The Editor's Column

We have always accented the fact that advertising speaks for itself, but we are introducing a contract advertiser this month, who is attempting to do something for dog clubs which has long been needed. The American Kennel Club considered the efforts of the Unites Specialists, Inc., (N.Y.) of sufficient interest to American dog breeders to warrant a two-page article in the opening pages of the April number of the *American Kennel Gazette*. This group is making motion picture films which will be available to dog clubs. The first film covers dog training, and arrangements are now being made for this film to be available in Canada.

The executive of this organization inform us that it is their intention to make a great variety of interesting pictures on many subjects connected with judging and with dogs. The following is a quotation from the *American Kennel Club Gazette* in connection with this project:

"Our estimate is that one moderate length, educational-type movie can cover almost as much ground as a text book—and do it much more pleasantly and effec-

tively. This certainty was the impression of most of those who witnessed an advance showing of what has been termed the first authentic training film, "Training You To Train Your Dog," which has recently been released by United Specialists, Inc. This sound and color film was viewed by several officials of the AKC and received their unstinted praise and approval. They agreed unanimously that it should do more to further the cause of obedience training than all the words that have ever been printed on the subject.

"The film shows a class of novice owners and dogs from the time—all thumbs and uneasy—they first start to receive instructions until they wind up thoroughly versed in how to conduct themselves.

"The AKC viewpoint is that there is an unlimited field in the various specialized departments of the pure-bred dog game for the production and use of instructive moving pictures. In fact, there are dozens of special activities alone on which excellent films could be made.

It will be remembered that at the Annual Meeting this year, the President, Mr. W. J. Risewick, stressed the value of motion pictures in connection with the dissemination of information regarding judging, breeding, etcetera. It is fortunate that United Specialists have stepped into the field at the present time and it looks as if the thought expressed by our President will begin to take on a tangible form.

In this connection I would advise you that in addition to making enquiry of the Public Health Service of the United States I also brought the matter to the attention of the American Embassy at Ottawa.

I have just been advised that the order to which you refer was revoked on March 28th, 1946. As there has been no change in the American regulations it would appear that dogs may still be shipped to the United States as in the past.

"V.I.P.'S" (VERY IMPORTANT POOCHES) ARRIVE IN UNITED STATES FROM GERMANY

One hundred and nine war dogs of G.I.'s arrived in New York recently on the Liberty ship *Thomas Nelson Page* from Bremerhaven, Germany, and were forwarded by railway express to 85 cities located in 25 states in this country, according to Railway Express Agency.

Under a plan recently worked out, the American Express Company in Europe arrange for their passage to the United States on board a Liberty ship, attending to such details as: the inoculation, food in transit, the shipping crate, and the final forwarding by railway express in this country. The G.I. must deliver his pet to certain designated Army kennels in Europe, which serve as collection points, and he also furnishes the leash and muzzle. On this ship, the dogs were attended by 12 returning soldiers who fed, watered and exercised them. They also received the same attention by messengers on express and baggage cars of trains they rode on their final trip to their new homes.

BOSTONS IN THE NEWS

The Robert Schellings' Saints Rest Kennels have just received word that Edlee's Wee Easter Honey, granddaughter of Old Easter Parade, had received confirmation of her U. S. Championship. This dog is owned by Dr. and Mrs. Thiedeman of Chicago.

Good luck came as a double-header to the kennel. Flash of Sunniland, sired by their International Champion Saints Rest Double Ace is reported to have finished his U.S. Championship in less than three and a half months with points to spare (subject to confirmation by the A.K.C.). He won Best of Breed at a five-point Show; he had two Best of Breeds, two Best of Opposite Sex; two Best of Winners and one Non-Sporting Group. He is owned by Dr. H. A. Mathis, of Macon, Ga.

Champion Saints Rest Easter Bunny, "Cover-girl" of the Christmas 1944 issue, made an auspicious debut in the United States going Reserve Winner at Baltimore show, two weeks ago.

NOVICE BREEDERS GO TO TOP WITH GREAT DANE

Fingard's Heidi II, Shir-Van Kennels, first title holder, finished for her championship (subject to confirmation) in three days, at three shows. This is believed to be an all-time Canadian record for the breed and sex. She was Winners, Best of Winners and Best of Breed under Mrs. Enno Meyer at the four point St. Thomas show, going over a previously undefeated male champion. Heidi also took the points at Chatham under Reg. Sparkes, and at Windsor under Captain Dudley Waters.

The new champion was bred by David Fingard, and it is interesting to note that she is the fourth title holder to come from his mating of King of Roxdane and Champion Wischer's Dulcy.

It is wonderful to know that a beginner can go in and win. Heidi, her owners and Miss June Smith, who handled her during her brief, spectacular career were all the veriest novices. It seems to speak well for the often criticized "system" when unknowns can reach the top at their first shows. Shirley Katkov, Shir-Van Kennels, Port Colborne, Ontario, is the owner of Heidi.

