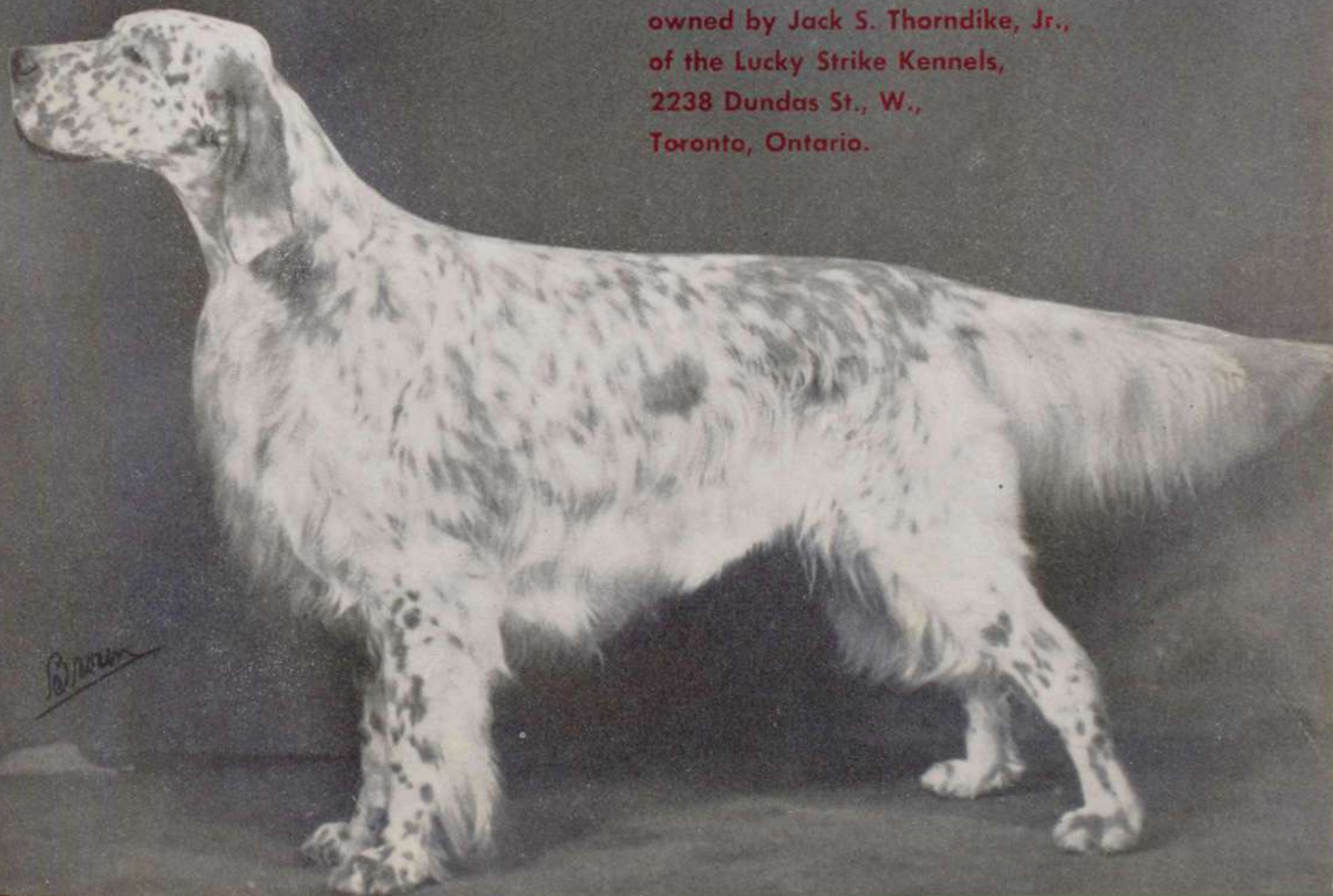

He is a son of the illustrious Best in Show winner Champion Sir Guy of Delwed and is a triple great grandson of the famous Rummey Stagboro. Amongst his many winning progeny is his group winning daughter, Champion Nancy Girl. He now shares top honours in his owner's Kennels with the recent importation, American Champion Prunes Own Blue Moon, who finished his American Championship just six days after being purchased by Mr. Thorndike.

A Gamble That Paid Off

THE Alberta Kennel Club (Registered), of Calgary, has been in existence since the year 1905 and has held 50 Championship shows, besides a few Sanction and Specialty shows, with varying degrees of success, but of the first 48 of these none could fairly have been called outstanding. They were the usual run of small-town shows, with mediocre prizes. Good shows from the viewpoint of local exhibitors, but not quite the kind of shows that experienced professional handlers would be liable to remember a week later. For several years, one of the Club's members had been repeatedly harping on the other members at the monthly meetings to get together and put on a REAL show. To put it on "American-style" with a generous scale of CASH prizes for ANY dog of ANY breed in ANY of the "official" classes, which placed 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or better. He suggested that \$100.00 be offered (on each day of a two-day show) for B.I.S., \$50.00 each day for Best Canadian-bred, another \$50.00 for Best Canadian-bred Puppy in Show, \$10.00 for 1st in each of the 6 groups, \$7.00 for Best of Breed—if at least 4 dogs of same breed were met and defeated on the way up to the group, \$4.00 where only 2 or 3 were met and only \$2.00 where no other entry of the same breed were met. For Best of Winners he suggested \$4.00, and for Winners of either sex \$3.00 where other entries had been defeated and \$1.50 if no others met. In the Classes he suggested \$4.00 for First in a Class of 3 or more, \$2.00 in a Class of 2, and only \$1.00 where no other entry competes. \$5.00 for Best Brace, \$10.00 for largest "Exhibitor-owned" entry and another \$10.00 for the largest "handler-entry."

This sounded too enthusiastic for most of the members, and the suggestion was repeatedly "Tabled".

However, with the election of the 1949 Executive, this member's voice was again heard, and in February the executive invited him to attend one of their meetings, and detail his proposals, with special attention to the question "Where is the money coming from?"

He attended and detailed his proposals, and suggested four means of raising the necessary funds. They were: (1) Entry and listing fees; (2) Members to donate puppies to be auctioned off and funds used for prize-money; (3) Advance sale of admission tickets with a couple of really well-bred puppies being offered as door prizes; (4) Donations from local merchants, business and professional men, and other interested persons. He estimated this would attract entries of 35 breeds, and that it would require \$1,000.00 each day to pay the prizes. Added to this \$2,000.00 would, of course,

be the usual expenses attendant on any show, such as \$200.00 each day for a judge, \$100.00 for a show-building, \$175.00 or so for show-ribbons, wages for day-men and night-men, money for straw, shavings, wire, nails, paper, etc. Money for advertising, entertainment of visiting exhibitors, presentation bouquets, etc., etc.—ad infinitum.

The proposals staggered even the executive members, but this member stated HE would collect from the merchants and professional men sufficient funds to cover all costs not covered by the other suggested sources of revenue. Furthermore, he offered to pay the cost of the printing of the tickets, and to take over the production of the show catalogue on a pay-all take-all basis, and to supply 500 premium lists for \$20.00 though a well-known local printer had quoted \$35.00 and tax for the same job. He also agreed to supply two pure-bred cocker pups of excellent pedigree, free of charge to be offered on the admission tickets, if the Club would give a third puppy, for which they were to pay him \$25.00, as a prize on the show catalogues. Then he pointed out the former "drabness" of the building in which the shows were always held, and asked for an appropriation of \$25.00 with which to dress up the ring. Where the Club had been paying about \$1.00 per bale for 10 or 12 bales of straw, he offered and got a ton and a half for \$10.00.

Taking a second look over the various proposals the 8-person executive voted 7 to 1 to call his bluff, and it was finally voted to allow him to proceed, and to give him a small "expense commission" on all monies raised through his personal efforts.

He contacted no less than 323 different donors—successfully—who gave from \$1.00 to \$50.00 each, with the all over average being about \$5.00 per donor. Those Club members who have ever attempted one of these donation-seeking canvasses probably know how many separate calls, and call-backs, this involved. NOBODY approached was "high-pressured." Those who signified they were not interested, were courteously thanked—and passed up. Another member had, last year, received a promise from a local business man of a \$200.00 donation to be used as \$100.00 Best in Show prize each day. This left our promoter with at least \$1,800.00 to raise. From donations, alone, he turned in to the Club, before show-date, over \$1,200.00 in cash and cheques, nett, and free of commissions.

On the tickets he (personally) offered to the sellers the following prizes: A good pure-bred cocker pup to the seller of the winning ticket. To school children outside of Calgary an outfit of soft-ball equipment valued at \$52.00,

to in-city children a cash prize, and to the Club-member selling the most tickets another cash prize. To the holder of the lucky ticket he offered another good pup.

Besides the cash donations he collected a couple of nice trophies, \$30.00 worth of bouquets and corsages, for use at the show, from local florists, 696 bottles of soft-drinks from local bottlers, toward the entertainment of the out-of-town guests. When the entries came in it was found that 257 dogs were entered, with fees running to over \$1,050.00. Average ticket-sales (before show-date) brought in over \$200.00 nett, and free of commission, to the Club. Many more out-of-town tickets rolled in at the last minute (as usual), and actual door-sales of tickets amounted to over \$220.00 nett. Total (nett) receipts from ticket-sales were over \$500.00 nett.

From the City Council he obtained a donation of \$50.00 toward the entertainment of the exhibitors. We forgot to mention that this fellow also took on the job of Show Superintendent. This gave him the following minor items to look after in a 60-day period. Get necessary donations. Sell necessary tickets. Produce and sell catalogue. Line up necessary preparations for the show itself. Superintend the show. Clear up the debris after the show. We forgot also to mention that this fellow runs a large kennel on the outskirts of the city, and during this 60-day period had about 60 dogs to feed and attend daily (in his spare time). Luckily he had back of him a VERY efficient and co-operative Club secretary-treasurer, in the person of Vernon Hyde. This gentleman, like all good treasurers, kept a wary eye of the financial barometer, and had a few shaky moments at one time, when he decided to analyze the entries, and to discover that it would take \$2,375.00 to pay off the prizes, instead of the estimated \$2,000.00. However, by show-date the same barometer had swung around to "set-fair" and he was again able to breathe more freely.

Another indefatigable worker before, throughout every minute of and after the show, was J. C. Anderson. This gentleman had been appointed Chairman of the show-preparations committee, and what a swell, bang-up, one-man job he made of it! Three o'clock in the morning of show-day found him still in the ring putting on the final finishing touches to the ring decorations, and tacking up stall-cards. The show superintendent had arranged beforehand with a prominent local cartage firm to have a large closed moving van at the station to meet dogs coming from the just concluded Edmonton show. Thirty-one dogs went down from the first train, and the van

enjoyed himself thoroughly at a recent show when he rode the Great Dane, Champion Fingard's Duchess II. It is quite noticeable that "Duchess" is in great working condition. She has won seven Working Groups in Canada and several awards in the United States.

returned to meet later arrivals. Local dairies had donated to our "collector" cans of milk, a produce firm had donated cases of bloodspot eggs, a dog-food producer had donated 100 pounds of freshly-ground hamburger containing carrots, eggs, meal, wheat-germ oil, etc. Hotel reservations had been made for the exhibitors who had requested them. Incidentally the bulk of the entries arrived one full day before the beginning of the show. Four o'clock in the morning of show-date found J. C. Anderson and our superintendent still in the ring. Six o'clock found our superintendent two miles north of town tending his own kennels. Eight o'clock found him—in his old kennel-clothes—helping exhibitors to bench their dogs. By noon he was able to slip home, shave and change to be back at 1.30 for the afternoon show. Just to show that "REAL troupers" DO exist in the dog game, we cite the case of one lady Club-member (who we believe would rather her name were not published) and who has repeatedly made a wonderful job of handling door ticket-sales, had attended the funeral of her aged father on Tuesday afternoon. In addition to ticket-sales she was in charge of preparations for the exhibitors'-entertainment party. Did she throw up her responsibilities?—She

did NOT! THAT was Tuesday—came 6 p.m. Wednesday and her husband lay on the operating table in a local hospital undergoing an operation for acute appendicitis. Did THIS stop her! —It did NOT! She was still in there battling 100%. THAT is the kind of people it takes to MAKE a dog-show. Just as in the theatre—"The Show Must Go On," and people like this good lady see that it does.

Judge for the first day was Mr. Max Bell of Millgrove, Ontario, and a very painstaking job he made of it, but he had a lot of dogs to go over, and as usual at most dog shows, exhibitors persisted in being slow in bringing in their entries. For B.I.S. he settled on a local entry, a very fine Wire-hair Terrier Malabar's Gunner. A study of the pictures of Calgary's shows in this issue will disclose our friend Jack making such a fast reach for that one-hundred-dollar bill that he blurred the fast lens of a professional photographer! Best Canadian-bred went to the same dog. Best Canadian-bred Puppy went to Mrs. Clyde Ritchie's beautiful Borzoi, Pat-Mer's Czar of Wyndhaven.

1st Sporting to a Red Setter Am. Ch. End o' Maine Billboard, ably handled in the ring by a local Club-member Miss Davina Johnson, and

owned by Snake River Kennels of Boise, Idaho.

1st in Sporting Hounds Group went to a Beagle, Am. Ch. Colton's Coldstream, with Mrs. Clyde Ritchie's Borzoi puppy placing 2nd.

1st in Working Group went to the Boxer Monarch's Ego of Garkonti, owned by Valley Grove Kennels, Tarzana, California, handled by Bob Wilson.

1st in Terrier Group of course went to the B.I.S. winner, Malabar Gunner, expertly handled by his proud owner. This dog had gone B.I.S. at Edmonton a couple of days earlier.

