



Mossie's Kerry Blue

By J. R. S. FROGGATT

Private Albert Moss, more intimately known as "Mossie", was first introduced to the Canadian public over the National Network of the C.B.C. four years ago, and has been the central figure in most of Mr. Froggatt's occasional radio talks since then. In this new story, specially writen for "Dogs In Canada", Mr. Froggatt tells us more about Mossie and his reputed Kerry Blue.

Englishmen have been proverbially dog lovers since the time of the Romans, and being very much an Englishman, and a Yorkshireman at that, it would have been surprising indeed if the love of a dog had not been one of Mossie's outstanding characteristics. There were times when we rather wished he had not inherited this trait quite so strongly. But before going into that it should be explained to those unacquainted with him that "Mossie" was Private Albert Moss, of a Yorkshire Regiment, a batman and orderly, given to introducing himself as "late Mister Albert Moss, window cleaner up in 'Alifax, with a small wife and a big family: a bit flat-footed an' shortsighted; thin on the top, an' not so young as he once was." He might have added, "with an extraordinary bump of curiosity and acquisitiveness", but that may appear as this yarn unfolds.

Every dog he came across at once took to Mossie, and he generally had one or more of some sort with him, but when we were in the South of Ireland, in County Cork to be exact, towards the end of the last war, he became a dog owner. He acquired what he swore was a Kerry Blue. He christened it Sergeant Hawkes, "because it's got a face just like Sergeant 'Awkes what enlisted me." But he generally referred to it simply as 'Awkes. Aitches were not so strong a point with Mossie as dogs, but that by the way.

As to how 'Awkes was acquired, perhaps the less said the better. Mossie was somewhat reticement on that point, but he was always at great pains to explain the dog had a pedigree. No one ever seemed to have seen it. Invariably, if it wasn't "in me other tunic", it had "been sent home to t' Missus". It doesn't follow, of course, that no such thing existed, any more than it follows that a dog is necessarily first-class because it happens to have an undisputed pedigree. But certainly if 'Awkes had a pedigree he failed to grow up to it.

Poor old 'Awkes! He wouldn't be considered much of a Kerry today.

It wasn't merely a matter of colour. There was precious little blue about the dog, but then blue is an elusive colour in many breeds. And though 'Awkes was to quote Mossie himself, "as black as t'Ace of Spades", black and tan points were then allowed in Ireland. He looked tough enough, and Heaven knows he was. Perhaps it was his size that was against him. He must have weighed, at a moderate guess, something like 45 lbs., while the recog-

nized weight was from 33 to 37 lbs., though, so far as Mossie was concerned, that proved nothing. "Do you mean to say?" he would argue, "at my oldest lad isn't a Moss just because he stands six-foot-two in 'is stocking feet, an' 'is Mother 'as to stand on a stool to kiss 'im?" That was usually where you gave up, and "rested your case", as the lawyers say.

However it may have been about the pedigree, there were naturally some things about 'Awkes there was no disputing. Beyond all argument he was, in his owner's phrase, "a champion ratter", and he answered most of the requirements of a watch dog. He could set a bird as well as any dog breathing, or scent a hare for miles. And, as Mossie assured the Colonel when defending the dog against a charge of nipping the Old Man's leg, he was "awful good with children". The Old Man never seemed quite able to grasp what that had to do with the matter in hand, but at least it was a point he could not dispute. All that apart though, 'Awkes was, from the beginning, a terrible nuisance. It would, of course, be possible to make out quite a case for him, proving the extent to which it was Mossie who was really to blame . . . but we can't go into that now.

On the whole, 'Awkes' relations with the human kind were good. Admittedly, there was open warfare between him and the Colonel, without any armistice, as you may say, to the very end of his military career. And he couldn't, for some reason, in Mossie's words, "abide t'Royal Irish Constabulary". But if, such exceptions apart, his relations with humanity were friendly and good, that is more than could be said of his manners in the canine world.

The very first day he was with the outfit he was into a scrap with a couple of Dachshunds belonging to the party who managed one of the camp recreation huts. Since 'Awkes won "hands down", Mossie thought that was "a bit of orl right", especially, no doubt, as he and the owner of the hounds were not on the best of terms. She was the maiden lady, one of those unappropriated blessings you expect to find engaged in good works, who once rang up and asked if she could "borrow that funny fellow with the flat feet" to do something or other round the hut. Mossie was on the other end of the wire. She couldn't remember his name, but she made it quite clear who she wanted. "You know", she went on, "he's a shiney bald head and speaks with an accent you could cut with a knife!" Mossie knew well enough. With a face something like a boiled lobster he let her rip, then he told her: "That's me, when you've finished." He never thought much of her after that. "H'm!" he'd sniff. "Er! 'Er with them German sausage dogs! She can't be up to no good wi' them round." He seemed honestly to believe that, and seemed to regard it a patriotic duty to set 'Awkes on to those unfortunate Daschunds whenever he could. "They're no use, anyway," he'd say.