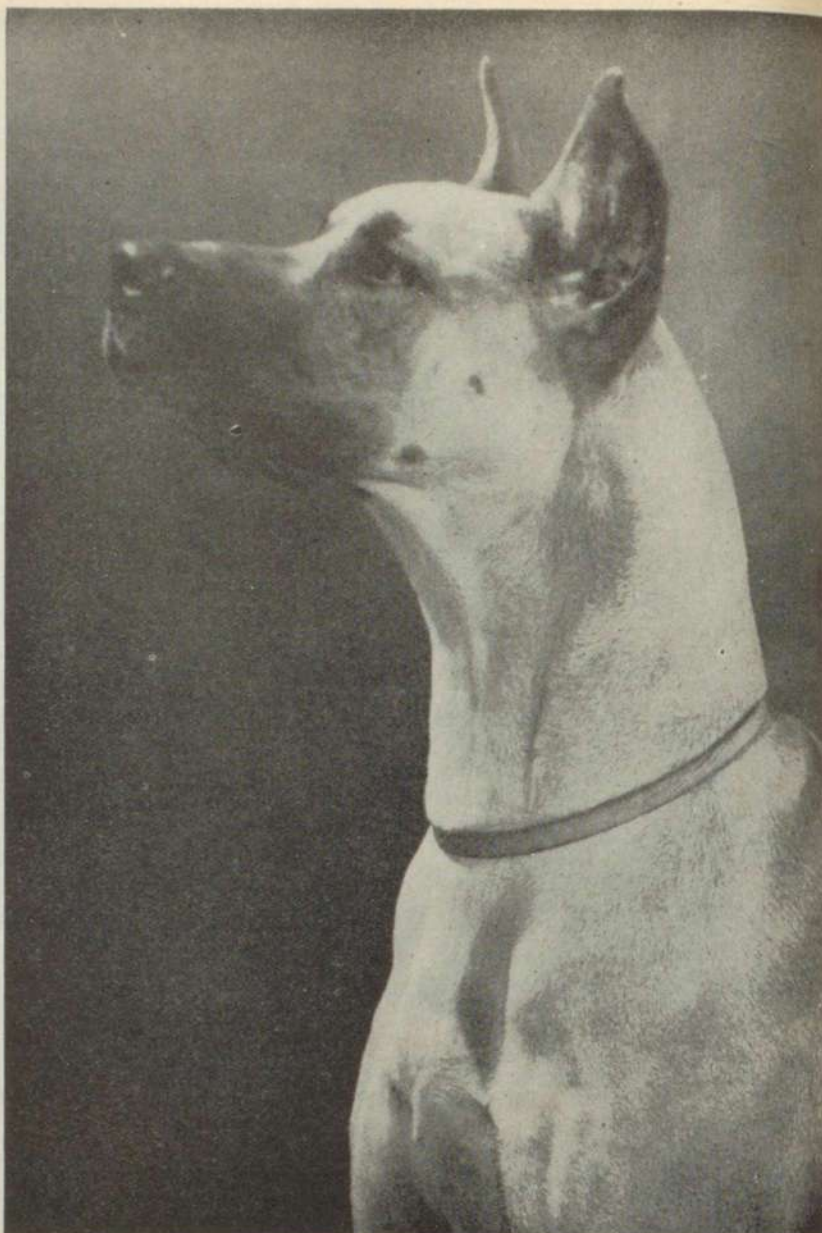

Carolina Observations

By ALAN C. SECORD

Ed. Note: Dr. Secord has favoured us with a glimpse of hunting in the South.

Following a veterinary convention in Washington, D.C., the writer was the guest of Dr. J. R. Currey and Mrs. Fred Ramsdell on a quail hunt in South Carolina. Many points were visited by motor and some observations made which might be of interest to members of the Canadian Kennel Club.

There is very little free hunting territory, as we know it here in Ontario. The shooting privileges are leased at a flat rate fee of 10c per acre per year. Much of it is privately owned and vast areas are controlled by lumber and holding companies. The shooting preserve we stayed at consisted of 23,000 acres with a central shooting lodge which was maintained during the hunting season of November, December, January and February. Deer, wild turkey, dove and quail are the principal game. The deer season opens August 15th. and closes January 1st. The quail season runs for four months, November through February.

South Carolina is a great sporting dog country. Everyone has dogs. Packs of coon hounds, fox hounds, rabbit and 'possum dogs are commonly kept and every establishment keeps a kennel of bird dogs. Pointers predominate but there are a goodly number of Setters. Mr. Ramsdell's kennels contained seventeen Setters and two Pointers. He has been a Setter man from away back and prefers the long-hairs. These were his broken gun dogs, fully trained and in top condition as they had been hunted hard for four months. In addition to his trained gun dogs, he had eight bred bitches and numerous puppies at his home in Maryland. The gun dogs were all good for a full three-hour stretch and finished fresh. They were the best trained dogs it has been my pleasure to see work. All the nineteen dogs pointed, held point, were staunch to flush and did not chase. Each dog has had several hundred birds killed in front of him. In every case, dogs would honour a brace mate's point by backing. The dogs were hunted in pairs—two dogs in the morning and two in the afternoon.

