Our Cover, this month, presents the beautiful Pointer Field Trial Champion "Ariel Spunky Girl" owned and trained by Dr. Alan Secord, B.V.Sc., M.Sc., D.V.Sc., of Toronto.

We are naturally very proud of this dog, as she has not only set a record in Canada for Field Trial work, but has proven beyond a doubt that ability to work is inherited, which when followed through by proper training produces the ultimate in sporting dogs.

"Ariel Spunky Girl" is not just a Field Trial dog. Her owner believes in a dog being useful at all times and, therefore, in addition to the training which he has given her for Field Trial work, he uses her as a personal Gun Dog on his shooting expeditions.

Her granddam is Dual Champion "Sally of Moydrum", who was bred by Dr. C. A. Temple of Unionville, Ontario, and given as a puppy to Dr. Secord. "Sally of Moydrum" was sent to the United States to be bred to "Spunky Creek Boy", who holds the world's record as the sire of Field Trial Champions. His sire, in turn, "Village Boy", had held that record previously to his son taking over. From this mating came the great Field Trial winning litter, which included "Sally's Spunky Cherokee", "Saddle", "Spunky", and "Spunky Creek Chocolate", all top field dogs. Cherokee was sent to be bred to "Marvellous", a son of the great "Ariel" and "Amazon's Village Girl", the latter a litter sister to "Spunky Creek Boy".

"Ariel" has won six National Field Trial Championships at the time of his death, which occurred while he was still a young dog, so few of his progeny are alive today. In Field Trial Champion "Ariel Spunky Girl" we have, then a concentration of the best bloodlines available for Field Trial work. That this breeding leads to success is evidenced by the fact that our Cover Girl won the award for Best Derby Stake winner of the year, and won her Field Trial Championship by taking two Firsts and one Second in the Open All Age Stake.

"Ariel Spunky Girl" was bred to the great Field Trial Champion Tyson, the winner of the \$1000 Stakes at Ft. Erie for two years in succession. Out of this litter are several potential field trial champions; one owned by Dick Toppa of Toronto, has already won one Puppy and Derby Stakes.

Dr. Alan Secord is one of the most active members in Field Trial Sport. He personally trains his dogs and is a familiar figure at Field Trials throughout the United States and Canada. As President of the Ontario Bird Dog Association, (Provincial), he has done a great deal to further Field Trial Sports in Canada.

Foreign Bodies

An extract from an address delivered by Dr. Secord at the Annual Meeting of the New York State Veterinary Medical Society at Rochester, N.Y.

IN the dog family, one of the favorite ways of attempted suicide is that of swallowing large and small undigestible foreign objects. In general, dogs are usually able to look after themselves and either get rid of these objects by regurgitation or by passage through the intestine with feces. However, the nature of the ingested object is often such that it becomes lodged in the oesophagus, stomach or intestine and would cause death if not removed.

Dog owners should be warned of the danger of giving their pets rubber toys to play with. These are frequently swallowed and often cause a fatal stoppage. The craze of youngsters several years ago to play with "Bo-Lo" balls, an arrangement of a small soft sponge ball attached with an elastic to a flat wooden bat, brought about an accompanying epidemic of gastrotomies necessitated to save the life of the family pet that swallowed one of these balls.

A dog bolts his food and when given cooked bones may hastily swallow a sharp pointed piece that lodges in the oesophagus or passes through the stomach undigested and cause an intestinal stoppage. Raw bones should be fed to dogs in preference to cooked bone as bone in the raw state is soft and easily digested and will not splinter. Certain dogs appear to have a specific mania for swallowing all kinds of objects. This unnatural appetite is recorded in many animals that have been maintained on an adequate diet so that it is not due to pica or perverted of some dietary deficiency.

X-ray equipment is essential in the correct diagnosis and removal of most foreign bodies. While it is true that a good clinician may suspect a foreign body there are many cases where he could not be sure of his diagnosis without the X-ray to confirm it and give the detail necessary to bring the case to a successful completion. If your practice does not warrant this expense it would be wise to make contact with a medical hospital or a neighboring practitioner where such equipment is available to check up on suspect cases. The prestige that goes with the successful handling of foreign bodies, along with the sense of confidence which follows correct diagnosis, is such that no veterinarian who does any amount of small animal practice can afford to be without X-ray equipment.

Foreign Bodies in the Oesophagus

The act of swallowing produces the most force in the upper tract so that objects seldom lodge in the upper two-thirds of the oesophagus. If there is any trouble it usually turns out to be a needle, pin or splinter of bone that

has become lodged crossways in the throat at the start of the oesophagus. Fluoroscopy is a wise procedure if the object is not at once apparent. Do not mistake the hyoid bone in the larynx for a bone splinter.

A foreign body which lodges in the lower oesophagus does not appear to cause the animal as much immediate distress as one that locates in the upper tract. Cases are sometimes present of long standing because of the vomiting that accompanies any attempt to swallow solid food rather than the idea on the part of the owner that there might be a bone lodged. All the cases which have been dealt with on my part where an object has become lodged in the thoracic oesophagus have been caused by a sharp bone. In each case the bone has been found to be just anterior to the oesophagus ring in the diaphragm. Apparently there is little if any power in the muscles of the oesophagus at this point. The fact that a dog will swallow food ravenously and then bring it up almost at once is diagnostic. This is the so-called meat test. When a dog swallows food he does so ravenously and then regurgitates it with a characteristic painful gulping and bringing the head downward and inward. A dog's digestion does not start until food reaches the stomach proper so that a sharp pointed bone that becomes lodged here will not be digested. Often liquids can pass alongside of the bone and life can be maintained for months. A probang or stomach tube may be passed successfully without dislodging the bone or pushing it down to the stomach where it would be digested. Other cases are on record where the irritation of the sharp points finally caused a perforation and death from pleurisy from the resulting infection.

The variety and nature of objects that dogs swallow and locate in the stomach would indeed make up a long list. Included are sponge rubber and hollow balls, hard rubber toys, stones, metal objects such as keys, rings, tap handles, beer bottle tops among the objects easily demonstrated under the X-ray or fluoroscope to cellophane, corn cobs, kid gloves, silk stockings, butchers twine, hard packed dry grass, hair balls, etc., that require some contrast medium or special technique to arrive at a definite diagnosis even with the aid of the X-ray. I am sure that every practicing veterinarian could relate oddities in the nature of objects recovered from the stomach.

Here are two cases that we have encountered.

Sally was a beautiful spotted Dalmatian puppy and a most attractive Christmas present, but when she started to grow the owners finally decided she was no apartment model and gave her to relatives living on a farm. A few weeks before the lady of the house missed a string of precious pearl

beads and a thorough search of the house failed to find them. One day four months later a long distance telephone call from the farm told the story that Sally, now a grown dog, had been allowed into the kitchen as a special treat because of a violent storm and, apparently because of the unaccustomed heat of the stove, had been sick and brought up of all things the missing string of pearls.

The prize story is that of a golden Retriever pup that was presented feeling quite seedy after spending the evening eating all and sundry of the refreshments provided at a stag poker party. The overindulgence was treated with apomorphine and the pup presented us with 24 poker chips of assorted colours, red, white and blue, along with the bologna and other remnants of party refreshments. The owner when communicated with by telephone sent his chauffeur post haste to reclaim the chips and straighten out some argument that had developed when the party broke up the previous night.

The symptoms shown by a dog with a gastric foreign body are not constant and depend a great deal on the character of the material and size of the object ingested. Rubber and metal objects may remain for weeks and sometimes months without causing violent symptoms. There is usually a history of vomiting and periodic attacks of inappetence and indigestion. Temperature usually remains normal. Animals sometimes are able to take fluids but cannot retain solid food. Other cases will eat solid food without trouble but are prone to vomit water. A talk with the owner will often give us a clue. We may find for instance that his dog has a habit of playing with small objects or that a small ball or rubber toy has disappeared. The easy cases are of course the ones where the owner suspects or knows that the object has been swallowed. I would say that any gastric condition that is chronic and fails to respond to routine treatment should be classified as a suspect foreign body and steps taken to make a thorough examination.

The removal of foreign bodies from the stomach may be accomplished in four ways. By vomiting induced by an emetic, passage through the intestine and out with the feces, by long instruments working under the fluoroscope and grasping the object and pulling it up and out the mouth, and by surgical intervention.

Foreign Bodies in the Intestine

Obstructing foreign bodies in the intestine are those small enough to pass through the pylorus and on into the small intestine and yet large enough that they are not able to negotiate the entire tract. Once they become lodged inflammation sets in and causes a com-

plete stoppage. The higher the object locates the earlier and more severe are the symptoms. If the object is rough-sided and allows some gas and fluids to pass the symptoms will not be as severe as if there is a complete stoppage with gas anterior to the object. The higher the object locates the more persistent and violent the vomiting becomes. Vomiting is the earliest and most constant symptom of intestinal obstruction. Because of the vomiting the patient rapidly becomes dehydrat-

ed. The combination of nausea, abdominal pain and rapid dehydration produce a characteristic expression that will often lead one to suspect an intestinal obstructing foreign body even sudden illness with loss of appetite, vomiting and excessive thirst. In the before a clinical examination has been made.

The history is usually that of a early stages the temperature is normal but tends to rise to several degrees the longer the obstruction persists. Intes-

tinal foreign bodies are often palpable and are characterized by their mobility. The free movement of the small intestine is such that often the object slips away from the probing fingers and is pushed either backward into the pelvis or forward into the costal region. Careful palpation is necessary and may sometimes be helped by a digital rectal examination while the other hand pushes the abdominal content backward so that one can feel it with the fingertip in the rectum.

Captain of the K-9 Corps

At the recent Sportsmen's Kennel Club Show, exhibitors were entertained each evening by Mr. and Mrs. Sonny Moore of Litchfield, Ohio, with a few of their dogs from the Roustabout Act, which was the highlight of the Sportsmen's Show, held in the Coliseum, Toronto.

The outstanding dog in this amazing troupe of dog comedians is a pure-bred German Shepherd, a veteran of World War Two. It was the dignity of this German Shepherd Dog which drew our attention to him.

Sonny Moore met 'Captain' in the Army when he graduated from training seeing-eye dogs for blinded soldiers to training scout dogs for the famed K-9 corps. When the Japanese invaded Pearl Harbour, Mr. and Mrs. Skelly of Oakland California joined the Services. Mr. Skelly was an officer in the Navy, Mrs. Skelly joined the Nursing Service, and their dog, Captain, was enlisted in the K-9 corps, where he served with the 26th Infantry Scout Dog Platoon, attached to the 6th Army. This Platoon, in which Sonny Moore was a sergeant, was shipped to the South Pacific, and after receiving special jungle training at Biak, New Guinea, they went into action at Lingayen Gulf on Luzon. As these intensively trained dogs were paired off with a soldier, Sonny Moore chose Captain, and as scouts, they patrolled ahead of all advance units and thus were exposed to the first fire from enemy ambushes, rear guards, snipers and the dangers of land mines and booby traps. In this campaign, of 20 men and 26 dogs in the original unit, 14 dogs and 8 men were lost in action, and the platoon won 12 bronze stars, 2 silver stars and numerous commendations. During one reconnaissance through Balute Pass, Captain was severely wounded, when he threw himself in front of Sonny Moore during a skirmish, and although the dressing station was many miles away, Sonny carried the dog on his back through the enemy-infested area, staying with the dog until he was recovered sufficiently to be sent back to the United States.

Dogs donated to the war services were returned to their civilian homes, and Captain was returned to Mrs. Skelly, whose Navy husband had been killed in action, but Captain was not happy, even though he was home

again. Finally, when he became so emaciated, Mrs. Skelly appealed to the Army to locate the man who had gone through the war with her dog, for Captain's interest could be aroused only when he saw a young man in an Army uniform. Radio and newspapers joined in the search and Sonny Moore was finally located at Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he was de-training war dogs back to civilian lives.

