



The colored cover painting of Int. Ch. Rudiki of Prides Hill, which is by one of America's leading dog artists, shows the beautiful long slender skull and heavy topknot which is such a feature of the dog.

Int. Ch. Rudiki has done for Afghans in Canada and America what his grand-sire, Ch. Sirdar of Ghanzi, did for the breed in England, and, in leading breeders' opinion, equals his greatest forebear. Rudiki's children and grandchildren, now winning, are carrying on the beautiful type and finely-chiselled head which are a legacy from Ch. Sirdar and a strong point in their favor. The great dog himself is too well known to need describing; the picture speaks for itself and his record, second to none in the world, show him the greatest producing and winning Afghan of all time.

Rudiki can well lay claim to being America's greatest producing Afghan, for his children and grandchildren are also Best-in-Show winners. Ch. Ali Khyber, Int.-Ch. Rudika of Blakeen, Ch. Asri Havid of Five-Mile, Ch. Yenghiz Khan of Five-Mile, are but a few of his Best-in-Show offsprings. Ch. Zumurrud of Five Mile, Ch. Khanhasset Kush of Five Mile, Ch. El Mio Zabu of Five Mile, Ch. Bradwood Shahjehan, Ch. Maharanee Kohibaba, are but a few of his Group Winning children and grandchildren. Many of his get are just beginning show careers, some are being exported to England, Belgium, France, Mexico and two to Africa.

A study of Five Mile Kennels' pedigrees is interesting and encompasses practically every great dog in Afghan history. Suffice it to say that the high points in Afghans produced through their Ghanzi-Ainsdart-Five Mile Kennel strain are: long slender elegant heads, strong sound powerful bodies, correct temperament, great showmanship and courage, tremendous coat, and true wild Afghan expression, good tail and neck carriage.

Afghans kept at Five Mile Kennels fluctuate. At present there have been thirteen litters during the 1945 Summer and Fall, sired by their famous studs, including Int. Ch. Rudiki and Int. Ch. Rana of Chaman (imported from Scotland). There are some fifteen youngsters, six or eight now six months old, ten or twelve grown show dogs in the Kennels at present. Extensive advertising in India and England this Fall (for which an extensive breeding program was carried out during 1945) have brought inquiries and orders from all over the world, with many fine Afghans being sold throughout the United States and Canada.

Reserved for the Florsheim's own show purposes have been some six top show dogs sired by Int. Ch. Rana of Chaman, and Int. Ch. Rudiki of Prides Hill.

WINS TITLE THE HARD WAY

Due to geographical circumstances the Pomeranian Champion Melbourne Blazing Glory, whose smiling countenance appears in this Christmas issue, traversed something over 10,000 miles in quest of his coveted title.

Purchased by Mr. K. A. Ross of the Keneva Kennels at the Lakehead, from the Fairbank Kennels of Toronto, this little dog competed in all breed point shows from Edmonton in the West to Quebec City in the East, completing his championship at the Calgary Show in September of this year, after a triumphant appearance at several of the other Western shows.

The old adage, "A prophet is not without honor save in his own country", could be applied to this little dog, inasmuch as he won his points away from home, having been defeated consistently by his kennel mates at the Lakehead Shows. He was handled in the East by Mr. Paddy Boughs, and in the West by Mr. George Kynoch of Winnipeg and Mrs. Pat Randall of Saskatoon, the last named having had the distinction of handling him in his last three shows when he completed his title.


Since coming to the Keneva Kennels this little dog made three trips over the Western circuit and the same number of trips to the East. He appeared in London before coming to Mr. Ross, where he acquired his first point.

Incidentally, Ch. Melbourne Blazing Glory has proven himself to be a sire of puppies better than average quality, possibly his most outstanding achievement being Mrs. McConaghy's sensational young dog Fairbank Destiny.

We are extremely fortunate in having a poem composed specially for our Christmas number by Mrs. Marjorie Freeman Campbell of Hamilton.

Mrs. Campbell is a daughter of John A. Freeman, B.A., one-time principal of the Waterdown High School. Her mother's name was Caroline M. White-side. Mrs. Campbell springs from United Empire Loyalist stock.

Marjorie Freeman Campbell readily produces both prose and poetry of fine quality. She is President of the Canadian Author's Association, Hamilton and District Branch, and has been the winner of many prizes.

Mrs. Campbell suffered the loss of a son in the war, Flying Officer William Freeman Campbell, killed at Gelati, Mamertini, Italy.

A book of her poems will shortly be published. The *Hamilton Spectator* has been running a series of her compositions. The editor of the *Spectator* mentions a short, inspiring message from a poem called "Reaching Up":

"If life has dashed you to your knees,
Remember this:
On bended knee prayer springs
With greater ease
More humbleness.
Reach up—and you will find the
black void spanned by
God's strong hand!"

Mrs. Campbell composed "Item: Dog" for *Dogs In Canada* in order to carry out a Christmas idea which was placed before her by the Editor.

The illustration of Mrs. Campbell's idea has been made by Mr. Adrian Dingle, an artist well known for his portrait painting and landscape work.