So far as those particular hounds were concerned, that was just about the case, because the good woman had stuffed them to the point they could scarcely waddle. But Mossie was never convinced that, when it comes to the breed in general, he was libelling as sporting a little chap as walks on four legs. It makes no difference which of the three kinds of Dachshunds you take, the smooth-coated long-haired or the wire-haired, they're all as sporting little chaps as their name implies: Dachs, badger, and hund, dog. If it was spelt as it is pronounced the spelling would be "Daxhund". In Europe they are used for going to ground and finding and marking badgers and foxes, and in many other forms of sport. Mossie was told this, and how as companions they are most lovable, being very faithful, sagacious, good guards and very hardy. But it made no difference. He was utterly unimpressed.

There were other fights of course: lots of them. In fact, we always seemed to be settling troubles that arose from them. But that was only part of the story. Directly or indirectly, that blessed dog seemed to be at the bottom of half our grief.

Take the upset down at Mulligan's. The private soldier is never very far from what we will call financial embarrassment, but Mossie was never away from it at all. It was a chronic ailment with him, and when he had business at the local hostelries, as being Mossie he often had, it was more than likely to be necessary to raise funds on the security of his personal property. The time in question it was 'Awkes he left as security "for value received".

The story of what happened then is best related just as old Mulligan, the landlord of the Military Hotel, reeled it off when he came up to headquarters "just to see about things". He wouldn't sit down. "Begorra, Sir," he said, "But if yer Honour'll pardon me I'll just kape standing." Which he did while he proceeded to explain that it was "about your Misther Moss". It so often was when the local population came to see us. That opening got rather monotonous, but this was at least something new.

"Arrah, Sir," Mulligan continued, "but ye've a man there with his head on, if ivver ye had one. I'll tell ye! Through no fault of his own, athall, athall, he was left owin' me the small mather o' foive bob"—in other words, a dollar.

"Mulligan' he sez, when he comes down to me esthablishment last night," 'Mulligan, oi can't pay ye, an' oi'm distreshed beyong measure'." That was open to doubt, the distress part, but still ... "Mulligan', he sez, 'ye're a great dog lover, will ye take me hound?"

"Well, sir, as shure as me name's Pether Paul Mulligan oi was in no nade of it, with all the dogs oi have about the place, and it being left-handed, as ye may say, in the mather of ancestry, but what ye can't get one way, ye have to take another in this disthreshful world. So I agrade. "For foive bob', I sez, 'I'll take him of ye'."

"Five bob?" he sez, "Five bob? Dog price is seven an' six, like gettin' married. Seven an' six or nowt." I tell ye, Sor, he's a man in a million, Misther Moss. And would ye belave it, Sor, it was all aginsth me better judgment, but with the thoughts o' him with seven brats an' them all aloive, I took it. Oi gave him half a crown to boot, and tied his hound, the dirthy spalpeen, to the leg of a chair in me private office. The bhoys was all sat round, and when I gets up to serve them again, may Heaven forgive me if I didn't trip over his rope. Down on me hands an' knees, oi was, like a blessed donkey, with four of me best Watherford glashes me grandmother set so much by may the Saints preserve her sowl, all rolling on the floor. An' when I went to get up, what does the owld heathen do but grab me behind. A piece clane out of me throusers and his teeth well in me. Bad cess to him!

"But that wasn't the worst, Sor. Why, me maid has the palpitations yet, poor soul, and if I say it was only by the grace o' God an' me best brandy she didn't join the Saints above, it's no more than the truth!

"I'd no sooner got the poor baste quietened down than somebody whistled, a whistle that baste knew. He was asleep under the chair as unconcerned as a new-born babe, but when he hears it-I heard it with my own ears-he darts up and is away like the wind o' Heaven, taking the leg o' me chair he was tied to. At the door he shoots between the legs of me maid and down she goes, on top of me cat that scratched her face for her throuble, taking me shmall table me grandmother had always set such store by with her, an' more of me Watherford glasses shmashed to smithereens.'

Incidentally, Mulligan had some good glass, but it's likely that "Waterford" in this case was just a figure of speech.

"Out of the front door, with four, or it may have been foive—I was in no condition athall to count—of me own dogs barking afther him, with Misther Moss—and I'm no liar, as sure as me name's Pether Paul Mulligan—waithing for him on the other side of the street!