Quail hunting is all done on horse-back. The dogs are cast off and followed until they make game. The shooters then dismount and walk in for a covey shot. The country is perfectly flat with broom-sedge grass growing profusely and knee-high between the long-leaved pine trees. Because of the cover, it would be difficult to follow dogs on foot. After the covey shot the singles are hunted up and then the hunt resumed from horse-back. I noted that the dogs kept checking back to keep track of the hunters, otherwise they would soon have been lost in the heavy

cover. No attempt was made to keep the dogs steady to shot. About half the dogs retrieved. To me the finest performance was to see them called in to hunt "dead" on command. They would comb the brush like a vacuum cleaner until the dead birds were found. Several of the dogs we hunted over were top notch field trial winners when younger but had been steadied down and brought in for shooting dogs. I never saw a poor dog and each one could have been a credit as an entry in our Ontario Field Trials. I think our dogs are as good but do not have the same chance to be shot over and hunt game as those in the south.

Village Boy, the famous field trial Pointer, was born and raised in this community. He was sold for \$875.00 as a two year old dog. No doubt, if his sale had been postponed a few years, it could easily have been that many thousand.

Coon and Fox Hunting

Fox are run at night with everyone in the community who owns a fox dog taking part. The fox is never shot. The hounds chase it while the owners listen to find out which are the best trained and fastest. Night hunting with hounds is a favourite past time—coon hunting particularly. The darkies own cross-bred hounds which they use to run rabbits in the day time and 'possum at night. These coloured hunters are great characters and take as much pride in their mongrel hounds as their white masters do in their pure bred bird dogs.

Wild Boar Hunting

Native razor-back hogs which have gone wild and crossed with wild boars imported originally from the Continent live in numbers in the tangled Santee River Delta swamp. Wild boars are grizzled black in colour and seems to be almost all head which takes up over a third of the body length. A pack of hounds broken to run hog scent is used to chase the boar until brought to bay.

The huntsmen follow on horse back through the swamp, over and under fallen trees and across creeks—a wild riding pell mell chase.

When a boar is finally cornered a "catch" dog which has been kept at heel is turned loose. These dogs are cross-bred bull Terrier and bull dog. The hounds will not tackle the boar alone and wait for assistance from the bulldog who is built for and loves a battle. He sails in and catches the boar by the ear and never lets go no matter how the boar may try to dislodge him. Once the catch dog gets his hold the other hounds all pile on and their combined weight holds the boar until the hunters ride up. Often when a big tusker is attacked he kills or badly mauls several dogs before the men arrive.

Health Notes

Coloured tenant farmers all have numerous mongrel dogs. They were the poorest looking specimens of dog flesh I have ever seen. Many of them were mangy, covered with ticks and, quite evidently, full of internal parasites. In that country, few untreated dogs live beyond the age of five years, due to heart worm, (*Dirofilaria immitis*) infestation. Heart worm is a blood parasite spread by biting insects. This worm lives in the chambers of the heart and causes serious damage and heavy mortality. The hunting dogs brought to this territory have to be treated every four months. Treatment consists of a series of intravenous injections of antimony compound. It is expensive and sometimes dangerous. Dogs of the coloured population live and die without veterinary attention and act as a reservoir of infection to the pure bred dogs, so that it is difficult to maintain good health in a kennel. Anyone importing a dog from the south should insist it be blood tested and proven free of microfilariae by a reliable veterinarian trained in this work. Rabies exists in the back counties and is an ever present threat.

"Of English Dogs"

The first pamphlet ever written on dogs, "Of English Dogs", translated in 1575, was published in Latin in 1570, by John Caius, (1510-1573). He is best remembered as the founder of Caius (Keys') College in Cambridge, but in his time he was an eminent physician and writer on medicine. He was a student at Gonville Hall, Cambridge, which he practically refounded as "Caius", and was one of the early Greek scholars of his country, before the Revival of Letters, under Erasmus, Collet, Cheke, and More, was delayed by the reforming zeal of Henry VIII. The labours of that evangelist made England an extremely unquiet place for men of learning, while there is much reason to doubt whether Caius ever quite shook off "the rags of Rome". In 1539, probably to avoid the "bustling of the university up and down" in matters of religion, Caius migrated to the schools of Padua. This was a tranquil home of letters and law, the mundane Republic of Venice discountenancing the persecutions which raged among the godly, whether Lutheran, Calvinist, or Anglican. The university had an Anglo-Scottish "Nation", of which the registers have lately been published. The celebrated Vesalius was here Caius' teacher in anatomy, a study for which the Church in the Middle Ages professed no admiration. After taking his doctor's degree (1541), Caius made a scientific tour among the libraries of Europe, especially examining the MSS. of Galen, the Greek medical writer. Returning to England shortly before the death of Henry VIII., he was commanded by that prince to lecture on anatomy. He also wrote a treatise, reckoned fine, on the "Sweating Sickness", and was appointed to the post, no sinecure, of physician to the ailing Edward VI. On the decease of the young king, our English Josiah, Caius, held the same office in the household of Queen Mary, usually styled by a vulgar sobriquet, "the Bloody". The offices enjoyed by Caius were lucrative, and he was not like the wealthy of the Reformation, whom Latimer chides for their neglect of scholars. He re-endowed Conville, where he had been educated, and became (1559) master of the College, without salary. On Mary's death, Elizabeth maintained Caius in his place of Royal physician, but, as Protestantism became of a more persecuting temper, he retired (1568), or was dismissed from his anxious post. After the affair of the St. Bartholomew, the Protestants were full of nervous suspicions,

