

OBEDIENCE TRIALS

By Alva McColl

At long last a solution has been found which will enable good dogs to appear before the public after they have completed their championship. Dogs compete in the breed classes when they are in the prime of life and then fade into obscurity, once the title of champion bench dog is awarded. A breeder does not care to keep other competitors down, thus leaves his champion at home.

A dog that has been well-bred, in time will lose his youthful figure, but not his intelligence that has been de-

veloped by hours of schooling in the dog show ring. It is to retain these faculties, in addition to educating the public in the value of a pure bred dog, that obedience trials were formed in connection with bench shows.

It was thirty years ago that Mr. Shelley, who developed Count Gladstone and Manitoba Rap, conceived the idea of bringing out the individual characteristic of his fine Setters. His training included a vard system not unlike the obedience trials of today. There is no doubt in my mind that German Shepherd dogs-I started out with that breed eighteen years ago have been improved more as a companion dog for the public than any other breed. If memory serves me right Miss Leary of the Cosalta Kennels initiated the idea of not showing a dog until it had won the novice obedience trial. That her idea was sound has been proven in Canada where the Cosalta Shepherds have been used by the R.C.M.P. to great advantage. Countless lives have been saved and criminals captured, in addition to the valuable time saved.

At the present time dogs are being returned from the battle area where, due to their temperament, they cannot stand the excitement and stress of war although their intelli-

gence is up to a high degree. The nervous reactions of dogs can be studied to a certain extent and bred out of them. Some of the most timid dogs, if they are backed with intelligence, train the best and their training seems to eliminate their timidity. If the dog people are going to promote their animals and create value and a place for them in this modern society, intelligence is going to do a great deal more for them than confirmation.

The value of the obedience trained dogs cannot be underestimated in the present Great War. Had it not been for the wise breeders who saw the value of obedience training, many more lives would have been lost in this conflict. When the demand for dogs, trained or suitable for training, was made in the

United States the dog owners were not found sleeping. With an almost uncanny speed "Dogs for Defense" came into being and nowhere in the history of the world has the domestic animal proved itself such a true friend of man, as have dogs at the present time.

Here in Canada we have known of the wonderful work done by the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada in obedience trials, but it was not until 1940 that action was taken to officially embrace all breeds. Jasper M. Daniels,

owned by Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph W. Buchanan, Detroit, Mich. This ten months' old German Shepherd pup was First Prize Winner with a score of 98.3 in the Obedience Trials, Novice Class A, at the reecnt Windsor Kennel Club Show

of Lynnmour, B.C., speaking for the Doberman Pinscher Club of British Columbia, brought forward the amendment to the C.K.C. rules that the obedience test rules be applicable to all breeds and become part of the dog show rules.

The trials were held recently in Windsor in conjunction with the Windsor Kennel Club official show, and were a great success. The report is included in "Show Reports". The Toronto exhibitors were so enthusiastic that E. S. McKay, of the Kirkpatrick Kennels of Irish Setters was detailed to go into the matter and organize an all-breed obedience trial club for Toronto and vicinty. The London Kennel Club has the trials scheduled for their all-breed show in Labatt Park, June 3rd, and George Wade has been invited to give a dem-

onstration with his Doberman Pinscher, Am. Champion Westphalia's Rameses, C. D. X. (Companion Dog Excellent) at the Guelph Show.

In order to acquaint secretaries of the simple rules required to include obedience trials at the official shows, also the owners of dogs intending to embrace this all important addition to their dog's life, we are publishing the official rules as adopted by the members of the Canadian Kennel Club at the annual meeting, 1940. Of particular note is

that a dog can gain his championship by attaining 85% or over in each test, if at least four dogs compete at each trial—thus if ten dogs compete, ten dogs can win and so on.

A club or association which has been granted permission to hold a dog show may also be granted permission to give as part of and in connection with its dog show any or all of the obedience classes, defined in this chapter, except Tracking Tests, if in the opinion of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club such club or association is qualified to do so.

If a club or association wishes to hold an Obedience Trial at which point toward a title may be awarded, it must make application to the Canadian Kennel Club for leave to hold such trial, the application to contain such information as the Canadian Kennel Club may require and shall make a deposit of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). There shall be no deposit made for Obedience Trials held in conjunction with licensed shows although application must be made in the regular way. The Canadian Kennel Club will notify the club or association of its approval or disapproval of the application. If the club or association shall fail to hold its trial at

the time and place which have been approved, the deposit shall become the property of the Canadian Kennel

If a club or association wishes to hold an informal Obedience Trial at which no points toward a title may be awarded, it may do so by obtaining the sanction of the Canadian Kennel Club.

(Novice Class A). The Obedience Novice Class "A" shall be for dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of "C.D." (Companion Dog). One dog only may be entered in this class by any one exhibitor, and may be shown only by said exhibitor or by a member of his immediate family. No professional handler or trainer, nor any kennel employee, shall be allowed to compete as exhibitor otherwise.

(Novice Class B). The Obedience

Novice Class "B" shall be for dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of "C.D." (Companion Dog). Dogs in this class may be handled or exhibited by either an amateur or a professional. Exhibitors may enter more than one dog in this class, but each dog must have a separate handler. No dog may be entered in both Novice Class "A" and Novice Class "B" at any one trial.

