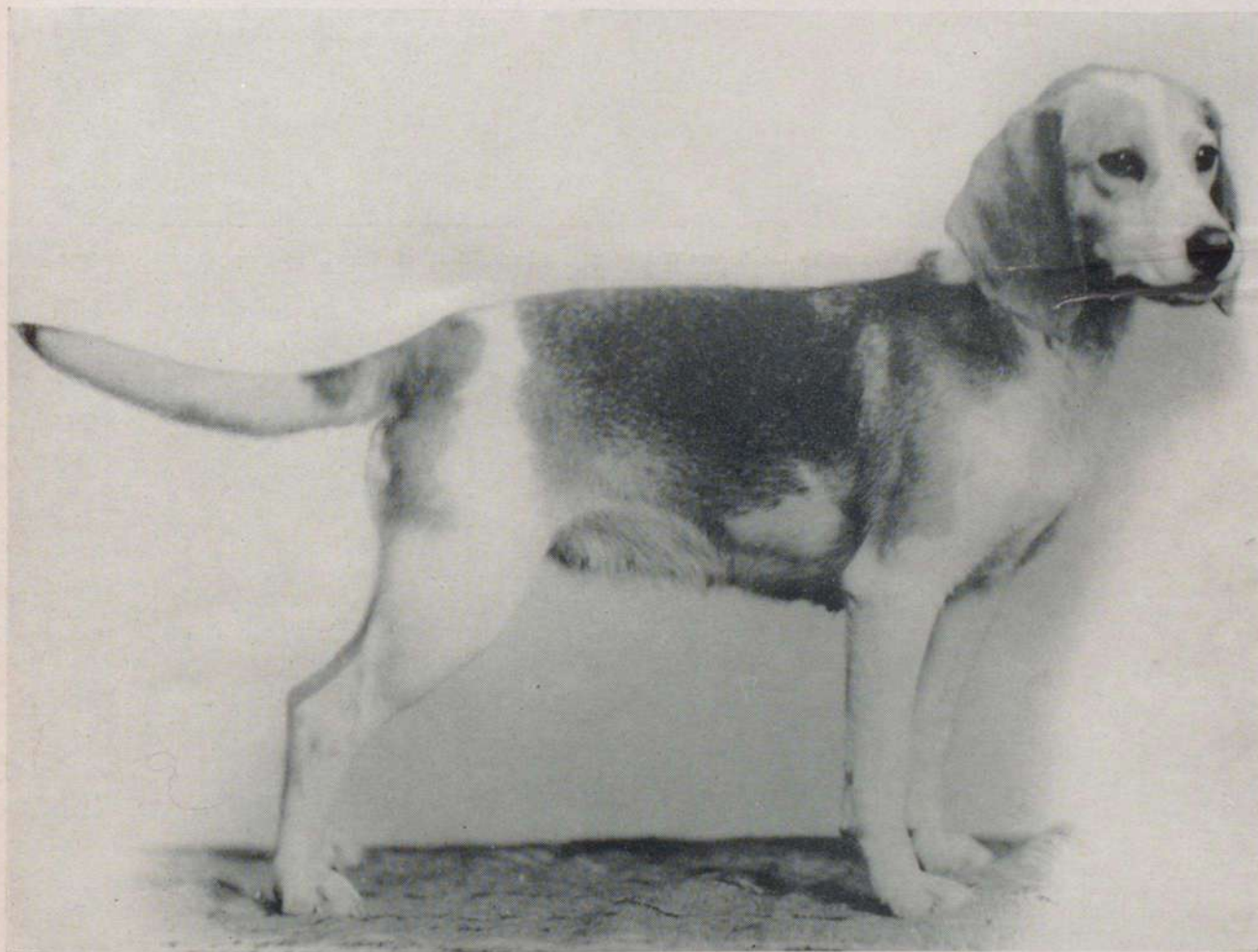

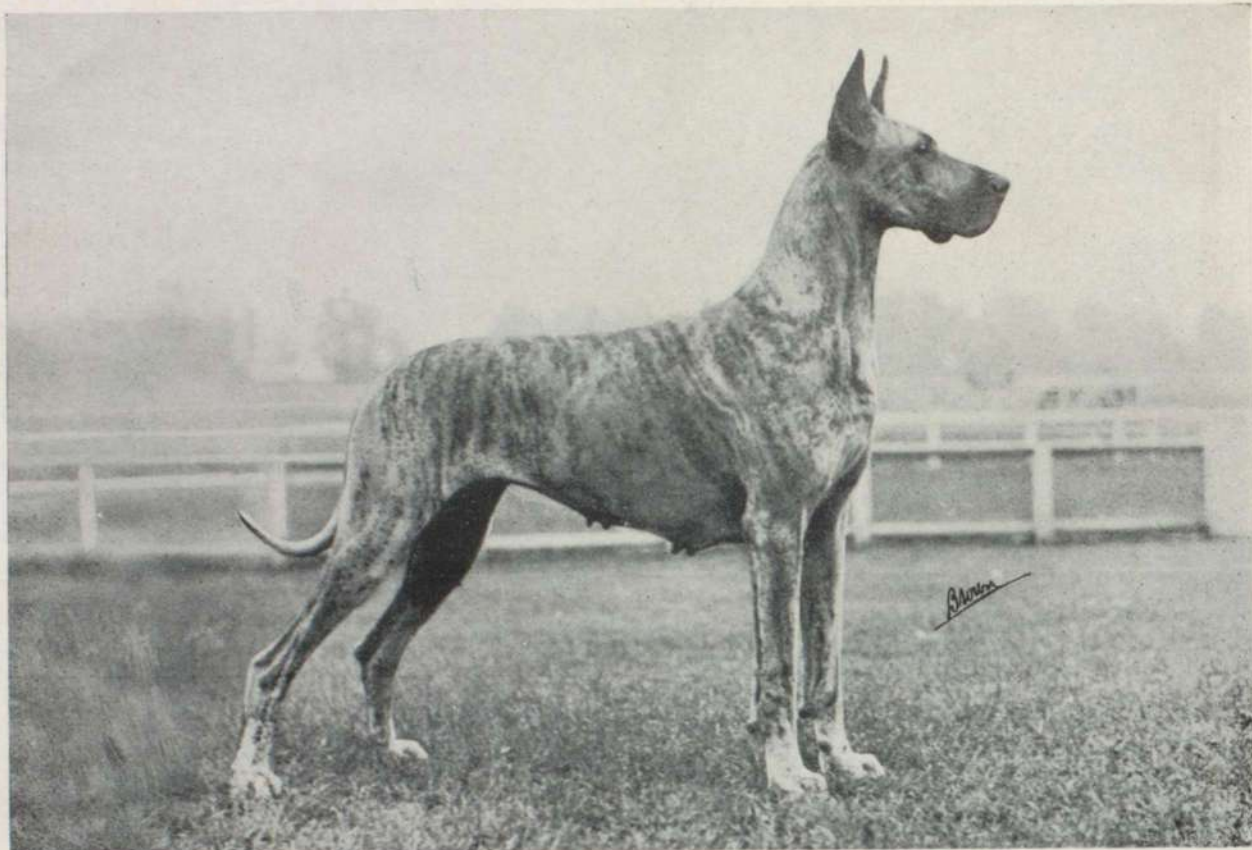

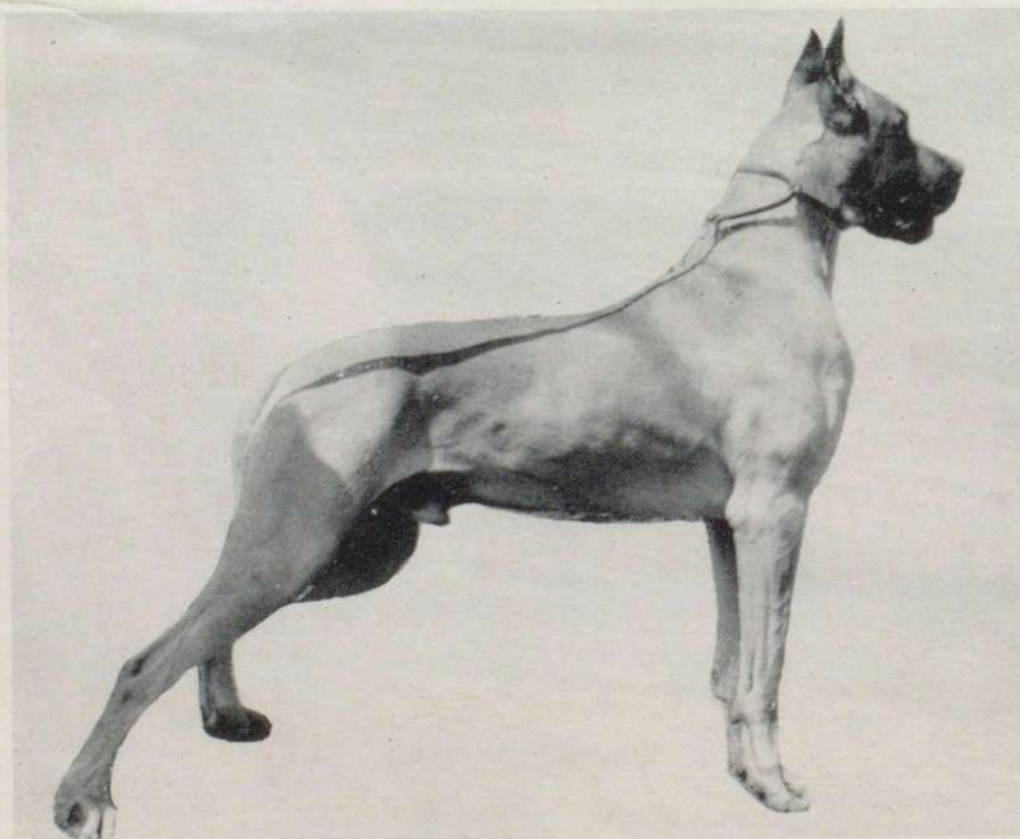

OUR COVER DOG

Our cover carries a beautiful likeness of Dr. Wes. Langmaid's Middle-Stone Joy, who was the Winner in 15" bitches and also carried away the grand prize silver trophy offered by the Ta-I-O de Beagles to the best typed beagles among the four place hounds and reserve in each class at the 11th Annual C. K. C. Fall Trials run at Iberville, Quebec, November, 1944.

