I have already reserved service for Marla, who is a beautiful blue belton with the same feathering as Rummey Sam to Jack Thorndyke's imported blue stud Silver Mine Echo."

Mr. Tom Grimshaw, Shawhaven Kennels Port Arthur, writes:

"Our shows went over pretty well, with about 125 entries, and such notables here as Ted Ward, Mac Bell, Paddy Boughs, Geo. Kynoch, Pat Randall, Mrs. Wade, Alf Loveridge, Miss Dagger, Mrs. C. Smith and other Easterners and westerners. The Scottie handled by Ted Ward went Best in Show at both shows. This has been our biggest show since our young club started up, and we hope it will continue to grow."

OUR COVER DOG

On the cover of this issue is a photo of the thirteen month old orange Belton, English Setter, "Nancy Girl", from Jack S. Thorndyke, Jr.'s *Lucky Strike Kennels*.

Nancy was bred by Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred S. Kennedy at Kendare Farms near Walled Lake, Michigan, and was imported into Canada as a seven week old puppy.

Her pedigree is marked with many greats of Setterdom from the Stagboro, Jagersbo, Maridor and Delwed Kennels. Her dam, Kendare Penelope, best of opposite sex winner at the 1944 Westminster Show, is by Int. Ch. Maro of Maridor, who holds the world's record for the greatest number of best in show awards. Her sire, Sir Guy's Stag of Five Mile, now a Canadian Champion, and placing in the open class at this year's Westminster Show, is by American Champion Sir Guy of Delwed, a runner-up for the record held by Maro.

We have a letter from Mrs. F. Y. McEachern recounting the remarkable wins of Kenmare Masterpiece, otherwise known as Danny. We quote Mrs. McEachern's letters:

"While visiting in Vancouver, I heard rumours of two very special dog shows, sponsored by the Victoria Kennel Club. They had every wish to make their two shows (held in Stanley Park) a great success. I wired Ted Ward who had just finished the Maritime circuit to come and show Danny. Ted did. It's a case of 'veni, vidi, vici'. Masterpiece, beautifully handled went to Best in Shows under Trullinger and Rost. (Eastern judges flown out to Vancouver). So with the magnificent ribbons and trophies, plus excellent management, flowers everywhere, the two shows were outstanding. We also attended the Saskatoon Show. Alf Loveridge judging, Danny again went Best in Show. Then we went on to Regina. (All of this in the heat up to 105!!) The two shows there were judged by Mrs. Enno Meyer and Mr. Semple. Again Danny went Best in Show twice. Making five Best in Shows in one day under two weeks. It was also a record for Ted Ward. In five weeks, from Coast to Coast, he had ten shows, with nine Best in Shows. Three of these were with my sister's wire and five with Danny.

I also played golf in Calgary between train times with Paddy Arnold, the Alberta Champion. Then I played also at Saskatoon. Then at Regina I played several times with Mrs. Robbins, (a charming Belgian, the wife of the Hotel Saskatchewan's manager). She is the Saskatchewan champion. So all in all, I had a most interesting time. Mr. Pym, at Regina very kindly gave us space for the dogs. There were five days between Saskatoon and Regina shows. I've had a picture taken of the amazing array of ribbons and trophies that Danny won at the five shows. I'll send you one when I get them. "Banff is a glorious spot for a holiday".

AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB TO RECOGNIZE ENGLISH COCKER AS A SEPARATE BREED

The English Cocker Spaniel henceforth will be a breed sufficient unto itself, completely divorced from the American-type. The board of directors of the American Kennel Club decided at its meeting recently to recognize the English Cocker as a separate breed, the ruling to go into effect September 1st.

The move means that English-type winners will receive formal Best of Breed ranking instead of Best of Variety as hitherto. It is hoped that the decision will remove a cause of irritation and has the blessings of both American-type and English type Cocker fanciers. It was approved by the American Spaniel Club, parent club for Cockers as well as other Spaniel breeds, and by the English Cocker Spaniel Club of America and the English Spaniel Breeders Association.

MORE ABOUT "INBREEDING"

Mrs. Agnes L. Wilkie of Victoria, B.C. writes apropos of a recent editorial concerning this book:

"I quite agree with all you say pertaining to the subject. The Dutch Keeshond has been my particular field of work and study. The method of buying dogs in Europe higgly-piggly and breeding them in England in the same manner, crossing to continued different lines instead of really working with three or four lines in one's own kennel, has not brought this lovely medium sized breed forward to a good uniformity.

"The same is true of the breed in the U.S.A. Odd specimens were purchased for their beauty, then mixed and crossed just as sales to different parts scattered them. It was the well-known breeder and judge, Mr. W. H. Pym who confirmed my own conclusion that continued remote outcrosses did not arrive at a satisfactory objective. It was pleasant to get still another breeder who found this to be true."

Mr. Max Schmitt of Timmins writes that he imported a red fawn male Boxer from New Mexico, the son of Champion Cobang of Sirrah Crest, who, he says, at the 1946 Morris and Essex Show in New Jersey was Best of Breed.

