THE IMPORTANCE OF THE JUDGE

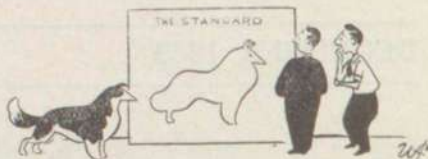

WITH exhibitors growing more rhetorical on the vagaries of dog show judging and publications devoted to the interests of breeders and exhibitors carrying the opinions of those most affected, even to the point of carrying on a nation-wide poll of comment, it would seem that those who are responsible for the running of dog shows will soon be hard put to find a judging panel which will come anywhere close to satisfying the average exhibitor of dogs.



The day when everyone is satisfied with the placings in a dog show will usher in the millenium, but it would seem that with so many interested in showing their dogs, the number of shows being held annually with the resulting importance of the breeding and showing of dogs, it might be that we have arrived at the place where a serious survey of the manner of permitting anyone to decide which of a given number of dogs is the best one should be made, and that very possibly the methods employed for arriving at those decisions on the part of the judges might be made more uniform in character. Achievement of any one of the changes which have been put forth as being desirable lies with exhibitors themselves who make the shows possible.

Actually, it lies with exhibitors themselves to bring about changes if they are needed and while it may take time, and here and there show-giving clubs will find themselves with very small entries in the meantime, it should not take too long to arrive at the place where a more satisfactory state of affairs would exist. Honesty on the part of the exhibitor to the extent that he admits to himself that a dog just as good as his, or better, was put over his own would, of course, be the first requisite. While every breeder has in his mind's eye the ideal specimen of his breed, knowing the standard for his breed and using a scientific program of breeding to attain that end, if he is truly honest, he must admit that few specimens of perfection have ever been produced and the best he can hope for is to come somewhere near to the stand-



ard and the best dog today can have a fault or two and still be a consistent winner; the important thing to remember is whether they are of major or minor proportions.

There have been dogs in the show ring, making excellent progress toward a coveted championship and suddenly, one finds that dog put down in a class, large or small, to dogs over which it has been placed time and time again. What conclusion is the exhibitor to draw? Is he to be considered a troublemaker if he seeks out the judge later on and asks for an explanation? Should he decide that there is something amiss, or should he just be a good sport and feel that it is only one man's opinion and continue on his way? All of these have been tried, sometimes with good results and often with the opposite. It does not "set well" with an exhibitor to have a good dog put down to one that he honestly feels is inferior. He never knows when another breeder may have come to that particular show just to get a good look at what has been talked of as a very promising dog and one which will eventually make a very real contribution to the breed. What is to be his reaction? The man who has the responsibility of placing the dogs not only has to discharge a duty to the exhibitor but also to the ring-side for there are enough on-lookers at every show who are well enough acquainted with the various breeds to see a fault or to pick out a dog with outstanding quality. As evidence we have in mind a show where the beginning of the judging of a breed with more than seventy-five entries, saw a ring-side packed six and eight deep. By the time the judging had progressed to the open bitches, the ring-side had almost evaporated and when the best of breed was chosen, where the specials included dogs which had made spectacular wins consistently, only a handful of interested persons remained. It was an instance where winners were embarrassed with their honors.

There is that other "bone of contention"—the professional handler—which one hears being discussed wherever dog folk get together. There are those who really believe that some judges favor certain handlers, and that if they and their dogs are at a show, others in the same breed may hope for no considera-

tion. Most handlers are known to judges who have had any experience at all. It is also known that handlers have opportunity to show only dogs of top quality, since it is their business, and to be considered successful they must win consistently. They, more than anyone else, can look at the owner's "show prospect" with a coldly critical eye and decide whether or not the prospect is a potential winner. However, there are certain ethics which judges should bear in mind in their relations with handlers. Recently, at a very well managed show we sat at the ringside when seven dogs came in for the open class. All but two were handled by professional handlers. One of these two was handled by the owner who had at least a speaking acquaintance with several of the handlers, and the other handled by the owner who was showing her dog for the first time at its first show. It must have been something of a set-back for her to hear the judge address every one of the handlers by his or her given name when instructing them as to how and where to put their dogs. The expression on her face was by turns comic and tragic. Her dog was not quite ready for the company in which he found himself that day and as a result, did not place; it was, however, an unhappy experience for the exhibitor for she was confused



in her reactions. Naturally, she felt an outsider in a tight little group of people who were on such good terms that they addressed each other in the ring as old friends, and her whole attitude was summed up in her expression to her friends, "What's the use?" The judge, if he had wanted to be kind, could have told her that the dog only needed maturity to make him a winner, and instead of seeming to cater to the old hands, might have given a novice in the game a helping hand, instead of making her feel unwanted. It is indeed, the new exhibitor with a new dog or dogs who keeps the judge in assignments coupled with the unassailable fact that "hope springs eternal in the human heart." How long that hope may be cherished before it develops into distrust is problematical, but for every such development, there probably are sufficient converts to make for balance!

And there is the exhibitor himself who should keep in mind that this is a sporting business and treat other exhibitors in sporting fashion. Quite by accident we fell into conversation with a woman who was a perfect stranger, because she had that open sesame for all dog lovers—a trio of lovely dogs which she was watching while they played about in a small park. Asked if she showed her dogs, she indignantly replied that she had—"once, only once and never again." She then launched into an account of her first experience in the show ring and the treatment she had received at the hands of older exhibitors. She was able to laugh about it but she admitted to tears shed all over her dog and the bench for the shabby treatment she had received, "because her dog had won." And as she related the episode, we thought it significant that the dog involved, looking every bit a champion, gambolled about on the grass, completely oblivious of "man's inhumanity to man."

Through a recent poll, it would seem that while there are literally thousands of persons licensed to judge dogs, the exhibitor is of the opinion that there are not enough "good ones." Human nature being what it is, this is understandable to some degree, but as was pointed out at the outset, there must be some basis for the verbiage thrown about at, around, near and after every dog show in connection with placings. There is almost unanimous agreement that licenses are granted too freely and too easily—simply on the sponsorship of a given number of persons. It is only reasonable that the person applying would see to it that he had either approached his "proposed sponsors" as to their attitude toward his application, or that he was reasonably certain they would give approval before submitting their names to the powers that be. The fact that a man or woman is a breeder of some years experience is no guarantee that he is going to do the best possible judging, for often one hears the remark, "I wouldn't enter a dog under him—look at the type he breeds or shows—it's nothing like mine." Who is right? And then there is the final broadside—"So-and So's dogs will all be there and will win everything because he has the same type of dogs." And more often than not, that is exactly what happens. Some place along the way, the standard has been passed up for something one or two individuals preferred whether to the detriment of the breed or for its improvement.



There are those who suggest that all judging should be done on a point system with the judge marking his

book in that fashion, with one copy to be posted following the judging in order that exhibitors might know how their dog had rated in the opinion of the judge. The chief objection is the matter of time. This procedure probably would necessitate more judges for each show, a financial matter which would create difficulties for some clubs. This would also eliminate from judging not a few judges who have not troubled themselves over-much to study the standards of all the breeds for which they are willing to accept judging assignments.

