For Our Cover feature, this month, we have pleasure in presenting American and Canadian Champion Fernray Chien Yu, owned by Mrs. Elsie Barnes and Miss Dorothy Milne of Toronto.

This beautiful Pekingese was born in California and commenced its Canadian campaign when only nine months of age by winning Best in the Toy Group at Victoria City Kennel Club, Victoria, B.C.

It completed its Championship while in British Columbia and then invaded the Ontario shows, where it won Best in Toy Group at Ottawa, Unionville, Brantford, Port Colborne and London.

In the United States, it won Best of Winners at Buffalo and Tonawanda in New York State; Detroit Huron Valley, and Oakland City in Michigan; Terre Haute and Evansville in Indiana; Dayton, Ohio, and several other American shows.

In addition to Fernray Chien Yu there are other top quality Pekingese in the same Kennels, and to add variety some excellent Chihuahuas have been imported which will be shown later this year. Mrs. Barnes and her daughter, Miss Dorothy Milne, have one of the most select Kennels of Toy Dogs in Eastern Canada.

CRUFT'S DOG SHOW

THE great event in London, England, in 1886, was Cruft's Dog Show, when 500 dogs of various breeds were exhibited. This year, 1950, there were 5,720 entries, to be shown in 12,319 classes.

The Show was divided into two days, as it was impossible to bench all the dogs at once in the Grand Hall of Olympia. On the first day, the Hounds, Terriers and Toy dogs were judged, the Best of that day's show being awarded to the Pekingese "Ch. Ku Chi of Caversham", owned by Miss I. M. de Pledge and Mrs. H. Lunham. This beautiful dog has won 28 challenge certificates, and had it not been shy of ear fringe, might have easily captured Best in Show honours, having had to defeat an entry of 337 Pekes before winning the Group and then top the first day's award.

Reserve Best in Show on the first day was the West Highland White Terrier "Ch. Shiningcliff Simon", owned by Mrs. J. Finch.

On the second day, given over to Gun dogs and Non-Sporting dogs, the English Cocker Spaniel "Tracey Witch of Ware", owned by H. S. Lloyd, one of an entry of 1,008 Cocker Spaniels, won Best in Show. Reserve Best in Show on that day was the Miniature Poodle, "Ch. Adastra Magic Beau", owned by Mrs. L. H. C. Coventon, a beautiful Blue which had topped an entry of 265 Miniature Poodles.

The four winners then met for the Best of the two days' show, and the English Cocker, "Tracey Witch of Ware", emerged as the Best of all

Breeds, repeating her win of 1949. Reserve for the two days' show was awarded to the Miniature Poodle, "Ch. Adastra Magic Beau".

Included in the Non-Sporting was the group which we know as the Working Group.

Honours for the most arduous task of the show must go, necessarily, to Mr. D. McDonald, who judged an entry of 616 Labrador Retrievers in twenty classes. In addition to placing the dogs, Mr. McDonald found time to take notes for his critique on the breed.

Second to the Cocker Spaniels in popularity was the Dachshund, with the Smooth coats having an entry of 387, the Long hairs 143, and Wire hairs 47. There were 78 Miniature Long haired and 76 Miniature Short haired, making a grand total of 721 of this breed. This was the second largest entry in the show. There were four judges assigned to this breed.

German Shepherds had an entry of 635, but the dogs and females were divided, making the judging task easier. Chesapeake Bay Retrievers numbered 448, so it is apparent that the hunting dogs are the strongest numerically than any other breed in England. The surprise of what we call the Working group was the exceptionally large entry of 444 Welsh Corgis (Pembroke). The Judge was Mrs. Thelma Gray, who in her critique suggested how harrassing it was to have only three prizes to award in classes having as many as 40 entrants. Mrs. Gray is very much in favour of the Continental system of awarding quali-

fications—grading the dogs "excellent", "very good", and "satisfactory". To grade the dogs in such a manner when the entries are large enough to warrant this, would do much to further the interest in exhibiting dogs, and also encourage the novice.

Mrs. Gray, having finished the Pembroke, then went on to judge 77 Cardigans with a total entry of 531 dogs which must surely be a record for one lady to judge in one day.

In the Toy breeds, the Pekingese led with an entry of 337, and as noted earlier, the winner of this breed went on to top the first day's judging. English Bulldogs, which one would quite expect to be amongst the largest in entry, had only 299, just a few over the Boxer entry of 287. Bull Terriers continue to lead the Terrier group, having an entry of 264. The Scottish Terrier followed closely with 255; Cairn Terriers came third with 253. There were 15 Miniature Bull Terriers entered. In this group was also a new breed known as the Maremo Sheep dog.

Another group with which we are not familiar was the Norwegian Buhund, 4 of which were entered. In the Toys, there was a breed called the Shih Tzu (pronounced "Sheed Zoo") with 18 entries. Apparently, this breed is the smallest in the Non-Sporting section. It is a Tibetan Apso and its name, Shih Tzu, really means Tibetan Lion Dog. Almost extinct in Tibet and China, it has been carefully nurtured in England until now it has become an established breed.

Collie fanciers will be interested to learn that there were 224 Rough Collies shown and 13 of the Smooth variety. One of the oddities at the show was the Bearded Collie, which is gradually coming back into its own. This breed of the Collie family is older than the Rough coat, and is credited with being the probable part ancestor of the old English Sheep dog. The head is square, with a pronounced beard. The discriminating drovers in Peebleshire are endeavouring to popularize this breed.

The English people were quite amused at the exhibition of Chihuahuas from Mexico. The one pictured in "Illustrated", an English magazine, does not look like the Chihuahua seen in the United States and Canada. According to this English paper, the Chihuahua's brain power is in ratio to that of a human being. The paper goes so far as to say that this breed has a pronounced brain cortex development which in proportion compares in size to the human, whereas other dogs, such as the Great Dane, allow only a limited space for brain development, leaving one to wonder how any reporter could be so naive.