"Misther Moss," I sez, when I came up to him and he spakes up and asks me what's wrong, as innocent as you please, and as if it wasn't himself had whistled athall, athall. "Misther Moss,"

If yer Honour happens to have the small matter of half a crown which Misther Moss lacks or if ye could just make it seven and six . . .

Another time Mossie and 'Awkes ran into trouble was at the local Kerry Field Trials. Jealous of the dog's reputation as workers, our Irish friends organize, or they did then, field trials at which their pluck and endurance can be tested. Naturally, the inseparables were there. Mossie and 'Awkes wouldn't have missed such an event for anything. They began by getting into an argument as to whether there could have been a field trial "hundreds o' years ago".

Actually, the first Field Trials recorded in the Old Country were held in 1865, as some old Irishman who had been there told him. Mossie was not to know this; he took them back almost to the days of Noah. But then he'd always argue the more heatedly over a matter if he knew nothing about it. He got a black eye for his pains, and sometime during the day 'Awkes "retrieved" half a dozen of someone's decoy ducks which Mossie afterwards sold back to their owner "to get some Christmas cheer".

But there was much more to that eventful day than can be told now. All there remains room for here is a story Mossie brought back with him. It is fiction, of course, but like most of Mossie's yarns was told with all the elements of truth.

"Yes", he said, "We was comin' back when we met a little kid cryin'. When we asked 'im what was wrong he sez he's lost 'is dog. "Well", I sez to him, "that nowt much. I've lost me grandmother". An' would yer believe it, t'little beggar turns on me an sez: "Yes, but you didn't bring her up from a pup!"



POLICE DOGS

ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE]

"That faithful servant of mine (the dogge that followes me) be ever biting of the wild beast, till they bee all driven into one heard, and so hunted into the toylesoftheLaw."

The above lines, a compliment to "man's best friend," written at the beginning of the seventeenth century, suggests the recognition throughout the centuries of the value of dogs as a protective agency.

As early as the fifteenth century history records that dogs were used in England to assist the law, that they were supported by taxes levied on the district and that a law was in existence declaring that whoever denied entrance to one of these dogs would be treated as an accessory to the crime. At first there was a great deal of prejudice

against these dogs, which were desselves to any emergency and condition. cribed as "wild, savage brutes". This stigma has long been removed.

Good law-enforcement dogs, like the human detective, are born not made. Qualities desired, noticeable from puppy days, are encouraged and developed by endless patience and teaching, until nature and man have accomplished a veritable miracle in canine sagacity.

In some police forces, dogs are trained to a specific purpose, such as tracking, searching, guarding, etc. The dogs used by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, however, are necessarily very versatile in all phases and able to adapt themselves to any emergency and condition.

They, as well as their future masters, are trained by an expert. The dogs are taught to bark on command, and also without command, when observing any suspicious object; to come and go at a command; to fetch and carry; to clear obstacles up to ten feet in height while carrying objects; to jump through open windows; to seek and fetch objects their master has hidden, or belonging to strangers whether hidden or thrown away, and to crawl on their stomachs whenever necessary; to go for assistance; to guard objects without quitting them, whoever may tempt or threaten; to refuse food from any but their master (to avoid being poisoned); to search for stolen property inside of houses: to attack quarry without giving injury and without being gunshy; to

throw down or trip and guard a runaway criminal; to watch the criminal and, without actually biting him, prevent his flight during their master's absence; to attack and throw in the open a criminal who assaults either dog or master and assist in taking him to the lock-up; to attack the running criminal who shoots, by grabbing his gun-arm and sticking to him until assistance arrives; to examine carefully and search systematically streets, gardens and outhouses and on finding anyone concealed, to give tongue until master arrives; and to perform difficult feats of climbing ladders and of distinguishing between a fugitive and a lost person.

To master the foregoing, dogs require some eighty lessons—most of them require patient repetition. The dog masters themselves require certain qualifications and undergo a course of instruction with their particular dog in order that it will have full confidence in him.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police first used dogs for police work in 1935 by the purchase of "Dale", German Sheep dog. He was first called upon to assist in a search for a two-year-old child who had wandered away from her father's residence. "Dale" took scent from some of the child's clothing and began searching the fields. A posse of approximately one hundred and fifty men searched throughout the night and

morning. It had been raining hard and the ground had been all tramped, the search appeared hopeless. Suddenly "Dale's" nose went in the air and he wheeled and ran towards a field of heavy wheat, moving so rapidly that on horseback could follow him, and there he found his quarry. What hundreds of humans could not accomplish in eighteen hours, "Dale" had done in a short space of two hours. Since that time the use of dogs has speedily increased till today there are some seventeen dogs posted at various points from Cape Breton to Alberta. Others will be put in the field as the need arises.