The tests in the Obedience Novice Class for each dog shall be:

- 1. To heel on leash.
- 2. To heel free.
- 3. To come when called.
- 4. To sit for a period of one minute away from handler.
- 5. To lie down for a period of three minutes away from handler.

In the event of and only in the event of there being less than six competitors in either the Novice Class "A" or the Novice Class "B" at an Obedience Trial, Test No. 4 (to sit) and No. 5 (to lie down) shall each be conducted with all the dogs in both Novice Class "A" and Novice Class "B" competing in the ring together at the same time.

The score of points for a perfect performance of each of these tests in the Obedience Novice Class shall be:

	Pts.
1. Heel on leash	25
2. Heel free	30
3. Recall	15
4. Long Sit	15
5. Long Down	15

Maximum score 100

The Canadian Kennel Club will permit the use of the letters "C. D.", signifying

"Companion Dog", to be used in connection with and after the name of each dog which shall be certified by Judges of Obedience Trials to have received scores of 85 or more points in Obedience Novice Classes.

The total number of dogs required to compete in the Novice Class "A" and Novice Classes in which a dog must receive a score of 85 or more points in order to be permitted to use the letters "C.D." shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club.

(At the present to be permitted to use the "Letters "C.D.", a dog must receive a score of 85 or more points in Novice classes at three Obedience Trials in which the combined number of competitors in Novice Class "A" and Novice Class "B" at each trial shall be four or more dogs.)

Standard For Obedience Trials

The idea of Obedience Trials is to demonstrate the usefulness of the purebred dog as the companion and guardian of man, and not the ability of the dog to acquire facility in the performance of mere tricks. The classification which has been adopted is progressive with the thought in mind that a dog which can be termed a utility dog has demonstrated his fiitness to a place in our modern scheme of living. The tracking test required for a dog to acquire the title of "Utility Dog" can be made only out of doors.

If the tests take place at an indoor show the ring should be large and the floor covered with matting in order to prevent the dogs from slipping. If the

tests take place out of doors the ground should be level and the grass, if any, should be cut short.

In the Novice and Open Classes the handler should enter the ring with his dog on loose leash, stand still with dog sitting at heel at the handler's left side until the Judge asks if the handler is ready and then gives the order "Forward", at which command the handler will attract his dog's attention by saying his name and then give the order "Heel" and at the same time start walking briskly with the dog on loose leash. At the command "Heel" the dog should follow as closely as possible to the left knee of the handler. At each order to "Halt" the handler will stop and his dog immediately should sit without command at heel and not move until ordered to do so. It is permissible after each halt before moving again for the handler to give the order "Heel" to his dog. Any tightening or jerking of the leash, or any act, signal or command, which in the opinion of the Judge gives the dog unnecessary or unfair assistance shall be penalized. The Judge will give the orders, "Left turn", "Right "About turn", "Slow" and "Double", which last order signifies that the handler must run. In executing the "about turn" the handler will use a "right about turn" unless the Judge specifically calls for a "left about turn" The Judge will order the handler to execute the "Figure Eight", which signifies that the handler shall walk around and in between the two stewards who shall stand not more than eight feet apart, or if there is only one steward shall walk around and in between the

the Judge and the steward

Heel free should be executed in the same manner as heel on leash except that the dog is off the lead.

To execute the recall to handler the dog is ordered to and must be made to stay in the "Down" or sitting position at one end of the ring while his handler moves to the other end. and when the Judge gives the order "Do the Recall", the handler calls his dog, which in the Novice Class must come straight in to its handler at a smart pace and when it reaches a point immediately in front of the handler, first sit, and next at command and/or signal go smartly to heel.

In the sitting oneminute test, the handler goes to the end of the ring opposite to that end where the dog has been left in the sitting position, and when

the time limit has expired returns to his dog, which must not move from the sitting position until spoken to and permission has been given by its handler after the Judge says "Exercise finished". The order is "Sit Stay". In the sitting three-minute test all handlers leave the ring and remain out of sight of their dogs until the time limit has expired.

In the "Down" three or five minutes' test, the same conditions prevail as in the Sitting Tests, except that the dog must remain in a lying down position. The order is "Down Stay". In the five minutes' test all handlers leave the ring and remain out of sight of their dogs until the time limit has expired.

All the competing dogs take the "Sit" and "Down" tests in the ring together.

The Judge of an Obedience Trial must remove from competition any dog which (Continued on page 34)

Gentlemen, It Can Be Done!

Elizabeth Blochin, she wrote the well-known
dog book, "That Dog of Yours". She was
born in Kentucky but fell so in love with
Canada on her first visit here that she has
remained. She has been associated with
Chatelaine, Canadian Homes and Gardens,
Mayfair and Maclean's Magazines. On her
marriage in 1929 she retired from editorial
work but about a year ago she returned to
this work, joining the staff of the Macmillan
Company of Canada.

When the war first came, we still retained our usual complement of 25 or more West Highland White Terriers -all fine breeders, show dogs and pets. Our huge outdoor and indoor boarding kennels were still running, the latter heated by furnacettes in winter. Our specially prepared dog-food was being delivered from Aurora, fresh to some two hundred customers in Toronto. Our model canning factory was turning out six flavours by the thousand tins. It was the last canned dog-food on the Canadian market. Our one man staved with us just long enough to undertake a last huge order before the tins were no more. How it was all done, only the great dog Geni knows. I remember we did have a litle boy now and then, and once a female fugitive from a rest home whose fixation was that she was being chased by horses. After they left, we settled down to face the worst winter in one hundred and two years without any help whatever.