Besides being an exceptionally good hound, she has a grand disposition, and is very easily handled in the bush. Her intelligence is keen.

She raised four pups sired by Zo-de Courtbois. Dr. Langmaid has two of them, and Mr. J. A. Thouin has a bitch and Mr. Pat Littish, of Brantford has the male.

Other dogs owned by Dr. Langmaid are Middle-Stone Roxie, who is sired by the American Field Champion, Fish Creek Duke, who in turn is sired by the outstanding American Field Champion, Fish Creek Farmer. Roxie's dam is Fish Creek Belle-Anne, whose sire is Fish Creek Buck, and dam, Fish Creek Julia.

Another brood bitch is Middle-Stone D-Dee (so named because she was born on D-Day) whose sire is Field Champion Starlight Prince, whose sire is Field Ch. Sherman's Hunter and whose dam is Field Champion Archdusty. D-Dee is ex Middle-Stone Roxie.

Dr. Langmaid recently imported another dog from Sky Crest Kennels, Erie, Pennsylvania, Emperor of Sky Crest, sired by the American Field Champion Pine Hollow Nifty. Nifty is sired by the Great American Field Champion, Sammy R, and her dam is the Field Champion Jonesdale Daisy. Emperor is out of Pleasant Valley Lena, one of the most consistent bitches ever to run in American Field trials.



James F. Byrnes, Secretary of State of United States was, until recently, in charge of transport. INCREASE IN KENNEL CLUB BUSINESS

We have received from *Canadian National Livestock Records* a statement showing the increase in Canadian Kennel Club Business in the year 1945 up to June 30th. This increase is highly gratifying, showing as it does, an increase in revenue of \$3,626.58 over the same period last year.

There are 919 more registrations than last year in the same period, and 869 more transfers, the total revenue in 1944 being \$13,740.09, which has increased in 1945 to \$17,366.67 in the same period. This is extremely good con-

sidering that last year was a "bumper" year.

It is a far-cry from the day this puppy picture was taken to the day in the Fall of 1916 when my Father bought me a 16 gauge Pump-Gun and a leather hunting coat. I was all set now to do some real hunting but I lacked a dog. However on our next week end up North I contacted a farmer that had a good hunting dog, tried him out before purchasing, and for a very few dollars became the owner of my first Beagle. Sport, as he was called, was long on brains and very short on looks, ancestry unknown.

I have had Beagles ever since. They make grand companions, either in the field or at home; hard and true workers with an amiable disposition and never cross.

About ten years ago, I was looking for a Beagle I had lost and on going to the Humane Society found a real stylish fellow in one of the pens. He was tattooed V.P. which is Mr. Emerson Robertson's mark. Mr. Robertson was so elated on finding this dog, which shortly after won its championship, that he told me it was about time I had a real pedi-

greed Beagle and to go out to his kennels and pick out a female, which I did. That is how and when I started on my better Beagle breeding. Up until this time I had the idea that a well bred Beagle was all show and would not hunt. This is not the case. I have proved to myself and will prove to any "doubting Thomas" that a well bred show type Beagle will run all day.

On checking over several pedigrees, I found that the old Wheatley strain contained what I was looking for, *e.g.*, good looking Beagles that know how to hunt. The puppies in this picture go back to the Wheatleys through both sire and dam. Their sire, Ch. Eberle's Bomber by Ch. Muirlands Micky, he by Ch. Delco Minor, Ch. Shady Shores Sagacious, Ch. Sapper Sagacious. The dam, Vermont Park Judy by Ch. Vermont Park Raider, he by Ch. Porters True Boy, who is a litter brother of Ch. Muirlands Micky.

I am making plans now for better Beagles so if you want a real tonic come with me some crisp afternoon this Fall when the leaves are turning and listen to the music of the chase.



FIELD TRIALS

The sport of Field Trailing takes in considerable scope. Broadly it means any trials featuring the various breeds of Sporting Dogs, such as Beagle Trials, Spaniel, Retriever, and others as well as trials for Setters and Pointers. Reference to Field Trials in this instance refers only to trials for Setters and Pointers. Of recent years considerable interest has been shown in this branch of sport, and it ranks very high in the United States. Owners of high class performers enter their dogs in direct competition with other dogs wherein speed, brains and nose are the major considerations. Spectators go to field trials for much the same reason they go to a horse race, and expect to see beautiful animals, high speed and to get thrills. It is the cleanest of outdoor sports, and while there may be the odd bet, gambling is not common, nor is it encouraged. What could be more thrilling than a bird dog straining every nerve and muscle to beat its brace mate to a likely looking bit of cover, and what is more beautiful than the picturesque point of a Setter or Pointer when on game? Added to this from the spectators' point of view is the thrill of riding a horse or in some other means of conveyance, where every effort is made to be in on the "kill", joining in the race so to speak. What sportsman or sports woman has not read with interest the running of a Field Trial, or a good hunting story wherein a Setter or Pointer plays a major part, and what is more thrilling than a picture of one of these dogs pointing its game?

Viewed from a breeder's point of view, and a good breeder is always on the lookout for new and better blood, his

interest is in what possible matings would better his present stock, and what competing dog is best suited to perpetuate its desirable qualities to his present stock. From a judge's joint of view, more is taken into consideration. He is looking for quality, and measures the competing dogs on that basis. A judge must be convinced that the dog has a good nose, a brain saturated with bird sense and a physical structure and stamina to carry that brain fast and sure to the objectives selected, and ability to handle game once it is found; style, good character, tireless and an undying desire to hunt as well as being responsive to his handler's desires. A judge does not take into consideration what he knows of past performances of any particular dog, but what is shown him on that particular heat or trial. In other words a dog must hunt well, enthusiastically, intelligently, use his brains as to wind and cover, handle his birds in a masterly manner, being accurate in his findings and show confidence, style and character on point.

Field Trials were instituted for the purpose of developing a class of dog showing all these qualities, and to bring them to the public attention in order that such performers could be used to perpetuate these desirable qualities. One should not get the impression that a field trial dog is not good for the average hunting; quite the opposite is true. A brainy field trial dog will accommodate its hunting pace to that of the hunter. In the "good old days" a short ranging dog of moderate speed was all that was required; birds were very plentiful and hunting seasons quite long and the areas that could be hunted

were large and close together. Under present conditions with short hunting seasons and a paucity of game, areas where game is found are widely scattered and a faster and wider dog is required. A dog must take in all available territory and be very staunch on game. Field Trialing has developed and brought to light the best blood of this type. For this reason a field trial dog should exhibit more than merely being a high class shooting dog. This does not necessarily mean that his bird finding faculties should be minimized because, as we have said the function of a bird dog is to find and point game and one that does not is useless whether he is in the field trial or whether he is in the field with his master for a day's shooting. There have been times when speed was the craze, and, possibly, there was the time when the slow moving bird dog had its day.

Field Trials, not unlike horse racing, present two angles for consideration; first, a spectacular form of sport, and second the basis for data on which to conduct breeding operations. Regarding the first, that a field trial is a race, spectators go there for thrills, and require dogs that can produce them. A slow moving dog who does considerable pottering around, and points in an indifferent manner, cannot stimulate one's emotions. A dog winning or even placing in a field trial would possibly be desirable from a breeder's point of view, depending on what the other side of the mating would be. Another very important point to consider, is the conservation of game. Nearly all conservation organizations heartily endorse the use of good bird dogs in the field.

The first record of a Field Trial in the United States was October 8th, 1874. The early trials progressed slowly, but nevertheless they went ahead. The early trials were more or less under the supervision of the bench show organization. Many of the owners of field trial dogs did not take kindly to supervision, and these freedom loving people, like the nervous high strung charges they handled, did considerable blinking and bolting. Up to about 1917 various organizations tried to get field trialing on a popular basis, but it was not until about 1917 that the "Amateur Field Trials of America" was formed and when this organization got into full swing, Field Trialing in the United States advanced by leaps and bounds. Recent figures show there are now over 250 sportsmen's organizations which sponsor recognized Field Trials each year. A total of over 400 such programs are staged yearly, with nearly 1,300 stakes being run, bringing out about 20,000 starters annually. Four hundred programs does not seem impressive until it is broken down when it will show that it averages more than one per day the year around, each running three stakes or more.

Previous to 1943 there had been several "catch as catch can" type of field trials held in Saskatchewan. Progressive thinking dog-lovers felt the need of placing field trialing on a firmer foundation. To satisfy their desire for improvement in this grant sport, an organization was formed and became known as the Field Trial Branch of the Saskatoon Kennel Club. Their aim was towards betterment of hunting dogs, both as to type and hunting ability, better understanding between owners, handlers, breeders and to hold all trials under Canadian Kennel Club Rules. It has been said that field trialing for Pointers and Setters under Canadian Kennel Club Rules was impossible for us here on the Prairies. The first of these trials was held on September 5th and 6th, 1943. It was so successful and all participants, as well as Club Officials were so well satisfied, that another Field Trial was planned for the following year. The second such trial was held September 3rd and 4th, 1944. It also was very successful, with a larger entry and better grounds on which to run. In each of the trials Mr. Ernie Howe, of Baldwinton, and Mr. Arthur G. Goddard, of Saskatoon, officiated as judges, being further assisted in the 1944 trials by Mr. E. L. Usher, of Saskatoon. Judges Howe and Goddard remarked on the great improvement shown both in the competing dogs and handlers in the 1944 trial over the one held the previous year. Another trial is planned for on September 1st, 2nd and 3rd, 1945.