Life for Cap now is perhaps as noisy as it was in the South Pacific campaign, but it is the noise of children laughing and the excitement of the stage. There is a dignified aloofness about him as he walks among the Poodles, Terriers and Bulldogs of Sonny's act, but he loves every moment of it. Sonny maintains the reason he didn't like being returned to his old home was that life was just too quiet for him—he had got used to lots of excitement.

There are few remaining today among the four-footed veterans of World War II. They were expendable. They knew no fear. But Cap is one of those alive, and nowhere in this remarkable dog's personality are the marks of war visible except that he has lost most of his teeth from the bad water of New Guinea and bears the scars of shrapnel wounds. Now 13 years of age, he asks nothing more than to continue to be of service to his beloved master for no Shepherd asks more than that.

At the close of the Dog Show, Sonny Moore and his charming wife Patricia were given an ovation by the Dog Show officials and exhibitors, for their generosity in showing their animal version of Hellzapoppin. All we can add to this is that Sonny Moore and his Roustabouts are the grandest troupe of performers we have been privileged to see.

Welcome to Our Visitors

The following article was written for the Sportsmen's Dog Show catalogue and can be used by your club to fill that extra page in the catalogues.

THE dog show you are visiting represents the culmination of months of efforts on the part of the officials in charge. The cause is most worthy, for the profit derived therefrom will be used to alleviate the sufferings of all animals cared for by the Toronto Humane Society.

At this show you can see some of the finest dogs on the North American continent. Many recently returned from winning high awards at the large dog shows across the border. Also you have the privilege of meeting some of the finest sporting people in the world—those of the dog fancy.

On the benches and in the ring can be seen the dog breeders' gift to the sporting fraternity, for a breeder of dogs is unique in this field. Does it look comparatively easy to you? Can anyone go out and buy a dog with a pedigree of many generations and win just like that? Indeed no, a breeder and exhibitor of dogs must have not only the gift of understanding a dog's mentality, but the knowledge to produce a dog by selective breeding; the ability to show the dog so that its faults are negligible; to raise, trim and condition a dog through to its championship is a real achievement.

We are proud of the Canadian dog breeders who have brought recognition to Canada in many other countries through their breeding of fine quality dogs. One of the greatest English bulldogs of all time was Dominion Fortitude, bred by Charles Webber, of London, Ontario. Having defeated all comers on this side of the Atlantic, the dog was sent to England where, after six months quarantine, he was shown and defeated the best that the English breeders had to offer. Elliott Humphries, of Ottawa, bred the great bull-terrier Haymarket Faultless which won Best in Show all breeds at the Westminster Kennel Club in Madison Square Gardens, New York City. Leonard Collins, of Toronto, bred that wonderful Old English Sheepdog Ideal Weather which won Best in Show at Morris and Essex, Madison, N.Y., the largest outdoor show in the world, and also the International Show at Chicago, Illinois.

At the thirty-first annual championship show held at Johannesburg, South Africa, the Dobermann Pinscher Int. Ch. Flame Von Mannerheim, bred by Dr. Wilfred Shute, of Guelph, Ont., won Best Dog in Show all breeds.

In Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, China, Japan, South

America, Europe, Canadian dogs have been shown and won and always the call comes back for more, as the Canadian bred dogs rate among the highest in the world today.

Recently, a Canadian bred fox terrier was acclaimed the best of all terriers at the New York show held in Madison Square Gardens. Sold as a pet, the dog was seen by a handler, purchased and sold to an American for a large sum of money. Not only good dogs are bred in Canada, but we have developed some of the finest judges of the breeds who travel extensively to adjudicate at shows throughout the world. Our handlers (those who condition and show dogs in the ring for the owners) not only have the knowledge of preparing and showing a dog but are alert to find good dogs, purchase and sell them for good prices. This not only brings money into Canada but enhances the value of the Canadian bred dog.

What is a Champion and what does it do to gain that title? Now that you are in the dog show and have seen the dogs on the benches, walk over to the ring where the judging is taking place. The judges are men and women of the highest integrity who have made a study of the breeds they are examining and the awards are made according to the standard of perfection by which the dog is rated.

It is necessary to have a series of eliminations for each breed, and to give each dog an opportunity to win, the classes are divided as follows: Puppy class, which is for all dogs up to the age of one year; the novice for dogs who have never won a first prize; the Canadian bred for dogs born in Canada; the bred by exhibitor class for dogs born the property of the exhibitor; and the open class, which is open to all dogs.

The first prize winners in each of these classes then compete for the Winners Award, and this is where the champions are started. According to the number of dogs competing the best of the first prize Winners is awarded points towards its championship. For instance if there are three dogs competing in the cocker spaniel breed, there will be but one point awarded, but if ten dogs compete four points are awarded. It is necessary for a dog to gain ten points under three different judges, to be confirmed as a champion by the Canadian Kennel Club.

The best of each breed then competes in its respective group so that only six dogs remain for the final judging. From these six is chosen the one which in the opinion of the judge is the best representative of the standard of its breed, and it is awarded the title of Best in Show All Breeds, the highest award in the dog show.

The color of the ribbons you see in the judging ring and on the benches has its own meaning. The green ribbon means the dog has won a special prize, the tri-color (red, white and blue) denotes Best of Breed; purple and gold, is the best of winners, royal purple is the winners ribbon which means the dog has now won points towards its championship; mauve is for reserve winners meaning the next best dog (should the winner be cancelled for infraction of the rules, etc., the reserve then steps up into the winners circle).

A first ribbon is blue in color, second is red, third is yellow and fourth is white. The group winners receive a rosette indicating first, second, third or fourth of the same color as the class ribbons. The best in show is tri-color with the award stamped on it in gold, reserve best in show is purple and white, while the best puppy receives a blue and pink rosette which color is applicable for either sex.

The only other awards a pure bred dog can win in a dog show are the Obedience degrees. Obedience Trials are also held at the show and this is well worth watching. Dogs are not bred for beauty and conformation alone, they must exercise their intelligence and so be of value as a companion, too. The dogs are taught to walk at heel without a restraining lead, to come when called, to stay in one position as long as desired, to retrieve objects, find lost articles, jump high and long obstacles, in brief to be of value beyond the reach of the average dog. The owners and trainers will show the dogs in this trial and the winners receive degrees as follows: C.D. (Companion dog), C.D.X. (Companion Dog Excellent), U.D. (Utility Dog). These letters when won are recorded after the dog's name on its pedigree, and appear as such on the entry in this catalogue.

The first dog of any breed to win all Obedience titles in both the United States and Canada was the Canadian bred Welsh Corgi (Pembroke) Int. Champion Windrush Redwing, C.D., C.D.X., U.D.T.

We hope you enjoy the show and that you will visit other dog shows when in the vicinity. Know Your Breed...

THE TAHL-TAN BEAR DOG

Originally used by the Tahl-tan Indians, the Tahl-tan Bear Dog originated in Canada. The Indians call him "their" dog, meaning the breeding stock has been passed down from generation to generation. Used for hunting black and grizzly bears, lynx and porcupine, the Tahl-tan Bear Dog was customarily carried in a hide sack to conserve his energy and released only when the quarry was sighted. The little dog harried his game by circling, nipping and barking, holding it at bay and distracting its attention from the approaching hunter. Two dogs were usually used in hunting the bear. Two days before the planned hunt, the dogs were bled by stabbing them in the hind quarters, the Indians believing this practice gave them more agility and endurance. The instrument used in the bleeding was the fibula bone of the fox or wolf, no other instrument being considered proper. When training a puppy for hunting, the Indians periodically scratched the puppy's nose with the claws and pad of the lynx in the belief that this would instill a greater desire to hunt this particular species of game.

The Tahl-tan Bear Dog is an alert, gracefully-built dog of from 12 to 16 inches at the shoulder for males and proportionately smaller for females. The head is decidedly foxy in appearance with erect bat ears. The color scheme is usually black on the head, with irregular black and white patches covering the body. Many of the species, however, are blue-grey with irregular white patches, while some are wholly black.

The distinguishing characteristic of the breed is the tail. This is from 5 to 8 inches in length, carried erect. It is extremely thick from set-on to tip, usually black with white tip, depending upon the general coloring of the dog. This tail is quite dissimilar from that of all other breeds of dogs.

It is a general understanding that the Tahl-tan Bear Dog will not live outside of Northern environment. A considerable number of these dogs have been taken "outside" in the past. Practically all have died, either from heat prostration or from unaccustomed diet. The dog is a fastidious eater, preferring small parcels of meat and fish. He is particularly fond of birds. The bark of the Tahl-tan Bear Dog is a fox-like yap. His yapping and yodeling on moonlit nights is almost identical to that of the coyote.



\$100,000 worth of Dogs

The following article was published in the official program of the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show, and could be used as publicity in the newspapers for any show being held in your vicinity. Be sure to change place names and dates before releasing it.

ON March 14, 1951, Toronto will be host to some of the finest canine bluebloods from all parts of Canada and the United States, at an estimated value of \$100,000. From then until March 17 these dogs will be competing for top honors at the two-day show to be held in conjunction with the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show for the benefit of the Toronto Humane Society at the Coliseum in the Exhibition Groups.

We have come a long way!

Some 40,000 visitors will pass through the dog show during its four-day stand. What, might you ask, is there in seeing a dog to create such an interest?

The general public has become purebred dog conscious. Issuance of dog licences in the past 10 years has not increased substantially, but the registration of purebred dogs has increased over 50 per cent. Leading newspapers devote regular columns to dogs and their shows, and how often do you see a movie news reel without a glimpse of a dog show?

Newsreels, however, do not tell the purpose of dog shows, neither do they indicate the support they are given by attending crowds. In less than 100 years, the sport of dog breeding and exhibiting has become one of the leading attractions in the world. In England, for instance, at Cruft's last month, there were 5,543 dogs shown and over 50,000 people paid admission. For several days before and after the show detailed accounts, pictures and cartoons were published in the press. Cruft's is the dog world's Epsom Derby, the event of the year! Madison Square Gardens staged the 75th Annual Dog Show of the Westminster Kennel Club at New York last month, to crowded galleries.

The affection and respect which exists between man and dog today began in the prehistoric ages when they first worked and hunted together. The dog still gives to man the same loyalty which he devoted to his Stone Age master, and as man advanced so has the dog. Throughout the centuries, their relationship has grown and matured, and today the dog is still the only creature ever to be completely accepted and acceptable for companionship and whose devotion to man has no equal in the animal kingdom.

So completely has the dog become a part of the domestic circle that dog lovers in the United States and Canada

annually spend some 231 million dollars on behalf of their dogs. Two of the biggest items on their shopping list are 400 million pounds of dry dog food costing an estimated 64 million dollars and 600 million pounds of canned dog food costing an estimated 84 million dollars. In a report of a study of family ownership of dogs in Canada, it was found that one Canadian family in three owned a dog.

The first dog show on record was a private affair, held at the Zoological Gardens in London, England, about 1843, and was confined to Spaniels. However, the earliest open dog show was held on June 28 and 29, 1859, in the Corn Exchange at Newcastle-on-Tyne. This one also catered to the sporting breeds, having two classes, one for Pointers and one for Setters. There were 60 entries and a gate of 15,000 dog lovers. It was, to say the least, well organized for both prizes found their way to the adjudicators. The judges were also exhibitors and by a happy arrangement of reciprocity the Pointer judge owned the Setter which was awarded the prize for best Setter, while the Setter judge owned the Pointer which copped the only Pointer prize!

Behind this story lies an interesting historical fact, as the aforementioned Setter was a direct descendant of the dogs bred by the Duke of Gordon. This dog's head is mounted and preserved as an example of the early type of the breed which in colour is practically identical with today's Gordon Setter.

The development of what has come to be regarded as perfection began in those early shows. It called for the establishment of kennel clubs as a guiding and controlling authority throughout the canine world—for without these organizations it would be impossible to maintain the records of ancestry and ownership, and to devise precautionary methods necessary for the successful development of any one breed.