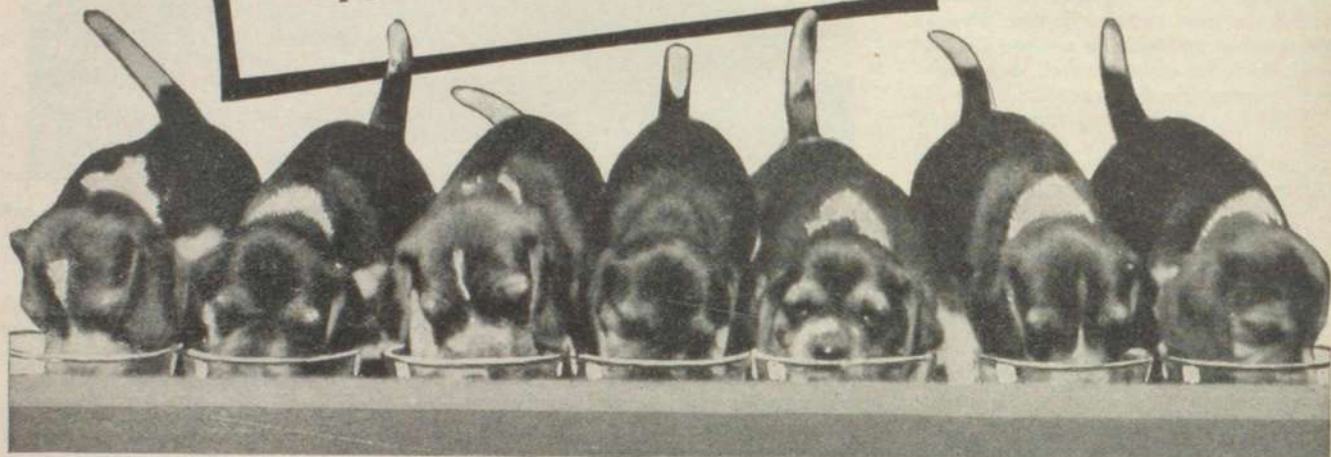

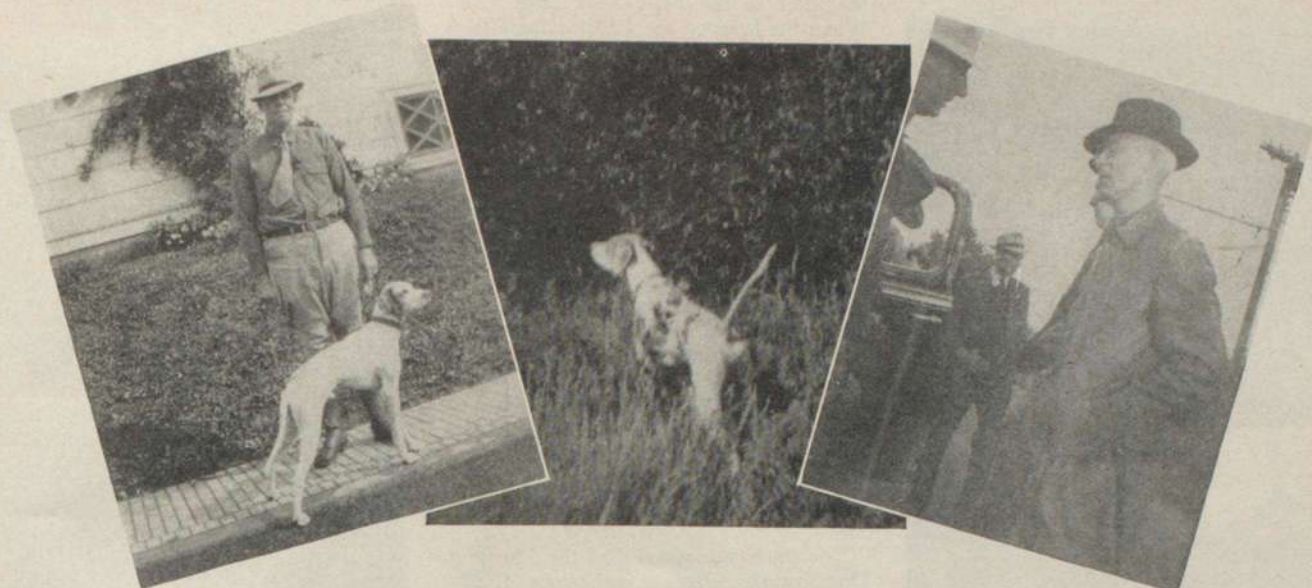

courses in October, 1926. Harry D. Kirkover, of Camden, S.C., and Eggertsville, N.Y., incumbent chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Pheasant Championship Club, has been a prime mover in the establishment of the stake, he was president of the affiliated units, and served as one of the judges at the initial running. The other judges were the veteran Fred J. Brooks, of Hadlyme, Conn., and Tracy S. Comstock of Thomasville, N.C.

Dan Woolton's Dauntless, the much-talked-about Pointer owned by the colorful Jack Dunn, of Baltimore Orioles fame, was awarded the title in a field of 15 English Setters and 11 Pointers. Dauntless was a development of Webster Price, who won major laurels with the dog, but in the Pheasant Championship the Dunn Pointer was piloted by Curtis Thompson, who also handled others of the Jack Dunn string.

In 1927, Village Girl, belonging to Harry K. Crandall, of Athens, Pa., annexed the title. She was later to become the dame of several celebrated pheasant performers, including Double National Pheasant Champion Village Boy, who today ranks as the leading all-time Pointer sire with respect to number of winners produced. He is, however, being stoutly challenged by his phenomenal son, Spunky Creek Boy, who if spared at stud another season, may gain premier ranking.

In the Pheasant Championship, it has always being optional with the judges whether the title be bestowed or withheld. In 1928, the title was withheld at the discretion of Judges George R. Harris, P. K. Phillips and Fred J. Brooks, established a precedent, for on four occasions in the history of the stake the judiciary has elected to withhold the Championship, in which case the event reverted to the status of an all-age with three dogs being placed, or to a winners' stake, with two performers named to share the prize.

In 1930, the Championship was taken over by a single club rather than the several clubs who had been associated in the promotion of the titular event. The

National Pheasant Championship Club came into existence under propitious circumstances and flourished for about a decade. However, with the demise of two of the moving spirits, Harry K. Crandall and Fred A. Miller, the affairs of the Club were at a rather low ebb, but the indefatigable Roy St. Clair Johnson, of Buffalo adopted heroic measures to save the day. He rallied to the cause outstanding sportsmen of the country and since the reorganization in 1939, the National Pheasant Championship Club, in a manner of speaking, has been in clover.

We can remember in the 1920's, when pheasant trials were in relative infancy, how "standards of performances" were being phrased. Indeed, we wrote quite a bit about what to expect of a good ringneck dog, although realizing the difficulty and shortcomings of trying to reduce to words on paper what constituted excellent performance in the variety of scent situations and game handling problems that were sure to be encountered. Back in the '20's, the opinion had gradually arisen among pheasant hunters that a good ringneck dog was different in his methods from the ruffed grouse or quail dog. But it was not to be concluded that *per se* the high-class quail or prairie chicken dog would not prove a performer of merit on pheasants. It was agreed that it was in the manner of negotiating the terrain and hunting the country wherein the difference lay, for where the quail dog may quickly and thoroughly wind the likely cover and thus "hunt" a wide area, the pheasant lurks in practically every kind of cover, even the sparse meadows, and the sagacious bird dog must needs adapt himself accordingly and hunt the fields with precision. There are no particularly birdy places in cover of the character found near Buffalo, for ringnecks are practically everywhere on the grounds. It follows, therefore, that the pheasant dog cannot race past unlikely fields like the quail dog, nor is to be desired that the pheasant dog be restricted in range and quarter his ground mechanically, or resembling the pattern of the ruffed grouse dog in the

brush. The pheasant performer must be a classy individual, with speed, snap, style and range, a choke-bore nose, an accurate and positive sense of location. The slow potterer and grass prowler that creepingly nosed about on foot scent has been consigned to the discard by pheasant hunters "in on the know". The fast, dashing, decisive bird-finder is being glorified, for such a dog has the magical faculty of wielding a hypnotic influence over these sprinters of the stubble, and a dog with intelligence and decision apparently mesmerizes them into laying.

The series of pheasant classics at Buffalo this coming October is shaping up as perhaps the most successful in the history of ringneck trials. Roy S. Johnson, *generilissimo* of the field trial forces at Buffalo, Secretary of the National Pheasant Championship Club, expert in pheasant management, and peerless marshal of the trials, is optimistic about prospects. "Conditions of the trio of ringneck classics this year should be well night ideal," opined Mr. Johnson. "Good dogs and expert handlers from all parts of the country will be in competition."

The National Amateur Pheasant Championship, under the auspices of the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America, is scheduled to open the Buffalo program, commencing on Tuesday, October 8. To be eligible for competition, a dog must previously have placed in a licensed trial of a member club of the Amateur Association. Heats are of one hour. Trophies are awarded; no cash purse. The Amateur Pheasant Championship has been run various places, but the most successful events, in the opinion of many, have been staged over the grounds of the Buffalo Trap and Field Club, situated in Tonawanda, N.Y.