However, that is not all—the "Sunday Express" went even further, and described a pictured German Shepherd as the four-and-a-half-year-old Cocker Spaniel which was Best in Show.

To get back to the Show itself—over 60,000 people attended. The building became so crowded that "sell out" notices were posted as early as three o'clock in the afternoon and it was necessary for the people to queue up outside and wait until others had left the hall before more could get in. It is a credit to the English Kennel Club, which sponsors this show, that there were only two cases of hysteria on the part of the dogs.

An amusing incident occurred during the first day's judging, when the man in charge of the televising asked if a Papillon could be taken into the Maltese ring for a few minutes. As a result, everyone with a Papillon descended upon the ring and the Maltese, their owners and the Judge were pushed off into a corner. As the Maltese judge had a very large entry, he did not enjoy the diversion.

Canadians Win at Buffalo

The Silver Anniversary All Breeds Show of the Kennel Club of Buffalo was the mecca for Canadians on February 25th and 26th.

Unfortunately, the catalogue which we had marked for the benefit of our readers was lost, so we are relying on memory for the major awards won by Canadians.

Perhaps the most thrilling of all the awards was that of the Terrier Group, when the Canadian bred white Bull Terrier female "Star of North Hill", bred and owned by Albert G. Hill, Toronto, was placed First. This is the first time in twenty years that a Canadian bred Bull Terrier has won such an award. "Star of North Hill" was the runner up for Best in Show All Breeds, being nosed out by the famous Boxer, "Ch. Mazelaine's Zarac Brandy", a Best of All Breeds in many shows, including the Westminster Kennel Club, New York.

First in the Hound Group was the Afghan Hound, Ch. Asri-Havid of Five Mile, owned by Mrs. Eva Gudgeon, of Bronte, Ont. In the Working Group, Mrs. Leroy G. Page, of Hamilton, Ont., took Third with Topsail's Captain Cook. In the Sporting Group, the English Setter, Int. Ch. Prune's Own Blue Moon, owned by Jack S. Thorndike, Jr., Mimico, Ont., placed Fourth in very fast company.

The largest entry in any breed from Canada was in the Great Danes, which were supporting the Great Dane Club of Western New York Specialty Show. Winners dog and Best of Breed were won by "Shirvan's Talisman", a Canadian bred dog owned by Robert E. Boyle, of Orchard Park, New York. Winners female was the Harlequin, "Noble Lady's Mona", owned by Mrs. Ellen Malcolm, of Stouffville, Ontario.

Other Canadians who won in Great Danes were: Mrs. T. C. Hopkins, Open dogs, Harlequin, took a First ribbon

with Graf Dane's Hurricane, and Shirley and Ivan Katkov took First in Limit, Females, with Shir-Van's Melissa. Second award winners were Shirley and Ivan Katkov with Robber Baron of Shir-Van's and Shir-Van's Carol. Third award winners were Charles S. Spratt with Lord Monty in the Puppy class; Claire Marie Miller with Graf Dane's War Paint, Open dogs, Harlequin; R. M. Doucette, Open dogs, with Warpaint; Elsie M. June and Iris Keen with Jeffrey's Jo Anne of Elm-Haven, Open Females (Brindle) and Lady Jennifer of Rurik, open any other colour.

Samuel Back took First in German Shepherds with Shoes of De Grassi. Incidentally, Mrs. Mary Weller scored the Second highest marks in the Obedience classes with Hexe of Briardale.

In Doberman Pinschers, Mr. F. Wickstrom took First Open and Winners Dogs with Tatjan of Reklaw. He also won third in Open Females with Glenna von Mannerheim. Mr. J. T. Webb won First in American bred with Spark of Troy, and Second in Novice with Lady Scarlet von Rommel. Miss Joy Wright won Second in Open Females with Trinkka von Edelwesen.

In the Welsh Corgis (Pembroke) Mrs. M. H. Page won Winners dogs and Best of Winners with Windrush Redwing. The Winners Female award was taken by the seven months old puppy, Alva Princess.

Dr. Roy N. Davis won First Open and Winners dogs with Showmans Finale's Tommy Canuck, First Open Females and Reserves Winners with Finale's Show Girl in Boston Terriers.

Ivy E. and George Sisson won the Novice Class with Topnotch's Tantalizing Witch, and Nora McIntee won Third Open with Regardless Gai Rhythm.

In the Labrador Retrievers, Dr. J. A. Campbell and Vincent Vaughan, Waterland Kennels, won First Open dogs and females. Lloyd G. Lymburner, took Second and Third in Open dogs with Covington Nimbeau and Covington Ace

Reporter. We have heard since that Covington Nimbeau won Best of Winners at the Michigan English Springer Spaniel Specialty Show held in conjunction with the Detroit Show, in an entry of 52, thereby gaining a five-point win.

We are sorry we do not have the balance of the Buffalo wins.

SUDBURY MAN IRED BY DOG BYLAW

Most municipalities have bylaws compelling owners of dogs to keep their pets confined during certain months of the year. Of course, even the strictest of bylaws won't stop Rover getting loose once in a while and going for an airing on his own, but most dog-owners make an honest attempt to comply with the regulations, whether they agree with said regulations or not.

Up in Sudbury, however, there's one chap who doesn't like the bylaw which says his dog mustn't run at large, and he intends doing something about it.

When Sudbury city council met one night, John J. Clemens, dog owner, was a deputation of one, to tell the council what he thought of the bylaw.

