OUR COVER

Our cover this month depicts the lovely Miss Mildred Beatty with the sensational Great Dane, Fingard's Count. This dog was shown at the Sportsmen's Kennel Club Show on March 26th, 1949. In what is believed to be the largest entry of top quality Great Danes at any show in the Dominion of Canada, Fingard's Count won first Open, Winners Dogs, Best of Winners and Best of Breed.

This dog bids fair to equal the enviable show record of his litter brothers and sisters which came from the record litter of eighteen pupples, eight of which were kept and four of which made show history. They are Champion Fingard's King, Champion Fingard's Heide, Champion Fingard's Honey and Champion Fingard's Odin.

That Fingard's Count comes from a line of illustrious champions is borne out by his sire's pedigree, which includes Champion Duke of Roxdane (Best of Breed at Madison Square Gardens, New York City, in 1940), Champion Steinbachers King, Champion Wiskow Kadow of Brae Tarn, and Champion Peer Gynt's Erl-king.

His dam is Fingard's Champion Wischers Dulcy. Not only was she a great winner, herself, in the show ring, but she comes from such noted breeding as Champion Muldoon (Best of Breed at Madison Square Gardens, New York City, 1942), Champion Randolph Hexengold, Champion Nero Hexengold, Champion Gunar Von Hollergarten of Walnut Hall, Champion Allure of Brae Tarn, one of the greatest of the great producers in Great Dane history, and that outstanding pillar of the breed from Germany, Champion Odin Von Birkenhof, the sire of Champion King Von Loenhart, who holds the world's record for awards in the show ring for the breed.

Fingard's Count was bred and is owned by David Fingard, who is believed to have bred more Great Dane Champions who in turn have produced champions, than any other breeder of Great Danes in Canada. The judge at the Sportsmen's Show where Fingard's Count made his sensational win was Mrs. Marie Meyer Nolan, who is considered one of the outstanding authorities on the working breed, and particularly Great Danes, of which she has bred many champions.

Through the Looking Glass

H AVE you ever sat at a ringside and listened to the comments of spectators and exhibitors? It is quite an experience, and for the first time in many years the writer was able to do just that. Beside me and around me were many people who were seeing a dog show for the first time. They were there because they liked dogs and most probably were interested in the purchase of a purebred dog, which ultimately would lead them into joining the Canadian Kennel Club and showing dogs of their own.

The question arises, What are we doing to interest these people? Do our actions at the dog show lead to the good and welfare of the dog industry? Or do we, unwittingly, say and do things which would lead a prospective purchaser to walk away and spend his time and money elsewhere?

Much has been written on this subject, and an article by John Franklin Bible in "The American Field" some twenty years ago might well apply today. Mr. Bible wrote under the heading "The True Sportsman" as follows:

"There is nothing else in all the world one-half so sweet as the memories of the true sportsman, whose record is unmarred and honor bright through all the ups and downs of a long and varied experience running back to the days of childhood. Every word uttered and every deed performed in the name of true sportsmanship become the most precious jewels in memory's storehouse, and they are always recalled with the most thrilling delight.

"It has been my privilege to wine and dine with the multi-millionaire in his gilded mansion beside the roaring sea; and also to sojourn with the red man in his native and primitive wigwam and tepee, and often I have been constrained to envy the red man rather than the rich man. Of necessity, the rich man is more or less a slave to the wealth he has amassed and has physical ills of which the red man knows nothing. If wealth brings not strength of limb, contentment of heart, a keen appetite and a stomach with a perfect digestive system it may have been a curse, rather than a blessing. Who would exchange freedom of action, contentment of heart, a strong and healthy body and a keen appetite for all the mansions in the world?

"The true sportsman is always a wellrounded man, a loyal patriot, a lover of his fellow man and believes in doing unto others as he would that they do unto him. He realizes that it is the little deeds of truth, kindness, sympathy and hospitality that make life worth living and the only things that justify his existence on this earth. Some day, somewhere, perhaps, we shall learn that the little deeds of love and kindness, wrought unostentatiously and perhaps even unconsciously as we journey through this world, will be greater in their helpfulness and will shine more brightly in the "eventide" of our lives than deeds of great renown with which we sought so strenuously and perhaps covetously to crown our

What has this to do with the showing of our dogs today? It has been said that a writer who is unafraid to air his views in cold print when he realizes he is right, can do more to bring about clean sportsmanship in the dog game than in any other way.

Delving back into the past again, we find an editorial written in "Dogdom", December, 1937, which did much to create interest in making the dog shows more of a sporting venture. It was

written at Christmas time, but the message is good at any time of the year.

"Good will toward men. That phrase, coined centuries ago, is exactly as significant today, for it stands for nothing less than the modern spirit of cooperation. Without it, no project, large or small, no work of any kind, no play, no sport can be thoroughly satisfactory or reach an even moderately successful culmination.

"Whatever our sphere of activity, good will toward men is needed for comfort and a measure of enjoyment, as well as for accomplishment in any type of endeavor. In an extremely complicated civilization, our work must depend upon the work of others; our play, upon the play of others, and no matter how well we order our lives we can rarely go far without the cooperation of those around us.

"No exception to the rule is the sport of purebred dogs, in which all must stand together if this steadily rising game is not to be a house of cards that will fall of its own weight. Rivalry and competition are splendid spurs to achievement, but in them lies the danger of rending asunder what should be welded with the spirit of good will. The arrogant winner who loses his friends in his journey up has a far more difficult time, a less enjoyable time, as henceforth he climbs alone. The whining, the malicious loser, too, cuts himself off from the association of friends who might have been glad to help him on his way.