Beginning on Friday, October 11, the thirteenth renewal of the blue ribbon American Field Pheasant Dog Futurity will hold the limelight. This fixture, launched in 1932, with the inaugural run at Buffalo in October, 1934, has in the short span of a little more than a decade become one of the outstanding bird dog

events of the country. The ringneck event was patterned after its sister stake, the American Field Quail Futurity, which was established in 1903. Conditions are known to most bird dog fanciers, but it might be well to summarize the regulations governing the Pheasant Futurity.

Conducted by the American Field Publishing Company, 222 West Adams Street, Chicago 6, Ill., the Pheasant Dog Futurity opens to nomination of bitches October 30 of each year. It is required that a bitch be nominated within 30 days of the date of mating—before there is any real assurance that a litter will be whelped—and a forfeit fee is paid at that time. Thirty days after the litter has been whelped, the nomination must be completed with payment of the second forfeit fee and enrolment of

the litter in the *Field Dog Stud Book*. When the breeder has fulfilled these conditions, all puppies in the litter are eligible for entry. The litters whelped by all dams nominated must be born on or after January 1 of the year preceding the actual running of the stake in October. Nominations for a particular renewal of the Futurity remain open from October 30 to July 1 of the year following.

Entries in the Pheasant Dog Futurity close on July 15. Puppies from eligible matings must be named individually on or before that date. It is also required that a prospective starter be registered in the *Field Dog Stud Book*. From the list of entries come the actual starters, who are named the night before the start of the stake, just prior to the drawing. These contenders are "Derbies", i.e., whelped on or after January 1 of the preceding year.

The thirteenth renewal of the Pheasant Dog Futurity offers a cash purse of \$2,500.00. This is divided between the owners and the breeders of the placed dogs. Three places are awarded. The owners' portion of the purse, \$1,500.00, is divided \$750.00 to the owner of the winning dog, \$450.00 to the owner of the dog placed second, and \$300.00 to the owner of third-place dog. Incidentally, usually the handlers of the winning dogs retain the prize money.

The breeders' share, \$1,000.00, is also divided on the 50-30-20 basis, \$500 to first, \$300 to second and \$200 to third. These amounts go to the breeder of the litter, the person who originally nominated the dam. It is readily apparent that the chance to share in the cash purse is real incentive for breeders, owners, and handlers, in addition to the prestige that comes with a win in this classic.

Pointers have dominated the winners' circles in the Pheasant Futurity so far, although Setters have accounted for some of the lesser places and it has been apparent in more recent seasons that the long-hair are now more than ever ready to bid for premier laurels.

A record number of nominations was completed for the Thirteenth Pheasant Dog Futurity, a splendid list of individual dogs entered as of the July 15 date, and the management of the stake confidently anticipates one of the most stellar fields in the history of the event. The Futurity features thirty-minute heats. The record for starters stands at fifty, but it may be that this mark will be surpassed when the contenders are all named by next October 10. Judges for the Futurity running will be Henry J. Banks, of Guerryton, Alabama, and John S. Applegate, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, both of whom are well and favorably known. Mr. Banks has judged the leading fixtures in all parts of the country, from the prairies of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, to the palmetto groves of Florida. Mr. Applegate, President of the National Pheasant Championship Club, owner of Caviar, Pointer winner of the Grand National Grouse Championship Inaugural, is a thorough sportsman, deservedly popular in the field trial fraternity.

The star-studded Buffalo Pheasant

Trials will close with the 1946 running of the National Pheasant Championship, carded to begin on Monday, October 14. This classic is for contenders of any age who have previously qualified by winning a place in a trial recognized by *The American Field* and recorded in the *Field Dog Stud Book*. The stake has been in existence since 1926, as previously mentioned, and today ranks with time-honoured bird dog championships on other species of upland game. Last year, in 1945, a record field of 34 competed and a cash purse of \$1,000.00 was awarded, in addition to handsome sterling silver trophies. It is expected that new records will be set this season.

While at the time of this writing it is not possible to name definitely the dogs that will be in competition for the ringneck crown, it may be taken for granted

that many of the best field trial performers on the continent will be striving for the title, dogs that have won laurels on prairie chickens and quail, as well as in prior pheasant events. Chances are that Tyson, the 1945 winner, will be back in the effort to duplicate the sparkling triumph he scored last year. Other seasoned pheasant trial performers and last year's Derby stars will be on hand for the attractive 1946 running.

It might be interpolated that additional details in connection with the series of pheasant trials at Buffalo can be obtained from Roy S. Johnson, 1010 Kenmore Avenue, Buffalo, 17, N.Y. It is of interest, too, to say that the Ontario Bird Dog Association will sponsor big-time pheasant trials following the Buffalo events. The Ontario program with alluring cash purses is scheduled to be held at Fort Erie, commencing on October 18. Particulars concerning the Ontario pheasant trials may be secured by addressing Neil Stryker, 7 Woodland Place, London, Ontario.

There is a strong desire to recount some of the thrilling performances witnessed in previous renewals of the National Pheasant Championship, but space is getting short. The accompanying tabulation gives pertinent data pertaining to each winner. It is notable that Village Boy and Tarheelia's Lucky Strike are the only double winners of the title. Rumson Farm Loch ranks as the only setter to have annexed the crown. Harry E. McGonigal of Kokomo, Indiana, leads all owners; he has won the stake three times with three dogs—Amazon's Village girl (litter mate to Spunky Creek Boy, by the way), the immortal Titan ((a son of Spunky Creek Boy), and Tyson, scion of Titan. W. Dewey English, well known professional handler of High Point, N.C., tops the list of trainers with three triumphs in the classic.

It is a foregone conclusion that there will be countless thrills for the lover of the class bird dog during the series of Pheasant trials at Buffalo and the events at Fort Erie. The management of the various stakes extend a cordial invitation to all readers to attend these ring-neck classics—to enjoy a full week of competition where pheasants are plentiful and the dogs are really good!

This unretouched photograph shows very clearly the required flatness over and between the eyes, flat skull, straight, full, rounded foreface, and straight line effect of the topline. Study the eye—it is just about perfect. Note its expression—dark colour, elliptical shape, and how it is set into the top side of the head. This photograph is a very daring one because it is a direct profile.



The acid test of any Collie's head is to make a photographic exposure of it at a dead profile. Again note flatness over eyes and marvellous straight profile (topline) with slight stop. Note that length of skull (partly hidden by ear) from front of eye to occipital bone is equal to length of foreface from front of eye to end of nose. This is correct. The ear carriage, size of ears and placement are nearly perfect here. Both photos are generally correct.

WHEN JUDGING COLLIES

By W. G. HASSELL

Since my last article was published in *Dogs in Canada* I have been to quite a number of dog shows, talked to a large number of breeders and exhibitors, and carefully noted the work of a number of judges.

I am of the opinion that no All-Breed or Group Judge can judge Collies as well as a specialist who has devoted his studies and experience to Collie alone; this, of course, with intelligence, ability and experience reasonably on a par.