The breeding of fine purebred dogs is an art. It takes idealism, sound reasoning and adherence to a common goal—the perfect specimen—to make a good breeder. This is actually where plans for a dog show begin. The breeder knows the Standard of Perfection for each breed (laid down by the Kennel Clubs), and he knows what he wishes to produce. It is this self-expression and fulfillment of the creative urge that inspires him. The vast improvements and greater uniformity in the various breeds, as well as the acceptance of new breeds have stemmed from the breeder's desire to create better purebred dogs.

It is a gift to be able to understand a dog's mentality; but to be able to produce a better dog by selective and

wise breeding, to be able to show a dog so that his faults are negligible, to be able to raise, trim and condition such a dog is an achievement.

To those unversed in dogs, a tour around a show will be quite an education. The various breeds are clearly marked so that the visitor will have no trouble in ascertaining whether he is looking at a Beagle or a Dachshund, and will be amazed at the wonderful variety of breeds in existence. Massive wolfhounds down to the tiniest lap dogs each have their following. There are fashions in dogs just as there are in clothes, therefore much discrimination and forethought is shown by the breeders and specialists in catering to public likes and dislikes.

As well as the opportunity of seeing excellent specimens of most of the breeds recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club, the spectator is at the logical place to acquire knowledge about his breed and where the art of breeding, showing and conditioning can be learned. For those whose interest in dogs is in keeping a dog as a companion, these shows offer the logical place to go to select the breed.

In picking a winner, the judge is guided by the aforementioned Standard of Perfection for each breed. This Standard describes in detail what would be considered a perfect specimen of the breed and indicates the relative importance of each feature and characteristic. Theoretically each feature is judged separately and the winning dog is the one whose total points come closest to 100.

As a further aid to judges and breeders, the Standard also lists definite faults which are to be discouraged or penalized in the breed. In addition to general disqualifications such as blindness or alteration, the Standard for some breeds specifically names extreme faults which can make a dog ineligible to be shown.

Unless a dog has a number of obvious, serious faults, the judge must study him very carefully—with his hands as well as his eyes, in motion as well as standing. To check the texture of the coat, the firmness of muscle and bone, and the soundness of the teeth, a judge has to handle each dog. The way a dog moves is considered very important—not only as a thing of beauty in itself, but also as a crucial test of body structure. The handlers of the dogs have to walk, trot and run them while the judge watches from side, front and back.

On Saturday, March 17, Obedience Trials will also be in progress at the dog show. These trials stress the intelligence and amount of training that can be instilled in any purebred dog. Physical perfection of the dog is not considered—here is to be seen the purebred dog in his role as man's companion and protector and the reasons he has earned the title of "Man's Best Friend".

The Superintendent of the Dog Show

FOR most dog clubs the point show is the highlight of the year and consequently the efforts of many enthusiastic members are directed towards making it as successful as possible. So often, however, the workers find out, after the show that there is little if anything on the right side of the ledger and various explanations are offered for this situation.

It is generally agreed that it costs a considerable amount of money to put on a dog show these days and that it is also very difficult, in most cases, to get sufficient revenue to make ends meet. Quite often, the show-giving club has not sufficient money at the beginning of the season to dispel all uneasiness and consequently part of the energy and drive of the members which ordinarily would be directed towards the promotion of the show is, without the fact being realized, used up in worry over how the bills will be paid if a profit is not made. The result is usually that a small profit is made and there is not enough in the kitty when the time comes to make plans for the next show. On the other hand, it is not forgotten that here and there in Canada clubs have made considerable profit and as a result have made substantial donations to charity. Most of these successes can be attributed to the enthusiasm of the members generated as the result of an attitude of not worrying but if one were to look far enough under the surface he would find that this care-free attitude came about as the result of careful planning and hard work on the part of one or more members over a period of time.

It is clearly set out in the dog show rules that the show superintendent is in charge the day of the show. Accordingly, the full responsibility for the success or failure of the show would appear to depend on him but it must be clearly stated that his success or failure is dependent on how carefully the plans for the show are laid and more particularly on how faithfully and efficiently they are carried out. Let us suppose that all the necessary planning has been done and that committees are organized and instructed and that all are eagerly looking forward to the big day.

I have always felt that the show, particularly the evening part, should be looked on as a play, as a performance in a theatre, and that all the preparations before hand were actually the rehearsals. If this view is pleasing, then it would only seem proper that all plans should tie in with the idea that the performance from say 8.30 to 10.30 p.m. is the climax and that everything should be timed and staged to please the audience. If

the committee accepts such an idea, then the show superintendent becomes the producer and director and stage manager of the show and it behooves him to commence quite some time before the actual date to become acquainted with all those working for the club. It goes without saying that he should attend all the meetings of the show committee as well as meetings of the executive.

To enable the show superintendent to make his plans, he will secure from the show secretary a tabulation of the entries, by breeds, at the time the latter makes up the copy for the printer. He can then calculate the amount of benching he will require and decide how it will be arranged. He will also be able to draw up the schedule for judging throughout the day. In the few remaining days he will make all his other arrangements so that all will be in order for the morning of the show.

The benching having been previously arranged, I have always found it expedient to have a clerk sit at the veterinarian's table, with a catalogue and check off each entry as it has been passed. In due course, this checked catalogue will be handed to the chief ring steward and he will have an accurate record of all absentees. Every show superintendent knows how many requests he gets from exhibitors wishing to have their dogs together or alongside or some other exhibitors or away from some other, and so on. This can be handled very easily if two benching clerks have been appointed beforehand. They will have placed the bench numbers on the respective benches but not tacked them and if any changing about is to be done there is no difficulty for the benching clerks who, when the exhibitors are satisfied, then fasten the numbers in the proper places. The previous arranging for water containers, food containers, brooms, shovels, and refuse containers will enable all concerned to keep things running fairly smooth.

In the setting up of the rings the previous evening, provision will have been made for the location of the trophy tables. If they are to be inside the judging rings these should be made large enough so that the exhibitors will not be crowded in showing their dogs. It has proven satisfactory on a number of occasions to name the chairman of the trophy committee a ring steward and there can then be no complaint of an unauthorized person being in the ring. In any event, whatever person is in charge of trophies and prizes should be named a steward, even if the trophy table is located outside the judging ring.

The exhibitors having all benched their dogs, the ring stewards being in readiness, the armband clerks and the runners having received final instructions, and the odd and sundry other details have all been checked, and with the time fast approaching the scheduled opening hour of the show, the announcer will give the first call. The club president brings the judge to the ring and introduces him and the show is officially underway.

During the morning and afternoon the superintendent will find it necessary to keep a close check on the progress of the judging to ensure that the schedule is being maintained. It is so vitally important that all details be carried out on time. There will be a break for lunch, another break if there is any afternoon feature, and then a resuming of judging so that all may have sufficient time to eat supper and those who are required for the evening to get their dogs ready.

If the evening programme has been laid out as a theatrical presentation commencing at 8.30, it may be expected that the audience will commence arriving about an hour previously. So that time does not hang heavy on their hands, it would be well to have arranged for some interesting items, such as children's and adults' handling classes to be judged, say from seven o'clock on.

Promptly at 8.30, the evening performance should begin with the playing of the national anthem, and then almost immediately the exhibitors should enter the ring for the first item of judging and the show is on. Timing is so important during this two hour period and if the show superintendent has explained to all those who will be participating during the evening what he has in mind he will be agreeably surprised with the cooperation he will receive and the spectators, who are the paying public, will, provided you ring down the curtain promptly at 10.30, go away enthused and all may rest assured that the favourable comment will go a long way to creating more interest in future shows.

Suggestions for Dog Show Judges and Stewards

At the 1951 Annual General Meeting of the members of the Canadian Kennel Club, it was decided that pamphlets explaining the procedure to be followed for judges, show-giving clubs and ring stewards be printed and distributed to those concerned. We feel that the views of show superintendents, secretaries, judges, ring stewards, and members of the Canadian Kennel Club, should be solicited in this matter.

The American Kennel Club has distributed a pamphlet, which has proven beneficial, and with their kind permission, we are publishing this, having changed the word 'American' to 'Canadian' where the Kennel Club is mentioned, also the reference to the rules, to conform to the Canadian Kennel Club rules as now printed.

We are most anxious to receive the guidance and support of the members from coast to coast, and will welcome any suggestions or comments, which will enable the Board of Directors in their preparation of a pamphlet, which will then be printed and distributed.

THE Canadian Kennel Club believes that, if the precepts set forth in this pamphlet are followed, judges, clubs and stewards will be able to perform their duties in a more uniform and workmanlike manner and in accordance with what has been found to be the best practice.

A judge is the arbiter who decides which dog most nearly approaches the standard of its breed. The members of the C.K.C. in making rules which apply to DOG SHOWS have sought to set forth to a considerable extent the duties and privileges of a judge. There are, however, certain principles other than those which appear in the written rules which should govern the conduct of judges.

The C.K.C. is aware of the sacrifices entailed by all those who act as judges whether they judge at their own expense or are reimbursed for their expenses and/or services, and desires to do everything possible to make their task easier. It does not approve of those who seek to be judges only because of a desire for self aggrandizement and the urge for appearing in the limelight and will view with suspicion any judge who solicits a judging engagement.

A judge should take stock of his qualifications periodically and if he finds that he does not measure up to the standard which he would require in a judge were he an exhibitor, he should request the C.K.C. to remove his name from the list of persons eligible to be licensed for those breeds.

Invitation and Acceptance

The first step taken by a show-giving club after the date for its show

has been fixed is to select the judges to pass upon the dogs. Letter, telephone or telephone communication should be had with each of the judges on the tentative list made by the club.

It is the duty of one who has been asked to judge, immediately to accept or decline the invitation. It is highly improper for a club to invite more than one person to judge a given breed until a reasonable time has elapsed for the receipt of an acceptance or rejection from the person first invited. A reasonable time ought not to be more than two weeks from the date when the invitation was sent. It is of course possible that an immediate acceptance or rejection cannot be made and that there must first be further correspondence.

The C.K.C. does not look with favor upon any show-giving club which is so discourteous as to send invitations to judge a given breed to more than one person at the same time. It looks with less favour upon that judge who, having received an invitation, has not sufficiently good manners to immediately reply, and requests show-giving clubs and judges to inform it when such breaches of good manners occur.

The C.K.C. also frowns upon the practice of a show-giving club which writes a number of persons, at the same time, asking them for terms and availability to judge the same breeds. If, however, a club deems it necessary to do this, the number of exploratory letters sent should be kept at a minimum, and upon receiving a reply from the judges, each one must be advised of the club's decision at the earliest possible date. A judge who receives such a letter usually reserves the date, considering that the club has an option on his services, and if he is not informed promptly of their decision, he is placed in the position of having to refuse bona fide invitations that would conflict with the show under consideration.

A judge after having been invited, should immediately inform the club which invites him of any other invitation which he has accepted to judge the same breed at another show to be held within three months' time of the date of the show, in order that the second club, if it feels the prior assignment would harm its entry, will be in a position to rescind the invitation.

A judge, when accepting an invitation, should inform the show-giving club if he intends to charge expenses, and a judge who is accustomed to ask for more than his normal personal expenses should also state what the limit of his expense will be. Clubs are entitled to know, prior to the show, what their liabilities are in this regard, and they cannot afford unexpected and unwarranted outlays.

The C.K.C. does not approve the practice of covering up a charge for services by means of a padded expense account, and prefers that a judge, who feels he is entitled to a fee over and above normal personal expenses, so apportion his estimate to the club.

Compensation for loss of pay while absent from a business or profession is never an allowable expense, nor is the cost of taking to a show a member of a judge's family or his friends.