"Malicious talk is in many instances careless talk, voiced not to offend but, oftentimes, merely to rationalize a weakness. That is why so many times we find the unsuccessful breeder broadcasting whatever gossip he has heard. He hopes to attract attention to himself, perhaps, as a bearer of tidings. He does not stop to verify his facts, but spreads them around without regard to the injury he may be doing to



his fellows and to the game. You can stop him anytime by saying suddenly: "Can you prove that?" "Well, So-andso told me, and "Such-and-such told him," is the answer.

The Dog Tax and Live Stock Protection Act

Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1937 CHAPTER 335

As amended by 1942, Chapter 12; 1945, Chapter 6; and The Dog Tax and Live Stock Protection Amendment Act, 1947.

INTERPRETATION.

1. In this Act,-

(a) "Dog" shall mean any dog, male or female;

(b) "Live Stock" shall mean and include any head of cattle or sheep, and the young of either of them:

and the young of either of them: (c) "Minister" shall mean Minister of

Agriculture;

(d) "Owner" of a dog shall include any person who possesses or harbours a dog. R.S.O. 1937, c. 335, s. 1.

(e) "Poultry" shall mean domestic chickens, ducks, geese and turkeys and the young of any of them; 1942, c. 12, s. 1.

PART I. DOG TAX, ETC.

2.—(1) Levy of dog tax—Subject to the provisions of section 5, an annual dog tax shall be levied in every local municipality upon every person who is assessed as owner or tenant of any land and who is in occupation thereof, in respect of every dog which he owns within the municipality or which is habitually kept upon the premises for which he is assessed although such dog may be owned by some other person.

(2) Amount of tax—The amount of the tax payable where no by-law increasing the tax has been passed by the municipality shall be,—

for a male dog, if only one is kept \$2.00 for each additional male dog 4.00 for a female dog, if only one is kept 4.00 for each additional female dog 6.00

(3) Spayed bitch—Where a certificate in writing by a veterinary surgeon is produced showing that a bitch has been spayed, she shall be taxed at the same rate as a male dog.

(4) Increase of tax—Any municipality may pass a by-law increasing the tax to be paid.

(5) Tax on kennel of pure bred dogs—The owner of a kennel of pure bred dogs registered in the register of The Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated, shall pay an annual tax of \$10 to the treasurer of the municipality as a tax upon the kennel and he shall not be liable to pay any further tax in respect of such pure bred dogs. R.S.O. 1937, c. 335, s. 2.

COLLECTION OF DOG TAX.

3.—(1) Entry on assessment roll of number of dogs.—The assessor shall enter upon the assessment roll opposite the name of every person assessed the number of dogs, bitches and spayed bitches respectively for which he is liable to be taxed.

(2) Statement by owner of dogs.— Any person when so required by the assessor shall forthwith deliver to him a statement in writing of the number of dogs owned by him or which are habitually kept upon the premises for which he is assessed by whomsoever owned.

(3) Penalty—Any assessor who fails to make all due inquiry and to assess all dogs reported to him and any person who neglects or refuses to furnish the statement required by subsection 2 or who makes a false statement shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10.

(4) Collection of tax—The amount payable for dog tax shall be entered upon the collector's roll and the collector shall proceed to collect the same in the same manner as other municipal taxes.

(5) Killing of dogs on failure to pay tax—When the tax is demanded and is not paid, the person assessed may be summoned before a magistrate who may direct the dog to be destroyed unless the tax and costs shall be paid before a time named.

(6) Powers of constable—For the purpose of carrying out such order, a constable may enter upon the premises of the owner and destroy the dog.

(7) Penalty on collector—A collector who neglects to collect the tax or take the proceedings provided by this section before the time fixed for the return of his roll to the treasurer shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$10. R.S.O. 1937, c. 335, s. 3.

DOG TAGS.

4.—(1) Owner required to secure dog tag—In a municipality in which the dog tax is levied every person in each year on or before the 15th day of February or on or before such earlier or later date as may be fixed by by-law of the council shall procure from the clerk or the assessor a tag for each dog owned by him and shall keep the tag securely fixed on the dog at all times during the year and until he procures a tag for the following year excepting that the tag may be removed while the dog is being lawfully used for hunting deer in the bush.

(2) Fee for tag—A fee not exceeding twenty-five cents may be charged for each tag.

(3) Serial number on tag—The tag shall bear a serial number and the year in which it was issued and a record shall be kept by the clerk or other officer designated for that purpose showing the name and address of the owner and the serial number of the tag.

(4) Penalty—Every owner of a dog who neglects to obtain a tag and keep it securely fixed on his dog or who uses a tag upon a dog other than that for which it was issued shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10.

(5) Killing dog found without tag— Every dog which is found off the premises upon which it is habitually kept without a tag and not under the control of any person, may be killed.

Note.—As to dogs at large pursuing deer in the closed season, see Game and Fisheries Act. 1946, c. 33, ss. 30, 31.

(6) Duties of clerk where owner of dog has not been assessed—Where an owner of a dog applies to the clerk for

a tag after the assessment roll has been returned and before the collector's roll has been delivered to the collector and the clerk finds that such owner has not been assessed for the dog the owner shall forthwith make and deliver to the clerk the statement mentioned in subsection 2 of section 3 and the clerk shall make the necessary entries in the assessment and collector's roll, but where the owner acquired ownership of the dog after the expiration of six months of the year he shall only be charged on the collector's roll with one-half of the dog tax. R.S.O. 1937, c. 335, s. 4.

5.—(1) Licencing and registration of dogs—By-laws may be passed by the councils of local municipalities for licencing and requiring the registration of dogs and for imposing a licence fee on the owners of them with the right to impose a larger fee in the case of bitches or for each additional dog or bitch where more than one is owned by any one person or in any one house-hold.

(2) Non-application of sections 2 and 3—Where the licence fee is equal to or exceeds the dog tax required to be levied by this Act, sections 2 and 3 shall not apply while the by-law remains in force.