To really appreciate the finest and most delicate points in any breed takes ability, intelligence, and years of ACTUAL AND PERSONAL EXPERIENCE—coupled with intense interest in that breed. This is exemplified in our great specialty judges.

No judge is truly great who plays politics. To be truly great he *must* be strictly honest and judge *only* the DOG. I think the majority of breeders, exhibitors and judges agree with me in this.

We *must* have dog shows; we cannot have an outstanding specialty judge for every breed. Most all-round judges insist on soundness, and the majority have a good general idea of type . . . this is all to the good. I for one having had sufficient confidence in a judge to show under him, will accept his ruling without criticism. I can forgive an error or lack of knowledge and experience, but I cannot

forgive a judge for playing politics or otherwise being dishonest.

Some time ago I received from U.S. a report of a meeting of judges, held to try to determine what is wrong with dog-judging. The meeting decided that one of the chief causes of dissatisfaction with judging is badly or loosely worded standards.

Now the gentlemen who were responsible for drawing up the original Collie standard were unquestionably geni at knowing what a true Collie should be—but they were *not* geni at explaining themselves in plain English.

Those of us who really know what these extremely clever Collie men were driving at do not realize that hundreds—even thousands—do *not* understand, and never will, unless it is clearly and fully explained. Even then some never get it.

Collie breeders and those who judge Collies should never rest until they REALLY UNDERSTAND the Collie standard. That is a bigger thing than many realize.

There is one point where more judges and breeders go wrong than at any other. I have seen it time and again and have come to the conclusion that comparatively few understand it. First let me quote from the standard: "There being *no brow* in which to set the eyes, they are necessarily placed obliquely the upper portion of the muzzle being dropped or chiselled to give them the necessary forward outlook" unquote. May I emphasize with all the power at my command certain words from the above quotations: "There being *no brow*

. . . placed obliquely . . . "The upper portion of the muzzle being *dropped*.

The cheek does NOT bulge; the brow does NOT rise; neither does the skull rise to make room for the eyes. They are set obliquely into the top side of the head without disturbing the gradual backward sweep of the WEDGE SHAPE of the head—which very surely should give an effect of a straight line, both sides and top. The SKULL should be FLAT. It should NOT rise between and over the eyes. It should be FLAT from side to side and front to rear. The foreface is dropped and rounded—this forms the "stop", which should be definitely there, but so slight as to be scarcely discernable and carry out the straight line effect of the "topline" of the head. Also the sides of the head from front to rear should create a straight line effect into which the eye is set as a slit. In other words the straight line of the top of the foreface, while slightly lower than the top of the skull, MUST be parallel to it.

I have carefully described the true Collie eyes, ears, and foreface in a previous article, so will leave you to digest the above. If you get it, you will be really on the road to understanding what the true Collie head should be. In my next article I will carefully go into the true Collie coat.

A high quality head is absolutely essential to a high quality Collie. Knowing that a verbal explanation is made clearer by a picture, I made these photographs of my dog Alandale Parader to illustrate the above article.

INTERNATIONAL KENNEL CLUB OF CHICAGO

After a war-time lapse of four years, the "Victory" International Kennel Club of Chicago All-Breed Dog Show will be held in Chicago October 19 and 20.

Prior to the war, this show ranked second in size among all indoor shows in the country.

It will again be held in the International Amphitheatre—one of the country's finest exhibition buildings that was the setting for this well known fixture from 1938 through 1942, the last show. The Army took over the International Amphitheatre shortly after the last Dog Show was held there in 1942 and has only recently returned the building to its owners.

Seven Specialty Shows are scheduled to be held in connection with the International Show; and the Wire Fox Terrier

Club of the Atlantic Coast and Midwest will hold its first Specialty in the International Amphitheatre on Friday, October 18—the day before the International opens, according to Mrs. T. H. Carruthers III, of Glendale, Ohio, President of the Club.

The seven Specialties that will be held at the International are the German Shepherd Dog Club of the Great Lakes, The Great Lakes Boxer Club, the Dachund Club of the Great Lakes, the Samoyede Club of America, the Central States Staffordshire Club, the Coonhound Club of America's first Specialty, and the Miniature Pinscher Club of America.

Indoor Field Trials, wherein the dogs will compete in water and under field conditions, were a popular feature of pre-war International shows. They will be repeated. An entire wing of the Amphitheatre—50,000 square feet—will be utilized for

these exhibitions and bleacher seats provided for spectators.

A similar wing of the building will be used exclusively for the Obedience Trial Classes. At its last two shows—in 1942 and 1941—the International Club set new national records up to that time in the size of its Obedience entry.

Officers of the Club are Arthur G. Leonard, Chairman; Mrs. C. Groverman Ellis, President; J. W. Austin, Treasurer; and W. E. Ogilvie, Secretary. The Club maintains year around office headquarters at 840 Exchange Avenue, Chicago, 9, Illinois.

HOW 148 COCKERITES VOTED ON CHANGES IN COCKER STANDARD

Mr. Bruce McRae thoughtfully requested that the following item from "Dog World" be reprinted for the benefit of Cocker breeders in Canada:

The post cards pertaining to Standard Revision sent out have been returned to the number of 148 as of April 18th, with the following results:

In favour of new variety (black and tan)—Yes 59. No. 89.

Desire disqualifying clause—Yes 81. No. 24.

Clause based on height—43, weight—21; both—59.

Every worth-while breeder in the country answered and signed his card.

What is more pertinent than the above tabulation is the many letters that came, such as from the gentleman who had his first litter in 1880 to the lady who will do so next year. Most of these indicate a distinct desire on the writer's part for the American Spaniel Club to act as a parent club should, to adjudicate on argumentative matters pertaining to the Cocker Spaniel.

They have a feeling of loyalty but do not want to be let down, but as one stated, and I quote, "Any member club of the A.K.C. can petition for a hearing when there seems justifiable cause, and putting essential restrictions in the standard seems to demand immediate attention."

Many letters received criticized the writer for not mentioning a minimum weight or height disqualification, as well as maximum. This point is well taken, and at the time of my last article it seemed obvious. However, a minimum with exceptions for puppies is as imperative as a maximum.

It is surprising how many seem to feel that the A.S.C. should fit the standard to the dog and not the dog to the standard. They mention figures for height and weight that are obviously those of their own dogs.

More cards are arriving and a note of them will be made in the next issue. In the meantime, it seems logical to suggest

that various members of the A.S.C. suggest to their zone representative that "Time's awastin'."—Joseph E. Redden, President C.S. Club of New England; in the club's monthly *The New Eng. Cocker Breeder*, edited by Mrs. Ellen Jane Siegars, P.O., Box 26, So. Sudbury, Mass.

"WE CRAZY PEOPLE"

Some years ago at the Garden in New York, an old-timer and I were discussing things that happen at dog shows. He had a lot of things to tell of his many experiences. At that time I discounted some of his tall tales as they were too fantastic to believe. With the passing years I too have seen many strange things happen at dog shows that make me believe the words I once heard from a wise old man that the dog people were the "nicest, craziest, people in all the world".