Said Mr. Clemens, "The bylaw ordering confinement of dogs in the summer months does not serve any more useful purpose than a bylaw designed to confine all licensed autos in the city for the same purpose."

He suggested that if the bylaw had been passed to protect children from dogs in hot weather, this danger was negligible, that they were in more danger from the unconfined motorcars.

If, on the other hand, the bylaw's purpose was to keep dogs out of gardens, Mr. Clemens maintained that that wasn't fair either, that it was up to the householders to put up fences around their gardens.

PINSCHERS (Miniature)

GENERAL APPEARANCE—A miniature of the Doberman Pinscher, having on a modified scale most of its physical qualifications and specifications, viz., symmetrical proportions, sturdy though slim, pert, lively, attentive, with well distributed muscle formation and a carriage suggestive of an active and lively temperament.

GENERAL FAULTS—Heavy set, coarse, poor quarters, too long or short coupled, knotting muscles, lethargic, timid or dull.

HEAD—The head should be in correct proportion to the body. As viewed from the side—elongated and tapering, with only a slight drop to the muzzle, which should be parallel to the top of the skull. As viewed from the top—narrow with well fitted but not too prominent forehead. As viewed from the front—the skull appears flat, tapering forward to the muzzle. Muzzle itself strong rather than fine and delicate and in proportion to the head as a whole; cheeks and lips small, taut and closely adherent to each other. Teeth in perfect alignment and apposition.

FAULTS—Too big or too small for body, too short or coarse, too long or fine or distorted, top too broad, forehead too prominent, skull too round or hollow with too much stop, poor teeth, jaws undershot or overshot.

EYES—Full, slightly oval, almost round, clear and bright, dark, even to a true black, set wide apart and fitted well into the sockets.

FAULTS—Too round and full, too small or large, too bulging or deep-set, too close or far apart.

EARS—Well set, placed form, upstanding (or when legal, cropped short, pointed and upstanding).

FAULTS—Poorly set, placed low, weak or hanging, or poorly-cropped.

NOSE—Black in black and tan, red or stag red.

FAULTS—Brown or spotted in black and tan, red or stag red.

NECK—Slightly arched, and gracefully curved, blending into the shoulders, relatively short, muscular, and free from throatiness. Length from occiput to withers equal distance from nose to occiput.

FAULTS—Too straight or too curved. Too thick or too thin. Too long or short, knotting muscles, loose, flabby or wrinkled skin.

BODY—Compact, wedge shaped, muscular with well sprung ribs, the base line of which is level with the points of the elbows; well knit muscular quarters set wide apart with back level or slightly sloping towards the rear. Length of males equals height, females may be slightly longer.

FAULTS—Chest too narrow or barrel shaped, quarters too wide or too close to each other, too thin or too fat, sloping rump, swayback, roachback, wryback, hips higher or considerably lower than shoulders.

LEGS AND FEET—Straight and upstanding as viewed from the front or rear with strong bone development and small joints; viewed from side—all adjacent bones should appear well angulated with well muscled stifles, short well developed hocks, well-knit flexible pasterns, strong, well-arched and closely knit toes with thick blunt nails.

FAULTS—Bow or X-legs—too thick or too thin bone development, large joints, thick stifles, large or crooked hocks, floating knee caps, weak pasterns, spreading flat feet, feet turning in or out.

TAIL—Set high, broad, held erect and cropped 1 to 2 inches.

FAULTS—Set too low, too thin, drooping, hanging or poorly cropped.

COAT—Thick, hard, short, straight, and lustrous, closely adhering to and uniformly covering the body.

FAULTS—Thin, too short, dull, upstanding, curly, dry, areas of various thickness or bald spots.

COLOR—1. Lustrous black with tan, rust-red or yellow markings on cheeks, lips lower jaw, throat, above eyes, twin spots on chest, lower half of forelegs, inside of hindlegs, and vent region. Black pencil stripes on toes. Faults—Light colored or white, very dark or sooty spots—in listed markings. 2. Solid Yellow. 3. Solid red or stag-red. 4. Solid brown or brown with red or yellow markings. 5. Solid blue or blue toned with red or yellow markings. 6. White with spots and ticking or grey with black, red or yellow markings. Faults: Yellowish white or greyish white in listed markings.

HEIGHT—Approximately eleven and a half inches at the shoulder or withers, with a slight variation permissible.

FAULTS—Too small or too large.

WEIGHT—Males: 6-10 lbs. Females—6½-10 lbs.

THE MALTESE

GENERAL APPEARANCE—Intelligent, sprightly, affectionate with long straight coat hanging evenly down each side, the parting extending from nose to root of tail. Although the frame is hidden beneath a mantle of hair the general appearance should suggest a vigorous well proportioned body.

WEIGHT—Not to exceed seven pounds. Smaller the better. Under three pounds ideal.

COLOR—Pure white.

COAT—Long, straight, silky but strong and of even texture throughout. No undercoat.

HEAD—In proportion to size of dog—should be of fair length; the skull slightly round, rather broad between the ears and moderately well defined at the temples, i.e., exhibiting a moderate amount of stop and not in one straight line from nose to occiput bone.

MUZZLE—Not lean nor snipy but delicately proportioned.

NOSE—Black.

EARS—Drop ears set slightly low, profusely covered with long hair.

EYES—Very dark—not too far apart—expression alert but gentle; black eye rims give a more beautiful expression.

LEGS—Short, straight, fine bones and well feathered.

FEET—Small with long feathering.

BODY AND SHAPE—Back short and level. Body low to ground, deep loins.

TAIL AND CARRIAGE—Tail well feathered with long hair, gracefully carried, its end resting on the hind quarters and side.