Mr. Dingle was born in Cornwall, England, but has lived in Canada since early childhood. He studied Art in London under the great artists John Mansbridge and James Bateman, R.A., and exhibited at the London Portrait Society. Mr. Dingle was on the art staff of a London advertising firm for a time. On his return to Canada he painted many of Toronto's outstanding citizens, among them Dr. Healy Willan, Dr. John L. Inkster, Monseigneur Treacy, Retiring Principal Clark of Jarvis Collegiate, and Mrs. Archibald Huestis, Chairmen of the Board of Women's College Hospital.

He exhibits at the Royal Canadian Academy and Ontario Society of Artists in their annual shows. His work was recognized in France before the war. "La Revue Moderne" of Paris mentioned him as "a portrait painter of high degree, possessing modern inspiration and keen penetrating observation, coupled with the dexterous handling of his medium in both the character and accessories of his subjects".

DOGS AND HOW TO DRAW THEM, by Amy Hogeboom; Price \$1.25.

This book should be good for either children or grown-ups, who are learning to draw. This artist goes to work like an architect and shows how the fundamental structure should be started.

MY DOG LEMON, by Ray P. Holland; Price \$2.00.

This book by former editor-in-chief of *Field and Stream* tells the story of Lemon a dog, in appearance the answer to every hunter's prayer, but lacking a vital requisite—his scenting ability was non-existent. How he won the most coveted championship in dogdom, The National Field Trial at Grand Junction makes a very interesting tale.

DAVID'S NEW WORLD, by Vernon Stokes and Cynthia Harnett; Price \$2.00.

An interesting story about a little town boy who inherited a country place and grows to love the fields, woods and streams and is initiated into the sport of hunting.

POTLUCK, by Roland Clark; Price \$4.00.

The author, gifted with pen and brush alike, has created a book that will be of interest to hunters who have watched the first streak of light steal silently across a marsh or who have waited eagerly for a drifting flock of ducks to turn in their direction. His colorful scenes of marsh and wildfowl hold honored places. There are few hunter's homes that do not contain some of them.

HOW TO TRAIN HUNTING DOGS, by William F. Brown; Price \$3.50.

In this new book, the author, regarded as an authority on field trials, presents the fundamentals of training dogs. Each recognized breed is treated individually, but general discussion is given to training of any dog. To the sportsman there is something more in the companionship of a real dog when he knows he has trained the dog himself. There are many illustrations and shots of dogs in action.

Although war is an evil thing, the conditions arising from it often produce or develop a country's potential resources in many unexpected ways. Better proof of this has, probably, been given during the struggle just passed than ever before, especially in those countries concerned in a life and death contention.

Many owners in Canada, Britain, and the United States were proud to boast, "My dog has gone to war!"

The co-operation of dogs after a short period of training has been recognized for many years in countries where dog-work has been brought to a very high standard, and even become part of a permanent State organization.

During the First World War, dogs were trained in Britain on a fairly small scale for army and Red Cross purposes but, although they made somewhat of a name for themselves as they proved satisfactory and of value, the authorities did not continue the canine side of army work as a permanent and official force. Fortunately, a few of the keen and expert individuals interested in this type of service kept up their training and trials privately, and with the outbreak of the last war their insight came to the fore, proving that their time and enthusiasm had not been spent in vain.

These spirited experts who fully realized the value of dogs in war, and understood the various branches of training, eventually convinced the authorities that the matter was worthwhile supporting. Although at the beginning the only trained dogs available belonged to these few keen and expert enthusiasts, other dogs were soon recruited from all over North America and Britain and put into training.

Considering the handicap of "starting from scratch", progress was extremely good, and dogs were used for many

purposes, both offensive and defensive, not only in England itself, but wherever the Allied Armies were operating.

* * *

Dogs and the British Red Cross

During the Battle of Britain trained dogs proved of valuable assistance to find the unfortunate victims of bomb damage, buried sometimes under masses of bricks and debris, but still alive, and many people have been saved in this way. This is something their handlers often could not do, and so as a result of the dog's highly developed sense of smell and their extensive training, not only were lives saved, but also much

"My Dog Has Gone To War"

time and effort, both so necessary to rescue work.

These dogs, working as teams or as individuals in close co-operation with the British Red Cross, were trained for specialist jobs. This training also applied to their handlers. Dog and handler have to be trained together in order to produce the full benefits of close co-operation and understanding. The handler not only works with his dog, but is responsible for him in every way, food, health, exercise, cleanliness, and so on.

As the Allied armies moved into Europe the "war dogs" worked along with them right up to the battle-front. Many tanks in the Armoured Corps had their own mascots. Specially selected dogs were trained to make parachute jumps and moved in "from the air" with the parachute battalions. Dogs were

trained to carry messages from one centre to another, many of these messages being of the utmost secrecy, concerning troop movements, attack information, etc.

Lives of many wounded soldiers were saved as a result of messages delivered from them to the Red Cross first aid and medical stations, as, seemingly, the dogs knew the pouches which they wore on their collars were a matter of life and death.

The canine contingents played their part efficiently whenever they were called upon, and many dog-lovers hope that this valuable addition to the armed and police forces will someday be established on a really permanent and official footing. The work of the expert dog in peace as well as war cannot be over-rated, and in the years ahead we will, no doubt, have every opportunity for proving the fact.