At the last Royal Winter Fair, I saw a large somewhat pompous looking man running frantically up and down outside the ring as his dog was being judged. He was perspiring quite freely and very red in the face. In one hand he had a handkerchief to mop his face, in the other hand a large set of keys was jingling merrily in the air to attract his dog's attention in the ring, but the jingling and strenuous efforts of the owner was a wasted effort. The disappointment of his little dog losing a coveted honour was a tragedy to this giant of the business world. This jingling of keys to attract our favourite's attention is but one of the many sounds heard at the ringside. For instance, we have the cunning little noiseless whistle favoured by many, this little masterpiece works miracles with the dog if he is not otherwise occupied. Sometimes our competitors think we are very unsportsman like blowing whistles at the critical moment to attract our dog. They think their own

private coughing signals are much more effective in a difficult situation. I have tried both methods, and found that continued coughing is not only undignified, but very hard on the vocal cords. The coughing attacks the exhibitors suffer from are usually caused by the hot air we listen to before the judging combined with the cold sweat we get ourselves into before the judge's final decision. To the musical mind these coughing sounds would be amazing. They completely cover the vocal scale. They range from the deep base of the barber shop quartette to the shrill falsetto of the soprano giving a farewell performance. These weird noises must be confusing to our dogs as they prance gaily around the ring. Then we have the exhibitor that hides coyly behind the post calling to his dog in a "low" whisper heard barely twenty feet away, this is really a sight to see his head bobs here and there around the post.

In the showing of dogs the poor hard working judging fraternity usually suffer much abuse in our private thoughts. It is surprising to some of us how little the judges know about dogs unless we win. We think that after judging dogs for twenty-five or thirty years he should be able to see that our dog is the perfect specimen of the breed. Poor fellows, as they enter the show in the morning, everyone is their friend. As they wend their way home at night, alas, they have but one friend left—the man who went Best in Show.

The joys and sorrows of showing dogs

are many. Our joys are in winning high honours with a favourite dog, and in cementing new friendships. Our sorrows are the broken friendship caused by the envy of trusted people who place a ribbon won at a dog show at higher value than the faith and trust of their friends.

It is all these things that make us wander here and there like nomads of the desert, and the "nicest, craziest people in the world."

The members present reported a great number of foxes in the district this year, and stated there were a lot of young dogs among the members that will be in top form by November 1st, 1946.

Mr. Frank Sisty reported that he re-

ALBERTA NOTES

By H. P. Saunders

Five thousand five hundred and forty-two Pheasant Chicks let loose in the Province of Alberta!

Alberta's grain fields and wooded valleys were the scene of a large scale immigration of wild life during the last two weeks of July.

Distributed by the Provincial Government in conjunction with the Alberta Fish and Game Association, 5542 Pheasant Chicks from eight to ten weeks old, were let loose in various parts of the province. This distribution marks the largest number of Pheasants ever to be placed out in the province.

In addition 1,035 day-old Chicks have been sent to various groups for raising until they are ready to be turned loose in the fields. For the first time in several years, however, no Pheasant eggs were distributed to groups or individuals for setting and hatching purposes.

The Pheasant Chicks were raised at the Brooks game rearing farm and were expressed by train, truck and plane to fish and game groups from as far north as Peace and Athabaska River to the Crows Nest Pass and Taber in the south.

Of 7,120 Chicks hatched at the rearing farm, a total of 6,577 lived. This is considered a very good average by the officials.

Few casualties were reported in the shipping and out of 90 birds sent to Peace River by air, only seven failed to survive the trip. The day-old Chicks which were sent out because the brooders at the farm were filled to capacity and are being reared by the Saskatchewan Fish and Game Association, the Calgary Fish and Game Association, and the Cypress Hill Forest Ranger. The Calgary Association also distributed 280 of the older Chicks.

Responsibility for the successful venture is largely due to the efforts of the Alberta Fish and Game Association's bird raising committee headed by G. E. Watt, Calgary, with J. K. Webb, Turner Valley, and J. A. McGhee, Brooks, Alberta.

The history of the Ringneck Pheasant in Alberta started in 1903 when 75 were brought in and planted in the Midnapore district by Fred Green and Austin deB. Winter, K.C., of Calgary, and their associates.

In 1911 another shipment of 75 Cocks and fifty Hens were brought in from Yardley, Pennsylvania, and were distributed around Rosebud Creek. These

spread and increased so rapidly that by 1913 the government had to grant permission to the residents of the Bragg Creek district to reduce the number of Cocks found in the area.

The Medicine Hat Fish and Game Association took the first big step in the introduction of birds in the south by planting \$400 worth in the Cypress Hills area in 1929 and 1930.

In 1927, the Calgary Association had acquired 600 Pheasants from Carl Binder, Silverton, Oregon, and a short time later distributed an additional number of the eighteen hundred. About this time the late A. E. Cross, of Calgary, also put out a considerable number of the birds at his own expense.

Since the early 1930's, Pheasants have been distributed yearly to various parts of the province by interested sportsmen.

In 1945 2,602 eight-weeks-old Pheasants and 5,000 day-old Chicks were planted by the Alberta Association and in 1944, 2,910 day-old Chicks and 11,570 were distributed.

So well has the Pheasant accustomed itself to the Alberta climate that it has now become one of the principal Upland game birds. Although the government is assisting in this work, the real credit for

there was an old soldier and he had a the introduction of this fine bird to Alberta goes to the sportsmen who out of their own pocket, first brought them to Alberta.

Now Mister Retriever man you should do your part to see that the game laws of our fair province are upheld, so train your dogs to locate every wounded and runner bird so that none will be wasted. and when your bag limit is reached fold up your equipment call the dog and hit for home and give others their fair chance.

The game laws will soon be amended so that it will be compulsory for every hunter of Upland game birds to take along a Retriever and I mean a dog well broke to locate and Retrieve every wounded bird, so govern yourself accordingly.

Mr. Thos. Webber of Ponoka, Alberta, has decided to really get going with Retrievers. He has purchased a Golden Retriever named Fair Haven Judy and her sister, Fairhaven Lady. These females are now nine months old and are sired by Ch. Gilnockie Bingo, their dam is Sally Ann of Roedare, and they are both good for Show and are really bred for Retriever Trials. He next purchased a black Labrador bitch, Flush of Avondale, in whelp to Imp. L'lle Larry, and she is due to whelp in August, and now he has also bought a young male four months old by Golden Pal ex Fogelvick Goldie of Roedare. All these will be shown at the forthcoming shows and will also enter the various Retriever Trials so watch Thomas Webber and may he go to the very top with his dogs!

Medicine Hat has engaged Hughie Allan, of Winnipeg, to do All Breeds at their forthcoming show.

Calgary has the renowned Sandy Forbes judging All Breeds and Edmonton has Bishop Wyn Vic Williams judging All Breeds at their show, so get out all the entries you possibly can and support the Alberta Shows. The judges are high calibre and are worthy of your support.

Corporal Henderson has been transferred to Edmonton, Alberta.

