

"OUR FRONTISPIECE"

The Miniature Schnauzer puppies, Strathburn MP Alpha Cath and Strathburn MP Alpha Andy, featuring the frontispiece this month, are first-class specimens of a very fine breed of the Terrier group which, though not too well known at present, is bound by its general merits and attractive appearance to reach its deserved position in popular favor as soon as careful selective brezding produces a sufficient quantity of representative specimens to supply the present demand and make more widespread the present localized favour in which the breed is held. Wherever the Miniature Schnauzer is shown he creates intense interest and an immediate demand, limited at present only by the small number of shows at which the breed is exhibited, and the circumscribed area over which these shows are distributed.

The puppies pictured on the frontispiece are carefully bred from the finest available stock. Their grandsire on both sire's and dam's side is Champion Cockerel of Sharrogue, Dog of the Year 1942, sire of futurity winners 1, 2, 3 and 4, 1942, litter brother of Sandman, Westminster Best of Breed, and over 14 champions spring from this same breeding. Cockerel's sire was the famous Champion T.M.G. of Marienhof, a Morris and Essex Best of Breed and considered one of the greatest sires of the breed. Behind these stand such remarkable animals as Champion Marks of Marienhof, another Madison Square Best of Breed; undefeated German Sieger and American Champion Marko Von Beutenberg, who stands second on the Galton Rating List (1935); Champion Mehitabel of Marienhof II, model of the breed and sixth on the Galton Rating List (1935); Czech Sieger and American Champion Urian Thuringia, and many others much too numerous to mention. On the distaff side we find infusions of outstanding Heinzelmannchen and Von Neff strains.

Quality is paramount at Strathburn Kennels and the greatest care is taken to ensure that animals of inferior quality are never used for breeding purposes. Quantity is relatively immaterial, and it is better that Canada should have a few good Miniature Schnauzers rather than a host of inferior ones. Close breeding is the surest way to produce quality and uniformity until inherent faults crop up, and then we must be prepared to breed out to another quality bloodline to erradicate these faults, physical or mental. This Strathburn Kennels are now in a position to do, thanks to the generosity of Mrs. Joseph Sailer of Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, Pa., for many years devoted to the improvement and promotion of the breed, whose gift of her American Champion and Dog of the Year 1944, Neff's Luzon is gratefully acknowledged.

Strathburn Kennels also gratefully acknowledge the kind advice and assistance of Miss Marguerite Neff, breeder of Neff's Luzon and many other notable Miniature Schnauzers, in their effort to improve and promote the breed in Canada.

There are two Schnauzers in the Terrier group, the Standard and Miniature, with the Giant Schnauzer in the working dog group.

The Miniature Schnauzer is derived from interbreeding the Standard Schnauzer with the Affenpinscher and the Brussels Griffon, and, as a breed, dates back only to the close of the nineteenth century. The earliest known picture of a Miniature Schnauzer, that of Jocco-Fulda-Lilliput, is dated 1899. The word Schnauzer (pronounced "schnowtzer") is derived from the German word schnauze, meaning snout, and has reference to the stubby whiskers which are characteristic of the breed.

A harsh, wiry coat, with abundant face and leg furnishings are characteristic of the Miniature Schnauzer, and colours run all the way from solid black to quite light grey with white markings. In addition to salt-and-pepper we often find a little red-pepper in the color scheme, probably derived from the old larger Schnauzer stock, which dates back to the seventeenth century and farther, and is believed to have been rehfarbig (fawn) or black and tan, and occasionally parti-colors which appear to be a specialty of the Abbagamba Kennels. Medium or dark grey with white markings and a slight trace of red-pepper is, however, by far the most popular and spectacular color scheme.

The height limit for males is 14 inches at withers and weight runs between 16 and 17 lbs., largely depending on weight of bone. The Miniature Schnauzer should not appear toyish, and good bone is called for, though often difficult to produce.

The forequarters should have flat, strongly muscled, somewhat sloping shoulders, without the steep-set "terrier front". This is something which might be taken particular note of by some Terrier judges who penalize Miniature

Schnauzers if they lack a "Terrier front".

Generally speaking, the Miniature Schnauzer should be sturdily built, nearly square in proportion of body length to height, with plenty of bone, less racy in outline than the Fox Terrier, and without any suggestion of toyishness

He is a robust, active dog, hardy and resistant to common canine ailments, of lively and affectionate disposition and particularly noted for his apparent love of home and absence of the desire to roam. An ideal companion for the city apartment dweller or the owner of many acres. An occasional walk around the block or romp around the house is all the exercise he requires, but he can keep up with a master who likes long walks in the country also, and is quite capable of 15 miles a day, or more.

Canadian Champion Silvermist of Marienhof is the original stud dog owned by Mr. Thomas C. Wylie of Strathburn Kennels. American Champion and Dog of the Year 1944 (American Miniature Schnauzer Club award). Neff's Luzon was recently presented to Mr. Wylie by Mrs. Joseph Sailer of Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, Pa., for many years devoted to the improvement and promotion of the breed in the United States.

Ch. Neff's Luzon is an outstanding specimen of the breed in every respect, mental and physical, difficult to fault, and will be used for the improvement of the breed in Canada.

The Pug is coming back into fashion, and startled dog breeders by coming right up to the top of the Toy Group at Westminster last winter. "Winna Pugs Kennel", Montreal, owned by Miss Winifred Steggall, have played a prominent part in bringing these little dogs to the fore once again.