1st in Toy Group went to a local breeder Bobbie Thomson, who handled his entry Cairnside Golden Mite to a fine win. M. J. & Mrs. Gagan's Pomeranian handled by Pat Randall placed 2nd, with Harold R. Burdick's Toy Poodle, Jacobs Le Mondes Buster, handled by Mrs. Bob Wilson in 3rd spot and a Yorkie, Ch. Twinkletoes of Yorktown (also owned by Bobbie Thomson) but handled by Vic. W. Williams, placing 4th.

1st in Non-Sporting fell to a Boston, Am. Ch. Personality's I'm The Emperor, owned by Mr. C. G. Biggar of Winnipeg, and handled by Bobbie Thomson.

Mr. & Mrs. Floyd B. Masser's Chow-Chow, R-B's Chi Yan of Wencha placed 2nd.

During the first day's show a pleasing interlude was the presentation by the show superintendent to Dr. J. Gordon Anderson, a local veterinarian, of a 3-piece Skywriter pen and pencil set by Sheaffer. The names of all merchants and professional men and others who had donated toward the prize-list had been made into the form of a draw, and The Animal Clinic, of which Dr. Anderson is a partner, had been the lucky winner of this small token of appreciation.

Highlights of the evening were the "Official Opening" of the show by Mr. Maynard J. Davies (the gentleman who had donated the two \$100.00 B.I.S. prizes, together with another \$50.00 toward other prizes) and the presentation of the B.I.S. award to Jack Brooks, by Mrs. Maynard J. Davies. Club President W. W. Pratt presented Mrs. Davies with a large bouquet of roses in appreciation.

All hands, exhibitors and members, then adjourned to a party held in the upper floor of the Administration Building of The Calgary Exhibition & Stampede, which is near the show building. Under the able direction of Mrs. Margaret Fawcett, the tables were tastefully decorated with flowers and weighted down with an ample supply of food and drink. "Group Judging" was engaged in—that is to say the gang broke up into groups, and discussed their wins and losses, as is done after EVERY show. The usual bouquets and brickbats were flung around, though we are glad to report that in this case the former seemed more plentiful, which is a tribute to an excellent performance by the judge. It was well after midnight when the gang broke it up and went off in search of sleep.

Friday morning found the decks all cleared for action again, a new judge on the bench and the entries coming in a bit more promptly than the previous day. A remarkably smooth, precision-like, but nevertheless thorough job of going over each entry was made by Mr. W. H. Pym of Vancouver. He appeared to place them exactly as HE saw them, with no regard as to where the chips might fall. In general the same dogs were in the top slots as during the previous day, but not always in the same order.

Top honours at day's end went to the fine boxer, Monarch's Ego of Garkonti in the able hands of Bob Wilson, with Mrs. Grant Mahood's Boxer Ch. Mazelaine's Minstrel Boy taking Best Canadian-bred. Best Canadian-bred Puppy was won by Matlock Foxavon Classic, a Smooth Wire owned by Vic Williams, who handled him personally. The six Groups were won by an Irish Setter in the hands of Vic Williams, a Borzoi in the same hands, a Boxer in the hands of Bob Wilson, a Scottie, owner-handled by George Shillinglaw, a Pomeranian handled by Pat Randall and a Keeshonden handled by Mrs. Alice Toole topping Group VI. (More detailed description of the various wins

can be gleaned from the Group pictures.) The Parade of Champions was led by a local breeder Miss A. E. Beggs who, with three assistants led four Scottish Terrier Champions. The Schipperke breed put 5 Champions into the ring, 4 being owned by Mr. & Mrs. D. L. Lonsberry of Lethbridge, the 5th by a local breeder, Mrs. Marion Morris. In the Scottie breed there were also 5 in the parade, the 5th being owned and led by George Shillinglaw of New Westminster, B.C. A Dane by Lt.-Col. & Mrs. J. de B. Cowan of Kaslo, B.C., a Black Lab by Maynard J. Davies, an English Bulldog by Miss M. E. Brown, and a Saint owned and led by A. Hoving of Calgary rounded out the parade. If the writer has missed mention of any others who were in this parade, apologies are hereby offered.

Another pleasing highlight of the day, which may give some indication of the opinion (of the facilities and arrangements at this show) of the out-of-town exhibitors, was the kind presentation to the Show Superintendent, by C.K.C. First Vice-President Vic W. Williams of Vancouver (himself an exhibitor) of a very beautiful and useful Ronson Mastercase cigarette-lighter and case combined, together with a list of names of the donors and an order to have the case suitably engraved. In presenting this Mr. Williams spoke in very glowing terms of the all-round excellence of these two shows, and very kindly stated that in his 25 years' experience this was the best set-up he had ever seen in Western Canada, and one of the best in all Canada. This spontaneous gesture on the part of the out-of-town exhibitors came as a complete surprise to the recipient—who had been a little too busy to smell a rat—but he replied in a few words, expressing his very heartfelt gratitude for the honor thus bestowed on him.

Another interlude well received by all present, was the presentation of a complete softball outfit to a 13 year old country boy who had sold the most advance sale admission tickets outside of Calgary. This was made, together with a suitable speech, by Mr. Al. Compton, proprietor of "The Sportsman"—Calgary's leading Sporting Goods store, from whom the Show Super had purchased the set of equipment.

Drawing of the "Lucky Ticket" for the puppies was made by a 2 year old boy, Paddy Joe O'Brien, who was dumped right into the big box containing the stubs, and told to hand out ONE ticket—just ONE! The Show Supt. was terribly afraid the youngster MIGHT come to the top with a double handful, but he didn't. He just handed out ONE. This wee lad was attired in a complete cowboy outfit, even to the cartridge belt and pair of six-guns. He was decorated with the Show Superintendent's badge and given the Freedom of the Show, and attracted much favourable comment.

Mrs. Mary D. Gardner, prominent Edmonton breeder of Sealyhams, untiring worker for the Edmonton shows for

many years, and herself a past Best in Show winner at Calgary, flew down from Edmonton to officially open the Golden Jubilee Show. She also spoke in very glowing terms of her opinion of all she had seen and heard. Mr. W. W. Pratt, Club President, presented Mrs. Gardner with a bouquet of Golden roses, tied with flame-gold wide ribbon, and with a china replica of a Sealyham, Mrs. Gardner's favourite breed.

Best in Show award was made by Mrs. W. W. Pratt, wife of the Club President, and a bouquet of roses was presented to Mrs. Pratt by Mr. J. S. Sasseville, 1st Vice-President. On both days, every lady assisting at the shows was presented with a corsage of Golden roses, and on the second evening each lady was presented with a large box of Page & Shaw chocolates, each box being topped by a large orchid, as a token of thanks for their very excellent services toward the success of the show.

During the afternoon a number of names were called out and their owners asked to come into the ring. These were the "Old-timers" of the Club, Charter-members some of them, with Membership in the Calgary Club dating back forty years and more. Grouped in the ring, this group was "shot" by the official photographer, Mr. Albert Tigerstedt, a local photographer who served in the Royal Canadian Navy as a photographer during the recent war. To this gentleman and his wife must be attributed the excellence of the very interesting pictures of these two shows which accompany this article.

As usual at most shows, hardest worked of all officials was the Club's Secretary-Treasurer who, like ALL dog-show secretaries, burned much of the midnight oil. Next probably came J. C. (Jack) Anderson, ever-genial and unruffled Chairman of the Preparations Committee. Jack seemed to have been determined to be first man ON the job, and last man OFF the job, and to be on the job all the way in between.

One of our oldest members Mrs. Dave Johnson had the arduous job of dishing out the folding money to the happy winners (though it was remarkable to note that, on the second evening the Show Supt. was STILL pleading with first-day winners to step up to the teller's cage and collect their previous day's winnings! (Guess they thought the Club was still quite solvent, and didn't worry!)

A regular "Teller's Cage", lent by the Bank of Montreal, was set up in the ring, and from this the money was paid out in cash, accompanied by a "Souvenir" cheque which the exhibitor could take home with him, and on which was inscribed the amount won and the nature of the win concerned.

The Judge's book was in the very expert hands of Mr. Bill Forrest, another of the old-timers, himself a judge, and fully conversant with procedure.

into Judge's Steward, and a fine job he made of that too!—on BOTH days!

Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Ross as usual took charge of the arm-band business. As they say—"Just TRY to give it to anyone else!" Mrs. Jack Sasseville was on the public address system, calling the entries to the ring, and marking the catalogue.

Mrs. Isabel Foster assisted in writing out the pay-cheques, Mrs. Margaret Fawcett with two lady assistants had charge of ticket sales at the door, while Mrs. Fawcett also had the added job of preparing for the entertainment-of-exhibitors party. The Show Catalogue—probably the finest ever put out in Western Canada—was published by The Cooke Printing Company of Calgary, and was on fine quality book paper with royal blue ink and with a solid gold cover printed in red and blue, the inside covers and fore-pages also being done in two colours. This job ran into exactly 100 pages and cover, with four pages being in two colours. It sold for 50c and a \$35.00 puppy was given away as a catalogue prize. It required three full pages, double-column, to list the "Donors To Prize-List" alone. The young and attractive lady selling the catalogues was smartly dressed and wore a multicoloured sash with rosette of show-ribbons, and a jewel-studded gold coronet. Another touch that lent colour to the ring was the presence of the Page-Boy in full red uniform who can be noted in several of the pictures. He was the boy who had sold the most in-town tickets. Beside him, in the second-day pictures can be seen the boy who won the out-of-town prize, and who was the guest of the Show Superintendent. The beautiful and colourful background of flags, centred by a 24-foot Canadian Ensign and flanked by Jacks and Ensigns were very kindly provided by The Hudson's Bay Company. The glass show-case centered on the big ensign housed the give-away puppies, and was surmounted by a coloured cut out of Walt Disney's Three Little Pigs. All backgrounds seen in any of the pictures were made by the show Supt., his wife and daughter. The shiny gold cream-can seen immediately below the teller's window contained disinfectant, and even the garbage cans were painted solid gold. The large column-like pillars which may be seen in some of the photos were 12 foot metal culverts, two feet in diameter, wrapped in gold and purple crepe. With the exception of the flags, the whole colour scheme was in gold and royal purple.

Doctor Ballard's Animal Food Products, known from coast to coast, fed the show, and provided entry forms and stationery and armbands and stall-cards.

In all 257 dogs were benched, and, apart from trophies, \$2,203.00 was paid out in cash prizes.

All the foregoing is an indication of just what CAN be accomplished when the members of a Kennel Club put their shoulders to the wheel, and give a determined shove.

NO! The Alberta Kennel Club DIDN'T lose any money on the whole thing—but they DID win a host of admiring supporters from coast to coast and south of the border. Long ago the U.S.A. dog show promoters found out that it takes the CASH PRIZES to bring in the entries. Eastern Canada is beginning to awake to that fact, and it is about time that the West found it out also. Let's have MORE shows like these two put on by the Calgary fanciers. They have proven IT CAN BE DONE!

Specialty Clubs

WHAT are the Specialty Clubs of Canada doing? I cannot answer this question and I doubt that you can, but you can compare your club with what is going on in the City of Winnipeg, where they have one of the most active and smoothly run clubs with which the writer has had the privilege of being associated.

In January of this year, the Cocker Spaniel Specialty Club of Western Canada was revamped and an entirely new slate of officers elected, with Mr. W. J. Monaghan as President and Mrs. P. Crombie the Secretary-Treasurer. Besides a new slate of officers, this Club instituted rather an efficient way of conducting their affairs. In this case the Executive members meet monthly to transact business and the minutes of these meetings are then submitted for discussion, approval or disapproval, to the full membership of the club at the regular meetings held on the third Tuesday of each month. There is considerable advantage in this procedure as it enables the placing of definite and concrete ideas before the Club members and avoids the discussion of petty details and contentious matters which if placed in an open meeting before the full membership of the club might cause disharmony, and would, of course, take up a lot of time which would do no material good for the progress and welfare of the Club. This keeps the usual bickering and discord, which does so much to wreck the good aims of so many Clubs, at a minimum.

At each monthly meeting of the Club when the business part is concluded, a well-planned, educational programme is featured. At the February meeting, Mr. Montague Francis reported the highlights and his observations of the C.K.C. Annual Meeting. At the March meeting, the writer gave a short discussion on the training of dogs. The April meeting was probably the most interesting and instructive one to date, and will likely take some beating for the future entertainments that may be booked. At this meeting Mr. Monaghan was able to get Miss Georgina Neithercut to bring her talking dog "Monty." The writer has seen many instances of

a dog's natural wisdom, intelligence and responsiveness, but most instances have been the product of professional trainers. "Monty" did mental arithmetic in addition, subtraction, division, cube and square root that was astounding, besides telling the number of ladies, gentlemen and boys in the front seats of the hall. "Monty" is a cocker that was trained and handled by an amateur, and it only goes to show what can be done with patience, kindness and perseverance. "Monty's" act was followed by a demonstration of gaiting and setting up of a cocker for show purposes put on by Mr. Joseph Kissel, one of our local handlers. By no means least was a motion picture in technicolor, "Scarlet and Gold" showing the many phases of R.C.M.P. work and training. This was in addition to the usual refreshments with which the club always ends the evening.

Besides the regular monthly meetings of the Club they hold social evenings, the first of which was on February 19th. The usual good time was had by all. It certainly is surprising the friendly and pleasant time one can have at these social evenings and one finds out other doggy people have troubles and problems similar to one's own. On March 17th they held their Annual Banquet followed by dancing. Another social evening was held on April 30th. On April 2nd they held an all Breed Sanction Show, report of which has already appeared in this magazine. It is easily to be seen that this Club is well on its way to achieving its one great ambition, which is, to foster a better understanding between dog owners, betterment of dogs in general and cockers in particular, and to encourage and assist the novice dog owner, be he breeder or trainer. A true indication of the interest the novice owner is taking in the training and handling as well as breeding, is shown in the nature of the questions they ask at the meetings. During the summer months it is hoped that there will be enough interested in training and obedience work to warrant a few Sunday Workouts and possibly a trial of some sort the latter part of the summer.