This Club runs a Puppy Stake, a Derby Stake, an Amateur Stake and features the Shooting Dog Stake and the Open All Age Stake, the last two carrying points toward separate Championship ratings, running only one of

the feature events each day. The Shooting Dog Stake must be handled on foot. This is to make a clear cut separation from the Open All Age Stake. It is hoped this will bring out handling ability and the dogs response to its handler. This Club has made steady progress, and will continue to hold Field Trials under CKC rules, provided said rules are applicable.

Realizing that the Canadian Kennel Club catered mainly to Bench Shows, and that our Provincial Director would be very busy from this angle, it was decided that we send our own Representative to the annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club. We fully realize there is a vast difference in field trialing in the Maritimes for instance than here on the prairies. With so few opportunities (one a year instead of over one per day as in the United States) it would be hard to bring to light the good dogs we have here, and practically impossible for a dog to win a championship. This prompted us to ask that a Field Trial Director be given a seat on the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club. One Director could serve several Provinces until the number of Field Trial Organizations made this impracticable; the Field Trial Director to be selected by Field Trial organizations. It does not seem fair to burden the Provincial Director with the additional duties of Field Trialing when he is elected to serve the Bench Sow organizations although he has four members on the Provincial Committee. Work connected with Field Trialing is bound to create additional work both for the Provincial Director representing the various Provinces and also the Canadian Kennel Club. It is easily seen what a help a Field Trial Director, elected to the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club would be both to the Bench organizations and to the Field Trial organizations. There are a number of cities and towns in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta which have sporting men and women owning good dogs, who we feel would benefit by field trialing. Once these points were organized, inter-club trials could put up a real Field Trial, but by all means have it on a recognized and officially sponsored basis.

Under the present set-up the Shooting Dog Stake and the Open All Stake each carry five points towards Championship, and a total of ten points are required in order to qualify as Champion in each separate stake, with an entry of not less than ten dogs running in each stake. As there is only one Official Field Trial being run in Canada at the present time, it would be practically impossible for a dog to win its Championship in either of the stakes. It is not the Club's intention to suggest that the standards of Championship be lowered in any way, but with only one club, and one Trial a year, it is easily seen how difficult it would be for a dog to win its Championship. This condition will prevail until there are sufficient clubs holding

Official Trials near enough to each other to enable a dog to take in several trials in a season. In order to get Clubs organized and owners of good dogs interested, some attraction should be given, and this would be in a fair opportunity of winning Championship at one, two or three trials. The point system is good, and should not be lost sight of. Our suggestion would be that if a dog won a Shooting Stake and an Open All-Age Stake, he certainly should be classed as a Champion; this would not in any way lower the standards of either of the Shooting Dog or Open All Age Championships, in fact it would take an exceptional dog to do this. On the other hand if it is thought advisable to keep each stake separate, five points be allowed for an entry of ten dogs, increasing the points by each dog entered over ten, thus with twelve dogs, 7 points or 15 dogs, 10 points which would be sufficient to qualify as Champion. This a matter that can be given considerable thought, and we would like to hear other viewpoints on the subject. One must not lose sight of the "breaks" of the game, such as wind, weather, cover and time of day the particular dog is being run. This Club has been fortunate in its judges, men who thoroughly know dogs and hunting conditions, and where it was felt a dog did not have an even break, a re-run was ordered; in this way the judges as well as the contestants were fully satisfied the best dog won.

Holding field trials under CKC rules is not at all difficult and the opportunity should not be passed up to form an organization to work under them; all that is needed is a little co-operation by both parties. A Field Trial Director would be a great help along that line. In all such trials, including Retriever and Spaniel Trials, some elasticity should be exercised, depending upon what section of Canada they were held. This would place another duty on the shoulders of a Field Trial Director, that is to see that such elasticity was not abused. Such Directors should be familiar with all phases of Field Trialing and Retriever Trials, and also should study means of popularizing this sport from the public point of view. There are quite a number of good dogs in Western Canada, and this (new to Canada, under CKC rules) form of sport only needs a bit of organizing and a few trials to make it as popular here as it is in the United States. It is hard to realize that we have made only one Field Trial Champion here in Canada during the past ten years. Let us take a page from the history of Field Trialing in the United States and benefit by their "trial and error" experience.

This Club would like to add Retriever and Spaniel Trials to its activities, but from what possible entrants say, some changes will have to be made in the rules to cover this form of trials as they apply to conditions found on the prairies. We believe from our experience with the CKC, some elasticity of

rules will be allowed.

Another angle that could be approached with the view to considerable improvement, and that is in getting dogs registered with the CKC. At the present time breeders have to import their new blood from the United States and no good breeder wants to own a dog that is not registered in Canada. The CKC recognize the Field Dog Stud Book Registrations from the United States, but only after it has passed through the American Kennel Club. This is troublesome and expensive, and many owners of good dogs registered with the FDSB feel the effort is not worthwhile in comparison to the benefits received, and let the matter rest and the FDSB registration stand, or do not have the dog registered at all. All possible effort should be made to bring the Bench Show dogs and the Field Trial type closer together as to type and performances. This can only be done by breeding to best performers as recorded by registration.

It is interesting to note that there were only three dogs registered under CKC out of 24 dogs entered in the Field Trial held by the Field Trial Branch of the Saskatoon Kennel Club in 1943. In 1944 there were 28 dogs entered, 16 of which were registered with the CKC and three of the dogs listed were actually registered, but the owners of the dogs could not produce registration numbers. This is a clear indication of the interest of the local owners in improving their dogs. In addition this Club was the cause of a number of new members joining the CKC and several others will likely join shortly. This Club is definitely Field Trial minded, and are making every effort to place the benefits that may be had by having recognized Field Trials before the dog owners whose aims are to have better dogs, and more better dogs.

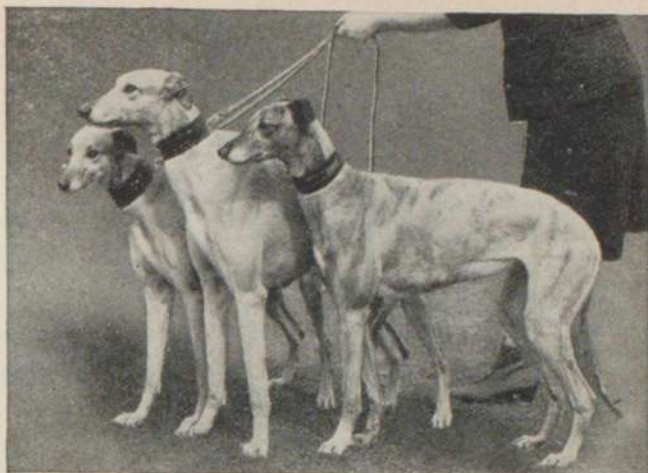

Retriever Trials

By
WILLIAM H. PYM

Ed.: This article was written by special request to assist new clubs. Mr. Pym, our first vice-president is a real Retriever enthusiast, and is always willing to help a fellow fancier.

Retriever Trials are now an established major sport under Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., Rules. It is a competitive game in which amateur and professional can compete together on an equal basis, be they man, woman, and or youth.

While there are fundamental training rules, the amateur should not hesitate to pit his training skill against that of the professional, and certainly there is no game more enjoyable for the out of doors sportsmen or sports women. The more "one-dog" fanciers we can attract to this wholesome game the better.

In such a game as this, the dog must be the first consideration. One has a wide field to choose from with such fine breeds of dogs as Golden Retrievers, Labrador Retrievers, Irish Water Spaniels, Chesapeake Bay Dogs, etc., all established retrieving breeds.

The next step to be taken after securing the dog, is his training. There are many fine text books available on the subject so this phase of the game will not be labored here, other than to suggest that you develop to the utmost the natural hunting instinct of your dog before you attempt to enforce too much discipline. Far too many dogs have the "hunt" taken out of them by trainers who start at the wrong end of the course. Remember hundreds of toy and non-sporting breeds are obedience trained, but the hunting instinct is a gift from the Creator. Keep that hunting instinct alive at all costs. If you cannot have a hunting dog as well as an obedient one, your obedience lessons will be of no avail.

A further suggestion is that in the training lessons use only game birds of the kind your dog will be expected to hunt afield in your locality. I fail to see any logic in using a "foreign scent" during the home training period, even though birds with a foreign scent are cheaper and more readily available. Many fine prospects have been ruined because the trainer insisted upon his dog retrieving a "sour pigeon".

The standards of the various breeds of dogs were designed with a view of producing dogs of specific build calculated to best perform certain tasks. The standards also insist upon certain refinements, so when we hear it said that such and such a dog is the "working type" or the "show type", the author of such remarks is merely displaying his lack of appreciation of the genuine breed requirements.

We have DUAL PURPOSE dogs, but not DUAL TYPE dogs in the same breed. Herewith is pictured a fine example of the dual purpose dog.

Let us remember also the dual purpose dogs to be found in the Rockhaven Kennels of Colonel S. S. Magoffin. Dogs from the Rockhaven Kennels have won group and best in show awards and they and their progeny have been major winners at the best retriever trials held in the wide world.

Who does not remember the dual purpose dogs owned by William Bradburn, of Edmonton, and the Skyline Kennels Chesapeake Dogs of the same city; the Robert Hutchinson Labradors; and the land and water dogs of Jack Ayre, of

Saskatoon; the Irish Water Spaniels of Fort Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan; the Labradors of Colonel Ewing, etc.?