Section 2 of Chapter 7 provides that, bench show committees or superintendents shall, in every instance, notify judges of the breeds and group classes upon which they are to pass, before the publication of the premium lists. The bench show committee or the superintendent should so notify each judge as soon as he has been approved and at the time should send in full information telling him how he can reach location of the show and the time he is to arrive.

If sickness or other serious happening should occur prior to the date of the show so that the judge knows that he cannot be present, he should at once notify, preferably by telegram, the bench show committee or the superintendent.

A judge who fails to fulfill an assignment without any reason or excuse having been offered the club or superintendent, or who habitually arrives at a show after the time at which he is scheduled to judge, or who consistently fails to make his appearance because of the small number of dogs entered under him, may not be approved for one or more future assignments.

The failure of an advertised judge to appear is of serious consequence to the show which has honored him with its invitation. We recommend that each judge before he accepts an invitation should read Chapter 8 of the Rules. We do not wish to confine the reading of the Rules, however, only to this chapter. It is the duty of every judge to familiarize himself with every rule applying to Dog Shows as well as with the standards of the breeds he has accepted to pass upon. These standards will be found set forth in "The Complete Dog Book" which can be purchased from the C.K.C.

Department Before Entering the Ring

Showing dogs is a sport and ought to be conducted in the manner in which other sports are carried on.

After the judging list has been published for a show for which a judge has accepted, he must be most circumspect in his communications, orally or in writing, with those who are known to be exhibitors of the breeds which he is to pass upon. It is his duty if he is approached by any such, directly

or by intimation, and requested to favor one dog over another immediately to inform The C.K.C. in order that the person guilty of this breach of sportsmanship may meet with drastic punishment.

The judge also must consider the public which attends dog shows. Some professional sports have reached a plane where suspicion on the part of the public is easily aroused of unfairness and wrong doing of those who participate and, unfortunate though it be, some of those who come to dog shows look upon that sport with the same eyes with which they witness a professional sporting exhibition. He who has accepted an invitation to judge, therefore, should not go to dog shows given immediately preceding the show at which he is to judge and watch the judging of the breed or breeds to which he has been assigned. Neither should he examine the dogs on their benches and pass comments on their qualities and faults. On the day of the show he should not visit the benches, or exercising rings, examine the catalogue, discuss the respective merits of dogs of the breeds he is to pass upon, or talk at length with those whom he may think are to be exhibitors or handlers under him.

It is also advisable for the judge not to accept invitations to social functions immediately before the show, where the host or guests are likely to be exhibitors under him. It is, of course, proper to attend an affair given by the club holding the show.

The Day of the Show

A judge should never be late in keeping his appointments. On the day of the show the judge should arrive at least one half hour before the time appointed for him to judge. He should go at once to the Superintendent's office, report, and secure the badge which he must wear when in the ring.

If it is a large show, there will probably be a Chief Ring Steward, and ring stewards definitely assigned to each ring. It is usual for the ring steward to take the judge's book, ribbons, prize money, exhibitors' arm cards, sharpened pencils, etc. to the judging ring. All these should be placed in a large bag with the judge's name and ring number endorsed upon it. This bag should also contain a catalogue for the use of the ring steward only, which catalogue under no circumstances must be looked at by the judge until his judging has been finished.

If, however, it is a small show and such stewards as there are, are inexperienced, the judge himself should see that this paraphernalia is taken to the ring.

There must be a table in each ring and at least two chairs as well as a board upon which the awards will be marked. As soon as the judge reaches the ring a steward should arrange the

armbands in numerical order and place the ribbons and prize money envelopes on the table in such a way so as to be readily accessible to the judge, at the same time giving the judge's book to him.

The judge himself must take charge of the judge's book. No one is permitted to make an entry therein except the judge or, in the case of a mistake, the superintendent or show secretary who may make the judge's book conform to the original entry form from which all information must be taken in case of dispute, no matter how the catalogue or judge's book may read. The judges' books at shows shall be in the custody of the judge, superintendent, or superintendent's assistant. None other shall be allowed access to them. At the conclusion of the judging, the book must be signed by the judge and any changes which may have been made therein initialed by him, and all absentees marked. A judge will feel more at ease if he has in his pocket a copy of the C.K.C. rules whenever he enters the ring to judge.

Knowing the standards of the breeds, verbatim, on which he is to pass, is not necessarily the yardstick of a good judge. Certainly, no judge could be criticized if before entering the ring, or during his judging, he wishes to refresh his memory by referring to one or more standards in the "Complete Dog Book".

As soon as he has his ring in order to go forward with his judging, he should notify his steward or the attendant assigned to the ring to bring in the first class which he is to judge.

The judge from the moment that his ribbon is placed upon the lapel of his coat, is looked upon as representing The C.K.C. He is the central figure in his ring. He must be dignified and courteous in his manner. He must conform, if possible, to the wishes of the show committee with regard to the speed with which he does his judging. He is affording entertainment for the spectators as well as deciding the merits of the dogs brought before him. No judge, however, should speed up his judging to the point where any exhibitor might have reason to believe that his dog was not receiving proper consideration.

The judge should not smoke while actually handling the dogs. If he smokes at all he should do so in the intervals between classes, and under no circumstances must a judge be permitted to enter the ring while under the influence of liquor.

While judging, he must not discuss the dogs with the stewards, attendants, exhibitors or spectators.

Judging the Dogs

It is the duty of the steward or attendant to advise the judge when a class is ready and to inform him of the numbers of the dogs found to be absent.

The judge shall mark the absentees before he begins to judge the class. If however, an exhibitor entered in the class presents himself and dog at the ringside after the judge has started to adjudicate the dogs already in the ring, the judge may, at his discretion allow the dog to compete, crossing out the absent notation and initialing same.

If the club has made an "additional regulation" which limits the time a judge will wait for dogs making up a class, he should, insofar as his schedule permits, abide by it, but he must be careful to enforce the regulation impartially, that is, he is not to "hold the watch" on some exhibitors and handlers and wait an unreasonable time for others, who without cause, delay bringing their dogs into the ring.

The judge has absolute control of his ring and of all those within it. They are subject to his orders. Section 5 of Chapter 8 of the Rules provides that a judge may order any person or dog from the ring. For the purpose of facilitating the judging, judges are required to exclude from the rings all persons except the steward and the show attendants assigned to the ring and those actually engaged in exhibiting. He shall cause any person to leave the ring who does not comply with his requests and if a vicious or uncontrollable dog is brought before him, he should cause that dog to be removed from the ring. The show ring is not the place to begin to instill show manners in dogs. That part of the training of a dog should be finished before he comes into the ring. There are occasions however, where it is proper for a judge to give a shy dog a reasonable time to find its courage.

Every judge, within reasonable limits and if requested, should point out to the novice exhibitor what he may do to make his dog show to better advantage. The judge must always bear in mind that it is the novice exhibitor who later becomes the regular and must exercise all patience with him.

Section 4 of said Chapter 8 provides, "the judge's decision shall be final in all cases affecting the merits of the dogs. Full discretionary power is given to the judge to withhold any, or all, prizes for want of merit. After a class has once been judged in accordance with these rules, and regulations, it shall not be re-judged."

Section 7 of said Chapter 8 provides "If a judge disqualifies a dog at any show, he shall make a note in the judge's book giving his reasons for such disqualification".

Section 6 of said Chapter 8 provides, "A judge's decision as marked in the judge's book cannot be changed by him after filing, but an error appearing in the judge's book may be corrected by The C.K.C. after consultation with the judge"

Before actually beginning the judging of a class it is good practice to

have the dogs paraded about the ring while the judge stands in the centre or at one side and the dogs pass by him one after the other. After the dogs have paraded, the judge must cause the exhibitors to station their dogs at fairly evenly spaced intervals about the ring and must then examine each dog in turn while the dog is standing still.

Experienced judges as soon as a class is in the ring can often pick out certain dogs of that class which cannot hope to be among the best four or five. None the less, the owners of dogs which are poorer in quality have paid their entry fees, presumably under the impression that their dogs have a chance to win, and it is not proper for a judge to neglect these dogs and not to give them a thorough examination.

Each dog in the class should be examined in turn while standing at ease.

A judge must enquire of each exhibitor whether or not his dog is of good temper before handling him and may order from the ring any dog that is of bad temper and will not submit to being handled. A judge should always request the exhibitor or handler of a dog, to open the dog's mouth, so as to minimize the possibility of putting his hand in contact with possibly infected secretions. The judge's fingers should feel for strength of underjaw, fulness or falling away of foreface, breadth and shape of head, whether flat on top or rounded, presence or lack of stop, too little or too much cheek, and the comparative relation of length of foreface to length of head. Well trained fingers will discover many defects which the eye cannot find in the anatomy of dogs with long hair or rough coats.

Where the color of the eye is important, the eyes should be carefully looked at. Artificial light and the shadow artfully cast by an experienced handler often make a light or yellow eye appear dark.

The legs should be handled where comparative size or shape of bone is important and if the condition of the feet is one of the requirements of a breed's standard, the feet should be examined.

Fronts and placement of shoulders must be inspected thoroughly. The judge will bear in mind that many a front may appear good as the result of a tight lead.

Texture and condition of coat must be determined. If a double coated breed, both overpile and underpile should be examined on back and sides. Feather on tails and legs can be seen without handling.

Length of back, whether there be too little or too much daylight under a dog, depth of brisket, set on of stern and whether a top be level, arched or let

down can best be seen by looking at the dog in profile.

Quarters, let down hocks or straightness in stifle, spread of rib and strength of loin can best be handled from the rear or seen from the rear or side.

A judge must also remember that even a cripple may be made to stand so as to look sound. Whether the way a dog moves is important or not from the point of view of the standard of its breed, the judge should have each dog moved in turn on loose lead to and away from him and if necessary across his line of vision, in order to check for any indications of lameness or unsoundness. This is essential regardless of whether the competition indicates it to be necessary or not. If lameness is evident call the veterinarian to determine whether it is temporary. Remember a dog which is permanently lame is ineligible to compete at any show.

If the class is numerically large and the best are closely matched and the ring too small comfortably to hold all the dogs, as soon as the judge has determined which of the dogs are not fitted to come into the ribbons, he may tell his ring steward to or himself request the exhibitors of the dogs with which he has finished to remove them from the ring and this should be done in a gracious manner. If the ring is comfortably large the judge should cause those dogs which are not in the ribbons to stand aside and not dismiss any dog until the class has been judged.

A judge must always have in mind that he is obligated to judge the dogs solely by comparison with the standard of perfection as has been promulgated by the parent breed club and approved by the Board of Directors of The C.K.C. In making his decision, no weight is to be given personal preference as regards size, weight, color, etc.

When the judge has decided the order in which he is to place the dogs for their ribbons he must cause them to stand in that order, in front of the place markers. The judge then should mark the placings in his book and must give out the ribbons himself. Exhibitors are to stand in front of the place numbers until they receive the ribbons from the judge, and are to take them from the judge in a courteous manner. Any deviation from good manners in this regard is to be reported by the judge at once to the bench show committee.

It must always be borne in mind that judging dogs in an orderly and proper manner serves to educate the public. As far as possible the judge should so handle his dogs as to indicate why he is placing them as he does. He should leave no confusion in the minds of the onlookers as to what he

is trying to do. The gate cannot discern all of the defects which close examination makes apparent to the judge, but in other respects orderly judging can be followed by those who have some knowledge of the breeds which are being judged.

When the first class of a breed has been judged there may be dogs in that class which are also to compete in the following class and the judge should request his steward to tell the exhibitors of such dogs to keep them in a place in the ring apart from the other dogs which make up the following class. As soon as the following class comes into the ring the judge will then go over those dogs which he has not seen and after they have been examined he then may go through the process of elimination which he has pursued with the first class, comparing the newly entered prospective prize winners with those dogs which have appeared in the class before.

This method should be followed throughout the judging and we cannot impress too strongly the fact that an orderly method when once adopted will save much time and make less easy the reversal of decisions which occasionally occurs where the handling of the exhibits has been done in a haphazard manner.