Besides the business-like and educational way in which this Club is run, it is very interesting to note that since the Annual Meeting of the Club in January, its paid membership is doubled, and the treasury is richer by over \$150.00. Another very interesting feature is that the whole of the Executive are members of the C.K.C. and this is probably outstanding in any such organization.

The Origin, Spreading and Combat of Cryptorchism

CRYPTORCHISM, that is the absence of one or both testicles in the scrotum, is a hereditary abnormality, which appears not only in the dog but also in other species of animals, and is especially apparent in pigs, sheep and horses. It has also been observed in wild animals, for instance, lion, deer, and roedeer.

Cryptorchism originates through a check in the development of the small brain (brain appendix). During the development of the embryo, the testicles move from their original position near the kidneys through the peritoneal cavity into the scrotum. If this movement is arrested, the testicles remain in the peritoneal cavity or in the inguinal canal and then there follows the condition which we know as cryptorchism—one or both testicles are not present in the scrotum. They are lying in the inguinal canal or in the peritoneal cavity just over the entrance to the inguinal canal. It is here that the testicles are normally situated in new born puppies. The movement in and through the inguinal canal usually takes place during the first weeks of life. The process is normal up to the moment of birth, cryptorchism only starting after birth.

The movement of the testicles is caused by the circulation in the bloodstream of sex hormones generated in the pituitary gland. The condition known as cryptorchism appears when this hormone does not act with sufficient strength to effect the necessary downward movement.

The cause of cryptorchism is hereditary. All research made in this connection has shown that environment, change of diet or rearing does not influence it, and that inheritance alone can be held responsible.

How this hereditary tendency is passed on has not yet been fully explored in detail. All experiments made so far tend to show that cryptorchism follows what is called recessive inheritance. In practice, this means that cryptorchid animals usually do not beget any cryptorchids if mated to hereditarily sound bitches and that cryptorchid animals almost always come from parents which outwardly look normal, but which are both carriers of the defective inheritance.

How can one explain the inheritance of cryptorchism? We must start from the fact that each animal has two sources of each different hereditary quality, namely, one from the sire and one from the dam. The simplest way of explaining the hereditary process of cryptorchism is to conclude that it has one source of normal development of the testicles, and one source of faulty development, or cryptorchism. Each animal can only get one source of development from each parent, either normal or defective. The appearance of cryptorchism is dependent on how the defective sources meet.

In the following, simple symbols are used to clarify the methods of inheritance, i.e., the source of normal testicle development being marked with an \bigcirc and the source of defective development with an \bullet . In a breed or strain where cryptorchism does not appear, all the animals are free from the abnormal source. Their hereditary sources, therefore, can be marked by two signs for normal development $\bigcirc\bigcirc$. These animals can only give their progeny the source of normal development. Mating two such animals can only give their progeny the normal inheritance, and they all have $\bigcirc\bigcirc$.

A cryptorchid animal possesses only the source of defective testicle development $\bullet\bullet$. If, for instance, a cryptorchid dog

is mated to a normal bitch, then all the progeny get the defective source from their father \bullet and the source of normal development from their mother \bigcirc . All these animals will therefore possess the mixed sources $\bullet\bigcirc$. If the source of cryptorchism as compared with that of normal development is recessive in inheritance, it means that the normal source will prove the stronger. The defect will then be seen only in animals which have no source of normal development. With the $\bullet\bigcirc$ cross-bred, there is always a defective source as well as a normal one. None of these animals therefore, shows cryptorchism, but all can, however, pass the defective source on to their progeny. This explains why there are very often no cryptorchids among the direct progeny of cryptorchid animals.

If $\bullet\bigcirc$ animals are mated to normal animals, several combinations are possible. The normal animals all pass on \bigcirc to their progeny; but the $\bullet\bigcirc$ animals give half of their progeny \bigcirc and the other half \bullet . From the progeny of such a mating, half are normal $\bigcirc\bigcirc$ and the other half $\bullet\bigcirc$. Among these no cryptorchids appear.

If $\bullet\bullet$ animals are crossed there will also be several possible combinations. As each parent either give its progeny a defective \bullet source or a normal \bigcirc one, the possible combinations will be $\bullet\bullet$, $\bullet\bigcirc$, $\bigcirc\bullet$, $\bigcirc\bigcirc$. Twenty-five per cent. of the progeny will get $\bullet\bullet$ from both parents. If such animals are males, they will be cryptorchids. In bitches, the condition is not visible. Half of the progeny are $\bullet\bigcirc$ and have the breeding potentialities already mentioned for $\bullet\bigcirc$ animals. Twenty-five per cent. of the progeny are normal. Outwardly, however, there is no difference between the $\bullet\bigcirc$ and the $\bigcirc\bigcirc$ animals, and it is therefore difficult to say which animal is normal and which is hereditarily unsound.

If a $\bullet\bigcirc$ is mated to a defective $\bullet\bullet$ animal, only half of the progeny can get the source \bigcirc from one of the parents, and in them, of course, the defective tendency remains hidden. The other half will be cryptorchids $\bullet\bullet$.

If $\bullet\bullet$ are mated to $\bullet\bigcirc$ all the progeny will be fully defective. All the male progeny will be cryptorchids.

If one considers these mating possibilities it is obvious that the progeny of the different matings is mostly $\bullet\bigcirc$, which carry the abnormal source but outwardly appear normal. In practice this is of great importance as it means that in a strain where there are cryptorchid males there are very many more hereditarily unsound animals which appear normal. To this one must add that it should be remembered that with bitches the tendency to cryptorchism can never be detected.

This knowledge must be the basis for combating cryptorchism. It is clear that cryptorchid animals can pass on the defect to a great extent and, therefore, should not be considered for breeding purposes. The appearance of a cryptorchid indicates that the defective tendency is present in the strain and its presence shows that both parents must be hereditarily defective and may have either the sources $\bullet\bullet$ or mostly $\bullet\bigcirc$. These animals, which generally appear normal outwardly, can reproduce this defective tendency. Our aim is to prevent such parents from spreading it.

It must not be forgotten that they have already got the defective source from at least one parent and that therefore at least two grandparents of a cryptorchid are hereditarily defective. It is not possible—or difficult at any rate—to ascertain which of these animals are hereditarily sound or unsound. Measures, therefore, to prevent them from breeding are very difficult.

Moreover, one must take into account the brothers and sisters of cryptorchid animals when combating cryptorchism. Some of these are always hereditarily unsound, and in a position to reproduce the defect. In their case also it is very difficult to find out which animals are sound and which are hereditarily unsound. It is advisable to refrain in principle from breeding from all sisters and apparently sound brothers of cryptorchids.

In nearly all breeds cryptorchism is so widespread that it is impossible to eliminate all carriers of the defective tendency at one stroke. Our measure can therefore only aim at severely restricting the frequent appearance of the defect. This should be possible if the advice given above is followed.

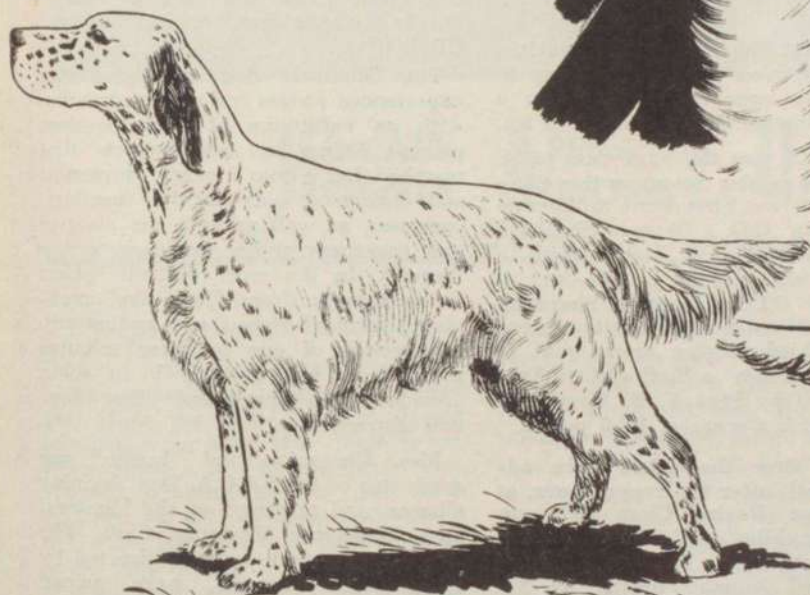

THE ENGLISH SETTER



Know Your Breed...

AN EARLY TYPE OF ENGLISH SETTER

By Alva McColl

THE English Setter holds a foremost place in the affections of all sportsmen as well as show men. Besides being a most useful, intelligent and hardy dog in the field, he is withal a handsome animal, appealing to all dog lovers of whatever class or creed. He is, too, a very ancient English variety. There is some difference of opinion as to whether he sprang from the Springer Spaniel, or the latter from him, but certain it is that he existed and was used and prized for his sporting proclivities as early as the fifteenth century. In the early days the dog was, of course, bred purely for sport, and few sportsmen from the wealth to the farming class were without their brace of Setters. Judging from old prints and other records, the ancient Setters were mostly lemon-and-white in colour, and a bigger and stronger dog than those which grace our game preserves and the show bench of today. The Setter, it is recorded, was the dog that was first used for hawking, and has been a constant companion of the gun for more than 400 years.

Briefly, the English Setter is throughout a symmetrically built dog. He should have a long, telescopic head with but little

"stop", square muzzle, rather narrow skull, showing a distinct occipital development, yet not too pronounced. The ears should be small and set on low; the eyes medium in size and full of intelligence, with a nice, soft expression. The neck should be slightly arched and of good length, finishing in obliquely set and well-laid-back shoulders. The body should be comparatively short, and ribs well sprung. Two common defects in the English Setter are flat sides and loosely placed elbows. The former is always an indication of want of heart room and cannot be tolerated, but the latter does not always imply want of galloping power. The out-at-elbows formation in the breed is no doubt hereditary, and may in some degree have been the "crouch" that was used in the early days when the dog lay close to the ground while a net was drawn over the birds. Later, as guns were used the sportsmen preferred the dog to stand and point the birds until they came up and flushed the game.

Height—Dogs about 23 to 25 inches, bitches 22 to 24 inches.

Weight—Dogs about 55 to 70 pounds, bitches 50 to 65 pounds.

Obedience Trials

MARCH 24th, 1949 will be a day long to be remembered by those who attended the All Breed Obedience Trials, held at The Sportsman's Show, Toronto, by The German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada.

To many of the Exhibitors this day was the culmination of many weeks of training, at the Training Classes put on by The German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada, these past few months, in the Coliseum at the Canadian National Exhibition Group. The Breeds represented at these Trials were Cocker Spaniels, German Shepherds, Staffordshire Terriers, Golden Retrievers, Poodles, and Miniature Poodles.

In the afternoon the first class to be judged was "Novice A", and Miss Edith Hall, of Cambridge, Mass., one of the Top Obedience Judges in the United States, placed a German Shepherd "Ellington of Rosemere" owned by E. Sucee, of Toronto first with a total of 191 points. In second place was a German Shepherd "Ynes of Sandorea" owned by Mrs. Mitzi Frohle with a score of 184 points. Third was German Shepherd "Tanya von der Vogelweide" owned by Florian Gratzner with a score of 182.5 points. Fourth passing score was another German Shepherd "Ymir of Val Hala" owned by James Day of Toronto, 170 points.

Special Awards were also presented to the Dogs first time shown in an Obedience Trial and First Prize went to "Ellington of Rosemere", second to "Tanya von der Vogelweide" and third to "Ymir of Val Hala".

At this point Mr. C. A. Frank of Detroit put on an Exhibition of Obedience Work with one of his Golden Retrievers and a Springer Spaniel. He

had them Heeling in unison, retrieving, etc., and it was really something to watch. The large crowd gave him a great ovation on completion of his act.

Novice "C" was the next class to be judged and passing Scores in this Class were as follows: First went to "Bonnie of Cara Mia" C.D. a German Shepherd owned by Mable T. Noble, with a score of 196.5. Second to "Trooper of Cara Mia" C.D. a German Shepherd owned by Mary Southcott with a score of 196. Third passing score went to "Hiccuppy Hiram" a Staffordshire Terrier, owned by Miss V. E. Meyers, of Toronto with a score of 191.5 points.

At this time the Trials were adjourned until after the supper hour, at which time Novice Class "B" was judged by Miss Hall. First in this Class went to a Golden Retriever "Duckerbird Atomic" owned by Mr. C. A. Frank of Detroit with a wonderful score of 199.5: second passing score to a German Shepherd "Edlyn's Jinn" owned by Ed. O'Brien of Canfield, Ontario with a score of 194.5 points: third passing score to a German Shepherd "Edlyn's Jody of Spruceroe" owned by Ed. O'Brien with a score of 190.5 and fourth passing score to a Miniature Poodle "Firebrave Aurelia" owned by Miss V. E. Meyers with a score of 178.

Mr. Frank of Detroit came in again at this point with two of his trained Dogs and put on another exhibition of top flight obedience work.

Mr. Bruce Unroe also gave an exhibition of trick work with his Shepherd "Tarzan V.D. Vogelweide" which was also well received by the large gathering.

First in Open "B" was a Staffordshire Terrier HICUPPY HIRAM owned by Miss Meyers, with a score of 188.5.

Montreal Dog Triumphs in Obedience Trials

FIDALTA'S Lady Luck, a Cocker Spaniel owned and shown by Mrs. L. R. Champion, won Best Obedience Dog at the Montreal Ladies' Kennel Club Show, outclassing an international field of over twenty dogs including top flight and experienced competitors bearing International and American obedience titles.