The argument wages pro and con in connection with showing under "all-rounders." Those who are against showing under an all rounder put forth the argument that it is humanly impossible for any one person to know the standard for some two hundred recognized breeds and mistakes in judgement are bound to be made. On the other hand, those who take the opposite view will contend that "at least he will pick out a sound dog."

After much serious discussion of the situation with breeders and exhibitors, one is forced to conclude that they put judges in three distinct categories, the first and their names are anathema to exhibitors, are those who accept any



and all assignments for the glory (supposedly) they get from sitting in high places, doling out of their wisdom to the exhibitor; the second group includes those who have had much experience, learn to know too many people and forget where friendship ceases and business begins, and the third for whom every honest exhibitor has the greatest respect and honor, the serious person who accepts assignments to judge only those breeds which he knows, who places the dogs which in his honest opinion rate placing in certain order and who will either by word or action convey to the exhibitor why he has put a dog up in the class, or down. Every exhibitor knows (or should know) his dog's fault. If the judge wants to do a good job, he can, without embarrassment to the handler of a dog, point out why the dog is being faulted. The thing that irks the exhibitor is when a judge looks vaguely at his dog, seemingly is oblivious of the important essentials of his breed, and then, in a great burst of enthusiasm marks his book, waves the ribbons under the noses of the handlers of dogs without much to recommend them to anyone and then turns his back on the ring in order to evade any conversation with exhibitors. No one feels that the show ring is the place for a social call, but an attitude on the part of the judge which conveys to everyone that he is



quite willing to give honest reasons for his placings is to be desired.

After sifting through the suggestions made for improving the situation, it would seem that most exhibitors do not feel a license should be granted to anyone unless he has first judged at least twice at sanction shows and following that, has judged at least three point shows, where his work will be reported on by a competent person or persons. It was also felt that the granting of a license should mean the holder has it only so long as he continues to carry out his assignments satisfactorily. There is also strong feeling that the Canadian Kennel Club should see to it that competent persons are appointed to periodically attend shows in order to watch the judging as it progresses. It has been more than once suggested that a limit, such as three years, be placed on licenses, at which time a renewal would have to be applied for. Too many complaints from exhibitors in the meantime, would obviously eliminate the granting of further license.

There is another group which favors the placing of would-be judges as stewards under competent judges. The steward, while carrying out his duties as steward would mark his own book as he would place the dogs. He would have no opportunity of going over the dogs, but would be able to judge general conformation and the gaiting of the dogs. The judge under whom he was working, would mark the steward's book, making any comments he deemed necessary. With this first stage of training over, the applicant then might accept assignments at member matches or sanction shows.

It was felt by some that breed clubs could do much to eliminate inefficiency with what practically amounts to a boycott. The greatest number of exhibitors consulted felt that in the final analysis changing the situation lies within their power. Instead of complaining, they should keep their dogs home when they feel a judge is not competent to judge their breed with the result that lack of entries would certainly not be cause for a second invitation to judge. It was pointed out by another exhibitor that it would probably take years before everyone had learned not to show under a given person and by the time he got back to the first place (being something of a wag) he assumed that the exhibitors who first complained might have got around to showing the type of dog the judge had preferred in the first instance!

Some of the most seasoned exhibitors have suggested that no first assignments should be allowed within several

The Revival of Cruft's

AFTER a lapse of nine years — during which time the great Charles Cruft passed over the Great Divide — our Kennel Club decided to revive the show which will ever keep this man's memory green. The Kennel Club most generously agreed that though they would run the show the name would not be changed — a policy greatly appreciated by all British dogdom. And what a success it was. The entry totalled 9,412 — unfortunately, some 600 had to be returned — and comprised 4,273 dogs.

It was in 1886 that Mr. Cruft started what was to become the greatest dog show in the world, and which has been the Mecca of dogdom for fanciers in every country where man's best friend lived. We were all delighted that Mrs. Cruft was able to grace the proceedings, and it must have been a great joy to her to see her beloved husband's memory so honoured.

The location was Olympia, quite the finest we have in London and somewhat akin to Madison Square Gardens in New York. And when I say that over 60,000 people attended the two days' event it will be seen how very popular was this Cruft's revival. Indeed, on the evening of the second day, so vast was the queue waiting for admittance at 6.30 p.m. that as the show was due to close at 8 p.m. the doors were opened to the public gratis. This

was a generous gesture on the part of the Kennel Club, and one likely to make even more doggy adherents.

On the first day were the Hounds, with 1,237 entries and 600 exhibits; the Terriers, with 2,399 entries and 1,080 exhibits and Toys, 804 entries and 439 exhibits. The second day was for Non Sporting, with 2,980 entries and 1,319 exhibits, and gun dogs with 1,992 entries and 835 exhibits.

Marvellous! stupendous! magnificent! the greatest ever! were some of the descriptions I heard of the show as I wandered about all the two days from 10 a.m. until after 8 p.m., and I got what became quite a common term "Cruft's feet". Visitors had come from all over Europe. There were a number from the States. One very popular one from the U.S.A. was Mrs. Marion Florsheim, so well known in Afghans, and who has many friends in Canada.

The show was supported by H.R.H. the Princess Royal, who entered a smooth Dachshund in two classes. We were all sorry Silvac Lustrious, bred by Mrs. Grosvenor-Workman, was an absentee. A novelty was a Leonberger from Hungary — not for competition of course. His owner, Gunner Gowes Wilson told us the dog weighed 220 pounds. His bench was apart from the others, and there was always a big crowd around it.

I noticed how smart so many of my sex were in their "New Look" gowns. Mink and pearls mingled with pullovers and slacks. Even the "New Look" was to be seen in some of the dogs' coats; one with three pale blue satin bows on was quite a star turn.

The evening of the first day the attendance grew to immense proportions. The anti-climax came when the judging took place for Best in Show. This was judged by Mrs. H. Barber, Mr. J. W. H. Benyon and Mr. H. G. Sanders, who eventually awarded Mr. E. Sharpe's eleven months' old Wire Fox Terrier bitch Drakehall Dairymaid the supreme honour, Reserve going to Miss De Pledge and Mrs. Dunham's well-known Pekingese dog Ch. "Ku-Chi of Cuversham".

The scene on the evening of the second day almost defies description. So dense was the crowd the huge ring was lined 15 deep with spectators. I tried in vain to see over their heads, and in the end induced a flinty-hearted policeman to let me see the scene from the balcony where spectators were forbidden owing to some London County Council ruling about fear of anyone throwing something down upon the masses below — such as lighted cigarettes, etc. As I don't smoke, I assured the guardian I was no danger.

What a scene I looked down upon. The two contestants from the first day's final had to meet Mr. H. S. Lloyd's Blue roan Cocker bitch "Tracey Witch of Ware" aged 3 years and Mr. J. V. Rank's 18 months' old Great Dane bitch "Ract of Onborough". The two judges were Mrs. C. Pacey and Mr. A. Croxton Smith, the ex-Chairman of the Kennel Club. Every dog had its supporters, and both judges gave each a thorough overhauling. Finally, amidst deafening applause, the award of Best in Show went to the Cocker, with the Wire Fox Terrier, reserve. The trophy to celebrate the win was a magnificent £400 silver cup, and this was gracefully presented to Mr. Lloyd by Mrs. Charles Cruft, who looked the personification of happiness and pride, and no doubt felt the occasion was a great tribute to her husband's memory. Mr. Lloyd has been an exhibitor at Cruft's for over 50 years, — I think he must have started in his cradle — and after the presentation he said, "I have won five supreme awards at Cruft's, all with the same breed, which has been in the family 80 or 100 years". "Tracey Witch" is a very lovely bitch, who showed for all she was worth, and is carrying on the "Ware" tradition, and her owner is a grand sportsman.