and Caius fell into trouble because he possessed certain "idolatrous" objects and ecclesiastical vestments. A bonfire of these was made in the College quadrangle, but, on July 29th, 1573, Caius escaped, by death, from the tender mercies of Protestantism. Three years later, Abraham Fleming translated the tract on Dogs, written for Gesner the naturalist, whom Walton quotes so freely in the *Compleat Angler*.

This pamphlet represents ancient journalism. To-day the authors would put them forth as articles in newspapers, or perhaps in the more ponderous magazines. Before such vehicles existed, the essays, as a rule, took the shape of pamphlets, in which the press, through the reigns of Elizabeth and James I., was prolific. The tractate on English Dogs, by Dr. Caius, is an exception to the general rule: it merely contains materials for Gesner's *Natural History*.

The essay is of interest to us mainly for the odd vivacity of the translator's English style, like that of B. R.'s rendering of Herodotus, partly as matter of natural history and the evolution of species of dogs, and, again, because of the illustrations of sport. The spelling and accenting of Greek words in the translator's text is pleasantly fantastic. We leave them as we find them. We learn that the same dogs, *leverarii*, were used as harriers and as foxhounds. The actual foxhound is mainly the result of specialised breeding in the eighteenth century, during which hare-hunting (practised by Squire Western) gradually went out of vogue, and fox-hunting became fashionable "jelly dogs" losing favour. Terriers, as their name proves, were used against foxes and badgers that had gone to earth. The "entering" of terriers, their education, is adequately described by Dandie Dinmont in Guy Mannering. "Beast or body, education should aye be minded. I had them a' regularly entered, first wi' rottens, then wi' stots or weasels, and then wi' the todos or rocks, and now they fear noeting that ever cam' wi' a hairy skin on't." From rats to weasels, foxes, badgers, and otters (of which Dandie makes no mention) is the curriculum of a Terrier's education. Dandie does not include cats, the habitual prey of the well-trained dandie dinmont. Not to assail cats ought to be part of his education; it is often successfully undertaken by puss herself. Caius is brief and unsympathetic in his section on Terriers, and throws no light on the breeding of our extant classes. The dandie was fully developed at the close of the eighteenth century, as may be seen in Gainsborough's portrait of the young Duke of Buccleuch, in company with a very fine dandie with a dome-like head. The present fashion breeds dandies too small and neat, and of insufficient strength, in the humble opinion of the present writer. The Borders, the home of the dandie, were also naturally the home of the bloodhound, so valuable for his use in "pursuing pestilent persons who plant their pleasure in practices of purloining"—everything that had legs. Such persons were Ill Will Armstrong, Kinmont Willie, and Dick o' the Cow. Among greyhounds both the rough

and smooth varieties are reckoned, the former used in stag-hunting, the latter in coursing hares. The "tumbler" and "thievish dog" would now probably be spoken of as "lurchers", night-wandering poaching curs of low degree. The Spaniel and Setter appear to be much what they were in the time of Dr. Caius, though a comparison of pictures of dogs in portraits, from Holbein's time downwards, is necessary for precision. The *Canis Piscator* of Hector Boece ("Boethius") which "seeketh for fish by smelling among rock and stone", is probably one of the many myths of that pillar of falsehood. At all events, though one has known Terriers to attack salmon in the water during the spawning season, and though a collie, Jack by name, has been trained to turn a hooked salmon when he tries to leave the pool, one has never heard of a dog that traces fish by the scent.

Of dogs, "little, pretty, proper, and fine, sought for to satisfy the delicateness of dainty dames", we know that Mary, in captivity, was very fond, and one such dog was faithful to the end. "She had a little dog with her upon the scaffold, who was sitting there during the whole time, keeping very quiet and never stirring from her side, but as soon as the head was stricken off, he began to bestir himself and cry out. Afterwards he took up a position between the body and the head, which he kept until some one came and removed him, and this had to be done by violence." The dog of the Queen was more loyal than her son. Henri III. of France, in his conscientious pursuit of effeminacy, made much ado with tiny toy dogs: "This abuse, says Caius, 'reigneth where there hath been long lack of issue.'" Henri had none. Caius, as a physician, says much more of pet miniature Spaniels than of Terriers, because the science of his age held that the malady of a sick person might migrate into her lap-dog. This belief survives in France, if we may trust Cyp in her *Ces Bons Docteurs*. Caius's logic here shows a lack of scientific precision. Witches used to cause the maladies of their patrons to shift quarters into a beast, as the disease of Archbishop Adamson of St. Andrews (1580) into a white pony. But I am apt to regard this anecdote as a slanderous myth, invented by the superstition of the prelate's Presbyterian enemies, the Melvilles, Blacks, and Davidsons. The sheep-dog's personal appearance is not described; and we know not whether Caius refers to our collies, or to a tall, rough kind of Terrier most common in the north of England. Little or nothing is said of the wonderful sagacity of the collie. That Caius should regard mastiffs as descended from "the violent lion shows a tendency rather erroneous to the theory of evolution. Mastiffs were used as water dogs, and for bear-baiting—Shallow's favourite sport. In an England populated by tramps, thanks to the dissolution of the monasteries and the wars, mastiffs had no sinecure. The British bull-dog (unless he is "the butcher's dog") seems to be ungraciously omitted. Probably he is the result of breeding with an eye to pinning the bull, in the humane sport of bull-baiting.