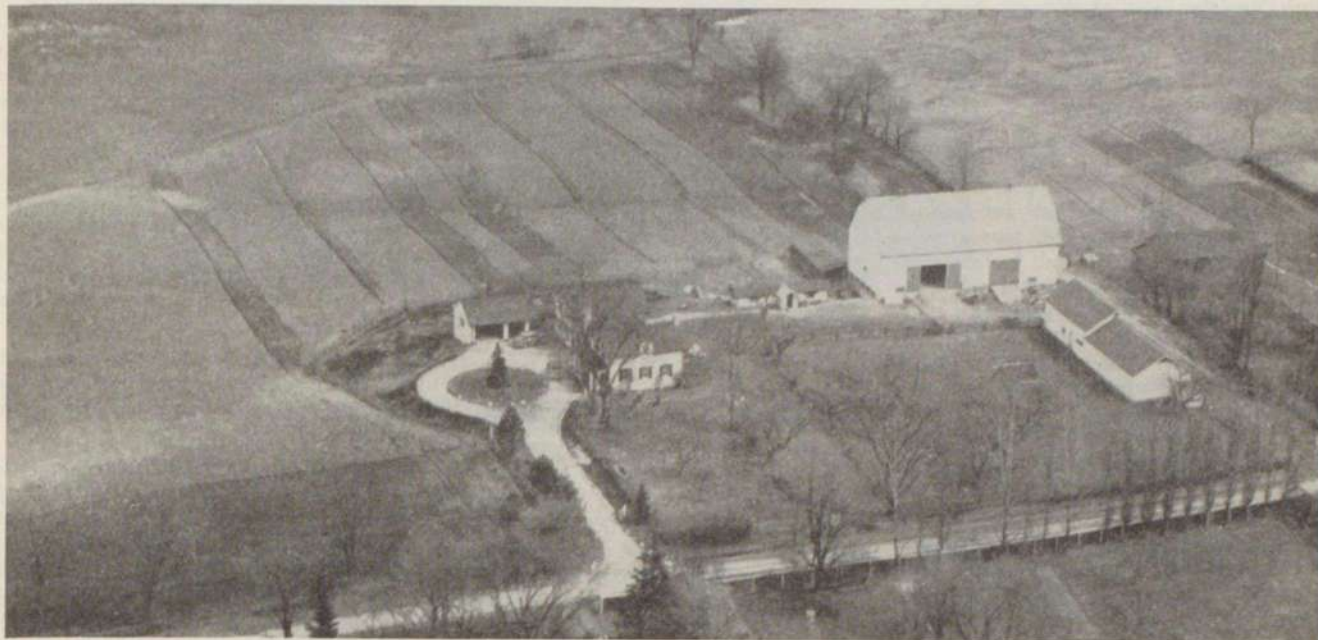
To win the Obedience Championship, "Lady Luck" gave two perfect performances on separate days, and each time was awarded the full 200 marks by different American judges, Miss Frances Pierce and Mr. Jack Baird. This is the first time in canine history that a dog entered for the first time in Obedience Trials obtained a Best in Show title as well as a double perfect score, beating by a slim half point margin the almost perfect exhibition of the tiny white Maltese "Tristan" and the drilled but eager display of the elegant French Poodle, "Maximillian" an International CD.

The Montreal dog impressed the experienced judges and spectators alike with an exhibition of close heeling, prompt sitting, and attentiveness that matched her owner's every movement and change of pace in the "heeling" exercises, as well as with the alacrity and eagerness of her response to the "recall". In the more difficult "stand for examination" and "long stay" exercises, "Lady Luck" stayed put and steady for periods of one to three minutes away from her handler in a room crowded with spectators, other dogs and distractions.

Mrs. Champion and "Lady Luck" are graduates of the S.P.C.A. Dog Training Classes, and members of the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club. The S.P.C.A. ten-week courses, directed by Mrs. Alec. Casgrain, have gained steadily in popularity. A year ago, the original class contained ten dogs. Today, there are over forty dogs in the Montreal S.P.C.A. Novice Obedience classes, and a further ten continuing the Advanced Training classes. The club has been formed to continue advanced training towards qualification for the Obedience awards of the Canadian Kennel Club. This includes, C.D. (companion dog), CDX (companion dog excellent) and UD (utility dog) which are canine titles of merit at least equivalent for your dog to a degree earned by you at a university.

Two club dogs, Mrs. Casgrain's Poodle "Wendy" and Mrs. Budge's Cocker, qualified at the Ladies' Kennel Club for their C.D., while Mrs. J. J. Meager's Lhasa Apso won his C.D. Among other club dogs qualifying for International stages of the awards were a Brittany Spaniel, Golden Retriever, Cocker Spaniel, Welsh Corgi, Cairn Terrier, Standard Poodle and a Hungarian Sheepdog (Puli).

Leptospirosis Jaundice

Spring brings again the many heart-breaking stories of children who have lost their pet dogs through illness brought about soon after their return from playing in the neighbourhood. Without thinking, the cry goes forth that the dog has been poisoned. Yet it seems strange that it is in the spring when there seems to be what almost amounts to an epidemic of dogs taking ill and subsequently passing away.

The snow melts away, and there is much refuse lying around which dogs love to investigate. They forage through garbage, and eat contaminated food which can bring ptomaine poisoning with its usually fatal results.

Not only contaminated food found on the streets, but often food given to them in their own home can cause illness. In England, due to the shortage of meat, dogs have been fed with meat condemned for human consumption, but on the advice of the Veterinary Association, the meat is cooked before being fed.

One of the menaces to the health of dogs is "Wells Disease" which germinates in the kidneys of the rat and is discharged through the urine. It is quite simple for a dog to pick up this disease simply by smelling where an infected rat has been. This disease is highly contagious and can be passed from one dog to another. The poison

gets into the blood stream and sets up a kidney and liver infection which is recognized by the orange-coloured, bloodstained mucus and the bleeding of the gums and lips. Not only can ptomaine poisoning cause violent illness among dogs, but also leptospiral jaundice. G. M. Edwards has written on this subject in a recent issue of "Our Dogs", England. The following paragraph describes the disease, which is so virulent that no dog is allowed into Sweden without first being quarantined and tested as being free from it.

"Without arguing the pros and cons of raw knackers' meat versus cooked, I think the worst risk of all has not been mentioned. That is the risk of leptospiral jaundice, caused through dogs being fed on meat contaminated by rats, either in the knacker's yard, or the shop or kennels from which it is obtained. Some year ago mysterious, almost sudden death of an occasional dog in my kennel occurred, and post-mortem examination failed to reveal the cause, until a bitch due to whelp, and taken suddenly very ill, was operated on by Professor Wright, with the object of saving the puppies, which were due at once and which the bitch was too ill to deliver herself. She died on the operating table before the operation commenced, and owing to these mystery illnesses the blood and organs of the bitch were examined and the leptospiral found in the blood. The

puppies were already dead, though the bitch was opened immediately. I was advised to have all my dogs injected with a vaccine in future, and from then onward have never had a case. I think the fact that there is such a vaccine to prevent and a serum to cure this disease is not as widely known by dog owners as it should be. Owing to the dogs' habits, leptospiral is an ever-present menace, apart from food, and prevention is cheap and easy to carry out, even in a large kennel. The worst feature of the disease is its difficulty of diagnosis, unless one is familiar with the symptoms. I feel sure that many dogs die of it which are thought to have died of poisoning by phosphorus. Bacteriological examination at Bangor University on the carcasses of the mystery cases failed to reveal any cause of death, and it was put down to phosphorus, which causes somewhat similar symptoms. The victims (they were all Scotties) had only been thrown a tit-bit of raw meat, and I remarked to my vet, on the coincidence that each dog that died had had a little bit of raw meat, but he did not connect the cause and effect, as I had fed raw meat for years. The dogs died before any hint of jaundice had time to show, and it was a particularly virulent form of the disease. My experience may put others on guard to prevent their dogs from contracting this terrible killing disease, which is far worse than distemper, and so easily prevented."

An Old Breed Comes Back

WITH the placing of the Irish Red and White Setter on the Kennel Club Register and classifying him as a distinctive type, this fondly remembered sporting breed has at last come into his long lost but well deserved place among the pioneers of our present great dogs.

This variety, whose history is so closely associated with our present-day, beautiful Red Setter, has for many years been neglected. This was a well regarded breed once, and feeling ran high among his supporters when his mahogany-coated descendant was placed over him as Ireland's National Gun Dog. But that was many years ago and the acceptance of the lovely, mahogany, self-colored dog is now a matter of national pride. However, the revival of this old breed merits historical recollection at this time.

The Red and White Setter was never entirely relegated; many old-time breeders refused to dispense with this intelligent and attractive breed. He was preserved for many years at Rossmore Castle and was often referred to as the Rossmore Setter. The last of his famous strain died in 1923, but his prominence gradually waned and he became obsolete with only a few breeders retaining a little stock. This stock, as may well be understood, degenerated owing to lack of recognition.

There is no record other than conjectural that the all-red Setter existed much before the 19th century, although the Irish Setter is referred to (without reference to color) as far back as 1803, and in 1780 a noted artist, Samuel Alken, painted a Red and White Irish Setter.

Some doubt has been expressed down through the years that the Red and White Setters were the forerunners of the solid-colored red dogs. However, one well-known authority writes: "There need be no qualms, however, as the parti-colored specimens were in actual fact the progenitors of the all-red dog." This theory seems fairly conclusive and would account for the appearance of white on the chest and feet of the all-red dog. The present standard of the Irish Setter allows for this, but modern-day breeders regard it as undesirable.

In detail, the Red and White Irish Setter differed from the all-red; they were coarser and more powerfully built. The head was similar in type with the same square muzzle, the skull was slightly broader and heavier, the ear was short and broad and set higher on the head. A further difference was in the coat and feather, the coat being dense and short and the feather profuse and inclined to curl. The tail is described as bushy and set high up.

But in spite of these differences it has been proven that the Red and White formed the background of the present-day solid red dog.

The Red and White were highly valued for their working qualities and tractability. They were steady and obedient and seldom required refresher courses. Some trainers who had the two varieties claim that the solid red dog required stiffer handling and more training. They also claimed that they were difficult to follow on the heather moors due to their color.

The Red and White Setter was not notable as a retriever from water, while the all-red setter, on the contrary, showed a marked aptitude for working in water and on marshy land. It is believed by many that the all red dog is the product of the old red and white crossed with the Flat Coated Retriever. This would account for his retrieving faculties as well as the presence of black seen in the early specimens of the all-red dog.

It is now, and always will be, a mystery just when and by whom the transition from a parti-colored dog to one of solid color was made. The recorded history of the Irish Setter sheds no light on this important event. But we are sure that the Irish Setter a century ago was red and white and that the all-red dog came into prominence in the late '80's.

It is extremely appropriate that this important old breed has been revived, if for no other reason than that he is the forebear of the beautiful mahogany coated setter of today. But in the area where he flourished and to those who fostered the breed he was prized as an intelligent worker.

It is interesting to note that for a number of years the Red and White Irish Setter was popular in France.

Wealthy French sportsmen took a keen interest in the breed, both as a field dog and show specimen. Count Robert de Moutbron had a large kennel and was a keen exhibitor. Mr. S. Smale, a noted Judge of that time, claims these dogs were shown in France up until 1908. At the last show where he judged six dogs and two bitches were benched, six of the eight belonging to the Count. While these dogs were commonly known as French Spaniels, when exhibited they appeared under the caption "Setters Ecosais" or Scotch Setters. Incidentally, Great Britain has never recognized a Scotch Setter other than the Black and Tan Gordon. Mr. Smale further states that they were identical to the ones bred in Ireland.

After the death of Count Robert de Moutbron, classes for this so-called Scottish Setter ceased and the breed eventually died out.

In 1875 the Red and White Setter was present in America, never in large numbers and they were never persevered with. The recorded history of dogs has little to say on this variety. The magnificent red-coated dog seems to have completely eclipsed him on this continent.

His revival will be an interesting new factor in the sporting dog world and the writer wishes to congratulate the Old Country Kennel Club for placing this important old breed back on their register. The history and evolution of the Irish Setter will be more perceivable with his existence assured.

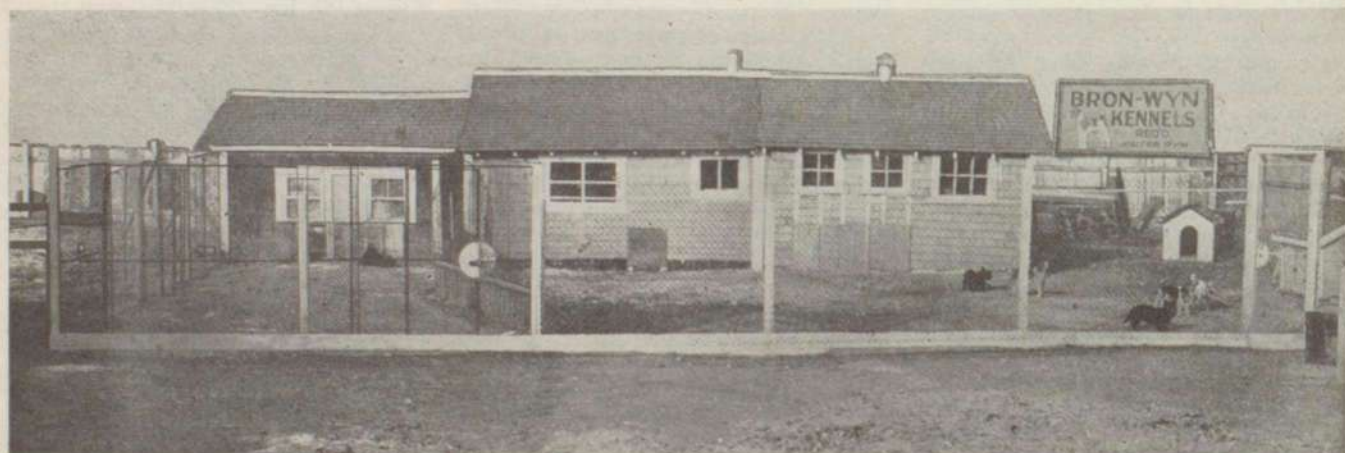

Plans have been formulated and a license granted for two Open All Age Stakes at the Field Trials to be held at Todmorden (suburb of Toronto) on July 2nd and 3rd. Under the Canadian Kennel Club Rules eight entries are necessary for qualifying points, and as some of the best Retrievers—Golden, Chesapeake Bay and Labrador—are coming from the United States, they will add to the Canadian list and so make qualifying scores a certainty.