Although dogs have been used in other countries for some years they are now making their first appearance in Canada in this specialized capacity. Most dogs show a very high order of intelligence. A complete survey of the work performed by all dogs fails to disclose any person or property having received injury or damage from any action taken by them. Dogs at all times have shown complete obedience under the most trying circumstances. The degree of intelligence shown at times has been almost uncanny. In searching for evidence such minute objects as burnt matches and cigarette butts have been retrieved by the dogs and carefully brought to their masters.

On one occasion "Dale" noticed a \$1.00 bill blowing across a vacant lot. Apparently realizing that it was not an ordinary scrap of paper and that it had monetary value, he chased and re-

covered it, then located its rightful owner, who was a total stranger.

The average person might consider that a thorough and lengthy training course as boresome to dogs, but to the contrary. One evening another police service dog, "Tell", disappeared from his kennel and eventually was located on the training field all alone and seriously rehearsing his course of instructions as a conscientious student should.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police have established training kennels at Rockcliffe, Ont., just outside Ottawa, and here all dogs and dogmasters receive their training. It is just as necessary to train the handler as it is the dog. The dogs are carefully selected and chosen and sent to the Kennels for a full try out. Those dogs retained then undergo a period of three-months' training with their handler. Then, dogmaster and his

OBSERVATIONS OF THE MINIATURE SCHNAUZER

By Harvey M. Gratton

I have observed these Miniature Schnauzers at various shows, and the great interest displayed in them by the general public is significant, but not surprising. Poor specimens have been observed, and it seems to me, that this is one breed in which a poor specimen is very poor indeed. They are either very good or very bad, and there does not appear to be any half-way mark. This applies to temperament as well as to general standards.

Having admired his Miniature Schnauzers at the Shows, I considered myself fortunate when I met Mr. Wylie vacationing at Grand Bend and was able to really study these dogs and gain my own impressions of them. Before having studied them I must admit that I was somewhat surprised that a Doberman man would take to Miniature Schnauzers but, after becoming better acquainted with the Breed, I must confess that it is a very attractive little Terrier, which any dog-lover might be proud to own.

Being a Doberman man, what I probably admire most in the Miniature Schnauzer is his "spunk". He is a really spirited little Terrier and although standing only 13 inches or so at the withers and weighing about one pound per inch, he will tackle anything regardless of size. In spite of his aggressiveness, however, he appears to be naturally obedient and easily trained.

I have heard that one of the outstanding characteristics of this breed was their habit of sticking very close to home, when allowed to run loose; a very desirable characteristic in any dog.

The profuse whiskers and beard, and the overhanging eyebrows give the Miniature Schnauzer a very attractive and game appearance, and the harsh Terrier coat and abundant leg furnishings, with a well proportioned frame and body, make a most presentable little animal that is hard to beat.

All dogs competing had excellent dispositions, and with careful systematic work, not unmingled with play, the losers in the day's contest may very well be on top in the near future.

I have heard criticisms that I judged too severely, only two dogs qualifying in both Novice "A" and "B", i.e., four dogs in all. It has always been my contention that a cheap championship has little worth, whether on the bench or in the field. Surely, there would be small glory in owning a field champion that could not back his or her championship with a reasonable standard of excellence. A trained dog, whether trained by novice handler or professional, has but one standard of excellence, which is 100 per cent. To attain 100 per cent a dog must be willing, eager, happy, live up to the manner of performance set down for each exercise, and complete each exercise to perfection.

MINISTERIAL ORDER NUMBER 59 (Rabies)

In reply to a question from a Foronto Club, the Veterinary Director General for Canada, Mr. M. Barker, states:

- That there are no quarantine areas in Canada. Dogs may not, however, run at large in the City of Windsor or surrounding Townships. The order governing entry of dogs from the United States applies to all States in that country.
- There are no closed ports. All dogs must, however, be covered by a certificate issued by the Veterinary Inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry at the port of exit from the United States.
- 3. There are no exempted districts.
- 4. With the exception of trained performing dogs, all dogs, regardless of the purpose for which entered, must be covered by a certificate as called for in the Order No. 59. This order was printed in full in the October number of Dogs In Canada.

Dog Psychology

Having special permission from the Publishers, JONATHAN CAPE, Toronto, we reprint a chapter from this best seller "Sixty Below", by Sergeant TONY ONRAET with the Canadian Army Overseas, a story of his life in the Arctic. A breathless story of experience in the area of Great Slave and Great Bear Lake, he bred and trained a team of Huskies from the original purchase of a BARREN LAND HUSKY BITCH, three-quarters Wolf, at the cost of a Baby Ben Alarm Clock.

