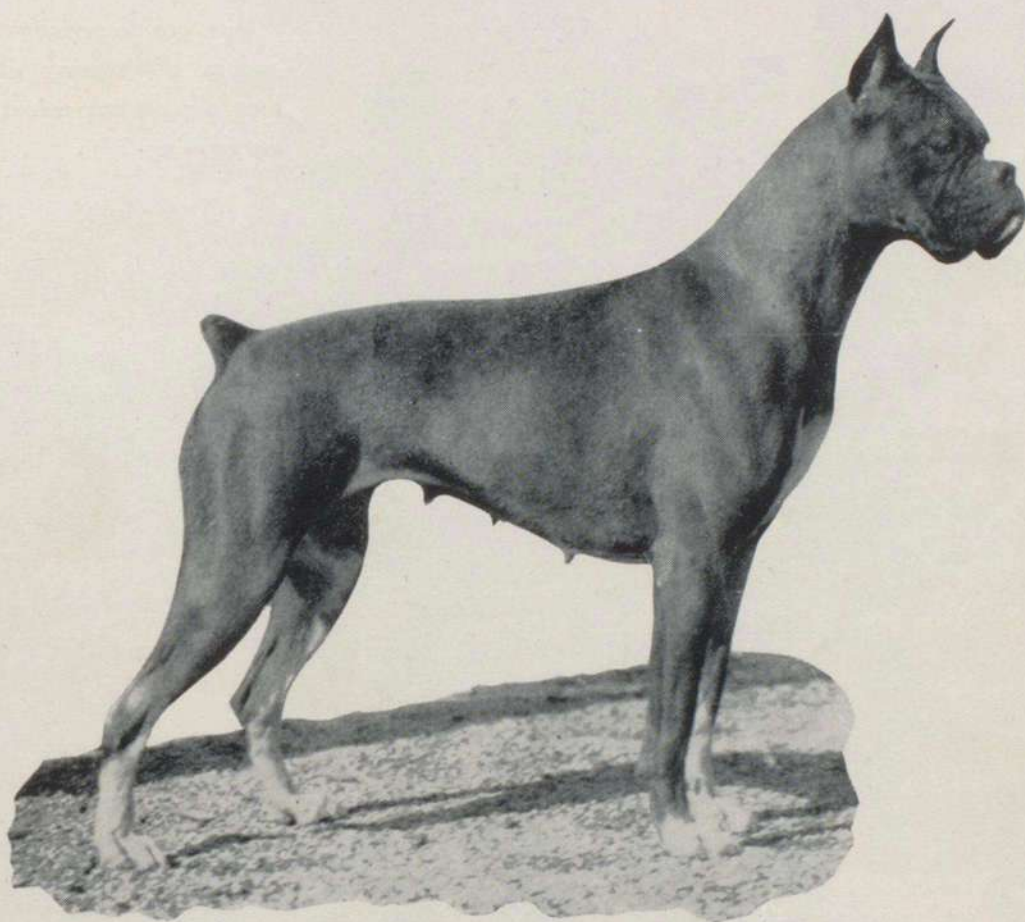

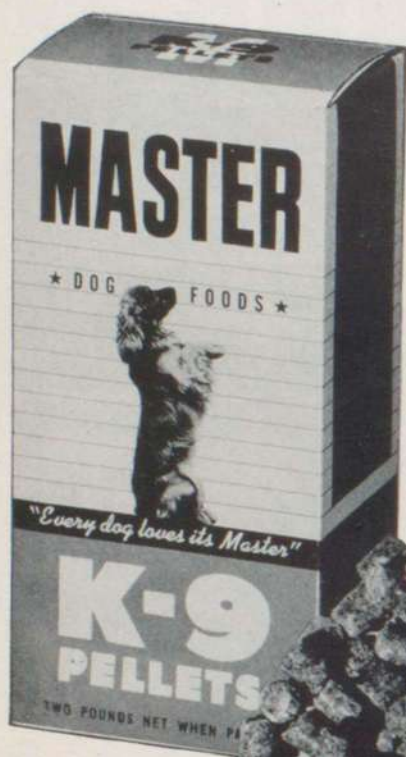

OUR COVER

In presenting the Boxer, this month, we are fortunate in having such a fine specimen for our Cover as International Champion Clinaude's Ottilia. That she is a worthy specimen of her breed is evidenced by the fact that she won her American Championship in the stiffest of competitions, and on her arrival in Canada she won Best of Breed at her first three shows. In addition to winning Working Groups, she also won Best of Breed at the Boxer Club of Canada's Specialty Show under Judge Charles Spannaus of New York City.

She was then retired from the shows while she whelped a litter of outstanding puppies. She will return to the shows this Spring.

In addition to Ottilia, Mr. William Harris has other good Boxers which have also made a name for themselves in the show ring and as producers of good stock.

Heading the stud dogs is Champion Clinaude's Palladium, half brother to the Boxer featured on our Cover this month.

Mr. Harris has also bred several Champion Miniature Pinschers from the two International female Champions which he imported to found his kennels. He has discontinued this breed, however, concentrating on Boxers, and has done much to further the advancement of pure bred dogs in this country.

The Importance of the Show Superintendent

TWO pairs of hands, eyes in the back of his head, a spare pair of feet, limitless patience and the wisdom of a Solomon are only a few of the requisites of the Show Superintendent. Coupled with these he should have a sense of humour which can work overtime if necessary—and without overtime pay!

There is little the superintendent can do prior to the setting up of the show. He will, when all the entries have been tabulated, work out a judging schedule which will be mailed out to all judges, ring stewards and the chief ring steward. The closest cooperation between the superintendent and the show secretary is a "must" if a show is to be well organized and smooth-moving, once it is in operation. In order to facilitate the setting up of the benching, the show secretary, as well as providing the superintendent with the tabulated entries, will also provide him with the exact numbering for each breed entered at the show in order that he may work out a suitable arrangement of benching.

In every well run show, the benching is arranged in such a manner that it will facilitate the movement of dogs to and from the judging rings. All this takes time—in fact, one might almost say the setting up of a blue-print is necessary if the show is of any size at all. In addition, the superintendent will figure the size of the number of rings required. He will also lay out a floor plan which will provide adequate space for handlers to put their crates and for all exhibitors to prepare their dogs for the ring, since there is that rigid rule that no crates will be allowed in the aisles. He must also make adequate provision for that bone of contention, the exercise rings. He it will be, who will decide whether the rings shall be of a certain size, and also the matter which has always been argued as to whether or not there shall be gates on the rings.

Since few clubs own their own benching, rarely can the superintendent and his assistants begin setting up the show until the evening before the actual day of the show. If he is wise, he will have fortified himself for the hours ahead of him from around 6.30 in the evening until any hour short of the opening time the morning of the show. No matter how many assistants may have been assigned to this job by the chairman of the show committee, there are always some absentees and it is strangely true that nuts and bolts have a contrariwise manner in even the best managed

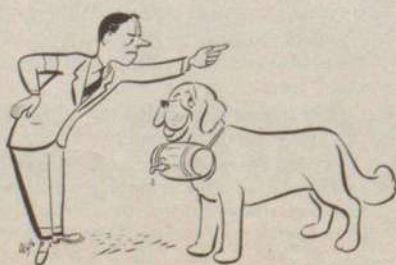
piece of work. And there will always be those who, while they have not taken the time the superintendent has to figure things out, are full of bright suggestions, mostly impractical in nature. Also those anxious to do their share but who need supervision so that the superintendent must needs be in several places at once if things are to go as he intended.

In addition to setting up the benching, he will see to it that the rings are properly blocked off, and that the necessary matting for gaiting the dogs is properly in place should the floor be of a polished nature. He will check to see that tables with basins are available for the veterinarians the first thing in the morning and that the judges' tables are in place in the rings. He will check to see that drinking water is available for dogs as well as their owners, and if he wants to save himself a good many questions as to "where —" he will see that signs are properly posted to direct exhibitors to conveniences. He will also try to persuade the show committee to see that capable persons cater in good fashion to the needs of the inner man.

Signs will also be posted at the ends of each row of benching informing exhibitors as well as visitors as to the breeds benched along that aisle. This too, saves much time when exhibitors arrive in the morning, many of whom do not have too much time to spare before their dogs are scheduled to be in the ring.

If food companies have been given permission to set up displays, he will direct their representatives as to where these may be placed, in order that they will not interfere with exhibitors or visitors to the show, and he will also see that the trophy table is placed in a suitable spot.

Finally, when the benching has been set up, the superintendent will see that the benches are all properly numbered. After that, if there should be any time between then and the opening of the show, he may take his weary bones to bed.



The morning of the show he probably will be the first person on the job, along with the chairman of the show and the secretary. Then begins a day when he can practise all his skill as a diplomat; his knowledge gained as an exhibitor, himself, and the fancy in general and the Dog Show rules as laid down by the Canadian Kennel Club. At the same time, he will try to keep everyone happy, because he wants to make a favorable impression for his club so



that everyone will want to return for their next show. Therefore, he is also expected to be a sort of "ambassador of good-will."

No matter how carefully he had laid out the benching, he has no way of knowing that Mrs. Smith's Affenpoocher is allergic to Mrs. Jones' entry in the same breed, but being an agreeable person, he is willing to change the numbers on the benches so that the "poochers" and their exhibitors will be happy. Occasionally, there is a lady brought to the show who is in an interesting condition so far as her male neighbor is concerned and again, knowing how disrupting the situation can be for everyone, the superintendent agrees to make the change. All of these are legitimate requests and the superintendent is willing to cooperate with exhibitors in order to keep them happy.

At the hour when dogs should have been benched in order to be allowed into the show, the superintendent will make a check of all absentees, along with the stewards who work outside the ring. In order to facilitate matters, it is as well for him to mark the card on the bench, "absent." If the exhibitor with this dog should arrive later and his reasons for lateness be satisfactory, the mark may be removed; this decision lies with the superintendent entirely. In any case, the check up eliminates those exhibitors who have a habit of arriving late. If this practice is observed regularly at shows there will be less complaining on the part of exhibitors who, travelling long distances, still manage to arrive on time, when those who are nearby make no effort to get there at the time specified because they have discovered that their breed is not to be judged until later in the day. Rules should be applied to everyone and exceptions should be made only when they are absolutely necessary.

As the judging progresses, the superintendent will check to see that the judges are keeping within the time specified. If the time-table for judging has been posted (and this is something which makes for the greatest satisfaction both on the part of visitors as well as exhibitors) he should see to it that the schedule is reasonably adhered to. He will occasionally check to see that dogs have not been removed from benches and taken to crates, another rule which should be rigidly adhered to. It is certain that there probably isn't an exhibitor showing dogs today who would not have liked to put his dog in a crate for one reason or another but who, because he knows there is a rule forbidding it, has sat with his dog hour after hour in order to keep over-interested persons away from it. It is amazing how few persons pay attention to a sign warning them not to handle the dog!

The Superintendent will see to it that the aisles are kept clean by those persons who have been engaged to do this work. It is also of the utmost importance that exercise rings be kept clean and the necessary requisites for keeping the judging rings clean kept within easy access of the rings. Careful spraying of the rings at regular intervals on the part of those who are in charge of this work should also be supervised by the superintendent of the show.

During the recess following the judging of all the breeds, the superintendent will see that the rings are broken down and arranged for the judging of the groups and best in show in the evening. He will, with the show secretary, see that the judges' and trophy table are properly arranged and that everything is in order so that the judging may proceed without delay. In order to facilitate the judging, he may work with the outside steward in seeing that dogs are brought to the rings promptly. To appear with one's dog in the group is not an occasion to be taken lightly by most exhibitors, and almost invariably one finds that exhibitors have taken care to see that every hair is polished and in place and they are waiting to be called. But there are those who cannot resist the temptation to "make an entrance", and while there should be no need to make exhibitors feel that they are being rushed, on the other hand there are many others who would like to see the final judging of the show, who have no part



to play, who create that atmosphere of excitement and give their best applause to the winners, but who also have long distances to travel before they arrive at home and it is only all of the piece of good sportsmanship to be ready when one's number is called.

Probably during this final judging, the superintendent has his most difficult time. There are always those who know the regulations full well but who find it imperative that they leave long before the closing time. They know, also, that it is only on the permission of the superintendent that they may leave the show building before the close of the show, unless the show runs over the regulation time. Here it is that he must use all his tact and diplomacy in the face of such urgency as is usually the case. But having allowed one or two exhibitors to go, how can he refuse a larger number if they also want to leave? One could hardly blame the superintendent if he became somewhat invisible for the time being. On the other hand, if he has seen to it that the show ran along smoothly and is closing at a reasonable hour it should not be too difficult for most persons to remain until the closing of the show.

Along with the secretary, the superintendent will probably be the last person to leave. There are always those who go away leaving coats, trophies, chains and leads on chairs or benches and these will be collected so that owners may pick them up. As was the case at one show, someone may even leave a dog which must be cared for until the owner comes to pick it up. With the president of the show-giving club, the superintendent and secretary will tiredly look at each other and ask whether the others thought it went off alright. At least one of them will point out that "Mrs. So-and-So" said it was one of the nicest shows she had ever attended. With that one small bouquet, they will go home, the secretary to her hundreds of jobs in winding up the show; the president and the superintendent to snatch a few hours sleep before returning to the scene of activity the next day to go through all the business of undoing what they had, forty-eight hours before, done so valiantly. While dismantling a show may not require the skill and care that setting it up made necessary, on the other hand it requires manual labor and after the long hours previously spent by those members of the club

who volunteered to carry out this most important end of the show, it is not looked forward to with great relish. Probably the only thing which makes it bearable is an opportunity to compare notes on the vagaries of the human who is attached to the other end of a lead and the things they will endure in order to show a good dog.

Certainly, the work of the show superintendent is no cynosure, for upon his good judgment and far-sighted planning rests much of the success of any good dog show and the show-giving club owes much to him if he has carried out his duties satisfactorily.



To be successful, a dog show should be looked upon in the same light as a theatrical production. While the Canadian Kennel Club may write the lyrics, as it were, it is the show-giving club which provides the settings for the show and actually is behind the entire production, with the dogs and their exhibitors the actors upon the stage. The superintendent has to be a combined stage manager and director, for he is faced with all the difficulties encountered by any director of a large production with the number of persons he has to try, in some measure, to please.