The Judges are Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Merritt of St. Charles, Ill., and Mr. Paul Bakewell of St. Louis, Mo. Not only will the judging be of the highest standard, but also the competing dogs. Game birds will be used for both land and water tests.

This will be one of the finest Field Trials run in Ontario and worthy of a visit from those interested in this phase of work. The long holiday week-end will be ideal for those who wish to enjoy the great outdoors combined with good sport.

Saw Mill Kennel Club Has no Best in Show

THE Saw Mill River Kennel Club took a bold step in eliminating best in show and group judging as factors in its annual all-breed event in White Plains, N.Y., in March and thereby brought about a teapot tempest among exhibitors, judges, handlers and bystanders.

The view of the club officers was that groups and best-in-show did not hold much interest for the average person attending and besides, it was too difficult to find judges qualified to pass upon the many breeds represented in the groups. President W. C. Burns said that a very high percentage of group judging was not based upon the excellence of the individual dogs but on past records and other unrelated factors.

Burns maintained that the experiment was a success both for the number and the quality of the entry, and so it was, since the show drew 921 dogs in eighty-three breeds and the class of the dogs was as high as in any show of its size. There was a decline at the gate of a total of 140 admissions from the all-time high of 1,840, established the year before. The officers' position was that since the event drew the second biggest gate in the club's history, it was a success from that viewpoint, too.

Those outside the club were divided sharply on the merits of the idea. Many were whole-heartedly for it, others definitely opposed, and some straddled the fence by saying that the move was fine for some shows but not for all, particularly such events as Westminster, Eastern and Morris and Essex, where the group and best judging had definite gallery appeal.

What soured even some of those who were for the experiment was the attempt at dramatization that replaced the groups and best in show competition.

All breed winners were brought into the ring in their variety groups, then each in turn was identified via the loud-speaker system, with the breed, name and owner announced. Then special trophies and ribbons were presented.

By the time eighty-two breeds (one was absent) had been introduced, those remaining were heartily tired of the whole procedure and many said so. The feeling seemed to be that if the idea was to be longer-lived than in one show, the process should be speeded

or all activity finished with the end of competition in each breed.

The thought behind the experiment included that more attention would be focused on the individual breed winners if groups and best were abolished. To a limited extent this may have been so, but it was true also that with eighty-three breeds it was quite impossible to focus attention on all of them. The metropolitan newspapers gave a reflection of this in the accounts of the show next day. The stories dealt with the idea itself and what ring-siders thought of it. Not one dog was singled out for special mention, since it was manifestly impossible to mention all and to pick out a few individuals would have been unfair to the rest. The breed winners were carried in the summaries as usual.

Among the ideas culled from those at the show was one that an exhibitor could have a dog that was so superior to others in his breed that the breed competition was virtually "no contest" and the only contention left was in the groups.

Others opposed held that a show lost a lot as a spectacle without the best-in-show climax and that in some of the rarer breeds a winner might lose points he could get if he went on to group victory also. Another likened it to a theatrical performance left hanging in mid-air. Others noted the decline in the gate, slight though it was, and held that to be a prime objection.

Two handlers favored the idea at some shows but not all. One said that outdoors some groups were only half filled because the people wanted to get away. He was for the idea "because it gave the conscientious dog exhibitor who is more interested in a breed victory than a group a better break and discouraged 'pothunters'."

A little lady recently arrived from England—a Yellow Labrador, BUTTERCUP OF BLOSSOMLEA, born July 28th, 1948, purchased in England for Mr. Grant Mahood of White Rock, British Columbia. Six days after her arrival in White Rock, she started out on another journey which started her show career. On the Prairie Circuit at the Capitol City Show at Edmonton, Alberta, April 18th, under Judge George Kynoch, she went straight through from Senior Puppy to Best of Breed. April 19th, at the English Cocker Specialty Show under Judge Harry Saunders, she repeated her win. Then on to Calgary, Alberta, for the Golden Jubilee Shows of the Alberta Kennel Club. April 21st saw her again Best of Breed under Judge Mac Bell, and on April 22nd Winner's Bitch under Judge William H. Pym. This gallant little lady was placed third and fourth in every group she won her right to enter, completing her Championship (subject to C.K.C. approval) with several points to spare.

All Labrador breeders will join in not only congratulating her new owner, Grant Mahood, but also her breeder in England and Jean Grant of Richmond Hill, Ontario, who purchased her for her new owner. Buttercup was handled by the well-known handler and breeder, Vic. Williams, second Vice-President of the Canadian Kennel Club.

And now comes the sad part of the above story, for Buttercup of Blossomlea did not keep her Championship as she had been entered in the Senior Puppy classes throughout the shows, and when the dates were checked it was found that she was ineligible for the Senior class until the 28th of April. So Buttercup will have to try all over again.

Time and again it has been brought to the attention of the members of the Canadian Kennel Club at the Annual Meetings that the division in the Puppy classes creates many hard-

ships, and that the former method of having a Puppy class from six to twelve months at all shows, with the exception of Specialty Shows and in breeds where the entries are very large, was more beneficial. To add more burdens would seem unfair, but the above sample would lead one to believe that a solution must be found if we are to keep the exhibitors interested.

Another good Labrador brought from England by Jean Grant and sold to Grant Mahood, of Vancouver, is Hiwood Sara, litter sister to Windsor Bob, owned by His Majesty, King George VI. Windsor Bob is the first dog ever run at a Field Trials by the King, and at the Kennel Club Retriever Trials, Windsor Bob won the Open Stakes out of a field of twenty-four dogs. The King's entry into Field Trial competition revived memories of the famous Labradors and Clumbers which his father the late King George V ran at Field Trials for many years.

Good News has arrived from the Providence Hospital in Everett, Washington. The popular handler, Bob Wilson, is recovering from the injuries received when his truck containing the dogs which he had campaigned on the Western Prairie Circuit was struck by an automobile at Prairie Field Crossing, just South of Everett, Washington. All the dogs which escaped have been recovered and none were seriously hurt. The optimistic Bob expects to be back in the ring again around the 10th of July.

Moffat Dunlap of Toronto is quite elated over the award given his female Labrador, Kiska Dinah, at the Midwest Field Trials held at Lake Forest, Illinois. Kiska placed fourth in the Amateur Stake and was handled in this stake by Mr. H. V. P. Lewis of Toronto. Mr. Lewis, by the way, is the trainer of the Golden Retriever, Moongate Suzanne, owned by Mr. A. C. Cowan of Toronto, and which was mistakenly called a Labrador Retriever in the April issue of DOGS IN CANADA.

Another dog which was featured in DOGS IN CANADA recently is Ariel Spunky Girl, a smart pointer owned by Dr. Alan Secord of Toronto. Ariel gained sufficient points for her Field Trial Championship at the recent Ontario Bird Dog Association (Toronto Branch). We believe that Ariel Spunky Girl is the first Pointer to win under our new rules in this section of the country.

An effort is being made to have all dog publications use Capital Letters as initials for breed names. The "American Kennel Gazette" and all American publications and press releases are using Capital Letters in this regard. Apropos to our article appearing in the May issue of DOGS IN CANADA, the following has been gleaned from the Chatham News, Ontario.

That a provincial statute which purports to allow the summary killing of stray unlicensed dogs cannot override the Criminal Code was the ruling of Magistrate Craig in Tuesday police court.

Defending Martin Zruna, 19, of Concession 8 Chatham township, charged with attempting to injure a dog, Douglas G. Kerr quoted the Dog Tags and Live Stock Protection Act which stated that a dog found off the premises where it is habitually kept "may be killed."

"The Criminal Code is superior in its own field," Magistrate Craig commented.

Zruna had pleaded not guilty to the charge of attempting to injure a dog belonging to Wren Jackson of Turnerville.

Registering a conviction, he placed Zruna under one month's suspended sentence, subject to \$50 personal bonds and payment of costs amounting to \$16.80. The costs included the veterinary's bill.

Recent applications of many spring and fall fair associations for dog show dates bring forcibly to our notice that to the agricultural fairs we must give credit for many of our dog shows. These fairs, which gave the dog shows their start and enabled them to leave their toddling stage behind, have in some cases left the dog shows off their itineraries.

Now the question arises: "What are we going to do about it?" Surely we owe something to these associations which have borne the brunt of good and bad times down through the years since dog shows were in the kindergarten stage of their existence? The agricultural fair presents a wonderful opportunity to kennel clubs and associations who in crowded districts have difficulty in obtaining suitable buildings in which to hold their shows, and to those who must give deep consideration to their projects and avoid clashing dates with those of similar organizations a relief is established almost overnight. By approaching almost any of the rural fair boards, arrangements could be made to include a dog show amongst their attractions, and the benefits would be mutual and far-reaching. A dog show would be held in a new centre, fresh fields would be opened, and as has been proved so often, a dog show held in connection with an agricultural fair is the most popular and heavily patronized attraction on the grounds.

The following letter was received from W. J. Simpson of Bridgeport, Ontario:

From time to time one hears arguments for and against Obedience Training insofar as it affects dogs participating in Championship Shows, so you may find the following of interest.

Our Shetland Sheep Dog, CH Speed Valley Ace of Beechcroft CDX, was sold to the States some time ago, and I am very pleased to advise you that he completed his American Championship and placed second in Group at the recent Washington, D.C. Show.

He was Canada's first CDX Sheltie.

I am quite sure that had it not been for his Obedience Training this dog would not have gained these high honours in strong U.S. competition. Actually, during the time he was competing for his Canadian Championship he was extremely hard to handle, and even after he attained his Bench title he was so nervous and excitable that, despite his good physical qualities, I seriously considered having him put to sleep. That is, until I became interested in Obedience Training. This work steadied him immensely and he gained his CD and CDX in six straight trials during which time he was handled by Mr. Ed O'Brien.

This, to me at least, proves the value of Obedience Training.

The popularity of the Weimaraner is growing by leaps and bounds, and we now have them registered in the Canadian Kennel Club. Frank Bush of Moose Jaw was the first to register the breed in that organization, and Matt Sterzer, Yorkton, Sask., has imported a female puppy. An exceptionally intelligent dog, it is promoted by a group of enthusiastic sportsmen who are not allowing the breed to be used indiscriminately.

Pet shops are to be licensed in England, but the breeders of purebred dogs are not alarmed, as they come under the provision of scientific purposes. The new law, however, may eliminate the various kennels which keep both purebred dogs and mongrels, and like Canada, confine kennel licenses for the breeding of purebred dogs only.

The Forum

IT is the contention of many exhibitors of purebred dogs that the point rating if published in the catalogues would be of great benefit to them.

This point is well taken. There are rules which specify what the catalogue must contain, but there is no rule forbidding any Show-giving Club from publishing the point rating in the catalogue should they desire to do so.

According to the Dog Show Rules as passed at the Annual Meeting in 1948, the Puppy Classes are recognized as official classes, and therefore a dog which has won a First in a Puppy Class is no longer eligible to be entered in the Novice Class. Wins in the Puppy Classes were excepted prior to 1948.

It is the contention of many people that a puppy should not be entered in the "Open" Class.

It is the opinion of seasoned exhibitors, that if they feel a dog is ready to show, then it should be entered in the Open Class. No matter what happens along the way, in the end the winner of any class still has to meet the winner of the Open. Occasionally, an exhibitor has two dogs in the same sex which he is anxious to show and he is alone at shows, so he enters them in different classes. Here, we should like to say that we wonder why more exhibitors do not try, as is the case in the United States, to build up the Canadian Bred Class. It could be made as important as the Open Class. As it is now, most people look upon it as "second choice"; we have often

seen the winner of the Canadian Bred Class go to the top.

As a result of an advertisement in Dogs in Canada, Mrs. A. Fix reports that Mr. L. R. Whitman's lovely Dachshund, "Hestor von Atlantis" made an air journey from Yarmouth, N.S., to be bred to Kahlenberg Kennels' well-known stud dog, Max v.d. Kahlenberg, whose progeny have made excellent show records, a granddaughter of his being the first Canadian bred Dachshund to go Best in Show at an all breed point show in Canada.

"Give me soundness, bone and coats, heads can always be improved but cripples never." Hind quarters seem to be the worst fault here and some judges consistently overlook them. The seriousness of it is that novices will use them and he only needs to do it once. Dr. McCain, a medical man, who is judging the Collie Specialty at Guelph and who understands bone structure says it will take 15 generations to get it out. So this fault can pyramid on until it ruins a breed. The English standard says "that the feet shall parallel the body, neither turn in nor out."

MEETINGS

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors will be held on the third Wednesday of each month.

1298. The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, April 20th, 1949, commencing at 5.00 p.m. The President, W. J. Risewick, presided. Officers and Directors present included Walter Brown, Paddy Boughs, George P. Davies, Douglas Riedel, A. Roberts and J. Thorndike, Jr.