PREVENTION OF RICKETS

The publicity Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has just issued a bulletin on the treatment of rickets as applying to cattle. As this information is equally applicable to dogs, it is reproduced herewith.

Dr. Charles A. Mitchell, Dominion Animal Pathologist, points out that rickets is a disease caused by a deficiency in diet. Specifically, it is a deficiency of calcium, phosphorus or of Vitamin D in an animal's diet. If a young animal does not have enough calcium deposited in the cartilage of its bones, these bones will become weak. Older animals may suffer from slight attacks of rickets, but usually recover provided that their bones have been built up to strength during their growing period. Young bulls, however, do not recover as easily. Indeed, in young bulls, rickets may persist, weakening the animal and reducing its market value.

The most effective precaution against rickets is a diet containing adequate calcium, phosphorus, and Vitamin D as the ability of the body to make use of calcium depends on the presence of phosphorus and Vitamin D in the diet. Well-cured hay should contain enough to both minerals to protect an animal, but whether it does depends on the presence of these minerals in the soil where the hay is grown. Nor should a mineral supplement be always depended on to supply the deficiency. As Dr. Mitchell points out, if

the soil producing the animal's feed is naturally rich in calcium, excess quantities of calcium in the feed ration will not be absorbed. Accordingly, this authority on animal diseases says that each case of rickets should be treated by a veterinarian who is thoroughly familiar with local soil and feeding conditions.

Early winter and its consequent early stabling is not the sole condition leading to rickets. A few years ago, live stock in Eastern Canada suffered from rickets when rainy weather during the haying season interfered with proper curing of the hay.

Many animals will recover from rickets when spring sunshine assists them to absorb the calcium their bones require. But as the disease can greatly retard the proper growth of young live stock, it is wise to call in a veterinarian at the first sign of the disease. The symptoms to watch for are sore feet, sometimes arthritis and—in some individual animals—bandy legs.

Pekingese, Kwaiyang of Crophorne, from the kennel of Miss Amy Addams, Toronto, won the prize for Best Pekingese in Show on Good Friday last at the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association Sanction Show held at Broadview and Queen Streets, Toronto. Miss Addams is very proud of this little dog, as she bred the parents, the two grand dam and one of the grand sires.

TWO DOGS AND CAT IN SAME CRATE "NO FIGHT" SAYS EXPRESS COMPANY

It's a well-known fact that expressmen are seldom surprised at the unusual variety of shipments they handle every day, but recently, a certain crate they handled caused a trail of raised eye-brows from California to Utica, N.Y. The cause of such eye-brow lifting was the fact that this crate contained not one—but two dogs and a large yellow cat who got along very nicely despite the long trip. Railway express men said the animals even ate from the same dish without so much as a drawn claw or a snapping of teeth!

The Cocker Spaniel Specialty Show

Winnipeg, Wednesday, April 17th

In these days of meat rationing, a suggestion to go out and buy yourselves "some hind-quarters" seems, on the face of it, a thing impossible to accomplish—these days of "points" and "tokens"! The Doctor was saying, in effect, that in our breeding programs our Cockers needed more strength, more stability, more drive. Dr. Westcott appears to be a quiet, unassuming young man, whose professional status is being recognized, whose articles on the general well-being of dogs, the elimination of the ills, the pests, and the discomforts from which they suffer, are looked forward to with a sustained interest by an increasing number of readers of the foremost dog magazines on the continent. Dr. Westcott, you must have guessed, if you did not already know, was our judge. For him, I am quite sure, his first visit to Winnipeg will be a memorable one. Among more pleasant recollections, he no doubt discovered that a judge can learn some things the "hard way", although actuated by sheer commendable honesty of purpose. At every show, in my experience, there has always arisen a set of events, which have brought out the "sterling" and the "dross"; even at a Specialty Show, where the thoroughbreds are "sporting", we find some of the "groups" at the ringside, are obviously of the "non-sporting" variety. This is mentioned just because there really exists a "spectator-exhibitor" problem, as well as the much advertised judging situation, about which a lot has been written and something tangible is being done.

What can be said for the interplay between judge and exhibitor? What can be condoned? What must be sternly condemned?