He has a tremendous responsibility, since the pacing of the show does rest with him to a great degree, and in a dog show as in any other show, timing is of the utmost importance. Properly produced, a show can be a tremendously important event in any community, attracting many persons who might not otherwise ever come within miles of the spot. A good dog holds attraction for almost any individual: a group of good dogs, beautifully prepared and capably handled, set against the background of a well-managed show, can do much to educate the public to the qualities of our canine friends. A successful show is a credit to the show-giving club, and also to the community in which it is held. In the final analysis, the superintendent has not only a responsibility to the club which placed upon his shoulders the work of managing the show, but to the community, since any event receiving the publicity accorded a dog show is a reflection upon the community in which it is held, whether for good or ill. It is a matter for great satisfaction, that in Canada, and in spite of the work and responsibility involved, superintendents are dog fanciers who have given their services gratis.



OFFICERS ELECTED FOR 1949

To familiarize the members with the officers newly elected, we will give a brief introduction.

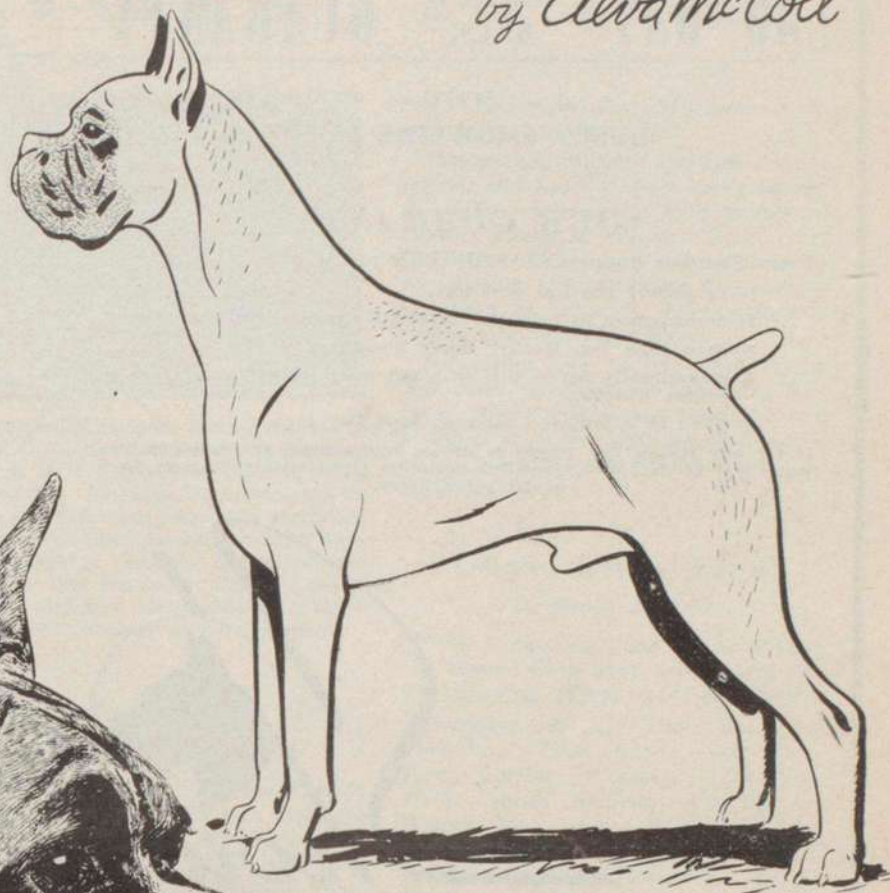
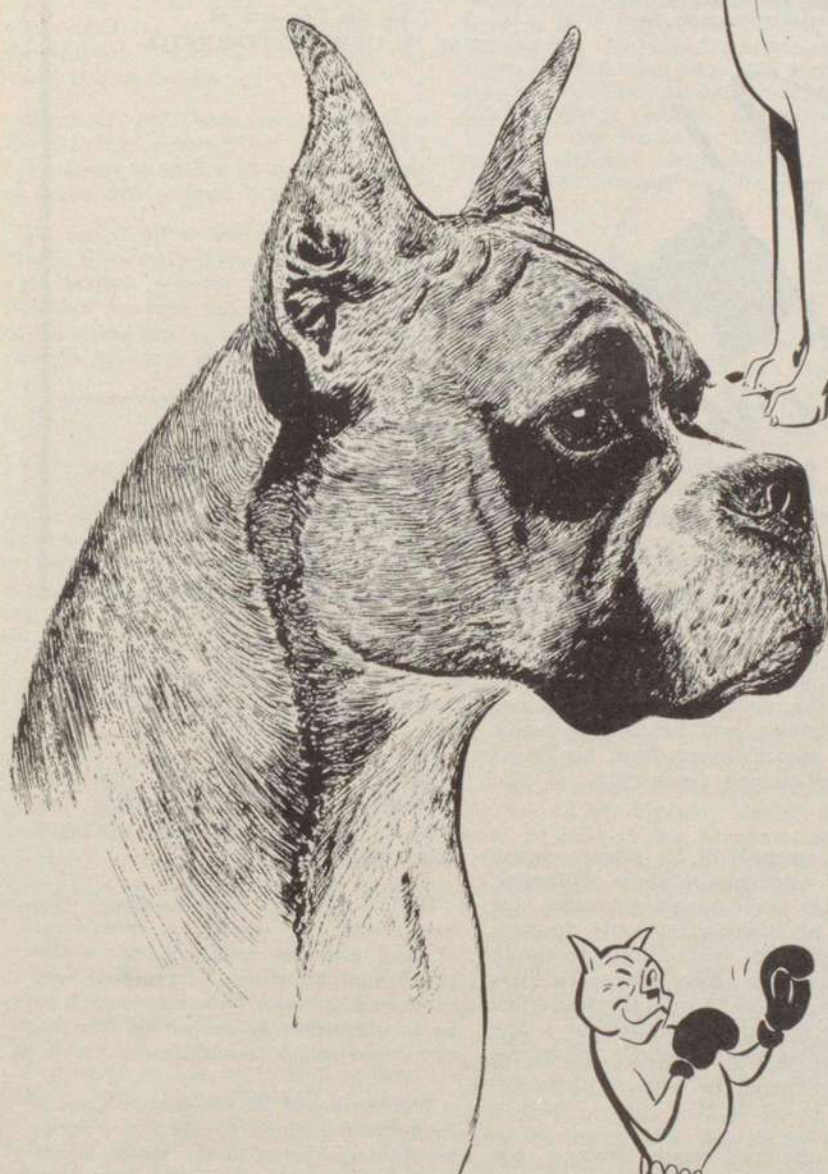

Know Your Breed ...

THE BOXER

ALTHOUGH it has reached its greatest perfection in Germany during the past 100 years, the Boxer springs of a line of dogs that has been known throughout the whole of Europe since the 16th Century. Prior to that time, the ancestors of this breed would hardly be recognized as the Boxer could they be placed beside modern specimens. Still, there is evidence that points to the Boxer as one of the many descendants of the old fighting dog of the high valleys of Tibet.

The Boxer is cousin to practically all recognized breeds of the bulldog type, and these all go back to the basic Molossus blood. Few other strains can claim such courage and stamina, and it is from this line that there has been handed down the attractive fawn color that recurs throughout the centuries.

Flemish tapestries of the 16th and 17th Centuries give scenes of stag and boar hunting, and the dogs in these splendid works of art are the same as the Spanish Alano, found in great numbers in Andalusia and Estramadura, and the Matin de Terceira or perro do Presa, from the Azores. The Alano and the Matin have been regarded as the same breed, and they are either ancestors of the Boxer or trace back to a common ancestor.

In France, there is a breed known as the Dogue de Bordeaux that is very close, both in appearance and size to the old Tibetan mastiff, and it is from this massive dog that the Bouldogue du Mida was developed. The Bouldogue du Mida, found principally in the South of France, possesses many of the points of the Boxer.

While all the European breeds mentioned are related to the Boxer, this favorite of Germany has been developed along scientific lines that not only have succeeded in retaining all his old qualities but have produced a much more attractive appearance. Besides bulldog blood he carries a certain heritage from a terrier strain. There also is some reason to believe that English bulldogs were at one time imported into Germany. Indeed, Reinagle's noted bulldog, done in 1803, is not unlike the Boxer, and pictures of some English specimens of 1850 are almost identical with the German dog.

Until dog fighting and bull-baiting were outlawed by most civilized peoples in the middle of the 18th Century, the Boxer, like all dogs of his type, were used for this purpose. Today, he has become an accredited member of society, but he still carries his old qualities, courage, defense mechanism, and aggressiveness when needed. Withal, he is devoted to his master.

Height: Males—22 inches to 24 inches at the withers. Females—21 inches to 23 inches at the withers. Males should not go under and females should not go over.

Weight: Males around 23 inches should weigh over 66 lbs., and females of about 22 inches should weigh around 62 lbs.

To say that J. P. Wagner has done more for the Boxer than any one person on this continent should meet with agreement throughout the fancy.

Probably his one greatest, single act in the cause of Boxerdom, was his importation from Germany of the one and only, Dorian.

Dorian retired from the ring undefeated, and his showmanship has been the topic of conversation wherever Boxer fans gather.

Dorian followed his sensational ring career with one equally as sensational at stud and has left a mark on the breed that should be intensified and preserved by those fortunate enough to be in possession of one of his few remaining sons and daughters.

The coming of Mr. Wagner to Canada to judge this show should be of paramount importance to the entire Boxer fancy and should also go a long, long way to further popularize the breed in Canada.

The show committee is sparing no effort to see that an entry, both in quality and in number, comparable to America's best is on hand to greet Mr. Wagner on May 24th, in Guelph.

What is Between the Head and the Tail of the Collie

By WM. L. POWELL

EVERYTHING has been ears and skulls until a person wonders about the other three-quarters of the dog. I have seen dogs in the show ring and how they were able to walk around the ring, let alone trot was a mystery. Poor hindquarters, wrong gait, spindly boned, sheep necked, bodies three and four inches too long, no depth of ribs, bodies greyhound size, front legs as if they were coming out of one opening and the hocks (knock kneed or cow hocked). Coats that don't fit—open so that you could almost see the skin or soft as a woolly lamb. A spectator would be justified in asking what breed was being judged. These faults are common, not in Canada alone but are also common in United States.

Specialty judge Roy Mitchell, when asked at the Collie Forum, "What is Between the Head and the Tail", replied: "A muscular neck set well up so the head may be carried high, shoulders should be straight with well filled forearms leading to strong pasterns, good depth and well rounded sprung ribs, a nice sloping top line from front to rear. Rear quarters very well muscled with well bent stifles to the hock and then straight down. Front and back legs should be set well apart." With this in mind, I asked the leading breeders of England and United States to write a paragraph on the most glaring conformation faults as seen in our ring today.

CH. LAUND LIBERATION

Fifty-two times best of breed and best in show at Detroit. Imported from Ireland by Mrs. Florence Ilch of the Bellhaven Kennels.

This dog was undefeated in Ireland and England and continued his splendid record here in America. I saw this dog three years ago at Detroit and again at the Collie Club Specialty in Cleveland. A breeder and specialty judge said to me, "if that dog is right then we have been breeding wrong". My answer was, "you have".

Dear Mr. Powell: Yes, indeed, there are too many long bodied, flat sided, leggy Collies around today. I do not like the soft, fluffy coat, narrow chest, close movers behind, and shy, scary dogs.

It has been written by one who has been associated with the Samoyed breed almost from the time it was introduced into England, and who, after keeping many of these beautiful dogs for more than twenty years, tries to give practical information as to keeping, breeding and rearing them. It points out also the many great advantages possessed by the Samoyeds, either from the point of view of the house-dog, the companion, or the devoted friend of all who own them.

DACHSHUNDS. By L. E. Naylor.

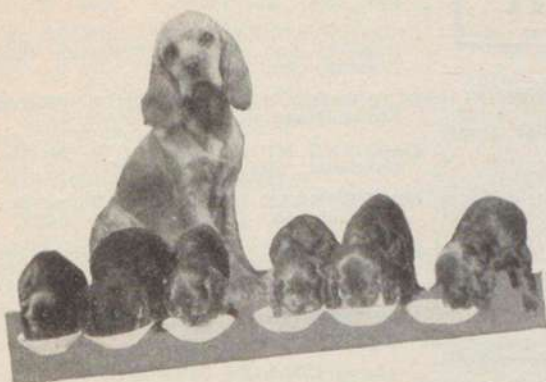

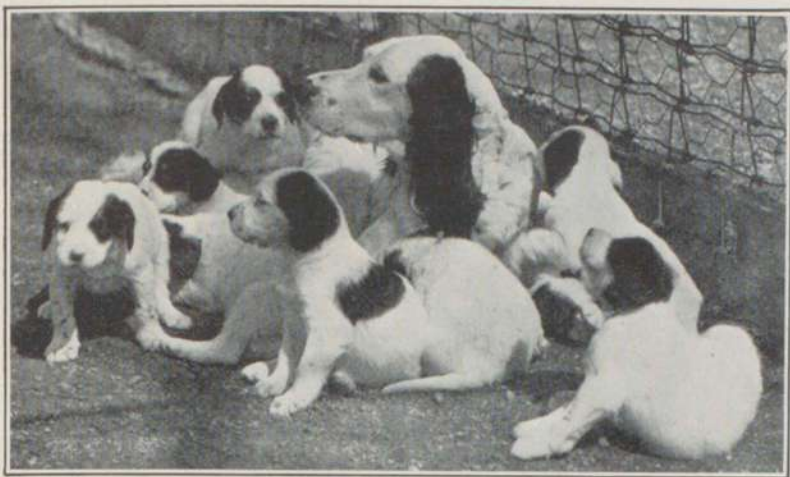

The Importance of the Novice Exhibitor

EVERY exhibitor of dogs who has been asked how he began showing dogs will have a different story to tell, but he will end by saying that once he began he couldn't stop.

We remember hearing one of our most consistent exhibitors recall how she had bought what she thought was a lovely dog, entered it at a fairly large show, and returned home with rage in her heart. Out of this rage grew a determination to get a better dog and go right back to show everyone that she, too, could enter a good dog and win with it. To her credit, she did. One of the most outstanding exhibitors in the United States recounted for us at a show where her dog won the Sporting Group how she had been given a dog by a breeder who felt sorry for her. She remarked that she knows full well today that the dog had no right to win anything, but the first time shown he was Winners Dog, and from then on she became a dog show



addict. She admitted to tears being shed when her "pride and joy" was consistently defeated at a number of shows after his first win, but she had enough good sense to go to an old-timer to talk over her troubles. That day she planned the foundation of her kennel which, today, is one of the finest in the country. Remembering her early experiences, she probably has started as many novices on their way as anyone else. Here or there, we may find an exhibitor who started out on his own, but it is praiseworthy to note that almost every exhibitor will recall that some one established in his breed had been his "guardian angel" while his kennel was in its infancy.