* * *

Dogs on Guard and Patrol Duty

In the early days of the war it was an urgent matter to obtain and train teams of dogs as quickly as possible. War factories, ammunition dumps, secret stores, aerodromes, and experimental buildings were springing up all over the Allied Countries. The most notable contribution of dogs was made in England where the possibilities of invasion—from air as well as sea—were far from remote. These vital centres had to be safeguarded in every possible way.

As soon as the authorities realized the value of dogs for certain work, they called on the general public for a loan of suitable material. With the advent of rationing many people were wondering how to feed and care for their larger pets and so welcomed a solution that not only ensured a future for their dog, but also a practical contribution towards the protection of the country. Expert trainers were called upon and the movement was soon well under way.

Dogs highly trained in guard and patrol work certainly proved their worth. They were trained to discover undesirable trespassers, and pursue and attack them on command.

In railway yards and seaports watch-dogs are an invaluable asset in guard work. Their sense of smell, highly trained and developed, can pick up the scent of any suspicious person at great distances, and no matter how well the suspect may try to conceal himself, the dog will find him out.

As efficient and observant as a sentry may be, he cannot follow after or fire on a suspected criminal if the night is so dark he cannot see. But no trespasser, however fast and cunning, can escape the attentions of a trained guard-dog whose ears and nose are helped, rather than hindered by the blackest night.

Dogs also have proven of untold value in escorting arrested persons. If the human guardian is not able to run as fast as the escaping prisoner, his canine partner can overtake the swiftest runner, even in dense woods or winding

streets, and hold him to the ground until help comes.

* * *

Army Dogs Being Demobbed

At the outbreak of war great strides had been taken in the training and use of war-dogs in Britain, and, after America entered the war, the American Army authorities soon realized the value of this work, taking over many trained British dogs and sending their men to be instructed in the handling of them for patrol and other purposes.

Thousands of dogs throughout America were recruited for service with the Army, but all these dogs were sent to the Pacific theatre of war. The Americans used many dogs in France and Germany, but nearly all of these were loaned by British civilians. Now these dogs are being sent back to their owners.

The big American training school for dogs was Camp G23, outside Cheltenham, England.

Part of the dog's training was to become suspicious of a person standing perfectly still. They had also to be on guard against such things as ticking clocks and things buried in the ground.

Now that their war service is ended and they are being returned to civilian life, the training camp at Cheltenham is being used for retraining; where they were once taught to be war dogs, they are now being taught to NOT be war dogs.

After this new training course a person standing still will not arouse suspicion, and the house clock will not be mistaken for a mine, and the garden will not be dug up by the animal when it returns home.

One main difficulty to overcome is the affection between the dogs and the men who have handled them; they have become so attached to each other that both men and dogs are loth to part now that the time for demobbing has come. In some cases, since the dogs were only on loan, the men have bought the pets. In others the owners have presented the dogs to their new masters.

When we see a party of Americans sailing for home it is quite usual to see some of the dogs going back with them.

Recently at a show in Chelsea, England, many dog heroes took their last bow before settling down to a humdrum civilian existence. The show was given


in aid of the People's Dispensary for Sick Animals and the Allied Forces Animals' War Memorial. Gathered together were many dogs with grand war service records.

Among these was Rob, sheep dog hero of twenty parachute jumps and partner in some of the most dramatic and dangerous work behind enemy lines.

Rob was lent by a Shropshire farmer, Mr. E. Bain, to an infantry regiment as a messenger, and was soon sporting a row of decorations for service in France, Germany, Italy and North Africa, in addition to a canine V.C.

He was later attached to a special unit which dropped by parachute in enemy-occupied territory for sabotage work. Rob became an expert, leaping from the plane without a qualm. He kept guard for his unit, never betraying their location by so much as a whimper, but silently approaching and licking the men's faces when there was danger. Only quarantine cheated Rob of participating in D-Day operations.

Undoubtedly Rob, as well as many other canine heroes, saved many lives, and dog owners may well be proud of the part played in war service by their pets during the past five years.

Twenty-eight active Canadian members have been written upon the roll and three honorary memberships—two of them to service men—granted. Two, occasionally three, pages of the well known, popular bulletin, *Dane Dribble*, are needed to cover the news made by Canadians in the show ring and in their kennels. An article written by Mrs. D. T. Weir, York Mills, Ontario, on the "Big Versus Small" breeder is felt by many to be the best thing of its kind ever done and, in a lighter vein, Canadian member Lorna Jackson's "Cyril" is being commented upon by Great Dane breeders across the continent.

One meeting of the Club has been held in Canada, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hopkins, Unionville, and it has been decided to make this an annual event.

The Dane puppy presented to the Club for its lucky draw was given by Canadian members—Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Eakins of West Hill. Ticket books were circulated only among members and the puppy was won by the Stevens, Rochester, N.Y. Part of the funds thereby raised are to be used for trophies at Canadian shows.

Mrs. D. T. Weir was chosen to judge at the Member Match held in the foothills of the Pennsylvania mountains last spring. This match, and the most important meetings, have been well attended by Canadian breeders.