The Secretary reported that Mr. George Boyd, a member of the Club residing at Niagara Falls, Ontario, had been killed in a motor-car accident in the United States. The Secretary was directed to convey to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Boyd the sympathy of the Board of Directors and members of the Club in their bereavement.

1299. MINUTES

SUBJECT: The Secretary presented for adoption the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on March 16th, a copy of these minutes having been forwarded to every member of the Board.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Riedel, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on March 16th, 1949, as prepared by the Secretary, be adopted." Motion carried.

1301 (1279). REGISTRATION COMMITTEE CASES

REPORT: The Secretary reported that the Registration Committee had:

- Authorized registration of the German Shepherd dogs AJAX VON DER KASTANIENBURG and ADA VON STEYL, imported from Germany by P. C. Trendell, St. George, Ont.;
- Authorized the registration, under Article 33, Section 7 of the Constitution, of the American Cocker Spaniels ROCKHURST LADY, ROCKHURST AMBER, ROCKHURST HONEY, ROCKHURST LADDIE and ROCKHURST RUSTY, owned by Mrs. A. C. Bate, Aylmer East, Que.;
- Authorized the registration of the German Shepherd dog ADELE VOM HAUS RUPERT, imported from Germany by Stanley Dymyn, Thorold South, Ont.;
- Authorized the transfer of ownership of the American Cocker Spaniel LOOKOUT PALOMINO (230871) from Wilfred Ruthledge to Victor E. Hartley, Fort William, Ont., as of May 24th, 1948;
- Authorized the registration, in the name of H. C. Macphail, of the Poodle PANDA, imported from Great Britain; and the transfer of ownership of this dog from Mr. Macphail to Mrs. Patricia E. Beck.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Davies, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, the actions of the Registration Committee in connection with the cases reported on by the Secretary be endorsed." Motion carried.

1302. LETTER FROM DIRECTOR JACK THORNDIKE

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Director Jack Thorndike, asking that the following matters be placed on the agenda for discussion by the Board:

- Possible arrangements whereby The Canadian Kennel Club could offer a service to show-giving clubs by selling ribbons required at championship shows;
- The offering of two medals by The Canadian Kennel Club at the end of each year, one to member of the Club whose dog wins the most Best in Show awards during the year, the other to member of the Club whose dog wins the most Best Canadian-bred in Show awards during the year. Mr. Thorndike suggested that these might be offered in recognition of services rendered the Club by persons to be named by the Board.

DISCUSSION: Director Thorndike pointed out that in order to obtain ribbons in time for a championship show, a show-giving club must place an order for the ribbons far in advance of its closing date of entries with the result that the club is obliged to order ribbons quite in excess of those which it might require at its show. He expressed the view that perhaps The Canadian Kennel Club, by making an arrangement with a ribbon manufacturer, could have the ribbons prepared after entries close in order that the show-giving club could order the exact number of ribbons required. In the discussion which followed it was agreed that it would be very difficult to get any ribbon manufacturer to agree to provide the service suggested by Director Thorndike, and that since many show-giving clubs order ribbons from manufacturers located nearby, any attempt to funnel all orders through the Club or one ribbon firm might be regarded as unnecessary interference by the Club.

ACTION: It was therefore agreed that no action be taken in this connection.

DISCUSSION: The President stated that he had discussed with Director Thorndike the possibility of the Club offering medals in recognition of the services rendered the Club by the late Mr. James D. Strachan, Secretary-Treasurer of the Club for twenty-two years, and Mr. William H. Pym of Vancouver, who had served on the Board of Directors for nineteen years.

RESOLUTION: Following discussion it was regularly moved by Director Boughs, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, in recognition of the services rendered the Club by Mr. William H. Pym of Vancouver and the late Mr. James D. Strachan of Toronto, the following medals be offered annually commencing with January 1st, 1949:

- The W. H. PYM MEDAL to be awarded to the member of The Canadian Kennel Club whose dog wins the most Best in Show awards during the calendar year;
- The JAMES D. STRACHAN MEMORIAL MEDAL to be awarded to the member of The Canadian Kennel Club whose dog wins the most Best Canadian-bred in Show awards during the calendar year." Motion carried.

DISCUSSION: It was agreed the medals would be restricted to dogs owned by members of The Canadian Kennel Club, but that such owners must be members in good standing at the time the awards were received in order to qualify for the medals. It was also agreed that only awards earned at championship shows and specialty shows (except those held in conjunction with championship shows) held under the Dog Show Rules of The Canadian Kennel Club would count towards these medals.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to obtain prices on such medals for the Board's consideration at its next meeting.

1304. LETTER FROM THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mr. H. D. Bixby, Executive Vice-President of The American Kennel Club, advising that through an error and in spite of an understanding between the American Kennel Club and the Canadian Kennel Club that the name of a dog registered in one stud book would not be altered when registered with the other club, the Welsh Corgi (Pembroke) registered by the Canadian Kennel Club as UPPERTON CORNCOB, had been registered by the American Kennel Club as UPPERTON CORNCOB OF LAGGENDEN.

Mr. Bixby reported that the dog had been shown at thirty A.K.C. shows, had earned his American championship and had sired some eighteen puppies, and enquired whether it would be possible, under the circumstances, to permit the name to stand as registered by the American Kennel Club in the event the dog's show and breeding records do not "show any great activity of this sort".

DISCUSSION: The Secretary reported that the show records indicated that this dog had earned its Canadian Championship before being exported to the United States.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Canadian National Live Stock Records and ascertain what litters (if any) by this dog had been registered, and in the event no litters are registered Mr. Bixby be informed that the Board would not object to the registration remaining as is providing the breeders (and first owners) of the dog do not object.

1305. LETTER FROM DEPUTY PROVINCIAL SECRETARY (ONTARIO)

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Deputy Provincial Secretary (Ontario) which reported that the Provincial Secretary's Department anticipated receiving an application from a charter for an organization to be known as the YORK AMATEUR FIELD TRIAL CLUB, the proposed objects of the Club to be as follows:

- To encourage the breeding, training and exhibiting of dogs and particularly to organize and conduct field trials for sporting dogs in the County of York and elsewhere within the Province of Ontario;
- To promote, organize and conduct, in accordance with the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, field trials for Chesapeake Bay Retrievers, Curly Coated Retrievers, Flat-coated Retrievers, Golden Retrievers, Labrador Retrievers, Irish Water Spaniels, and such other breeds as the Directors may from time to time decide;
- To organize and conduct obedience trials, exhibitions and shows of dogs of every breed and description;
- To promote public interest in game conservation by encouraging the use of retrieving dogs in the hunting and shooting of wild fowl;
- To further the interests of owners and breeders of sporting dogs;
- To do all such other things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform the Deputy Provincial Secretary that the Club had no objection to the incorporation of the new club nor to its proposed objects as outlined.

1307 (1286). CLUB DELEGATION RE SHOW DATES

REPORT: The Secretary reported that the Toronto Kennel Club and the Canine Breeders' & Exhibitors' Association of Canada had been informed of the Board's decision (item No. 1286 in minutes), regarding their applications for show dates, that these clubs had later requested that a delegation from each be permitted to appear before the Board to speak on behalf of their applications, and permission had been granted after consultation with the President.

The Board agreed to hear the delegation and the following then entered the meeting:

Mr. Peter Herd and Mr. John McNaughton, representing the Toronto Kennel Club;

Mrs. E. Brown, Mr. H. Carter and Mr. C. J. McGarry, representing the Canine Breeders' & Exhibitors' Association.

REPRESENTATIONS SUBMITTED BY DELEGATIONS

Speakers from the delegations submitted the following arguments in support of their applications to hold two-day shows:

- That it was not fair to either judges or exhibitors by limiting their shows to one-day affairs in that the judging of the large number of dogs entered at their shows compelled a rushing of the judges with the result that:
 - Exhibitors, particularly the novices, felt that the judges had not given their dogs sufficient examination;
 - Judges were unfairly criticized over lack of proper examination of dogs even though they had a schedule to keep up to if the show was to conclude at a reasonable hour.
- That exhibitors had little opportunity to enjoy the amenities at a show (i.e., meeting and chatting with other exhibitors and spectators or to discuss their dogs with prospective purchasers), when everything is rushed.
- That while exhibitors were at liberty to not exhibit dogs, the clubs holding such large shows were facing increasing costs in putting on their shows.
- That the extension of a show from one-day to two-day would allow for increasing the returns to owners of winning dogs.

DISCUSSION: Director Roberts asked whether the two clubs had considered the possibility of each holding a two-day show but requiring only the breeds from three groups to be present each day. The delegations replied that such an arrangement could hardly be entertained because:

- The Canadian National Exhibition Association would not endorse it;
- Considerable criticism could be expected from paying spectators who would expect to see most (certainly the popular breeds), breeds represented at the show even though prominent signs indicating otherwise were posted at the entrances to the show.

Director Riedel suggested that a policy should be laid down whereby a club whose previous show had indicated an entry say of 350 dogs could be granted permission to hold a two-day show otherwise clubs with shows with a lower number of dogs entered would be granted permission to hold one-day shows only. The President expressed the view that the Kennel Club was primarily interested in seeing that good dog shows are held, and it would be the show-giving organization that would suffer if it attempted to put on a show of longer duration than is justified by the size of its show from the point of view of the number of dogs entered, prize money offered, possible championship points that could be earned, and travelling and other expenses borne by the exhibitors.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Boughs, seconded by Director Riedel:

"THAT, the application of the Toronto Kennel Club for permission to hold a single championship show on September 2nd and 3rd, and the application of the Canine Breeders' & Exhibitors' Association of Canada for permission to hold a single championship show on September 8th and 9th, be approved conditional that such applications comply with the Dog Show Rules."

FOR THE RESOLUTION: Vice-President Brown; Directors Boughs, Davies, Riedel and Thorndike.

AGAINST: Director Roberts. Motion carried. The delegations expressed the appreciation of the action taken by the Board and left the meeting.

1308. LETTERS FROM MISS V. E. MEYERS

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported on letters from Miss V. E. Meyers, Toronto, who recommended that the Club advance \$1,000.00 a year for three years to be used for research work in connection with "X" disease, that a representative from the Club sit in on a committee of three and the results of the research work be published periodically in DOGS IN CANADA.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, the Secretary communicate with Dr. J. A. Campbell, an Honorary Veterinarian of the Club, with a view to obtaining information about the disease referred to by Miss Meyers." Motion carried.

"THAT, the accounts reported by the Secretary-Treasurer be paid." Motion carried.

"THAT, with the exception of the action taken in respect to the judges of groups for the Niagara Frontier Kennel Club show, the proposed judge of the Amherst Kennel Club show, and the selection of Mr. Lee Wade as judge of the Brant Kennel Club show, the balance of the selected judges reported by the Secretary be approved conditional that the applications for approval of selected judges conform to the requirements of the Dog Show Rules." Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Geo. L. Cartledge, Show Secretary of the Boxer Club of Canada and Assistant Show Secretary of the Guelph Kennel Club, requesting that the Guelph Kennel Club be permitted to have Boxers judged in the afternoon of its show on May 24th rather than in the morning. Amongst the reasons given for this request was that the judge of Boxers (Mr. J. P. Wagner of Milwaukee), may have difficulty in reaching the show in the morning owing to previous commitments.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Cartledge that the request was granted.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association, stating that a resolution had been adopted by the Association to the effect that at its future shows the refusal of entries would be confined to those persons suspended or expelled by the Canadian Kennel Club or denied the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club.

ACTION: No action was considered necessary.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read the following letters:

- (1) A letter from The Boxer Club of Canada, stating that a resolution had been passed by the Club expressing the desire of the Club that Mr. A. Loveridge be "returned to the position of C.K.C. Field Representative at the Ontario shows at no additional cost to the show-giving club."
- (2) A letter from Miss Lena Shortt, London, expressing disapproval of the Board's decision in respect to the attention of the C.K.C. Representative at shows, and urging reconsideration of the matter by the Board.
- (3) A night letter from the President of the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club, stating that the members of the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club "are unanimously in accord with sentiments expressed in letter petitioned by the Box Club of Canada regarding the duties of Mr. Alf. Loveridge."
- (4) A letter from the Secretary of the Barrie Kennel Club, stating that it is the wish of the Barrie Kennel Club that Mr. Loveridge be instructed to attend its forthcoming championship show on May 14th.
- (5) A letter from Mr. C. Matthews, Richmond Hill, Ontario, expressing satisfaction with Mr. Loveridge's efforts at championship shows, and indicating a desire that he be returned to such duties.
- (6) A letter from Mr. Loveridge (addressed to the President), stating that while consenting to his performing other duties in the Club's office, he was "not giving up any of my rights under my contract with the Canadian Kennel Club, dated the 29th November, 1948, nor am I consenting to any variation in the terms of my employment as expressed in that contract."
- (7) A letter from the Club's solicitor stating that in his judgment Mr. Loveridge's letter of itself would not alter any contractual rights which existed between the Club and Mr. Loveridge, that in his judgment no reply was called for unless the President felt that as a matter of courtesy he should answer the letter.

DISCUSSION: Director Riedel stated that he saw no objection to the Representative attending a nearby championship show if the club holding the show addressed to the Canadian Kennel Club a request for the Representative's attendance at its show. The Board reviewed its earlier discussions on this subject.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Roberts:

"THAT, these letters be received and filed, and any question of a change of policy in respect to the attendance of the C.K.C. Representative at shows be left over for the consideration of the Board of Directors at its annual meeting in 1950."

FOR THE RESOLUTION: Vice-President Brown and Director Roberts.

AGAINST: Directors Boughs, Davies, Riedel and Thorndike. Motion lost.