If you ask an exhibitor whether it has been worthwhile to show dogs, you will probably get as many different replies as there are persons to ask! There are some exhibitors with whom dogs and showing dogs is essentially a hobby, just as golf or horse-racing is a mania with others; there are those

who make it a business and who have built kennels where many dogs are bred and sold. There are those who are not over-careful breeders, who turn a great many dogs out of their kennels, breeding once in a while (accidentally or otherwise), a really good dog on which they build a reputation. There are others with whom breeding is a scientific business, and only a few planned litters are whelped each year in those kennels. This is the breeder who is making a contribution to the betterment of his breed and usually he has arrived at this point through bitter experience, but he is a better breeder for having learned the hard way. But of all these exhibitors each has one thing in common—once along his way he was a novice, too.

As we have remarked before, while there will always be those "big breeders" who will continue to show dogs, it is the novices (and there is a new crop every season), with their high-hearted hopes who keep the shows going. Here one finds the greatest percentage of exhibitors showing their own dogs. Perhaps they have just one dog which they have been told has possibilities in the show ring, and they set out to discover whether or not their mentors have been right. Often there is disappointment, sometimes joy, but somewhere the owner has picked up a new interest amounting to a mania in some. To others it becomes a sporting hobby which brings pleasure and pain, sometimes satisfaction; often disappointment and hard work with little financial gain. It is a hobby which brought forth the sage observation on the part of someone, "The more I see of some people, the better I like my dog."

Invariably the novice wants to know what he has to do to show his dog. In the beginning, he may have bought a dog just because it happened to be the one he knew best or liked best, with no knowledge of the essentials



for making a good type of that particular breed; he has depended entirely upon the honesty of the breeder from whom he purchased his dog. If he has been misled, he will soon discover his dog's shortcomings once he has entered him at one or two shows. At least, he will learn whether or not the dog is able to win—what he learns beyond that is problematical.

We have had letters from novice exhibitors who complain that they have paid their entry fee, brought their dogs before the judge and left the ring not having learned a thing, excepting that the judge didn't like their dog well enough to put it up. The only way they are able to learn what is wrong is through the kindness of some other exhibitor who will, if asked, possibly point out where the dog is lacking as a dog, or where the exhibitor could have made his good points more outstanding by trimming or dressing him up. If he is keenly observant, he may be able to discover something in the dogs that did win which just MIGHT be the reason why they won, but he still has no assurance that this is the case. Unless he is a hardy individual, that may be the end of his career in the show-ring.

It is probably true that if every person contemplating the purchase of a dog stopped to study the standard of that breed and all its requirements there would be few exhibitors at shows. But it is essential that the exhibitor should have in his mind's eye a picture of the perfect specimen of his breed and then check his own dog against that picture. We doubt if the perfect specimen of any breed has been bred. Invariably the owner of a really good dog, if he is honest, will admit to a fault or two, possibly minor but still



faults. Having satisfied himself that his dog is pretty near to the requirements of the standard, he still has much to do before his dog is ready for the show-ring.

There is nothing more delightful to the eye of the spectator than a dog and his handler who seem to be in constant accord and understanding while in the show-ring. One often hears the remark at the ringside, "Did you ever see such co-ordination between that dog and his handler?" In this combination we have a happy one, for these two understand one another. It is true that every dog likes to please his owner, and if the owner has inspired confidence on the part of the dog whatever happens in the show-ring the dog will be merry—one of the first requisites. With some dogs this comes naturally; with others it has to be cultivated by the exhibitor with many weeks of unceasing effort, but there are some dogs which never arrive at the place where they enjoy being shown.

Having taught his dog ring manners, the new exhibitor will concentrate on preparing his dog for the show, keeping in mind that competition these days is really tops and a dog must be in top condition if he is to be considered by the judge. We have seen dogs that, physically, were bound to be show winners, but the owner did not bring the dog into the ring "dressed for the occasion." Coats must be worked on constantly if they are to look their best. If the dog is one of the breeds requiring trimming, it might be wiser for the exhibitor to take the dog to a professional for this job, until he learns how to do it efficiently for himself. If he has several other dogs he can do a bit of experimenting there, but no experiments may be made on the dog he intends to show tomorrow or even next week—coats do not grow overnight, and a poor trim on a dog can make him look like a bum, instead of a potential champion properly prepared.

Sanction shows should be the novice's delight, for here he may take his dog to a show which is informal. This gives him a chance to see how his dog will perform in the company of other dogs,

and he, himself, can gain confidence in handling his dog before a group of interested spectators. Usually, the judges are persons who are breeding and showing dogs themselves, and recognizing before them the newcomer who is probably suffering the agonies most novices do, they offer good advice. All this helps to give the new exhibitor confidence in himself and his dog, one of the most important requirements, for nervousness on the part of the handler certainly is transmitted to his dog, often with disastrous results. Occasionally, one sees a dog that just naturally shows himself, and no matter how badly mis-handled stands out as a winner, but such a dog is unusual. Every dog needs to feel that the person in the ring with him knows what he is doing and that all is well.

While sanction shows may be many in some localities, there are many exhibitors who do not live in those communities. These novices have to go into a show without previous experience, and here, we believe, the judge has a great responsibility.

There is no doubt that the judge can recognize the novice in the ring. The steward too, can detect hesitancy, possibly on the part of the exhibitor when he comes into the ring and he can be helpful in an unobtrusive manner. We have remarked before that no one feels the show-ring is the place for a social call (though we have observed judges holding long conversations with exhibitors as they were leaving the ring simply because they happened to know each other), but it would certainly put the stamp of approval on any judge if he would indicate to exhibitors where their dogs failed to meet with his approval. The seasoned exhibitor knows his dog's faults full well. We have heard many of them remark that they don't worry about the dog's good points—the judge will see those. They concentrate on minimizing the dog's faults! If the fault found by the judge could be corrected, the exhibitor would be forever grateful to him if he told him how to do it. If the dog's fault lies in his immaturity, would it not be a kindness on the part of the judge to impart that knowledge to the exhibitor? We well recall taking a young dog to a show simply because we wanted that particular judge to pass on him, knowing that he was an authority on our breed. In the pleasantest manner possible, he pointed out the dog's good points and at the end remarked, "He is nice. He has possibilities, but he is a little too immature for winning in top competition." There were other exhibitors that day who had the same experience and all came away feeling that they had very definitely got the cost of their entry fees back in good measure. This novice came away feeling that showing a dog wasn't such a bad experience after all! One week later we encountered one of those

judges who looked bored to death with his job, waved dogs casually to their places in the final line-up and then handed out the ribbons. He never did put a hand on our entry and we felt that we might better have stayed at home. In one week's space of time we had met the two extremes in judging. It was only upon the urging of a seasoned exhibitor that months later we again entered a dog at a show. One might observe that with shows run as they are today every judge could take time to be helpful to the exhibitors. They have paid their entry fee and brought their dog to make the show possible, and, one might add, made a judging assignment possible for the judge.

Then there is the matter of sportsmanship on the part of exhibitors toward the novice. So often we have heard complaints on the part of even experienced exhibitors that certain others have manners in the ring which are not very sporting. Everyone wants to get his dog into an advantageous position, but he does not have to push other exhibitors around to attain that position. To the oldtimer these tricks are known, and because he has had years of experience he probably, if necessary, can take care of himself in the ring: to the novice, it is an appalling experience. Everyone is in the show-ring to win (he would not have entered his dog otherwise), but as in any other sport, good manners still apply.

The novice, too, will inquire as to which class he should consider for entering his dog. There are those who will enter several classes because trophies are offered in those classes.

Finally, it could be pointed out to the novice that there will be many satisfying contacts made through his dog. There may be those experiences which will not be too happy; he may find himself showing a dog (for a short time at least) not of winning calibre whom he will love with all his faults, but when he comes through with a winning "home-bred" he will know one of the happiest days of his life, and when he is able to put that charmed word "Champion" before the home-bred's name he will have reached the ultimate in satisfaction and happiness.



Highlights of the Annual Meeting

THE 61st Annual Meeting of The Canadian Kennel Club was one of the best attended in the history of the Club. A much larger room was necessary for the evening meeting than has been used in former years, and even then it was packed to capacity. It marked the eighth occasion on which the President, Mr. W. J. Risewick, presided as the President of The Canadian Kennel Club. His address to the members is being outlined in another article in this issue.

Lefroy and Mr. W. H. Reeves, Oakville, Ont.; Mrs. O. R. Hanson, Cooksville, Ont.; Mrs. G. B. Hopkins and Mr. and Mrs. E. Smith, Barrie, Ont.; Mr. D. J. Lerch, and Mr. W. Hammerton, London, Ont.; Mr. C. P. Francis, Rutledge, Manitoba; Mr. A. P. MacVannel and Mr. A. T. Steele of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ont.; Mr. Frank Plant, Jr., and Mr. E. B. Reid, also of Ottawa; Mrs. T. H. McGuire, Miss M. Luke, Mr. Peter Smith, Mr. George Lawless, Mrs. F. Peacock, Mrs. H. Cole, Mr. F. J. Colehouse, all of Hamilton; Mrs. L. Lymburner, Port Colborne; Mr. W. W. Rooney and Mr. John Sheenan, of Montreal, Que. It was noted that Mr. A. S. Anderson of Longford Mills and Mr. Peter Herd of Toronto (who, incidentally, is the Chief of the Toronto Fire Department) were reminiscing on the many changes which had been made since they joined The Canadian Kennel Club thirty-eight years ago. Mr. J. H. Sheehan, of Montreal, has thirty-four years as a member to his credit. On the Board of Directors, Mrs. G. O. Alsen, of New Westminster, B.C. and Mr. A. Roberts of Etobicoke, Ontario, each claim twenty-five years as a member.

There was a complete attendance of the Board of Directors from all over Canada and enthusiasm for the good and welfare of The Canadian Kennel Club was manifest in the rapt attention which was given from the opening at ten o'clock in the morning until the close at midnight.

The proposed Amendments to the Constitution on Dog Show Rules and Obedience Trials were published in the January issue of DOGS IN CANADA. Of these amendments, only one carried in the Constitution, and that was that a Representative be elected for the Obedience Trials in the same manner as is now in effect for Field Trials. In the Dog Show Rules, four amendments were passed as follows:

Chapter 3, Section 8 be amended by the addition of the following words to

follow "Shall not exceed one day"; "(but the Board of Directors shall have the power to approve championship shows of more than one day's duration where it feels that it is in the interests of exhibitors that such approval be extended.)"

Chapter 19, Section 15. If dogs are not required for groups they may be removed from the show at 9:00 p.m.

Chapter 15, Section 9 (new). "The order of breed judging of shows within a Province shall rotate starting with Groups No. 1 at the first show in that Province, followed by the breeds in Groups Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 in that order. At the second show the order of breed judging shall commence with Group No. 2, followed by the breeds in Groups Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6 and 1 in that order and this arrangement shall continue with subsequent shows within the Province in the same calendar year. The Canadian Kennel Club will notify the show-giving club of the order of breed judging at its show and this information will be set forth in the Premium List of the Show."

Chapter 19, Section 14 (new). "The Superintendent of the Dog Show shall supply a large board on which to post a copy of the judge's book, bearing the carbon copy of the judge's signature just as soon as the breed is completed, in order that the exhibitors may mark their catalogues and notice if there are any corrections to be made while the judge, exhibitors and show superintendent are all at the show, and in order that errors may be corrected while the incidents are fresh in the minds of all."

The amendments to the Obedience Trial Rules were carried in their entirety with the exception of the word "cement" which was changed to "hardwood flooring".

In view of the confusion arising through the identification of dogs for registration purposes, Mr. A. P. MacVannel, Chief Registration Officer of the Dept. of Agriculture, addressed the meeting. As a result of his address a Committee was formed which met with Mr. MacVannel during the dinner hour and brought their findings back to the members at the evening session. It was then agreed that a delegation be sent to Ottawa to interview the Minister of Agriculture. Mr. MacVannel left the impression with the members that the Department was doing all in its power to assist them in keeping records of their dogs on a high standard.

On the question of the one day dog show, Mr. Sam. Foster, General Manager of the Agriculture Department of the Canadian National Exhibition, addressed the members and outlined the difficulties which were met when the C.N.E. endeavoured to sponsor three one day All Breed Shows at the Fair

last year. It was felt that such a hardship might result in the curtailment of dog shows at the Exhibition. Mr. Frank Plant, Jr., of Ottawa, spoke on behalf of the Central Canada Exhibition. As a result, the members passed the amendment which gives the Board of Directors power to grant a Championship Show of more than one day's duration where it feels that such is in the interest of the exhibitors.

The introduction of a board on which to post a copy of the awards marked in the judge's book at each show will be of great benefit both to the show-giving club, the Secretary of The Canadian Kennel Club and to the exhibitors at the dog shows. The exhibitors can help materially by noting the awards from this board and correcting any errors or omissions before leaving the show.

With these few changes, the Constitution, Dog Show Rules, Field Trials and Obedience Trials carry on as before.

Business carried on by the Board of Directors will appear in the Minutes to be published in the April issue.

The Board of Directors reviewed the financial statements for 1948 and agreed on a budget with a view to preventing any financial loss in 1949, assuming that the club's revenue during this year is not less than it was during 1948. It was felt that the budget would in no way curtail services usually provided by the club and yet would obviate any necessity to increase charges for registration, memberships and other services.

The Board decided on new procedures in dealing with applications for memberships, kennel names, show or trial dates and approval of judges with a view to expediting the handling of these applications.

The Board decided to continue the club's previous policy of recognizing major wins of Canadian-bred dogs owned by members of the club. It, however, decided to discontinue trophies for the current year, and instead decided that specially engraved certificates should be provided for Canadian-bred dogs placed Best in Show, Best Canadian-bred in Show, or Best Canadian-bred Puppy in Show, when these dogs are owned by members of The Canadian Kennel Club.

In order to make possible an earlier publication of the minutes of Board meetings, the Board decided that the regular monthly meeting of the Board would be held on the third Wednesday of every month.

As an economy measure the Board agreed that for the current year it would not authorize the payment of travelling expenses for Directors attending shows or trials.

Know Your Breed ...