E. P. Tuson, of Edmonton, Alberta, reports the death of his outstanding English Bull Dog, Mickey Doolan, which he had imported from the Old Country. E. KERRIES IN BRITAIN TODAY

By Captain Gladys Peers

The following impressions gained during my five years of army life which has failed to lessen my admiration for that grand breed, the Kerry Blue Terrier, will I hope be of interest to all Canadian fanciers, for now that I am back in Canada—and does it look good to me!—expecting to be out of the C.W.A.C. any day, I find I am as keenly interested in these dogs as when I had my Tralee Kennels at New Westminster, B.C.

I was lucky enough to be sent overseas, and during the time I was in the Old Country endeavoured to visit as many Kerry Kennels and to see as many of the British winning Kerries of to-day as possible. The warm hearted welcome given to me by all Kerry fanciers with whom I came in contact made this an extremely pleasant task.

It was a real piece of luck that I was able to attend both the first post-war Kerry Specialty Show and the first post-war Championship Show as well as quite a number of All Breed Shows and in this way obtain a really comprehensive picture of the standard of Kerries in Britain at this time.

The 25 mile radius imposed during the war was lifted for the Open Breed Show, as it was called, held on September 29th, 1945, at the Holborn Hall, London, so that there was a splendid entry from all parts of the U.K. Unfortunately I arrived a little late and as this was an unbenched show (benching being practically unobtainable) and held in limited space, it was rather difficult for me to see the dogs properly or go over any of them. The kindness extended to me, however, by Mr. Woodly, Hon. Show Secretary; Mrs. Barlow, Chairman of the Kerry Blue Terrier Club, of England and many others whose names I did not get, also the fact that Mrs. K. E. Dunlop, who was judging well over 60 dogs, yet spared a few moments at the end of her strenuous day to talk to me about her grand old Ch. Breezehrast Breen, the sire of my own Stud Ch. Killbarney, assured me that the link between Kerry enthusiasts stretches across the Atlantic. Best in Show went to Mr. Z. H. Thorning's Comandor's Courageous by Shaun of Larna Ex Princess Emer of Larna, a small compact dog of good colour, while Winners Bitches was won by Miss E. S. Scott's "Peggy's Leg" by Bemel Calidore-Maritza Duskie bred by Miss D. Imber of Stafford. From the ringside Peggy's Leg looked rather immature and was, I thought, lucky to beat Mrs. D. Wrigton's lovely bitch. Lisnalea Enchantarella, while I would have liked a longer reach of neck and more spirit in Courageous. A delightful afternoon was climaxed by Miss Imber allowing me to help her down to Euston Station with her dogs, little Maritza Duskie being so like my Ch. Rose Marie of Cheriton even to her ways that I almost

thought I had "Lassie" as she was called on the lead instead of "Duskie."

A kind letter from Mrs. Crabb, Hon. Secretary of the K.B.T.C. of E. inviting me to visit her kennels and see her 15th century home, the name of which "The Old Post House" conjured up pictures of Dick Turpin and four-in-hands, took me up there during my first leave, so that the Gandria Kennels were the first I visited. Here I was given every chance of going over all Mrs. Crabb's stock and picked out a lovely bitch Gay Lady of Gandria, good head and front, short back with tail well set on, grand hindquarters, a lovely mover and real Terrier, that I would have liked to have taken away with me, then and there, had I not still been in the army. Later on I was delighted to see her go to the top at the Champion Show under the world renowned judge, Miss Helen K. Henry. Others to catch my eye were Glamour Girl of Gandria reminding me strongly of my Ch. Leading Lady of Tralee and Downsview Duchess owned by Miss Garstone whom I also met. Glamour Girl by the way is the dam of Gay Lady sired by Overport Sheorsha. Mint, as Miss Garstone calls her bitch, had a very which I liked very much, Grandee of Gandria a nice headed pup, good front and changing fast and his sister Gem of Gandria a very typy puppy. We all talked Kerries so hard it was a wonder any of us had voices left, and it was with difficulty that I tore myself away from these charming ladies and their really lovely Kerries.

One Sunday I was able to run out to the well known Overport Kennels. Here the Misses Parry were kindness itself and it was here too that I met Mrs. Ryan, owner of the Irish dog, Ch. Oscar Calma, a splendid veteran later placed in that class at the Championship Show. It was unfortunately a pouring wet day, but in spite of the difficulties which that entailed, no pains were spared to show me all the stock. Bemel Blue Buttercup, a lovely headed bitch who has done a lot of winning I believe and who at that time was owned by Sgt. Cumminge of the U.S. Army but has since been resold to Miss Perry, Bantrex, Bonnie nice colour and very showy, Arm Beaufighter and several others whose names have slipped my memory. Phyllis Parry told me of the coming All Breed Show at Eltham on March 2nd, 1946, and this being a Saturday and close to London I was able to get there for a short time. There was a good entry of Kerries being judged by Mrs. J. Creasy. It was here I met Mr. C. M. Gray, owner of Bemel Bracken and we had quite a delightful chat while Mr. Gray kindly allowed me to go over his dog thoroughly. Bracken is a fine dog who is being used extensively at stud. One of his sons, Shevaun of Blueprint, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Dempsey appealed to me from the ringside but I did not have the opportunity of seeing him at close quarters, and Mr. Woodley's Bawn of the Bog, a lovely silver bitch, also caught my eye.

My next visit was to the famous Downsview Kennels, and it was indeed a

great pleasure to meet Mrs. Rosemary Smith surrounded by such well known dogs as Duellist, Delysia, Damask, and a lovely youngster, Denouement, all lying down in perfect harmony in front of a roaring fire. I was impressed with the quality of the young stock which I saw at Wentworth and have happy recollections of discussing them all thoroughly while eating some wonderful black current pie and thick cream supplied by Mrs. Smith's own Jersey cow—a real treat in these days of scanty rations.

Unfortunately the only other kennel I had time to visit was the Bemel, owned by Mrs. P. Littlefield who had just moved into new quarters. I had been unable to advise Mrs. Littlefield of my visit, despite this however she went to no end of trouble to show me her dogs. Bemel Calidore a fine upstanding dog of real Terrier type, Pixies Alannah a most attractive little bitch of real quality whose recent litter by Kramwen King were running around the yard looking extremely promising. My visit was all too short as I had to hurry back to Birmingham for a meeting that night, we did however, have time to discuss the Championship Show and the very high quality of the entries, and I was only sorry I had no more time.

The Championship Show was held at the London Scottish Drill Hall, London, on May 15th, 1946, and it was indeed a privilege to watch the judging of Miss H. K. Henry who had no easy task as there was a very large entry of uniformly high quality. The winners dog, Buncrana Benison, owned and bred by Miss M. McIntyre of Glasgow looked grand from the ringside with lovely head and front and moving well. Winners bitch and Best in Show Mrs. Crabb's Gay Lady of Gandria I have already mentioned and she certainly showed every minute she was in the ring. This was a splendid show affording every opportunity to both see the dogs and meet exhibitors and there are many others I would like to mention, did space permit. Having been at the Westminster Show in 1944 as well as various Eastern Canadian Shows during the time I was stationed in Ontario and Quebec, and having on many occasions heard the opinion expressed that due to war conditions it could not be expected that the Old Country could have maintained its standard of breeding, I would like to conclude by saying that in my opinion the quality at the Championship Show was so high that in many classes dogs were unplaced who would have been winners on this side of the Atlantic. Does the secret lie in the road exercise which these enthusiastic breeders give so conscientiously each day?