One of the pioneer breeders of Labradors Retrievers is Mr. P. H. Moore. He has been working along scientific lines and has always been a stickler for the right type of dog for field performance.

require these pioneers of the game back with us to hustle some of the 1945 dogs such as Bert Blair's Field Trial Champion Brackens Sweep, and International winner of note, and the G. H. Pendy-grasse Labrador, "Shellburn of Deymar", the dog that won the sporting group at the Edmonton Spring show and then was a bang-up second in a first class retriever trial a few weeks later.

The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., have adopted rules for the fair government of Retriever Trials with the express view of developing the pure-bred retrieving dog to the maximum. At a licensed trial held near Vancouver last May it was necessary for the winning dog to give almost the perfect performance to win the laurels, so the time has already arrived to revise our present rules by adding walk up trials and other essential features which demonstrate the real worth of a retrieving dog in the field.

A brief resumé of the current rules should not be amiss here. The idea of a retriever trial of a perfectly trained the performance of a perfectly trained dog in the field. The principal points to be considered are sagacity, marking, steadiness, nose, dash, perseverance,

obedience, and tenderness of mouth in retrieving. Each and every item is essential in a first class shooting dog.

Sagacity is the first requirement. If your dog is not endowed with acute intelligence he will be of no value in the field. Marking the fall of game by the dog is a great attribute and results in the recovery of wounded birds which may otherwise be left to die and decay.

The next item is what we call "nose". In other words the perfect development of the olfactory organ. A hunting dog minus a good nose is as false to his breed as is the jersey cow that would not produce milk. We want dash and style, and perseverance which will overcome every reasonable obstacle. Last, but by no means least, we demand a tender mouth. A bird mutilated by the dog is of no value to the hunter and is therefore wasted.

The delivery of the bird after a hard retrieve is a spectacular manoeuvre. Some trainers insist that the retrieving dog first make a complete turn around the handler then sit or hup before dropping the bird into the handler's hand. The practical shooting man insists upon a rapid retrieve right up to hand without unnecessary loss of time so the dog is free to be sent after the second and third bird which may be carried away with a running tide or current.

At some retriever trials it is not uncommon for spectators to hold stop watches on the dogs in action. This is interesting from a purely academic point of view. But in judging, THE "LAY" OF THE BIRD and the DIFFICULTY OF THE RETRIEVE are the deciding factors, not minutes or seconds.

The accompanying chart will give the novice an idea of the general lay-out of a retriever trial course. On the land trials the course should be moved to unfouled ground as often as conditions will permit for obvious reasons. The water course will be some what similar

to the land course dependent on local conditions. The decoys as indicated on the chart are naturally for water test use only.

The distances suggested are merely approximate, although based on the theory that the average bird is shot in actual hunting within the forty yard pattern, thus with the usual glide of the falling bird, we arrive at the seventy yard suggestion.

At some trials, less or greater distances are employed. But it should be remembered that retrieving a game bird on land or from the water is not a task for a toy dog, therefore a reasonably long retrieve should be insisted upon. By the same token we all use shotguns with limited killing powers, so why insist upon excessively long retrieves when such conditions would not be met

with in the hunting field? Common-sense should be the guide.

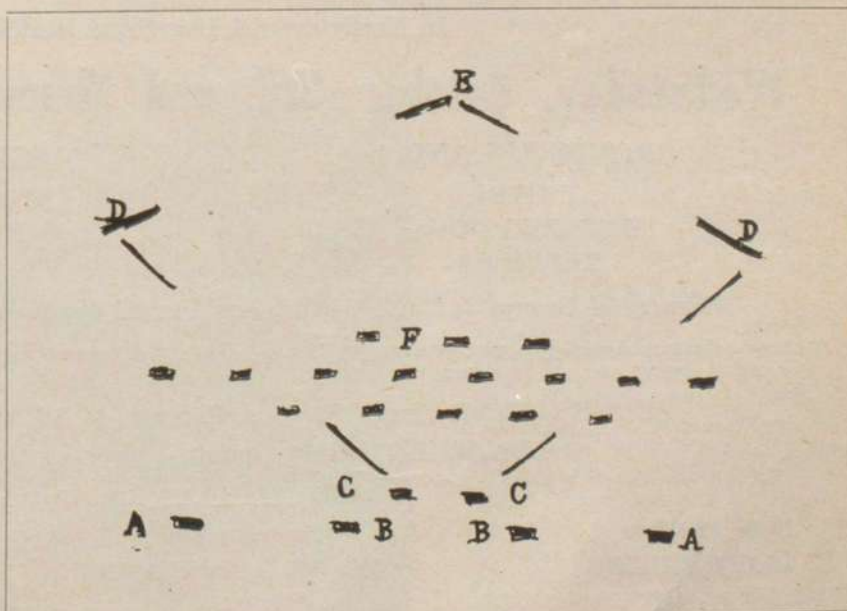
At retriever trials the dogs are run in braces ordinarily (although on occasion single dogs are tested from blinds). The judges indicate the dog to perform first. The brace mate must remain steady during the performance of the dog in action. It can readily be realized that retrieving dogs must be well trained and in perfect physical condition to survive the nervous tension placed upon them while under judgment.

The planted birds must be placed in position without the dog's knowledge of the location. In water trials, if local conditions permit, the planted bird should be placed in cover up or down stream from the starting point.

It is optional which of the three birds are retrieved first. The planted bird is usually the most difficult to locate, and it is in this exercise that the closest co-ordination between dog and man is manifest. Hand and whistle signals may be used to assist the dog to locate.

Some may say that trials are too artificial. If a hunting dog with his retrieving trial education is not a better dog afield, then reason must fail.

It will be a happy day for all concerned with wild life preservation when retriever trials are held in every community where land and water dogs are used. A well trained dog is a game conservationist in the truest sense of the word. The retrieving game has the enthusiastic endorsement of William Fisher, Esquire, President of Ducks Unlimited, and of most Game Authorities. Here I wish to pay tribute to the Officers and Inspectors of the British Columbia Game Commission whose co-operation has been so helpful and so cheerfully given in the development of this wholesome outdoor sport.

Beagles In Canada

By
A BEGINNER

ED. NOTE: Dr. W. Langmaid, of the Oshawa Beagle Club, modestly describes himself as "A Beginner". Like the truly learned in any field, he associates himself thus with the people of the world who know that life is short and does not afford the time to learn all there is to know about anything. "Beginners" such as this, usually have a store of real knowledge that puts the "cocksure" to shame.

You can't fall in love with a girl unless you get to know her, and so it is with beagling, either at field trials or hunting with a gun. While this article deals largely with the Beagle Clubs of Canada, just a word on the grand sport of hunting with a pack of beagles. While many may scorn the lowly rabbit yet I believe that hunting the cotton-tail or hare is one of the finest sports, and I believe that more sportsmen indulge in rabbit hunting than any other game, and the beagle, the natural rabbit dog adds to this fun a thrill similar to the thrill that pointers and setters do in bird hunting.

Everything is a matter of opinion and so it is with the kind of dog which each individual likes, but the writer after raising and hunting with fox hounds for twenty years has been converted to the fun of hunting with beagles. The fox hound still has its place and for many is still superior to the beagle, but for the hunter who hunts for the pleas-

ure of being out of doors, and for the pleasure of watching the skill of a dog, rather than having the amount of game to be killed in mind, I believe that the beagle has many advantages. However, just as in any breed of dog, it is impossible to judge the entire breed by some poorly bred and poorly trained individual. So it is with beagles. The type I have in mind are those which have been bred for generations with the same care that sportsmen use in breeding the finest horses or any pure bred stock. As has been said "a good beagle is a gentleman,—it's what is behind him that counts. It's the generations of training and culture, education and refining,—that is what produces the real beagle."

Pages could be written on the care that is being taken in Canada and the United States in trying to produce perfect beagles, for nose, brains, accuracy, and general hunting ability, and most breeders study pedigrees back for five or more generations in trying to pick

the proper sire and dam when breeding.

While the beagle seems to be extremely well suited for hunting, yet many men get more pleasure from field trials, and it is here that the beagle makes its mark. In the United States one could start in August and follow beagle field trials every week until the following April, with some trials lasting a week and entries running up to 300 beagles, and at one trial last fall there was a gallery of over 2000 people. Beagles in the U.S. have for some years ranked second in registration with the A. K. C. and if they continue to gain at their present speed will soon rank first. Space does not permit to describe how the trials are run, only to say that some are run on cotton-tails where the dogs are drawn and run in braces until the judges are satisfied with their skill or lack of it, and some are run on hare or pack stakes when one class are put on game together and run for three hours or until ordered up the judges. Of these we have at present three in Canada running on cotton-tail, Canadian National running at Forest, Ontario, the Thames Valley of London, Ontario, running at Dorchester, and the Hamilton Club running at South Cayuga, while on hare we have the Ta-I-O Club of Montreal running at Iberville, Que., and the Oshawa Club running at Caesarea, also a new Club has just been formed at Middleton, Nova Scotia, to be known as the Annapolis Valley Club.