There are parts of the Mackenzie River districts so much alike that on a cloudy or foggy day even an old-timer with a lot of experience might easily get lost. And that is just what happened to me one night in the middle of May.

I was hunting beavers. I had left my main camp—a tent pitched on the shore of a small lake in the middle of my hunting ground. This is the usual camping method for trappers: they prospect a part of the bush that has plenty of creeks and lakes, and when they have decided that judging by looks, it must hold plenty of game-enough to keep them going for about three months-they make camp, as I did. Think of the tent that was my headquarters as a sort of hub of a wheel, with trails radiating from it like spokes. These trails, of course, are only trails as long as the snow is on the ground, when you can see your own snowshoe prints. Here and there a chip may be sliced off a tree, Indian fashion, to give direction when the weather gets clear. These blazes are easily recognized even after the snow is gone, and they are all that is left to guide the trapper to the places he has spotted during the

There's a catch in it, though, and here it is. Sooner or later, while the trapper is spotting the spring hunting-ground, he will come upon a lake. He has blazed his trail as far as the shore, and if the distance across the ice is not too far he takes a bearing on a big tree, or a rock, or a little bay, or any other landmark, but preferably a tree. He blazes it in a way that can be seen from the other side of the lake when he looks back. There he will leave a similar mark. Then when he returns to the same lake later on, and the wind has filled in his tracks with blown snow,

or fresh snow has fallen heavily, he is able to make a bee-line for the blazed tree across the water and renew the bush trail without difficulty. This plan works well as long as the ice is on the lake before Break-up. But it is different matter when you arrive at the edge of open water. Instead of walking straight across the frozen surface, say a mile or so, you are obliged to walk round the lake, often half a dozen miles more than that if the water happens to be long and narrow.

On this trip of mine I intended to go but a short distance, just far enough to bag a couple of beavers on a small lake towards Roche - à - Clark. The weather looked like turning wet, and I had no wish to be far from my camp when the rain came. An early spring rain can spell blank misery for those who are unfortunate enough to be caught in it. Because of this I took only my two favourite and strongest huskies with me. They were Rollo and Gin, and they had empty packs strapped on them to bring back meat for the team, as well as a supply for my own use. Rollo and Gin could be depended on to obey me instantly, and to keep absolutely rigid for hours at a stretch if necessary. We had not travelled far from camp when we came upon a miniature lake, some three hundred yards across, and there, swimming in the middle, I saw a big otter.

I hushed the dogs and cocked my rifle. I followed this with a long sharp whistle—and the ruse succeeded. The swimming otter heard it, raised his head and faced me for a moment, presenting a target. I let go at him. By the furious way he threshed in the water I knew I had not missed.

Then he lay still, dead still. I turned to one of the dogs: "Okay; go get him, Gin!" Gin was off in a streak. A powerful swimmer, but as he made towards the otter she came to, and immediately headed for the opposite shore. Good as Gin was in speed, the otter left him behind. Landing, she struck across the bush to another lake, about half a mile distant, and arrived there five yards sooner than the dog. Gin had gained on land, but otters are more at home in the water.

While this was going on I had not wasted any time. I started off around the lake, followed by Rollo. The shore was swampy; it took me up to the knees, all black mud, and Rollo was black mud too. I couldn't afford to take to higher ground because I had to keep my eyes on the spot where the otter and the dog had landed, so that I could take the trail from there. I sent Rollo ahead to help, and then, at the end of the lake, I ran into a black bear! Up went the gun. Bang! I never stopped to look. I knew my aim was good and I figured I could come back to that bear later on. It would give us some excellent dog-feed. But the otter mattered more at the moment. It was extremely valuable to me, in dollars.

Suddenly I heard a commotion 'way forward. A hell of a commotion. I guessed I wouldn't need to look for the trail taken by the otter and my dogs; the great noise they were setting up would be sufficient guide! Gin had caught up with the otter. The fight was on.

I cut straight through the bush on the run. The other lake was not far. And there, on the shore, was Rollo, licking a big gash high up on his right front leg. I fervently hoped the leg wasn't broken . . . But I had to give my first attention to Gin, battling in the water. Poor fellow, he didn't have much chance. An otter that size could beat and murder a dog on land, let alone in the water, her own element. playing on the home ground, so to speak. But Gin refused to be beaten. The struggle went on. The water changed colour. Sometimes the two disappeared from sight for a while; then they showed up in a different place. I felt awful about Gin; he squealed with pain between his growls. Otters are mighty

strong! And what enormous mouths and sharp teeth they have. Nature sure gave them some weapons.