So ended a magnificent event which will ever be remembered in the annals of dogdom, and the Kennel Club is to be congratulated upon its magnificent gesture and noble effort. Truly Cruft's will live for ever and commemorate a great man.

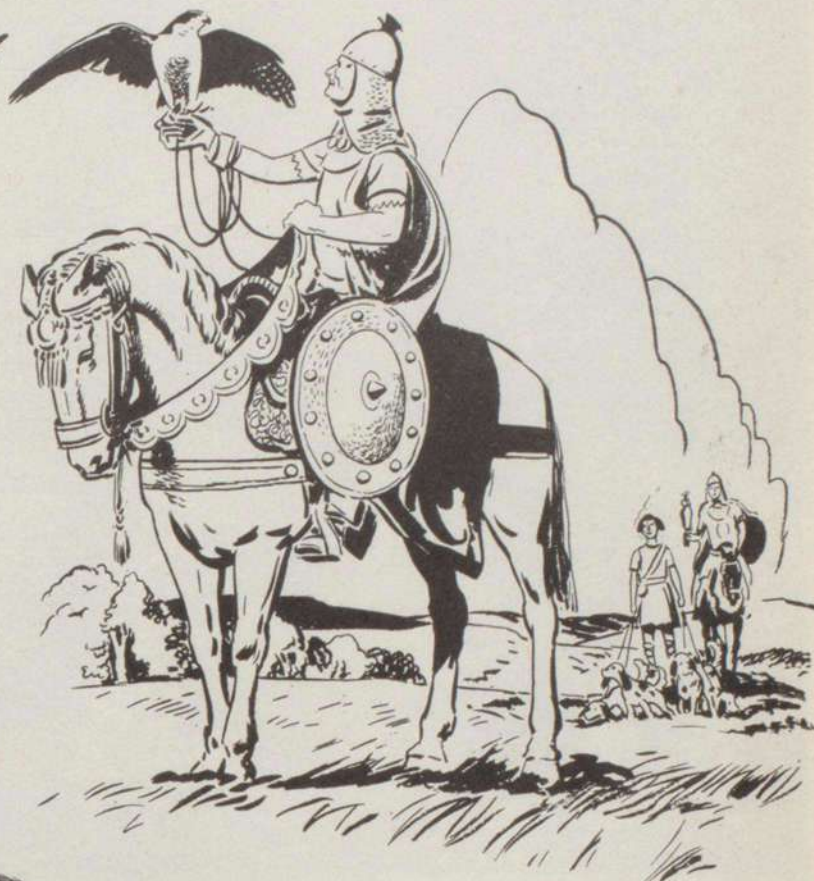
Know Your Breed...

English Springer Spaniel Club of Canada Field Trial

Springer Spaniel owned by Althea Horvath, Cleveland, Ohio. Finished his championship points in two field trials, those run by the English Springer Spaniel Club of Canada in 1947 and 1948 at Cook's Mills, Crowland Township, Ont., taking the Open Stake both times. Sired by Ch. Roderique of Sandblown Acre, the greatest living sire of champions and out of Chaltha's Hope, he has shown that dogs bred of bench stock can make their way in the field as well.

THE second annual Field Trial run by the English Springer Spaniel Club of Canada at Cook's Mills on October 30th attracted entries from as far away as Rocky River, Ohio, and New York State with twenty-eight entries altogether, creating something of a record for an all Spaniel trial.

Heavy fogs rolling over the fields held up the starting of the first stake, but by 11 o'clock the Puppy Stake was being run and there was promise that the day would be excellent, a promise which was more than kept as the day wore on.

Dr. John Barnes of Williamsville, N.Y. and Julian T. Collins of Ravenna, Ohio, were the judges. Both commented on the excellent performances turned in by the dogs, and many were the comments on the fine spirit of sportsmanship which pervaded the entire day. Captain of the guns was Dr. J. A. Meek of Welland, and J. P.

Tompkins of Welland was chairman of the committee assisted by Edgar Langlois of Thorold South.

Meriting particular comment was the fact that dogs were never worked over ground which had previously been worked in a stake. Arrangement had been made for grounds which gave fresh ground for every brace of dogs sent into the trial and particularly large birds were provided for the trial through the cooperation of the Department of Lands and Forests, all of which added to the interest both on the part of handlers and the gallery, which in the afternoon grew to large proportions. It was significant that though the day was cold and damp, the gallery stayed on until the last dog had been run.

Chaltha's Cordite Jon owned by Althea Horvath of Cleveland, Ohio and handled by Calvin Barry won the

Open All Age Stake, finishing the points for his Field Trial Championship. In order to comply with the Field Trial regulations, the dog was given a water test on Sunday morning coming through with flying colors, to the complete satisfaction of the judges. The dog worked beautifully, always under control and at the same time giving an impression of eagerness to work no matter how heavy the going. "Johnny" as he is affectionately known to his handler, also won the Gun Dog Stake.

In the Novice Stake there was an excellent entry. Edgar Langlois' Ridgcroft Rosa, a daughter of the Int. Ch. Frejax Royal Salute bred by G. Fred Stickel was the winning dog. This young dog also won the Puppy Stake, and another of Royal Salute's sons also bred by Mr. Stickel placed second in this Stake. He is owned by Dr. J. A. Meek.

Following the Trials, a dinner party followed at the Barclay Hotel in Welland where the presentation of awards and certificates was made by the president of the club, G. Fred Stickel of Welland. At the dinner, congratulations were expressed to the winning dogs and their handlers and Mr. Stickel also extended the club's appreciation to all the owners who had entered their dogs. A welcome was expressed by Mr. Stickel, also to Alf Loveridge representing the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., Stewart Walton, president of the Ontario Bird Dog Association, St. Catharines, and Henry P. Nicholson of Rod and Gun Magazine.

Jean and the Duke of Barrimor

WHEN you were a child, did you ever have a wish to such an extent that you would say "When I grow up I am going to have lots and lots" of whatever it was you wished for most. For instance, while talking to Mr. John Webb of the Bressay Kennels the other day, he mentioned that it had been his boyhood ambition to own a good Blenheim Toy Spaniel, and how thrilled he was when he went to the Airport recently and his wish was fulfilled by the arrival of a beautiful Blenheim Toy Spaniel on the plane.

Many of us have not seen the fulfillment of our dreams for many years, but Jean Bradd of Toronto saw her wish come true while still a young girl. Jean had seen the Obedience Trials and became enamoured of the German Shepherd Dog breed. Enquiring amongst the breeders, she found that the price was beyond her reach, so thought of ways and means whereby a girl of thirteen could earn sufficient funds to buy one of these beautiful dogs possessing also the intelligence for Obedience work. Rushing home from school, she would do her home-work and then contact people, offering her services as a baby sitter, or anything which would help towards the purchase price of a dog. Slowly but surely the bank account grew until finally she had sufficient to approach a breeder and ask if a dog which would be the answer to her every desire was available.