THE ENGLISH TOY SPANIELS

NOTE: Under the ruling of the American Kennel Club, passed December 16, 1902, Prince Charles, King Charles, Ruby and Blenheim Spaniels will, after January 1, 1903, be classed together as English Toy Spaniels.

HEAD—Should be well domed, and in good specimens is absolutely semi-globular, sometimes even extending beyond the half-circle, and absolutely projecting over the eyes, so as nearly to meet the upturned nose.

EYES—The eyes are set wide apart, with the eyelids square to the line of the face—not oblique or fox-like. The eyes themselves are large and dark as possible, so as to be generally considered black, their enormous pupils, which are absolutely of that color, increasing the description.

STOP—The "Stop", or hollow between the eyes, is well marked, as in the Bulldog, or even more so; some good specimens exhibit a hollow deep enough to bury a small marble in it.

NOSE—The nose must be short and well turned up between the eyes, and without any indication of artificial displacement afforded by a deviation to either side. The color of the end should be black and it should be both deep and wide with open nostrils. A light colored nose is objectionable, but shall not disqualify.

JAW—The muzzle must be square and deep, and the lower jaw wide between the branches, leaving plenty of space for the tongue and for the attachment of the lower lips, which should completely conceal the teeth. It should also be turned up or "finished", so as to allow of its meeting the end of the upper jaw, turned up in a similar way as above described. A protruding tongue is objectionable, but does not disqualify.

EARS—The ears must be long, so as to approach the ground. In an average-sized dog they measure 20 inches from tip to tip, and some reach 22 inches or even a trifle more. They should be set low down on the head and hang flat to the sides of the cheeks, and be heavy feathered.

SIZE—The most desirable size is from 9 pounds to 12 pounds.

SHAPE—In compactness of shape these Spaniels almost rival the Pug, but the length of coat adds greatly to the apparent bulk, as the body, when the coat is wetted, looks small in comparison with that dog. Still, it ought to be decidedly "cobby", with strong stout legs, short broad back and wide chest.

COAT—The coat should be long, silky, soft and wavy, but not curly. There should be a profuse mane, extending well down in the front of the chest, the feather should be well displayed on the ears and feet, and in the latter case so thickly as to give the appearance of being webbed. It is also carried well up the back of the legs. In the black and tan the feather on the ears is very long and profuse, exceeding that of the Blenheim by an inch or more. The feather on the tail (which is cut to the length of about 1½ inches) should be silky, and from 3 to 4 inches in length, constituting a marked "flag" of a square shape, and not carried above the level of the back.

COLOR—The color varies with the variety. The black and tan is a rich glossy black and deep mahogany tan; tan spots over the eyes, and the usual markings on the muzzle, chest and legs are also required. The ruby is a rich chestnut red, and is whole-colored. The presence of a few white hairs intermixed with the black on the vest of a Black and Tan, or intermixed with the red on the chest of a Ruby Spaniel, shall carry weight against a dog, but shall not in itself absolutely disqualify; but a white patch on the chest or white on any other part of a Black and Tan or Ruby Spaniel shall be a disqualification. The Blenheim must on no account be whole-colored, but should have a ground of pure pearly white, with bright rich chestnut or ruby red markings evenly distributed in large patches.

The ears and cheeks should be red, with a blaze of white extending from the nose up the forehead and ending between the ears in a crescentic curve. In the center of this blaze at the top of the forehead there should be a clear "spot" of red, of the size of a sixpence. The tri-color should in part have the tan of the Black and Tan, with markings like the Blenheim in black instead of red on a pearly-white ground. The ears and under the tail should also be lined with tan. The tri-color has no "spot" that beauty being peculiarly the property of the Blenheim.

THE YORKSHIRE TERRIER

GENERAL APPEARANCE—Should be
that of a long-coated Toy Terrier, the
coat hanging quite straight and evenly
down each side, a parting extending from
the nose to the end of the tail.

The animal should be very compact
and neat, the carriage being very up-
right, and having an important air. The
general outline should convey the exist-
ence of a vigorous and well-proportioned
body.

HEAD — Should be rather small and
flat, not too prominent or round in the
skull, nor too long in the muzzle, with
a perfect black nose. The fall on the
head to be long, of a rich golden tan,
deeper in color at the sides of the head
about the ear roots, and on the muzzle
where it should be very long. The hair
on the chest a rich bright tan. On no
account must the tan on the head extend
on to the neck, nor must there be any
sooty or dark hair intermingled with any
of the tan.

EYES — Medium, dark and sparkling,
having a sharp, intelligent expression,
and placed so as to look directly for-
ward. They should not be prominent,
and the edge of the eyelids should be
of dark color.

EARS — Small V-shaped, and carried
semi-erect, or erect, and not far apart,
covered with short hair, color to be of a
very deep rich tan.

MOUTH—Perfectly even, with teeth as
sound as possible. An animal having
lost any teeth through accident not a
fault providing the jaws are even.

BODY—Very compact, and a good loin.
Level on the top of the back.

COAT—The hair on body moderately
long and perfectly straight (not wavy),
glossy like silk, and of fine silky texture.
Color, a dark steel blue (not silver blue)
extending from the occiput (or back of
skull) to the root of the tail, and on no
account mingled with fawn, bronze or
dark hairs.

LEGS — Quite straight, well covered
with hair of a rich golden tan a few
shades lighter at the ends than at the
roots, not extending higher on the fore-
legs than the elbow, nor on the hindlegs
than the stifle.

FEET—As round as possible, and the
toe-nails black.

TAIL — Cut to medium length; with
plenty of hair, darker blue in color than
the rest of the body, especially at the
end of the tail, and carried a little higher
than the level of the back.

TAN—All tan hair should be darker at
the roots than in the middle, shading to
a still lighter tan at the tips.