I hurried up with my gun. I had only split-seconds to shoot in. My aim was very difficult, although I was at close range. I was mortally afraid lest I should hit the dog instead. It suddenly came to me that I had raised him from a wee pup, a small happy bundle of fluff. I remember when he first became venturesome and crawled off a woollen blanket to the edge of the snow, and how he stuck his tender, pink paw out onto the ice-cold whiteness-and drew it back with a squeak. Queer, how swiftly and how clearly a man can think at a moment of deadly peril, and yet keep his mind on his immediate business! You seem to review a whole period of time in a flash.

The otter was hit with my third shot, and she became helpless again, this time for good. But Gin refused to bring her ashore, and I didn't blame him. He looked at me with reproach as well as pain; I had double-crossed him according to dog psychology. Everything I had done hitherto had been right, he seemed to say; I couldn't do anything wrong in his estimation. But now . . . When that dog landed he would not let me sympathize with him, or examine the gashes the otter had made. I knew what he meant as plainly as if he had spoken. I could hear his thoughts: "I trusted you. You were my friend. You were my boss. I thought you were a square shooter. I would do anything for you. I would go through hell for you. Yes, as long as I knew you were in trouble, I would do anything-anthing; even die for you, and gladly. But you have lied to me. You have made a fool of me. You sent me into the water after a dead otter, and it wasn't dead. I don't like your idea of a joke. I don't trust you any more."

I said: "It's Okay, Gin, I felt sure she floated dead in that darned water, or I would never have told you to go get her." But no, all my attempts to put things right with Gin were in vain . . . There was a bit of wind blowing inshore. I built a small fire and waited for the wind to blow that otter to the land. Soon she drifted in, the biggest otter I had ever seen. Eight feet from tip to tip, and the weight of a baby elephant.

To make me feel lower still, the rain came. I made a rough-and-ready job of the otter-skinning, threw the skin into my pack, and started back towards the bear that I had shot on the edge of the other lake. I wanted some bear grease urgently now to put on the dogs' wounds. I cannot say if there are really any healing virtues in bear grease, but I do know that it makes the dogs lick their wounds, and that this in a round-about way heals them by keeping the wounds clean.

In my haste, however, I had omitted to take a landmark at the place where I shot the bear. I searched and searched. The dogs grew more and more despondent. They refused to help me. Try as I would, I failed to coach or interest them in anything. By this time the rain was pouring down, and we were soaked. Visibility was very bad. "Let's go home," I said to myself. No use saying it to the dogs, but they would follow all right. I promised myself I would attend to Rollo and Gin as soon as we got there; but those dogs didn't make the least sign when I spoke their names aloud. That is what I call the true pride and the best sort of dog. But they would still follow me.

I had a small bottle of iodine in camp. Both dogs needed it; they were bleeding considerably. To get back quick I decided to take a short cut. In such circumstances you only have to make one mistake to make a hundred, and taking that short cut was my mistake. I ought to have returned on my trail. It was not a moment for chancing things. Instead, I struck out in what I thought was the direction of my camp. I may have been correct in the way

I took, but after half an hour I realized I ought to have been home, and yet the camp was nowhere to be seen. I must have missed it.

My hopes had not all petered out, though. The lake where my tent was pitched—surely I had not passed that! I ventured farther. No, that lake must be to the right. I cut at a sharp angle and trudged a longish distance. No good. Well, it must be to the left. Off I went to the left . . . but it wasn't there either, and I had been travelling now for hours.

I guess I am lost.

Pull yourself together, Tony, old boy. Do a bit of orientation. I climbed a tall tree and—well, instead of being able to recognize the country surrounding me·I see everything grey. Still, I can distinguish a big lake on my trail; there was one of that size, I remember, a few miles from where I camped. I'll make for it. And when I get there I will walk around the shore until I find a blazed tree that is bound to put me on my trail home. Simple.

But everywhere I look seems alike. Just a steaming grey in north, south, east, west. And sheets of rain. So what? This time I'll make no mistake, whether I can see things or not. I can't take my bearings on the sky, so I climb up big trees, and as I go along I blaze a straight line, glancing backward once in a while to make sure I am not going round in circles. The lake isn't far . . . Here, what's happened! I have reached the lake and it is only a swamp and not a lake at all!

If only the weather would clear I could see Roche-à-Clark, because it is a mountain rising lonely from low ground, and a landmark for fifty miles in any direction. As I back-track on my trail, I climb the same tree out of curiosity just to see if that big lake looks different now. No, I could swear it's a lake, even though I know it isn't!