THE COCKER SPANIEL



THE Cocker Spaniel is the smallest of the sporting Spaniel family and by reason of his versatility in the field in addition to his sterling worth as a companion in the house, to adults and children alike, is a very popular breed. The variations in colour add to the interest in the breed among which are the solid colours, consisting of black, red, parti-colours among which you will find black and white, black and tan and combinations of black, tan and white known as tri-colours; also a few liver and whites.

The Spaniel family is a large one and one of considerable antiquity. As far back as 1386, we find mention of the Spanyell which in the next century was divided into two groups; the land and the water Spaniel. Later, a further division of the large Spaniels and the small ones cut the toy Spaniels from the sporting ones, and

eventually as various localities developed individualistic strains the classification became a definite one of which, numerically, the Cocker Spaniels have held the lead both in England and the United States.

He is a serviceable-looking dog with a refinedly chiseled head; standing on straight legs and well up at the shoulders; of compact body and wide, muscular quarters. The Cocker Spaniel's sturdy body, powerful quarters and strong, well-boned legs show him to be a dog capable of considerable speed combined with great endurance. Above all he must be free and merry, sound, well balanced throughout, and in action show a keen inclination to work; equable in temperament with no suggestion of timidity. Not under 22 nor over 28 pounds in weight.

1949 Specialty Show

January 8th and 9th, 1949

THE outstanding show, of each year, to Cocker breeders is the American Spaniel Club's Specialty Show held each year early in January at the Hotel Roosevelt, New York, and all Cocker breeders make a special effort to attend. Everything possible is done to make it a very comfortable and homey show.

Usually there are three judges, one for each variety. This year Mr. Clyde Heck did the parti's, John T. Eash Any Solid Colour other than black (including black and tans) and Mr. C. B. Van Meter the blacks.

There is the Futurity Stake open only to Members of the American Spaniel Club. This year the parti entries were very few in the stake, viz: five dogs and five bitches Pentown Kennels having the best dog, Pentown's Pard (Ch. Hodges Honey Cloud ex Pentown's Contrary Mary) and Mrs. Peter Garvan had the Best Bitch, Dungarvan Clair De Lune (Ch. Curtwin's Buffer Boy ex Dungarvan Humoresque) who went over the dog. There were twenty one Ascobs for Dr. Eash, the winning dog being Raymond W. Cacchio's My Own Red Bruce (Ch. Bigg's Cover Charge ex My Own Reward 111). The Winning Bitch was owned by Mrs. Frank H. Plaisted, The Plaisted's Sohio Cherie (Ch. Myroy Night Rocket ex Sohio's Hubba Hubba) and again the bitch went over the dog.

The blacks had twenty nine entries and being the biggest entry gave their judge the honor of judging Best in the Futurity. The best black male was Try-Cob's Ace High (Try-Cob's Challenge ex Ch. Try-Cob's Favorite Girl) and the Best Female was Dr. Clarence Smith's Glory Be (Ch. Sohio Cadet ex Eufalia's Hallelujah).

The dog went over the bitch in this class and Mr. Van Meter picked him for Best Futurity Winner, adding one more to the Try-Cob's wins. They have won the Futurity three times with their own breeding (1941 with Candidate, 1943, Favorite Girl) and last year with Penrock's Promotion.

In the regular classes George Boyd's Marlane Citation (Ch. Bar-Nan's Checkers ex Washburn's Lady of Gledale) went Winners Dog, Parti-colour. This dog was bought by him from the Loeys, who bred him, and is now owned by Mrs. Sherwin Hebble. Citation went on to Best of Winners over Miller's Cinderella (Ch. Bar-Nan's Checkers ex Billy-bob's Miss Tippy). In this class Mrs. Bea Wegusen's Ch. Honey Creek Vivacious went Best of Variety and Ch. Easdale's Apache Best of Opposite Sex. In the Ascobs Pentown's Kennels Pentown's Indian Chief (Ch. Try-Cob's Success ex Miss Royalty of Wilmarry) went Winners Dogs and the Futurity Winner bitch Plaisted Sohio Cherie was Best of Winners and also Best of Variety with Best of Opposite Sex going to the black and tan Ch. Belden's Town Blaze. In the blacks Mr. Van Meter gave his winners ribbon to the winning futurity puppy Try-Cob's Ace High and the winners bitch was Mrs. Robert Mauchel's Hickory Hill High Barbaree (Ch. Stockdale Town Talk ex Ch. Hickory Hill High Bid) the dog going over the bitch for Best of Winners. Best of Variety was Ch. Penrock's Prize Package and Best of Opposite Sex Ch. Hickory Hill High Bid.

In the ring, along with the day's winners were Ch. Aracoma Raven (dog) Ch. Penrock's Presentation (dog) Ch. Lancaster Great Day (dog) Ch. Mister Try-Cob (dog) Ch. Pinefair Pilgrim (dog) and last year's Best in Show Ch. The Dream Boy of Chalbourn. Ch. Penrock Prize Package was given the nod and Best of Opposite Sex went to Ch. Honey Creek Vivacious. Then came the final thrill, Best in Show, judged by the Venerable Judge Townsend Scudder, who has done so much for the American Spaniel Club, and he awarded the much coveted ribbon to Ch. Penrock's Prize Package, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Louis Hausman and most ably handled by George Boyd over the Best of Breed English Cocker, Springer and other spaniels, and although a Canadian owned dog has never won the show the 1920 and 1923 winners were bred here and a Canadian boy piloted the winner in 1949.

What is Happening to Cockers?

BEFORE we progress further on the subject, let us use the words of the small boy "There ain't nuthin' happenin' to Cockers."

During the war years when Mr. John Public was "nigger rich", dogs were sold at fabulous prices—in most instances, at prices far beyond their actual worth. Buyers would appear, and their approach would be "I'll take him—how much?" That situation is changed, today—changed for all breeds of dogs. Gone are the box car figures. Now we have far fewer buyers, and these buyers are more critical as to the quality of the puppy they pur-

chase; their price ceiling is definitely much lower.

Now, let us take a peek at what that situation is doing to Cocker breeders in general.

NEVER IN THE HISTORY OF BREEDING COCKERS HAS THERE BEEN A MORE OPPORTUNE TIME FOR THE SERIOUS BREEDER TO REPLACE HIS MEDIOCRE STOCK OF BROOD FEMALES WITH WELL-BRED GOOD SPECIMENS AT REASONABLE FIGURES. Female puppies are being sold today for less than \$100 that probably would not be for sale a few years ago at all, and if they could have been bought would most likely have fetched \$300—and that figure is beyond quite a few breeders' pocketbooks. Here is a concrete example of such an opportunity in an advertisement appearing in the January, 1949, issue of an American dog publication: "Nice Brood female sired by that great dog Champion —"

Probably your last chance to obtain one of — daughters. Price \$50." I happen to know this bitch and she is really nice. We own her litter sister and she has given us a very sweet six months' old female puppy.

Many such opportunities are appearing, and right now is the time for the breeder to step out and at a very nominal cost secure a few good, well-bred specimens that will do more for his kennel in one generation than a poor specimen will in several years, in an endeavour to bring his present stock up to top standard.

Just a word as to the size of the kennel the average breeder should attempt to operate under today's conditions. In determining this, the one thought in mind should be quality—definitely—following this up with a fewer number of brood females so that the breeder places on the market a lesser number of puppies of higher quality. Quality has yet to go begging. Do not think that Mr. John Public cannot spot a top puppy when he sees it.

There is no place in today's market for the "Pups for dollars" breeder. Quite a number of these have dropped out, and quite a number of novice breeders with one female are not breeding that female today. TOO MANY TIMES, FEMALES NOT WORTH THE PRICE OF A STUD FEE HAVE BEEN SENT FOR SERVICE TO A GOOD STUD.

This all offers a real opportunity for the breeder who is really serious in his endeavour to produce good dogs. Now is the time to houseclean. For every two females you dispose of, replace with one good one, and take your time about selecting that. Three good quality, show-brood females will do more for your kennel than ten "run of the mill" bitches. The future was never brighter for the breeder who is awake to opportunity; who will keep quantity down and see that quality is his watchword.

Where are the Cockers?

DESPITE inclement weather, a large and enthusiastic group turns up every Wednesday night at the Obedience Training Classes held at the Coliseum, Canadian National Exhibition Grounds, Toronto. Sad to relate, however, very few Cocker Spaniels are in evidence. This is a shame, as these dogs are well fitted for this work by reason of their heritage as field dogs.

Those who attend do so with commendable regularity. It is a fascinating game and one which both dogs and humans enjoy, though after trotting around the arena "on the double" one is inclined to wonder just *who* is being trained. After a laborious trot, one larger-than-average gentleman looked somewhat bitterly at his fresh-as-a-daisy German Shepherd which was clearly wondering when his master would cut out loafing and really run, and remarked audibly, "And they call this Dog Training!" A few minutes later, with a proud gleam in his eye, he was enthusiastically demonstrating to the class that his dog had mastered the lesson of "sit and recall" and glowed at the instructor's words of praise. He'll be back next week for more training.

The Cockers really give a good account of themselves. All are in advanced classes. Blacks are definitely in the minority. Mr. A. M. & Dr. Fitzgerald attend with their Champion Don Marcos Dainty Maid, Mrs. Dorothy R. Vaughan with her new acquisition Champion Bucksburns Perseverance and Mr. R. G. Dudlay accompanied by his daughter, Jean, bring their new black (a son of Champion Sohio Cadet, we believe). Jean does her usual fine job of handling.

The ASCOBS are better represented. Unfortunately, the writer does not know one or two of the owners, but Mrs. R. J. Austen, Mrs. Katherine King, Miss J. K. Balshaw, Mr. and Mrs. Dennis and Mr. and Mrs. J. Devlin with their son, Russell, have all attended. In the latter case, credit must be given to young Russell for most of the handling of their dog.

During recess and at the end of the evening workout, anyone desirous of doing so can try out their dogs over the hurdles used by dogs training for their CDX degree. Most dogs enter into this new game joyously, but the two Cockers which really love it are handled by the junior dog enthusiasts Jean and Russell. Do they stand by and patiently try to coax their dogs to jump over? Of course not! To the ecstatic delight of their dogs they jump the hurdles with them. Ah, youth!

Crowds watch the Obedience Trials. Quite a number turn out on Wednesdays just to watch the classes, so would it not be good business to bring out the Cockers and keep it fresh in the public mind that the breed we fancy is as intelligent and smart as it is beautiful?

The Springer Spaniel Specialty Show

STAGED against the ornate ballroom at the Hotel Roosevelt in New York, the National Specialty Show held annually by the American Spaniel Club has, for years, attracted an entry of top-winning dogs from all over the United States and Canada. A win at this show is certainly akin to that of the famed Westminster Show held in Madison Square Gardens, albeit in a somewhat different manner. This is a Specialty Show attracting the "cream of the crop."

The section given over to the English Springer Spaniels this year, as in the past, brought dogs from the most outstanding kennels of the United States. Unfortunately, there were no Canadian entries this year. However, the final winner was a dog which has been consistently winning at Canadian shows in the past year.

The American and Canadian Champion Walpride Sandeman owned by Robert J. Walgate of Buffalo, N.Y., was the final choice of Fred Jackson, owner of the famous Frejax Kennels at Detroit, Mich. With an entry of 45 dogs in the breed and nine of them Champions entered for Specials Only, it was a notable win for this beautiful black and white specimen of the breed.

"Nimmie" as he is known to his owner and his friends, has within the past year, really "come into his own". Out of a bitch bred by Mr. Walgate, Woodelf Gypsy of Hampton, he is sired by Ch. Roderique of Sandblown Acre; the dam is out of another of the Walpride bitches, Walpride Ginger Bell. He made his points at the top shows in the United States, making them all at major shows after taking the first at Westminster Kennel Club show in New York. He has won the Sporting Group innumerable times and in the past year has been Best in Show at the Niagara Frontier Kennel Club show held in Port Colborne in 1947 and 1948; at the Elgin Kennel Club show held in St. Thomas in May 1948 and

at the English Springer Spaniel Specialty Show held at Bronte last June.

Winners Dogs at the Specialty was Edward Copperthite's Fleet Breeze of Hampton and was also Best of Winners. Winners Bitches was the entry of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Paton, Rosemary of Melilotus. It is interesting to note that the Copperthite's entry, Fleet Breeze of Hampton, is out of the same dam which produced Walpride Sandeman, in this instance bred to the American and Canadian Champion Frejax Royal Salute.

Specials entries included Ch. Greenfair's Gamelad owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Quirk; Ch. Enchantress of Cauliers owned by Mr. and Mrs. R. Gilman Smith who also entered their Ch. Amos of Mililotus; Ch. Maquam's Gay Lady owned by Marguerite Elder; Norman Morrow's Ch. Runor's Agent; Ch. Frejax Knighterrant, C.D., owned by J. L. Gibney; Mrs. William McKelvey's Ch. Sir Thomas of Rumak and Henry Goeppert Ch. Janies Bos'n Boy and Mr. Walgate's entry, Int. Ch. Walpride Sandeman.

The Strength of a Kennel

By A. Elsie Mayhew

AT the Annual Meeting of the Cocker Club of Central Ontario, the Editor of DOGS IN CANADA requested of the members that they assist in making the March issue as interesting as possible to the breeders of Cocker Spaniels. Mr. Stan. Jones, the President, recalled during the ensuing conversation an article written by myself in a previous issue of DOGS IN CANADA, and suggested that I write something of that nature. My reply, on the spur of the moment, was that "Perhaps I don't believe now what I then wrote," but having read the article since I am more convinced than ever that we must exercise greater care in the breeding of our dogs and cut out the unnecessary stock if we are to keep the Cocker Spaniel at the high rating which it now enjoys.

We are now entering a new era—money is becoming tighter, and feed and labour costs are much higher—so we must breed on the most essential lines. Once again I reiterate that a good producing female is the most valuable asset to the Kennel.

Let us glance quickly at the records of successful Kennels in the United States. Their top quality dogs came from such females as My Own Leading Lady, owned by the late H. Mellenthin; My Own Straight Sale, owned by Miss Dodsforth; the wonderful Stockdale and Nonquitt females, and the present Try-Cob's Favourite Girl, who won the American Spaniel Club's Futurity Stake in 1943 and has since produced many Champions, including this year's Futurity Winner, Try-Cob's Ace High. Then we have the Penrock Kennels, who bred last year's sweep winner and this year's Best in Show at the American Spaniel Club Specialty Show. The Hausmans do not carry a large number

or dogs, but the quality is certainly there. All these Penrock dogs are linebred with the same ancestors on both sides of the pedigree, usually on the sire side, so that the outcross comes on the dam's side. Those who have read Dr. Eash's article on how he bred his Golden Boy might well take a lesson, as we all know how successful this dog has been.