When the Open Class has been finished, if the winner of that class has not been beaten, it shall be kept in the ring to compete with the unbeaten winners of the other regular classes. No matter whether in the eyes of the judge an unbeaten dog is not fit to compete for winners, its exhibitor should be given the opportunity to bring that dog into the ring to compete for winners if he so desires. The judge must not forget that when he has selected his winning dog, the dog which has been placed second to the winning dog in its class if otherwise unbeaten, is eligible to compete for Reserve Winners, and must be brought into the ring. In order to be sure that the opportunity is afforded a dog, so eligible, to come into the ring and compete, the judge will give out the Winner's ribbon and mark his book, before judging Reserve.

In judging Best of Winners the judge is obligated to base his decision solely on the merits of the two dogs.

After Best of Breed or Best of Variety of Breed has been awarded, the judge, before judging for Best of Opposite Sex, must see that all eligible dogs are in the ring.

The following "Procedure" is printed on the inside cover of every judge's book, but too much emphasis cannot be placed on the importance of a judge following every point contained therein. It is reprinted here so that every judge will be thoroughly conversant with all the points mentioned.

Procedure for Judges to Follow

1. All absentees in each class in this book must be marked by the judge. This includes dogs entered for specials only.

2. A judge must make an individual examination of all dogs brought into the ring for him to pass upon; as well as check on each dog's movement for any indications of lameness or unsoundness. This is essential, regardless of whether the competition indicates it is necessary or not. If lameness is evident, call the veterinarian to determine whether it is temporary. The exhibitor has paid for your opinion—give it to him, after you have carefully inspected his individual dog.

3. The judge alone must mark this book and hand out the ribbons. Under no circumstances can this be done by the steward or anyone else.

4. Ribbons must be presented in the ring. If the owner or handler has left the ring before the ribbons are given out, do not follow him, send an attendant to bring him back into the ring. This is important.

5. It is assumed you know the standard. Any dog in the ring which calls for disqualification under the standard of the breed must be disqualified. If the disqualifying fault requires that it be sustained by a veterinarian's examination, call for the veterinarian and have his opinion in writing before making your decision and then mark the judge's book giving your reason for disqualification.

6. Be sure and line up the dogs, first, second, third and fourth, before marking the judge's book or handing out the ribbons. The public is entitled to know the order in which the dogs will be placed.

7. In judging the winners, the book shall be marked and the ribbon given out before judging reserve. After the winner's ribbon has been awarded, call into the ring for competition for reserve winners any dog which has been defeated only by the dog awarded winners.

8. Do not forget to sign the judge's book on the front cover to meet the certification that judging has been made in accordance with the above requirements.

Dog Show Stewards

It is recommended that clubs or associations giving dog shows provide two stewards for each ring in order to expedite the prompt disposition of all classes.

No one shall be appointed a steward whose license to judge or superintend has been revoked or who has been denied the privileges of The C.K.C.

Clubs or associations giving dog shows should appoint a chief steward well in advance of the date of their show, whose duty it will be to invite

a sufficient number of experienced persons to act as stewards in the judging rings on the day of the show. He should advise all persons accepting the invitation the date and locale of the show, the time at which they are to report for duty, and their particular ring assignment.

Persons should be selected who are familiar with ring procedure and breed classifications. It should be borne in mind that a good steward makes the work of judging easier by relieving the judge of necessary detail; by assembling classes promptly, he will be able to keep the judging program on schedule and eliminate to a large extent long delays between classes.

The chief steward shall use his discretion on the advisability of assigning more than one steward to a ring.

Stewards will notify the judge when all the dogs are in the ring for each class, and call his attention to known absentees. They will not mark anything whatsoever in the judge's book or make any erasures therein.

Stewards will mark the blackboard promptly after each class has been judged and will be responsible for returning voided prize money, trophies and ribbons to the chief steward or superintendent upon the completion of the judging.

The steward must have in mind that he has been selected to help the judge and not to advise him. He must carefully refrain from discussing or seeming to discuss the dogs or the exhibitors with the judge. Stewards must not take, or seem to take any part in judging. When they are not actively engaged in their duties, they should place themselves in such part of the ring as will not interfere with the view of those watching the judging, and must not permit exhibitors to crowd about the gate and interfere with the comfort of the audience.

The Homing Instinct

SOME time ago we requested stories on the homing instinct of dogs. The first story to reach us is that of Mr. C. M. Tangsted, of Winnipeg, which is as follows:

I notice in the March issue of DOGS IN CANADA that you are anxious to secure stories about the homing instinct of dogs, and as I had quite an experience here some six years ago, I would like to relate same.

I bred and raised a litter of eight German Shepherd pups and all were sold at a tender age except one male. I sold him when he was just over six months of age to a fancier residing in this city but about five miles from my kennel.

I delivered this pup to his residence in the evening by auto and to get to

his home I had to cross the Red River which is rather wide here at Winnipeg. I crossed over the Redwood Bridge, then south along Main Street through the C.P.R. subway. Then in a westerly direction for some two miles.

Now this pup had never been outside the kennel fence in his young life. I instructed the new owner to keep the dog closed up for some days until he became adjusted to his new home and surroundings and also till he became fast friends with him and his family.

At 8 a.m. five days after I had delivered the pup, I heard a noise at the back door. I proceeded to investigate what it was, and on opening the back door found the pup which I had delivered to the new owner five days before. I felt his coat which I found to be absolutely dry. I looked him over thoroughly—he was hale and hearty, glad to be home. I phoned the owner and he told me the dog seemed so friendly and anxious to get out he let him out in his yard at 7.15 that morning. Three-quarters of an hour later he was at his old home. Now I would like to know how that six-month old Shepherd pup could locate the Redwood Bridge to cross the Red River which was necessary in order to reach his old home.

Furthermore, he had to pick his way through a myriad of streets, then cross the heavily travelled Main Street and travel along Main Street for 12 to 14 city blocks before he came to the Redwood Bridge. He had used a bridge as his coat was entirely dry.

These Shepherds are certainly smart.

* * * *

Your editor could add a story to this. Some years ago while operating a boarding kennel some 16 miles from Toronto, the biggest obstacle was in keeping the dogs confined to the runs. It is the desire of any pet to return home, and our most persistent offender was a Labrador Retriever owned by Miss Nordheimer, of Lowther Ave., Toronto. This dog although driven to the kennel in a closed pickup truck returned home the next day. For a while it was a one-sided arrangement. Sambo would run home to Lowther Avenue from the kennel, then sit on the verandah and wait for the truck to come and pick him up. It became quite a game until the truck didn't come for him. He was taken in the house and kept there. That didn't suit Sambo, he was being cheated out of his ride, so back to the kennel he trotted, 25 miles, seven of which were through congested traffic lanes.

He was promptly driven back to his home, which was just what he wanted—a day's roaming and a car ride. To find his way by devious routes was the homing instinct which subject is being given considerable attention by scientists. Have you a story to add to this? If so send it along and so assist in this work.

Are the Show Dogs Deteriorating

by the late Alex Dalzell

THE sudden death of Alex (Sandy) Dalzell at Belfast, Ireland, came as a great shock to dog fanciers all over the world. Mr. Dalzell was known for many years as the ambassador of good will for the pure bred dog industry for the British Isles. As a judge he toured Europe, India, Ceylon, Burma, South Africa, and through making the places he visited and the people he met pure-bred dog conscious was instrumental in putting kennel clubs in these countries on a sounder footing.

His father, the late A. P. Dalzell, was one of the world's foremost Collie breeders, and as was natural, the Collie was his son's favorite dog. Mr. Dalzell's association with dogs, dog shows, coursing and racing had lasted unbroken from his childhood. He was one of the oldest breeders of dogs in Ireland and his knowledge of coursing and greyhound racing was of immeasurable value to this sport.

Through his articles on all topics regarding dogs, he promoted their cause in all parts of the world, and his contributions to *Dogs in Canada* throughout the years were greatly appreciated. The dog press in England has been quite outspoken for the past few months regarding the deterioration of British dogs. It is a fitting tribute, then, to Mr. Dalzell that his last story was a sharp reprimand to those who through their zeal are causing disturbing reaction for dog circles in the rest of the world, particularly to those wishing to purchase British dogs.

Following is his article, which we consider one of the best he ever wrote:

Following up my previous and necessarily brief reference to the charges that a rot had set in among our pedigree dogs, it now seems more than ever imperative that the challenge should be met.

Some may think that the subject had better be left alone, and that further publicity might only aggravate the situation. It is true that at times assertions are worthy only of silent contempt, but when the finger of scorn is pointed in wholesale condemnation of acknowledged achievement the accusations must be assessed for what they are worth.

The writer who made the charges is a judge of wide experience and an extremely capable journalist specializing in canine affairs. He admits the gravity of his words, and states they were written "with due realization of their seriousness." But I wonder if sufficient thought was given to the effect of the charges upon the prestige and quality of British-bred dogs, or of the repercussions that are likely to follow in countries overseas.

It does not require much perception to appreciate the reaction and possible adverse effect upon the export scheme which the Kennel Club has fathered so successfully. And surely, too, will confidence be shaken when they read,

and possibly believe, that exhibits with palpably faked ears and tails can gain high awards at our shows. It may well be that there are instances of interference with Nature, but the impression conveyed is that the malpractice is common in certain breeds, with only "some still fairly unspoilt."

There is no doubt in my mind that the allegations are totally unjustifiable and unwarranted in their all-embracing and sweeping impeachment of our pedigree dogs.

One is puzzled, indeed, to understand the motives which inspired the indictment. And yet, without any desire to doubt the sincerity of the writer, a thought springs to mind that there is usually an urge for something sensational in the outlook of those who are trained in professional journalism, something akin to "man biting a dog." In sport circles, outside our own immediate interests, it has been noted that Pressmen sometimes revel in having a tilt at certain aspects, and authority is often a favourable target in "stirring up a hornet's nest." At times it has excited my admiration, but more often there is regret that the effect of an onslaught has not always been in the best interests of all concerned.

Reverting to the charges. These concern the deterioration of our various breeds, both as affecting physical attributes and nervous reaction, and criticism of handling technique designed to cover up faults. The latter is not so serious, but it will come in for later comment.

As a warning, the writer's remarks were right and proper insofar as they pointed out weaknesses which are undermining certain characteristics. But of common faults these are present in all breeds in varying degrees, and owners are striving to eliminate them in every litter. And no one knows better than breeders that they cannot get away with anatomical defects, as judges are seldom slow to note them and penalise accordingly.

But the claim should not be made, or an impression created, that all our breeds are physically and mentally defective. It is wrong to convey, as has been done, that because of faults which exist among some exhibits there is a serious general deterioration.

We have always had and always will have, the imperfect specimens. The law of variability sees to this in all livestock breeding, and there will ever be a blue and a better blue, just as we have leadership and followers in the human species.

The Terrier breeds first, with some thoughts on the appearance of gameness. I repeat—the appearance of gameness. We know quite well that absence of this quality exists. It will be found lacking among certain specimens in all the Terrier tribe, but, here again, you cannot damn a breed be-

cause of the number which show signs of cringing and nervousness.

The judge knows where to place them, and few, if any, get to the top if their tails are habitually downcast. The holding up of heads and tails is to be deplored, but a Terrier or any other breed cannot be expected to assume the model pose all the time. During the critical period of actual judging, however, when the exhibit is being assessed and compared with others, essential alertness and carriage are of paramount importance.

When under individual examination the dog moves up and down the ring, and, this is the period when tail carriage depends upon the dog itself. It is true that the handler can take his dog along on a tight lead, but if the judge thinks fit he can order otherwise.

Another vital period is when two or three exhibits are called into the centre of the ring for comparison. It is here that the handler must again leave tails alone. But in the final lineup it is a different matter. The judge has previously noted deportment, and no one can ask me to believe that the majority of judges are adverse to the accepted practice of posing exhibits before they put pencil to paper. And the same can be said about Gundog breeds such as Pointers and Setters, when the judge may request exhibitors to "set their dogs up."