Well we came through! Our lane to Yonge Street was blocked early in the winter of '42 and we had no communication with the outside world save through a horse-drawn cutter which hauled in food and supplies-including meat for our dog food. It also carried my husband and the packed cartons out to the highway where our truck was wintering in a neighbour's garage. Every other day, after rising at six a.m., tending to the dogs, hauling up the meat, grinding, mixing and packing the food, he left home at about three in the afternoon. Many nights, because of blizzards, drifts and breakdowns he didn't get back until three the next morning. One time, I remember, when the snow was neck-deep and the blizzards so blinding there was no following the drifted road, he came in Russian-fashion on his hands and knees. He was laughing when he finally blew through the door! In all that winter he missed only one delivery-when the truck broke down. I should say half a delivery-he went back and finished it next day!

As for me, I am glad that I had a good many dogs that had to be nursed with one thing and another, and a baby or two to be brought up indoors-for there was one stretch when I did not get to the end of the icy lane for three months. During that time, the only conversation I held face to face with a human being other than my husband on the "day between solstice", was with the dreadfully afflicted teamster of our neighbour, who drove our "rescue" cutter. He did not exactly stammer. His speech was more a series of totally unrelated explosions. Once I made the fatal error of giving him a glass of home-made wine as he stood stamping in the cold. He lost his head entirely, and standing up like Jehu, whipped up the team and disappeared in the distance before my husband could load the sleigh or get aboard himself. I think the cartons had to be dragged out to Yonge Street by toboggan in several relays that time. Small wonder that when it was all over, someone suggested awarding my husband a litle gold medal-something that only doggies could bestow upon a human being, for better than us, they know is true meaning. It was to be "The Order of the Faithful Heart". For hundreds of dogs, our supply was the only fresh meat they received during all the long months of rationing.

When spring finally arrived, the boarding kennel began its tremendous demands. Between us we managed to keep it going, my husband still delivering the food, for by something like leger-de-main, we had secured the somewhat ephemeral services of a school boy. He was a fugtive from a summer camp where he did not wish to spend his summer. Being a native of Hawaii, he spent a good deal of time making leis which he hung about the dogs' necks, my neck and the kennel

runs. He lasted just long enough to permit my husband a much needed week's vacation.

Things were running on an amazingly effective schedule by that time. Everything had to be arranged by appointment, of course, but the dogs were fine, and the place was looking lovely. For a while we had been afraid it might turn into a second "Gone With the Wind."

Our policy with regard to breeding was simply to keep up the blood lines. This we have done by allowing ourselves one litter a season, Spring and Autumn. Shipping, especially in the United States, is now too great a hazard. We simply can't stand the strain. Customers "come and get" their puppies—or don't get them at all. Boarders are brought and fetched—by arrangement and on schedule. It is amazing how many people find they can be prompt and also spare the gas.

As a result of this regimentation of everything, and the narrowing down of activities. I was actually able last year to do a "Mr. Chips" act and return to my profession, commuting from Aurora and returning every evening. For nearly a year now this arrangement has been working out very well indeed and I am fortunate to have a part-time housekeeper. There are only a few hours every other day when the place is alone. Now we have a fine boy for the summer of 1944, and in the fifth year of war, are still carrying on. Sometimes we wonder what all that big staff of ours used to do.

"Gentlemen, it can be done!"

Mystery of a Red Coat

wife of Harry R. of Toronto, and cousin of the Hon. Earl Rowe, has been interested in Irish Setters since childhood, owning her first in 1904. She imported Setters of the Jordan Farm strain because she is so greatly interested in their even temperament, so necessary in the dog show ring. While Mrs. Drew has never shown a dog through to its championship, dogs imported and owned by her have promulgated some of the best Irish Setters of today. Mr. and Mrs. Drew have two sons. The older, Petty Officer Writer Douglas Drew, R.C.N.V.R., has just returned from two years at sea and will soon be leaving again. Colin Drew is with Research Enterprises, Limited

The Irish Setter with his dignified poise, richly coloured coat and quiet behaviour stamps him as the gentleman and aristocrat that he is. His prowess in the field when properly trained cannot be excelled and as an exhibitionist he really shines.

When one chooses an Irish Setter from among the scores of other members of the canine family it must be for some well defined reason rather than the ordinary desire to possess a dog.

The Irish Setter enjoys the reputation of answering all the requisites of the dog lover's ideal and he is not so plentiful as to be common. He is unselfish and loyal, courageous, understanding and honest as well as possessing an almost human sympathy. Besides that he has a gay and merry spirit which adds to his desirability as a friend and pal. Summed up, he has all the great qualities in a dog that men might well try to gain for themselves. And he has unexcelled beauty in his rich elegance of colour.

These then, are the reasons for his popularity, these the reasons for one's personal choice.

One is first attracted to the Irish Setter because of his unique and distinctive colouring, giving little or no thought as to how that colour was attained and knowing nothing whatever of the mystery which has shrouded it throughout the ages.