Finally, after much studying and negotiating, Jean secured a two months' old puppy named "Duke of Barrimor". Then began the task of caring for the puppy so that he could grow up to be as good as the other dogs. There were many hardships in raising the puppy. He didn't like streetcars, and it was necessary to go a few blocks with him, then get off and walk, then on again, until such time as they reached the Sandorea Kennels away off in Scarborough where the dogs were being given instructions in Obedience work by George Taylor.

As was natural, Jean and her dog were inseparable. He accompanied her wherever she went. In the hot weather they swam together at the beach. Duke loved the water and became so adept at swimming a long distance that Jean entered him in the Toronto Star Dog Derby which is run in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition. This Dog Derby is conducted very much like that of the marathon swim. For instance, the dogs leave the starting barge on the "Go" signal and are directed around the course by their owners in a boat which precedes them some hundred yards. The first dog to cross the finishing line receives a handsome trophy.

Duke won the Championship in 1947, and was presented with the trophy by Lieutenant-Governor Ray Lawson. By this time, Duke and his little companion had become celebrities and Duke was chosen by the photographers to act as a representative of his breed at the Royal Winter Fair in 1947. Entering Duke again in the dogs' swim at the Canadian National Exhibition in 1948, Duke swam the fastest race of the series and was presented with the swimming trophy by Barbara Ann Scott, the Olympic Skating Champion.

To travel to the various dog shows with the dog to compete in the Obedience Trials was a great expense, and Jean found that her earnings made in spare time were quickly absorbed in the high cost of food, etc. The members of the German Shepherd

Dog Breeders Association made arrangements therefore, for them to travel to the shows. As a result Duke now carries the proud title of Companion Dog and Companion Dog Excellent.

Here, then, is the story of a brave little girl who has not only watched her dream come true, but in doing so has added greatly to the promotion of the Purebred German Shepherd dog.

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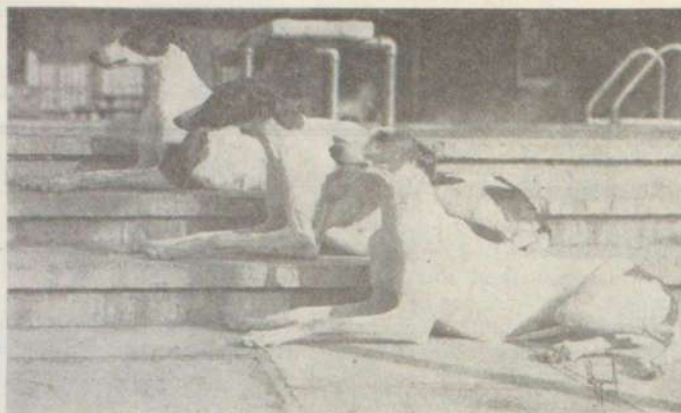

MISS Amy Thew, the good looking and popular young lady at the Calgary airport is most enthusiastic over her Labradors and English and American Cocker Spaniels.

At the last meeting of the Alberta Kennel Club, a resolution was adopted requesting the Government to require that any person purchasing any kind of poison be compelled to sign and give their address.

Jack Brooks has brought in a grand wire pup from Bill Scarpa of the Malabar Kennels, Point Fortune, Que. This pup was selected by Mac Bell, the genial President of the Canadian Handlers' Association. Jack will have this youngster on the circuit this next spring. Watch him go.

Now for a few highlights on the Edmonton shows. It was a battle royal to watch Mac Bell and Billy Quilley take the spotlight under Walter J. Pym. Mac was showing Bill Scarpa's Wire female Ch. Caress of Shawhaven, and Billy was handling the sensational Beagle Int. Ch. Altopa Atom. It was nip and tuck between these dogs, and the handlers gave a performance very rarely seen. Both are expert. The gallery were in a high state of tension all the while these dogs were being judged, and the handlers certainly left nothing undone. It was well worth going miles to see. After being tested in every conceivable way, the judge finally made the award to the Wire.

Both these shows were a decided success, and we hope to see more like them.

I have only space to mention that in the show judged by Mr. Wright, my smiling friend, E. P. Tuson, won the Non-Sporting group with his Bulldog. I was particularly pleased to meet two friends from Saskatoon, Mr. Don Sampson and Jack Aires, both ardent dog-fanciers; also Burnice Heaven, a former resident of Calgary, and now of Regina; and Mrs. Churchward of Lloydminster, Saskatchewan, the latter a very prominent Cocker fancier. She has a very up-to-date kennel, and takes in all shows.

Albertans have been granted an extension of time to complete their hunting season, as far as pheasants are concerned. Those who have not been so fortunate as to have bagged their limit previous to this will appreciate this gesture on the part of the Provincial Government.

You, know, we in these Western Provinces, really do appreciate to the full the marvellous possibilities we have, as far as game is concerned. Our perspective is altogether too close up, for all we have to do is to go only a few miles from our front door to get right into the grandest shooting of any place in the world. Imagine, if you will, leaving your home after four in the afternoon and taking along a pair of English cockers; running out ten miles, parking your car and entering a stubble field just before the sun goes down, then making a blind and watching the night flight coming in this field to feed. Some stay right close and keep quiet. Soon a long line can be spotted on the horizon. They are not in formation, just coming in from some slough a few miles away. They circle the field, and the dogs have a few impatient moments. Soon they begin to lose altitude, and in a few moments they are in gunshot and the fun starts. The dogs wait for orders,

and the bunch of mallards get going plenty fast. If your aim is true the dogs are commanded to "fetch" and they do just that. You can bet your bottom dollar that bunch of ducks will leave that field. Soon another thin line appears, and you make a repetition of your former actions until you have your limit, or until darkness falls.

About decoys, we have a genius in our club in Calgary who is one of the high officials in the Bank of Montreal. He has something that really stumped me, the first time I went shooting with him. He uses for decoys, squares of black sateen about the size of the lining in a hat. These, placed around on the stubble, will attract ducks just as good as if you used the best imitation decoys obtainable, and they are so easily carried around from place to place or from field to field, and they pack into such a small bundle that they take up very little room in your car. Of course, they can only be used in the stubble fields.

Now, you Dachshund breeders, what dog you think of this. Henry Christensen and his wife from Vancouver hunted pheasants in the Brooks area, this fall, and they used two Dachshunds, and they worked marvellously. They could get right down in the buckbrush and root the birds out. The only complaint Henry had was they could not tell the cocks from the hens, which some of the other breeds are said to do.

Next season, we will again have our Pointers and Setters working, for the Hungarian partridge and prairie chicken are again getting numerous after having almost entirely disappeared for the past two years. I would suggest that we maintain another close season for 1949, but the Game Clubs have decreed otherwise, and the Game Department of the Provincial Government is usually governed by their wishes.

Dog fanciers all over Alberta extend their Xmas Greeting to fellow fanciers everywhere, and may 1949 contain nothing but the very best for all.