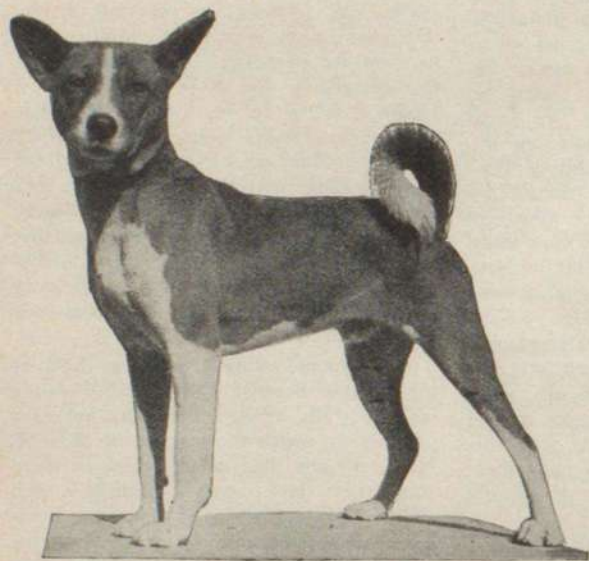

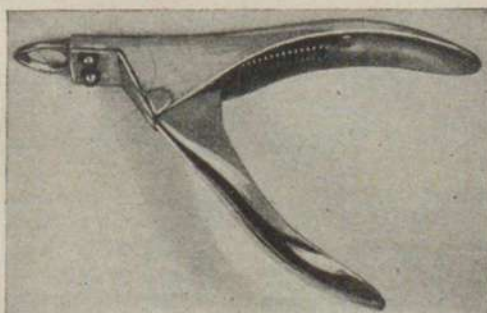

IRISH SETTERS IN AMERICA

By Gertrude W. Drew

Editor's Note—Our author is a studious enthusiast and has herself done much to improve and promote her favourite breed.

Several years ago, when I decided I could import an Irish setter from Ireland, I wrote to Mr. J. A. Carberry of Drogheda. Mr. Carberry, as most fanciers now, was a breeder for over fifty years and a foremost authority known the world over for his fine dogs and notably finer judgment of the breed.

Many months passed and I had abandoned all hope of hearing from the distinguished gentleman. The, one day the postman handed me a large, heavy brown envelope—So heavy that I was obliged to pay extra postage for excess weight. I looked at it but it was not from Drogheda. It was from another town in Eire. Apparently Mr. Carberry had moved. I carefully cut the end off the envelope and pulled out what appeared to be reams of paper. I excitedly found the last page and here in bright purple writing was the magic signature of "J. A. Carberry".

That was the best ten cents worth of reading matter I ever paid for. Mr. Carberry took endless time and trouble to acquaint me with the pros and cons of the Irish Setter situation, past, present and future. He looked all over the British Isles to find a dog that would fit into the picture I had so graphically delineated. He could find nothing at that time and I was greatly surprised when he ended his letter with the following paragraph; "But why come to Ireland for an Irish setter when you Americans have been buying our best dogs for years? There must be good ones in United States and I would advise you to look across the border to some of the careful breeders and I feel sure you will find exactly what you want".

I never heard from Mr. Carberry again. I wrote and thanked him for the valuable information he had so kindly sent me. I have since heard that this fine old gentleman, breeder and all round authority on the Irish setter has passed on.

It was just such men as Mr. Carberry who gave to America the dogs which are the background of the breed today. The old country breeders had established the Irish Setter long before he came into our hands and they had developed his hunting instincts to a high degree. From these old country dogs we have developed our own American strains.

In looking over the records of the Irish Setter in United States, we find the breed being exhibited at shows as far back as 1842. However, it was not until some thirty years later that the sport became organized and the dogs were classified. Here it is interesting to note that the Kennel Club of England was organized in the year 1874 and two years later in 1876 the National American Kennel Club was formed in this comparatively new country. I make this observation to point out the fact that even in those primitive days American people were mighty dog minded. Twelve years later the Canadian Kennel Club was founded.

In America, as in the old country, there

were other varieties of the Irish setter before the advent into greater popularity of the solid red dog. I cannot say too much about these although the white and red variety was one of them. The solid red dog eclipsed the others to such an extent that none of them were persevered with and they eventually died out.

But the red setter became a great favorite and he has been greatly improved upon since those early days. Remarkable progress has been made in the last forty years. Today United States are breeding some of the best if not the very best Irish setters in the world. It is the writer's opinion that if it were not for the

six months quarantine, which prohibits the entry of American bred Irish setters to compete at old country shows, they could and would make show winning history.

In giving credit to American breeders it is without thought of detracting from the achievements of the old country breeders, without whose contribution the present day setters in America would have been impossible. It is interesting to note that almost the entirety of the breed today trace their ancestry back to one dog. That one dog was Ch. Higgins Redcoat whose sire, the imported Paddy of Boyne, upholds the tradition set by his predecessors. I cannot recall a single strain in America that is not tied up in some way to this great dog. Ch. Higgins Redcoat gave American breeders the greatest boost in setter history.

Redcoat, as he was familiarly, known was the sire of twenty-five champions. Some of these are still living, including Ch. Redwood Russet of Harvale, himself the sire of many champion sons and daughters as well as having several champion grandchildren. The late Ch. Milson O'Boy was another of his famous sons and he in turn sired Ch. Milson Topnotcher who was almost equally famous.

Ch. Milson O'Boy will be remembered for his best in show win at Morris and Essex. Here he topped an entry of over

three thousand dogs, a spectacular achievement for any dog of any breed. But in productivity he was equally successful. From Milson O'Boy came Ch. Milson O'Boy II, and from him Rosecroft Premier and this year at the Gardens, End O'Maine Sarah Jane, a year old daughter of Premier walked off with best of breed over a large entry. There are many other lines such as; Ch. Higgins Redcoat, Ch. Redwood Russet of Harvale, Ch. Kleiglight of Aragon and Ch. Janet of Aragon; Ch. Higgins Redcoat, Ch. Ruxton's Mollie O'Day, Ch. Tyronne Farm Mollie O'Day and the recent sensational winner, Kendare Hi-Stepper. One could go on and on quoting line after line of Redcoat descendants all top winning and top producing dogs.

It is true, therefore, that there is in the Redcoat strain, dogs with the inherent, genetic ability to produce dogs in succeeding generations of the same high quality as themselves—probably a little better. It is important to note that these reproductive qualities have been stabilized in this great strain by breeding within the family. Some old country dogs have from time to time been introduced as an out-cross but in most cases the breed in its broader aspects has been held together by the sound judgment of breeders in keeping close to the Redcoat lines.

The name "Kleiglight" reminds us that he probably is the greatest bench winner of all time. His owner, Jack Cooper of Franklin Park, Ill., claims he holds the world record. He is now seven years old and if he continues to be shown with the same success he will in all likelihood add many more laurels to his already long and spectacular list of wins. Mr. Cooper's Aragon Kennels house some of the finest setters in the world, both Irish and English.