The origin of the Irish Setter colour will never be known as history does not record the details. But the presumption upon which the logical solution is founded and contributory evidence gleaned from old pictures makes a rather interesting if not romantic story. In this short article a brief outline of the evolution is recalled.

The history of the Irish Setter goes back some five hundred years and like all other breeds has probably had many infusions of foreign blood. Unfortunately there are no records which give us any clue as to what breeds were used. Collateral relationship to the Spaniel is generally conceded and Setter development can be vaguely traced. After the death of Charles 1st, when hawking went out of fashion, the change to the Setter type became more pronounced. At the same time it would be difficult to say just when the Spaniel became a Setter or the Setter ceased to be a Spaniel. But, the digression from Spaniel to Setter type is readily understood.

The history of the Irish Red Setter can only be traced back to a little more than one hundred and twenty-five years. The history of the old white and red Setter antedates that of the all red dog which lends credence to the belief that both types were offshoots from the same basic stock if not identical in origin. Both the all red and white and red will throw each colour denoting they are of the same strain.

Sporting men in Ireland familiar with the red and the white and red varieties recognize a close relationship and it is generally believed that the Red Setter owes his origin to his white and red compatriot though what cross or crosses were made to produce the solid red colour one can only presume. The hunting ability of the older type was unquestioned and while in the seventies he was referred to as a "high ranging Spaniel" authorities claim that this phantom dog was identical to the Setter of later years.

This white and red Setter was so highly esteemed that even after the adoption by Irish sportsmen of the solid red dog as Ireland's national gun-dog many of the foremost breeders and fanciers clung to the old breed. As a result the two varieties were perpetuated and for many years Rossmore Castle preserved this strain and to this day these dogs are referred to as Rossmore Setters. Mr. A. E. H. Gillespie of Armagh bred both varieties and I am pleased to have in my collection three original snapshots of some of his remaining stock. He explains in his letter that "Gill" the female puppy whose picture is reproduced here is "a very typical specimen". These pictures were taken about thirteen years ago and Mr. Gillespie who was the Secretary of The Ulster Gundog

League at that time would in all likelihood know what he was talking about.

He also had some cross-bred dogs, the results of mating the all red dog with the old white and red and it is interesting to note that these cross breds invariably threw back to the older type having the same colour and markings. Others retaining this ancient breed in their kennels were Rev. Noble Huston and Mr. W. Robinson of Dungannon. It is quite possible that it is from the remnants of their stock that this obsolete variety is being revived. Not so long ago there appeared an item of news to the effect that classes at shows would be reopened for this old breed.

It is extremely difficult at the present time to visualize the Irish Setter as having been a parti-coloured dog and it is equally difficult to understand how a parti-coloured breed in which white predominated could be transmuted into a self-coloured red from which white was so successfully eliminated. Yet, this would appear to be the case.

For more than a century, the colour of the Irish Setter has been the theme of many stormy discussions and opinions bandied back and forth through the ages have seemingly shed little light on the true origin of his distinctive red colouring. Present day is no exception for controversies are still rampant, but,

since nothing can be proven such discussions will probably continue, ad infinitum.

A hint as to the possible source of colour in the Irish Setter is given in the standard which states, "with no trace whatever of black". His colour should be a rich golden chestnut or mahogany red with the permissable white markings. But black obtruded in many of the early specimens and the stock were frequently black. Edward Laverack, perhaps the greatest authority of all time on all that pertains to the Setter, in his monograph on the breed written in 1872 states, "One of the best specimens of the Irish Setter I ever saw was in the possesion of Rowland Hunt. Another magnificent specimen which I saw at Cockermouth Castle, Cumberland, belonged to the Late Gen. Wyndham; both of these dogs were blood red with a black shade on the tips of their coats. Another had an immense profusion of coat with a tinge of black on the tips of his ears". These dogs all threw black puppies occasionally, evidently denoting there must have been a black strain in the breed.

At the time when the parti-coloured Setter was changing his coat for a full red uniform sporting owners were extremely busy in their search for a capable retrieving dog. They were crossing their white and red Setters with Poodles, Water Spaniels, Newfoundlands and many other breeds in an endeavour to add the retrieving instinct and a tender mouth to the capacity of game

finding. How could these faculties, which the Irish Setter now has, have been better acquired than by a cross with the flat coated Retriever? This would account for the traces of black as prohibited by the standard.

Breeders argue that in breeding a whole coloured sire and a parti-coloured dam the offspring would be solid coloured; not necessarily favouring the colour of the sire but as often as not partaking of the more dominant colour of the dam. By this argument the white and red Setter mated with the black Retriever would produce puppies mostly all white or all red. If any were black or parti-coloured they would be discarded. In further substantiation of this argument, pictures of some of the early specimens greatly resembled the flat coated Retriever in conformation though being solid red in colour.

The white markings on our modern day Setters have not quite disappeared but Irish Setter breeders are persistent in their endeavours to eliminate it completely. It is not unusual for large litters now to be wholly red. White on the breast is a very striking contrast and is greatly admired by some, nevertheless the general tendency among good breeders is to strive for the solid red colour and the more intense it is the more highly esteemed.