Great Danes owned by Club members have been benched at all Ontario shows this year and nowhere was the influence

of the organization so strongly felt as at the Niagara Frontier Kennel Club's Port Colborne Show, September 29th. Of twenty entries sixteen were benched to compete for the sterling trophies offered by the Great Dane Club and its popular president, Bill Gaertner, and for the nine other prizes donated by Canadian and American members.

Three Club dogs finished for their championship in 1945. Fingard's Odin, bred and owned by David Fingard, Toronto; Tawney of Tyldesley, bred by D. T. and Mrs. Weir, owned by John Ferguson, York Mills; and Fingard's King (subject to C.K.C. confirmation), bred by David Fingard, owned by Wally Cutts, Niagara Falls, Ontario.

Seven puppies bred in five different kennels here have been exported to Club members in the United States during the year just passed. These ambassadors augur much that is good for the future of bloodlines established, or being established, in Canada.

Weekends spent by American breeders in the homes of their counterparts here, and visa versa, were informal highlights throughout the show season. The resultant exchange of ideas, opinions and stock promise a splendid future for Great Danes in both countries and certainly cannot help but influence our "good neighbor" policy through the widening circles made by all such stones cast on the clear waters of friendship—particularly friendship having the sound basis of mutual interest and combined endeavor.

HUMANS BENEFIT MENTALLY BY OWNING DOGS

(Editorial)

Many types of mental trouble are treated by simply devising ways and means of taking the patient's mind off himself. He is urged to engage himself in work or play and to interest himself in something besides his own worries, real or imaginary.

A large amount of mental illness arises out of fear, grief, loneliness, inferiority complexes, repressions and just plain selfishness. Almost all persons are prey to some of these emotions at some time or other. The way to serious illness is to give way to the emotions and refuse to see their cause. This course leads to expensive medical treatment. The way to mental health is to recognize the tendencies of the mind to turn inward and to resolve to fight them by seeking an antidote in the form of a responsibility to be undertaken or some absorbing interest in something outside of ourselves.

What can the dog do to help you? He can accomplish marvels! To begin with, a dog is very satisfying to the ego. He

does not measure you by your success or failure. You can be shabby as a tramp but still look wonderful to him. He does not repress his feelings either and, in his enthusiastic presence you also can let yourself go in expressing your affection, certain that your dog will not turn coldly away.

Your dog needs you. You have many little duties to perform for him. His very life and happiness hang upon your ministrations. You are God's special agent as far as he is concerned.

In your loneliness or in your grief you need your dog too. Your dog will not fail you. In some strange way animals sense your moments of despair and sorrow and they cuddle closer, anxious to console.

Dogs have humor and playfulness to drag you out of your "nervous tension". A wildly boisterous and happy little pup uttering his joyful puppy barks will revive the "little boy" who is deep in the heart of the tired business man.

Dogs have qualities from which humans can learn much. What sweet paternal and maternal care they give their wee pups! What adoring love the pups give in return! Children benefit by

the sight of this interchange of protective and loving emotions. They learn gentleness to the weak and helplessness.

Dogs accustom their observers to the ideas of birth, life and death and to the normality of these processes. They have a dignity and decency which might sometimes put humans to shame.

Shy persons gain much through the ownership of a dog. Friendships are struck through mutual interest. The dog gives you a clue to the nature of the person you meet. Dogs are hard to deceive and their uncanny instinct enables them to distinguish between the false and the true, thus guiding to sympathetic and real friendships.

Your dog will serve you by his work. He protects your flocks and your property. He would lay down his life to save you from harm. Even the veriest toy dog will hurl his defiant barks at an intruder.

In short, your dog can accomplish miracles toward the healthy development of your mind and character. For these reasons, the dog, from time immemorial, has been rightly known as "Man's Best Friend".

To all C.K.C. MEMBERS—

A nice letter from Mrs. F. C. Waddell of Victoria, who has had Brussels Griffons for the past fifteen years, tells that she has acquired a miniature smooth female from the U.S.A. in 1942—"La Petite Follette". She has also recently acquired some breeding stock from the Pekin Sun Kennels, Nanaimo, Ontario,

and is shortly expecting a fine specimen of a miniature smooth dog from the same kennels for stud purposes. At the time of writing, we believe Mrs. Waddell has the largest kennel of Griffons on the Pacific Coast. The Victoria City Kennel Club Show on October 10th was a great success both as to entry and gate. Mrs. Clarke, the Secretary, is to be commended for her fine show. Awards are elsewhere in the magazine.

A Review of 1945

By W. H. PYM

1945 will be a year for remembrance and rejoicing, and the year 1946 could usher in a new era for dog shows and dogdom in general provided legitimate dog owners act on sound principles in their respective communities.

Great credit is due those who carried on their breeding activities during the war period and it is safe to say that the active breeders in Canada are now in a position to supply foundation stock for those at home and abroad who were obliged to discontinue their breeding operations on account of the war.

During the past year there has been greater activity in dog shows and field trials. Several new clubs have been organized to augment the old reliable show giving clubs, all to the end that greater interest has been aroused in canine affairs throughout the country.