There are many more I would like to mention, but "a wink is as good as a nod to a blind horse". So, breed for quality and not quantity.

The question today which is puzzling the Cocker breeders is the fact that while the registrations still top the list, the entries at the show are sliding down. It is my firm opinion that there are too many mediocre females kept for breeding purposes and sold as producers. The solution to that problem is to follow the pattern set by our most successful Kennels—spay all females which are not top quality and, if necessary, purchase a good female to produce good stock in your own Kennels.

The Value of the Stud Dog

By L. L. Broley

MANY theories have been advanced as to the relative merits of the sire and the dam of a puppy in respect to their contributing factors. It has been said that the females influence the quality of the offspring as much as 80%. Some breeders must think the other way, as the quality of their females presuppose that the stud dog can do it all. In the opinion of the writer, neither is correct. Give me a good bitch and a good stud, if it is line breeding, and I will take a chance on the result.

There is one factor with regards the stud dog. He can service as many as five females a month, whereas the

females can produce not more than an average of eight puppies a year, so the influence of the stud dog goes much further than that of the female.

The success of any stud dog will be predicated on the quality of the females that are sent to him. True, he may sire puppies that are of a higher quality than the dam, but unless the dam is of a certain quality the type of puppies produced will not as a general rule approach the quality of the sire.

Cockers have made great strides forward in Canada during the past ten years, and it does seem as if the major credit must, at this time, go to the stud dog. Numerous good dogs have been brought into the country, and all have contributed their share in the improvement of the breed. It is to be regretted that not nearly the same number of high class, show-brood females have been brought in, and to those who have gone out to secure the best ones possible all credit is due.

One of the first questions to ask when selecting a stud dog is "Is he a good producer?" Far too many breeders pay more attention to the prefix "Champion" than to the ability of the dog to sire quality puppies. Remember, these puppies cannot take their sire's prefix into the ring with them. Once there, they are on their own and rise and fall on their own merits or lack thereof. Too much attention, also, is focused on the pedigree of the stud dog, and not enough on the physical attributes which it possesses. A pedigree is only indicative of the quality that one should expect to find in an individual; there is no guarantee that that looked for quality will be there.

In selecting your stud dog, therefore, do so with an eye to its proven ability to produce good stock. As far as possible, line breed your bitch to a stud which possesses those qualities which your brood bitch may lack.

A Newcomer's Viewpoint

PERHAPS I may be considered presumptuous for airing my views, for it was just twelve months ago that I made my bow to the Cocker Spaniel fancy at the Sportsmen's Kennel Club Show. However, a newcomer can sometimes see things with more clarity because his vision has not yet become obscured by "professionalism".

The Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Ontario was but a name to me for the first nine months of my year in Cocker activities. At the shows I heard members discussing Club meetings and wistfully wished that I might join. Was I asked? Oh, dear me, no! Now, I had shown dogs in many of the major shows throughout the year: I was breeding and selling good Cocker puppies and trying to conduct my doggy activities in a way that could cause no adverse comment from established breeders. I had made quite a large number of very good friends in the Cocker group and they had been most generous and helpful, imparting to me knowledge that had taken them years of hard work to acquire, but not one suggested that I join the Club! Eventually, I plucked up enough courage to ask if I may be permitted to join. My request was received with satisfying enthusiasm and I was duly elected and installed as a member—but why, oh why, did I have to do the asking?

A Club thrives on members. The fees help make it financially strong and capable of promoting its aims. New blood mellowed with the old makes for progress tempered with experience. Any breeder of good Cockers should not only be asked to join, but *persuaded* to join. On second thoughts, why limit it to breeders of "good" Cockers? Much has been written and said in disparagement of the "back

yard" breeder—a hateful phrase, for nearly everyone starts in a small way (it is financial suicide to do otherwise). I started in Cockers because I fell in love with, and purchased, a dark-eyed blonde. Then, because two pups are more fun than one, I bought another. How about you?

A large kennel does not necessarily indicate good dogs, nor a small back yard inferior ones. Supposing a person is misguidedly breeding inferior dogs in a two-by-four back yard, or in a large acreage—get after them. Get them into the Club and show them the error of their ways. Point out to them the ultimate advantage of investing in stud fees to good dogs, rather than the "cocker across the street"; of culling out the inferior brood bitch and replacing with a daughter who is an improvement on her dam, and of selling female pups spayed. Make the club meetings instructive and interesting enough so that they will feel the urge to breed stock good enough, eventually, for the show ring. Can't it be done? Sure, it can. Deep in the heart of every average human is the desire for achievement. It is the one completely satisfying thing that life has to offer. You cannot stop people breeding dogs, but you can educate them to do it properly. What better medium than a friendly Club?

Cockers still are the most popular of dogs. Whether or not they remain so is up to us, the present Cocker breeders. Trying to make Cocker breeding the prerogative of an exclusive few will not keep this game, lovable dog in stellar position, for outside the select circle hundreds of other people will be breeding Cockers that can only do harm to the breed, not necessarily from ulterior motives, but in the majority of cases from sheer ignorance of the Cocker standard.

1200. IDENTIFICATION AND THE LIVE STOCK PEDIGREE ACT

SUBJECT: The President stated that very soon after being re-elected, he was acquainted by telephone and letter of developments in respect to many applications for registration having been returned to applicants.

The Secretary read the following:

(1) A letter from the Director of the Canadian National Live Stock Records dated December 23rd, in which Mr. Hitchman referred to:

(a) remarks in respect to identification by the colour method as made by A. P. MacVannel, Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture, at a meeting of the Record Committee held in October, 1948;

(b) A letter, dated December 13th, 1948, addressed to him by Mr. MacVannel in which the Chief Registration Officer stated: "We are not satisfied that some breeders are taking this method ('a clearly stated description of the colour or colours of the dog for which application is made') of identification seriously."

"It is apparent to me that confusion may follow the indiscriminate approval of certificates of registration where 'Clearly stated description of the colour or colours' is not contained on the application."

(c) A conference on December 15th, attended by Mr. MacVannel, Mr. Steele (the Associate Chief Registration Officer), Mr. A. Dawson, Mr. T. E. Gundersen and himself, following which the Department returned (without Departmental seal and approval) many certificates of registration.

(d) The many applications for registration which were returned as a result of the developments reported above.

DISCUSSION: Vice-President Brown suggested that the matter be taken up with officials of the Department and Director Riedel suggested that a committee be appointed for the purpose of making representations on behalf of the Club.

The President referred to an invitation (read by the Secretary), received by the Club, to send representatives to a meeting of departmental officials and representatives of the various Live Stock Associations, to be held on February 8th and 9th for the purpose of discussing a bill to amend the Live Stock Pedigree Act 1932, which is to be introduced at the present session of Parliament. The President pointed out that this meeting coincided with the coming annual meetings of the Club, but the Club could, if necessary, make representations direct to the Agricultural Committee when the contents of the Bill are known. The President further reported that he had asked the Club's solicitors to write the Department for a copy of the Bill. It was pointed out that officials of the Department would likely be in Toronto during the first week of February whilst the various live stock associations held their annual meetings.

1201. REPORT OF ELECTION COMMISSION

REPORT: The Secretary read the report of the Election Commission in respect to the election of Officers, Directors, Field Trial Representatives and Provincial Committees for 1949, and referred to vacancies indicated by the report.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to:

(a) Refer the Election Commission's report to the Annual General meeting; and

(b) Refer the matter of vacancies to the Board of Directors at its meeting on February 9th.

1202. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

REPORTS: The Secretary tabled financial statements (for 1948) received from the Canadian National Live Stock Records and reported that while final audited statements for 1948 had not yet been received from the Club's auditors, information available indicated that an operational loss of approximately \$12,000 would be shown by the final statements.

DISCUSSION: The President stated that when the final statements are printed for distribution to the members, they would be accompanied by analyses prepared by the Secretary-Treasurer so that the members could better see the nature of the expenditures made in 1948. He further stated that if the present Board was to take action to prevent further serious inroads on the Club's financial resources, the Board must know from month to month where the Club stood financially. For that reason it was his intention to recommend to the Board, at its annual meeting, that each member of the Board be provided with monthly statements of revenue and expenditures so that the Board could, if necessary, decide on policies intended to prevent any financial loss on the Club's operations in 1949.

Director Thorndike suggested that monthly or quarterly audited statements be obtained if it did not involve any increase in auditing costs.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to place the financial statements before the Board at its meeting on February 9th, and before the members at the annual general meeting to be held on February 10th.

1203 (1189). REGISTRATION COMMITTEE FILES

REPORT: The Secretary reported on the action taken by the Board of Directors at its meeting held on December 1st, in respect to the applications for registration (made under Article 33, section 7 of the Constitution) for eight Staffordshire Terriers who held the property of Mr. G. O. Smith, Toronto. A letter from Mr. Smith, dated December 20th and addressed to the Board of Directors, was read.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, the applications for registration of the eight Staffordshire Terriers, as received from Mr. George O. Smith, be approved." Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary reported on an application for registration (made under Article 33, Section 7 of the Constitution) received from Thomas B. Sexsmith, Brighton, Ont., for a dog said to be a Staffordshire Terrier.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to ask Mr. Sexsmith to provide side and front pictures of his dog, on receipt of which the file be turned over to the Registration Committee for consideration.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that the Registration Committee had:

(1) Authorized the transfer of ownership of the Doberman Pinscher VAL-CLOSE REX REGENT (200022) from F. A. Itter to Marius Madsen;

(2) Authorized the registration of the American Foxhound PEGGY'S JULY, under Article 33, Section 7 of the Constitution;

(3) Authorized the registration of the Doberman Pinscher ARNIM V. BRIESENECK (application for registration accompanied by certificate of registration issued by Fachschaft Dobermanpinscher im RDH);

(4) Authorized the registration of the English Springer Spaniel ROY'S GYPSY, under Article 33, Section 7 of the Constitution;

(5) Authorized the registration of litter of Pomeranians whelped on August 31st, 1948, by Ch. Melbourne Blazing Glory (180983) out of Milleigh Red Girl (192989); authorized the registration and transfer of ownership of

the Pomeranian KENEVA AUTUMN BLAZE transferred to the name of Mrs. A. Dance;

- (6) Authorized the transfer of ownership of the Cocker Spaniel FANCY DRESS OF BARRIE (185016) from Frederick Robert Gleason to Mrs. Dolores Beauchesne.

SUBJECT: The Secretary recommended that a pro-tem Registration Committee be appointed pending appointment of the standing Registration Committee at the annual meeting of the Board.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Riedel:

"THAT, the President and Directors Davies and Thorndike be appointed the Registration Committee pro-tem pending appointment of a Registration Committee at the Annual Meeting of the Board." Motion carried.

1205 (1174). REPORTS RE SHOWS

REPORT: The Secretary read the C.K.C. Representative's report on the sanction show held by the Boxer Club of Canada at Lansing, Ontario, on January 21st.

DISCUSSION: The Board discussed deviations from the approved list of judges for a sanction show, and agreed that while conditions could develop requiring such alterations at the show, announcement of such changes should be made an exhibitors allowed the same privilege of withdrawing entries as applies at a championship show.

1207. LETTER FROM THE CANADIAN ASSOCIATIONS OF EXHIBITORS RE COLOURS OF RIBBONS

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the Canadian Association of Exhibitors which referred to the confusion arising out of differences of opinion regarding colours of first and second prize ribbons, and indicated that the Association was endeavouring to compile information with a view to bringing about uniformity in the colours for these ribbons.

DISCUSSION: In discussing this communication it was pointed out that the C.K.C.'s present policy of requiring a blue ribbon for first and a red ribbon for second was based on a recognized need of conforming to the American procedure in this regard so as to prevent confusion and disputes when American judges, accustomed to blue first prize ribbons and red second prize ribbons, officiate at Canadian shows and trials.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Riedel:

"THAT, the Secretary, in replying to this communication point out that the Dog Show Rules call for a blue ribbon for first and a red ribbon for second, and no change in this policy is favoured or contemplated for the reasons referred to in the Board's discussion of this matter." Motion carried.

1208. TRAVELLING EXPENSES FOR FIELD TRIAL REPRESENTATIVES

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Harry Dean, Dalmeny, Sask., Saskatchewan Field Trial Representative, seeking information regarding the payment of a Field Trial Representative's travelling expenses in attending the annual general meeting.

DISCUSSION: In discussing this matter the Board noted that no previous provision had been made for the payment of a Field Trial Representative's travelling expenses, and it agreed that no action in that direction should be taken at this time in view of the Club's financial position and because the extension of that consideration to any Field Trial Representative would require the same consideration for all Field Trial Representatives.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Dean of the Board's decision and at the same time point out that if a Field Trial Representative had any questions to ask regarding Field Trials and Field Trial dogs, such questions should be turned over to the Provincial Director who could obtain the desired information during the annual meetings.

1209. CORRESPONDENCE RE SHOWS

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Miss June Keen, Secretary of the Great Dane Club of Canada "with regard to the conditions at the Brantford, Port Colborne, and London Club Shows". The letter stated that the members of the Club felt that "the benching for Danes is totally inadequate", "that much larger stalls should be provided", "That the exercise rings are far too small", "the aisles between the benches too narrow" and "Judging rings too small to show a Great Dane to the best advantage".

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, a copy of this letter be sent to the Clubs named in the communication with a letter suggesting that anything that can be done in respect to the conditions referred to will help their shows". Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Lillian Miller, Seattle, Washington, seeking clarification of the Club's position relative to the continued practice of the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association in refusing her entries for its shows. The Secretary read a letter which the B.C. Director addressed to the Board of Directors on November 27th, 1948, regarding this matter.

DISCUSSION: In discussing the matter it was agreed that further discussion and possible action would best be decided on when the British Columbia members are in Toronto for the Annual Meetings.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Thorndike:

"THAT, the matter be tabled for further consideration at the next meeting of the Board of Directors". Motion carried.

Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that the question had been raised as to whether a specialty club, recognizing the classes for its breed or breeds at an all-breed championship show as "its specialty show" would, by such a step, qualify for additional sanction shows.

ACTION: The Board, following discussion, agreed that such a step on the part of a specialty club, would allow of the specialty club holding an additional three sanction shows.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that the Secretary of The Toy Dog Breeders' Association of Canada had indicated, by telephone, that The Toy Dog Breeders' Association wished to cancel its championship show scheduled for April 15th. The Secretary further reported that the Cocker Spaniel Specialty Club of Central Ontario had indicated that it wished its show date moved from March 19th to April 15th.