(3) Application of subss. 1-5 of Section 4—On payment of the licence fee the owner shall be furnished with a dog tag and the provisions of subsections 1 and 4 as to keeping the tag securely fixed on the dog, and subsections 2, 3 and 5 of section 4 shall apply. R.S.O. 1937, c. 335, s. 5.

6.—(1) Prohibiting and regulating the running at large of dogs—By-laws may be passed by the councils of towns, townships, villages and cities having a population of less than 100,000 and by boards of commissioners of police in cities having a population of not less than 100,000 for prohibiting or regulating the running at large of dogs within the municipality or within any defined area thereof; for seizing and impounding and for killing, whether before or after impounding dogs running at large contrary to the by-law, and for selling (Continued on page 8)

Trimming the Terriers


Dogs known today as terriers constitute one of the largest of our canine classifications or groups, comprising 23 different breeds or nearly 20 per cent. of our pure-bred dog population now recognized by the American Kennel Club. Time was, when dogs were considered either as hounds or terriers, these being the two fairly early main roots from which our present dogs have come. This division, of course, was in vogue only in that hazy period of long ago when little if any thought was given to the division of dogs into specific breeds. But that time has long since passed, and today we find that under domestication and modern development the terriers constitute one of six classifications, grouped more or less accurately according to probable heritage and original usage.

The chief office of the terrier was to dig in the earth. That is where he got his name, from terra. Old time hunting found both hounds and terriers in pursuit of small game; the former to trail by scent, the latter to "go to earth" and dig it out of the ground when perchance it holed into hiding. The terrier, therefore, is not as conspicuous for trailing ability as it is for persistence in finding vermin within a comparatively small area, and in quickly snapping it dead or, if need be, of drawing it out of the ground.

And so we find the terriers as a class the veritable "live wires" of dogdom; inquisitive and exceedingly intelligent; determined but amenable to control; adapted to almost any clime and habited surely to any weather. It is this unique dress of theirs, the wire coat with which so many of them are clothed, that under modern conditions has been their fortune and their misfortune. For a terrier of the wirecoated variety looks groomed or frowsy according to the care given his natural habiliments.

It should be explained here for the benefit of those who keep terriers only as companions in the home that they should be trimmed occasionally for the sake of comfort and appearance. The wire coat, left to grow its full length, becomes a shaggy tangle, destroying whatever good lines the dog may possess, and lending the air of a rather unsightly nightgown. Judicious trimming of the long hair gives the skin its rightful chance to breathe; it preserves the wiriness of the coat, moreover, enabling it to shed water and better stand the rigors of the elements. And as for the dog to be exhibited in the ring, trimming and stripping enhances the outline of head and body, to make a really aristocratic appearing animal, graceful, racy, and proud of bearing.

Proper stripping of a terrier is an art that can be learned by patient practise. One must know, to be sure, what the best accepted contour of a terrier is before he can hope to approximate it by means of trimming. But models may be obtained for study easily enough. The show room provides many, while pictures of show-groomed specimens serve as well. Then there are first rate guides published in the form of charts which explain exactly what to take off, what to leave on and how the finished specimen should look. Fortu-



nate is the novice who has access to all three types of study!

The Tools We Need

The tools needed for stripping, and other details for obtaining correct terrier dress, are inexpensive and easily procured. A good stiff brush, a comb, a "dresser" or stripping knife, some whiting and a turkish towelling coat. The whiting or chalk serves merely to give a grip on the hair to be stripped: it is sprinkled into the hair at the start of operations, while the towelling jacket will prove of assistance after the trimmed dog has been washed. It is the dog's "hair net" that sets the hair close to the body, training it to lie flat.

If you will study these pictures you will see how different dogs of various terrier breeds appear when properly trimmed. All shagginess is removed, and replaced with clean lines except in those places where length of hair is left on, even encouraged, for the purpose of accentuating desired characteristics. The average terrier head, for instance, is long; his jaw punishing and powerful, so we carry out this idea by leaving on the foreface whisker and eyebrow growths. Terrier bone must be fairly heavy, and strong, so we enhance this characteristic by leaving on a certain proportion of the leg hair. That is the idea behind the entire trimming job: to take off, where the lines must be neat, flat or clean, and to leave on for facial expression, head modelling, and particulars of body and running gear, such as, for example, lowness, height or breadth.

The infancy of the stripping vogue found the aspiring kennelman equipped merely with a razor or ordinary knife, plus an extra strong thumb and fore-finger. The too-long, offending hairs he grasped tenaciously, and with a quick, sharp jerk pulled them out. But this was a most tedious and time consuming job, requiring days of close work which irked the dog and tried the patience of the operator alike. So the stripping knife was born, and this made the work easier, shorter for man and dog, to say nothing of turning out a better job.

The up-to-date stripping knife, to-day's modern dog dresser, removes the hair in such a way as to prevent any slightest "manipulated" look, and it obviates that persistent need for exerting real strength. Made on the principal of a safety razor, it carries a blade sheathed in a steel-toothed protector, so that no harm can come to the dog from the razor edge, and so that no clearly defined cut edge can appear on the outline of the well stripped dog. The knife is run over the subject much as an ordinary comb would be, and with its blade held safely higher than the teeth of its comb-like sheath the too-long hairs are neatly removed without pain or discomfort to the dog.

And now, let us see how to make a few of these wire-coated dogs presentable for street or show ring.

Schnauzer

Trim the neck down evenly into the back and take off the hair along the back so that the backline looks even, but do not attempt to trim this portion of the back down too closely. Trim the neck and brisket closely, working down into just a shade more hair at that spot where the forelegs join the body. Clean the shoulders down closely, and trim the front legs so they appear straight, working mainly on their back line. Clean up the sides of the feet and between the toes.

From backline down over the ribs trim carefully, so as to blend into slightly longer and heavier growth on the underpart of ribs and chest, cleaning the underline of the chest to the natural body line. Trim out the loin region more closely than the chest, and make the loin's underline emphasize the tuck-up.