NEW ALL-BREED DOG CLUB FORMED

The dog-loving people of Canada expressed a keen desire for All-Breed Dog Shows and the CANADIAN NATIONAL ALL-BREED DOG CLUB has been organized to provide the type of show which will be a credit to every good breeder of dogs, and which will encourage the breeding of the champions of the future. The organizing Board of the Club is as follows:

President, David R. Feetham; First Vice-President, Walter G. Kenyon; Second Vice-President, Edgar A. Eaton; Secretary-Treasurer, Alroy K. Butler.

The Club has decided not to participate in holding Sanction Shows, but to devote its entire efforts to producing first-class point shows at all times, ever having in mind the aim of assisting in keeping breeding at its highest standard.

The Canadian National All-Breed Dog Club is giving earnest consideration to many requests for two shows each year.

A further announcement will be made at a later date.

MINISTERIAL ORDER No. 62

Under and by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by Section 17 of the Animal Contagious Diseases Act, Chapter 6, R.S.C., 1927, I do hereby order that:—

All dogs for entry into Canada from the United States of America shall be accompanied by a certificate in ONE of the following forms:—

- (a) A certificate signed or endorsed by a veterinary inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, certifying that the dog has been inspected and found free from any symptoms of contagious disease; that the dog has not been exposed to the infection of rabies and that no case of rabies has occurred within a radius of fifty miles of the place in which the dog has been kept for a period of six months immediately prior to date of shipment.
- (b) A certificate signed by a licensed veterinarian of the State, of origin certifying that the dog has been inspected and found free from any symptoms of contagious disease; that so far as can be ascertained, it has not been exposed to the infection of rabies and that it has been vaccinated against rabies within a period of six months of the date of shipment.

Performing dogs entered for temporary stay and kept under direct control while in Canada shall be exempt from this order.

My orders of August 29, 1944, and March 24, 1945, are hereby cancelled.

Ever since the rabies ban was imposed last September, Mr. W. J. Risewick, President of the Canadian Kennel Club, has steadily endeavoured to have modifications made. Henry's El Capitan-Clarewood's Capitan, to Langley Prairie, B.C. Her recent sales also include a dog sent to the Maritimes. She states that there is a growing appreciation of the merits of these little dogs and that she has purchased three new females in order to keep up to the demand. Chihuahuas are sensible little dogs and well behaved. They are alert watch-dogs and have a strong instinct for play. It was the Chihuahua who was supposed to guide the spirits of the departed across the seven rivers to the heights of Heaven. He is a 100 per cent American dog, native of the Province of Chihuahua in Mexico and apparently has no infusion of European or Asiatic blood. His dainty little figure has been found by archeologists among Mexico's ancient ruins. He was revered by Mayan, Toltec and Aztec and it is possible that he existed 8,000 years ago in much the same form and type as now. The Chihuahua usually has a smooth coat but there are, however, a few long-haired specimens.

"That a Best of Winners must be established in each color division before going on to Best of Breed."

She remarks that the Black Chichuahua is almost a thing of the past in Canada. She has been fortunate enough to breed some of the Blacks and is very proud of them.

Private Breeding Record Books

A great many breeders start out with high ideals but end very badly. It might be said in truth that 75 per cent of the people who earn bad reputations for themselves as breeders, earn that reputation not through any actual wish to be cheats, but simply through a carelessness in keeping records which one day or another proves disastrous.

Careful record-keeping regarding kennel transactions is not only very necessary, in order to breed scientifically and correctly, but it is obligatory under The Canadian Livestock Pedigree Act

Many people pride themselves on a good memory, and imagine that with a small kennel of four or five dogs, they should have no trouble at all in remembering the transactions.

After a generation or two, they wonder whether they are breeding dogs or rabbits. It becomes more and more difficult to remember parents, grandparents, great grand-parents and so on, as time goes on. No breeder worthy of the name would be content to proceed on a breeding program in such a haphazard manner.

For the purpose of keeping records, the Canadian Kennel Club has prepared a PRIVATE BREEDING RECORD BOOK. We herewith reproduce the instructions on the inside of this book, and also illustration of record sheets for male and female animals. This book may be obtained from The Canadian Kennel Club, and is priced at 50c.

Canadian Kennel Club, Inc. PRIVATE BREEDING RECORD BOOK

This record book has been designed to meet the constitutional requirements of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., and the Canadian National Live Stock Records, and to conform to the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

To keep a dependable private record becomes a source of pleasure and leaves nothing to chance.

Chapter 49, Live Stock Pedigree Act 22-23, Geo. V., Section 5, sub-section 1, clause m, reads as follows: "The keeping by its members of private breeding records and the manner in which these shall be kept."

Only breeding records should be kept in this book. All transactions such as selling prices, dog show awards, etc., must be kept in a separate book.

In Memory of The Late Sir Claude and Lady Alexander By MRS. PERCY ADAMS

Vice-President, Sky

It is seldom that we have the pleasure of coupling husband and wife as very ardent "fanciers", but in the case of the late Sir Claud and Lady Rachel Alexander, we have an example of a true Highland gentleman and his wife, who shared, until death, their true deep love for animals.

Lady Alexander died in February, 1944. A beautiful as well as a sweet and gracious lady, she was the founder of the British Cat Club, and from 1913, perhaps earlier, until her death, the Honorary Secretary of the Skye and Clydesdale Club of England, in which she took the most profound interest. She was an authority on the breeds and judged at many shows, and it has been said her judgment or criticism was never known to be unjust or unkind.