During the years of World War II, many thousands of dollars have been raised and properly distributed to worthy causes. This is but a repetition of the history of the war years of 1914-18. Generally speaking, the promoters of these charitable affairs have worked under great handicaps. The majority were forced to hold their shows in any available building regardless of its suitability for dog shows. But the time has now arrived when we should insist upon a square deal for dogs and dog shows.

During the years of World War I, we were content to hold shows under adverse conditions. Unfortunately this became a habit in some communities and for the past twenty-seven years we have seen shows that have failed to approach the 1914 standard in the same communities. That is not progress.

Dog shows in Canada will never reach their proper status until they are held in attractive buildings in suitable locations. Every dog exhibitor must understand

that the day is long since past when the public streets can be used for exercising grounds between judging periods. Proper sanitary arrangements must be contained within the show building regardless of who might like it or dislike it. Then, and then only can executives approach owners of fine buildings with a guarantee that their property will not be depreciated by the holding of a dog show therein.

It is an established fact that where dog shows have been held under favorable conditions the general public has supported such ventures. Patrons have attended for the entertainment provided, and many have left such a show as owners of pure bred dogs for the first time in their lives.

At this very moment the great service rendered during the war years by dog owners is already forgotten by some of those in public positions. Human nature being what it is, we should not be surprised when we wake up to find that "Mr. John Dignity" who was so ready to take a bow and accept a sizable cheque the result of a tremendous amount of hard work, and cash contributions of dog owners, is now planning and advocating legislation designed to put dog breeding and dog shows entirely out of business. And they will accomplish their purpose if we do not successfully oppose them.

We in British Columbia have been faced with such a problem on several occasions, and it is but fair to say that we escaped during the last session of the Provincial Legislature by the narrowest of margins. None but a blind optimist will believe that we should not provide to meet a similar contingency during the next session. As this is written certain members of the Vancouver City Council are leaving no stones unturned in their attempt to find ways and means to prohibit the keeping of a kennel within the limits of the city. What can happen here can also happen in any city in Canada.

It is a very worthy thing to do your utmost for others, but the time has arrived when dog owners must do something for themselves. They must prepare to fight, and fight hard, against

some in official positions whom they thought were their friends. Genuine dog owners must also oppose some dog owners who bring all fanciers into disrepute through their lack of consideration for the common good. When dog owners successfully oppose the movement to legislate us out of our hobby we should give sober thought to the future of dog breeding and dog shows.

If thousands of dollars can be raised for charitable purposes through the agency of dogs during war years, it appears to be but common sense to say that similar amounts can be raised in peace times to create a defence fund for our own protection; and to acquire buildings suitable for dog shows and other activities. If we cannot now assume such a burden we must admit that dog exhibitors have been exploited during war years. 1946 must be a year for resolution and definite action.

DIETARY LAWS — PART II

By David Fingard

(Continued From November)

Composition of the Diet

The PROTEIN PROBLEM was discussed and the conclusion was reached that in order to preserve health and vigor and to experience normal longevity a person must eat a liberal quantity of good protein (50 to 60 gms.) daily. Sherman adds this—estimating that a man can get along satisfactorily on 75 gms. daily. The results of animal experiment and other considerations, however, suggest even this latter estimate hardly allows a sufficient margin of safety and that in order to insure continued vigor and normal longevity the diet should provide daily approximately 100 gm. of good protein. (There are approximately 30 grams to an ounce.) This applies with especial force to the child, for his food should provide not only for maintenance but also for growth.

"With the lower animals, feeding experiments have shown that in order to maintain normal growth and development the young must receive a liberal amount of good protein and that animals which have been reared on a minimal protein ration show prematurely the degenerative changes of age. There is good reason for assuming that the results of these experiments can be applied to the human young as well.

The protein of the child's food should be of high biologic value. Milk is pre-eminent, for its proteins are excellent. The proteins of meat and eggs also rank high in this respect, but obviously they are not so important to the child as those of milk. The proteins of cereals, of legumes (peas, beans, etc.), and of other vegetables are of relatively low biologic value and should not be depended on as sole sources of protein. They are readily utilized, however, when supplemented by others of higher quality, especially those of milk; for this reason the addition of milk to a cereal enhances greatly its nutritive value.

"Man's dietary needs may be summarized as follows: In order to enjoy robust health and to avoid the results of nutritional failure he should each day drink one quart of milk and eat one green salad and two liberal helpings of the leafy portion of green vegetables; he should eat one helping of meat and perhaps two eggs; to this he may add anything else within reason which his appetite demands, including a liberal supply of bread, butter, fruits and the various vegetables. If he will do this, the state of his nutrition will not suffer.

The RELATIVE PROPORTIONS of the three chief foodstuffs in the child's diet, according to fuel value (calories, not grams), should be approximately as follows:

Protein	15%
Carbohydrate	60%
Fat	25%

The intake of VITAMINS AND MINERALS should not be left to chance. As the result of diets deficient in this respect, children suffer also from other vague, borderline states of ill-health. The relative frequency among children of latent scurvy and of nutritional disorders related to beriberi has long been appreciated, and recently Jeans has demonstrated that the milder forms of vitamin "A" deficiency also are not uncommon. In addition, it is now believed that even an apparently healthy child's development can be enhanced and his vigor appreciably improved by the inclusion in his diet of liberal amounts of vitamins and minerals."