From the back to the middle of the thigh, the back legs should be trimmed fairly close, while from the middle of the thigh to the hock all shagginess should be removed. The backline of hocks must be trimmed straight, and the sides of the feet deprived of superfluous hairs. Then trim inside of hindlegs clean. The tail must be made devoid of shagginess, but do not trim down too closely. Take off stern hair evenly.

Trim skull quite close, but leave fairly heavy eyebrow, with more hair left on at the inside corner of the eyes than at the outside corner. Clean off the cheeks closely from just behind the eye to just behind the corner of the mouth. Muzzle and chin whiskers are not trimmed to any extent except to shorten and blend the hairs into the cleanly trimmed cheeks. And trim the underjaw from just behind the mouth's corner back into the neck. Make the ears clean inside and outside and straighten the ear edges with scissors.

Sealyham Terrier

Begin at the neck and trim from behind the ears down to the back, taking the hair off especially close at the withers. Trim the back level. Take off the hair quite close at front of neck, leaving it long, however, when working down toward the brisket. Like the Scottie, the Sealy is a low-to-ground built dog, so avoid any shortening that might detract from this appearance.

Front legs are not trimmed, the hair being combed smooth to enhance the straight look, and the superfluous hairs taken off the edges of the feet and between the toes. Blend the body hair from the finely trimmed back to a full coat on the under portion of the ribs, leaving a rather full contour as viewed from the front but not bulgy or shaggy.

Clean off the shaggy hairs from the thighs, and clean up the hindfeet like the forefeet, using scissors if necessary to round up the feet themselves.

Trim the tail fine and a bit pointed toward the head. Trim the stern close where the tail joins it, but work right into the long hairs, which give the naturally heavy, low-to-ground appearance.

Trim the skull quite clean but leave on most of the eyebrow. Trim the cheeks fine from outside corner of eyes to just behind the corner of the mouth, blending the long hairs of the whiskers into the cleaned off cheek. Take off the hair of the ears outside and inside, nipping the hairs from the edges with the scissors if necessary. The top of the muzzle must be neatened up by taking off just the shaggiest hairs. And leave chin whiskers on, but clean out the hair slightly from just behind the corner of the mouth back into the neck.

Scottish Terrier

Trim the neck and back evenly, with the back level but not too fine. Trim front of neck closely, but upon working down toward the brisket, leave the hairs long but not shaggy. Beware of shortening any hairs that might detract from the natural low-to-ground build. Trim the shoulders enough to blend the body into the forelegs in a clean, even line. Do not trim the forelegs but comb the hair so as to make them appear straight from front and side view. Take off superfluous hair from the feet and between the toes, and shape the foot round.

From the well trimmed backline, trim carefully down over the ribs to an absolutely full coat on the underpart of ribs and chest. When viewed from the front the body should not look bulged or shaggy, but at the same time not so much should be taken off as to detract from an appearance of breadth and substance.

Take off just enough from the thighs to prevent shagginess; trim back line of hock straight, and clean up the hind feet in the same manner as the forefeet. Trim the tail to a point, leaving it heavier at the base. Trim the stern fairly close where it joins the tail, but don't trim down too far, as the rear view of the dog should disclose a heavy, low-to-ground appearance.

Trim the skull very closely, leaving most of the eyebrow hair on, then clean off the cheeks from the outer corner of the eye to the corner of the mouth. The line from the inside corners of the eyes down to the corner of the mouth is taken off but slightly. The back and edges of the ears are trimmed fine, but the hair on the inside of the ears is left to blend into the skull. Trim between the eyebrows, parting the hair over the muzzle and combing this downward and forward. Leave chin whiskers on, but take off the hair on the under portion of the jaw from the mouth's corner back into the neck.

The Wire Foxterrier

The neck is trimmed closely and evenly down into the back, the back being made level and fine but not taken down as closely as the neck. The front section of the neck and the brisket are trimmed quite close, with just a trifle more hair left on down toward the spot where front legs and body join. The shouders must be very neat and trim, so the hair at that point must be taken off closely. The forelegs must look as straight as pipe-

stems—the line from the top of the shoulders down to the feet, and from the brisket down to the tip of the toes must be as straight as it can be made. Trim off the superfluous hair from the edges of the feet and between the toes, shaping the feet round.

Hair on the ribs should be shaped to follow body conformation. This means that the trimming must be adroitly done from the clean backline down over the ribs toward the underbody, where a fairly heavy coat is left on the under part of the chest, and beyond and beneath the ribs themselves. On the under part of the chest remove just enough hair to prevent shagginess, of course following the body line of the chest.

The hair in the region of the loin is taken off rather close, and the underline at this point on both sides cleared to enhance the natural tuck-up, sometimes designated as waist-line. Hair on the belly is made to follow the natural body line, but is not trimmed off too closely. The flanks must be nicely smoothed off, but at the same time a fairly heavy-coated thigh is desirable. Even up the hair from the middle of the thigh down toward the hock, but avoid taking off very much here. The backline of the hock down to the toes must be trimmed straight, then the superfluous hairs taken from the feet and between the toes, and the feet rounded. Trim the insides of the hindlegs down to the hock joint, so that when viewed from the rear a clean, even line is observed.

Now the stern and tail. Trim the stern very closely where it is joined by the tail, allowing it to be slightly heavier in its growth as it approaches the hind-legs. Trim the tail evenly, but not too close, to a tip toward the head.

Trim the skull down closely, leaving the eyebrows fairly heavy over the inner corner of the eyes but taking off all but a little of the eyebrows at the outer corners. Trim off the cheeks quite close from the outer corner of the eyes down to the corner of the mouth, trimming slightly from each eye's inner corner down toward the mouth. Now, trim to a straight line the top of the muzzle from between the eyebrows to the nose. Chin whiskers should be left on and brushed forward, but clean off that portion of the underjaw from the corners of the mouth back to the neck. The ears are taken down closely, inside and out, and their edges straightened.