Lady Alexander became interested in Skyes because her husband kept them as a boy. She showed her first in 1897, a year after her marriage to Sir Claud, and from then until 1939 her Ballochmyle exhibits were to be seen winning top honours at practically every championship show. Speaking of her favorites, Lady Alexander said: "Their fascination to me is that they attach themselves to their owner and to no one else -I don't care for a dog who likes everybody. The old Skye Club of Scotland's motto, "wha daur meddle wi me", exactly describes their nature." She also added, "We were never troubled with tramps or peddlers, because they knew that they might get an unpleasant surprise by finding perhaps old Ballochmyle Whiskey walking down the drive to meet them." An old Scotchman once remarked to Lady Alexander, "Skyes is the worst dogs I hate", so she concluded he spoke from bitter experience.

For 48 years Lady Alexander always kept to one type—the Highest—her first entries (in her husband's name) were with Ballochmyle Tum Tum, Ballochmyle Bashful, and Ballochmyle Levity, her last was the grand win of Ballochmyle Jock at Crufts, in 1939, when he won the Championship Certificate, defeating the great Ch. Rip of Merrymount, Ch. Togo of Merrymount, Ch. Southernhills Moonglow and Ch. Southernhills Dust Storm. At Crufts, in February, 1933, she had the outstanding honor of winning, with Lightning (the litter brother of Ben of Merrymount), the Peranelle Challenge Cup for the

best conditioned dog in the show—when entries totalled nearly five thousand it is apparent what a magnificent win this was. Another good one, young Roseberry, had such wonderful Skye character and was such a "laster" that at the age of 13 years he won 1st in a very strong variety class at Richmond.

Lady Alexander was also a very successful exhibitor of smooth Collies, and her several varieties of famous "short hair cats" made her very prominent in the Cat Fancy. Her prize fowl were also one of her keen interests.

Sir Claud Alexander, Bt., passed away on March 18th, 1945, in his 79th year, at his home Fay Gate Wood, Sussex. The name of Sir Claud Alexander, Bt., of Ballochmyle will go down in Skye Terrier history, as he was the leading authority in the world on the breed which he had kept from childhood, and his Ballochmyle Kennel had an outstanding influence. As well as for Skyes, he was known for his famous herd of cattle and also Hackney horses—Airedales and Clydesdale Terriers, flat-coated Retrievers also shared his interest.

He at one time was an active member of the committee of the English Kennel Club and always a supporter in general of anything relating to dogs and dog shows. He was a staunch supporter and lover of the Skye Terrier since a young school boy, and his services as a judge were keenly sought at leading shows. His first Skye was a drop-eared son of the famous Mr. Pratts' "Piper", called Ghillie, who became a pillar of the Stud book

In the good old days, when the streets of Glasgow and Edinburgh were full of Skyes and Clydesdales, Sir Claud used to make a practice of hunting for good ones in bad condition and as a consequence could be bought cheap. Old Mr. Wm. Millar used to collect some for him when he knew he was coming

to Scotland, and on one occasion he brought him such a rare one Sir Claud protested. "Hoots, mon," said the old Scotsman, in his broadest Doris, "Dinnah fash your heid about that, for Mistress Alexander wad grow a coat on a dog-box."

Some years ago Sir Claud sent me a picture of the late Mr. Pratt's Skye Terriers, Sandy Grant and Piper, telling me to study this picture thoroughly as an object lesson, because it shows so well every point, good and bad, of both dogs most accurately. He said he hoped all breeders of Skyes would file it for reference, for he said, "It is of more value than all the standards in the world to show what a Skye should be." He also remarked, "Learn to know the anatomy, points and type of a Skye before you bother about trying to grow a coat." Sir Claud said he had often been accused of unduly liking little ones, and equally often of preferring big ones. To both these criticisms his answer was the same, "I don't; I like them good."

As a young man, Sir Claud bred and showed both drop-eared and prickeared Skyes, but latterly he and Lady Alexander swung to the prick-eared variety. I give here a list of some of their most famous Skyes: Ballochmyle Ghillie, Nellie Grant, Panel, Ballochmyle Creamy Cress, Ballochmyle Beautiful Ballochmyle Brother Beautiful, Ballochmyle Length, Ballochmyle Levity, Ballochmyle Tum, Ballochmyle Rosemary, Ballochmyle Abbess, Panda Laird of Ballochmyle, Ballochmyle Whiskey, Ballochmyle Stella, Ballochmyle Knut, Lass of Ballochmyle, Ballochmyle Lightning, Ballochmyle Starlight, Accrington Wonder, Accrington Duchess, Young Roseberry, Miss Billet Oldentimes, Wolverly Wallace, Ballochmyle Chance, Ballochmyle Bashful, Lily Scott, Ballochmyle, Priscilla, The Ade Monk, Ballochmyle Yellow Broom, Wee Mac of Adel, and more latterly the Ballochmyle show string consisted of

Schiehallion, Rorytogo Piper, Aurora, Miss Given, New Moon, Dust Storm and Jock. Many of these were champions.

In 1939. Sir Claud was instrumental in Roland of Meerend and Skyhigh Lady Fay of Talisker coming to my kennel. In 1941, Ch. Schiehallion was sent to me as a gift, and shortly after Lady Alexander's death, in 1944, her lovely Skyes, The Ballochmyle Merrywidow, Skyhigh Mina and Ballochmyle Jock, were sent out to me. Jock, who Sir Claud described as probably "the best Skye of all times", was lost overboard in mid-ocean on his voyage to Canadaa terrible loss to me and to the breed. In 1939 he sent out as a gift to Miss Frances Stillman, Ch. Ballochmyle Togo and, I believe, selected both Dora and Portia of Meerend for Miss Stillman, and as recently as January of this year he wrote advising the purchase of a very beautiful little bitch who I expect will arrive in Canada some time in June.