HEAD—A well rounded "Apple Dome" skull, with or without Molera. Cheeks and jaws lean. Nose moderately short, slightly pointed (self-colored, in blond types or black). In moles, blues, and chocolate, they are self-colored. In blond types pink nose permissible.

EARS—Large, held erect when alert, but flaring at the sides at about an angle of 45 degrees when in repose. This gives breadth between the ears.

EYES—Full, but not protruding, balanced, set well apart — dark, ruby, or luminous. (Light eyes in blond types, permissible.)

TEETH—Level.

NECK AND SHOULDERS — Slightly arched, gracefully sloping into lean shoulders, may be smooth in the very short types or with ruff about neck preferred. Shoulders lean, sloping into a slightly broadening support above straight forelegs that are set well under, giving a free play at the elbows. Shoulders should be well up, giving balance and soundness, sloping into a level back. (Never down or low.) This gives a chestiness, and strength of forequarters, yet not of the "Bulldog" chest, plenty of brisket.

BACK AND BODY—Level back, slightly longer than height. Shorter backs desired in males. Ribs rounded (but not too much "Barrel-Shaped").

HINDQUARTERS — Muscular with hocks well apart, neither out or in, well let down, with firm sturdy action.

TAIL — Moderately long, carried cycle either up or out, or in a loop over the back with tip just touching the back (Never tucked under). Hair on tail in harmony with the coat of the body, preferred furry. A natural bob-tail or tailless permissible, if so born, and not against a good dog.

FEET—Small, with toes well split up, but not spread, pads cushioned, with fine pasterns (Neither the "Hare" nor the "Cat" foot). A dainty small foot with nails moderately long.

COAT—In the smooth, the coat should be soft texture, close and glossy. (Heavier coats with undercoats permissible.) Coat placed well over body with ruff on neck, and more scanty on head and ears.

COLOR—Any color—solid, marked or splashed.

WEIGHT—One to six pounds, with two to four pounds preferable. If two dogs are equally good in type, the more diminutive is preferred.

GENERAL APPEARANCE — A graceful, alert, swift-moving little dog with saucy expression. Compact, and with terrier-like qualities.

DISQUALIFICATIONS — Cropped tail, broken down or cropped ears.

THE ITALIAN GREYHOUND

GENERAL APPEARANCE—A miniature English Greyhound, more slender in all proportions, and of ideal elegance and grace in shape, symmetry and action.

HEAD—Skull, long, flat and narrow. Muzzle, very fine, nose dark, teeth level. Ears, rose shaped, placed well back, soft and delicate. Eyes rather large, bright and full of expression.

BODY—Neck, long and gracefully arched. Shoulders, long and sloping, chest, deep and narrow. Back, curved and drooping at the hind quarters.

LEGS AND FEET—Forelegs, straight, set well under the shoulders, fine pasterns, small delicate bones. Hindlegs, hocks well let down, thighs muscular. Feet, the long "hare foot."

TAIL—Rather long, fine and with low carriage.

COAT—Skin fine and supple, hair thin and glossy like satin.

COLOR—All shades of fawn, red, mouse, blue, cream and white are recognized, black and tan terrier markings not allowed.

ACTION—High stepping and free.

SIZE—Two classes, one of eight pounds and under and one over eight pounds. A good small dog is preferable to an equally good large one but a good larger dog is preferable to a poor smaller one.

THE PUG

SYMMETRY—Symmetry and general appearance, decidedly square and cobby. A lean leggy Pug and a dog with short legs and a long body are equally objectionable.

SIZE AND CONDITION—The Pug should be multum in parvo, but this condensation (if the word may be used), should be shown by compactness of form, well-knit proportions, and hardness of developed muscle. Weight from 14 to 18 pounds (dog or female), desirable.

BODY—Short and cobby, wide in chest and well-ribbed up.

LEGS—Very strong, straight, of moderate length, and well under.

FEET—Neither so long as the foot of the hare, nor so round as that of the cat, well split-up toes, and the nails black.

MUZZLE—Short, blunt, square, but not upfaced.

HEAD—Large, massive, round—not apple-headed, with no indentation of the skull.

EYES—Dark in color, very large, bold and prominent, globular in shape, soft and solicitous in expression, very lustrous, and when excited, full of fire.

EARS—Thin, small, soft, like black velvet. There are two kinds, the "Rose"

and "Button." The preference is given to the latter.

MARKINGS—Clearly defined. The muzzle or mask ears, moles on cheeks, thumb-mark or diamond on forehead, back-trace should be as black as possible.

MASK—The mask should be black. The more intense and well defined it is the better.

WRINKLES—Large and deep.

TRACE—A black line extending from the occiput to the tail.

TAIL—Curled tightly as possible over the hip. The double curl is perfection.

COAT—Fine, smooth, soft, short and glossy, neither hard nor woolly.

COLOR—Silver or apricot-fawn. Each should be decided, to make the contrast complete between the color and the trace and the mask. Black.

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... DOTS AND DASHES - - -

In October, 1949, we wrote of the rules governing the excess powder remaining on a dog when being exhibited at an American Kennel Club Show. It was written to assist those Canadians who are planning to attend the Shows, in order that they would know the rules.

That this rule means just what it states, was brought to our notice at the recent dog shows held in the United States, when several dogs were not given awards because of excess chalk remaining on the coats when taken into the ring. The exhibitors were soon aware that when rules are made by the American Kennel Club they are enforced, regardless.

Chalk may be used to clean the dogs, but there must be no foreign substance in or on the coat when examined by the judge. Contrary to reports which have been printed, the dogs are not ordered from the ring, thereby causing embarrassment to their owners, but a notation is made in the Judge's book giving the reason why an award is not made.