THE Kerry Blue Terrier originated in Ireland having been first noticed in the mountainous regions of the County Kerry, hence the name. They had been pure bred in this section for many years. Gentle, lovable and extremely intelligent, he is an allround working and utility terrier, used in Ireland and England for hunting all manner of small game and birds. Excellent retrievers, from both land and water. Are used quite successfully for herding sheep and cattle and are without a peer as a watchdog and companion for children. The Kerry first came into the public eye when they were adopted as The National Dog of the Irish Republic. The Kerry is endowed with a remarkable nose and has an instinctive trailing ability. He retrieves equally as well from water as from land and is tireless on the trail of his quarry. He has remarkable endurance and will fight unto death when in combat. The Kerry is adaptable to all manner of farm work, especially in the capacities of the average shepherd dog. He is a willing worker, is easily trained and enters into the spirit of his environs and his work in a whole-hearted manner. Game to the utmost degree, faithful to an unbelievable end, he is the most alert of all terriers. He has an instinctive air of watchful waiting and is quick to discern right from wrong. He is an indomitable foe, to wrong doers, and cannot be beaten as a watch dog and companion. In some instances he has been used in England for police work. Owing to their high degree of intelligence they are most easily trained for all the utility purposes for which they are used.

Height—Dogs about 18 inches at the shoulder, bitches slightly less.

Weight-Dogs about 33 to 38 pounds. Bitches 32 to 36 pounds.



The Kerry Blue Terrier Club of Canada

THE Kerry Blue Terrier Club of Canada held a most successful Specialty Show on March 25th, with Mr. John Harding of Oriole, Ontario, as judge. The entry of thirty-three top quality dogs, of which the greater percentage were owned by members, has given the club much satisfaction. That the majority of the awards were won by members proves that a club can, by teamwork, improve the quality of their dogs.

At the Annual Meeting held on Wednesday, April 13th, the following officers were elected for the 1949-1950 season: President, George P. Davies; First Vice-President, W. R. D'Eath; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. A. R. Winters; Trophy Secretary, Mrs. Gladys Davies; Show Secretary, Mrs. W. R. D'Eath; Executive, Messrs. T. Black, A. Scott and K. Hertz.

The Forum

The Dog Tax and Live Stock Protection Act (revised Statues, Ontario 1937), Part 1, Section 5, provides that only the owner of a kennel of pure bred dogs registered in the register of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc. may obtain a kennel license. The term "registered in the register of the C.K.C. Inc." is interpreted in various ways by municipalities in Ontario. Some regard this section to mean that the owner of the kennel must be a member in good standing of the C.K.C. Other munici-palities insist that not only must the owner of the kennel be a member of the C.K.C. but his kennel name must also be registered by the C.K.C. In the City of Toronto a kennel owner cannot obtain a kennel license until he first obtains from the C.K.C. (and he must do this annually when he renews his kennel license each year) a certificate certifying that he is the registered owner of not less than three pure bred dogs whose names and registered numbers are stated on the certificate.

Since the constitution of the C.K.C. provides that a person cannot become a member nor remain a member if he engages in the breeding and/or buying and selling of other than pure bred dogs, it is obvious that a kennel license cannot be obtained by a person who, operating in a municipality where the kennel owner is required to be a member of the C.K.C. breeds, buys and sells other than pure bred dogs.

Under Section 3, Collection of Dog Tax it states: that a person who neglects to furnish a complete statement of all dogs owned or kennelled by him is liable to a penalty. All dogs kept in a kennel come under Section 2 (1) of Part I which states "In respect of every dog which he owns within the municipality or which is habitually kept upon the premises for which he is assessed although such dog may be owned by some other person."

While on the subject, may we once more draw attention to that part of the constitution which stresses that, "if a person represents a dog as a specimen of a breed recognized by the C.K.C., he will automatically be considered as having represented the dog as being one already registered in, or eligible for registration in, the C.K.C. Stud Book. In other words, if John Doe sells a dog as a Dalmatian, then he will by such act be deemed to have sold a dog that is registered in the C.K.C. Stud Book as a Dalmatian, or one that can be registered in the C.K.C. Stud Book as a Dalmatian. Do not jeopardize your status as a member of the Club by representing a dog as a specimen of a breed recognized by the C.K.C. if such dog is not eligible (or already registered) as a specimen of that breed."

Persons can materially assist the assessor in their community by reporting infractions of the law regarding the collection of dog tax.

... DOTS AND DASHES - - -

Thanks to the veterinarians of the Health of Animals Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, and those in private practice, Canada is free of serious animal diseases. Since 1868, this Division has been on watch and guard protecting the health of Canada's animals. But Canada can only be kept free of animal diseases—and particularly from invasion by disease from abroad—by constant vigilance by all in the interests of the whole livestock industry.

Members of the Canadian Kennel Club can assist greatly in this work by reporting any outbreak of disease which is not being controlled by proper supervision. Send a letter to the Health of Animals Division, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ontario, who will take care of it.

Rabies, also, has ben controlled, the only known cases in Canada being amongst the foxes and sled dogs. There have been no cases of rabies in England, outside of the quarantine kennels, for 27 years. In November 1948 there was the case of the Fox Terrier from India which was destroyed while in the quarantine kennels. The dog, however, did not show rabies until seven months after leaving India.

There were 6,949 cases of rabies in the United States, last year, yet strangely enough with the freedom of dogs crossing the thousands of miles of border between the two countries, there was no outbreak amongst Canadian dogs living at or near the border. All dogs coming to Canada from the United States must be inoculated with the serum against rabies and must carry a health certificate.