I feel sure all members of the Skye Terrier Club of America will join me in paying tribute to the late Sir Claud and Lady Rachel Alexander, who for so many years meant so much to the Skye Terrier fancy and who gave so freely and kindly to all who asked of their knowledge and experience relating to our beloved breed.

I would love to have the honor of offering at our post-war specialty shows a silver trophy in memory of Sir Claud and Lady Alexander, to be known as "The Ballochmyle Trophy", to be won three times by the same exhibitor for the Best of Breed. I hope there will be much competition.

POMERANIANS CAN TAKE IT

In view of the somewhat widespread impression that toy dogs in general are inclined to be frail, especially when exposed to cold temperatures, it might perhaps be interesting to the readers of Dogs in Canada to learn about the experience which the writer had a few years ago in connection with a little Pomeranian female, "Melbourne" Nerine, which had been purchased from the late Mrs. J. W. Bruce. This little dog came to the writer at eight months of age, in early March, 1941, a good physical type of the breed, with better than average lineage, but extremely nervous and emotional in temperament. From the first it was evident that she was possessed of frantic dislike toward men. which made it almost impossible for the writer to approach her near enough to place a hand upon her.

However, we endeavored to win her over by keeping her in the house with one or two other of our pets. After three or four days it seemed reasonable to permit her to take a little outdoor evercise with the other dogs and this was done in the early afternoon of a bright sunny day. Right here is where we made a fatal mistake, for no sooner had Nerine sniffed the outer air than with a toss of her head she streaked across the countryside in an easterly direction, disappearing in a thick wood some half-mile from our place.

To get a proper perspective it must be explained that the temperature was considerably below zero, with deep encrusted snow covering the land. Naturally we followed the little dog, not for a moment abandoning the search until darkness set in.

Without wearying the reader with all details of the harrowing days which followed, it is only necessary to state that twelve days and nights passed without word of Nerine. On the morning of the thirteenth day, however, our joy can be imagined when a kind-hearted neighbour informed us joyfully that our little dog was at his home, having been discovered by him the night before, cowering in an old shed some two miles away from our place. She was pitifully emaciated, completely unable to hold any food on her stomach, a truly heart-breaking sight.

Again, we recall that the weather during the entire period had been extreme, the temperature at night dropping to twenty below zero, with a bone-chilling north-west wind blowing most of the time. Many times Nerine was seen running wildly about the country-side. She was shot at several times by the young men of the district, quite innocently it is true, due to her resemblance to a fox. Fortunately for Nerine and her owner the shots went wide.

The sequel to this story lies in the fact that Nerine was restored to perfect health, having since whelped a total of 19 beautiful puppies who have gladdened the hearts of satisfied purchasers from Moose Jaw to the State of Virginia and points between. But Nerine still hates men.

NEW LICENSING REGULATIONS RE JUDGES

A judge may be granted a temporary license upon application, endorsed by three members of the Canadian Kennel Club, two of whom must reside in the same province as the applicant, the names of applicants, together with members sponsoring them, to be published in Dogs in Canada.

No person will be granted a license to judge who has not proved to the satisfaction of the Board that:

- (1) He has bred and/or owned registered dogs for at least three years, not necessarily consecutive, and has shown dogs at regularly licensed dog shows in Canada at least five times
- (2) He has an understanding of such fundamental anatomy as is necessary for the interpretation of breed standards

(3) He can repeat the breed standard of each breed covered by his application. He must be able to repeat the so-called "major faults" and "faults" and he may be required on demand to pass an oral examination to prove his knowledge of the breed or breeds for which application has been made.

An applicant so licensed shall be required to judge at three shows satisfactorily, and may then be granted a permanent license to judge these breeds, by the Board of Directors. At each of these three shows a member of the Board, or someone appointed by the Board, shall report in writing to the Board of Directors upon the judges' work. In addition the show-giving club shall be required to report in writing on the judges' work.

Any temporary or permanent license

may be revoked at any time upon just complaint, which complaint shall be made in accordance with 14 of the Show Rules, or Section 22 of the Constitution and shall be passed upon by the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club

No judge who has had his license revoked shall be permitted to apply for reinstatement until at least 12 months have passed since his license was cancelled

The above rules not to apply to field trial judges.

It was moved by Mr. Wylie, seconded by Dr. Shute and unanimously carried that the above rules be adopted as a whole, and be published in the next issue of *Dogs in Canada* together with the application questionnaire set forth

Few breeders of any note over here are breeding haphazardly, which should speak well for those of your countrymen who have agents over here ready to purchase stock for them now the final "ALL CLEAR" has sounded. As an example, I am now rearing a litter from my winning bitch by Champ. Talavera Nigel, and the puppies are five times line-bred to the great Champion Talavera Simon, being by a great stud dog by Champion Talavera Romulus (Simon) ex a bitch by Champion Tala-

This is the type of breeding that is being done by those who think first and who are not much interested in how many, so long as they keep the true blood lines running and produce type and quality with intelligence. To me these dogs never seem to have a consistent ability to reproduce their type, and are successful at stud merely because the crowd cannot judge for themselves. Give me the man every time who doesn't want to know what the dog has won, but can form his opinion on the spot whether the dog is the type for his bitch or otherwise. These are the men the "others" say, who know how to breed, and in many cases never use the "big winner" unless he suits him, of course. I have enclosed the brochure on him and you have my full consent to publish same for the benefit of your readers, and the notes in all or part if you wish. Any cost arising from same, I shall gladly meet, as I have heard so much said of the standard of wires falling over there that I am sure your readers will appreciate the purchase of Crackley Straightaway by Mrs. Bondy as a lucky stroke for them, and will agree that if they can breed them like Harrowhill Straightahead from their new dog, that they will at least be free from disgrace in any ring. Should you publish this, or part, I only ask that you send me a copy at the current rate, as I have not had one since August, 1943, and would appreciate it very much in-



Mr. Gostick's reference to the Chevrier dogs and to the history of Goldstream Guard certainly struck a responsive cord, started a train of thought, and hurriedly painted a series of pictures of men, of dogs, and events, of triumphs, and near triumphs, of times when one felt cheated or elated, felt joyful or sad, of times when one wondered why the judge could not recognize such quality, and again of the times when you still wondered why on earth he did! Being on the other "end of the lead" all through the years has had its compensations; mingling with the truly great in men and dogs, and gradually learning to discriminate between the "points" and the "faults", to feel that one knew a "good head", whether it was on a man or a dog, is an experience I would not have missed. "For we've had a lot of fun."