A well prepared "quality" dog with a just right hair do or trim could at first sight upset the calculations of a judge with a lengthy program and little time at his disposal without the interjection of a lot of "exhibitor chatter" designed expressly to influence the judgment given to the detriment of a fellow-exhibitor, who is content to display his entry in the manner "polite". The point that needs to be stressed is this: suppose a "sporting dog" ever indicated to a field trial judge that he did not respect his running mate's "point", he would be penalized with a capital "p", to the full extent of his infringement of the rules. Yet, time after time, we have exhibitors at the ringside who should be compelled to wear a "non-sporting" ribbon for the duration of every show till the lesson sinks in.

It should be made clear that they will not be permitted to break the "point" of common courtesy to the judge and cause shame to their fellow club members who share the responsibility with them for his or her appointment. It affords me great pleasure, however, to say that our show was an outstanding success that reflected

credit on those responsible for its promotion. I need only remind our readers that whilst the Westminster Madison Square Garden event, housed only 87 American and English type Cocker Spaniels in actual competition. We in Winnipeg had 76 comprising both types, with only two absentees in 78 entries, a compliment I think to our judge, the exhibitors and the club's executive. Mr. E. J. Heaney (potentate of Khartum Lodge of the local Shrines) made a brief, well-rounded speech on appreciation of the effort put forth by the Cocker Spaniel Specialty Club of Western Canada. He referred to the association of children and their dogs, explaining how character development always accrued from such relationship. Mrs. James Crombie, who specializes in the things most people don't want to do and excels in them was right there "pitching", with the other girls helping too. President Bentley was a very busy ring-steward. Our show superintendent, the veteran T. Kay McKenzie, whom all local dog clubs delight to honour, made a nice job in very nice surroundings. Messrs. J. Whitehouse, the McAuley brothers, (Frank and Bill), Mr. Sam Saidman all contributed valuable "ister of Transportation" (without port-service. Mr. Cliff Biggar was our "Minifolio—or even remuneration) using his equipment and working staff to convey the benching to and from the building. A special word of thanks is due the Fort Garry Kennel Club for their splendid cooperation. The Greater Winnipeg Kennel Club was represented by Mrs. Tom Eamons, the ever-dependable, in an important spot. Mrs. Gove of the F.G.K.C., gave valued assistance at the steward's table. Bill Pettigrew's ticket-selling campaign was a real personal success. Dr. Harry Colebourn, B.V.Sc., M.R.V.S., made a very detailed examination of all entries. The German Shepherd

By GEORGE R. JERMAN

My experience in raising German Shepherds varies both in relationship to breeding and in observing the raising of a litter of puppies. I have realized that the Shepherd is mostly a companion dog and pet in this country but as a working dog he is most excellent. Usually we do not have the work for him to do except occasionally when he goes on a farm to guard turkeys, look after cattle, etc.

We have a breed standard as do other breeds to go by. This is where the breeder with care in selecting brood females and proven sires must be on his toes. In the first place, the method of feeding our dogs since they are becoming quite domesticated is really an art. The feeding of cod liver oil, bone calcium, etc has a tendency to put too much daylight under our Shepherd; but to raise good stock we must feed cod liver oil, etc. To overcome this condition I select an undersized female of good health, temperament, structure—one that is wirey and can do a good day's run in the country without feeling any ill effects. Mate this type of female with a proven sire which is as near as possible to the standard taking into great consideration the blood line of both sire and dam and especially their foreparents' faults and favours. I also try to select an animal with dark points which denotes strong constitution; washed out colours being the weaker which applies to all animal life.

Now I am trying to raise a Shepherd with brains, flash, dark points, good temperament, and as close as possible to the standard. In observing the puppies from day to day you come to realize you have an outstanding puppy. He sets himself off like an old showman. You realize his conformation must be good or else he could not do it. He is asking you to make a champion of him, but remember it is 50 per cent breeding and 50 per cent raising. If you have such a youngster in your kennel, have faith in him; develop him.

The Shepherd needs no trimming. He is a natural dog, loving affection and his greatest wish is to protect his master and his master's property. The show ring, field, Army and Navy, and Seeing Eye Association have given a good account of him. We might say, "The German Shepherd for Service, Love, and Devotion". What more can be asked of man's best friend?

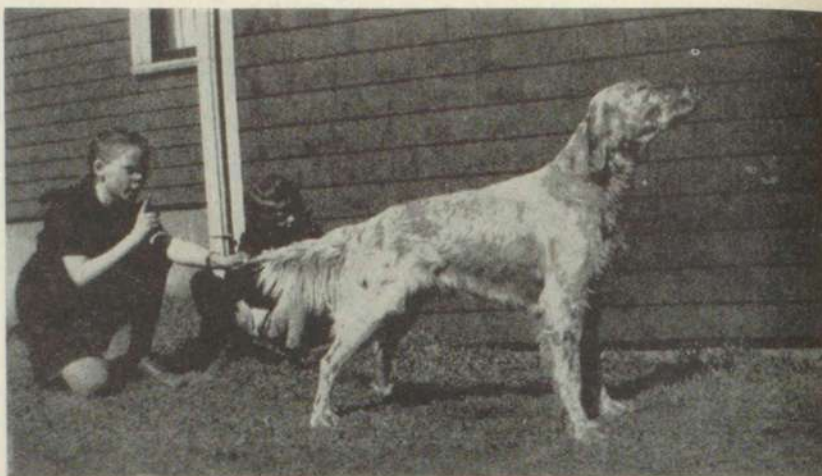

Webster. This brace put up a good searching heat and displayed great technique coupled with speed and style. They will be heard from later on no doubt. There are suggestions that will promote the health and well-being of the dog, discussion of kennels, feeds and feeding, exercise, grooming, care of young puppies, etc. It is strikingly illustrated with photographs of outstanding breeds.