In this connection one wonders how an official regulation would be received if it was made an offence for exhibitors to handle and control their charges in the ring other than by means of a lead. Perhaps the K.C.L.C. will try this one out to test reaction.

On the question of nervous exhibits—not necessarily among the tribe of Terriers, we certainly do not wish that this should be an ever-increasing trait in our show specimens. But here again, the obviously nervous and shrinking exhibit can get nowhere. And yet there must be an amount of sympathy and understanding on the part of judges.

Many who are privileged to adjudicate have had the experience of a puppy or young dog being naturally nervous during its initial outings, and in cases such as these there should be both encouragement and patience. The quiet approach and gentle handling on the part of a judge can often influence the future deportment of an exhibit.

I am making no excuse for the habitually nervous show specimens, and yet it may seem paradoxical to relate a few instances, three in fact, of a Labrador, a Greyhound, and a working Terrier. The first was a field trial and bench champion, Flora of Knocke, which passed from my ownership to that of the well-known owner and trainer, Mr. David Orr, of Co. Down. She was an extremely nervous animal in the early stages of her career, but an amount of (shall we say) coddling exorcised this fault and enabled her to

achieve the many high awards she so well merited.

The Greyhound, a beautiful bitch named Knocke Allanah, was most timorous on handling and when she was with other dogs, yet on the coursing field and track was in the top flight of performers.

The working Terrier was named Bottle, and was owned by the late Mr. Bobby Dunville a member of the famous whisky firm. She was a nervous cringing, nondescript Smooth Fox Terrier—truly a miserable-looking specimen—yet on the many occasions when she accompanied us on badger digging expeditions none could compare with her in pluck and gameness. She never hesitated or wilted when put to ground, and on more than one occasion she had to be "choked off" a badger when the "earth" was opened up.

These recollections may seem irrelevant, but they point to the fact that, although we must penalise timorous and nervous show specimens, it does not mean that they will be lacking in boldness and daring under working conditions. In the ring, however, it is appearance that counts, and credit cannot be given for latent qualities.

The reference by the distinguished commentator to the handler who carried his Cocker into the ring cannot be taken seriously. It was a silly reference, as many owners adopt this method to facilitate the judge and, more than likely, to save the dog from being trampled on when pushing through a crowded ringside. It is a common and acceptable practice, and was scarcely worthy of the commentator.

A final word about judges and judging—and what may be said is no reflection upon anyone who undertakes this often thankless task.

The expert who combines knowledge of working conditions with show perfection has an insight into the essentials which have been stressed so strongly in the indictment. This was impressed most strongly upon me during the past seven or eight years when actively engaged with my trainer in preparing Greyhounds for coursing and the track. The need for muscle in the right place is only one of the many necessities in preparing dogs for their natural pursuit, and much greater care should be exercised in assessing the physical fitness of all breeds that are expected to do a job of work in the field. The majority of our judges do pay attention to this essential, and some exhibitors seem surprised when their dogs are penalised on account of flabbiness.

With an experience reaching towards the half-century of pedigree dogs in the British Isles, it can be said without fear of contradiction that at no time have we ever had so many high-class specimens in all the classified breeds. And, when we consider the vast numbers in each breed, there is full justification, with pride in the fact, that we can lead the world in the perfection attained.

At the International Kennel Club of Chicago, the Canadian dogs did very well. In Cairn Terriers, Int. Ch. Kindon Saucy Sue won Best of Breed and third in the Terrier Group, Nina of Rurik won Best of Winners. At the Cairn Terrier Specialty Show also held at Chicago, Kindon Saucy Sue again won Best of Breed with Nina of Rurik winning the Winners class, Cairngorum Fionne won the puppy classes. All these dogs are owned by Mrs. G. W. Hyslop of Brockville.

In Labrador Retrievers, Mr. and Mrs. George Doherty, of Cooksville, are scoring at the American shows with Holland Marsh Golden Rod a golden Labrador bred by Dr. J. A. Campbell, Honorary Veterinarian of the Canadian Kennel Club. Goldie won through to Best of Winners at the Chicago International and Winners at Elmira, N.Y.

British Columbia also scored at the Chicago International, when the English Cocker Spaniel 'Can. Champion Luigi of Abbotsford bred by James Roberts and now owned by Floyd Dixon of Elkhart Lake, Wisc., won through to Best of Winners.

The Toy Manchester Terrier, McGilivray's Mister Chips owned by George Robertson, of Toronto, has won Best of Breed and third in the Group at his only two appearances at United States shows.

Victoria S. Sturge, of Clarks Summit, Pa., writes: "Three Canadian-owned dogs did very well at the Lackawanna (Scranton) and Back Mountain (Wilkes-Barre) shows on April 14 and 15 respectively. At Scranton, the English Springer, Covington Bai Blade, owned by L. G. Lymburner, of Humberstone, Ontario won the open class, then went on to take winners, best of winners, and best of breed, then placed third in the sporting group. It had the same results, at Wilkes-Barre.

"At Scranton, two Kerry Blue Terriers, owned by Mrs. Eileen McEachern, of Caulfield, B.C. did very well. Miss Show Off of Cognewaugh won the open class and then went winners, picking up two points. The judge for the Great Danes at the Guelph Kennel Club Show will be Mrs. F. O. Proctor, of Sugar Grove, Pa., not Mr. Proctor as advertised in the April issue.

The Boston Terrier Honey's Kewpie Doll, owned by Dr. Roy Davis of Hamilton and bred by Olga M. White of Fredericton, N.B., was victorious at Youngstown, Ohio, with Best of Breed and third in the Group, also winners at Warren, Pa.

At the Annual Meeting of the Canadian National Livestock Records, held in Toronto on April 3rd, Mr. H. L. Walley, President of the Canadian Kennel Clubs, was elected a member of the Canadian National Livestock Records Committee.

We believe this is the first time that the Canadian Kennel Club has had a representative on the Board, whose only connection with livestock was as a representative of the Kennel Club. Our past-president, Col. J. N. MacRae, was a member, but he represented one of the cattle associations, and former director Mr. Dan Lerch was also on the Livestock Records Committee, but it was as a representative of another department.

The sudden death on Tuesday morning April 24th. of Director Paddy Boughs comes as a great shock. The sympathy of all members and friends is extended to his wife and sons. The business of the kennel will be carried on by Mrs. Boughs and her son Teddy. Further information will be given in the next issue of the magazine.

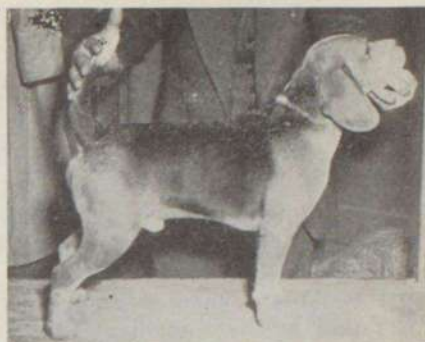

Meeting of the Board of Directors

March 8th, 1951

1834. A regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge St., Toronto, on Thursday, March 8th, 1951, commencing at 10.00 a.m. The President, H. L. Walley, presided. Directors present: Paddy Boughs, Mrs. Ellen Brown, J. J. Farmer, W. H. MacKendrick, and Mrs. Alva McColl.

1835 (1790) MINUTES

SUBJECT: Following discussion, it was agreed that part of Item No. 1820 (Minutes of meeting held on January 24th-February 6th, 1951), was incorrect, and the Secretary was directed to make the following correction:

Item No. 1820—Resolution should read:

"THAT, all members of the Board be provided with a copy or review of all matters coming before the Board at its regular meetings at least one week before the meeting."

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Farmer, Seconded by Director Mrs. Brown:

"THAT, the Minutes of the Meeting held on January 24th and February 6th, 1951, be adopted with the correction as noted." Motion carried.

1836 (1827). OFFICE ACCOMMODATION

SUBJECT: Director Farmer referred to the Minutes of the meeting held on January 24th, and enquired whether or not any offer, in writing, had been received direct from the oil company which had indicated an interest in the Club's present office accommodation.

DISCUSSION: The President reported that when Mr. Loveridge first relayed to him the realty agent's observation that the premises could be rented for \$550.00, he had asked Mr. Loveridge to obtain a written offer for the rental of the premises. . . .

Mr. Loveridge was invited to enter the meeting. He reported that although he had sought to obtain a written offer direct from the oil company, no written offer had been received and in his last telephone conversation with the realty agent in this connection, he had been informed that the oil company had obtained other premises. Mr. Loveridge left the meeting.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Farmer, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, it be noted in the Minutes that there was no offer direct from the oil company in writing confirming any offer for rental." Motion carried.

SUBJECT: The President reported that the lease on the present premises called for the consent of the owners to any sub-letting, and he proposed seeking such consent, in writing, as soon as the owners of the premises returned from Florida.

ACTION: The matter was left in abeyance pending a further report.

1837 (1818). RE-ORGANIZATION AND BY-LAWS

REPORT: The President reported that:

(1) In accordance with the Board's direction, Director Farmer, the Secretary-Treasurer and himself had met with officials (Mr. A. W. Peterson and Dr. Leslie) of the Department of Agriculture for the purpose of finding means by which the Club could carry on its activities in respect of shows and trials, etc., without the necessity of obtaining a separate charter, the Meeting having materialized in Ottawa on February 28th and March 1st.

(2) The conversations with Mr. Peterson and Dr. Leslie indicated a feeling on the part of the Department that while the By-laws could include provision for the adoption and enforcement of rules relating to the various types of competitive events for dogs, such provisions may not indicate or imply any monopoly in this connection.

(3) With the foregoing in mind discussions took place on the revision of Article 5 (Objects) and Article 36 (Improvement of Stock) of the proposed by-laws published in the February (1951) issue of DOGS IN CANADA, and as a result of such discussion the representatives of the Kennel Club agreed to recommend to the Board of the Directors and the Annual General Meeting that Articles 5 and 36 be revised (and adopted) to read as follows:

ARTICLE V. OBJECTS

The Club shall have for its objects the encouragement and development of pure-bred dogs in Canada by:

(a) Keeping records and issuing certificates of pedigree registration of all recognized breeds of pure-bred dogs;

(b) Collecting, preserving and publishing data, information and documents relating to pure-bred dogs;

(c) Carrying out a system of registration as may be found satisfactory to the members and in accordance with these By-laws;

(d) Establishing standards of breeds;

(e) Adopting and enforcing rules and regulations governing dog shows, racing, coursing, obedience trials and field trials for pure-bred dogs where the clubs or associations stating such events desire to hold same under said rules and regulations and where the awards and/or points earned at such events are to be recorded by this Club;

(f) Adopting means to encourage and assist persons engaged in activities referred to in these objects;

(g) Compiling statistics and furnishing official and authentic information in respect to pure-bred dogs;

(h) and in such other ways permitted by the Live Stock Pedigree Act (1949), and as it may seem fit, encourage, guide and advance the welfare of pure-bred dogs and their owners.

ARTICLE XXXVI. IMPROVEMENT OF STOCK

1. The improvement of stock being an important factor in the advancement of the breeding and registration of pure-bred dogs, the Club may, at general meetings of the Club and otherwise as its members deem advisable:

(a) adopt rules and regulations governing the exhibiting, racing, speed trials, obedience trials and field trials of pure-bred dogs where such clubs or associations staging such events desire to hold same under said rules and regulations and where the awards and/or points earned at such events are to be recorded by this Club;

(b) adopt codes of ethics in respect to the breeding, buying, selling, leasing, handling, trading, marketing, advertising and exportation of pure-bred dogs;

(c) adopt rules governing the setting up and maintenance of an advanced registry and of a system of inspection and grading of pure-bred dogs;

(d) adopt policies designed to further the activities referred to in this section and to publish and otherwise disseminate information relating to such activities.