To record the contribution of their respective provinces and the developing of the worthwhile in Cockers certainly gave Messrs. Gostick and Saunders quite a thrill, judging from the enthusiasm displayed in both articles; the former in the fact that a "line" was established, the latter in that he gloried in the stake his province had in its "establishment". Maybe I could be pardoned for a certain amount of exuberance when I recall that I was honoured to be the one to choose the most suitable sire available at the time for Mr. T. P. Murray's Lady Betty. I had won a service from the owner of Matlock Durbar. By arrangement this service was applied by transfer, to the satisfaction of all concerned. As a result, the names of the late T. P. and Mrs. Murray will go down in Cocker history as the breeders of that splendid little campaigner, Gold Stream Guard of Cordova. What an appropriate name for one destined to be the pro-genitor of that "Gold Stream" of quality that has, and is, maintaining itself in the world's most popular dog, and its foremost representatives. By what is a usual procedureknown as the "pick" of the litter for service, the Guard automatically became my property.

He was born on the last day of the year 1925. It will, in passing, be of interest to note that Mr. Chas. Hopton never set eyes on the Guard in any Winnipeg show, for the best of good

In 1944 I put through a lot of Champions. Let me handle your Dog in 1945.

reasons: he was never shown in this city.

Mr. Wm. Livesay had an option to purchase "Guard", the pup. The time limit on said option expired, Goldstream was duly entered in the Toronto Exhibition, September, 1926. On arrival in Toronto Mr. Livesay enquired if I had brought the pup along. I said I certainly have and feel sure he can win; he is entered in all classes that he is eligible for. Having satisfied himself that the pup possessed real quality he said. George, what do you stand to win, for I think with you he can do it." I would rather take this pup for my client the way he is and be credited for picking a good one. So the matter was settled with satisfaction. He was withdrawn from competition and that's how Goldstream Guard became "Goldstream Guard of Cordova".

Leaving home in Scotland at an early age I never matriculated. As a matter of face I never reached junior high, but I did go as high as a junior could go who didn't stay to finish. (Since then I have, however, learned a thing or two.) Arriving in Toronto, in 1904, I contacted Mr. James S. Clark, who will be remembered by the oldsters as a breeder of quality stock, in Cockers. It was while in his service that I had what I consider the greatest thrill in my life, for still in my teen years, I had the satisfaction of conditioning, handling, and naming the dog "Clark's Dare". Because of my youthful enthusiasm, I thought him good enough to "dare" anything; so my joy can be easily appreciated, when under the critical eye of the noted judge, Mr. Geo. Douglass of Woodstock, Ontario, I was awarded best Cocker in show at Madison Square Garden, New York. I am reminded also of another series of wins that gave me a wonderful lot of satisfaction. I was successful in obtaining for the Clark's the last five wins on the famous Midkiff Trophy presented by W. T. Payne, Esq., for best Cocker in show, for competition in the United States.

This trophy is now one of the proud possessions of Mrs. Clark in her home in Toronto. The following is an incomplete list of Cockers handled and piloted to their respective championships during the period of my connection with the Deer Park Kennels: Ch. Clark's Kildare, Ch. Clark's Lady Pauline, Ch. Midkiff Kermit, Ch. Clark's Jessie, Ch. Brookdale Toby, Ch. Clark's Quinteen, Ch. Clark's Diadem, Ch. Lance Farewell, Ch. Lenore.

This experience at Deer Park has been of immense value to me, for to the extent that I have developed what is called "an eye for a dog", this schooling was justified. Let me illustrate: A Cocker Spaniel was pulling a child's sleigh. It appealed to me in the rough, and I saw its possibilities. I contacted the owner and without paying a king's ransom for the dog I trimmed and entered him at the Toronto Exhibition, and under Arthur Garick, a judge whose decisions were highly regarded, I won Best Cocker in Show. Mr. Garrick liked the dog so much that he purchased him on the spot for the famous Judge Scudders, who after numerous successes sold him to the famous Lucknow Kennels, owned by J. Robinson Beard, I am referring, of course, to that dandy little dog Ch. Lucknow, "Lottery".