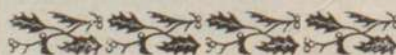

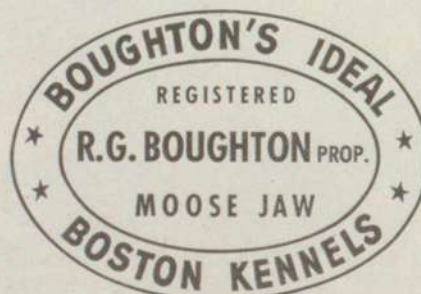

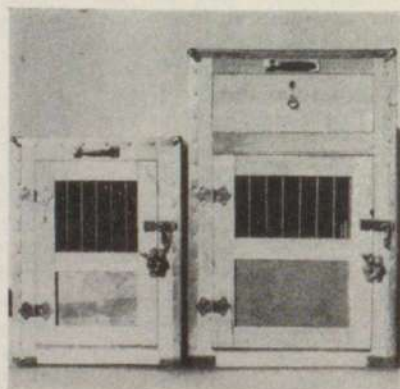

Maritime Notes

THE month of October brought to the Maritimes an opportunity for Field Trial enthusiasts to have an innings, for early in the month the newly-formed Atlantic Beagle Club in Halifax staged a most successful two day meet. This event, in conjunction with an equally successful two day meet held by the Annapolis Valley Beagle Club at Middleton, N.S., has done much to popularize this grand sport in the province, and I understand that many new and enthusiastic beaglers have been gathered into the fold.

In Charlottetown, P.E.I., the dual purpose Charlottetown Kennel Club, Inc. held its second Field Trials open to all pointing breeds, and this year again this progressive Club staged trials that evoked the highest commendation from the many visiting sportsmen from the U.S.A. who make a point of making the P.E.I. Trials a *must* on their programme. Entries were slightly down from last year, but what they lacked in quantity, they made up in quality, the work of the dogs in the field being far in advance of that of last year.

The first day, when the Puppy Stakes and the Shooting Dog Stakes were run off, was marred by showery weather, but birds were plentiful and scent was good. Local entries were well to the fore, the first day, and special mention must be made of the wonderful showing of an English Pointer, owned and handled by Ollie Harper. This dog won the Puppy Stakes in splendid style, and his proud owner was the recipient of many congratulations, the American visitors being particularly loud in their praises of this youngster. In the Shooting Dog Stakes the local boys again did very well, Wally Rodd and Frank Acorn placing second and third respectively with their English Setters, while Stewart Jones placed fourth, with his Brittany, "Barbette de Sapine."

On the second day, when the weatherman was in a far better mood, scent was again good and birds were again plentiful, and most excellent sport was enjoyed. This day, when the Derby Stakes and the Open All Age Stakes were held, the American sportsmen had a real field day, and their Brittanies captured all the placings with one exception, and that was fourth place in the All Age Stakes gained by Dr. Gil Huston's English Setter "Stagboro Gentleman". All who were present were most enthusiastic over the excellent arrangement, and they were particularly so over the excellent lunch provided each day by the Women's Institutes of Harrington one day and Winsloe the second day. This service was greatly appreciated, and this, together with the fact that the farmers of those two districts had made their lands available to the Club, made the holding of these Trials possible.

Great credit is due, both to Stewart G. Ives, the genial President of the Club who acted as Field Marshal, and to Stewart Jones, the Field Trial Representative of the Maritime Zone for the C.K.C. The efforts of these gentlemen and their band of willing workers who seemed as if they couldn't do enough for competitors and "gallery" alike, ensured the success of the Meet, but in the final analysis it was the very satisfactory numbers of Hungarian partridge that topped off everything and made the Trials the success they undoubtedly were.

The Island Trials were followed immediately by the Annual Meet of the New Brunswick Brittany Club. These, again, were open to all pointing breeds, and thanks to the energy and enterprise of Jack Mayer of Moncton, N.B. who most successfully pioneered Field Trial work in New Brunswick, and to the fact that they were supported by the majority of the sportsmen who attended the Island, these, too, were a great success, and I understand that

there is likely to be an additional Meet next season at Sussex. Before leaving the subject of Field Trials, may I put in a word, in fact a plea, for greater support for this great sport from the Sportsmen on the mainland. We only get a very small portion of the entries that we should have.

I very much regret to say I have to speak of the passing of two grand dogs, "Ch. Danny Boy", a Labrador Retriever owned by Mrs. W. P. Moore, the wife of our Provincial Director. "Danny" was a familiar figure at all Maritime Shows, and he did a lot of very good winning. He made his Championship in 1942. He was bred in Nova Scotia by J. Somers of Amherst, Nova Scotia, but it was in the field that "Danny" was in his element for he was a grand gun-dog; he also was a most successful sire. The second dog of whose untimely death I must speak is that very fine Standard Poodle owned by Mr. E. St. John Green, of Canning, Nova Scotia. This beautiful bitch, "Rockvale Carmen", was imported from England from the Rockvale Kennels of Mrs. G. M. Edwards at Uppermill, Lancashire. This bitch was being returned to Mr. Green after being exhibited at the Poodle Specialty Show at Rochester, N.Y. where she had placed first in the Limit Class, and was in Montreal enroute for the kennels of Mrs. Lallemand at Senneville, Que. where she was to be bred. While waiting in Montreal she was allowed to escape from her crate and couldn't be rounded up. She was seen several times during the next few days but no stranger could get near her. Finally, she was run down by a car and killed. Naturally, Mr. Green feels very badly about this, and I am sure all Maritime fanciers will sympathize with him in his loss.

This writer had the very great pleasure of talking with that Dean of Collie breeders, W. Ormiston Roy, at the recent Halifax Show and at the

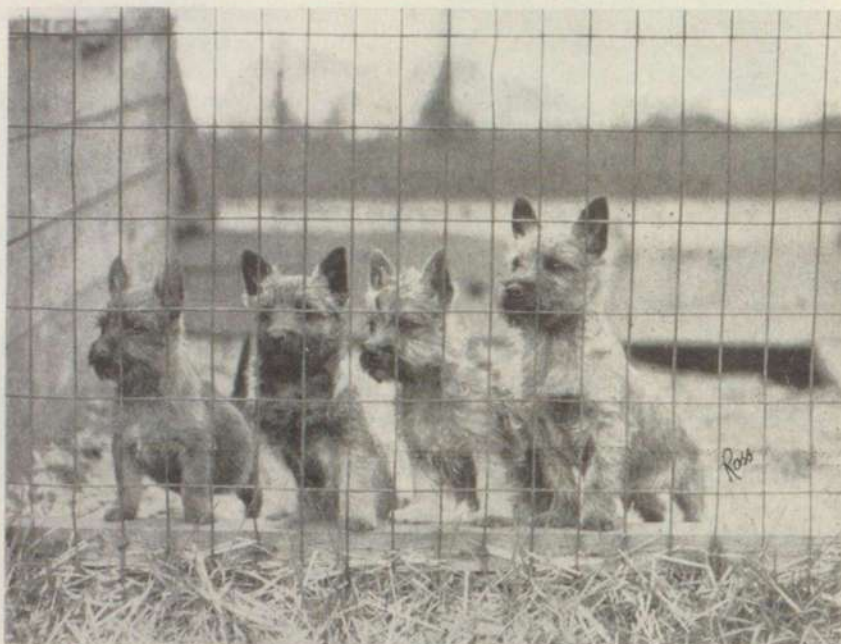

Truro Show. It was indeed a very great pleasure to again meet that Great Dane enthusiast, Alvin M. Litchfield of Winchester, Mass., and his very charming wife. They had returned to the Maritimes to collect that elusive last point on their Am. Ch. "Joralsted Prince Pierre". This they accomplished with no half measures, for they won the Working Group in Sydney, and Best in Show at the Pictou County Show.