2. The Board of Directors and/or such Special Committees as may be appointed by the members in general meeting assembled and/or the Board of Directors, shall have the power to take such action as may be necessary so that the rules, codes, policies and means referred to in Section 1 of this Article may be effectively carried out.

(4) Should the members attending the annual general meeting adopt the proposed by-laws published in the February issue of DOGS IN CANADA, with Articles V and XXXVI revised as indicated above, the Club may, subject to approval of such by-laws by the Department of Justice, except Ministerial approval of said by-laws.

ACTION: Following discussion, the President's report was held over for further discussion.

1838 (1793). REGISTRATION COMMITTEE MATTERS

(a) Declined to authorize registration of three Labrador Retrievers imported from England by Lt. Col. G. C. (b) Declined to authorize the registration of Golden Retrievers sired by a dog imported from England for which a full three generation pedigree was not available, said litter having been whelped the property of T. A. Ellis, Calgary, Alta.

(c) Authorized the registration of the Australian Terriers, SEVEN OAKS ROSE MARIE and COPPER TOP CRUSADER, imported from Australia by Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, three generation export certificates issued by the Kennel Control Council of Victoria, being submitted with the applications for registration.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Farmer, seconded by Director MacKendrick:

"THAT, the Registration Committee's report be accepted." Motion carried.

1839 (1794). COMPLAINTS

(f) Miss Edith P. Hall, Cambridge, Mass.—Obedience Classes.

CENTRAL ONTARIO BEAGLE CLUB—Spec. Show—June 10th.

(a) Jack Mansfield, Taunton, Mass.—Beagles and American Foxhounds.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director MacKendrick, seconded by Director Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, the applications reported by the Secretary be approved conditional that: (1) such applications comply with the show or trial rules concerned; (a) the local provincial director approves of those selected to judge at shows or trials located in his or her particular province." Motion carried.

RESOLUTION: It was regularly moved by Director Mrs. Brown, seconded by Director Boughs:

"THAT, we abide by the agreement that Mr. Roberts be allowed to judge the breeds assigned to him by the Barrie Kennel Club for its show to be held on June 2nd, 1951."

Motion carried.

(d) Miss Grace McDaniel, Detroit, Mich.—Irish Setters, Irish Water Spaniels, Afghan Hounds, Beagles, Greyhounds, Collies, Newfoundlands, Old English Sheepdogs, Shetland Sheepdogs.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that the late Mrs. Justice McFarland had handled all payments for the Norman K. Swire Memorial Medals which the Club ordered and sent to Clubs entitled to offer same at its shows, and sought an instruction of action to be taken in the future in this regard.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to seek information regarding the present status of the fund set aside for the purchase of these medals.

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that a reply had not been received to the letter addressed to Mr. Ted Ward in accordance with the Board's order.

ACTION: The matter was left in abeyance for further attention.

SUBJECT: The Secretary sought an instruction regarding the attendance of the C.K.C. Representative at shows to be held prior to the annual meetings.

ACTION: Following discussion, the Secretary was directed to:

(1) Arrange for the attendance of Mr. Loveridge at the shows to be held in Toronto and Oshawa this month;

(2) Place on the agenda of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors the matter of the C.K.C. Representative's future duties and activities.

SUBJECT: Director Mrs. Brown suggested that a copy of the C.K.C. Representative's report be sent to the Club holding a show attended by Mr. Loveridge, so that each Club would learn where improvements could be effected.

ACTION: No action was taken.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Ethel L. Webb, Secretary of the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association, who reported that "owing to conditions beyond our control, and not having a suitable place to hold" its proposed show on April 7th, the Club had "decided to postpone its show".

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to hold the date fee in the Club's account.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a further letter from Mrs. M. Hudson, Victoria, regarding the change made in the judge's book in connection with a score earned by a dog in a test (Obedience Trial) held in conjunction with the Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association show held on November 18th.

Examination of the judge's book indicated that a score had been altered and initialed by the judge, and an explanation given for the change.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to inform Mrs. Hudson that it is permissible for a judge to alter a score when an error has been made in marking up the judge's book.

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from Director Mrs. Mack recommending the appointment of Miss W. Stegall to fill the vacancy on the Quebec Provincial Committee (insufficient candidates in last election).

ACTION: As the proposed By-laws to be considered at the Annual General Meeting do not provide for provincial committees, the matter was ordered held over for consideration at the Annual Meeting of the Board.

SUBJECT: The President reported that arrangements had been made for the attendance of Mr. T. E. Gundersen, Registrar in office of Canadian National Live Stock Records, at the Annual General, to check the eligibility of those entering the meeting.

The President reported that it had been suggested to him that Mr. Gundersen be invited to attend the Annual Meeting of the Board.

ACTION: No action was taken.

1849. LETTER FROM A. M. FITZGERALD

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from A. M. FitzGerald, Pickering, Ont., followed by a proposed motion signed by Mr. FitzGerald and J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, calling for the appointment of a committee to prepare a brief for presentation to the American Ambassador in Ottawa, the brief to deal with "the inequity of the present procedure necessary for Canadians who wish to import dogs into the United States of America for exhibition purposes only . . .". Mr. FitzGerald asked that the motion be set on the agenda of the annual general meeting.

ACTION: Following discussion, the Secretary was directed to inform Mr. FitzGerald that the proposed motion could not be placed on the agenda of the meeting although any member may bring forward the proposal under the heading of "Any Other Business" at the meeting.

1950. LETTER FROM CUBAN MINISTRY OF EDUCATION (SPORTS DIVISION).

SUBJECT: The Secretary read a letter from the Cuban Ministry of Education (Sports Division) with regard to a proposed congress of national canine organizations at Havana in September.

ACTION: The Secretary was directed to take no action on the communication.

1951 (1811). LIST OF SUSPENDED PERSONS

SUBJECT: The Secretary reported that he had written the Live Stock Records office for information regarding those whose names had been added to the list of persons suspended by or denied the privileges of the Club because of infraction of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, but a reply received from the Director of Live Stock Records indicated that all such files were not readily available having been placed in storage.

ACTION: It was agreed that the Secretary would endeavour to locate all necessary information from the Club's records and files, and a committee composed of the President, Director Mrs. Brown and Director MacKendrick, would review all information obtained and prepare a report, with recommendation for the Board's consideration.

SUBJECT: Director Farmer referred to the President's earlier recommendation that some one member of the staff should be appointed to head the office. Director Farmer indicated that he believed such action should be taken at an early date.

Director Mrs. McColl pointed out it had been customary for the Managing Editor of DOGS IN CANADA to handle all details in connection with the staff and production of DOGS IN CANADA.

ACTION: This matter was ordered placed on the Agenda of the Annual Meeting of the Board.

1953. ADJOURNMENT

On motion by Director Mrs. Brown, duly seconded and carried, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourned at 5.30 p.m. (Note: These minutes are subject to correction when presented to the Board at its next meeting for adoption.)

The President, Mr. H. L. Walley, presided. Except for Director W. W. Pratt, of Calgary, who was unfortunately unable to be present because of illness, members of the Board of Directors from coast to coast were present. The members, by resolution, directed that a message be sent to Mr. Pratt extending the members' wishes for a speedy recovery from his illness.

The members adopted a resolution to lay on the table for reference and file in the Club's records, the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of 1950, and the Special General Meeting held in July, 1950.

The Immediate Past President, Mr. W. J. Risewick, was present and presented a report on the 1950 operations of the Club. A resolution was adopted receiving the Past President's report.

The Auditors' report for the year 1950 was adopted by resolution.

A resolution was adopted endorsing the action of the 1950 Board of Directors in assessing the 50-cent recording fee.

Mr. Walter Brown and Mr. H. L. Walley were elected the Club's representatives to the Canadian National Exhibitions Association for 1951.

Annual Meetings (continued from page D of minutes)

The following were the major changes made in the by-laws at the Annual General Meeting. Members desirous of noting these changes against the by-laws as originally proposed for consideration at the meeting should refer to Folio A in the February, 1951 issue of DOGS IN CANADA.

ARTICLE V—OBJECTS—the objects as published in DOGS IN CANADA were deleted in their entirety and in their stead were adopted Objects in line with discussions which representatives of the Club had with officials of the Department of Agriculture. (See Item 1837 of Board Meeting Minutes published in this issue; a minor change was made in Section (e)).

ARTICLE VII—MEMBERS—Sub-section (b) of Section 4 of this Article was deleted. This was a section requiring that all Renewals of Membership be referred to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII—MEETING OF MEMBERS—A new section, No. 8, was added to this Article, the new section to read: "A copy of the minutes of each general meeting shall be made available at cost to any member ordering the same."

ARTICLE XII—ELECTIONS—Section 3 was amended to permit of the inclusion of military, civil or courtesy titles or decorations and/or abbreviations, to appear on the membership list, distributed with nomination papers. (This information may not however appear on ballots).

Sections 5, 6 and 7, were amended to require that when a nomination paper is submitted to the Election Commission, such paper must be accompanied by the written acceptance of each member nominated on the form.

ARTICLE XIII—COMMITTEES, REPRESENTATIVES, AND APPOINTMENTS—Section 7, Auditors was amended by the deletion of the word "Chartered" as it preceded the word "Accountants".

Section 9 was amended to read as follows: "The Board of

Directors may from time to time, as it deems advisable, appoint Advisory Provincial Committees. Each such Committee shall be composed of five members, and the Provincial Director and Field Trial Representative shall be ex-officio members of the Committee. The duties of each such Committee shall be to advise the Provincial Director, and such other duties as may be assigned them by the Board of Directors. The action of any Advisory Committee is subject to approval by the Board of Directors."

Sections 10 and 11 were amended to provide for the appointment of Field Trial Representatives and Obedience Trial Representatives by the Board of Directors, and in the case of Field Trial Representatives, there are to be (where required) a representative for each of the various types of field trial activity in each zone.

ARTICLE XV—DISCIPLINE—Section 3 was amended to provide that if a charge or complaint is to be entertained by the Board of Directors, the charge or complaint shall be referred to an Advisory Committee designated by the Board for investigation and report. This action to be taken only if at least three-quarters of the entire Board of Directors decide that the charge or complaint is to be entertained.

Section 8—this section was amended to read "for any act of omission or commission which in the opinion of at least eleven members of the Board of Directors constitutes a violation of any of the Rules and/or Regulations adopted by this Club. The Board of Directors, subject always to the provision of Section 6, Sub-section 5, of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, 1949, may impose such penalties as it deems fit."

A further section to be known as Section 9 was added to read as follows: "No penalty of any kind may be imposed until such penalty has been considered by at least eleven members of the Board of Directors."

ARTICLE XXIII—AGREEMENTS—Section 1 was amended to read, "A pure-bred dog may be sold or otherwise disposed of by private agreement. Such agreement must be in writing." Section 2 was amended by deleting the word "supersede" and inserting the word "contravene".

ARTICLE XXV—KENNEL NAMES—Section 1 was amended by the addition of the following: "Where both husband and wife hold separate membership, it shall be permissible for both to use a kennel name registered by either provided that the member who registered the name gives his or her consent to the arrangement."

Section 6, regarding renewal fee in connection with a registered kennel name, was deleted and the present Section 7 of Article XXVI of the 1947 Constitution was inserted in its stead.

ARTICLE XXVI — RECOGNIZED BREEDS, STANDARDS—Section 1 was amended to require that the breeds be listed in Group order rather than the one alphabetical list as published in the February issue. It was agreed that poodles would be listed in Groups 5 and 6 without reference to "Miniature", "Standard", or "Toy". The "Long-haired Miniature Dachshund" and the "Wire-haired Miniature Dachshund" were added to the list of recognized breeds. The "Staffordshire Bull Terrier", recognized in 1950 and omitted from the list in error, was added to the list of recognized breeds.