Miss Jean Grant has arrived back in Canada and has purchased a home in Richmond Hill, where a Kennel will be erected for the English importations she brought with her. Among them are a Pekingese, Labrador Retrievers and Wire haired fox Terriers. The rapid transit now available was evidenced when the Wire fox Terrier, Tully Trooper, arrived at Malton Airport early Tuesday morning, having left Dublin, Ireland, on Sunday afternoon. Tully Trooper is an Irish bred dog. It seems the Irish are breeding top specimens of all breeds, now.

The writer was privileged to attend the dinner of the Western New York Collie Club in Buffalo, recently, and was impressed with the magnificent work being done by this club for the novice. At their regular meetings, experienced Collie fanciers teach the young people how to care for their dogs and prepare them for the show ring. This is conducted like a school. The pupils pass examinations and, on graduation, receive diplomas from the club attesting to their qualifications. From these classes emanate future handlers for the Collie breed.

Indications are that the All Breed Shows held by the Ottawa and Hull Kennel Clubs on May 6, 7 and 8th will have a bumper entry from the United States. Several letters have reached this office from American fanciers stating that they had received an invitation from the Government Travel Bureau to see Canada while visiting the abovementioned Dog Shows. It is our belief that other show-giving clubs can avail themselves of this service. However, might we suggest that the clubs give

their names and addresses to be sent out with the Government circulars in order to avoid the delay occasioned in ascertaining where the dog shows are going to be held and to whom entries should be addressed.

Questions and Answers

Can a purebred dog be sold without a certificate of registration?

Answer: Yes. According to Chapter 20, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club which reads as follows:

"A pure-bred dog may be sold on the understanding that a certificate of registration will not be provided by the seller or otherwise obtained from the Canadian Kennel Club providing the seller and purchaser enter into such agreement at the time of sale and purchase and that such understanding is set forth in writing on forms made available by this Club at the time of sale and a copy of the agreement deposited with the recording office of the Club by the seller within thirty days of the sale of the dog. This agreement may be cancelled by mutual consent of the parties to the agreement. This agreement shall be binding on all parties to the agreement and any subsequent person, partnership or company which may purchase the dog while the agreement is in effect. Notification of a cancellation of such agreement must be made in writing and sent by all parties to the agreement to the recording office."

In "The Forum" in the April issue of DOGS IN CANADA it stated that "dogs not registered with the Canadian National Live Stock Records" etc. Is this correct?

Answer: No. It should have read "dogs not registered with The Canadian Kennel Club". The Live Stock Records process our registration papers, but purebred dogs in Canada are registered by The Canadian Kennel Club.

What is the difference between the requirements of the eligibility for championship status in Canada and the American requirements published in "The Forum" of your April issue?

Answer: The Canadian Kennel Club rule is different in this respect, and we quote from Section 7 of Chapter 21—

"(a) In order for a dog to be recognized as champion it must: (a)

Earn at least ten championship points under at least three different judges; and (b) Be registered in The Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book; and (c) Defeat at least one dog in its own breed or be placed in its group. Only when these requirements have been met may a dog be recognized as a Champion and its owner at the time of the dog completing its championship be provided with a championship certificate."



Through the Looking Glass

"Possibly if everyone with whom this fancier talked would ask: "Can you prove that?" the scandal-monger would grow so discouraged that he would cease his huckstering of unsavory tales. But the pity of it is that there are willing listeners as well as plausible talkers, and these take up the tales which become an endless chain of unsupported evidence against some poor, unoffending mortal.

"But more serious even than this is the harm done by the mud slinger to the breed he represents. To greater extent than our acts are we judged by our attitude, and an attitude of tolerance and good will toward the other fellow, whoever he may be, reflects the light of dignity and poise directly back upon us. As each one of us represents a breed, then does it not follow as a natural consequence that our dog is harmed or benefited by our conduct. Can we afford, with this in mind, to do or to say anything that will militate against his interests! We cannot, for we represent our breed to the public.

"This fact we might do well to keep in mind whenever we walk abroad, whether our steps lead into the show room, into the competitive ring, or along the highways of the world, is that the chief reason for our affiliation with this game is love of a dog, a breed. Our club has signed up to promote its interests, and as members we are obligated to help carry out the precepts of our club. Whether we are in the game for profit, for sport, or for recreation, the same truth holds—that the foundation stone upon which the game is built is the promotion of a breed whose interests must come first.



"And so, when the dress parade is over, let us ask ourselves each night as we look in the glass: "Have I done anything today that has harmed my breed? Have I, perhaps, done something to serve it? Have I carried tales: have I offended? Have I failed to give a hand to someone who has needed my assistance? Have I betrayed my dog, or have I been loyal to him and all that he represents?"

Having read this, let us remember when next we go to a dog show, that a little tolerance on our part will make the task much easier for the officials of the show-giving club. Judging dogs is not as simple and easy as it appears. It is hard work, mentally and physically. Have you ever judged a large entry of small dogs such as Cocker Spaniels? Stooping over dog after dog, conscientiously examining each one with a cheery word for each exhibitor, one could be forgiven if after it is all over, the judge longs to retire for a rest. However, he must stay, and if necessary, explain his placings to all who may ask, at the same time maintaining a cheerful attitude. A kind word and a smile from the exhibitor as he leaves the ring will do much to make the judge feel that his work has been worth while, and a letter of encouragement to the show-giving club officials thanking them for giving you the opportunity to exhibit your dog will do much to promote goodwill all around.

MEETINGS

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors will be held on the third Wednesday of each month.

1275. The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, on March 16th, 1949. commencing at 5.00 p.m. The President, W. J. Risewick, presided. Officers and Directors present included Walter Brown, Paddy Boughs, George P. Davies, Douglas Riedel, A. Roberts and J. Thorndike Jr.