As some very prominent Judges were criticized at the recent Westminster Kennel Club Show for obeying this rule a statement was sent out by that organization to the Press, informing the public of their absolute confidence in the integrity of their judges, and thanking them for the manner in which their assignments had been handled.

Members will be interested, no doubt, in the fact that the American Kennel Club general income for 1949 was \$827,864. Their recording fees totalled \$54,513, allowing the club to operate at a profit. The total number of dogs registered in the American Kennel Club for 1949 was 241,811.

We do not have the complete figures for the total registrations in the English Kennel Club, but for the eleven months of 1949 they were 100,144, and it is significant to note that cross breeds are allowed to be registered. Over there, Spaniels are still on top in registrations, with German Shepherds second, Fox Terriers third, Pekingese fourth, Labradors fifth and Welsh Corgis sixth.

When Obedience Trials originated in the United States, the purpose was to demonstrate the usefulness of the purebred dog as the companion and guardian of man, and only purebred dogs are allowed to compete in Obedience Trials in the United States and Canada. In England, however, a special registrar has been opened to allow dogs of unknown pedigree and also cross bred dogs to compete in Obedience classes. It is doubtful, however, that such dogs would be allowed to compete in the Trials on this side of the Atlantic.

In the case of dogs purchased by a breeder which have not been tattooed, the owner may tattoo the dog with his own tattoo letters and a number, but omit the year letter. By omitting the year letter, this is a means of distinguishing those dogs from the ones that are born his property. This will also apply to dogs which are imported from other countries which do not use tattooing as a means of identification.

Partnerships are reminded that identification allotted to a partnership may not be used in identifying dogs which are born the property of one part of the partnership. Similarly, letters allotted to a individual person may not be used to identify dogs born the property of a partnership.

Space will not permit publication of all the winners at Cruft's Show, but if any of our readers wish to know of the particular wins of any dog or any breed, please write us and we will be glad to furnish them.

While Cruft's Show might sound like a stupendous task, it would not seem so to those of us who have seen the marvellous manner in which the Morris and Essex outdoor show is conducted each year at Giralda Farms, Madison, N.J. We well remember the big show just before the war, when 4,456 dogs were judged in six hours. Opening at ten o'clock in the morning, by four o'clock the large ring was ready for the Groups and Best in Show, and everyone was on their way home by six o'clock.

Though Cruft's is, no doubt, a very big affair, it has yet to equal such a record for one day's judging. May 27th is the day on which the 20th Annual Dog Show of the Morris and Essex Kennel Club will be staged, this year.

Our apologies to Fred Welsh of St. Catharines, for omitting the sensational win of First Open and Winners' dogs in English Setters at the Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York, with Rip of Fair Glen. Rip is a Canadian bred dog, having been bred by Mr. F. L. Rife of Toronto, whose English Setters continue to score sensational wins.

Canadian fanciers were shocked to hear of the sudden death in Buffalo of Mrs. Ethel Bixby of El-Bix Kennels, Buffalo, N.Y. Mrs. Bixby had shown Kerry Blues and Boxers for many years, at not only the Ontario shows, but also in Western Canada where she made many sincere friends.

Every spring, with the same regularity that marks the arrival of the season, there comes an outcry against dogs

from almost everyone but dog-lovers.

Some of the complaints are doubtless justified, as in the case of farmers whose sheep have been killed, or gardeners whose careful efforts have been destroyed, and the result is frequently a campaign against all stray dogs which sometimes results in injustices.

No man or woman with a scrap of kindness in his or her makeup has any ill will against the canine breed, and the movement for kindness to animals has made rapid strides as human sympathies have grown broader and at least the baser sort of cruelties are punishable by law.

Yet while it is unwise to recommend further restrictions, particularly when they affect what is termed personal liberty, it does seem as if something more could be done about dogs. There are so many of them that it does actually constitute a real problem, graver in the town or city than in the country. Every humane-minded person agrees that the dog catcher is, or should be, an obsolete institution. Like a great many other methods which society has adopted, it is starting at the wrong end.

Many families have dogs who have no right whatever to own them. They have absolutely no idea of training, feeding or caring for a dog, and when the result is a snappish, surly cur, the breed is blamed, rather than finding out the cruelty or neglect that has caused it.

It seems as if the purchaser of a dog or a dog license should be required to give some assurance that he or she is prepared to care for it properly; to look after it as a dog should be looked after, or else lose the right to keep one. It would prevent a great deal of misery and an equally great deal of trouble, if there were some other requirements beyond the mere possession of the sum necessary to purchase a dog license.

We see many dogs tied in unsuitable places day and night, winter or summer. Poor neglected, miserable creatures exposed to the sun in the hottest weather and the coldest winds in the winter. So thin one shudders to think of how little they must eat and usually no water near them to drink. Never exercised, these dogs have no life of their own and certainly are no pleasure to their owners.

Those who are responsible for laws compelling owners to tie up dogs should also be responsible to see these dogs who are deprived of their freedom and any chance to look out for themselves are properly cared for by their owners or taken from them. There are two sides to the story.

"We speak for those who cannot speak for themselves."

The Secretary reported that Group Captain W. E. Baker, Cobourg, Ontario, a former Director of the Club, had passed away. The Secretary was directed to send flowers to Mrs. Baker along with a message expressing the deepest sympathy of the Officers and Directors of the Club.

The Secretary reported that Mr. Peter Herd, a member of the Club for many years, was ill in the Private Patients Pavillion of the Toronto General Hospital. ACTION: The Secretary was directed to approve of the above mentioned application provided its name was altered so that it would not indicate Dominion or province wide status.

The Board adjourned the meeting for lunch.