"Calcium and phosphorus, particularly the former, are often lacking. The growing child requires approximately 1 gm. of calcium daily; this element is contained in abundance in milk. Other necessary mineral elements (except iodine in the "goitre" districts), especially iron, which is lacking in milk, can be secured in adequate amounts from eggs, and the leafy portion of green vegetables. Therefore, if the child's diet contains an abundance of milk and green vegetables, he will be assured an adequate supply of mineral elements.

Eggs are valuable food for the child. They supply proteins of high biologic value, easily digested fats, iron and fat-soluble vitamins, especially the anti-rachitic factor. They should be simply prepared — soft boiled, poached or shirred rather than fried. One egg a day is desirable.

The eating of green vegetables should be insisted on. The leafy vegetables, such as spinach, lettuce and cauliflower, are to be preferred. Peas, beans, onions, squash and asparagus are also of value; tomatoes are of essential value. Cabbage and radishes are perhaps to be avoided. The cooking of vegetables for children should be especially thorough. They should be given in water in which the vegetables are cooked, as this contains valuable mineral salts and vitamins.

The wide variations in the average child's nutritional requirements render it difficult to state succinctly what constitutes for him a liberal intake of protein. The Food and Nutrition Board recommends for boys and girls 7 to 12 years 60 to 70 Gm. of protein daily; for boys of 13 to 15 years 85 Gms., and for girls of the same age 80 Gms. Following their studies of adolescent girls, Wang, Hogden and Wing advised 2.5 Gms. of protein per kilogram. It is possible that

during the period of greatest growth from twelve to fifteen for girls and from thirteen to sixteen for boys, a somewhat larger intake of protein would be safe. Two-thirds of this allowance should be in the form of animal protein, in which milk should always find a prominent place. It is safe to say always that about 15 per cent of the child's caloric intake should be in the form of protein.

It has been shown that the average American diet cannot always be trusted to provide a sufficient amount of mineral salts and that it is frequently lacking also in vitamins. The mineral elements most often lacking are calcium, iron and phosphorus, chiefly the first named.

Large dogs which weigh in the neighborhood of 100 to 150 lbs. Their daily intake should be comparable to that of a man employed in normal daily activities. (See table below.)

It is also important to note from the above table the approximate requirements for an adult weighing 154 lbs., the amount of proteins, carbohydrates and fats that are essential according to man's occupation, and a house or pet-dog needs should be compared with the resting or sedentary daily intake (see table below); — the large dog, if working or hunting, his requirements to be compared with the laborer or athlete's diet.

Then, too if the teachings of animal experiment are to be trusted, man is no longer justified in contenting himself with mere adequacy of diet; he should endeavour to attain something better. Witness, among the results of experiments, those of Sherman and Campbell from which it appears that the enrichment of an already adequate diet in respect to its calcium, vitamin A or riboflavin content resulted in an improvement in the animal's nutritional well-being, health and longevity. Such observations are highly significant.

The following charts were a part of an exhibit of a joint Committee of the Council on Foods and Nutrition of the American Medical Association and the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council at Atlantic City, June, 1942.

Food Charts

Foods as sources of VITAMIN A:

Green, leafy and yellow vegetables are outstanding sources. Dairy products, eggs and liver (and fish liver oil) are the important animal sources. Vitamin "A" is well conserved in cooking.

Foods as sources of THIAMIN (VITAMIN B₁):

Except for pork, common foods supply only small amounts of thiamin, the best sources being nutritionally unimpaired cereals and meats; some thiamin may be lost in cooking, either through destruction by heat or extraction by water.

Foods as sources of RIBOFLAVIN (VITAMIN B₂):

Milk is the most important common source of riboflavin. This vitamin is not readily destroyed by heat but it may be lost by extraction in water during cooking and by prolonged exposure to light.

Foods as sources of NIACIN (NICOTINIC ACID):

Meats are the most important source of this vitamin.

Foods as sources of ASCORBIC ACID (VITAMIN C):

In addition to citrus fruits and tomatoes many common fruits and vegetables supply significant amounts of ascorbic acid, especially if eaten raw. This vitamin is readily destroyed by heat and it is extracted by water.

Foods as sources of PROTEIN:

Animal foods are the best source of good quality protein.

Foods as sources of CALCIUM:

Milk is the most important common source of calcium.

Foods as sources of IRON:

Beans, meats, the green leafy vegetables and nutritionally unimpaired cereals are the best common sources of iron.

(Readers will understand this subject is too comprehensive to deal with food charts, etc., in an article of this length.)

The following foods are chosen as being foods which are considered almost a daily requirement on man's menu.

The following is to be noted for man's well-being: "The excessive use of coffee or tea is harmful to a high degree. Stimulation and irritation lie very close together, and caffeine, when taken in relatively large doses, irritates instead of cheers. Some dispositions are ruined by caffeine. It may produce insomnia. True, many persons state that coffee or tea will permit them to relax and sleep, as a rule, however, this is followed later in the night by a period of insomnia. Too much coffee or tea will cause cardiac irritability and produce rapid heart

action. Even such a small amount as one cup a day will, when the heart is already irritated, as in hyperthyroidism, accentuate the disorder.