DISCUSSION: The Board then discussed the advisability of conducting a referendum ballot to ascertain the wishes of the majority of members in respect to the attendance of the Representative at shows and trials. Following discussion it was agreed that such a ballot could be conducted at the same time as the annual election.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to place this matter on the agenda of the meeting of the Board of Directors to be held in September, at which time the Board would then consider how the ballot should be conducted, and at the same time consider what other questions (if any) need be referred to the members for an expression of opinion.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported on a letter received from the Greater Winnipeg Kennel Club, regarding rosettes for championship shows, particularly for dogs placed in the groups.

ACTION: The Board agreed that it could not authorize any change in the requirement of Chapter 5 of the Dog Show Rules so far as it concerned ribbons and rosettes that must be provided at championship shows.

1314 (1217). REGISTRATION OF CLUB NAME

REPORT: The Secretary reported that the TORONTO DOBERMAN PINSCHER CLUB had applied for the registration of its club name, that notice that the application had been received had been published in DOGS IN CANADA, and no objection to the application had been received.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Riedel, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, the application for registration of club name as received from the TORONTO DOBERMAN PINSCHER CLUB be approved conditional that the application meets the requirements of Article 26A of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club Incorporated." Motion carried.

1315 (1288). NEW LIVE STOCK PEDIGREE ACT

REPORT: The President reported that he had been given to understand that the proposed new Live Stock Pedigree Act had had two readings in the Senate and in the House and had been referred to the Agricultural Committee.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to communicate with Mr. A. P. MacVannell, Chief Registration Officer of the Department, with a view to obtaining information as to the present status of the Act and, if possible, copies of the proposed Act so that each member of the Board could be provided with a copy.

1316 (1295). POSTCARD ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Canadian National Live Stock Records, in answer to a letter addressed to the Records at the Board's instruction, stating that the acknowledgment by postcard notices of applications received at the Records Office could not be undertaken with a resultant increase in administration costs.

ACTION: No action was taken.

1317 (1290 and 1291). PRINTING OF STUD BOOK LEASE ON OFFICE AND BOARD ROOM

RESOLUTION: After discussion it was regularly moved by Vice-President Brown, seconded by Director Davies:

"THAT, these matters be tabled until our status under the proposed new Live Stock Pedigree Act is known." Motion carried.

1318 (1287). APPOINTMENTS

REPORT: The Secretary reported that acceptances had been received in connection with the following appointments:

1319 (1292). MINUTES OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

REPORT: The Secretary reported that he had, in accordance with the Board's direction, prepared a summary of the proceedings at the annual general meeting. This summary was presented for the Board's consideration.

DISCUSSION: In discussing whether a summary of the minutes should be published and distributed as in other years, the Board noted that the cost to print and distribute the minutes of the annual general meeting, held in 1948, exceeded \$1,500.00, and the cost to follow the same procedure in respect of the minutes for the 1949 annual general meeting would be in the neighbourhood of \$1,000.00. It was estimated the cost of publication of the summary, as prepared by the Secretary, in DOGS IN CANADA would not exceed \$100.00. It was agreed that the summary furnished, in concise and understandable form, all the information that a majority of the members would desire.

ACTION: In view of the need for economy and the belief that the majority of members would prefer the summary rather than the complete report, the Board instructed the Secretary to arrange for publication of the summary in the June issue of DOGS IN CANADA.

1320. LETTERHEADS

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that the stock of letter-heads (for regular office correspondence) needed replenishing and tabled, for the Board's examination, quotations and sketches on a new letterhead.

ACTION: Following discussion, the matter was left in the hands of the Secretary to place an order for the present style of letterhead.

1323. ADJOURNMENT

On motion by Director Davies, duly seconded and carried, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourned at 1.35 a.m. on April 21st, 1949.

Summary of Proceedings

at

Annual General Meeting

Royal York Hotel, Toronto, February 10th, 1949

The President expressed a welcome to the Members and then went on to introduce the entire Board of Directors, all of whom were present.

In his opening remarks the President indicated that the Board at its Meeting the day before had taken considerable time to set up a budget so that there would be no financial loss on the Club's operations during 1949, assuming that the Club's revenue during the year was commensurate with revenue realized 1947-48, and that he had made reference, in a message read at the Meeting of the Board of Directors held the day before, to a number of possible economies that could be effected. Vice-President Brown pointed out that the Board had ordered the President's message read at this General Meeting and the President then read his message. (Note: This message was published in the March, 1949, issue of "DOGS IN CANADA".)

On motion by Vice-President W. Brown, seconded by Mr. T. C. Wylie, it was ordered that the President's message be recorded in the Minutes of this Meeting and referred to the Board of Directors for its consideration and action.

The President indicated that Mr. A. P. McVannel, Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture, had indicated a wish to speak to the members at this General Meeting and an invitation had been extended to Mr. McVannel. Mr. McVannel being present, the President asked him to speak to the Members at this time.

Mr. McVannel, in addressing the meeting:

- (a) Expressed his appreciation of the invitation extended to him by the President;
- (b) Stated that "a little time irons out" many things, and that he had confidence that at the conclusion of his remarks a "fairly mutual understanding" would obtain in respect of these matters;
- (c) Expressed the opinion that the President's address (read earlier in the meeting) left little opportunity for discussion;
- (d) Stated that a very good feeling existed between the other large live stock associations and the C.K.C.;
- (e) Reported that a satisfactory meeting of officials of the Department of Agriculture and representatives of incorporated live stock associations had been held to discuss the proposed new Live Stock Pedigree Act drafted by the Department;
- (f) Referred to the "objects" of the Club as stated in the Club's Constitution at the time of its incorporation under the Live Stock Pedigree Act in 1915;
- (g) Stated the objects of the Club (and other associations) had "possibly broadened out a little bit", and "present legal interpretation" indicated that the Department had given powers to associations when such powers were not authorized; that he assumed responsibility for such authorizations during the past seventeen years, but it was believed that the associations were "the most natural and the best possible to undertake that work";
- (h) Referred to the Constitution, adopted at the Annual General Meeting in 1948, which had not received Ministerial approval.
- (i) Stated that the Department had drafted a new Live Stock Pedigree Act in which the original principles of the present Act had been retained and it was believed that the draft Act would be acceptable to the various live stock associations, that each association had been invited to send representatives to a meeting in Ottawa to discuss the new Act which, he anticipated, would be presented to the House in a very short time;
- (j) Reported that the new Act clearly indicated that private breeding records must be maintained by breeders;
- (k) Stated that following an absence of several months because of ill health, in the spring of 1948, he had noticed "an increasing indifference with respect to dog breeders" so far as it concerned supplying, on applications for registration, detailed descriptions of the colour or colours of dogs, and on checking it was also found that a large number of breeders were not keeping adequate breeding records as required by the Act;
- (l) Stated that the Department is "taking a definite stand on two points, the maintenance of breeding records and identification";
- (m) Reported that "about the middle of July in conversation I appraised Mr. Hitchman (Director of the Live Stock Records) of his observations in respect of applications completed by breeders, and referred to changes made on applications";
- (n) Reported that he had again referred to the matter at a meeting of the Record Committee in October at which time "the Chairman of the Committee instructed the representative of the Canadian Kennel Club to take that message to your Board of Directors";
- (o) Read his letter to Mr. Hitchman dated December 13th, 1948, at which time a considerable number ("about 470") of prepared certificates of registration had been turned back without Departmental approval;
- (p) Reported that after the applications had been returned to breeders for further attention many had been returned in a form acceptable to the Department.

In closing his remarks, Mr. McVannel stated "that the dog business is a good business", but "we cannot increase or maintain that dog business or any other business unless we keep that on a proper plane".

In the discussion which followed a number of members sought to obtain, from Mr. McVannel, clarification of the Department's requirements in respect to the identification of

solid coloured dogs and dogs whose colours changed in time. No apparent progress in that direction being made, the members, by resolution, appointed a committee to meet with Mr. McVannel and Mr. Steele, Associate Chief Registration Officer, to discuss the matter further at 6 p.m.

The Meeting adjourned for lunch.

On motion by Mr. T. C. Wylie, seconded by Mrs. H. S. Weller, the Minutes of the 1948 Annual General Meeting were adopted.

The Members then discussed the 1948 Financial Statement, and during discussion the following points were brought up.

Mr. T. C. Wylie stated that applications of registration, etc., should not be provided free of cost. The Secretary explained that these forms are provided by the Canada National Live Stock Records and the cost for printing them was pooled by all associations working through the Live Stock Records Office.

In answer to a question regarding the \$500.00 honorarium listed in the statement, the Secretary stated that this was paid to Mr. T. E. Gunderson and explained that this was for past services rendered. In answer to a question put by Mr. T. C. Wylie it was explained that of the \$2,039.76 expended for engravings and art work, the sum of \$696.70 was recovered in the sale of engravings.

Mr. Wylie expressed the view that the amount of postage charged to "DOGS IN CANADA" amounting to \$1,017.53 was excessive. The Secretary explained that of this amount, \$769.12 represented the cost of mailing the magazine to members and subscribers.

Mr. T. C. Wylie expressed the view that the travelling expenses of Directors attending Championship Shows should not be borne by the Club. The President explained that of last year's travelling expenses approximately \$215.00 represented the cost of Directors attending Championship Shows. Mr. Wylie suggested that the Board give serious consideration to discontinuing this policy and the matter was left in the hands of the Board.

Mr. W. G. Kenyon asked why the "Provision for Contingencies", set up in the statement in the amount of \$3,000.00, was included in the 1948 statement. The Secretary explained that while the statement had to deal with the Club's operations in 1948, the auditors required full disclosure of all liabilities, real or contingent, and the auditors recognized any action taken with regard to these liabilities previous to the issuance of the balance sheet and associated statement. The President explained that reference to this contingent liability had been made in the 1947 financial statement and at the time of the issuance of the auditor's statement for 1948 (January 28th, 1949) it was believed that \$3,000.00 would be the maximum amount required to settle the litigation being dealt with by the Board of Directors.

Mr. W. G. Kenyon referred to the deficit on the magazine and pointed out that at the time the present Editor took the publication over following publication of the March issue, there had been an estimated deficit of \$576.00, that the commissions paid to the former Editor amounting to \$199.00 could not be attributed to the present Editor's administration, and that an amount of \$922.00 for doubtful accounts receivable had been set aside but had been charged to the 1948 operations of the magazine and, in his opinion these items, when considered together, removed the deficit shown in the 1948 statement for the magazine.

The Editor explained that for the purpose of the financial statement the auditors believed that a reserve should be set aside for overdue accounts but that there was no doubt that much of the \$922.00 set up for doubtful accounts receivable would be paid.

In reply to a question put by Mr. A. K. Butler, the Secretary read the following break down of the general expense account: stenographic report of 1948 annual general meeting, \$483.30; Purchase of model benching (less amount realized on sale), \$75.00; Contribution to Canadian Appeal for Children Fund, \$200.00; Contribution to B.C. Flood Relief Fund, \$200.00; Watch presented to Dr. J. A. Campbell, \$135.00; Moving expenses, change of offices, \$129.30; Box at 1948 Westminster Kennel Club Show, \$72.64; Lettering windows, new offices, \$82.00; Taxis, \$59.50; Luncheons and dinners—\$54.70; Flowers—\$45.00; Towel supply service, \$32.30; Room rentals: Members meeting, Victoria, January, \$5.00, Members meeting, Vancouver, January, \$15.00, Directors & Members meetings, Regina—\$20.00, Judging Lectures, \$12.00, Meeting at Vancouver re B.C. Flood Relief, \$10.00; B.C. Directors' report to B.C. Members following annual meetings, \$20.20; Car tickets, \$16.25; Providing and installing clamps on typewriter desks, \$12.40; Notices calling Directors' meetings at Victoria and Vancouver, January, \$11.47; Beagle Measuring standard, \$13.00; Press Clippings, \$148.80; Vacation pay stamps, \$51.85; Miscellaneous items, \$32.23.

In reply to a question put by Mr. A. K. Butler the Secretary explained that the difference between the amount of \$257.00 shown in the last Records Office statement as Stud Books sold and the amount of \$286.00 for the sale of Stud Book provided in the analysis of the Club's accounts could be attributed to sale of back issues of the Stud Books sold from the Toronto office.

Mr. N. S. Duckett referred to the small revenue on the sale of Stud Books as compared with the total cost of printing and distributing them and suggested that the Board of Directors consider ways and means of providing this information in the official organ of the Club.

On motion by Mr. E. Reid, seconded by Mr. A. K. Butler, the financial statements for 1948 were accepted.

The Secretary then read the Election Committee's report on

the election of Officers and Directors, Provincial committees, and Field Trial representative for 1949. The following indicates the number of ballots cast:

On motion by Mr. T. C. Wylie, seconded by Mr. A. Burden, the Election Committee's report was adopted.

On motion by Mr. T. C. Wylie, seconded by Mr. Bill Hammerton, Clarkson Gordon & Company were appointed the Club's Auditors and Election Commission for 1949.

The President reported that in view of a request received, Mr. Sam Foster, representing the Canadian National Exhibition and Mr. F. O. Plant, representing the Central Canada Exhibition Association of Ottawa, were invited to attend this Meeting to speak on behalf of exhibition associations desirous of holding Championship Shows of more than one day's duration.

Mr. Foster, being present, addressed the Meeting, made reference to the following:

- The Exhibition's application to hold a three day show in September 1948 which application had not been approved by the Canadian Kennel Club Board of Directors in view of Chapter 3, Section 8 of the Dog Show Rules;
- Although disliking the arrangement, but in order to preserve continuity of dog shows at the C.N.E. the Exhibition Dog Show Committee operated three one-day shows;
- The holding of three shows instead of one meant that prize money had to be split three ways with consequent reduction of cash prizes in the classes;
- Although three judging rings were continuously in operation each day, the large number of dogs entered each day resulted in the late conclusion of each show and instead of the crowded ringsides for the groups and Best in Show,

- only "a corporal's guard" witnessed the final awards;
- The three shows made necessary increased entry fees for those exhibitors entering dogs at more than one of the Exhibition shows, this despite the lower rates of prize money in the classes;
- With such large shows the preparation and printing of catalogues in time for each show presented a real difficulty;
- The Exhibition has decided that it cannot continue to operate one-day shows; and that having gone out of their way to comply with the Club's wishes, the Exhibition requested consideration of restoring the right of the C.N.E. to hold a one three-day show.