To Mr. Chevrier belongs the credit for owning and exhibiting the first Springer Spaniels shown in America, in the old Madison Square Garden, New York, in 1922, with an entry of 12 dogs. Best Springer in show was Chasalton Belinda, the award being made by the Dean of Dogs, Mr. Freeman Lloyd. The year 1923 saw further successes for the Chevrier string in Ch. Boghurst Rover, an importation of real quality, who placed Best of Breed under the capable expert, Mr. R. A. Ross, Montreal. At this point came Canada's sweetheart Springer, if we take the word of one reputed to know. We are, of course, referring to no less an authority than Walter H. Reeves, who said of Marvel of Avondale that he considered her to be the greatest Springer of all time. So great was his enthusiasm after placing her Best in Show over a large field at St. Paul, Minn. The frequency of Marvel's wins thereafter is one definite and clear indication that Mr. Reeves understands his business. When Marvel placed Best in Show at Canadian National Ehhibition, under that celebrated authority, W. J. Marples, he was known to have said, "I consider this the greatest Springer Spaniel that was ever produced." The campaigning of this wonder dog, through her entire career, with just one exception, is one of those pleasing and thrilling experiences that are exceedingly rare; with 24 Best in Shows in Canada and three in the U.S.A. Knowing a dog's record and piloting it through a glorious career, feeling the response and your urging reflected in a dog's behavior to show herself to the best of her ability, makes Marvel, or "Shiela", as we named her at Silverdale, something more than

In my opinion, the next in importance was the fortunate importation by Mr. Chevrier of Springbok of Ware, who's appearance in this country was made possible by the fact that the shows were cancelled in Britain, owing to World War No. 1, which was then in progress.

As Mr. Chevrier once said, "That was one good thing which came out of the war!" Otherwise we would have been deprived of one of the finest stud forces that has dominated, in no uncertain manner, the pedigree of most of the quality Springers produced in this country and the United States. Like many another, old "Punch", as Springbok was familiarly known, ended his day on the old Silverdale Ranch.

No list of the Chevrier dogs could possibly omit the "Int. Ch. Lavistok Powder Horn", whose disposition did not make a hit with Mr. Chevrier, but it must not be forgotten that his bid for fame was established when it is remembered that he was the sire of the one and only "International Ch. Marvel of Avondale".

Next in importance was the great "L'Lyle Messenger Boy", a beautiful black and white dog which I handled to his International Championship. His first wins of note were Best Springer, Best Sporting Dog, and Reserve Grand Champion at Passadena, California, in 1926. It will surprise many Springer breeders to learn that he was the son of Dual Ch. Flint of Avondale. Wins of importance were also made in New York and Chicago. In pasing, I must mention that upon arrival the "Messen-

ger Boy" looked so tough that our old friend Charlie Cowell, kennel manager for Mr. Chevrier at that time, said: "Brother, what do you think of this one?" I replied, "He looks to me like a small Setter with his tail docked!" As a result of the pains-taking care that Mr. Cowell was noted for, he soon developed into the great Springer that he really was. I am reminded at this point that Flint of Avondale had a shy, retiring disposition. He acted like his life has been one of continuous frustration. his attitude towards even the most attractive of the opposite sex was such, that in alarm Mr. Chevrier wired his previous owner to learn the possible cause. The reply came in just three words: "Feed him potatoes." For what it is worth we pass this on to you, for Flint became a most prolific sire. In conclusion, I would say that in my considered opinion the best Springer Spaniel made ever produced in Canada was International Champion Masterpiece of Avondale, who most clearly approached what the standard requires in this breed of dog that it has been my pleasure to see.

I have many times been asked how many dogs I have piloted through to championship status, so just for the record, I am pleased to say it has been my joy and privilege to have owned and handled, or handled for owner, almost 300 dogs (297 to be exact) who have been admitted to the charmed circle of "champions"

A little girl asked me which kind of dog I liked best and why I wasn't satisfied with one dog like her daddy. I could, of course, have given her several good reasons, but the fact is, that if I said I like Cockers best, the Airdales and Bulldogs would think I'd let them down, for I have raised at least 27 Champion Airdales and 26 Champion Bulldogs. The Airedale that gave me the biggest thrill was that real pal and campaigner, Ch. Silverdale Tornado (old "Bunty" to my friends and his admirers), who had the distinction of defeating International Ch. Walnut King, who was the dog to beat in his day.

In Bulldogs my most notable win was with Ch. Silverdale Dimple, who went to Best of Winners at the Chicago World's Fair, 1933. To conclude this article, I am going to return to Ch. Goldstream Guard of Cordova and give you as clear a picture as I can of this truly remarkable Cocker, who really 'arrived", and left an imprint in doggie history that can never be erased:-

As a very young pup, the "guard" seemed to have everything, "If he had not turned out well, he should have been sued for breach of promise", because he was so richly endowed with the features and characteristics that go into the make-up of a dog that so nearly approaches the ideal. If you will visualize with me, a Cocker coming toward you that has everything you would like in your dog - and then some! - you will have an imaginary glimpse of the dog that was almost all: "GOLD STREAM" That is responsible for the "stream" becoming a flowing river of beauty, of constancy and affection, which is the Cocker's contribution in his relationship to the home-life of thousands.

With a truly wonderful body, supported by free and jovially moving, beautifully rounded feet, whose pads were firm enough when contacting the ground to emphasize the free, easy, rhythmic gait of the "happiness boy" of Dogdom. If you want me to itemize, I would say our subject possessed a beautiful head, grand neck and shoulders, real conformation, was splendidly ribbed and short-backed, with an even slope from the withers to a tail carried correctly with the top line of the back, which functioned as a Cocker's tail should under the stimulation of interesting work, or joyous play. The Guard had a lovely, very dark eye, sparklingly and intelligently alert, his expression was at once tender and irresistible. His black flat coat had a lovely sheen, a really splendid fellow, and definitely conscious of it. I have been asked quite frequently just what was wrong with Gold Stream Guard. The question is more difficult than it would appear. It is customary to say he was a little "funny" in mouth, but if you still persist I'll go on record as saying that if a person were submitted to treatment for the same trouble, the dentist's bill would not go high, or if you prefer, he was a little "funny" in the mouth. I give you my word that he was neither under or over-shot, he possessed square, even jaws, with a muzzle that was at once smooth and clean cut. He had style, quality, character. I was going to say "as pretty as a picture", but I would not have been doing him justice, for he was a picture, a beautiful, "animated" picture. My thanks to all contributors to this series and for the privilege of taking part in so interesting a discussion.