Motion carried.

ACTION: No action was considered necessary.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Kennel Club (England) asking whether A. Greenwood, Montreal, is a licensed judge of Dachshunds (Smooth).

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform the Kennel Club that Mr. Greenwood had judged at a championship show in Canada, and the Club's records did not indicate that he would not again be approved if selected to judge at some future championship show.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the American Kennel Club asking whether or not Commander P. Hopkinson was approved by the Canadian Kennel Club as a judge of Corgis.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform the American Kennel Club that Commander Hopkinson had not yet applied to the Canadian Kennel Club for a judicial license, but there is nothing in the Club's records at the present time indicating that such an application, if submitted, would not receive approval.

1216. SIGNING OFFICERS

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that with the change of Presidents, the bank would require a new authority to accept the signature of the signing officers for the Club.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, W. J. Risewick (President) and N. F. Brown (Secretary-Treasurer) are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. to draw, accept, sign and make all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Cheques and Orders for the payment of money; to pay and receive all moneys, and to give acquittance for the same; to assign and transfer to the Bank all or any Stock, Bonds and other securities; from time to time to borrow money from the BANK OF MONTREAL, either generally for and in the name and on behalf of the said Canadian Kennel Club Inc. to transact with the said Bank any business they may think fit.

Also that W. J. Risewick (President) and N. F. Brown (Secretary-Treasurer) are hereby authorized on behalf of the said The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said The Canadian Kennel Club Inc.

account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Cheques or Orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said The Canadian Kennel Club Inc.; also from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books and accounts between the said The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. and the Bank; and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers, unpaid and unaccepted bills of exchange and other negotiable instruments, and to sign the bank's form of settlement of balances and release." Motion carried.

1217 (1167). REGISTRATION OF CLUB NAME

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that the Great Dane Club of Canada had applied for the registration of its Club Name, the application met the requirements of Article 26A of the Constitution of The Canadian Kennel Club, and no objection had been received following publication in DOGS IN CANADA of notice that the application had been received.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Roberts, seconded by Vice-President Brown:

"THAT, the application for registration of the Club Name, as received from the Great Dane Club of Canada, be approved." Motion carried.

1218 (859). PRIZES

SUBJECT: The Secretary referred to the policy followed in 1948 regarding prizes offered by the Canadian Kennel Club, and requested an instruction regarding prizes to be offered in 1949 so that premium lists received, for approval, before the annual meeting of the Board could be dealt with.

DISCUSSION: In discussing the matter the Board agreed that a temporary arrangement should be made until the matter could be discussed by the Board at its annual meeting.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Riedel, seconded by Director Thorndike:

"THAT, as a temporary measure pending final decision at the annual meeting of the Board, the Secretary be authorized to include the following prize offered by the C.K.C. in premium lists received by him before the annual meetings:

"The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. offers \$10.00 in cash for Best in Show if Canadian-bred and owned by a member of The Canadian Kennel Club in good standing." Motion carried.

1219 (1144). ARRANGEMENTS RE ANNUAL MEETINGS

SUBJECT: The Secretary referred to earlier arrangements made regarding the annual meetings of the Board.

ACTION: The arrangements previously made were endorsed save that the Secretary was directed to notify the members of the Board that the meeting of the Board of Directors to be held on February 11th be convened at 2.00 p.m. rather than 10.00 a.m.

1220 (1143). DAVID FINGARD vs. C.K.C ET AL

REPORT: In reviewing this matter for the information of the incoming Board of Directors, the President reported as follows:

1. Following the issuance of the writ against the Canadian Kennel Club and before his term of office as President had expired in 1947, he had directed the Secretary to communicate with Messrs. McMillan, Binch, Wilkinson, Berry and Wright, then acting for the Club in this matter in the absence, because of illness of the Club's solicitor, and request that this firm provide the incoming 1948 Board of Directors with their considered opinion as to the Club's position as to the litigation which was prompted by disciplinary action taken by the Board of Directors in October 1947.

2. That in view of his previously stated convictions regarding the procedures followed in the disciplinary proceedings, he had, on his re-election as President for 1949, immediately sought to establish what had transpired regarding this matter, during his absence from office in 1948.

3. That after studying the written opinion of Messrs. McMillan, Binch, Wilkinson, Berry & Wright, as set forth in a letter dated January 2, 1948, and developments during 1948, he was convinced that it was in the Club's interest that steps be taken to bring the litigation to an end.

4. He had discussed the matter with the Club's solicitor with the result that he had unofficially, and without prejudice to the Club's position, discussed the matter with Mr. Fingard, the plaintiff in the action. In view of Mr. Fingard's reaction to his suggestion of an amicable settlement, he had suggested to Mr. Fingard that he discuss the matter with his solicitors and then submit proposals for settlement on the understanding that any such action would be entirely without prejudice to the interests of the principals in the action.

The President then read the letter of Messrs. McMillan, Binch, Wilkinson, Berry & Wright to the Club dated January 2nd, 1948, in which they fully reviewed all developments relative to the disciplinary action against Mr. Fingard, and reviewed in detail the legal points involved.

The following points in the solicitors' letter impressed the 1949 Board:

- The two respects which raised doubts that the disciplinary proceedings were conducted according to principles of natural justice—First, the temporary suspension made without notice to the defendant; secondly, the exclusion of counsel from the proceedings. According to the solicitors' letter, the power to order a temporary suspension is not given to the Directors in order to bring pressure to bear on a member (as the minutes in this instance indicate). The temporary suspension of the plaintiff did not in the circumstances protect the Club in any way, and was imposed without hearing him or giving him an opportunity to be heard. Although it was within the power of the Board to exclude counsel, it is not the usual course and place on the Directors a very heavy responsibility to see that justice was done, particularly when the accused member refused to be present in view of the Board's decision to exclude counsel.
- The fact that the court would examine into the possibility of malice entering into the Board's decision, and that a finding of "malice" might be based on occasions on which individual members of the Board had expressed themselves in terms unfriendly to the plaintiff or had been involved in any previous personal disputes with him.
- The solicitors' statement to the effect that the court would be inclined to give weight against the Club to the fact that the Directors were not unanimous, that the strong view of Dr. Shute was disregarded, and the President's advice was not taken.
- The solicitors' reference to the heavy punishment of an indefinite suspension.
- The following conclusions set forth in the solicitors' letter:

"For all these reasons we are of opinion that although the action can be defended with some prospect of success, there is no reasonable certainty that it can be won, and it might develop into a most embarrassing proceeding. We would, therefore, recommend that the new Board consider the lifting of Mr. Fingard's suspension before the end of this month and that they thereafter authorize us to take up with Mr. Fingard's solicitors the discontinuance of the action. If the suspension is lifted and no public announcement is made of the matter, then it will be difficult for Mr. Fingard to prove any money damage in connection with it, and without proof of damage his case cannot succeed.

In conclusion the matter can be simply put. This action can be defended and may be defended successfully, but the chances are not good and the harm that can be done to the best interests of the Club by an adverse decision or by adverse publicity arising in the course of the trial should incline the Directors to consider terminating the suspension. We do not recommend that they should withdraw from the position they have taken but simply that they should bring the existing suspension to an end."

The President then read a letter from the Club's solicitor dated January 24th, 1949, in which Mr. Wilkinson stated that:

"The Board of Directors, in the circumstances, will have full authority to decide whether or not the action should be carried on, whether any negotiations for settlement should be conducted, and as to the amount or type of settlement which may ultimately be authorized."

The President then read Mr. Fingard's letter to him dated January 7th indicating possible terms of settlement.

DISCUSSION: The Board then discussed developments since it had come to office and had sought informally to take steps to bring the litigation to an end. The President suggested that any action taken to discontinue the action against the Club should also include a definite understanding that the suit against the four individual members of the Board named as defendants should also be discontinued. Director Thorndike suggested that any settlement should remove the possibility of litigation involving all other persons concerned in the disciplinary action including those who gave evidence at the Board's request.

In discussing the matter further it was agreed that the Board should, in the interests of the Club, take action to bring the litigation to an end, and discussion then took place on the possible terms of a settlement.

RESOLUTIONS: It was regularly moved by Director Thorndike, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, our solicitor be instructed to proceed to discuss settlement of the Fingard case on the following lines, and to report back to the Board the best possible settlement which in his opinion can be reached within the following maximum limits:

1. For damages and plaintiff's solicitor's fees not to exceed \$2,150.00;
2. Complete dismissal of this action against the Club and other defendants and protection so far as can be made available, for all other persons connected with or mentioned directly or indirectly in the subject matter of the litigation;
3. Publication of Mr. Fingard's re-instatement in the usual manner (i.e. in the minutes published in DOGS IN CANADA)". Motion carried.

It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, consideration of the re-instatement of Mr. David Fingard to the position of a member of the Club in good standing, be postponed until our solicitor has all the necessary documents in his possession for the discontinuance of the litigation—David Fingard vs. Canadian Kennel Club Inc., W. E. Baker, W. G. Kenyon, D. J. Lerch, and Miss A. E. Mayhew, together with such protection as can be made available to all other persons connected with or mentioned directly or indirectly in the subject matter of the litigation; any settlement must be endorsed and approved by this Board of Directors before reinstatement is considered". Motion carried.

ACTION: Director Thorndike suggested that members of the Board outside the Province of Ontario should be made acquainted with the Board's decisions in respect to this matter, and the Secretary was therefore directed to provide the provincial Directors with a copy of the legal opinion dated January 2nd, 1948, and an indication of the action being taken by the Board in Ontario.

DISCUSSION: The Board discussed the advisability of adjourning this meeting so that the Board would be in a position to authorize any final settlement of the action as soon as the necessary arrangements had been made. It was agreed that the meeting would adjourn to reconvene on the call of the President as soon as the Secretary was notified by the Club's solicitor that terms of settlement had been agreed to by all parties.

1221. ADJOURNMENT AND RECONVENING

On motion by Director Roberts, duly seconded by Vice-President Brown, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourned at 2.20 a.m. on January 25th, 1949, to be reconvened on the call of the President.

This meeting of the Board of Directors reconvened on February 3rd, 1949, in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, at 5.30 p.m. The President, W. J. Risewick, presided. Directors present included Paddy Boughs, George P. Davies, A. Roberts and J. Thorndike Jr. Vice-President Brown and Director Riedel could not be present.

1222. DAVID FINGARD vs. C.K.C. ET AL

REPORT: The President reported that the Club's solicitor had proceeded along the lines indicated by the resolutions adopted by the Board on January 24th, and negotiations for settlement of the Fingard vs. C.K.C. et al litigation having proceeded to the stage where the Board's further consideration of the matter was indicated he had reconvened this meeting

of the Board and had arranged for the Club's solicitor, Mr. Frank Wilkinson K.C. to be present to report further developments that had taken place since January 24th.

Mr. Wilkinson then outlined the proposals for settlement as advanced by Messrs. McCarthy & McCarthy, solicitors for Mr. Fingard, and of the changes in terms brought about by negotiation. He proceeded to outline the arrangements that were satisfactory to Mr. Fingard's solicitors which were within the terms originally agreed to by the Board.

RESOLUTION: Following further discussion it was regularly moved by Director Boughs, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, the solicitor be instructed to close the matter on the basis of payment to Mr. Fingard of \$1,000.00 and payment to his solicitors, Messrs. McCarthy & McCarthy, of \$1,150.00, in exchange for consent, signed by Mr. Fingard's solicitors, to dismissal of the action against the defendants without costs; that a letter in the following terms be transmitted from the Canadian Kennel Club to Mr. Fingard:

"By action of the Board of Directors of the Club you were placed under temporary suspension on the 15th of October, 1947, and under indefinite suspension on the 30th of October, 1947. The present Board of Directors of the Club have considered the whole matter and are of the opinion that you should be reinstated as a member of the Club in good standing and as such entitled to all privileges.

I am, accordingly, instructed by the Board of Directors of the Club to inform you that you may consider yourself as not under suspension or subject to any other penalty in respect of the matters under discussion as of January 1, 1949.

The Club also undertakes that it will notify Canadian National Live Stock Records of your reinstatement and will instruct it to process immediately all applications for registration of dogs owned by you or the progeny of such dogs, which applications are now being held in abeyance by it on instructions of the Club.

The Club also undertakes that it will immediately advise all other clubs and show-giving bodies which were informed of your suspension that you have been reinstated as a member in good standing entitled to the full privileges of the Club.

The Club regrets the many embarrassments which you must have suffered as a result of the whole affair"; and that a letter enclosing the cheques be forwarded from the Canadian Kennel Club to Messrs. McCarthy & McCarthy, the letter to be drafted by the Club's solicitor." Motion carried unanimously.

(NOTE: The above mentioned letters were delivered with cheques to the Club's solicitors who then obtained the final release).

1223. ADJOURNMENT

On motion by Director Boughs, seconded by Director Thorndike, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourned at 7.05 p.m.

President's Address at the Annual Board Meeting

At this our annual meeting it is my pleasant duty to welcome the new Board of Directors. Composed as it is of those who have served before and those who for the first time are sharing in the management of the Canadian Kennel Club, I believe it is a well-tempered executive body and that its several qualities of experience and enthusiasm, will serve the organization truly and well.

Though we face a difficult period of adjustment, I am confident that this Board, working together in a sustained spirit of co-operation, can meet and solve all of the problems arising during the months that lie ahead.

In past years when it has been my privilege to act as Chairman of this annual meeting, I have taken the opportunity of reporting generally on Kennel Club affairs. I propose to do the same

on this occasion, and so without further ado, I will launch into my "state of the union" message.

Over the past ten years the business of the Club has more than doubled, and in the process has brought us face to face with the necessity of changing pace. Today we have problems and weaknesses that are a product of the times we live in. To meet this challenge we must be prepared to lay down a sound course of action and then to follow it. As a start in the right direction, my remarks constitute a review and analysis of the four topics of primary significance to the welfare of this organization—finance, identification, incorporation and affiliation, and finally administration.