Again space does not permit a full description of the history and activities of all the Clubs. Suffice it to say a few things concerning each Club with a little more about "Le Club de Beagles Ta-I-O de Montreal" which I believe all beaglers will agree is the most all-year-round Club. The Canadian National running spring and fall trials at Forest, Ontario, has been active for thirty years and for the past ten it has had an international aspect awarding both C.K.C. and A.K.C. points. The Thames Valley Club is very active and has many enthusiastic mem-

bers which include, the secretary, Hardie Brown, or the man of a "million pedigrees" and of course the dean of beaglers, George "Buck" Sherman. This Club has been running trials for the past ten years and the entries are increasing each year. Hamilton Club owe their success to two men, namely Fred Perrow and George Ironberg. These fellows are the kind that not only work for the good of their own Club, but work for the good of all beaglers in general. The Oshawa Club ran their trials for some years on cotton-tail but last year switched to pack stakes on hare and held a most successful trial which will be improved this fall, the main stay of this Club has been Lloyd "Buff" Courtice. Buff has also been greatly in demand as a judge for trials in the United States, which speaks well for his ability in this work. And now a more complete account of the activities of the Ta-I-O Club. This Club has been under the guidance of Mr. J. A. Thouin, Chief Recorder of the city of Montreal, and was organized in 1931, and the first trial run in 1933, which have been improving ever since. For the past four years Dr. L. O. Geoffrion has done a wonderful job as president, with the help of a very active and efficient executive. At one time this Club had 700 members and the secret of their success is "continued activity", or as the "Judge" says, "something every month", — January—general elections with a party; February—one or two free movie nights with lunch; March—a Habitant supper in one of the best Clubs in town (usually attended by 400 guests); April—bush sugar party; May—two or three U.S. trials and Club trial; July and August—a field day for men, women and children; September—U.S. trials; October—Club C.K.C. trial; November—oyster party; December—private hunting and ready to begin another year, and so we see why this Club is so successful. The Annapolis Valley Club are running their first trials this fall and are looking for a couple of good judges, which is a very important thing

in getting away to a good start. All beaglers wish them every success.

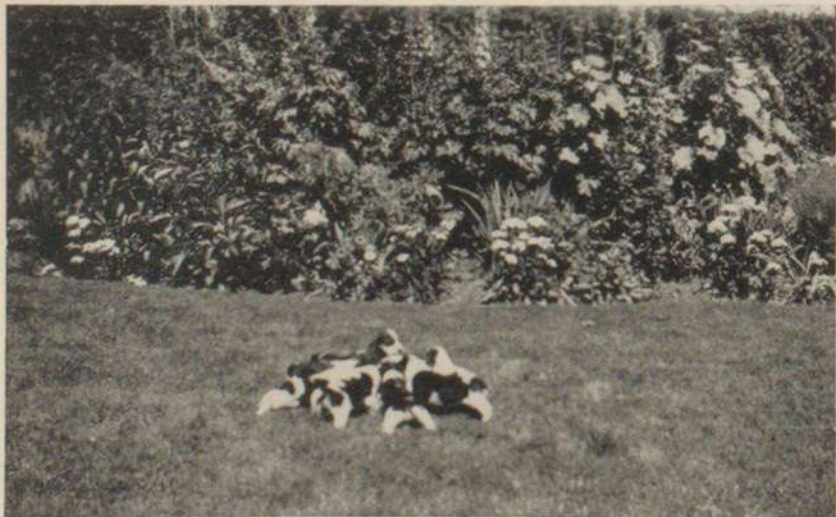

"TRAINING CHESAPEAKE'S TO RETRIEVE"

By W. F. Brennan

Here is how I train my Chesapeake for land retrieving with pigeons.

On either wing of a pigeon count out seven feathers. These are known as flight feathers. Group these together and wrap with a rubber band. With your flight feathers so arranged the bird can be made to fly one-half block or more with a heavy wind. In this way you also have a bird to put out blind retrievers without fouling the grounds. With blind and mark retrievers I usually use a rubber band around both legs to prevent the pigeon from walking off. When I want the dog to trail the bird I leave the rubber band off the legs. This makes an ideal bird for trailing.

When throwing the bird, take the bird with his back towards the palm of left hand and with the right hand pull its legs towards the tail and force wings into the palm of the right hand, with an underhand motion of the arm throw the bird palm upwards into the air. Releasing the bird at different angles of the arm will determine to a great degree the distance the bird will fly.

When training alone, which I do most of the time, I find the above about as easy a way as one could wish.

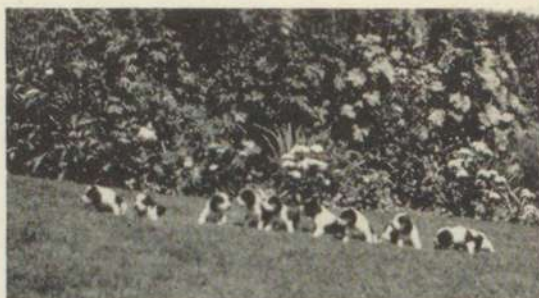

The Collie

By W. G. HASSELL

In the following article, I refer to both dog and bitch in the masculine gender.

TYPE means the physical materials of which a dog is made, the way in which they are articulated—and their relation and balance. I have heard many experienced breeders say that they consider "Type" more important than anything else, in any breed of dog. Just as far as we depart from type, we depart from the true collie. Let us get that clear. Departure from type is a matter of degree. Every departure from type is a fault, but because some faults tend to destroy the general effect of the dog they are the most serious. A dog that is light in bone—long in leg—flat sided—shallow in brisket—lacks coat—may have a wonderful head. But he has BIG faults that give a totally *wrong* effect. In other words he is away off in type.

For what does Nature USE the physical parts of a dog? To express his spirit or character.

What is a true breeder? A person who not only assists Nature in her handiwork, but actually makes Nature do better work to fill the needs of man. That gives a breeder a very decided importance and dignity. To be worthy of that a breeder must have purpose. To have purpose he must have conviction. Conviction! Ah brother! (and sister—for I'm not leaving the women out of this). What is YOUR conviction of what a collie should be? Here are MY convictions:

First of all, a collie's type should express his character. What should his character be? A collie should be intelligent, sensitive, alert, courageous, strong, gentle, loyal, and affectionate. Study each one of those words carefully.

General Type

There are so many details that make a collie a good type that it is impossible to cover them all in one article. I will give a brief and simple picture of the dog and in later articles, take section after section.

A collie should have size and strength, with refinement, elegance, and style. In other words, a collie MUST have QUALITY. He should have a leg coming out of each of the four corners of his body—his forelegs should not appear to come out of the same place. He should have, not only DEPTH, but BREADTH of chest. He should have a long sloping shoulder, ribs that curve and spring—supporting his spine right back to his moderately wide, graceful hind quarters. He should be STRONG without appearing HEAVY—GRACEFUL without appearing LIGHT. He should have that combination so hard to find in horse or dog—size with refinement, expressing power combined with speed. He should be able to move

swiftly, and have the endurance to keep it up.

Only those with a natural gift, developed by experience, ever have the exquisite pleasure of fully appreciating all this—for the collie is essentially a hairy dog—a very hairy dog. His immense glorious coat tends to dazzle the uninitiated so that they miss what is underneath. Only does this cleanness, grace, elegance, power and style show itself CLEARLY through the legs, feet, and head.

A dog which is weedy, lanky, shallow, long legged, narrow chested and lacks coat, is not correct type. He should not be called a collie at all.

I have heard breeders and judges raving about a collie's heavy bone. A collie's bone should NOT appear heavy. It should be clean, straight, powerful—but not heavy. There should be NOTHING heavy, just as nothing LIGHT, about a collie. In type and character, he is the very ultimate in exquisite balance—the ultimate of moderation in all things—except in beauty, and sweetness, which he possesses in measure overflowing.

Now we cannot have a high class collie unless we have a high class head. That is why many breeders—experienced breeders—give forty points out of one hundred to a collie's head. Because the collie's head is such an important part of his anatomy, I shall discuss it very minutely in my next article.

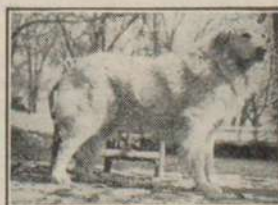

BOOK REVIEWS

By the Editor

RETRIEVER GUN DOGS, by William F. Brown. \$3.50.

A. S. Barnes and Company, publishers of *Retriever Gun Dogs*, by William F. Brown, have asked me to review this helpful and instructive book. The author deals with retriever gun dogs in a very thorough manner. He discusses breeds and characteristics and gives expert advice on the selection of a dog. Highlights of the book are the numerous excellent action pictures showing the work of the various types of retrievers including the Chesapeake, the Labrador, the Golden, the Flat-coated and the Curly-coated, Irish Water Spaniel, and American Water Spaniel. You are taken step by step through the various phases of training your retriever in obedience, in retrieving, in staunchness to firearms and in water work.

A chapter devoted to Retriever Immortals with records of some of the world's outstanding retrievers, such as the Golden, Rip; Champion Nigger of Barrington, a Labrador; Champion the Second Cocoa, a Chesapeake; the famous Ch. Skipper Bob and Ch. Shed of Arden, should interest many of our Western Labrador enthusiasts. This book is a pearl beyond price for those who are interested in retrieving dogs and their work.

COOKING WILD GAME, by Ashbrook and Sater. \$4.50.

Cooking Wild Game, by Frank G. Ashbrook and Edna N. Sater, should pay for itself many times over as it contains 432 recipes. When the Orange Judd Company requested a review, your editor had no idea of the treat in store for her. While I was a resident of France, one of my hobbies was collecting cook books and recipes. During the war and since rationing, these have been put away in a dark corner of the kitchen cupboard, so that even the sight of them can not be a temptation.

I opened the book at 10.30 p.m. thinking to skim through the chapter headings. One o'clock found me completely absorbed in the book, which contains chapter after chapter of choice recipes garnered from every corner of the earth. From time to time I made bets with myself that certain recipes well-known in Brilliant Savarin tradition would not be included. However, by the time I had reached page 239, where I found Wild Ducks à la Presse, I realized that the recipe so simply set out was none other than the recipe which has tickled the palates of generations of tourists at the "Tour d'Argent Restaurant in Paris. There, in pre-war years, for about \$5.00 in our money, you could look at a minute portion of duck done in this delectable manner.