If my friend, Mr. George Climo, is brought a little more into the limelight he will soon be signing autographs, dodging the publicity boys, and even the cameraman.



Manchester Terriers

(Toy and Standard)

A life member of the Ottawa Kennel Club, Mr. F. C. McLean, needs no introduction in Canada or the United States as a breeder of Toy and Standard Manchester Terriers. Mr. McLean and his son "Mac" (whose Toy "Virginia Brass Hat" went Best of Breed at Madison Square Gardens in the last show) have jointly about forty-five specimens in their kennels at present. They have recently furnished the basic stock for two new Ontario breeders of these aristocratic little dogs. Mr. F. C. McLean has judged the breed both at Madison Square, and Morris and Essex shows, and was the President of the original Black and Tan Club of America (now the Manchester Terrier Club) organized

The McLeans have among their many beautiful trophies the "Manitoba Challenge Cup", which had to be won three different times, under three different judges, and with three different dogs. This was offered for a Standard Manchester Terrier-medium weight (17 lbs.).

In discussing the breed with Mr. "Mac" McLean, he said that in his opinion the Toy Manchester was favored more in Canada than the standard type.

As early as the sixteenth century, the Black and Tan Terrier was described, and was the foundation of the present Manchester Terrier. A group of breeders located in Lancashire, England, produced from the original Black and Tan, the type now known as the Manchester Terrier.

By the selective breeding of the smaller specimens of the Manchester Terrier (standard) the Toy Breed was produced.

These alert, intelligent little dogs, apart from being very adaptable to city abodes because of their tiny size, have their usefulness as well. They are excellent rat killers and with their exceptionally keen sense of hearing make excellent watch dogs, and needless to say the food bill doesn't run too high.

Mr. McLean stressed the fact that breeding for proper color and markings was of paramount importance, and in their kennels no dog is kept which is lacking in this respect. He quoted the following points which are the desirable and necessary qualities for the standard of perfection in the Toy variety of this interesting breed:

Head—Long, narrow, tight skinned, almost flat, with a slight indentation up the forehead; slightly wedge shaped, tapering to the nose, with no visible cheek muscles, and well filled up under the eyes; level in mouth, with tight-lipped jaws.

EYES — Small, bright, sparkling, and as near black as possible; set moderately close together; ablong in shape, slanting upwards on the outside; they should neither protrude nor sink in the skull.

Nose-Black.

EARS—Of moderate size; set well up on the skull and rather close together, thin moderately narrow at base; with pointed tips; naturally erect carriage. Wide, flaring, blunt tipped or "bell" ears are a serious fault: cropped or cut ears shall disqualify. NOTE: Disqualification for cropped ears shall apply only to dogs whelped after October 11th, 1938.

Neck and Shoulders—The neck should be of moderate length, slim and graceful; gradually becoming larger as it approaches and blends smoothly with the sloping shoulders; free from throatiness; slightly arched from the occiput.

Chest—Narrow between the legs: deep in the brisket.

Body—Moderately short, with robust loins; ribs well sprung out behind the shoulders; back slightly arched at the loin, and falling again to the joining of the tail to the same height as the shoulder.

Legs — Forelegs straight, and well under body. Hind legs should not turn in or out as viewed from the rear; carried back; hocks well let down.

Feet—Compact, well arched, with jet black nalls; the two middle toes in the front feet rather longer than the others; the hind feet shaped like those of a cat.

Tail—Moderately short, and set on where the arch of the back ends; thick where it joins the body, tapering to a point; not carried higher than the back.

Coat—Smooth, short, thick, dense, close and glossy; not soft.

Color—Jet black and rich mahogany tan, which should not run or blend into each other but meet abruptly, forming clear, well defined lines of color division. A small tan spot over each cheek; the lips of the upper and lower jaw should be tan, extending under the throat, ending in the shape of the letter V; the inside of the ears partly tan. Tan spots, called rosettes, on each side of the chest about the front legs, more pronounced in puppies than in adults. There should be a black "thumb mark" patch on the front of

each foreleg between the pastern and the knee. There should be a distinct black "pencil mark" line running lengthwise on the top of each toe on all four feet. The remainder of the forelegs to be tanned to the knee. Tan on the hind legs should continue from the pencilling on the feet up the inside of the legs to a little below the stifle joint; the outside of the hind legs to be black. There should be tan under tail, and on the vent, but only of such size as to be covered by the tail. (White in any part of the coat is a serious fault, and shall disqualify whenever the white shall form a patch or stripe measuring as much as one-half inch in its longest dimension.)

Weight—Not exceeding twelve pounds. It is recommended that at all dog shows the open classes shall be (and any or all other classes, except puppy classes, may be) divided as:

- (a) under seven pounds.
- (b) seven pounds to twelve pounds.

I still get many phone calls and letters asking what the Cairn is like, so to those who do not know our breed I pen this short sketch:

Back in the 17th century the small dog of Scotland was known as the "terrier". At that time he was bred to work, not exhibit. His work was chiefly foxbolting and keeping down all vermin. In those days the "standard" as we know it, was unknown. Beyond general size requirement, the Terrier did not conform to any particular type. Every laird or crofter followed his own idea, some demanding speed, others endurance. It is therefore not surprising that there are many variations in height, weight and colour. Only in recent years has stress been laid upon what we now know as "points". The Cairn was recognized as such in 1909.