1276 (1254). "DOGS IN CANADA"

REPORT: The President reported that the Editor had requested an opportunity to appear before the Board to clarify several points regarding the magazine.

DISCUSSION: Mrs. McColl entered the meeting and then referred to the following matters:

1. PROVINCIAL CORRESPONDENTS: The minutes of the meeting of the Board held February 11th (item No. 1252) indicated that the selection of provincial correspondents rested with the provincial Directors, yet she had been given to understand that the Editor would appoint such correspondents.

The President stated that the Editor, being in complete charge of the publication, had the right to make her own appointments without reference to the Directors. The Board endorsed the President's reply to the Editor's question.

2. NEWSSTAND DISTRIBUTION: The Editor referred to the Board's suggestion regarding the printing of an extra 500 coples monthly for distribution on selected newsstands, and asked whether the number of extra copies could be increased or lowered at the Editor's discretion.

The President stated that the Editor was at liberty to vary the figure according to her own wishes. The Board endorsed the President's reply to the Editor's question.

3. LISTS OF BREEDS: The Editor asked whether the policy of distributing free copies of the magazine to those requesting lists of breeders was to be continued or could she refer such enquiries to newsstands where the magazine is sold.

The President suggested that henceforth such enquiries should be referred to the Editor and it would be up to the Editor to decide whether copies are to be provided without charge, or other arrangements made in that regard.

4. DICTAPHONE EQUIPMENT: The Editor asked whether or not the Board would authorize the purchase of a mail-o-voice machine for dictation purposes.

The President stated that the Editor, being in complete charge of the publication and all arrangements regarding its publication, should decide whether or not she required such equipment and be governed accordingly.

The Editor then left the meeting.

DISCUSSION: The Secretary referred to the Board's decision regarding monthly statements of revenue and expenditures, and asked for an instruction regarding the allowance, out of membership fees, for magazines distributed to members.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to allocate \$1.00 per member to the magazine, and to also allow as a credit to the magazine such charges as are made by the printer for author's corrections and unused material set in type.

1277 (1228). MINUTES

SUBJECT: The Secretary tabled the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors held on January 24th (completed February 3rd), February 9th and February 11th, 1949, copies of which had been sent to each member of the Board.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors held on January 24th, February 9th and February 11th, 1949, be adopted." Motion carried.

SUBJECT: Director Riedel referred to the resolution adopted on February 9th (Item No. 1232) empowering the Secretary to grant show dates, and suggested that in order to eliminate possible criticism of the Secretary, all applications for shows of more than one day's duration should be referred to the Board for decision.

ACTION: Director Riedel's suggestion was endorsed and the Secretary was directed to refer such applications to the Board for consideration.

1278 (1271). IDENTIFICATION

REPORT: The President reported that in accordance with the wishes of the members, as indicated at the annual general meeting held on February 10th, and the Board of Directors as indicated at its meeting held on February 11th, representatives of the Club had met with officials of the Department of Agriculture with a view to eliminating difficulties being experienced by breeders in obtaining certificates of registration.

The President then read his written report which reviewed all details and developments up to and including the recent annual meetings, and continued as follows:

"The Board having named Mr. William H. Pym of Vancouver as a member of the Committee to meet with officials of the Department, the writer immediately contacted Mr. Pym by telegraph and asked when he would be in Toronto either on his way to or between his judging engagements in the eastern United States. Mr. Pym reached Toronto on February 25th and we immediately made arrangements to meet with officials of the Department of Agriculture and that meeting materialized on March 2nd. At that time we were privileged to meet the new Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Mr. J. G. Taggert, the conference being attended also by Mr. R. S. Hamer, Director of Production Services in the Live Stock and Poultry Division of the Department of Agriculture, Mr. A. P. MacVannel and Mr. A. T. Steele together with Mr. Pym, the Secretary-Treasurer and myself.

During the course of the conference your representatives brought the following points to the attention of the Deputy Minister and his colleagues:

1. The withholding of Departmental approval on certificates of registration prepared by the Canadian National Live Stock Records had been without any prior notice direct to the Canadian Kennel Club;

2. To date officials and members of the Club had been unable to obtain a clear picture of the Department's wishes in respect

dian Kennel Club;

2. To date officials and members of the Club had been unable to obtain a clear picture of the Department's wishes in respect to identification;

3. There appeared to be no consistency in determining what certificates of registration would be issued or would not be issued (several examples of certificates issued for solid coloured dogs were referred to as well as examples of applications for registration of solid coloured dogs returned to breeders);

4. Members of the Club and many other breeders had been caused considerable inconvenience and embarrassment by being unable to promptly deliver certificates of registration to purchasers of dogs who, experiencing long delays in receiving certificates, were concluding that such sellers of dogs were not fulfilling their proper obligations in respect to the delivery of certificates.

5. That these developments were discouraging the breeding

certificates.

5. That these developments were discouraging the breeding and sale of pure-bred dogs;

6. The inevitable loss of revenue to the Canadian Kennel Club through withholding of certificates of registration would most definitely hurt the financial position of the Club, particularly when it is trying to overcome the substantial financial deficit realized on its 1948 operations;

7. That regardless of any means of identification practised by breeders, the accuracy of live stock records depended largely on the honesty and integrity of the breeders.

The discussions revealed that in the opinion of the Department, identification means the ability to match a certificate of registration with the particular animal for which it was issued. It seems that the Department considers that the requirements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, which calls for "a practical and effective system of identification", have precedence over the provisions of the Club's Constitution regarding identification.

the provisions of the Club's Constitution regarding identification.

The Deputy Minister made it quite clear that the Department had no desire to inconvenience breeders and sellers of pure-breed dogs, and it was finally agreed that providing breeders accurately described the colour or colours of dogs, certificates would be issued and that in the meantime the Club would undertake to educate breeders generally as to what the Department means when it refers to identification.