The book gives recipes for the hunting man who wants a simple preparation for camp, but who has a civilized taste for something more than salt and pepper in his flavorings. The book should be a

happy way around rationing difficulties in many localities, and I feel strongly that restaurants in those localities where game abounds should make a special feature of such cooking in order to give our Canadian tourist resorts a little more of an individual attraction.

The book gives careful instructions on how to prepare game, how to store it and how to cut it. It has several chapters devoted to various types of fish with recipes some of which are a legacy from our own Indian natives and others which would make a success for the most sophisticated hostess.

A LIVE ORGANIZATION

The following letter was received from Mr. T. E. Gunderson, Chief Registrar for Registration of Dogs, Canadian National Livestock Record, Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa:

Dear Mrs. Fix:—

I don't know whether what I am about to type is worth very much to the readers of *Dogs in Canada*, but thought that some of our members might possibly be interested to know that the Canadian Kennel Club Inc., is definitely a very live organization these days.

We have now reached the registration number 200,000; it has taken since 1932 to reach this second 100,000 dog to be recorded in the Stud Book, which covers a space of thirteen years between the two. The recorded number 200,000 has been assigned to a black Cocker Spaniel female, registered as Oakwood Baroness, bred by Mrs. D. M. Ardagh, Streetsville, Ont., and sold to Mrs. A. R. Kittermaster, Toronto, Ont.

In looking back to volume 36 for the year 1932, we find a Pomeranian recorded under 100,000, and the Stud Book further reveals that the Fox Terrier was then the most popular dog of the times. Today the Sporting Cocker tops all breeds by a wide margin, he of course has been leading now for several years. I am not prepared to say how long he will hold that enviable position, but it has been interesting to watch the rapid strides some of the other breeds are now taking. It would, of course, be a gamble to predict what breed will lead, say ten years hence.

So we march forward today with very noticeable increase in litter registrations, individual registrations and transfers, as well as many many inquiries pertaining to membership, and the requirements in starting of kennels, that we take time out to pause to pay honour to the pioneers of the early days of The Canadian Kennel Club, and others, who laid the foundation that established a firm and sound

system for the registration of Pure Bred Dogs—a system backed by a statute enacted by the Parliament of this Dominion for the protection of those who now own, or contemplate owning a Pure Bred Dog.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I take this opportunity to bring to the attention of our interested Sporting Group supporters a few notes on the best of our Pointers that are going the show circuits these present days.

One of the main questions is: Will a show dog hunt?

This question has been asked so often that at times one wonders if the enquirer is really serious.

I may go on to say that in some cases there are stupid show dogs with positively no nose for anything but an pan full of food; there are also field dogs which are very keen on the food tin.

I bring to your attention among our winning Pointers in field and bench today, our old friend Dr. Temple's outstanding Moydrum strain. This strain has survived all the tests that have been asked of any sporting dog. I call to your attention Harold Crang's Pointer male, "Lampalague", which came to the fore at the spring trial of Toronto and District. When this dog walked out to enter the brace I was so taken with his appearance that I followed his field work on that round. I have seen many Pointers working and I have yet to see anything more steady with running birds, flying birds, or birds that crash land directly in front. With a caution word of "whoa", his handler, Jack Willis, could keep him more of a statue than something living. Needless to say he had this event for Toronto and District tucked well away in the bag to take home. This dog again has repeated under other trial conditions. He is definitely an old Moydrum strain.

Again, I speak of C. A. Ellis', of Windsor, Lady Jane, sired by Sea King out of Pamela of Moydrum, another pure bred Moydrum. This dog, while still in a senior puppy stage, has been a constant best of breed and a group placement at several shows this present year.

Another very fine example of the breed is W. J. Irwin's Fritz Suspi, which has come along and has taken Winner's Dog at several shows last fall and the present spring meets. Here again is a very fine dog.

Fred Chaney of Kingsville, Ont., has also one out Duke of Northmount, who has only been taken to camp by Fritz Suspi.

Ross Rushing's Comanche's Beautiful Joe has been a constant runner up. A very sturdy, stocky dog. Again another Moydrum dog.

Many will be sorry to hear about the death of Dr. Allan Secord's outstanding female, Sally's Spunky, which suddenly died this summer. This pup is out of

that famous champion Sally of Moydrum, another outstanding Temple dog. I understand also that while Dr. Temple has not brought to light a little female by Sea King out of Pamela, that she is a very outstanding bitch and will go a long way both in the field and bench.

Again I mention Army Armstrong's Specs, which is very much available for stud services for any one interested in a real field dog. This dog is very sturdy and steady, and has sired many good pups, some of which are performing both on the bench and in the field with the best of results.

I also am pleased to say that Joe Cassolato of Guelph, whom I stated in my last article had given up has not done so. Joe' who has suffered a relapse in health, has reserved two fine females to start up his kennel as soon as he is released from hospital. Joe is progressing favorably and I myself will take a great pleasure in trying to beat him when he comes back into circulation.

I also go on to mention another very outstanding female, Champion Nancolleth Sparkle of Moydrum, that has accounted for a lot of good field work and has many times been placed in the group. This female has produced, like her sister, Champion Sally of Moydrum, some very fine puppies and the strain has carried pretty much everything along with it. We regret the loss of Sparkler this last spring, but fortunately

have retained two very fine females out of Sparkler.

The dog Alphonse is gradually being put back in shape to enter the fall circuit to complete his championship, of which he has several points. He is bigger and better than ever and on his return will certainly have many of the judges stalled.

I now go on to mention A. Folt, who has purchased, in Vancouver, Huntingdon Stylish Mac, that outstanding Western dog that was brought to Vancouver from the States and will start again in Ontario at the Brampton show this present month. Mac is a very sound, flashy and stylish dog. He is three years old and well worthy of being closely watched. He is now residing at High-cliff Kennels, where he is undergoing field training and will be shown on to his championship. Mac has many wins to his credit in Western Canada and also will be a big addition to the new blood lines in Central Canada.

This pretty well answers the question in Pointers will a show dog hunt? As many outstanding dogs in the field have also won on the bench.

I now go on to mention a show dog in our English Setter. If our judges find a dog short on feather, they are not like their sporting brothers, the Pointer, who does not have that long flowing tail, or like feather. After a Setter goes through the paces of being trained and

is put down as a working dog, you cannot have his feather up to that of a dog that has never been allowed to run, as the brush, fences, etc., will tear all of this feathering away.

I go on to mention George Obenhack's dog, The Earl of Rumshire, also Lady of My Ra of Rumshire. This litter brother and sister have been placing Winners Dog and Winners Female for several shows this spring. I trust that these dogs will be worked in the field as well as show.

Also I go on to mention Fred Rife's Lady Cinderella. This very fine little female has had her share of winning this year and should complete her championship. I also hope that Mr. Rife will run this dog into the field to be trained on birds. An absentee from the shows this year has been our old friend Fred Archambault, who has travelled hundreds of miles in past years to show his dogs. Mr. Arnambault has purchased many dogs from the States, mostly from the Blue Bar Kennels, and has passed the test of being a real sportsman in showing.

One dog I mention needed one more point to make him International Champion and this dog was placed Reserve Winners on eleven occasions to inferior

dogs, all of Ontario. Finally, under a strange judge that new nothing of the dog, his first comeback was to complete himself as an International champion and take a group falling right back at the next show to take second in the group. This also is history in putting a dog through.

I also would like to mention some very outstanding 16-month-old pups owned by Bethune Smith, sired by Pal of Maridor, out of Alpha of Maridor. These pups are very promising and will make their appearance in the fall shows of this year. They are at present under the able care of Capt. Dudley Waters, M.C. Capt. Waters is putting these grand puppies into top shape. Something very big should be looked for from some of these pups. Mr. Smith also has a younger litter of just a few weeks, sired by the same parents. This will also be something to come back with when the older pups have finished their championship.

Trusting that these notes will be of value to many of our Setter breeders and hoping that this will bring to light that there are shows being held and that the Pointer and Setter breeders are not bringing their dogs out; come along and make our interests general and bring your pups along!

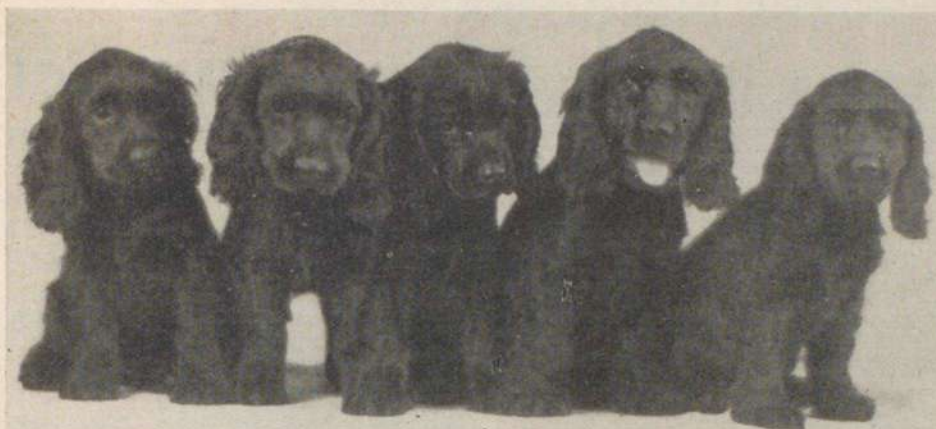

Developing the Dual Purpose English Setter

This has been the dream of every breeder of Setters. There always have been show dogs that were good in the field and, once in a while, a field dog that would win on the bench. Most breeders are, however, convinced that it is only by the most careful selective breeding, that puppies will be born that will consistently have both field and bench prospects. This has been a difficult task and few breeders have reached this objective. Outstanding among these are the late Dr. Daw, Victoria, B.C., with Dave Johnson, Calgary, Alta, with Davina, crossed with

stock of D. F. L. Rife, Toronto, Ont., Fairglens Kennels, the writer with both the above crossed with Trevallen, and James Catty and Mrs. Joan Detmold, with the Spruce Kennel strains.