TRAINING YOU TO TRAIN YOUR DOG

By Blanche Saunders. \$3.50

This is a totally new approach to the subject of training dogs in obedience. The author's original ideas are clearly explained in the text and by a series of half-tone illustrations that leave no doubt about the procedure to be followed. The thousands of dogs all over the country that have been trained by these methods attest to the correctness of the theories. Such training gives something over and above the routine of obedience tests, as it forms the dog's character. Every dog with training is a more amusing companion, and a pleasure to his owner. Mr. H. YOUR CO-OPERATION PLEASE!

During the past few years the *Canadian National Live Stock Records* office at Ottawa has experienced difficulty in providing its pre-war standard of service. This has been largely brought about by its inability to maintain a staff sufficient in numbers and experience to handle the ever-increasing amount of business it is now being called upon to transact.

Despite this condition, however, the *service would be materially improved* were it not for one other factor which has assumed serious proportions. It is estimated that *nearly 40% of the applications reaching the Live Stock Records office carry either insufficient or faulty information.* During the month of March 3,406 letters were written to obtain corrections on applications, fees, etc., occupying nearly the full time of four stenographers. With very little imagination we can all visualize the effect this extra and unnecessary labour has on costs and better service.

A study of the wide variety of errors which have necessitated correspondence indicates that with the *co-operation of all interested parties* the number of letters required in dealing with incomplete or incorrect applications would be materially reduced, thus *reducing costs and affording a much improved service.*

At the direction of the Board of Directors, this appeal for your co-operation is made, and you can greatly assist to combat this deterrent to better service by seeing to it that:

- Each application contains *all* the required information;
- The *information and signatures* provided are *correct*;
- Sufficient fees* accompany all applications.

May we count on your assistance? Thank you.

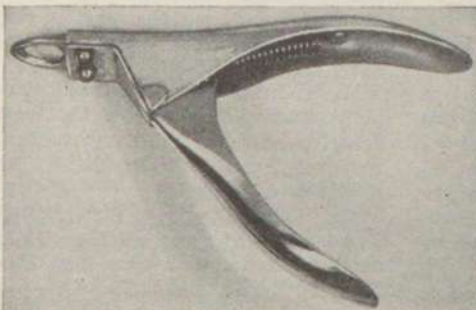

POISONERS ACTIVE AGAIN!

The many cases of dog-poisoning in Western Canada are causing anxiety among dog owners and dog lovers who are at a loss to know how to successfully combat the scourge. Detection is difficult, and conviction more so as it is so easy to take a piece of poisoned meat out of a pocket and drop it where some dog or cat can pick it up.

Several dogs have been saved by prompt attention by a veterinary surgeon; several have died, and many losses are probably unreported; meanwhile new cases turn up from day to day.

In every case where an analysis of either some meat found, or the contents of the stomach has been made, strychnine was used, and that is easily obtainable at this time of year when so much is bought for gopher-bait, and though the purchaser has to sign for it much of it is carelessly left in barns and shed to be picked up by anyone about the farm.

There seems to be but one section in the Criminal Code under which dog-poisoning may be punished, which is under the head of cruelty to Animals with a penalty of from \$5.00 to \$500 fine, a maximum of one year in jail, or both fine and imprisonment. Many dog owners think thrashing should be added.

Many dogs have been poisoned in Calgary; Medicine Hat reports the loss of at least eighteen dogs and several cats, and an unconfirmed advice from Gull Lake, Sask. claims that out of a dog population of about fifty, less than a dozen remain alive.

Editor's Note: Various dog organizations in the United States have adopted a means of combatting dog poisoners, which is likely to prove effective. They have offered rewards leading to the conviction of dog poisoners. Very often suspicions are strong, in a neighbourhood, but few people like to come forward without some strong inducement. The type of person who would poison a dog is not the type of person who is nice to know.