In bringing the Irish Setter to the state of perfection which he enjoys today, it is claimed that other breeds were used such as the Pointer, or perhaps one of the other Setters, this of course after his colour was established. His alliance with the black Retriever is not contradicted when colour is the subject of discussion. It is feasible and if it is the result of accident it is an education as well.

Since his inception as the national gundog of Ireland many years ago his claim to purity has not been disputed and he breeds true to type. But his unique red colouring still furnishes that aura of mystery which shrouds his transition from a parti-coloured dog to one of solid red.

Summer Comfort For Your Dog

By Dr. J. A. CAMPBELL



DR. J. A. CAMPBELL, B.S., B.V.Se., C.M.Z.S., one of the oldest members of the C.K.C., and for many years Honorary Veterinarian, hardly needs an introduction to our readers. He exhibited hs first dog, Woolton Roona, a Field Spaniel, in 1899. Since then he has been interested in Wirehaired Terriers, Whippet racing and Cocker Spaniels. He was the first veterinarian to convince breeders of dogs susceptible to whelping troubles that a Caesarian operation is the safest and most humane method for delivery of puppes. Dr. Campbell is also Curator of Toronto Zoological Gardens; Director Toronto Humane Society; Senator Toronto University and a member of the Zoological Society of London, England. He served in the last war as a Major and now holds the rank of Colonel. Two sons are now overseas, John, a Captain attached to the First Canadian Army, and Pat, a Lieutenant in the British Infantry.

During the past twenty-five years there has been a pronounced increase in non-contagious skin diseases due to the fact that certain breeds of dogs, prone to these conditions, are in greater demand by the dog owning public. There is a continual conflict going on between nature and man from which the unfortunate dog is the sufferer. We find that the non-contagious forms of skin diseases are very largely confined to long-haired and rough-coated dogs, and that these conditions are far more common in the summer than in the winter.

If you make a survey of dogs benched in a show, you will see how the longhaired and rough-coated varieties outnumber the smooth breeds. In the popular Terrier group we find all the classes well filled; the rough-haired kind outnumbering the smooth representatives by ten to one; the Pekes, Poms, Poodles, Griffons and Yorkshires, all supposed to have more or less length of coat, comprise more than seventy-five per cent of the toys. The same ratio prevails among the big breeds, the Working and Sporting dog groups. The standard set for these breeds provides that importance must be attached to the coat. With some

in fact, it is the actual feature of the breed. For many generations man has put a great deal of effort into his breeding operations in an endeavour to produce desireable growths of hair. Indeed, for length, thickness and harshness of texture, man has managed to surpass nature, except in the winter in the very cold climates, but nature takes care of her animals and provides that the heavy coats which have been in use during the cold weather will be definitely cast in the spring or early summer, so that they may have a light covering of hair for the hot months. This is a provision that man has very much neglected, with the result that the shedding of the old coat and the growth of the new hair have been interrupted and disorganized. The outcome is that the heat regulating system of the skin becomes completely upset, and the result is only too frequently eczema, a term which is, perhaps too loosely used and very much abused, but which does cover a multitude of skin conditions.

Eczema may be acute or chronic, dry or moist, localized or diffused, but the fact is that it is far more common with the old than the young, with the long haired than the short, and in the summer than in the winter. This bears out the contention that the condition is associated with the shedding and growth of hair. Eczema calls for a wide range of treatment in the way of dips, washes, lotions, ointments, varnishes, powders and internal medication, everyone of which gives varying degrees of relief. But when all else in the way of medicinal aid fails, there is one rational step to take in the treatment of the majority of skin disease: that is to clip early and often, or artificially shed the coat, varying from the whole body to the width of the region on the top of the back from withers to tail. By doing this first and using medicines afterwards, results will be quicker, better and more permanent. And where a dog is incessantly scratching for no apparent reason at all, clipping seems to be the one means of giving relief. Some owners pay a great deal of attention to their dogs and aid nature in the process of shedding the hair by brushing and combing thoroughly every day, with the result that the skin is kept healthy; but they are few as compared with those who imagine a dog's hair is natural and requires no human interference other than an occasional brush and wash.

It is hard to say which is the more pitiful sight: a fat Collie or Pom covered with a long matted coat on a hot summer's day looking for a cool place, or a Whippet, Italian Greyhound, or some other short coated dog sitting on an icy doorstep on a cold day. People are apt to put a coat on a rough haired dog in cold weather, but would never dream of relieving the same dog of its suffering

from an unnaturally cumbersome coat in the summer.

I maintain that we should follow nature's example as much as possible when dealing with animals and the phenomenon of shedding the coat is one that should be closely carried out with respect to long haired dogs, if they are to be kept in good condition with healthy skins; so I am now advocating the removal of the coat in the spring or early summer by regular brushing, combing, stripping or clipping with all long haired and rough coated dogs, and even in some cases short haired dogs as the individual may require.

The clipping machine is brought more into use all the time. It has the great advantage of being quick, but the minor disadvantage of appearing to cut too short, or of perhaps leaving the marks of the machine, a very trivial objection and apparent only for a brief time. Stripping is suitable for Terriers but it requires an expert and takes a great deal of time.