The meeting reconvened with Vice-President Riedel in the Chair. Officers and Directors present included: W. J. Risewick, Paddy Boughs, Mrs. Ellen Brown and J. J. Farmer.

1524 (1522). DATES, JUDGES, SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

SUBJECT: The Secretary read letters from Mrs. A. L. Wilkie and Mrs. Ethel Webb, President and Secretary respectively of the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association, regarding the wish of the Association to hold a sanction show on April 19th and a championship show on May 6th. The Secretary tabled two statutory declarations to which were attached documents purporting to be copy of "Certificate of Incorporation" of the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association and copy of "Constitution" of the said Association. Letters from Second Vice-President Williams and Director Mrs. G. O. Alsen were read.

The Secretary read letters from Mrs. C. Bloomfield to which were attached applications for permission to hold championship shows on April 14th and 15th, 1950.

ACTION: It was agreed that:

(a) The right of the group, submitting the above mentioned documents, to use the name "Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association" would be recognized unless or until such time as that right had been successfully challenged through legal channels;

(b) The applications for the dates—April 19th and May 6th—be approved;

(c) Mrs. C. Bloomfield be informed of the decision reached by the Board, and informed that if those who had heretofore functioned under the name "Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association" wished to stage championship shows applications should be submitted under another club name, and such applications would receive the Board's consideration.

SUBJECT: The Secretary tabled petitions regarding the number of dog clubs holding dog shows under Canadian Kennel Club rules on Vancouver Island.

ACTION: The Board agreed that it was not prepared to place limitations on the number of clubs operating within a given area, nor the number of shows that may be allowed within a given area.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Island Terrier Club who reported that the Club deemed it inadvisable to proceed with its championship show to have been held on March 4th, 1950, because of a Terrier Specialty show to be held at Seattle on March 5th.

Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that an enquiry had been received from the American Kennel Club regarding an application to judge all breeds received from Dr. Wilfred E. Shute, London, Ont., and reported that the American Kennel Club had been advised that Dr. Shute was approved as a judge of all breeds and had officiated as judge of all breeds at a show held at Winnipeg on September 20th, 1949.

ACTION: No further action was considered necessary.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that:

(a) A night letter had been received from Frank Creasey, Show Secretary for the Point Grey Kiwanis Kennel Association show to be held on March 1st and 2nd, seeking approval of two prizes—\$250.00 for each Best in Show—donated by Mr. M. J. Davies after the premium lists for the shows had been mailed;

(b) He had given approval to the additional prizes conditional that all those to whom premium lists had originally been mailed were notified of the two additional prizes promptly;

(c) A postcard notice apparently mailed by the Show Secretary appeared to indicate that the money donated by Mr. Davies would be distributed for "unclassified and group specials."

ACTION: Following discussion the Secretary's action in approving the offering of the two prizes was endorsed, and the Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Creasey that:

(a) The prizes must be offered as approved by the Secretary;
(b) No other prizes could be offered except those set forth in the premium list and these two additional prizes approved by the Secretary;

(c) All those who entered dogs in the shows must be promptly notified of the distribution of the two additional prizes approved by the Secretary.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Barrie Kennel Club seeking approval of their staging an "All Breeds Special Class" open only to members of the Barrie Kennel Club at their championship show to be held on May 13th.

ACTION: The arrangement was endorsed by the Board conditional that entries for the class are accepted in the same way as for other classes, and the class is judged after Best in Show and the other General Specials.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Barrie Kennel Club stating that they wished to proceed with the printing and distribution of entry forms for their show, and enquiring whether or not it would be advisable to include on their entry form reference to the proposed 25c additional charge included in a proposed amendment to come before the annual general meeting.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform the Barrie Kennel Club that the Board was not in a position to forecast any decision that may be reached at the annual general meeting regarding the proposed 25c extra levy on each entry.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the New Brunswick Kennel Club seeking information about correspondence dealt with by the Board following the New Brunswick Kennel Club championship shows held on September 14th and 15th, 1949.

ACTION: The letter was ordered tabled.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Quebec Kennel Club seeking permission to continue the practice of publishing in one cover the catalogue for its two one-day shows.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform the Quebec Kennel Club that the Board had no objection to this arrangement.

DISCUSSION: The Board discussed a number of conditions in respect to sanction shows.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to draw the attention of clubs holding sanction shows to the following points:

(1) The names of owners are not to be posted in judges' books;

(2) Only dogs which are registered with the Canadian Kennel Club or are eligible for registration with the Canadian Kennel Club may be exhibited;

(3) Ribbons only are to be distributed; cards must not be used;

(4) Posters or other literature must not suggest or imply that dogs other than those registered with the Canadian Kennel Club or eligible for registration with the Canadian Kennel Club may be entered;

(5) Judges are to be informed that it is the wish of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club that ribbons and prizes be withheld from dogs that are not representative specimens of their respective breeds, and the owners of such dogs are to be informed, in a diplomatic fashion, that ribbons and prizes cannot be awarded to dogs that are not representative specimens of their respective breed.

SUBJECT: Director Farmer referred to his earlier suggestion that each approved judge be provided with a copy of the Dog Show Rules and advice to the effect that he is expected to be governed by the Rules and to judge according to the standards adopted by the Canadian Kennel Club. It was further suggested that each judge be instructed that he alone is to hand out ribbons and this duty is not to be transferred to a ring steward or any other show official.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to carry out the suggestions advanced by Director Farmer.

SUBJECT: The Secretary tabled a proposed new layout for a judge's book.

ACTION: The new style of judge's book was approved, and the Secretary was directed to charge show-giving clubs \$1.00 for each judge's book.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the President of the Collie and Shetland Sheepdog Club of Canada pointing out that their Club had arranged a sanction show on February 6th to coincide with the annual meetings of the Canadian Kennel Club, and since the annual meetings had been postponed their Club felt that there should be a rebate on its advertisement, and their club should have the privilege of holding a sanction show immediately prior to the annual meetings.