It seems difficult to realize that by the time these Notes are printed 1948 will be on its last legs. We in the Maritimes have, I think, reason to be satisfied with our accomplishments during the year that is nearly over, for we have a record of 12 Championship Shows, two Field Trials for all pointing breeds, and three Beagle Trials. A satisfying record, I would suggest, and by far the most pleasing feature of that record is the three excellent Shows staged by the newly-formed Clubs at Fredericton, Sydney and Truro, N.S. 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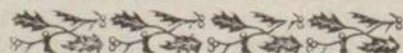

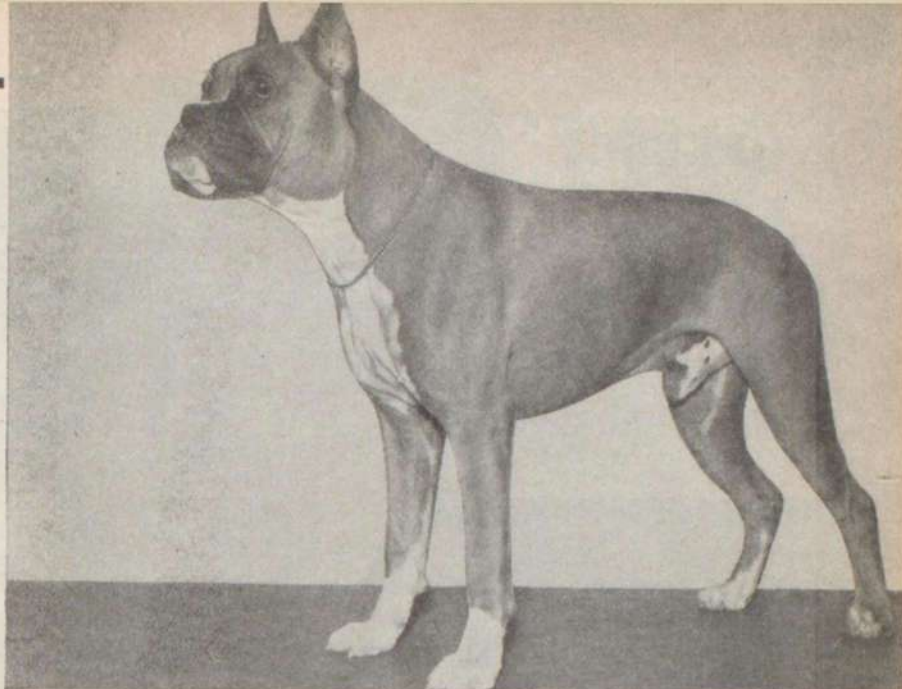

In Dachshunds, Mr. Vigneault, of Montreal, came home with a second in a strong class with his little bitch Coony, and Mrs. Hope won winner's dog with her imported long-haired Primrose Patch Lord Black. Next year we hope to make these Obedience Trials really international, and they should be the Show of the Year.

hundred miles of their home; the assignment should be far enough away that most of the dogs would never have been seen before.

Having made their decision as to the judges who will preside at their shows, the clubs must abide by that decision. The suggestion, however, of one person with many years of experience, that the Canadian Kennel Club representative at shows report to the Board of Directors any glaring errors in judging seems a good one, particularly since the further suggestion was made that following such complaints, the judge be requested to meet with the Board or anyone appointed by that body to carry out the work, in order that he may make an explanation of his decision, this to be done as soon as possible after the show which has been reported. It was felt that this procedure would serve as a check on anyone wanting judging assignments and would help greatly to eliminate a half-hearted job being done by any judge.

Christmas Greetings, also, to Mr. Fred C. Hessel, of London, Ontario, who is now in his 81st year and still maintains a large Kennel of Cocker Spaniels, this being his 52nd year in the breed. We believe Mr. Hessel is the only member of the Canadian Kennel Club living who attended the meeting in the Tecumseh Hotel in London when the Canadian Kennel Club was formed on September 27th, 1888.

Mrs. M. H. Page had a nice weekend at Detroit with her Welsh Corgi Champion Windrush Redwing, which is the first dog of any breed in the world to have attained the rating of International Champion Obedience dog. Redwing went through from Open Dogs to take second in the Working Group, which is certainly setting a record for the breed. According to the winners' ribbons Redwing is bringing back from the United States he will be able to add "International" to his Bench Show title, thereby breaking all records again.

A famous dog passed away last month, and we mention his passing because he was such a familiar figure at our Ontario Shows for the last fourteen years. He was the beautiful white Samoyed Ch. Nicholas, and was shown consistently through the years. He was beaten only once.

His owner, Mrs. Gladys Davies, took him to Chicago with her for the big Samoyed Specialty Show where he placed first in his class, although twelve years of age. Mat. Korshin was judging, and after he had placed the dogs he remarked to me that it would not surprise him if this particular dog did not live in a Kennel where there were Terriers, for the dog came into the ring prancing as if he owned the show, and with that Terrier air of knowing he was the best dog in there. Later, when the judging was over, I explained to Mr. Korshin that Nicholas lived in a Kennel which specialized in Kerry Blue Terriers and he had no doubt assumed many of their habits. The familiar sight of seeing Nicholas shepherd the other dogs into the show will be missed when the Spring shows come around.

"The Doggonedest Facts"

The cost of sending two Great Danes from San Francisco to the Philippine Islands was \$1,654.00. The Danes in question were the pair sold by Colonel J. De B. Cowan of Crystal Creek Ranch, Kaslo, British Columbia.

The purchaser, Mr. Fermin del Rosario of the Philippine Islands, was not the least bit perturbed when told of the cost of shipping by air. It is unlikely that there will be a rush of Great Danes to the Islands with such a rate charge for air shipping.



Somewhere in the back of our mind lay the suspicion that somewhere, sometime, a Cairn Terrier had won Best in Show All Breeds, and on searching the records we found that in 1935 the first Grand Champion Cairn Terrier in Canada, namely, Bonshaw Zur, owned by J. A. C. Irving of Vancouver, was Best in Show All Breeds at the Vancouver Junior League Show. This fine little Cairn had several Group wins to his credit, and he did much to promote the breed in Western Canada. He was bred in England and imported in dam.

Congratulations are in order to the publisher and editor of "Dog World" England, for "Dog World" has also adopted the "new look". The double page spread of the pictures of the winners at "Crufts", and the comprehensive review of all dog activities in the British Isles, makes this English publication a joy to read. Much of it is due to the acquisition of the new model Rotary Press, a triumph of British engineering. This machine is capable of printing, stitching and trimming a journal in one operation at high speed, and at the same time of adding clarity to both type and picture.