The way in which dogs are brought back to be clipped every year in increasing numbers is proof that owners realize the benefits of getting rid of an old coat quickly. With some individuals it is necessary to strip or clip a second time-or partially so-in August, in some cases periodically every couple of months, particularly the rough haired breeds that are kept in warm surroundings. When some of these long haired or rough coated dogs, with their coats in full bloom are undergoing a more or less lengthy treatment in a warm hospital, a skin condition is likely to suddenly flare up in the form of a moist

Temperament in the Working Dog

By HEDLEY S. WELLER

The second essential factor is that

Working Dog Breeders should stop to compare the wonderful work being done by the dogs of war, used by the armed

forces, and the pampered show dog. The high standard of intelligence demanded for this war work is such that animals of unsound nervous systems are eliminated and justly so.

Temperament is a quality that can be described in many ways, but in my opinion it is a combination of only two things. First, and by far the more important, is a sound nervous system and secondly is nobility of character. To the breeder, these two characteristics should be dominant in the mother of the breed. The use of unsound animals for breeding purposes is like building our homes upon sand. They will collapse under pressure of wind and storm. It is difficult, I know, for owners of dogs, beautiful in conformation, but of unsound nervous systems, to refrain from breeding them. Unfortunately we often expect a sound stud dog to eliminate these undesirable traits from the progeny of a shy dam. After years of breeding, I have discovered

that this method will not correct the fundamental weakness of the unsound parent. It is comparable to putting a drop of ink in a bottle of milk-you can-

not see it but it is there.

illusive something which we instinctively recognize-nobility. Certain people

use of selected blood lines. Great strides have been made in improving the type and temperament of my own breed-

German Shepherds-by conscientious breeders.

The sound Working Dogsound not only in body but in mind-should be able to accommodate himself to any surroundings or conditions. The dog who has to look to his master for constant moral support is a failure. Another type to be criticized is the animal that ignores everything and yet is not afraid of anything. These are too stupid to recognize the unusual and would be a failure for all useful purposes.

Temperament in the Working Dog has always been a very touchy subject but I am unable to see why beauty cannot be combined with brains. In Europe before the war, certain breeds of working dogs had to have working qualifications before they could compete in the show ring. Thus brains are not sacrificed to beauty. In the past few years at various Canadian and American shows, specialty judges, principally, have been severely penalizing working dogs of

questionable temperament. This is a step in the right direction and should in time eliminate from the show ring those craven animals, afraid of their own shadows, so detrimental to the future of our dogs.



NORTHERN ALBERTA NOTES Leonard H. Horncastle

In a letter received from Nicky Finn, the California handler, we read some very flattering remarks about a Sealyham pup flown to the Golden State and sold to Lt.-Com. Harry A. Adams, U.S.N.R., by Mrs. M. D. Gardner. Mr. Finn was full of praise for his pup, who is known as Felbourne Fiery Queen, and predicts that she will annex her championship in the minimum number of shows. Mrs. Gardner also sent a promising show prospect to Sqdn. Ldr., Mac-Pherson, Vancouver.

At the May meeting of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' club the members were favored by a very interesting address by "Bill" Irwin, an old-time dog breeder, known to the older members of this district. In a short informal talk he dealt with judges and judging problems, and skimmed lightly over the usefulness of various sporting breeds. It is very refreshing to hear a man, who gives you the impression of knowing what he is talking about, give his convictions uncurbed and unvarnished—that's the way Mr. Irwin talks.

The financial results of the Chinese War Relief dog show, held at Edmonton, on Easter Monday are now in, showing a cheque for \$1,006.39 handed over to this fund. Without doubt this show eclipses any recent show held there, not only from the financial standpoint, but from the high standard of the entries and the attendance viewpoint.

The May meeting of the local dog club was to have been devoted to the probable formation of plans for holding field and Retriever trials near Edmonton this coming Fall; but owing to unforseen meetings at the Medical School at the University we were unable to have the attendance of local medical men versed in the procedure of these matches. However, we are assured that the June meeting will see this project launched, and we urge all our members to sidetrack any counter attractions for this meeting. We are assured of thorough co-operation from the local branch of the Alberta Fish and Game League, but one hundred per cent co-operation is needed by all those interested to put the issue over, so let's make it an "allout" for the June meeting!

Mrs. S. C. Arno has recently purchased an outstanding Pekingese from the New Jersey kennels of Mrs. Emma Thygesen; biscuit colored, this male has been shown at several eastern shows, and secured a second ribbon at the Westminster show. Other recent importations include a male and female Cocker brought in by W. T. Tetterington from the Tokolon Kennels, we regret we have not the particulars of these Cockers at hand, but the young male certainly has promise of being a type for local breeders to consider. Mr. Tetterington, who is comparatively new to the dog game, secured a kennel of Cockers somewhat below the average type, a mistake that is only too often

Scioto King David ex Ch. Kappa of York.

A notice of motion has been made that it is intended at the next annual meeting to consider changing the name of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' club to the Edmonton Kennel club.

Plans are on foot, approved by the northern members, to establish an Alberta circuit of shows this Fall, starting with Medicine Hat on Labour Day, followed by Calgary and Edmonton. This is a step in the right direction, and the Saskatchewan show-giving clubs migh take under advisement making an extended circuit, with Regina and Moose Jaw before Medicine Hat, Saskatoon club following Edmonton. With Winnipeg connecting up this Prairie circuit could become a universal affair.