DISCUSSION: Director Farmer reported that in conversation with the President of the Collie and Shetland Sheepdog Club it was not their wish that any further action be taken in respect to these matters.

ACTION: It was agreed that no action be taken.

SUBJECT: The Secretary requested an instruction regarding the offering of prize certificates by the Club.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to follow the same policy as in effect during 1949 regarding prize certificates offered by the Club for Best in Show, Best Canadian-bred in Show and Best Canadian-bred Puppy in Show.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported on letters received from J. Brooks, Calgary, and Mrs. M. Gibson, Cowichan Station, B.C., regarding judging at championship shows.

ACTION: The letters were ordered tabled.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported on a letter received from the Professional Handler's Association of Canada re cancellation of entries at championship shows (see item No. 1471).

ACTION: The letter was ordered referred to the Board of Directors at its annual meeting.

1526. APPOINTMENT OF REPRESENTATIVES

REPORT: The President reported that:

- (a) It is customary for the Club, at its annual general meeting, to appoint the Club's representatives to the Canadian National Exhibition Association, Royal Agricultural Winter Fair Association, Central Canada Exhibition Association, and the Western Fair Association;
- (b) With the annual general meeting set for March 29th it would not be possible for the members to appoint the representatives before that information would be required by the Exhibition Associations in connection with its annual meetings.

The President suggested that, subject to the action taken at the annual general meeting, the representatives elected at last year's annual general meeting should carry on in the interim until the members appointed representatives at the coming annual general meeting.

ACTION: The Board agreed that the Secretary should write the Exhibition Associations as suggested by the President.

—The President took the chair.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that it is customary for the Board, at its annual meeting, to appoint the Club's representatives to the Canadian National Live Stock Records Board.

DISCUSSION: Since the annual meeting of the Records Board is scheduled for March 30th, the Board agreed that the appointments should be made at this time.

ACTION: The following were named the Club's representatives to the Canadian National Live Stock Records Board for 1950: Douglas Riedel, Paddy Boughs, Mrs. Ellen Brown, J. J. Farmer and C. S. Spratt.

Now about "DOGS IN CANADA", as I promised in last month's issue. In 1948 you will remember, when trying to build up the issues, our Editor made a suggestion which was adopted by some Clubs and resulted in the December issue being a most outstanding

one. It is my contention that every issue of "DOGS IN CANADA" could be on a par with that number, with a little more co-operation from the various Clubs and their Breeder Members, and at very little cost per capita. Just for a moment, let's take a look at the importance of "DOGS IN CANADA" from a financial point of view. If you will read the Financial Statement as published in the March issue, 1950, you will observe that, had it not been for "DOGS IN CANADA" the operations of the C.K.C. during 1949 would have finished up in the 'red' to the extent of \$304.95. Fortunately, for all concerned, "DOGS IN CANADA" came through with an excess of revenue over expenditures of \$1,078.41, thus clearing the C.K.C. deficit and leaving a surplus of \$773.46 on the year's activities. This, undoubtedly, was brought about by the issuance of what may be termed "Wafer thin sandwich editions", supported only by the hard work of our Editor, and the few enthusiastic paying advertisers; together with taking the dangerous risk of losing the interest of the Members and the readers at large. Now the point is this. Nobody buys, or is interested in, a magazine just for the fun of reading the advertisements in it! There must be some other interesting material in it to engage the intelligence of the person who buys it, otherwise he might just as well buy a roll of toilet paper. It is through this, what I call, "some other interesting reading material" that an otherwise disinterested party notices an advertisement and decides to make a purchase. In other words, the financing of a magazine should not be expected to come entirely from the advertisers; the company that owns the magazine should do something about it too and thereby help create a circulation that will, in turn, bring about the desired quantity of advertising to make the publication pay for itself, eventually.

Of course, the Editor's suggestion I spoke of, is a good one in-so-far as "DOGS IN CANADA" is concerned. If each Kennel Club throughout the Dominion would arrange to take a full page periodically, divided among its



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breeder members the cost would be very small to each one advertising; it would be a great help towards obtaining our objective and, at the same time have a fourfold beneficial effect on the welfare of all concerned—assist in increasing the standard of the magazine, keep the Kennel Clubs and their breeder members constantly before the readers; and create an interest in Canada's only dog magazine of any note at present. So-o-o! what have you to offer our Editor? If your kennels and their inmates are as good as you say they are, and worth as much as you say they are worth, then they are worth advertising in "DOGS IN CANADA! If your Kennel Club is as good as you say it is, and it is worth patronizing when it puts on a show, then it is worth the cost of keeping its name before the readers all the time. The Specialty Clubs have done good work along this line in the past. Why not all the other Clubs take a leaf out of their books and try it out? You'll be surprised at the results! Let's go! And good luck to you all!

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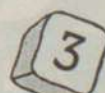

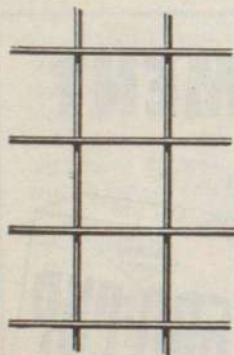

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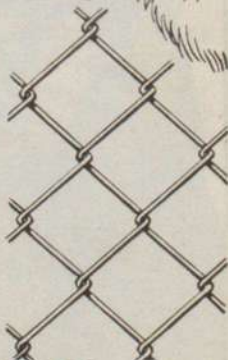

Many people take home a dog with no idea of the responsibility it involves, Miss Warnock said. They don't know how to look after it when they get it home.