FINANCE

Inspection of the 1948 financial statement will indicate that consideration must be given to means of increasing revenue and at the same time reducing operating expenses. How to do this without adding to the burden already borne by members of the Club and without withdrawing services normally provided, will be our knottiest problem. But it is a problem that must be tackled if our financial resources are not to be illogically expended without regard to the income of the Club and its financial soundness in the years to come. In an earlier message to the members I advanced the thought that each of the departments of the Club's operations should, if at all possible, be self-sustaining. It will be realized how very difficult it would be to produce figures indicating the revenue derived from each branch of the Club's activities and the cost to maintain the services rendered by each department, but the general picture can be seen from the analysis, based on our 1948 statements, accompanying this message. This indicates the sources of our revenue and the distribution of our expenditures in a more understandable form that can be seen from the orthodox statements provided by our Auditors.

FINANCIAL—LIVE STOCK RECORDS

It will be seen that by far the greatest proportion of the Club's income is derived from memberships, registrations, transfers, etc. and that approximately a fourth of the income of the Club is required to maintain these services through the Live Stock Records Office. Despite the fact that the number of transactions handled by the Records office on behalf of the Canadian Kennel Club decreased in 1948 as compared with 1947 (1947—60,211; 1948—58,010) the 1948 costs exceeded 1947 by \$1,287.22. This can be attributed to two factors: (a) The increase in costs experienced in almost every type of business during the past few years; (b) Much work was entailed in the handling of applications for which the Records Office can make no specific charge until the applications are finally processed and certificates issued. Fees accompanying these applications were deposited in 1948 and are included in the 1948 statement of revenue, yet the Records office costs for handling these transactions must be borne by this year's operations.

Under the present pro-rata system by which each Live Stock Association is assessed proportionately according to the number of transactions handled by the Records Office for all Associations, there is little incentive for any single association to take steps to reduce the work of the Records Office in handling its business. A specific example can be given in support of this statement—American exhibitors at Canadian Championship Shows, acting with accordance with our Dog Show Rules, register their dogs in our stud book. Since the A.K.C. certificate of registration of a dog names only the sire and dam of the dog, it was therefore necessary for the staff of the Records Office to spend many hours building up three generation pedigrees from the A.K.C. stud books in order that the annual C.K.C. three-generation pedigrees for these dogs could be issued. Acting on a worthwhile recommendation made by the Club's Registrar in the Records Office, your Board of Directors last year directed that the certificates of registration for American born dogs owned outside Canada need show the name of sire and dam only. The consequent saving of labour can readily be imagined, but the significant factor here is that by this one step the C.K.C. assisted in a reduction of Records Office costs in the handling of the registration of these dogs, yet the C.K.C. itself benefited to only a small degree, the full saving being shared by all associations doing business through the Records office. When it is pointed out

to you that one registration is considered a transaction, and a single transfer of ownership (whether recorded at the same time or not) is also considered one transaction. It will readily be seen how inequitable is the present system of determining what all Associations must pay for these services. Unquestionably the amount of time and labour required to record a transfer of ownership is considerably less than what is required for a registration of a single dog because of the fact that the said animal was previously registered and the individual pedigree has already been compiled.

It is apparent that the cost per transaction has increased appreciably over the period of the past few years—21.567 cents in 1938 as compared with 37.27 cents in 1948. Whatever action is to be taken to arrest this trend, can only become effective through the combined efforts of all Live Stock Associations.

Since the cost of maintaining its records at the Live Stock Records Office naturally represents a large part of the overall costs of the Club's operations, consideration is indicated by the Board of Directors to the fact that we have not been able to rally these other breed Associations to our support and to meet with them and discuss our privileges in an effort to improve the services of the Records Office. It is true that we have had representatives on the Live Stock Committee at various times, but I have yet to see any tangible evidence that such representation has improved our relations with the other Live Stock Associations.

FINANCE—DOG SHOWS, FIELD

TRIALS AND OBEDIENCE TRIALS

I am certain it would be a revelation to our members if they could see the work entailed in the Toronto office in connection with correspondence and records for dog shows, field trials and obedience trials.

Revenue derived directly from shows and trials is negligible, but the analysis will establish that a very considerable portion of the Club's operational costs result from this branch of our activities. In the first place the Live Stock records office at Ottawa provides the Toronto office with a copy of all certificates of registrations for individual dogs issued, and notifies the Toronto office of all the transfers of ownership that take place. These records would not be required if the Toronto office did not have to keep records of wins at shows and trials. The cost of this additional service in 1948 amounted to \$3,536.00.

Show and field trial results are published in Dogs in Canada and this naturally represents an expense to the Club.

While all of the Kennel Club staff is to some extent concerned with the correspondence and records for shows and trials, it is not possible to definitely calculate the percentage of their working hours involved in this type of work. It is however, possible to calculate the salaries of three members of the staff exclusively working on show records and reports and in 1948 their salaries totalled \$4,104.00. It should be understood that this figure does not include any portion of the Secretary's salary, the Book-keeper's salary, or for the time of stenographers dealing with correspondence relating to shows and trials.

The C.K.C. Representative's salary in 1948 amounted to \$3,500.00 to which must be added his travelling expenses which in 1948 amounted to \$1,244.66. Other travelling expenses directly chargeable to dog shows were provincial directors' expenses amounting to \$211.15, payment of which was authorized by the 1948 Board.

The cost of prizes offered in 1948 was \$1,907.02. This was greater than past years and can be accounted for by a decision of the Board in selecting a very lovely piece of silver to commemorate the occasion of our Diamond Jubilee. I would like to compliment last year's Board on reaching this decision.

I am heartily in accord with the Club's policy in recognizing major wins by Canadian-bred dogs owned by members of the Club, but am of the opinion that if the Club is to continue this policy, some more satisfactory method of distribution of the prizes should be sought. For example of the 150 salvers ordered and delivered to prize winners in 1948, a total of 32 salvers went to two members of the Club. No fair-minded member would question the wins made by the dogs owned by these members, but the distribution of the prizes nullifies to some extent the reasons for offering such prizes.

The amount of \$1,174.22 charged to printing includes the printing of the Dog Show Rules, printing of certificates and other forms and applications required in connection with shows and trials. It will be noted that an amount of \$555.00 for engraving has been allotted to this section and this represents the Editor's estimated cost of engraving featuring winners at Championship shows. It is estimated that it cost \$858.40 to print these illustrations.

It would however, be unfair and perhaps unwise to conclude that competitive contests for dogs ultimately mean little in the way of revenue but a great deal of expense, for it should be realized that shows and trials are actually the show window of our sport; and the sale and registration of pure-bred dogs is naturally stimulated by these activities. My sole purpose is to indicate to those who may entertain the view that The Canadian Kennel Club contributes little to show and field activity, that the Club has indeed substantial costs in that direction.

FINANCE—DOGS IN CANADA

Examination of the financial statement of Dogs in Canada for 1948 as compared with the statement for the magazine for 1947 reveals the following significant factors:

1. Advertising has jumped from \$9,501.13 in 1947 to \$13,234.49 in 1948, an increase of approximately \$4,000.00.

2. The amount placed to the credit of the magazine for the publication of official business amounted to \$9,138.47 last year as compared to \$2,308.06 in 1947. Undoubtedly there was an increase in the amount of official business published in 1948 as compared to 1947 due to the fact that the minutes of the Board meetings were included in the publication rather than being printed and mailed separately, but the huge increase in this allowance can be attributed largely to the 1948 Board's decision (acting on the recommendation of the Dogs in Canada Committee) to credit the magazine with the publication of official business at a rate of \$35.00 per page. No doubt some recognition should be made of the fact that by publishing the minutes in the magazine additional costs for handling, envelopes and postage would not be encountered but it is perhaps not unreasonable to suppose that had this official business been printed and handled separately from the publication the actual cost to the Club would not have exceeded \$6,000.00.

I am certain no one could object to a reasonable allowance being made to the magazine for the publication of the Club's official business, but I do not see how anyone can justify the policy of not only paying a reasonable charge for the printing of official business but in addition a premium for this service, certainly not when it is remembered that the magazine is the Club's official organ. On the figures I am able to obtain, this allowance of \$9,138.47 exceeded a reasonable allowance by the sum of \$3,000.00. If the cost of the publication of official business in 1948 had been computed on the same basis established in previous years the allowance would have been \$5,999.83, a difference of \$3,138.64 from the allowance recommended by the Committee last year.

3. The sale of half-tones jumped from \$320.75 to \$696.70. An increase of approximately \$376.00.

4. Profit on purchase and sale of books dropped appreciably, which no doubt can be attributed to the fact that this phase of the magazine's operations was not encouraged.

5. News-stand sales dropped from \$467.34 to \$57.53, due to the fact that news-stand sales were discontinued after the publication of the March issue. Since news-stand sales did not pay, this was an actual economy.

6. Share of membership fees increased from \$2,945.00 in 1947 to \$3,445.00 in 1948, since the policy of allowing the magazine \$1.00 per member was not altered.

7. Actual printing of the magazine jumped considerably being \$16,572.39 in 1948 as compared to \$9,363.62 in 1947, but this no doubt can be attributed to increased printing costs, a bigger magazine, more copies, the setting of official business in the larger type, and perhaps to some extent, a change of printers.

8. Engraving and art work costs jumped considerably, the cost in 1948 being \$2,039.76 as compared to \$511.06 in 1947. The explanation for the increase is obvious when we note the number of

illustrations appearing in last Year's magazine as compared with 1947. But they say a picture is worth a thousand words, and I believe it.

9. In the statement for 1948 there appears an account of \$922.00 which has been set up for the provision of doubtful accounts.

10. An increase in the charges for salaries can be attributed to the financial adjustments required in view of the change of Editors in March of last year.

11. The substantial increase in the charges to the magazine for rent, light, telephone has been brought about largely due to the increase in the rent of the Club's new offices and also to the increase in the amount for telephone service charged against the magazine.

I have always contended that we have two possible courses of action to follow in respect of our magazine.

First, publish a general dog magazine of interest not only to members, but to one-dog fanciers who would perhaps be interested in buying the publication occasionally or frequently on the news-stand or by direct subscription. Secondly, that the magazine be made a club magazine distributable only to members and containing such information and news as the membership generally wishes to read. It would of course include the official business of the Club.

It is for the membership to decide on the form and content of the magazine, but I am of the opinion that a general magazine would be more costly in that it would have to be "dressed up" to appeal to the one-dog fancier and encourage news-stand purchase. To publish a magazine that would appeal to all lovers of dogs is desirable, but I suggest that we do not experiment this year with printing costs and other expenses so high.

If it is finally decided that the Club magazine should be solely a Club publication containing not only official business, but other news and articles of interest to the membership generally, then I believe that every effort should be made to have the magazine pay its own way and towards that end I would make the following recommendations:

1. That the Board of Directors at the beginning of the year set the charges and credits that will be made to the magazine so that the Managing Editor will be in a position to calculate her production costs from month to month. It is virtually impossible for an Editor to do this if, as has been the policy for years, we delay determining what allocations will be made until the end of the year. This will greatly assist the Editor in keeping costs commensurate with income.

2. That reading material in the magazine be set in 6 point type rather than the 8 point face. Such dog papers as the Dog World (American) and Our Dog World (England) use the smaller type face exclusively for reading material. This would effect a saving of approximately 20% in the printing of reading material.

Whichever decision is reached with respect to the magazine I think that the following points should be remembered:

1. The magazine is one method of advertising the Club and the sport with which we are vitally concerned and any business worthy of the name always has a sizeable portion of its income allocated for advertising purposes and public relations.

2. The allocation of \$1.00 per member in lieu of the membership fees to the magazine virtually means that the Editor is allowed not more than 8 1/3 cents per copy when it is all too obvious that the printing cost of a magazine is far in excess of that allowance. No member of this organization can hope to subscribe to a publication of its present size and expect to obtain the copy at 8 1/3 cents.

3. For a publication of its size, content and circulation the advertising rates are exceedingly low. By maintaining the present advertising rates we are in effect subsidizing the advertising of our member-breeders, a service which should not be forgotten. While we may very well consider increasing the rate for advertising placed by non-members of the Club and allied industries, I do not recommend any increase in the rates as far as it concerns breeders of pure-bred dogs who are members of this Club.

FINANCE—CONCLUSION

No organization can for long continue in operation if its expenditures continually exceed its financial income; cer-

tainly our Club cannot financially afford another year like 1948. It is therefore apparent that unless our revenue increases substantially, a most unlikely development, then our expenditures must undergo drastic curtailment.

I therefore offer the following recommendations for your consideration:

1. The Board now decide on allocations to DOGS IN CANADA, and the Editor be instructed to see that expenditures on the magazine do not exceed revenue. Consideration be given to increasing advertising rates to non-members and commercial firms. Note also my earlier recommendation regarding use of smaller type.

2. It was on my suggestion that in 1946 and 1947, meetings of the Board were held outside Ontario. It was my hope that this would indicate to the membership generally that the Club was indeed a national organization, that the direction of the Club's affairs was not exclusively concentrated in one geographical area, and that movement of the Club's officers about the country would enable the members in the various areas to acquaint such officers with their own individual problems and difficulties. There has apparently been a mixed reception to this policy, and while I do believe in its advantages, I nevertheless feel that for this year at least we should forego this arrangement.

3. The expenditure for prizes offered by the Club could be materially reduced. It would be my thought that the Club have special certificates engraved for delivery to member-owners of Canadian-bred dogs placed Best in Show. Such certificates would contain the name of the dog, the name of its owner and the seal of the C.K.C., suitable for framing.

4. The Board, acting on a recommendation made by myself as your President and as an experiment, appointed a Representative of the C.K.C. to attend Dog Shows and Trials in the Province of Ontario. The original contract with the Representative was for twenty-one months only. The idea was born as a result of many complaints that reached the Club's offices over a period of years from exhibitors who complained generally about the lack of continuity of shows, the late hours and conditions under which some shows were conducted. It was my intention that the Representative would assist show-giving Clubs in the actual planning and operating of their shows but certainly not to act as a policeman or attempt to judge the judges. It is now all too obvious that our Representative cannot possibly attend all championship shows and trials in Canada. The problem of setting out future policies in respect to the duties of the Representative is another point that must be settled.

Those members who read the minutes of the meetings of the Board held last year will have noted that last year's Board committed the Club to a ten-year lease on its new office and at the same time entered into contracts with the C.K.C. Representative and Managing Editor, their contracts to be for five years and one year respectively.