Major Quirk did the judging, which may have had a bearing on the entry. Conformation, angulation and movement are his strong suits and on that basis he'll always be popular with us. He gave Bill Mc-Auley's young Cocker a nice win, which pleases us Manitoba fans; personally we've always liked Bill's red stud, the sire of this one, and there should be some more winners to come from this

We had a pressing invitation to attend the Saskatoon show, held in April and are sorry to have had to turn it down. but as you've probably read in the papers the live stock business is really something these days and we can't get very far away from home. Two of the Manitoba Kennel's entries came out on top there, Blond Memory, a sister of Keystone, took everything in solids and a black youngster by Keystone, Manitoba Masterkey, went all the way from Senior Puppy to Winners, beating an American Champion en route. Canada. And now we're going to pull an "I told you so". Fresh back from the Saskatoon show, Masterkey has gone into training and he's really getting down to it, enjoying trip out. He put up his first cock pheasant for us the other day and was as keen as the proverbial mustard, working the scent like a veteran and needing no introductions. Did we say something recently about the feasibility of putting our show dogs into field work? This one has all the heredity instincts and will be "useful as well as ornamental", you'll be seeing him around the shows following a season in training and he'll be the better for days spent next to nature.

Results from a reorganization meeting of the Gun-dog Club of Manitoba have proven very gratifying and the Club looks to be away to an interesting and active summer; weekly workouts will be a feature, with the promise of a well organized Fall trial to come. The membership is around the forty mark at the moment, but that's only half of it. Col. Tulloch is the 1944 President, Harold Taylor is Vice and yours truly, Secretary-Treasurer. The President will have with him as an executive, a group of committee chairmen fully capable of giving the Club active support.

The April bulletin of Fish and Game has included in it this interesting observation:

"Dogs aid in two ways in conservation work. In the first place they retrieve dead birds and save cripples. The second is psychological: The owner of a good dog immediately becomes conscious of the necessity of maintaining the game population. Practically without exception he starts to shoot carefully, observing the bag limits and places more value on live birds in the field than on dead birds in the bag. The pleasure of making a good clean shot does not equal the thrill that come from the sight of a tense dog on a trinstand, his game located and properly held, while the hunter and his shooting companions take up their positions.

To the owner of a dog, there is meastisfaction in hunting that quite equals the fact that the dog proudly return with a crippled bird or one dropped in an inaccessible place for either himsel or his shooting companions. There seem to be something about the ownership a trained dog that almost automatical makes a conservationalist of the owner.

Both of these organizations, the Mantoba Fish and Game and the Gundo Club are worthy of your support.

The exhibitors would like to thank and compliment Mrs. George Sanborne, who arranged lunch and dinner in a quiet homelike atmosphere. No show the editor has attended in the last eighteen years served more delicious home-cooked meals. Over the loudspeaker system, Mr. Hopton in his inimitable manner, told an enthusiastic audience of some two thousand, that never had he seen such quality of dogs at an All Breed show. Canada is rapidly taking her place in the world as the foremost breeder of purebred dogs. American exhibitors brought their top dogs along and there is no doubt but that Canadian Fancy is reaching the top of the ladder in the

breeding and exhibiting of purebred dogs.

Time and space permit only the awards of Best in Show and Group, the Wire-Haired Fox Terrier Wynwire Saddle, owned by Mrs. M. A. Kraft, of Detroit, Mich., and handled by Pte. George Ward, was Best in Show, a duplicate of the Windsor Show.

The Sporting Group was won by the Cocker Spaniel Whirlaway of Irolita, the latest importation of Miss Elsie Mayhew of Markham, and handled by George Boyd. This dog placed top in a class of fifty, one of the finest aggregations of Cocker Spaniels ever seen in a Canadian ring. The hound group had for its winner a beautiful Borzoi, "Krasna Boris of Radziwell", owned and shown by Mrs. Madge Cluxton of Guelph, whose Glenwild Kennels have a remarkable record throughout the United States and Canada. The Working Group honors went to the Doberman Pinscher, Ch. Renco von Mannerheim, owned and shown by H. D. Reynolds of Toronto, and bred by Dr. Wilfred Shute of Guelph. This dog justified our contention that a sound working and show dog also possesses an ideal temperament.

The Terrier Group was won by the eventual Best in Show winner Wynwire Saddle, capably shown by Pte. George Ward, who is now in training for active service with the infantry.

The Toy Group was hotly contested and the miniature pinscher, Am. Ch. Trail Blazer of Geddesburg, owned by W. A. Harris of Toronto, and handled by Paddy Boughs, still reigns supreme. The turn out at this show was the best Toy Group seen in a long time. The nonsporting group went to the English Bulldog El-Torno Dusky Crusader, owned by Mr. and Mrs. James Parker of Paris, Ontario. This is the breed which the judge, Charles Hopton, introduced to this country and the entry at the Guelph show was the largest seen in Canada for many years.

Westphalia's Raswin who is campaigning on the Ontario circuit. Raswin won the Working Group at Windsor. Nearly 100 per cent pure-blood descendant of the Helios line, Rameses is not only one of the greatest show specimens in the country, but is also proving to be a very potent stud force. He should be of great benefit to the Doberman Pinscher breeders in Canada.