In my message to the Board, which was published in the March issue of DOGS IN CANADA, I gave two specific examples of how Collies and Boston Terriers could be better described so that certificates of registration could be issued. For example the following Collie would have been registered, in the past, as "black, white and tan". You will now note that the dog is described as follows, "Black, white collar, breast, front paws, tan on part of face".

Again we would furnish an example of the following Collie which in the past would have been described as black, white and tan. In order to register this dog the breeder described it as follows, "Black, white on right side of collar and lower part of front feet, tan above knees and on cheeks".

As a result of our conversations with officials of the Department, and on behalf of the Committee I would recommend as follows:

1. Breeders of solid coloured dogs be asked to forward their applications for registration as they have in the past.

2. Breeders of dogs having more than one colour should clearly indicate the location of the subsidiary colours, such as I have indicated in the examples of registered Collies referred

3. The Club should undertake to publish a booklet furnishing detailed information to all members and others interested concerning identification of animals, the necessity for keeping private breeding records, and information regarding memberships, registrations, and so on. This educational programme to continue indefinitely so that newcomers in the game can be thoroughly acquainted with what is expected of them by the Department and the Club.

I cannot conclude this report without paying tribute to Mr. R. S. Hamer, Director of Production Services, for the courtesy and consideration shown your representatives, particularly when it is realized that we saw Mr. Taggart on his first day in office as Deputy Minister of Agriculture while the House was in session. This, I consider an indication of Mr. Taggart's interest in our problems, and his desire to co-operate with us in seeing that our affairs are properly conducted so that progress may prevail."

The latter stated that the request for a two-day show was made because of the anticipated large entry and the desirability of completing judging at an hour satisfactory to all concerned.

The Secretary reported that the Toronto Kennel Club had made application for permission to hold a single championship show on September 2nd and 3rd in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition.

DISCUSSION: In discussing these applications the Board agreed that the members in amending Section 8 Chapter 3 of the Dog Show Rules, had intended that the Board would exercise its powers to grant applications for shows of more than one day's duration for individual show giving clubs, even if such clubs intended holding their shows in conjunction with Class "A" fairs or exhibitions.

ACTION: The Secretary wa

on August 16th and 17th, and the South Okanagan Kennel Club wished to hold championship shows at Penticton, B.C., on August 19th and 20th. DISCUSSION: The Board discussed a resolution, adopted

DISCUSSION: The Board discussed a resolution, adopted some years ago, regarding the protection afforded shows held by the Pacific National Exhibition Association by requiring that other shows be not held within a thirty day period immediately prior to the Exhibition shows. The Board agreed that this resolution was not binding on the present Board, and in view of the greater number of shows now being held, it could not subscribe to a continuation of this policy without considering the application of this policy to other shows.

ACTION: The Board directed the Secretary to approve of the applications provided they conform to the Dog Show Rules. SUBJECT: The Board reviewed correspondence received regarding the applications of the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association for permission to hold championship shows on May 27th and 28th. The President reported on an exchange of telegrams between himself and the President of the Victoria Lions Club which indicated that the Lions Club was prepared to run its own shows on May 27th and 28th in order that charitable purposes, sponsored by the Lions Club, could benefit from these activities.

ACTION: The Board agreed that it was not prepared to alter the decision.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that he had found it necessary to consider the appointment of replacements on the staff but had, at the President's direction, deferred action so that the matter could be discussed at this meeting of the Board.

DISCUSSION: The President recommended that the practice, in force for some years, of concentrating all responsibility for all phases (except the magazine) of the office's operations in the Secretary's hands should be replaced by a system of assigning work and responsibility for that work to various members of the staff, thus leaving the Secretary in a better position to handle the work requiring the attention of a more responsible member of the staff. He suggested that if the Board maintained its present policy in respect to the C.K.C. Representative, it might well consider the possibility of setting up a dog show department under the Representative's jurisdiction to handle all the correspondence and office work involved in connection with shows.

ACTION: The matter was left in the hands of the President and Secretary to make arrangements for the most efficient organization of the staff, its duties and responsibilities.

NOTICE

As a result of difficulties being experienced by members, since early December, 1948, in obtaining certificates of registration for dogs, a delegation from The Canadian Kennel Club met with officials of the Department of Agriculture on March 2nd. The discussion with Departmental officials revealed that, in the opinion of the Department of Agriculture, identification means the ability to match a certificate of registration with the particular animal for which it was issued. It seems that the Department considers that the requirements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, which calls for "a practical and effective system of identification", have precedence over the provisions of the Club's Constitution regarding identification.

There is now being prepared a booklet which is intended to provide members and non-members of the Club with much useful information in respect to membership, registration, private breeding records, identification of dogs, etc., but in the meantime we are taking this opportunity of indicating to those registering dogs what they should do when completing that section of the application for registration calling for the colour or colours of the dog for which registration is desired.

SOLID COLOURED DOGS

If a dog is solid colour then the application should indicate that fact. For example if a dog is solid black and has no markings, then the application should state "solid black". The same applies to any other solid coloured dog.

DOGS OF MORE THAN ONE COLOUR

In the past it has been sufficient to state the colours of a parti-coloured dog without indicating the location of the colours. For example a sable and white Collie would, in the past, be registered as "sable and white". It is now, however, necessary for the location of the markings to be clearly indicated on the application for registration form. The following examples will furnish an indication of what is now required for registration purposes:

- 1. "Sable, white color, white on chest, muzzle, front legs and tail tip, black spot on tail" (Collie);
- 2. "Black, tan on lower jaw and over eyes, white ruff, throat, chest and feet shading into tan" (Collie);
- 3. "Seal brindle, white blaze, muzzle, collar, chest, front toes and extending over left eye and ear" (Boston Terrier).

It is suggested that the application for registration form clearly set out any features which would establish positive identification.