SUGGESTIONS FOR OBEDIENCE TRIAL JUDGES

Standardized judging has now come to be of paramount importance owing to the spread of Obedience Trials from coast to coast. To guide amateur and professional judges, for whom this part of the dog game comes as a distinctly new feature, the following guide and rules are being promulgated:

1. The responsibility for making the tests interesting to the gallery and worth while to the exhibitor is left to the judge, who must not permit the judging to drag so that the handlers and those watching become bored and the competing dogs tire. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance that a judge, before accepting an appointment to judge an Obedience Trial, should acquaint himself with the necessary procedure by carefully reading the following rules and, if possible, by attending tests and acting as a steward.

2. The judge must remember that he is judging the dogs only on their ability to perform the tests set for them and not upon their show points or conformation.

3. The judge must test each contestant separately (except for the "sit" and "down", where all dogs in a class are in the ring together), unless the judge feels he is capable of assuming the responsibility of testing two contestants at the same time, providing the ring is of sufficient size. As each handler enters the ring the judge should ask if he has knowledge of the rules and regulations and should see that the dog has on either a plain or chain choke collar, as no spiked collars are allowed. All exercises in both Novice and Open Classes, with the exception of "Heel on leash", are executed free of the lead.

4. All orders given to handlers must be called out loudly and clearly in order that everyone may follow the judging and at the end of each test the judge should say "Exercise Finished".

5. The orders for the exercises must be called out as follows:

Heel on Leash: "Forward", "Halt", "Right turn", "Left turn", "About turn", "Slow", "Fast", "Figure eight" (for this order the two stewards or the judge and the steward face each other not more than 8 feet apart, and the handler and dog walk around and in between them).

Heel Free: Same orders as heel on leash.

Recall to Handler: This calls for no special orders from the judge except to tell the handler to "Do the Recall". In the Novice Class the dog comes straight in, sitting in front of the handler then going to heel position on command. In the Open Class the dog drops on command as he is coming in when the judge gives the handler the signal to drop his dog, and upon a second command comes to sit in front of handler, finally going to heel position at a third command. No test is considered complete until the dog is in the heel position. Note: No whistle is permitted for the recall.

Retrieve on Flat and Over the High Jump: "Throw it" — Handler throws dumbbell. "Send him"—Handler sends dog to retrieve. "Take it"—Handler takes dumbbell from dog. "Finish"— Handler gives order to heel.

Long Jump: This calls for no order from the judge except to tell the handler to "Do the Long Jump". The jump should measure 6 feet long except for smaller breeds, for which the last barrier should be removed. The handler should stand within the range of the first and last hurdle, at side of jump.

Sit and Down: For these tests the judge or his steward shall call the entire class into the ring and will give the order to line up at one end of the ring and sit the dogs. In the Novice Class handlers shall walk to the other end of the ring and stay there. In the Open Class the handlers go out of sight. If a dog gets up and starts to roam, judge should call in the handler of said dog and have him take the dog outside of the ring. When the time limit is up the judge shall recall the handlers, who will return to their dogs, walking around and in back of the dogs to the original heel position. The dogs should not move until the judge says "Exercise finished". The judge shall then order the handlers to "Drop your dogs" for the long down, and the same procedure is gone through as for the sit. The dog should not get to a sitting position until the judge says "Exercise finished".,

- 6. The judging chart may be marked as soon as each part of each exercise is performed; and to facilitate this, the judging chart carries in the left-hand column the orders to be called out by the judge and the maximum points which may be given for each section of each test.
- 7. Care must be taken not to score the first dog so high that allowance may not be made for a dog giving a better performance. Also judges should not be too lenient in their markings, as dogs should not attain their titles upon work of poor quality.
- 8. When giving orders (especially for heel work), the judge should not stand at one end of the ring, but should follow the handler at a discreet distance so that he may observe any signals or undertones given by handler to dog.
- 9. In the case of a tie, the dogs should be tested again by having them perform some exercise together, such as the "Recall" for the Novice or the "Drop on Recall" for the Open, which will prove to the judge and spectators which dog is the most obedient.
- 10. After the scores are totaled and winners decided, before awarding the prizes, the judge should inform the public as to the total number of points required for a perfect score. He should then call out each winner separately and announce the points gained toward the total. In the cases where Novice "A" and "B" classes or Open "A" and "B" classes are combined for the "Sit" and "Down", when the final award is made, the dogs qualifying for points should be divided, those from one class being placed at one end of the ring, and those

from the other class being kept at the other end, so as not to confuse the spectators as to the awards.