Mr. Wade has many other good Doberman Pinschers in his kennels. His latest acquisition is Bruce v. Wilsona of Seigester breeding. Bred from the best of Germany's Seigers and Seigerins he will be used to outcross females sired by Rameses.

Dog Shows for War Charities

Canada has no such project as the Dogs For Defence organization in the United States where some 20,000 dogs are giving their intelligence to aid in the battlefields, but we do have dog shows, from which the receipts are given to aid those suffering from the ravages of war.

It has been suggested that Canada's dogs' war effort should be given prominence and with this in mind we are contemplating giving editorial space to such shows each month. Please send details to this magazine to reach us not later than the 15th of the month preceding publication.

In a country as vast as ours where shows are sometimes held in inaccessible places, it would hardly be fair to make comparisons of the donations. Outdoor shows are apt to be spoiled by inclement weather and naturally the gate receipts fall, causing a deficit for which the club is responsible. To overcome this difficulty the sponsors of the show call upon the dogs for help and as a result thousands of dollars have been raised through the sales of tickets on pure bred puppies.

The Progressive Kennel Club starts the ball rolling on June 24th with an outdoor show on the grounds of the Dufferin Race track in Toronto. If the weather is cold or wet sheltered accommodation is available where the dogs may be benched and judged. Hot lunches will be served and the facilities of the Dufferin Race Track are available to the exhibitors.

A number of pure bred puppies have been donated on which draw tickets are being sold. Included are two

The judges' list for this event appears elsewhere in this issue and as it is an all-breed show, exhibitors are requested to arrive early so that judging may be completed by twilight.

On July 1st the All-Terrier show, sponsored by A. Palmer and the Irish Terrier fanciers, will be held on the grounds of the Ballycliff Kennels. Canada, United States and Northern Ireland have joined forces to make this an outstanding event. Prospects are even brighter than last year, when one hundred and fifty entries were received—the largest Terrier event in Canada. Judging honors have been divided between two well-known men—one from Canada and the other from United States.

Major-General A. E. Potts, C.B.E., commanding officer Military District No. 2 has consented to be chief honorary patron. Other honorary patrons will be Hon. R. C. Mathews, president of the Toronto Humane Society; Major Everett Bristol, K.C.; Capt. Reginald Brock, C.B.E., R.C.N.V.R.; Air Vice-Marshall A. T. Cowley, R.C.A.F.; Rev. J. R. Mc-Kavney, of Pittsburgh, Pa.; Hon. W. J. Stewart, C.B.E., Speaker of the Ontario Legislature and Controller W. J. Wadsworth.

Highlight of last year's event was the gesture of Robert Grant of Ballymena, Northern Ireland, in donating and shipping an Irish Terrier puppy, Slemish Sentiment, as a draw prize. For this year's draw six of her puppies are on the list, and in addition Mr. Grant is sending another Irish Terrier, Slemish Samaritan, a promising nine months' old youngster.

The above message is one of which his parents are very proud, and who wouldn't be. It is a courageous message that brings out the spirit of these young lads who proudly go out from England on these bombing missions.

In May, 1943, Fred's bomber and its crew made a successful raid over the Ruhr Valley but were shot down over Holland on their way home. Sergeant F. W. Walkerdine was killed in action and buried in Dalen Cemetery, Holland together with three other members of the crew. The other three are now prisoners of war in Germany.

His younger brother, Kenneth A. Walkerdine, formerly of the Accounting Department of the *Toronto Daily Star*, is a Flying Officer (R.C.A.F.) in charge of a medium fast bomber as Navigator and Bomb Aimer. Ken trained at No. 1 I.T.S. at Eglinton, Toronto, where he topped his class. He is a very keen student and finished his training at No. 10 A.O.S. which earned him a commission as Pilot Officer. He is determined to seek revenge for his brother's death.

does not obey its handler, any handler
who interferes wilfully with another
competitor or his dog, and bitches in
heat, and may exclude from competition any dog which he considers unfit
to compete.

The owner or agent entering a dog in an Obedience Trial does so at his own risk and agrees to abide by the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club.

The decisions of the Bench Show, Field Trial or Obedience Trial Committee present shall be conclusive in all matters arising at the Trial and shall bind all parties, subject however, to the Rules of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Any dog entered and received at an Obedience Trial must compete in all classes in which it is entered, unless excused by the judge.

it possible to run off three big cards with speed and smoothness.

Forty-one Pointers and Setters competed in three stakes, Puppy, Novice and Open All-Age. Novice and All-Age, most of the contestants located game and handled well, and some excellent exhibitions of "backing" were displayed by dogs whose brace mates made finds.

The weather on Sunday was clear and mostly sunny and although the going was a bit heavy for the dogs, owing to the heavy rain of the previous day, a large gallery followed all braces. Lieut.-Col. W. H. Singer, of Niagara-on-the-Lake, president of the association, spent the entire day in the saddle following the contestants.

Headquarters for the event was the River View Inn where prizes were presented to the winners of the Pointer and Setter stakes.

Spaniels were judged by Frank Lock, Burlington and Wm. J. Phillips, Jr., Niagara Falls, N.Y. Judges for the Pointer and Setter events were Roy Johnson, Buffalo, N.Y. and Irvine Lounsbury, St. Catharines.

Official guns for the Spaniel trials were W. B. Elliott, St. Catharines and Dr. J. A. Meek, Welland.