The whole civilized world (and much of the uncivilized) drinks tea and coffee. Much cheer and comfort is thereby obtained, but it cannot be said that through them man's productivity, whether intellectual or physical, is increased. When these beverages are taken in moderation, no appreciable harm is done; one cup of coffee or tea a day is possibly all right; more than this is probably harmful. The tendency today is to rely too much on coffee, tea and other drinks containing caffeine.

The necessity for vitamins and minerals is probably just as pressing in old age as in middle life. Indeed, there is reason for believing that some of the disabilities of age are due to vitamin deficiencies consequent upon an inadequate intake or upon poor absorption. Adequate amounts of these substances should be given in the form of vitamin-rich foods. In addition, brewer's yeast or vitamin concentrates may be prescribed.

Fertility

Fertility and nutritive efficiency are intimately related. Indeed the ability of an animal to reproduce and successfully rear its young is regarded as an excellent criterion of the adequacy of ration, so much so that students of nutrition appraise the adequacy of rations used in animal experiment largely by the size and the number of litters produced and the vigor of the young. Stock-raisers appreciate this and give extra allowance of food to their breeding animals. The practice in the highlands of Scotland of supplementing the food of the sheep just before the period of the annual estrus is said to increase materially the fertility

in the direction of insufficient protein or of lowered caloric intake, will lengthen the estrual interval, and that if sufficiently pronounced the inadequacy will stop this function altogether. Vitamin deficiency operates in many ways to produce sterility. Lack of vitamin A not only will retard ovulation but will also produce cornification of the vaginal epithelium which makes conception impossible. Lack of vitamin B₁ interferes with ovulation; in the male it lessens sex interest. Mineral deficiency is probably responsible for the fact that rats fed exclusively on cow's milk reproduce little and that the few animals that are born do not long survive. The depressing influence of a diet lacking in protein has received frequent comment; Slonaker and Card found that when the rat was restricted to a vegetarian diet there was marked delay in pubescence, with lessening of fertility ranging from 40 to 92 per cent of the normal, and that normal reproductive activity reappeared when a liberal diet containing more protein was allowed. In addition, improvement in the general nutritive state of an apparently well nourished animal or attention to even relatively minor matters of general health will sometimes influence fertility. The addition of agar to the synthetic diets of experimental animals has been found to improve intestinal function to such an extent as to increase fertility. Sherman and Campbell found that the addition of milk to an already adequate diet not only improved the general vigor of the rats but also increased their fertility. Many other examples could be cited.

The writer for many years past has used a well-balanced vitamin and mineral diet for his dogs and he believes this scientific diet has proved to be advantageous. All puppies from four weeks of age up to six months of age receive daily (Dane puppies):

One teaspoonful Dicalcium Phosphate (a prepared chemical food obtainable from any druggist).

One tablespoonful chemical food powder (a supplementary source of iron, calcium and phosphorous).

One quart of milk—preferably whole milk.

A minimum of two eggs (these are blood spotted eggs).

Two tablespoons cod liver oil (one in the morning meal and one in the evening meal); but for adult dog, one tablespoon per day. (It has been found by the writer at all times that it is advantageous to mix these chemical foods with the cod liver oil, thus ensuring a better assimilation.)

Two cups cereal a day (minimum) we use Pabulum, a palatable mixed cereal (vitamin and mineral cereal).

One cup rolled oats—either cooked or uncooked.

One teaspoonful yeast.

Salt (it is essential that puppies or adult dogs receive the same quantities as a child or human adult).

Liver, heart, kidneys, etc., are used

of the flocks. "The capacity for reproduction is a function of the well-being of the animal, and dietaries which affect the general well-being, either adversely or favorably, affect the function of reproduction in like manner." . . . This general influence upon fertility is felt by both man and the lower animals, and any deficiency, whether of vitamin, mineral or protein, can be expected to exert an unfavorable effect. By observing changes in the vaginal epithelium of laboratory animals, Evans and Bishop found that inadequate nutrition, whether

mixed with horse meat (this is a most excellent protein substance which is fed daily depending upon the age and size of the dog).

Dog biscuits and canned dog meat are also used as a supplement to make up for the four meals a day for puppies, and two meals a day for adult dogs.

(While it is true that the body absorbs vitamin D from the sun's rays, it is equally true that dogs rarely lie in the sun if shelter can be found; hence the reason for the daily use of cod liver oil.)

(When the mother dog is lactating, two quarts of milk per day are given until puppies are weaned.)

(With the meat we add three cooked vegetables once daily—these are given to puppy and adult dog alike. Be sure not to throw away the water in which vegetables are cooked as it contains the valuable part of the minerals, etc.)

Method for mixing cereal, chemical food, cod liver oil, etc.: Mix the eggs, cod liver oil, chemical food, dicalcium phosphate, yeast, and iodized table salt thoroughly, then add cereal and milk, and this makes a most nutritive and perfectly balanced meal.