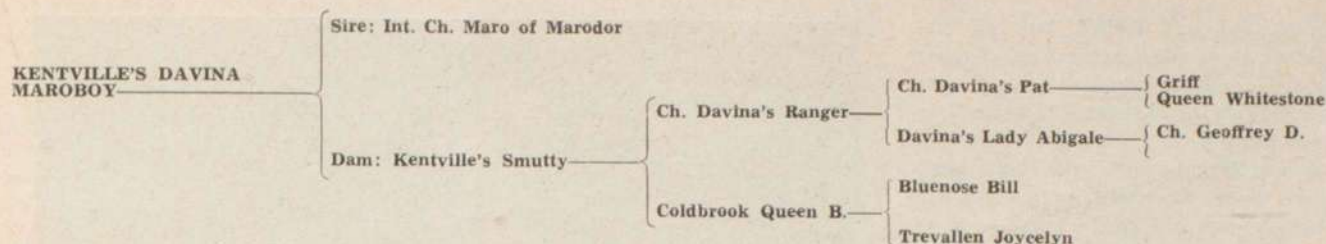
I have been informed that Dr. Daw spent \$25,000 in a period of fifteen years developing dual purpose setters. All breeds are not able to indulge in this hobby in such an expensive way, but fortunately, they have been able to benefit by the work of Dr. Daw and other breeders. In order to reach his objective, Dr. Daw selected a bitch pup, sired by one of the greatest dogs of all time, viz., Int. Ch. Rackett's Rummey, and bred it to Mallwyd Monarch which

he imported from England. From this mating came the D. strain of English Setters. The writer purchased a dog from the Daw estate which developed into a perfect working dog and which would have won its championship easily. Unfortunately this dog was shot by a man who did not appreciate the value of good dogs. In all the three years I owned this dog, I could find no fault in him. He was the kind of a dog a sportsman is lucky to own once in his lifetime. In endeavouring to replace this dog, I discovered that Dave Johnson had acquired a litter sister which he had bred to his Ch. Davina's Pat, a descendant of Count Whitestone, field trial winner himself, and one of the greatest producers of field-trial winners. This mating produced one of the most outstanding litters of English Setters ever whelped. All are either champions or near champions and great field dogs. One of these won the Novice Field and was runner up to his Grand-sire, Ch. Geoffrey D, in the Field Trial Sweepstakes held this year in Victoria, B.C. The writer was fortunate in getting Ch. Davina's Ranger from this litter. It was with great difficulty he was finally taught to range close in our woodcock covers, but he is a wonderful worker today. I am sure that many breeders or owners of setters will find the following pedigree of much interest and that some of their dogs have descended from some of this great strain of English Setters.

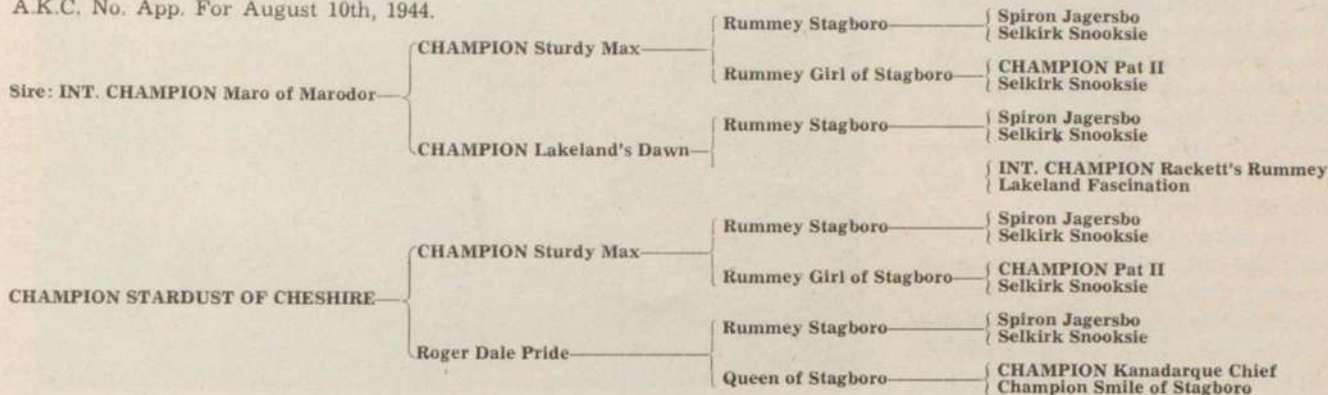
I connected this bloodline with Trevallen strain, which has been produced by those two grand old sportsmen, the Lloyd Bros., of Greenlawn, Alta., who are noted for their fine bird dogs. This mating produced my personal shooting bitch, Kentville's Smutty, a fine built,



Patsy Webster with "KENTVILLE SMUTTY", Halifax Kennel Sanction Show.



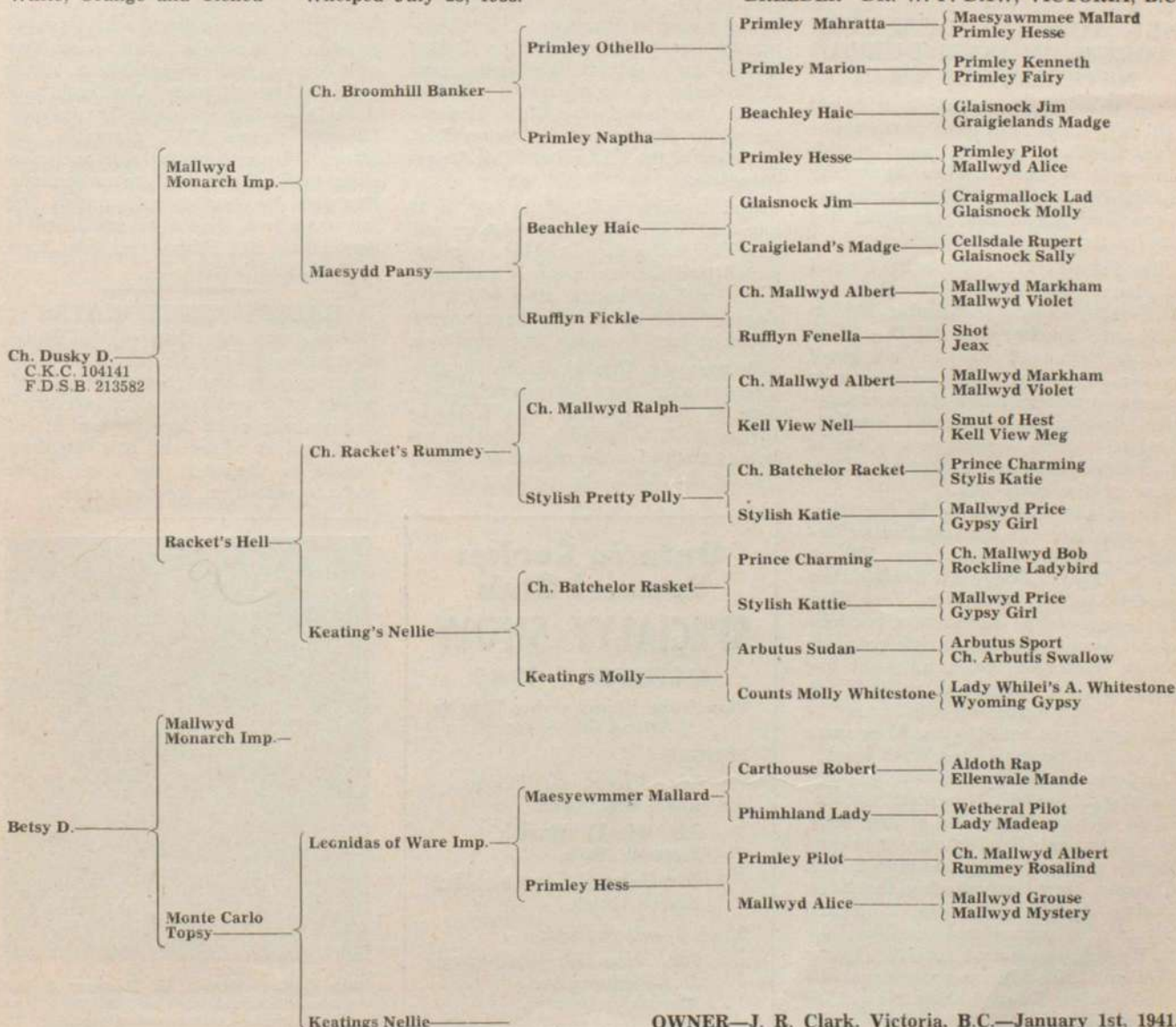
Copy of Pedigree English Setter Bitch

strong and well ribbed, but still not perfect show-type, not enough feather being one of her greatest faults. After much study of bloodlines, I decided to send Smutty to be bred by Int. Ch. Maro of Maridor and from this mating there were whelped eleven beautiful puppies, everyone good enough to compete in Madison Square Garden. They were in fact the most symmetrical puppies I have yet seen. I selected an Orange Belton which has already made some points and which can, I believe, be made into a fast wide ranger for field trials, or to range close in thick cover. In fact, from all appearances, it will be natural for this dog to work this way as his dam does.

The writer purchased a bitch pup from this litter with the intention of breeding it to Maroboy. However, the writer is now convinced that this new stud-dog, when used for stud with the right bitch, will produce puppies that will be developed into one hundred per cent dual purpose dogs.