I wish I had time to recount the numerous kennels who are actively engaged in the production of America's great Irish Setters. Here are a few who have produced some of the breed's best: End O'Maine, owner Hollis Wilson, Amherst, Wis.; Tyronne Farm, Jack Spear, Tipton, Iowa; Tirvelda, Mr. Irving Eldredge, Salisbury, Conn.; Caldene, Dr. Jay. W. Calhoun, Uhrichsville, Ohio; Kendare, Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Kennedy, Walled Lake, Mich.; Denhaven, D. L. Hollenbeck, Chicago, Ill.; Kinvarra, Mr. Lee Schoen, Darien, Conn.; Crosshaven, Ward Gardner, Walla Walla, Wash.; and hundreds of others.

I think the disbanded kennels of the late Mr. Dusenberre deserve mention as his prefix "Jordan Farm" was well known and played no inconspicuous part in the improvement of the breed. His Jordan Farm Abe was responsible for many beautiful, dark coated and dark eyed setters. Chief among his winning progeny was Champion The Baron Gore, best of breed at Morris and Essex, and his Garden winning daughter, Jordan Farm Girl. Jordan Farm Abe, a top sire for producing winning Irish, in his heyday held that title for three consecutive years. Ch. Jordan Farm John was another big winner from this kennel and he in turn sired many good dogs. Jordan Farm John's

Ghost was one of his promising sons whose show career was cut short owing to the death of the owner. The Wamsutta Kennel is another which merits mention.

It is a long way back to the days of the celebrated champion Palmerston, described as having a white streak on the muzzle, white on the breast and white feet. It is a still longer way back to the old white and red Irish setter. Visualize if you can the transition which took place in the intervening years and you will appreciate more than ever the beautiful product of today. To retain the highly desirable and eliminate the objectionable was not the easiest task but it was accomplished and much of the credit belongs to the glamorous entrance of Ch. Higgins Red-

coat into the field of breeding.

In conclusion I just want to say that I heeded Mr. Carberry's injunction, I did "look across the border" became a student of American bloodlines and have imported seven good specimens for the improvement of our Canadian dogs.

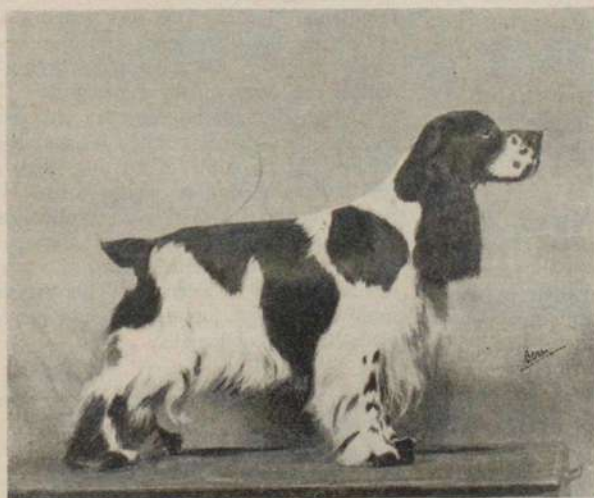

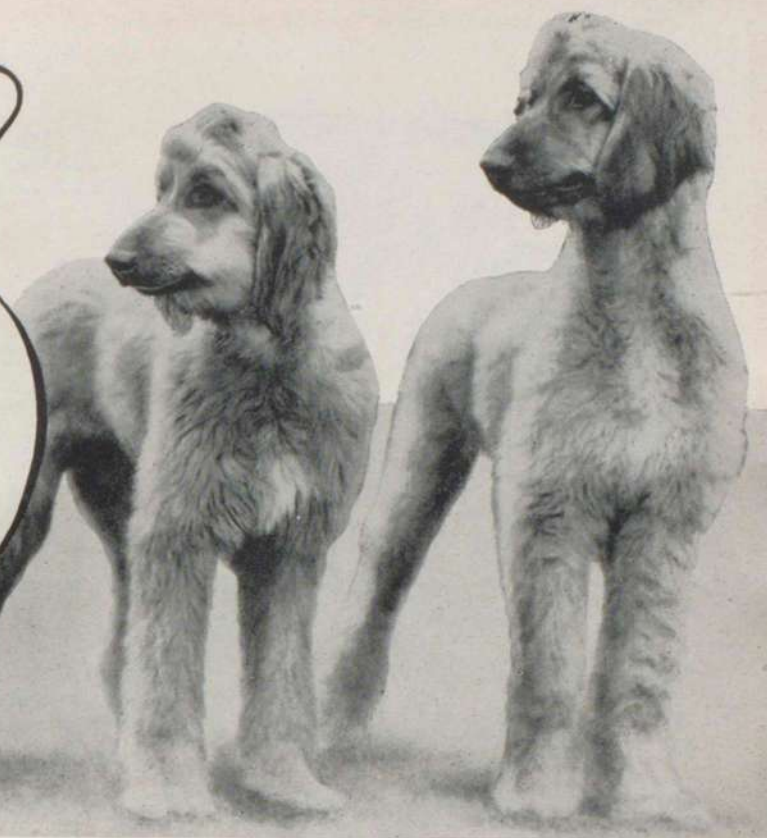

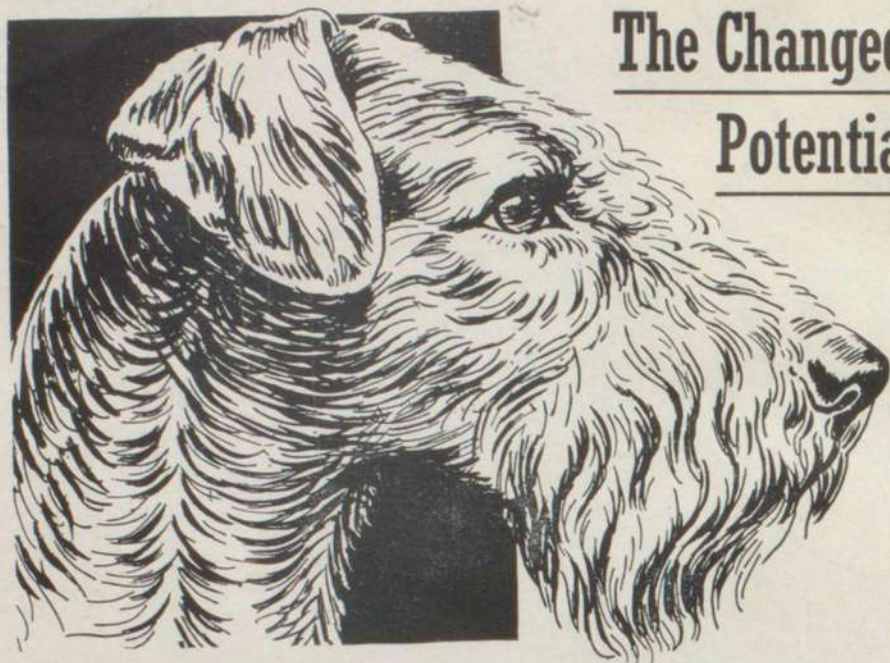