The well-fed dog is much easier to feed than a starving one.

Fresh water should be available at all times for adult dogs. With puppies we exclude water and keep milk available at all times for them until they reach the age of three months.

An important factor which breeders of Great Danes and other large breeds of dogs should take into consideration is the fact that the Dane, St. Bernard and Newfoundland attain in one year the body weight that the human being attains in 15 to 20 years. Indeed, the reason that so few large breeds of dogs are ever sound is because the breeder does not take this factor into consideration.





B.C. GUN DOG CLUB ANNUAL FALL RETRIEVER TRIALS

Judy of Tuckluck, a Golden Retriever owned by Chas. Snell of Portland, Oregon, and trained and handled by J. Hoenes, withstood the long journey from Dousman, Wisconsin, to score by a very narrow margin over Terry Maunsell's Labrador, Crevamoy Pride, handled and formerly owned by Jack Smyth, at the B.C. Gun Dog Club's Annual Fall Retriever Trials at the Wild Duck Inn, Pitt River, September 23rd. At the end of a series of four tough land and water tests the judges could not agree on the winner and ordered another test over a hundred yard water course, together with another bird planted in the reeds. This test was made to be particularly tough in an effort to produce a decisive win, but these dogs fought it out almost neck and neck, and the nod was finally given to the American dog. Bracken's Jill, owned and handled by A. E. Jolivet of Victoria, B.C., turned in a consistent performance to take third place.

The puppy and shooting dog stakes were run Saturday, September 22nd, at Woods Island, on the Fraser River. First place in the puppy stake went to Vic's Cuyuni Boy, owned by Grant Mahood, and handled by T. H. Pendygrasse. Rockhaven Rusty, a Golden Retriever, owned and handled by E. Scott, was second, and Black Knight, owned and handled by Ben Furrie, third.

Grant Mahood's Thurzalaine Kennels scored again in the shooting dog stake when his Golden, Pat, turned on the heat to nose out Judy of Tuckluck. Pat was handled by Jack Smyth. Nelson's Black Prince, owned by Ritchie Nelson and handled by Henry Christenson, placed third. The judges awarded the "Vic Williams Best Prospect Trophy" to Escott's Rockhaven Rusty.

There were over 700 tickets sold for these trials and the B.C. Gun Dog Club is to be congratulated for the work they

have done in building these tests up to where they now compare favorably with the best on the continent. The start of Retriever trials here on the Pacific Coast some ten years ago, when the B.C. Gun Dog Club put on their first trials for Retrievers, was a one-bird land and water test. No advancement was made on this for some time. Then when competition became too keen for such elementary work, two-bird retrieves were introduced, and finally three-bird and blind retrieves. Over a year ago the B.C. Gun Dog Club induced America's three top Retrievers, Shed of Arden, Stilverin Super-Speed, and Scornine of Deer Creek to compete in B.C. for the silverware. Only Shed of Arden was able to offer serious contention. Next year we hope to see the walk-up included in the tests, as B.C. Retrievers are now capable of competing with the best in any test. It is interesting to note here that in pioneering the Retriever game here, it was the B.C. Gun Dog Club which in every instance took the initiative in putting B.C. on the grand circuit of Retriever Trials (contrary to a Retriever report published in the October issue of *Dogs In Canada*).

F. T. Chairman B. Deverill and Field Marshal W. Egerton, together with members of the Skookem Club, deserve a lot of credit for the efficient and snappy manner in which the trial was conducted.

Judges in the open all-age were Frank Andrews and Oliver Krog. Judges in the puppy and shooting-dog stakes were B. Deverill and E. Walsh.

20 SHOW RING DON'T'S

1. DON'T wear your hat in the ring. Your hat is in the ring figuratively but not actually.
2. DON'T smoke in the ring.
3. DON'T pay so much attention to one part of the dog that you overlook another important part.
4. DON'T call the judge's notice to a fault by trying eagerly to conceal or minimize it.
5. DON'T call your dog by its registered name (or any other name).
6. DON'T converse unnecessarily with the judge or the steward or another exhibitor and certainly not with the ring side.
7. DON'T tell the judge about your dog, his pedigree, or the wins at some other show.
8. DON'T have the jitters. Be calm and collected; if you are nervous, you transmit your excitement to the dog.
9. DON'T hog the attention of the judge.
10. DON'T argue with the judge as you leave the ring; if you don't agree with his placings ask him after he has finished all his work, to explain his reasons, if he feels so inclined.
11. DON'T have your dog facing a strong light.
12. DON'T loaf in the ring before or after your class is judged.
13. DON'T let the dog boss you; keep both the dog and yourself under control.
14. DON'T let the judge's hand come close to the mouth of a biting dog.
15. DON'T punish your dog in the ring; it shows poor training and lack of control.
16. DON'T get between the dog and the judge.
17. DON'T mope around or stand idly or gaze absent-mindedly; keep your mind and your eyes on your dog and the judge.
18. DON'T fuss with your dog if he is showing well.
19. DON'T get too close to another dog or person purposely or not purposely. The other fellow may be a bigger bully than you.
20. DON'T try to draw attention to yourself; the dog is on show, not you.
