springers were won each year. Actually the total from 1929 to 1939 inclusive was 387 challenge certificates won in Springers.

In earning their title of champion, the 44 Springers who completed their championship in this period earned no less than 269 challenge certificates although it should be understood that a small number of these were earned prior to the years under review. The average, therefore, of Springer champions in this period is four per year. While we in Canada have become ac-

while we in Canada have become accustomed to champions entered "for specials only", no such provision is made in the English Kennel Club rules, and, therefore, it is customary for English dogs to compete in Open classes and earn challenge certificates after they have become champions.

The greatest number of challenge certificates earned by any one dog in this period were won by Ch. Nimble of Hamsey with a total of 29. This outstanding winner is a son of English Ch. Beauchief Outcross, a grandson of Ch. Inveresk Chancellor, a dog Herb Placey brought to Canada many years ago to his then very active Belmoss Kennels at Sherbrooke, Quebec. Nimble's dam, Nell of Hamsey, is a granddaughter of Eng. and Am. Ch. Nuthill Dignity, who has contributed so much to Springer breeding both in England and America. Nell's dam, Laverstoke Pet, is by Eng. Field Trial Bryngarw Jock ex-Eng. Ch. Laverstoke Pattern, the latter being a daughter of the well known Dual Ch. Horsford Hetman, who was brought to Canada many years ago by Eudore Chevrier of Winnipeg.

Not far behind Nimble in the number of challenge certificates won is Ch. Roundwood Lass with 27 to her credit. Like Nimble she too was born in 1932. She is a grand-daughter of Eng. and Am. Ch. Rufton Recorder and on her dam's side we find such dogs as Eng. Ch. L'ile Buccanneer and Eng. Ch. Hemlington Kalgar, a son of Ch. Springbok of Ware; the latter was also brought to Canada by Mr. Chevrier.

Another big winner is Ch. Winning Number of Solway with 21 challenge certificates earned. He is by Eng. Ch. Beauchief Benefactor (Nuthill Dignity ex-Eng. Ch. Beauchief Bonetta) out of Adcombe Poppy, she by Eng. Ch. Adcombe Yakoob out of a daughter of Dual Ch. Horsford Hetman. Other

prominent names in the pedigree of this dog are Ch. Andon of Leam, Ch. Little Brand, Ch. L'ile Buccaneer and Ch. Jambok of Ware.

Two dogs earned 11 challenge certificates in this period. The first, L'ile Fifeloon, is by the well-known Twelve Pointer, and the other being Ch. Admiration of Solway, he by Eng. Ch. Inveresk Cocksure, who was brought to Canada by Mr. Placey.

Outstanding Sires

The influence of Eng. and Am. Champion Nuthill Dignity is at once noticeable when checking the list of champions to determine the males who were the sire of two or more dogs that earned their championships in the period in review. Dignity was himself the sire of two champions, Ch. Hazelton Dignity and Ch. Beauchief Benefactor, the latter a winner of 10 challenge certificates. Benefactor is perhaps the leading sire from the point of view of the number of champions sired, for four of his get earned their titles, among them Ch. Winning Number of Solway (21), already referred to; Ch. Beauchief Beaucoupe (7); Ch. Beauchief Bahram (3) and Ch. Pleasant Peter (3).

A grandson of Ch. Nuthill Dignity,

A grandson of Ch. Nuthill Dignity, Ch. Marmion of Marmion by name was the sire of three champions—Ch. Higham Tom Tit (8); Ch. Dry Toast (4); and Ch. Worthen Sunchine (4)

and Ch. Worthen Sunshine (4).

Eng. Ch. Beauchief Outcross is another sire to be reckoned with. Ch. Nimble of Hamsey (29), already referred to, was one of his sons as was also Eng., Am. and Can. Ch. Showman of Shotton (4), so well known on this continent. He was also the sire of Ch. Brice (3). Outcross was a son of Eng. Ch. Advert of Solway, who in turn was sired by Eng. Ch. Inveresk Chancellor.

The one other sire to have more than one champion to his credit since 1928 is Eng. Ch. Beauchief Buchanan, a 30n of Beauchief Nicholas, and, therefore, a son of Eng. and Can. Ch. Jambok of Ware. He was the sire of Ch. Achi

Evement (4) and Rollick of Harting.

WHAT ABOUT INFLUENCE? What About Relative Influence of Parents?