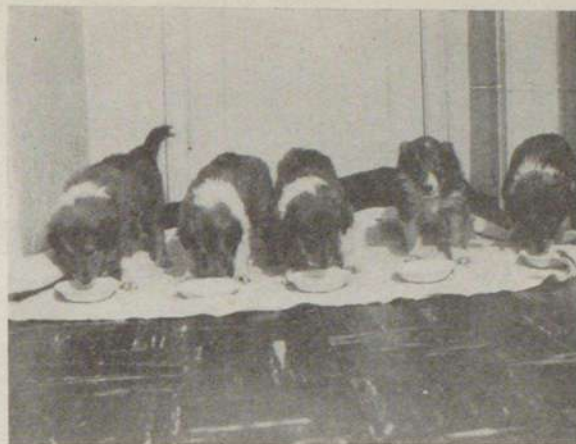

Schelderf, D.S.O., M.C. and Bar, of Victoria. The day Wallace came home, being on duty with the C.R.C. corps, I was able to see the landing and ovation given our regiment and their mascot. He lined up like a veteran, took his place in the front line, and moved majestically with the Scottish on their march past, up the C.P.R. ramp and down the street to the reviewing base, where our Lieutenant-Governor, W. C. Woodward and military dignitaries awaited them. The next of kin of the regiment then proceeded with their loved ones to the armouries where a sumptuous banquet was served. One man, more than any other, was excited beyond words to greet Wallace. He was "wee Andy McGregor, Wallace's trainer, and friend. Their reunion taunched

the hearts of all who saw it. Wallace's ramblings are over; and he can eat, sleep, dream doggy dreams of his beloved regiment and the skirl of the pipes he so loved.

The shows held in April by the Victoria City Kennel Club, although a thing of the past, would provide interest to many who could not attend on account of the distance, so I will just give a few of the highlights. The judge for the all-breed was Mr. Anton Korbel of Belmont, California, and the Specialty Cocker Spaniel was judged by Joseph Dodds of Vancouver. No words of mine are needed regarding the abilities of either, both having judged in most parts of Canada and the U.S.A. There was a good entry, 291—and I understand that the Queen Alexander Solarium for Crippled Children will benefit by approximately five hundred dollars. I also understand the judge made a sizeable donation to the worthy cause. We surely thank all those who in any way contributed to our Island Solarium, and to those children who need our help so much.

Mr. Korbel found his B.I. Show in a lovely German Shepherd, Judy of Northmere, owned by Mr. C. Lonsdale of Shawnigan Lake. She was bred by the well-known Alex Gooderham, Toronto, Ontario, and claims as her sire Bell of

liable dog, came in third, to keep our visitors from sweeping the stake. There were ample birds, and all dogs showed on game. Another point of interest here, we thought, was the fact that the first place dog Bingo is in pup (four weeks) to the second place dog Jerry.

In the Derby Stake, we also had a high class field of dogs. Hillbright Dan's Sport, Setter, owned by N. Striker, handled by C. 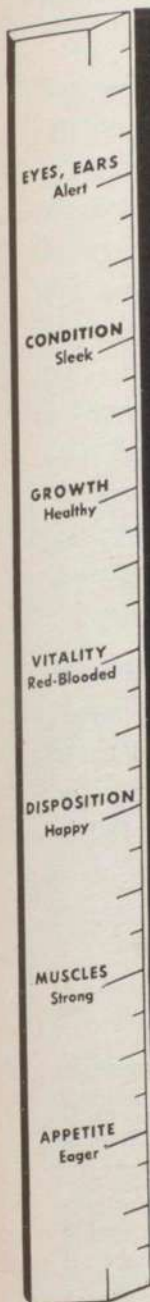

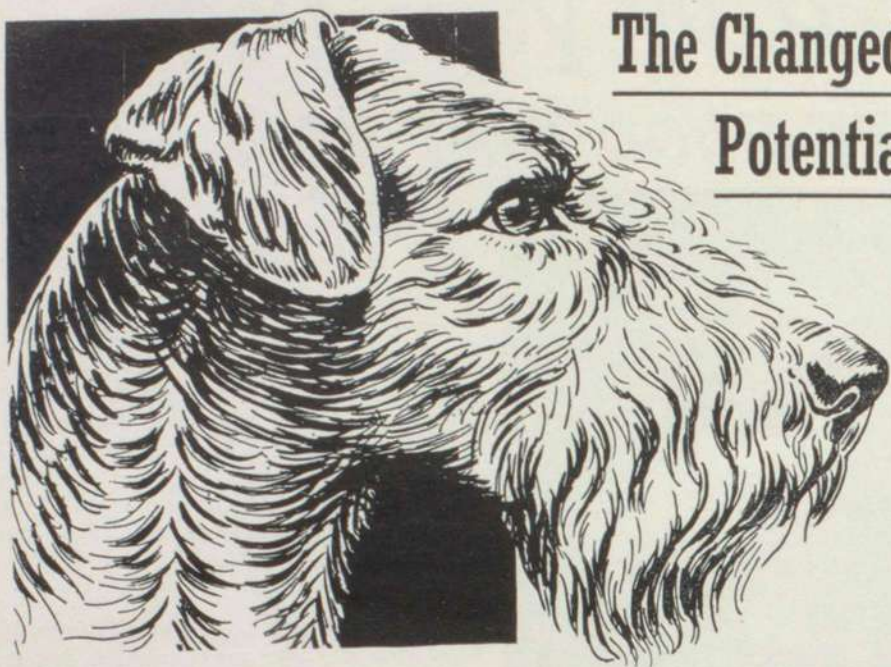