Undoubtedly there are occasions when it would be to the Club's advantage to enter into long term contracts but when any new contract commits the Club to an obligation far in excess of that to which it has been accustomed to meeting in the past, then, in my humble opinion, a Board is morally bound to not only consider the Club's future position but that of future Boards who will be tied to contracts on which they had no say. It is incomprehensible to me that a Board, in the last two months of its term of office, would enter into contracts when such matters could quite easily have been deferred to the incoming Board for consideration. I fail to understand why a Board should be so concerned about entering into contracts with two relative newcomers to the staff, and yet take no action in respect to your Secretary-Treasurer, a man who joined the staff sixteen years ago and whose services could least readily be replaced. In short your 1949 Board is faced with contracts calling for expenditures of \$11,320.00 in 1949, and yet it in no way could be consulted regarding these fixed expenditures.

To the annual meeting of the Board I will recommend that the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to provide every member of the Board with a monthly statement of revenue and expenditures. The Board will then be in a position to determine what further economies will be required in order to bring the Club back to a sound financial position.

I will further recommend that audited financial statements be published in the November issue of DOGS IN CANADA in order that the membership at large can see, before the balloting in December, how this year's Board has conducted the financial affairs of the Club. I think it is only fair if the members are to be in a position to decide whether any or all members of the current Board should or should not be returned to office.

There is the matter of the litigation resulting from action taken by part of the Board of Directors in 1947. I am of the opinion that had your 1948 Board taken action along the lines suggested by the Club's solicitors as contained in a letter addressed to the Secretary under date of January 23rd, 1948, costs arising out of legal fees and for damages most certainly would have been greatly reduced. Your 1949 Board, after carefully considering the suggestion contained in our Solicitor's letter of January 2nd, 1948, thought the continuance of this litigation would only increase costs in defending it and accordingly unanimously approved of a basis of settlement.

The members can be assured that this year's Board will do its utmost to follow a businesslike policy in respect to the finances of the Club.

PROCEDURES AND POLICIES

As stated earlier, the Club's business has more than doubled over the past few years, and with each passing year it seems that the work in administering the Club's affairs has become more complex and involved. Numerous examples of this can be found, so many in fact, that I am convinced that if the work involved is to be reduced, efficiency increased, costs lowered and better service provided, we will have to examine every step of our operational procedures and determine what should be done in that regard.

For example, at one time when an application for a show or trial date reached the office, the Secretary was empowered to grant the date immediately providing it did not conflict with any date already granted. Over the years the procedure in dealing with an application for dates has reached the stage where the date cannot be granted by the Secretary until it has received the approval of all Directors in the area where the trial or show is to be held (in Western Canada this means the Directors for all four Western provinces) and the Board of Directors. It doesn't take much imagination to see how much letter-writing and postage is involved, to say nothing of waste of time. An application could be four weeks in the Secretary's hands before he could notify the Club of approval, meanwhile the date could not be listed in DOGS IN CANADA, could not be advertised by the Club, nor could the trial or the show club close any contracts for building or judges until the date was finally approved. I unhesitatingly recommend that the Board lay down a general policy in respect to applications for dates and empower the Secretary to approve or disapprove dates within that general policy. Immediate action could be taken on applications and only in event of dispute need such matters be brought to the Board.

The same developments occurred in respect to applications for membership. The Secretary has been obliged to consult every member of the Board in respect to application for membership and then obtain the Board's approval at a Board meeting before returning approved applications to the Records office. Again I say, empower the Secretary to act immediately on such applications; he should only have to refer to the Board for consideration an application from an individual whose previous record was such that he feels the Board should deal with it.

I recommend that the same policy be followed in respect to applications for kennel names.

Over a period of years so much red tape in respect to judges has developed that we must do something to expedite applications for approval of judges. I would recommend that anyone upon invitation to judge who is in good standing with the Canadian Kennel Club and affiliated clubs be approved automatically. As you are all aware, the American Kennel Club has recently instituted a new system in respect to judges, closely paralleling that now in force here (i.e. no permanent judging license) and I believe we should watch their experiment closely.

LIVE STOCK PEDIGREE ACT

It is now known that the Department of Agriculture is going to present to the House at this session a new Live Stock Pedigree Act for its approval. This is the Act from which we derive our powers to operate as a Club. We were invited, along with other associations, to send representations to a meeting to be held on February 8th and 9th in Ottawa when this Act was to be discussed.

Because of our current meetings coupled with the fact that our solicitor had a previous commitment on that date we were not represented at that meeting. However, I am certain that our association will have ample time to make representation in respect to that Act before the Act becomes law.

IDENTIFICATION

The writer had hardly received notice of his election as President of your Club when numerous telephone calls and letters brought his attention to developments in respect to identification of dogs for registration purposes. I endeavoured to promptly ascertain what had prompted the Department of Agriculture's attitude with respect to a considerable number of applications for registration which the Live Stock Records office subsequently returned to breeders, and was referred to a letter written by the Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture dated December 13th, 1948, in which he quotes from Article 24, Identification:

(a) Colour or colours. A clearly stated description of the colour or colours of the dog for which application for registration is made.

Mr. MacVannel then went on to state: "We are not satisfied that some breeders are taking this method of identification seriously."

"The Seal of the Department of Agriculture and approval or signature of certificates of registration may only apply where confidence is maintained."

Confusion may follow the indiscriminate approval of certificates of registration where "clearly stated description of colour or colours" is not contained on the application." In pursuing the matter further, I as your President, had an interview with the Chief Registration Officer and later a further meeting was held attended by Directors Thorndike, Davies, Riedel, Boughs and myself.

The Chief Registration Officers, Mr. MacVannel and Mr. Steele, his associate, outlined some of the problems of registration as it applied to their duties and one of their big problems is the proper colour markings of some breeds. As an illustration, most Boston Terriers are described as brindle and white and in reality most of them could be described as having white feet, half white collar and so on. The same applies to Collies which are very often described as sable and white, when it would be quite possible for the breeder to indicate that the dog is sable and at the same time state where the white markings are located. It is our responsibility as breeders to see that the colour (or colours) of a dog is clearly stated on the application for registration form and the location of all markings should also be clearly stated. It is also our responsibility as breeders to keep complete records of our breeding activities so that such a record will be available to any authorized representative of the government who may desire to examine such records. I feel sure that we can count on the co-operation of our members and others registering dogs in our records.

CONCLUSIONS

I have summed up for you the problems that must be mastered during your term as officers of this Club—problems not of your own making, but problems nevertheless. It must be admitted that their sum is somewhat staggering. Perhaps you are thinking these difficulties are insurmountable; I do not believe that is true. I am confident that as a group we can go forward together, if necessary patching here, improvising there, until such time as we have built up a sound structure within the framework of work-a-day reality. The thing we must decide to do is to cut expenses without corresponding depreciation of service rendered. This is not easy to do. It can be done if we are willing to face facts. We must spend less or earn more, but whatever we do, we must learn to live within our income.

A Message to the Members:

AT the annual meeting of the Board of Directors held on February 9th, the finances of the Club were discussed thoroughly, and after lengthy deliberation a planned economy budget was set up for 1949. Providing our revenue for 1949 is commensurate with 1947-1948 revenues, the Club will be able to operate without a financial loss for 1949, and also there will be no increases in membership or registration fees or for any other paid services to the members.

* * * *

The Board agreed that the editorial and advertising contents of DOGS IN CANADA (with the exception of official business) should be the responsibility of the Editor. Allocations of revenue and costs to the magazine for 1949 have been decided on, and this will enable the Editor to know from month to month how the publication is progressing financially. It is the desire of the Board of Directors that all our members do everything possible to assist in making our magazine of interest to all dog lovers.

Saskatchewan Notes

THE Provincial Director, Mr. Walter W. Riome, has been a busy man since the elections, devoting a great deal of time to Kennel Club business and holding meetings of C.K.C. Members and Field Trial Associations. An effort is being made, also, to re-organize the Prince Albert Kennel Club. In the past this city held some very good shows and it is to be hoped this may once more become a possibility.

Two meetings were held in the friendly city of Saskatoon where enthusiasm still runs high among the Fancy—one to re-organize the general Club and bring back the summer shows we have all missed of late. Tentative plans were made to hold a Sanction Show in May; also another show to fit in with the Prairie Fall Circuit. The Field Trial Association met in Mr. Newton MacGregor's office where the business of 1948 was reviewed, plans laid for this year's trials and amendments to the Field Trial Rules to be taken up at the Annual Meeting were discussed.

It is anticipated that the American Field Trials will be revived and run in the Moose Jaw district this year. These trials which were such a success before the war will once again bring an army of trainers, owners and hundreds of the finest dogs on the continent to Moose Jaw. Over a thousand sections of land well stocked with birds will be available. The Director has already endeavoured to procure the use of these grounds after the American Trials have been run in order to stage C.K.C. meets if the local Field Clubs deem it advisable.

THE biggest news in Ottawa dog circles at the moment, of course, is the three days of point shows being held jointly by the Ottawa Kennel Club and the newly organized Hull Kennel Club, on May 6, 7 and 8. Ever since the first of the year, the clubs have been working towards these highlights and arrangements have now reached a stage where the directors of the two clubs are anticipating the most successful shows in the history of the Dominion capital.

Arrangements completed are a perfect example of what two clubs, working in harmony and towards the one objective, can achieve. It was realized from the first that co-operation in many fields could save a great deal of money and prevent much needless overlapping. For instance, the one mailing will carry the premium lists and entry forms for all three shows. Advertising can be done jointly. Catalogues for the shows will be produced from the one printer. With joint agreement on the judges it was possible to save a great deal of expense in this field and secure three, high calibre, all rounders for little more per show than was paid for two judges a year ago.

With three all rounders available, each judging two different groups each day, it will mean that owners of good dogs, in the more popular breeds, will have an excellent chance of completing a Canadian championship on the one trip here.

Enquiries already received indicate a great deal of interest in these shows and the executive of the two clubs have suggested to exhibitors that they get entries in early, because it will be possible to accommodate only a certain number of dogs and it may develop to a stage where late entries would have to be refused.

Change in the executive of the Ottawa Kennel Club was announced during the month due to the resignation of the Second Vice-President,

Judging Dogs in Cuba

I KNOW the Canadian Dog Fancy can understand why I was happy, with the consent of the Canadian Kennel Club, to accept the invitation of the Federation of Canine Clubs of Cuba to judge at their two shows in Mantanza and Havana, Cuba.

After snow plows had cleared a runway at Malton Airport, on Thursday, January 27th, I took off for New York, and then on an Eastern Air Liner, D.C.6, for a 1,100-mile flight southward to Miami. Friday morning, the difference in temperature made me feel like shedding my coat and shirt. An hour and a half flight from there across Key West to Cuba's capital city of a million . . . Havana!

Cuban hospitality began at once. Senors Tello and Gonzales called for us at our Sevilla (Biltmore Hotel) and took us for a delightful ride through Cuban countryside. We stopped at Rio Cristal for a very Cuban lunch which we ate on the open verandas. We looked out upon a tropical paradise. Within a few acres were eucalyptus, oranges, lemons, guanos, cocoanuts, almond trees and a rainbow of flowers.

Friday night, the clubs gave an open-air dinner at the country club for a few of the exhibitors from the United States.

Saturday, January 29th, Senor and Senora de Salazar had a group as guests at their large farm for a suckling pig roast. I cannot begin to tell you fully the warmth of Cuban hospitality. We all enjoyed the food, the beautiful grounds and the company. I picked a few oranges ripe from the trees.

The first show was held at Matanzas, about seventy-four miles out of Havana. This is a beautiful city of the resort type. The weather was most enjoyable, although this is Cuba's winter.

The judging was out of doors and began at six o'clock in the evening. Dr. Lichtenburg of Mexico City judged Terriers, Toys and Non-Sporting. I made all other awards.

There was a large crowd present in the gallery, and with the brightness of the town lights and the coolness of the sea breeze blowing in the scene took on the effect of a large garden party.

Senor Rivero presided at the loud speaker. He owns the first Cuban-bred dog to win a championship in the United States, a Cocker Spaniel, Ch. Red Nyun.

THE escapade of the German Shepherd dog while in flight to New York last September caused the officials of the Air Transport to make a ruling that all dogs must be securely muzzled in addition to being crated. This has worked a hardship on the small breeds, and particularly Terriers. So much so, that rather than muzzle a Terrier whose whiskers must be guarded carefully for the show ring, the exhibitors returned to using train service. A new ruling has been made, now, which will allow small dogs—that is, dogs of the size of an Airedale or less—to travel by air without muzzles, providing they are securely crated. The large breeds, however, must be muzzled as well as crated. One can readily understand that a 150-pound dog plunging around in the baggage compartment of a plane in flight would necessarily cause confusion.

It was decided, at the meeting of the Board of Directors held during the second week of February, to invite the show-giving clubs to assist in making DOGS IN CANADA attractive, and at the same time help with the additional expense incurred by publishing full-page layouts of the Groups and Best in Show awards. The show-giving clubs are hereby requested to put photographs and engraving costs in their budget if they wish these photographs to appear in DOGS IN CANADA. The magazine, in turn, will not charge for the space taken by these layouts.

As the readers will see in the official minutes of the meetings and in the President's address, it will be necessary for DOGS IN CANADA to curtail expenditures if it is to remain an attractive magazine. It is the Editor's firm

belief that photographs are most appealing and do much to interest the buyers of pure bred dogs. Commencing with the March issue, DOGS IN CANADA will return to the news stands across the country giving added value to the news photographs and advertisements contained therein.

As a result of the advertisement placed in DOGS IN CANADA, Mr. and Mrs. John Ford of Erie, Pennsylvania, visited the Barrimor Kennels with their lovely German Shepherd, Greta of Neldon, for mating with Ch. Steel of Barrimor. The result is a litter of puppies which from all accounts are "tops" in the estimation of their owner.

There was such a large entry of Canadian dogs at the Westminster Show that we are holding the news over until the April issue in order to make all awards correct. The Westminster Kennel Club has discontinued selling a marked catalogue at the show, so it was impossible to secure one in time for this issue.

Mrs. E. J. Lockie, of the Greenfield Kennels, Markham, Ontario, writes that her Canadian Champion Honey Creek Pandora, with 13 points towards her American Championship, has been sold back to her breeder, Mrs. Bea. Wegusen. Since returning to the United States, Pandora has finished her championship.

Next month, we will feature the Non-Sporting breeds and the owners of these breeds are cordially invited to send in news and photographs so that we can make the issue attractive. The Non-Sporting Group includes, Boston Terriers, Bulldogs, Chow Chows, Dalmatians, French Bulldogs, Keeshondens,

Poodles (Miniature), Poodles (Standard), and Schipperkes. Please remember, the deadline is March 5th.

He is a world-wide authority on all live stock matters and an author of note. He favors Labrador Retrievers and has greatly contributed to the improvement of this breed of sporting dogs.