11. The judge must look for the following in testing the dog and penalize accordingly:

- (a) Enjoyment and willingness should be taken into consideration over a better worker that shows fear and dislike of his work.
- (b) A handler should have to give a command only ONCE-except in the case of the word "heel", which he is allowed to repeat to his dog each time the judge tells him to go forward.
- (c) Constant talking to the dog by the handler, snapping of fingers, slapping of sides and stamping of feet are decidedly out of order.

(d) Signaling correction to dog from the distance, especially during the "Sit" and the "Down" is forbidden.

- During the dog's "heel" work, the handler should always walk briskly with dog on left side and with a completely loose leash. Guiding the dog by means of leash is to be penalized.
- (f) Gentleness and smoothness of handling is to be greatly desired.
- (g) The dog should never anticipate the handler's orders, but should wait for the commands.
- (h) At the judge's command for handler to halt during the "heel" work exercise, the dog should sit at once without any signal, sign or command from his handler.

12. The Utility Class is divided into two parts:

First Part-The four exercises which may be done at any indoor or outdoor dog show.

Second Part - The Tracking Test, which cannot be held in conjunction with a dog show.

The First Part consists of: Speaking on Command-For requirements see Section 12 of "Standard for Obedience Trials"; Scent Discrimination-For requirements see Section 13 of "Standard for Obedience Trials"; Seeking Back for Lost Article—For requirements see Section 14 of "Standard for Obedience Trials": Stand for Examination-For requirements see Section 15 of "Standard for Obedience Trials".

The Second Part consists of: Tracking Test-This test for obvious reasons cannot be held at a dog show, and a

judge, though he may be qualified to judge Obedience Classes, is not necessarily capable of judging a Tracking Test. No judge should accept the appointment to judge a Tracking Test unless he is familiar with the various conditions that may exist when a dog is required to do nose work. Scent conditions, weather, lay of the land, etc., must be taken into consideration, and a thorough knowledge of this work is necessary.

- MERRY CHRISTMAS -

Picking up an interesting item in Ed. Durling's column recently which might interest some of the local folk, particularly if they are looking after a pet for some boy or girl who is overseas. Seems that Ed told about a family keeping a dog for their son. The dog was pining for the boy and refused to eat and was getting quite sick. The folks were desperate. One day, in a try-anythingonce effort, they took a recent letter from the boy and put it down on the floor for the pup. The dog smelled the letter and promptly got better, went back to eating and is fine and dandy again. Now he gets a smell of every letter the lad writes from overseas. Durling repeated the story because he'd received a subsequent letter from a family out West. They had read the dog story and tried it out on their son's horse that was acting up. It worked on the horse, too.—Roly Young, The Globe & Mail, Toronto.

- MERRY CHRISTMAS -

Vancouver-A Chow puppy, whose frantic yelping attracted two soldiers to the beach, where his aged mistress had been lying for five days, is credited with saving her life, and the rescuers spectulated that the dog had tried to carry fresh water to the woman in its mouth.

Gnr. Edward Morrisey, who with a companion found Mrs. Jean Torrance, 76, lying in a state of collapse on the beach, said the dog had worn a path through long grass to a creek.



Capt. Judy came to the city as a dog show judge. He worked all day Thursday at Victoria Pavillion in a doggy world of canines and breeders. He was well into his second day of experting on man's best friend Friday when somebody discovered there was a Capt. Will Judy who had a reputation in the United States as a political commentator and magazine publisher.

It turned out he was the same guy. On the one hand he is a well-reputed judge of dogs and editor of the canine magazine "Dog World". On the other, he is publisher and editor of a pocket-sized magazine called "Judy's", in which he writes on almost every subject in the world except bow-wows.

"Judy's", which has a nation-wide circulation in the United States and also can be found regularly on Calgary news stands, is a modern version of the type of newspaper that was published by O. Henry before he became a short story writer, and by Calgary's Bob Edwards in the days of the original Eye Opener.

Capt. Judy, the magazine commentator being shoved aside for the time being. Capt. Judy, the dog judge had plenty of nice things to say about Calgary. "You have had a fine show up here this year," he declared, "but it is the people who are interested in dogs who impress me most.

"This is a good country for them," he said, "and with more and more Americans planning to come up here for hunting it would be a profitable project to develop them. Modern Retrievers, you know, don't just bring in the game ,they help locate it and are fine dogs to shoot over."

Despite wartime conditions, dog shows everywhere have shown a boom, he declares. The dog market also is in the strongest position it has enjoyed in the 80 years since it was established. "There is no priority on dogs," he explained. "People have money to spend and they are putting it into purebred dogs.

A pure-bred is truly a good investment, not only in the pleasure derived from ownership, but often the monetary return is many times the original cost.