On motion by Mr. W. G. Kenyon, seconded by N. S. Duckett, a resolution was adopted thanking the Canadian National Exhibition for co-operating with the Club by the holding of Championship Shows in 1948.

Mr. F. O. Plant, being present, then addressed the Meeting. He stated that while the Central Canada Exhibition's dog show building accommodated approximately 300 dogs, only one judging ring could be provided and that although the Central Canada Exhibition's Dog Show Committee had discussed the Canadian Kennel Club's ruling in respect to one-day shows, it had to conclude that a Central Canada Exhibition dog show in 1948 was not possible. After dealing with several aspects of the Exhibition's position in respect of dog shows, Mr. Plant indicated that a strong possibility existed that there would be no dog show in conjunction with the Exhibition if the present rule continued in force. Mr. Plant referred to the friendly relations existing between the Club and the Central Canada Exhibition and requested that consideration be given to changing the present rule.

On motion by Mr. E. Reid, seconded by Mr. A. K. Butler, the Members decided to immediately discuss the proposed amendments to the Dog Show Rules regarding the holding of Championship Shows of more than one day's duration.

The members then discussed the following proposed amendment to chapter 3, section 8 of the Dog Show Rules, this section to be amended by the addition of the following:—

"That the Directors shall have the power to approve Championship Shows of more than one day's duration where it feels that it is in the interests of dog shows that such approval be extended."

In the discussion which followed, the words "of dog shows", immediately following the words "the interests", were deleted and in their stead "of exhibitors" were inserted.

This amendment, as amended at the meeting, was adopted by the required majority. (86 votes to 24 votes.)

The President called for nominations for the election of two representatives to the Canadian National Exhibition Association. The following were nominated: Mr. W. J. Risewick, Mr. Walter Brown, Mr. Bruce McCrae, Mr. A. Roberts and Mr. T. C. Wylie. Mr. Wylie and Mr. Roberts withdrew their names. On the completion of the balloting, the scrutineers later reported that Mr. Risewick and Mr. Walter Brown had been elected the Club's representatives to the Canadian National Exhibition.

The President called for nominations for the election of two representatives to the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair Association. The following were nominated: Mr. Jack Thorndike, Mr. W. J. Risewick, Mr. Walter Brown, Mr. W. A. Harris, Mr. A. K. Butler, Mr. A. Roberts, Mr. A. Burden and Mr. Paddy Boughs. Mr. Risewick, Mr. Brown, Mr. Harris, Mr. Roberts and Mr. Boughs withdrew their names. On the completion of the balloting the scrutineers reported that Mr. A. K. Butler and Mr. Jack Thorndike had been elected the Club's representatives to the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair for 1949.

The President called for nominations for the election of one representative to the Central Canada Exhibition Association, Ottawa. Mr. T. E. Gunderson and Mr. E. Reid were nominated. Mr. Reid withdrew his name and the President declared Mr. Gunderson elected the Club's representative to the Central Canada Exhibition Association.

The President called for nominations for the election of one representative to the Western Fair Association. Mr. T. C. Wylie and Mr. Bill Hammerton were nominated. On completion of the balloting the scrutineers reported that Mr. Hammerton was elected the Club's representative to the Western Fair Association for 1949.

Before dealing with the proposed amendment to the Constitution, the question was asked as to whether or not the Club is continuing to operate under the Constitution in force during 1947 or the Constitution which the members adopted at its Annual General Meeting in February 1948. The President stated that inasmuch as the Constitution adopted in 1948 had not been approved by the Minister of Agriculture, the Club was continuing to operate under the Constitution effective in 1947.

The proposed amendment to chapter 8, section 4f with regard to the withdrawal of an acceptance of a nomination in connection with the annual election of officers, directors, etc., was discussed. Following discussion the President ruled that the Constitution already made provision on the lines intended by the proposed amendment, and no action was therefore taken in respect to this proposed amendment.

A proposed amendment in respect to extending the President's term of office from one year to two years was defeated, as was also the proposed amendment calling for the President to be elected by the majority of the directors.

The amendment proposed by Messrs. W. G. Burton and W. W. Rooney to chapter Section 8 of the Constitution regarding the eligibility of candidates for election to the Board was withdrawn by Mr. Rooney.

A proposed addition to chapter 11 section 10, calling for the annual election of an Obedience Trial Representative for the Province of Ontario was adopted.

The members adopted the following amendment to Chapter 15:

SECTION 9. The order of breed judging of shows within a Province shall rotate starting with Groups No. 1 at the first show in that Province, followed by the breeds in Groups Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 in that order. At the second show the order of breed judging shall commence with Group 2 followed by the breeds in Groups Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6 and 1 in that order and this arrangement shall continue with subsequent shows within the Province in the same calendar year. The Canadian Kennel Club will notify the show-giving club of the order of breed judging at its shows and this information must be set forth in the Premium List and Catalogue of the show.

The members adopted the following amendment to Chapter 19:

SECTION 15. The Superintendent of the Dog Show shall

supply a large board on which to post a copy of the Judge's books, bearing the carbon copy of the judge's signature just as soon as the breed is completed, in order that the exhibitors may mark their catalogues and notice if there are any corrections to be made while the judge, exhibitors and show superintendent are all at the show, and in order that errors may be corrected while the incidents are fresh in the minds of all.

The following proposed amendments to the Dog Show Rules were defeated:—

- (1) The proposed amendments to chapters 4 and 5 which would have eliminated the awards of best Canadian-bred in Show and best Canadian-bred Puppy in Show.
- (2) The proposed amendments to Chapter 16 regarding recording fees. (Note: the present rule calling for the payment of a recording fee of 25c per show for an unregistered dog continues in force).
- (3) The proposed amendment which would have renumbered chapters of the Dog Show Rules in the event that the proposed chapter in respect to Canadian Kennel Club representatives had been adopted.
- (4) The proposed new chapter regarding the appointment, duties and responsibilities of Canadian Kennel Club Representatives.
- (5) The proposed amendment to Chapter 4 of the Dog Show Rules which would have prohibited a dog earning more than two championship points beyond the ten required for Championship status.
- (6) The proposed amendment which called for all judges to be certified as qualified judges by a Judges' Committee to be set up to ascertain their qualifications.
- (7) The proposed amendment to Chapter 19 which would have permitted the removal of dogs from a dog show at 6 p.m.
- (8) The proposed amendment which would have permitted dogs to be entered into the obedience classes only to be exercised out of doors.
- (9) The proposed amendment to Chapter 19 regarding the use of food for dogs which are being judged.
- (10) The proposed amendment to Chapter 20 which would require that judging rings be swept clean and disinfected after each class.
- (11) The proposed amendment to Chapter 20 which would have required the Secretary of a show to inform the Humane Society of the show and to request the presence of an inspector at the show.
- (12) The proposed amendment to Chapter 21 which would have required a dog to earn at least three points at one show before being recognized as a champion.

The following proposed amendments to the Obedience Trial Regulations and Rules were adopted:

- (1) CHAPTER 1, SECTION 3 of the Regulations amended by the addition of the following: "A specialty club may apply for permission to hold an Obedience Trial, but must include pure bred dogs of all breeds in its Trials".
- (2) CHAPTER 6, SECTION 6 of the Regulations amended by the addition of the following: "nor can the entry of a dog, improperly entered in a class for which it is not eligible, be altered to another class after entries close."
- (3) CHAPTER 2, SECTION 1 of the Regulations amended by the addition of the following: "Only a club or association whose officers are members of The Canadian Kennel Club in good standing at the time of application may make application for Obedience Trial dates."
- (4) CHAPTER 2, SECTION 13 of the Rules amended by the deletion of the second sentence in paragraph one, and insert the following: "The obstacle or high jump shall be jumped clear and shall be one and a half times the height of the dog at the withers, except that the maximum height shall be three feet on turf or a similar soft surface. On hard surfaces such as cement or hardwood, the jump shall be lowered six inches."
- (5) CHAPTER 2, SECTION 14 of the Rules amended by the addition of the following to the end of the second sentence: "on turf or similar soft surface. On hard surfaces such as cement or hardwood the maximum shall be five feet."

During the supper hour, the Committee appointed for the purpose met with Mr. A. P. MacVannel and Mr. Steele of the Department of Agriculture regarding identification, and a report of the proceedings was read by Mr. A. K. Butler, Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee's report indicated that while Mr. MacVannel had expressed a desire to co-operate to every extent with members in respect to the registration of their dogs, no real progress was made in obtaining the information for which the Committee had been appointed to meet with Mr. MacVannel and Mr. Steele. The Committee recommended that the matter be gone into fully by the Board of Directors. Following further discussion and on a motion moved by Mr. Walter Brown, duly seconded and carried, a resolution was adopted receiving the Committee's report and referring it to the Board of Directors for the purpose of taking the matter up with the Minister of Agriculture.

Reference was made to the resolution, adopted at the 1948 annual general meeting, calling for the Club to purchase and rent benching. The Secretary reported that this matter had been taken up by the Board of Directors who had appointed a committee to look into the matter. The Committee reported back to the Board with the result that the Board had ordered that the

Committee's report be referred to this annual general meeting for consideration. The Secretary read the Benchling Committee's report (published in June, 1948 issue of DOGS IN CANADA). No action was taken nor did the members indicate that the matter should be pursued further. The Committee's report was adopted.

Mr. W. W. Rooney referred to a letter which he, as Director, addressed to the Board of Directors on June 14th, 1948 (referred to in item No. 1043, meeting of the Board of Directors held on June 18th, 1948), and claimed that the published minutes did not correctly reflect the content of his communication. A motion, moved by Mr. T. C. Wylie, seconded by Mr. A. Burden, was adopted calling for the publication of Mr. Rooney's letter, subject to the usual precautions regarding the publication of libelous matter in DOGS IN CANADA.

Mr. W. W. Rooney asked whether or not the Secretary had in the Club's files a letter addressed to the past President of the Club by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada. The Secretary replied in the affirmative.

Mr. W. W. Rooney asked whether or not the Club had in its files a letter allegedly addressed to the Club by Mrs. McColl in respect of the editorship of DOGS IN CANADA. The Secretary replied that he recalled a letter being shown to him, that he did not know its present whereabouts nor could he say as to the author of the communication, but his recollection was that the letter was not addressed to the Club or to any officer of the Club.

Mr. A. M. FitzGerald referred to the present style of entry forms and suggested that the Board give consideration to finding a more economical way of making it possible for show-giving clubs (and food companies providing these entry forms) to distribute such forms without the necessity of sending four entry forms with a premium list to an exhibitor who would likely enter not more than one dog. On motion by Mr. FitzGerald, seconded by Mr. Bruce McRae, the matter was referred to the Board of Directors for consideration.

Mr. N. S. Duckett again referred to the high cost of publishing the annual stud book, and suggested that the matter be discussed by the Board. Mr. Duckett also suggested that the Board consider transferring the Club's offices to its "own building".

Mr. T. C. Wylie referred to the present style of judge's book where the classes for males and females are on separate pages, and recommended that the style of book be amended so that the classes for both sexes would be on a single page. The Secretary reported that the present stock of judges' books would last for two years.

Mr. Wylie referred to an earlier message by the President in which it was suggested that the various divisions of the Club's operations should be self-sustaining as far as possible, and referred to the possibility of a certain percentage of the profits (if any) on a show may be contributed to the C.K.C. to offset the costs of the Club's operations in connection with shows. Mr. Wylie wondered if consideration could be given to a show-giving club paying the C.K.C. Representative's salary and travelling expenses.

Mr. Wylie suggested that the Board consider means by which the minutes of this annual general meeting could be made available to all members at an earlier date, and "in a much more uncensored and legible form than they have been in the past".

Mr. Wylie suggested that the Board consider the construction of a proper Board Room in the Club's new offices.

Mr. J. A. H. Irving suggested that action be taken to obtain the adoption of a simple certificate which would facilitate the passing of dogs through Canadian and American customs.

Mr. W. W. Rooney made reference to Mr. Wylie's earlier remarks regarding a portion of the profits on a show being turned over to the C.K.C. and stated that the C.K.C. should be provided with a financial statement on every show. Mr. Wylie expressed the view that when a show is held under C.K.C. rules, and it is advertised as being in aid of charity or some other worthy cause, the C.K.C. is "somewhat responsible" for the final disposition of the profits on the show. The President stated that the interest of the C.K.C. in such matters was solely to see that such shows are conducted as required by the Dog Show Rules.

Mrs. H. S. Weller referred to the last two published issues of DOGS IN CANADA, and enquired whether the Editor had been directed to cut down on the size of the magazine. The editor reported that there had been no direction from the Board but economies were indicated in view of the financial position of the Club as shown in its 1948 financial statements, although the final decision as to the size and content of the publication rested with the members who, at this meeting, had an opportunity of indicating their wishes in that regard.

A motion, moved by Mr. E. B. Reid, seconded by Mr. T. C. Wylie, was adopted calling on the Board to consider ways and means by which an "out-going executive" could not commit an incoming Board to expenditures except in respect of such items as rent, light and heat.

On motion by Mr. V. W. Williams, seconded by Mr. J. A. H. Irving, a motion was adopted calling for the issuance of membership cards to members of the Club.

On motion by Mr. J. A. H. Irving, seconded by Mr. A. K. Butler, this meeting adjourned.