By G. R. VIVYAN, in the "Dog World" (England)

Without being either a biologist or a zoologist it is open to every man nowadays to learn much of how the world of living creatures has become what he sees it to be. It is not only possible but it is essential to the dog breeder to learn something of the great laws of biology, for it is the only way to see the whole life of a dog. I write this because from time to time we read articles from the pens of famous canine breeders which suggest that some have no clear conception of all the principles which govern the life of a dog.

It seems to me that much advice is built up on matters of pure belief, with no plausible or reasonable explanation put forward to account for the beliefs. I feel, therefore, that we merely sit on the lid of progress by indulging in speculation instead of dealing in known facts.

Many claims have been made that certain characters are derived chiefly from the male and certain others from the female, and no question pertaining to breeding has given rise to more controverted opinions. Evidence, however, can be advanced which must surely prove fatal to any theory that one parent, in virtue of its sex, influences only certain characters in the progeny.

Unfortunately, one has to go outside of dogdom to produce much of the evidence in order to refute that theory. But the illustrations given apply equally to dog breeding as they do to other branches of animal husbandry, because organic conditions are fixed and absolute, are necessary, are universal, and govern every organ and function throughout life and nature.

In the human family children very frequently resemble the mother more than the father in form, in features and in mental power, and for the reason that in the human family we do not have the selection in breeding, as with domestic animals; hence the average female is just as prepotent as the male.

In the matter of colour let us take,

for example, two of England's famous racehorses of the past, "Touchstone and Launcelot, both the same colour, and full brothers. "Stonehenge" says of the progeny of the former, "They possessed fairly high form as racehorses and showed much uniformity of colour, while the progeny of the latter were of all colours and below mediocrity on the turf."

A fact long established in pig breeding is the ability of the Large White (Yorkshire) and the Berkshire to transmit characteristics peculiar to each breed. The Large White transmits his colour (white) to a marked degree when crossed with, say, the Berkshire, which is black. It makes no difference whether the Large White boar or the sow is used, it results in a preponderance of progeny white in colour. In its turn, the Berkshire gives a compactness and desirable conformation to the progeny whether a male or a female is crossed, but, as previously stated, fails to transmit its colour when crossed with the Large or Middle White.

The Galloways, among cattle, are noted for the persistency with which they transmit the hornless character and the colour (black) when crossed upon other breeds, especially when the latter are mixed in their blood elements. This happens whether the Galloways used be male or female; the progeny will be nearly all black and hornless. Contrast this prepotency for blackness with the lack of it in the black Berkshire when mated with a white Yorkshire, dominant for white.

I have two show catalogues before me of shows held some years ago. In the former one dog won two firsts and two specials in Smooth dogs. The following year a litter brother won first in open Wire Fox Terrier bitches.

The theory that certain characters are derived from one parent alone seems to be somewhat upset by the above illustration, where both parents fail to transmit properties to one of their progeny which they themselves possessed—i.e., a Wire-haired coat.

Francis Galton, on June 3rd, 1897, read before the Royal Society a paper on what is known as "Galton's Law of Ancestral Heredity". His observations were obtained from the registered colours of a pedigree stock of Basset ours of a pedigree stock of Basset Hounds, originally purchased from Sir Everett Millais. The experiments re-sulted after years of breeding in a col-lection of 817 hounds of registered colours, descended from parents whose colour was known. The calculation from the facts obtained led Galton to suppose that of its total heritage the individual receives from its two parents one-half, from the four grandparents one-eighth, from the sixteen great-grandparents one-sixteenth, and so on in series, the sum of the total contributed heritages being equal to one. Although Galton's experiments were carried out on the one character a lone (colour), nowhere does he say that the male had more influence than the female in transmitting that character.

"They are as sharp as needles," said the watchman, "and are well trained to their work. We find them very valuable watch dogs, and wouldn't be

These five bright little dogs who spend all their nights in the dusky gloom of the great store come off duty in the early hours of the morning and then retire to a well-earned rest in their kennel on the roof, where they have the run of the big gravelled stretch all day. They can then sleep off the fatigue of their strenuous work, for it is real work and no mistake. These faithful little animals take their

calling very seriously and are never backward when the time for duty arrives. Next time you go shopping think of these tiny guardians sleeping up on the roof, ready for another night watching over all the pretty things mother buys for you and little brother and