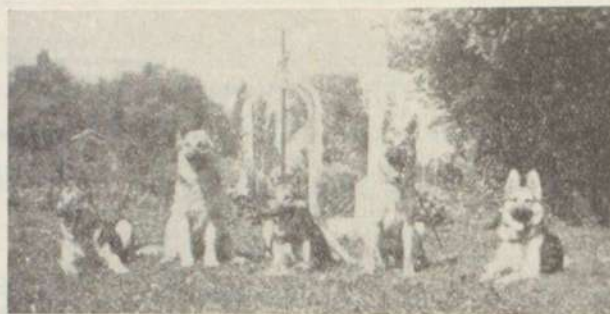

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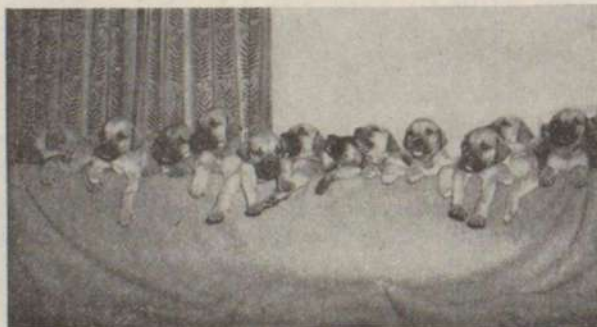

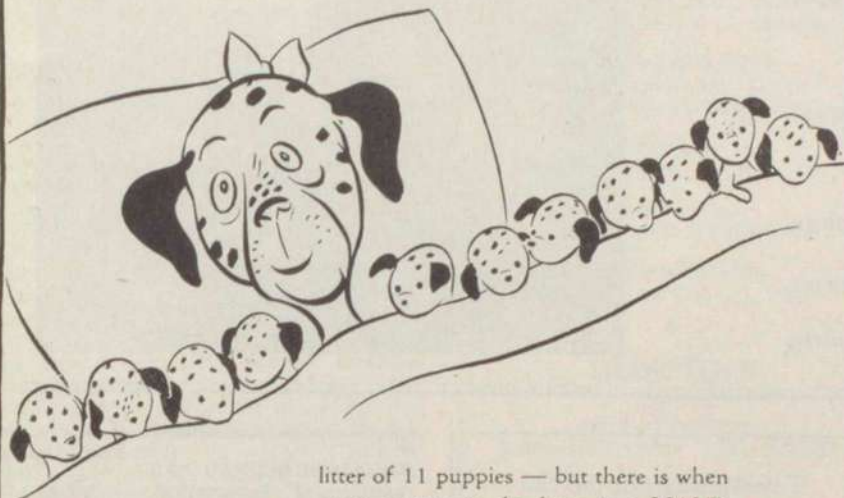

The Committee agreed to the experiment being carried out, provided the necessary Veterinary Surgeon's Certificates were obtained in both countries, and instructed the Assistant Secretary to notify the American Kennel Club of their decision. Should this experiment be successful, we will be enabled to breed our dogs in any country without the expense and red tape which is involved through quarantine laws, etc. An article on this subject will be published in DOGS IN CANADA shortly.

Background

WE were spending a pleasant evening recently, scanning The Scottish Farmers' Annual. Reading for probably the hundredth time about such great horses as Darnley, Hiawatha, Barons Pride and other notable winners of the Cawdor Cup, the top trophy in the draft horse world since 1892.

We read, too, how James Kilpatrick, of Cragie Mains, had won this trophy on thirteen separate occasions, the first being in 1901, the most recent 1942. We recalled that another Kilpatrick, uncle of James, had been an early winner before the turn of the century.

We wouldn't feel that this "horse talk" would strike a receptive note among dog people, except that word recently came to hand that Herbert Lloyd of "Ware" Cocker fame, had just won his fifth supreme award at Cruft's against an entry of over 4,000 dogs, with his female Tracey Witch. Mr. Lloyd has exhibited at Cruft's consistently for fifty years. The Lloyd family have bred and shown Cockers in Great Britain for close to one hundred years.

The conclusions we draw from such citations are the important part that background, experience and heredity play in the life of a successful breeder.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS — MEETING

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-TREASURER

1125. The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc., was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, on October 1st, 1948, commencing at 10.30 a.m. The President, Reg. P. Sparkes, presided. Officers and Directors present at the commencement of the meeting included: Walter Brown, D. J. Lerch, George P. Davies and Douglas Riedel.

1126. (1116). DATES AND JUDGES

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that Mr. A. M. Fitzgerald, Secretary-Treasurer of the Sportsmen's Kennel Club, indicated a desire to appear before the Board of Directors to speak on the matter of the Sportsmen's Kennel Club's application for permission to hold championship shows on March 25th and 26th, 1949.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Fitzgerald entered the meeting. He assured the Board that in the event the Board approved of the applications for dates submitted by the Sportsmen's Kennel Club, then the Club would provide the required passes for exhibitors as well as car passes but no such assurance could be given in respect to the admittance of spectators, and he saw no reason why any special arrangements should be made in that connection since spectators attending dog shows held in conjunction with exhibitions or fairs do not receive free entry into the exhibitions or fairs in order to attend dog shows.

The President assured Mr. Fitzgerald that the Board would consider his representations and assurances made on behalf of the Sportsmen's Kennel Club. Mr. Fitzgerald then left the meeting.

SUBJECT: The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held at Toronto on September 1st, 1948.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Riedel, seconded by Director Davies:

(c) The van parked at the rear entrance was a sufficient distance from the door to permit the removal of the largest crates.

(d) The duties of the C.K.C. Representative should be clarified so that all concerned may work in harmony.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Riedel, seconded by Vice-President Brown:

"THAT, the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club be informed that their letter has been received, that we are accepting their explanations in respect to the matters referred to in our letter of June 29th, that the Canadian Kennel Club is at all times "desirous" of cooperating with Clubs holding shows under our Rules, and that we trust we may continue to have the co-operation of the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club in that regard." Motion carried.

Director H. S. Weller entered the meeting

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Cliff Tushingham who state dthat he did not remove Dog No. 247 from the Progressive Kennel Club Show held on June 28th but that he did remove dog No. 249. The Secretary read a letter from Mr. James Beattie, listed in the catalogue of the Progressive Kennel Club Show as "Superintendent of the Show", who reported that he did not attend the show because of a business appointment in Toronto. The Secretary reported that a letter addressed to Mr. L. Mackay, at the order of the Board of Directors, had been returned by the post office.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Second Vice-President Lerch, seconded by Director Riedel:

"THAT, Mr. Cliff Tushingham be informed the re-occurrence of the unauthorized removal of a dog from a championship show would not be tolerated." Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that while Mr. Ted Ward had spoken to him at the Canadian National Exhibition in respect to his alleged failure to bench an English Springer Spaniel at the Fredericton Kennel Club Show held on June 29th, no reply had been received to the letter addressed to Mr. Ward in this regard a tthe order of the Board of Directors.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, this matter be held over for the consideration of the Board of Directors at its next meeting, and that Mr. Ward be given an opportunity to either answer the letter addressed to him a tthe Board's direction or appear before the Board of Directors to speak on the subject." Motion carried.