NEW YORK TO HAVE OPEN FORUM ON DOGS DURING NATIONAL DOG WEEK

An Open Forum which it is hoped will help smooth out some of the problems troubling the dog fancy at this time will be held in New York City during National Dog Week as the inaugural activity of the Professional Dog Judges Association, it is announced.

The Forum will be held in the Crystal Garden of the Ritz-Carlton Hotel on Wednesday evening, September 19th, at 7.30 p.m. Another National Dog Week feature, "Canine Cavalcade", a pageant of the dog breeds which will seek to present a good specimen of every recognized breed of dog in America, is scheduled to be held in the Lower Plaza of Rockefeller Center at 2.30 on the afternoon of the same day.

As an added service to the dog fancy in connection with the forthcoming National Dog Week—September 16th to 22nd—National Dog Week headquarters at 424 Madison Ave., New York City, have arranged to distribute a portfolio of six sporting pictures in full color, by Edwin Megargee, America's great dog artist, entitled "Gun Dogs at Work". A copy of the Megargee portfolio may be had by anyone contributing \$5 or more to the 1945 National Dog Week fund.

Subject of the Forum will be "The Judging Situation". Speakers will include George Foley, as a dog show superintendent; Paul Palmer, representing the smaller breeder-exhibitors; Mrs. Sherman Hoyt, representing the large, active breeder-exhibitors; Leonard Brumby, as professional handler; John P. Wagner, as amateur specialist judge; William L. Kendrick, as professional all-breed judge; Edward Dana Knight, as breeder, judge and AKC director; W.

Ross Proctor, as chairman of the Westminster bench show committee; Roland Kilbon, as a veteran dog writer, and H. D. Bixby, as executive vice president of the American Kennel Club. Moderator of the Forum will be Anton Rost, president of the Professional Dog Judges Association.

Each speaker will be limited to 10 minutes. When the guest speakers will have concluded, there will be a question period in which the speakers and moderator will participate, after which the meeting will be thrown open to the audience for discussion and questions.

Because the Crystal Garden accommodates only about 250 people, admission to the Open Forum will be by invitation, it is stated. Invitations are being extended to the officers and directors of the AKC, the members of the

Dog Writers Association, the Professional Handlers Association and committee members as well as exhibitors taking part in the "Canine Cavalcade" at Rockefeller Center earlier in the day. Licensed judges, AKC delegates, and officers of show-giving and specialty clubs will also be given preference. CANADIAN DOG TRAINING

When the Canadian Dog Training Club was organized, it appeared that here was just another dog club with a new fangled idea. Clubs come and go in the years, but it is doubtful if any club has enjoyed such prosperity in such a short time. The work has accumulated to such an extent that Walter Flink, the secretary-treasurer, has found it impossible to give the time needed, and much to the regret of the membership, has withdrawn for a while. The war may be over for some people but Mr. Flink is in the Pullman department where accommodation must be found for the thousands of boys returning from overseas. A large job in itself and we are grateful for all that Mr. Flink has done to further the work for the returned boys and for our club.

In addition to training dogs in obedience work, the club is also training dogs for the show ring. One of the tests called for in Novice A, is that the dog must while following at heel, halt on command, stand in position while the handler walks forward a distance of fifteen feet. The judge then walks up and examines the dog, which must not show nervousness or shyness. At the command from the judge, the handler calls the dog who proceeds to finish the exercise at heel. This is invaluable for training dogs in ring deportment, for the day will come, when a rebellious dog will be excluded from the show ring.

This work is still in the early stages; if it were possible to secure accommodation for the dogs, the members of the club, who are experienced in the work, would gladly give their services towards training the dogs and securing pets for our battle weary soldiers. Ideas along this line will be welcomed from the readers of *Dogs In Canada*.

All work and no play is not good for any association so on Sunday, July 22nd the members of the club enjoyed a picnic at the home of Mrs. Donald Hamilton, of the Kincaid Kennels at Aurora. The regular classes were held in the afternoon, with a supper at night. As a result another picnic is scheduled, this time at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Spratt on the York Mills Road. The Spratt family have a Great Dane which bids fair to top the classes at the fall shows in obedience work.

Members who intend exhibiting their dog's prowess at the Fall shows are reminded that time is getting short for training in an outdoor park. The classes at Acorn Park will finish with a Specialty show when all dogs trained this year will compete for a grand trophy, the highest rating on the day to count.

The Army Air Forces Convalescent Hospital at Pawling, N.Y., is encouraging patients to acquire and care for a dog of their own to hasten their recovery. In August, 1944, one of the patients had become so apathetic he was given a puppy in the hope that it might revive his interest in life. As a result, the man was discharged in four months, instead of ten months which had been estimated by the physicians. Consequently, the staff and the patients realized the convalescent value of such companionship, and requests were made for some three hundred and twenty-five dogs. The A.S.P.C.A. responded with the result that every patient now has a dog.

Canada is very apathetic towards dogs as a useful part of its work. The countries at war have found dogs to be a definite necessity and thousands of lives have been saved by the members of the Canine Corp in the Pacific, and the Canine Corp in Europe which were trained to locate mines. Cecil Radford and the R.C.M.P. have trained dogs to find lost children, and to trail escaping prisoners of war. The German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada, and the Ladies Kennel Club of Canada, have purchased dogs as leaders for the blind. The Government and the Canadian Institute for the Blind have yet to be convinced that a dog is worthy of attention in rehabilitation.

All dogs training now will be ready for the "Companion Dog" and the "Companion Dog Excellent" titles this year. Clubs from coast to coast who wish to add the Obedience Training to their curricula, are invited to write us for rules and methods. Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, has an enthusiastic group headed by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Orge, who are training in obedience work. ALBERTA NOTES

By H. P. Saunders

Alberta points with pride to the marvellous introduction and success of the Hungarian Grey Partridge, which now has spread all over Canada in countless numbers.

Years ago considerable money was spent to introduce Hungarian Partridges to the Western Hemisphere. Strangely enough all attempts failed, even in the Eastern States, over a period of one hundred years. The birds bred well in captivity and when planted out in colonies did well for one year, then decreased, until the third year they absolutely disappeared. Many attempts were in the State of Pennsylvania, the state which has shown itself quite capable of supporting any feathered or furred game which could be raised in Western Canada. However, the Pennsylvania experiments were not better than the New England States, or in fact the middle Western States.

Some thirty-five years ago a small body of sportsmen living in Calgary, amongst whom was Fred Green, Austin DeB. Wintner, K.C., and E. D. Adams, purchased fifteen pairs of birds to be imported through Wenz and Mackenzen, dealers in Yardley, Pennsylvania. This, then, was the start of the importations of Hungarian Partridge. They were fortunate in getting healthy stock and a succession of good breeding seasons. Good judgment was used in the distribution, for out of the experiment emerged the outstanding success of the introduction of Hungarian Partridge, transcending all other efforts throughout the whole North American continent, and in many cases the numbers brought into a single state ran into thousands.

Fred Green had been in communication with a well known American sportsman, Colonel Mershon, and he had studied the habits of these birds. Austin De B. Winter received his early education in England and he, like his noble sire, the late Judge Winter, made a careful study of all game birds. He was pleased to convey all the information he possessed about the Hungarian Partridge, especially did he inform the others of the characteristics possessed by these game birds. Their preference is the open prairie regions, where there is a limited amount of cover for their protection. Another characteristic was that the entire covey, when approached, raise as one bird. He especially emphasized that nothing created a greater thrill than to have an entire covey break from under one's feet and the fast flight of the bird demands that the hunter's eyesight and shooting ability be away above average. Another quality as stressed by Mr. Winter was the fact that

E. D. Adams, one of Western Canada's best known sportsmen, took a very active interest in the importation of these birds. He always possessed one of the very best retrievers. Curly coats were his favorites. He knew just where the most suitable grounds were to liberate the birds and he gave his time, talent and money to assist.

This combination contacted Dan Patton, one of the greatest naturalists of all time, and the first birds were liberated near Dan's home. This was a wise move, for under the careful eye of Dan no one was allowed to molest them and they began right away to pair up and nest. Never were birds so prolific, for in a short time they began to spread and multiply. The birds bred well, like most of the partridge family. It is not unusual to find a hen bird with twelve to sixteen young, and these birds seem to be able to shift for themselves from birth.

No where in the world is there better shooting than in the eastern part of the Province of Alberta, but Hungarians can be counted in hundreds of thousands in Saskatchewan, and even to Manitoba and, in fact, the northern parts of Montana. These birds are all descendants of

the original bunch brought to Alberta by the good sports named above. So, brother, when you drop a Hun, thank your lucky stars that there are such men as Fred Green, E. D. Adams and Austin De B. Winter. The Hungarian is small, considerably smaller than the native Canadian Partridge; in fact there is little, if any, resemblance in the Hungarian to the native North American Partridge. The Hungarian is more compact. His neck is short and his head and build somewhat resemble that of a pigeon. His feet and legs are bare. Nature did not provide the excellent leggings which she put on the prairie chicken and grouse, both ruffled and native. His tail is considerably shorter than that of the Canadian Partridge and has rufous bars against a grey background. His breast and neck are grey and his wings and upper body a mixture of grey and brown. The game departments of the three western provinces co-operated splendidly with the sportsmen in the way of closed seasons and game preservation.

Pointers and Setters are really the answer to what it takes to obtain your bag limit of Hungarian Partridge.

In Alberta we have a number of very enthusiastic hunters who take their

wives and daughters with them on shooting trips. Have a look at this picture of the good looking treasurer of the Alberta Kennel Club as she shows you just what her English Setter can do in the field. Miss Davina Johnson can show, break and hunt with a Setter just a little bit better than most people.

Now for a little dog news from Alberta.