The Cairn is a small terrier, in fact the smallest working terrier, but not in any sense a toy. Characteristically he is

shy, chiefly due to the outdoor life his forbears led. After puppyhood he does not make friends with anyone and everyone. This brings greater loyalty in the end. Once he has been won he is single-heartedly devoted to his owner. He is at his best in the field, a natural retriever, will dig out moles, or run anything on four legs till he drops from exhaustion. His two coats serve him well, one shake and he is fit to go indoors. Inside the house he lays aside his restless activity, is quiet and well-mannered, very easy to train. His sensitive nature makes him entirely amenable to

spoken reproof, a whip invariably spoils a good sport and loses a friend.

Cairn colour ranges from black brindle through silver, reds to cream, black points desirable. Weight, bitches, 12 to 13 lbs.; dogs, 14 to 15 lbs. I received a letter from England that 7 to 10 lbs., are winning, but let's hope its just a wartime phase.

A word of warning, a section amongst Cairn breeders use the slogan "a real terrier", unfailingly the animal is a good terrier but a Bad Cairn Terrier.

The old true type possesses what the Gaelic-speaking fancier calls "Enden Kath" (cats' faces). He must have eyelashes. There is no doubt the Cairns are extraordinarily difficult to breed really good. Far too little attention is paid to "gait".

So here's to the Cairn for his infinite variety, so fascinating to the breeder, so annoying to the orderly-minded judge! May he continue to grow in popularity.

AFGHAN HOUND, CH. RUDIKA OF BLAKEEN, IS AWARDED BEST-IN-SHOW AT LONDON, CANADA

Taken to Canada for the first time by Marion Foster Florsheim, Ch. Rudika of Blakeen, many times contender for the chief honor in the States, crashed through against many of Canada's best entries, and was awarded the top honor by Judge W. C. Baldwin, at London, Canada, on April 21st.

Again shown the following day at Windsor, Rudika was Best Amer.-Bred in Show and runner-up for the top honor under Judge Wm. E. McDerment. The Afghan was beautifully handled by Mr. Alf-Loveridge, of Canada, and showed proudly with neck and head carried high, with her eyes constantly following the judge as he moved in the ring.

Ch. Rudika is one of the outstanding daughters of Int. Ch. Rudiki of Prides Hill; is a red with black mask ears, a beautifully coated and finely built bitch. After finishing her championship when a youngster she was retired from the ring and produced an outstanding litter of eight sired by Int. Ch. Rana of Chaman of Royal Irish. From this litter three were fortunate enough to go into show homes and are top winners; Ch. Zurmurrud of Five Mile (owned by Mrs. John Bamburger of Salt Lake City) has won many groups and is a top bitch the same color as her dam; Ch. Asri Ravid of Five Mile is a Best-in-Show son, and is owned by Mrs. Percy Gudgeon of Canada. Another Best in Show son of this litter is Ch. Yenghiz Khan of Five Mile (owned by Mrs. Wilfred Kennedy of Detroit, the English Setter fanciers).

Resuming her show career for a short time last summer Ch. Rudika's wins to date are: 21 Best Breed; 20 Pl. Group; 11 Best Hound; 2 Best Amer.-Bred in Show; 1 Best in Show. This bitch now possesses all points necessary to becoming an international champion, but must be shown once more in Canada and win under a third judge before she is awarded the Canadian title.

Rudika is now owned by Mr. Charles Costabile of Texas, who travelled to Canada to see her shown, but will remain at the Florsheim's Connecticut "Five Mile Kennels" to avoid the Texas heat this summer.

AMERICAN SPANIEL CLUB

1946 Year Book

The 1946 Yearbook of the American Spaniel Club will contain a unique 16-page section devoted to an illustrated Cocker Spaniel Standard by famed artist Paul Brown, working under a grant by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, it is announced.

The grant was made in line with the Center's belief that the judging and breeding of Cockers would be greatly benefitted by the existence of a pictorial standard to accompany the textual standard now in use. Expectations are that it will make for greater uniformity in judging on the one hand, and, on the other, give breeders, particularly novices, a concrete ideal "to shoot at." It is hoped that the adoption of similar pictorial standards by other clubs will prove a definite contribution toward the breeding of more desirable dogs in all the several classifications.

Second place was won by an English Setter, Lucky Strike, owned by Scottie MacPhail, also of Calgary. Scottie developed that wonderful performer and producer, Tick Tock, bred by Nick Nickolson of Forest Lawn, Alberta, who has owned and campaigned so many field trial winners.

Third place went to the Pointer Graingers Gremlin, owned by Andy Lund of Calgary. This dog will be heard from again, I am sure, for he packs around just about what it takes to be a good one, but he was unfortunate. Watch him another time. This last event was a split between Graingers Gremlin and Mindy's Ace, a Setter owned by Jimmie Wordie, and was he a goodlooker. He is a litter brother to Lucky Strike. Jimmie Wordie always has a good dog and no person enjoys working them as much as Jimmie.

Mac MacLaughlan had some real contenders in this event, but they were also unfortunate in drawing fields where the birds were scarce. The classic was the all-age and the large gallery was treated to some of the finest exhibition of dog work.

The winner of this event was a big upstanding Pointer and was he goodlooking. He put up a performance that brought the gallery right up on its toes and they gave him thunderous applause. This dog was bred by Dave Sinclair of Calgary, Alberta, who years ago owned an imported dog that has left his stamp on some wonderful progeny. Towit Gus Dumas and Church of Balsac were made famous by the same breeding. Frank Fallon had another and they were all performers. The winner is owned by the Creach brothers, Mike and Jimmie, and are they proud of this dog, and well they might be, for he just simply stole the show. 

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