DISCUSSION: Director Riedel suggested that notice should appear in **DOGS IN CANADA** informing professional handlers that their failure to comply with the Dog Show Rules regarding the benching of dogs would be considered when they applied for the renewal of their handlers' licenses. Mr. Riedel also suggested that the C.K.C. Representative should report on those who fail to bench their dogs as required by the Dog Show Rules.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter addressed to the Board of Director by Mrs. Joy Osterdahl, Highland Creek, Ontario, who complained that the judge of Dachshunds at the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association Show held on September 9th, 1948 "did not in any way even attempt to judge" two dogs entered for Specials Only. The C.K.C. Representative's report on the judging at the above mentioned show was read by the Secretary.

DISCUSSION: Vice President Brown expressed the view that the C.K.C. Representative's report on judging should be available for the guidance of show-giving clubs. The President suggested that the judge be informed of the complaint and advise that when judging dogs at championship shows held under the rules of this Club every dog coming before him must be examined and moved before decisions are made.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Weller, seconded by Second Vice-President Lerch:

"THAT, a letter sent to the judge informing that the Board of Directors takes a very serious view of his judging or dogs at the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association show held on September 9th, 1948, and that in the event he again judges a championship show held under the Rules of this Club, it is expected that he will carefully examine and move every dog in the ring before making his decisions." Motion carried.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform Mrs. Osterdahl that the matter had been taken up with the judge.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mr. W. H. Pym, Vancouver, who suggested that an explanation should accompany the Dog Show Rules relating to the selection of Best Canadian-bred in Show, particularly to indicate to exhibitors circumstances under which a Canadian-bred dog, not directly defeated by another Canadian-bred dog, would not be eligible for this award.

DISCUSSION: Mr Pym's letter indicated that the subject matter of the letter might very well receive the consideration of the Dog Show Rules Committee, but the Board agreed that since the Dog Show Rules Committee was no longer in existence it would be perfectly in order for Mr. Pym to submit a proposed amendment to the Dog Show Rules clarifying the rule in question.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Second Vice-President Lerch, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, Mr. Pym be informed that

it would be quite in order for him to submit a proposed amendment clarifying the Rules relating to the selection of Best Canadian-bred in Show." Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mr. John R. Kennedy, Toronto, in which Mr. Kennedy made observations in respect to the difficulty of holding a large show in one day, the assistance rendered by Mr. Alf. Loveridge, the C.K.C. Representative at the shows held in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition, of the excellent organization of the Canadian National Exhibition office staff, of the excellent work of the Superintendent, Mr. John McNaughton, and Ring Stewards at the Exhibition Dog Show, of the advisability of so arranging a show that the Group judging might well start at 7.00 in order that the Best in Show could commence at approximately 9.30 p.m.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Second Vice-President Lerch, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, Mr. Kennedy be thanked for his communication and informed that it is very likely that the matters referred to in his letter would be discussed at the next annual general meeting of the Club." Motion carried.

Director W. E. Baker entered the meeting.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. A. Molin President of the All Toy and Boston Terrier Association, Vancouver, in respect to an alleged contravention of Chapter 19, Section 1 of the Dog Show Rules at the Pacific National Exhibition Show held on September 3rd and 4th, 1948. The Secretary read a letter from Mr. William H. Pym, Show Superintendent of the Pacific National Exhibition Shows, who reported that the dog referred to in Mrs. Molin's letter was given official permission to be removed from the bench for a period of one hour and that the dog was returned to the bench within that period.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Dr. Weller, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, Mrs. Molin be informed that we have received a report on this matter from the Show Superintendent, that this Board accepts the report of the Show Superintendent and that no other action be taken in respect of this matter." Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary placed the following reports before the Board:

(1) C.K.C. Representative's reports on the Toronto Kennel Club Show held on September 4th. The Canadian National Exhibition Dog Shows held on September 6th, 7th and 8th, the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association Show held on September 9th, the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada Specialty Show held on September 18th, and the Niagara Frontier Kennel Club Show held on September 25th;

(2) Director Rooney's Report on the Sanction Show held by the Hull and District Kennel Club on August 22nd;

(3) Director Saunders' reports on the Medicine Hat Kennel Club Shows held on September 6th and 7th, the Alberta Kennel Club Shows held on September 8th and 9th, and the Edmonton Kennel Club Shows held on September 13th and 14th.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Second Vice-President Lerch, seconded by Director Riedel:

"THAT, the reports on Shows as received from the C.K.C. Representative and Directors Rooney and Saunders be filed for reference purposes." Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that information received from Mr. John S. Grant of Edmonton and Director Saunders indicated that Mrs. M. D. Gardner, Secretary of the Edmonton Kennel Club, was seriously ill, and that the Edmonton Kennel Club could not therefore submit its official returns for shows held on September 13th and 14th within the time limit set by the Dog Show Rules. The Secretary reported that after consultation with the President, permission had been given to send the returns in at a later date.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, the action taken by the President and Secretary in respect to the returns for the Edmonton Kennel Club Shows be endorsed." Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Sergeant Roy Montague, Secretary of the Halifax Kennel Club, who reported that the ribbon manufacturer, from whom they had ordered ribbons for their Championship Show held on September 6th, had failed to provide the correct ribbons as ordered, and since the order had not been received by the Halifax Kennel Club until shortly before the Show, it was impossible for them to supply the correct ribbons at their show.

ACTION: It was decided that no action would be taken in respect to this matter unless any complaints are received from exhibitors at the Halifax Kennel Club Show.

1132. DOGS IN CANADA

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a night letter from Director V. W. Williams who strongly recommended that favourable consideration be given to immediate revision of the salary now being paid the Editor of **DOGS IN CANADA**. Director Williams stated that her "latest achievement is a masterpiece and surely warrants recognition at this time." The Secretary read a letter from Director Kenyon who referred to the Diamond Jubilee issue and who was of the opinion that the Managing Director is deserving of sincere congratulations from the Board for her splendid efforts.

DISCUSSION: In discussing the matter the Board agreed that the matter of the Editor's salary should be considered by the **DOGS IN CANADA** Committee. Second Vice-President Lerch recommended that the Editor be given a bonus for her

efforts in connection with the Jubilee issue. Director Baker stated that the Board should have a financial statement showing the standing of the magazine before making a decision on the recommendation advanced by Director Williams.

ACTION: The matter was ordered referred to the DOGS IN CANADA Committee for consideration and report.

Vice-President Brown took the chair while the President was temporarily absent from the meeting.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. John H. Nelles, Fort Churchill, Manitoba, with regard to the registration of a litter of Airedales, whelped in Canada, which Mrs. Nelles wished to register directly with the American Kennel Club without previous Canadian registration.

DISCUSSION: In discussing Mrs. Nelles' request, the Board noted that while a number of these puppies would be returned to the United States, some had been sold in Canada, and it was felt that it would be preferable for the litter and the individual puppies sold in Canada to be registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform Mrs. Nelles that the Board was of the opinion that the litter and individual puppies should be registered in Canada since some of the puppies had been sold in Canada, and by following this arrangement, it would enable her to provide Canadian certificates for the puppies which had been sold earlier than would otherwise be possible and at less expense.

The President resumed the Chair.