ARTICLE XXVI — IDENTIFICATION — Section 2 (a) was amended to permit the identification letters of the purchaser of a dog to be used on a dog born in Canada and out of a registered litter, providing that the written permission of the owner of the dog at birth accompanies the application for registration form.

ARTICLE XXXV—FEES—Section 3, reference to the Renewal of Registration of Kennel Name fee was deleted from the schedule of fees. No other change in schedule of fees was made as listed in the February issue. The new schedule provides that the initial membership fee shall be \$6 and the renewal of membership fee \$5.

ARTICLE XXXVI — IMPROVEMENT OF STOCK—The proposed Article was deleted and was replaced by a revised Article as agreed, following discussions by the representatives of the Club and officials of the Department of Agriculture. (See Item 1837 in Minutes of Board Meeting published in this issue—Section 1 (a) was amended slightly from that published in Item 1837).

ARTICLE XXXVIII—AMENDMENTS—Section 1 was amended to require that all of the Rules of the Club may only be amended by referendum ballot.

The following was the disposition made of the proposed amendments to the Dog Show Rules, Field Trial Rules and Obedience Trial Rules (see proposed amendments published in the February, 1951 issue of DOGS IN CANADA, starting at the bottom of the right-hand column on page G).

1. Mrs. Alva McColl's three proposed amendments regarding no liability on the part of the Canadian Kennel Club for any loss or damage arising at or by reason of any show, obedience trial or field trial, held under the Club's rules, were adopted.

2. Mr. P. B. Jacobi's proposed amendment to Chapter 2 was adopted with the additional provision that the information to be sent to Show Secretaries and Superintendents include information regarding the duties of the Superintendent and Ring Stewards.

3. The proposed amendment to Chapter 3, Section 1, as proposed by W. J. Monaghan and E. B. Reid, was adopted. This proposed amendment requires that application for Championship show date be submitted to the Canadian Kennel Club not less than four months before the date of the show. (Three months was the previous rule.)

4. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Section 2 of Chapter 3 was adopted. This amendment called for the deletion of the words "All shows (except sanction), held indoors must be benched."

5. Mr. P. B. Jacobi's proposed amendment to Chapter 3, Section 3, regarding date fees was not adopted.

6. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 19, Section 1, regarding dogs excused by the veterinarian not being allowed to continue in competition at a particular show, was adopted.

7. The proposed amendment to Chapter 4, Section 3, as proposed by W. J. Monaghan and E. B. Reid, was adopted. This calls for a 4th division in American Cocker Spaniels to be known as "Black and Tan". This new division to constitute another variety in that breed.

8. The proposed amendment by Mrs. H. M. Mellish and W. J. Pym, regarding change in the Dog Show Rules of the name of "mastiff" to "Old English Mastiff", was approved.

9. A proposed amendment, sponsored by Bruce McRae and John Devlin, calling for the awarding of a Best of Opposite Sex to Best of Breed award at specialty shows, was adopted except that this award is to be made at all championship shows, the ribbon to be green and white.

10. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendments to Chapter 4 calling for the deletion of sections relating to the awards of Best Canadian-bred and Best Canadian-bred Puppy was amended to require that such awards be made, after Best in Show, all eligible dogs to be brought to the ring for the awards, the present practice of making such selections in each breed and in each group to be discontinued.

11. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 4, Section 3 (i) regarding persons in the judging rings was not adopted.

12. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 3 regarding priority dates was adopted.

13. The proposed amendment, sponsored by John Devlin and Mrs. Mary B. McRae, was dealt with earlier in the meeting (see section 6 above).

14. The proposed amendment to Chapter 16, Section 2 (b), regarding listed dogs, as sponsored by A. M. Fitzgerald, and Miss Faye Fox, was not adopted.

15. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 17, Section 2, regarding disqualifications, was adopted.

At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors the following decisions were made:

- (a) A club holding a championship show, obedience trial or licensed field trial under C.K.C. Rules to pay a 50c recording fee to the Canadian Kennel Club for each and every dog entered in competition at a show or trial;
- (b) The non-refundable date fee of \$15.00 for a sanction show

- or trial held under C.K.C. Rules to be no longer collected;
- (c) Any show-giving club requesting the services of the C.K.C. Representative in his official capacity will be required to pay \$15.00 for every eight-hour period the C.K.C. Representative is away from the office attending their show, plus his travelling expenses.

The Board considered plans by which publication of the stud books may be resumed. Further information on this subject will be published in DOGS IN CANADA.

Members reading these notes on the annual general meeting should note that the By-laws as adopted at the Annual General Meeting do not come into effect until approved by the Minister of Agriculture although it is possible that such approval will be obtained before this issue of DOGS IN CANADA appears in the mail. The new By-laws will be effective immediately on the Minister's approval.

Members should note that the amendments to the Dog Show Rules do not come into effect until 60 days after the annual general meeting.

16. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 17, section 2, regarding disqualifications, was adopted.

17. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 5, Sections 6 and 7, was not adopted.

18. The proposed amendment to Chapter 7, Section 5, as proposed by E. B. Reid and J. W. Loftus, regarding professional handlers acting as judges, was not adopted.

19. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 8, Section 1, regarding judges, was withdrawn.

20. The proposed amendment to Chapter 19, Section 5, as proposed by E. B. Reid and W. J. Monaghan, regarding the addition of the words "and height" to the sentence which reads, "the decision of the Show Superintendent shall be final in the determination of weight", was adopted.

21. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 4, Section 3, was withdrawn in view of the decision reached earlier in the meeting regarding the awards of Best Canadian-bred and Best Canadian-bred Puppy.

22. Mr. P. B. Jacobi's proposed amendment to Chapter 15, Section 5, requiring that the time of judging the first breed in each Group be stated in the premium list, was withdrawn.

23. The proposed amendment to Chapter 8, Section 1, with regard to professional handlers judging, as proposed by E. B. Reid and J. W. Loftus, was not adopted.

25. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 17, regarding the disqualification of dogs upon which colouring matter, excepting chalk for cleansing purposes, has been used, was not adopted.

26. Mr. P. B. Jacobi's proposed amendment to Chapter 18, requiring that the time of the commencement of the judging of the first breed in each Group be published in the catalogue, was adopted.

27. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment calling for the deletion of Section 14, of Chapter 19, of the present Rules, was adopted. (This provision made reference to a show-giving club permitting the bringing of a dog into a one-day show up to 12 o'clock noon.)

28. Mrs. Ellen Brown's proposed amendment to Chapter 20, requiring that trophy tables be not located inside judging rings, was withdrawn.

29. Dr. F. Rushton's proposed amendment to Chapter 1, of Section 21, in respect of point-rating for Beagles in Ontario, was withdrawn.

30. The proposed amendment to Chapter 21, sponsored by A. M. Fitzgerald and Miss Faye Fox, was not adopted.

31. Dr. Rushton's proposed amendments to the Field Trial Rules, as listed on page "L" of the February, 1951 issue of DOGS IN CANADA, were adopted.

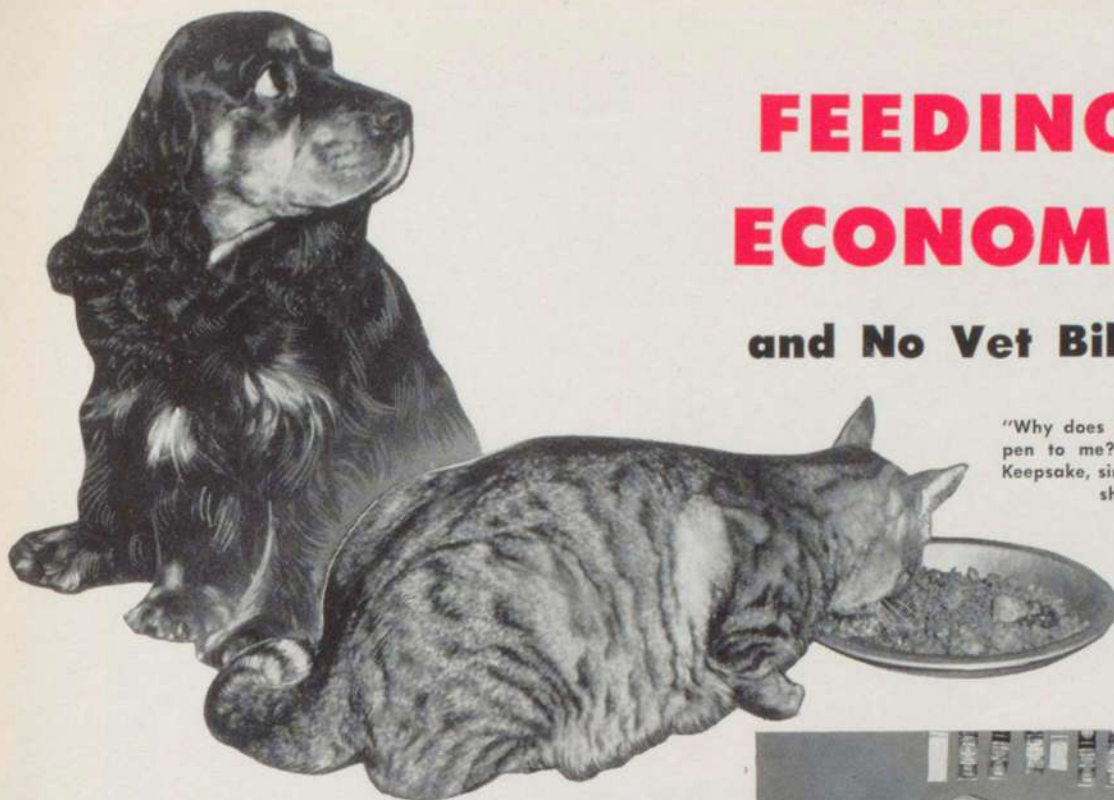
32. The proposed amendments to Chapter 10, Section 4, and to Section 7, of the Standard Procedure for Non-Slip Retriever trials, as proposed by V. Grainger, D. B. Blacklock, et al. were not adopted.

33. Dr. F. Rushton's proposed amendments to the Beagle Field Trial Rules (see pages U, V, W, and X, of the February, 1951 issue of DOGS IN CANADA), were adopted with the following amendments:

- a. Chapter 12, Rule 4, Section 1, was amended by the addition of provision for appointment of official measurers and issuance of official measurement certificates.
- b. Chapter 12, Rule 17, Section 3, was deleted.
- c. Chapter 13, Rule 4, Section 1—last sentence of second paragraph, deleted. To this section was added provision for the appointment of official measurers and the issuance of official measurement certificates.
- d. Chapter 13, Rule 8, first sentence, changed to read as follows: "Should the pack split, hounds going away on different hares, the judges shall either order the handlers to get their hounds into the one pack or pick up all hounds and get a new start on fresh game."
- e. Chapter 14, Rule 1, Section 1, the following words were deleted: "All open classes shall be run by braces on game to be eligible for Championship point rating."
- f. Chapter 14, Rule 1, Section 2, was amended to read as follows: "The running of both sexes in one class (combined classes) shall not be allowed in licensed trials."
- g. Chapter 14, Rule 2, Section 1, was amended by the deletion of the second paragraph and the substitution thereof of the following: "Dogs and bitches at or near the 13" mark which obtain points in both divisions must be officially measured before a Championship certificate can be issued. The first place required must be obtained in the class into which it is measured and the total points required by that division obtain. All points accumulated in both divisions count towards the total."
- h. Chapter 14 was amended by the addition of a new section to be known as Section 7, and to read as follows: "Beagles placing at trials in different geographical areas in which there is a difference in the total points required must obtain a larger total. The first required may be obtained anywhere."

In addition to the foregoing changes, an amendment was adopted requiring that the Field Trial Rules be amended in the same manner as other rules adopted by the Club are amended from time to time.

The foregoing information is subject to correction when the minutes of the annual general meeting are received and reviewed.



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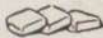
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
