

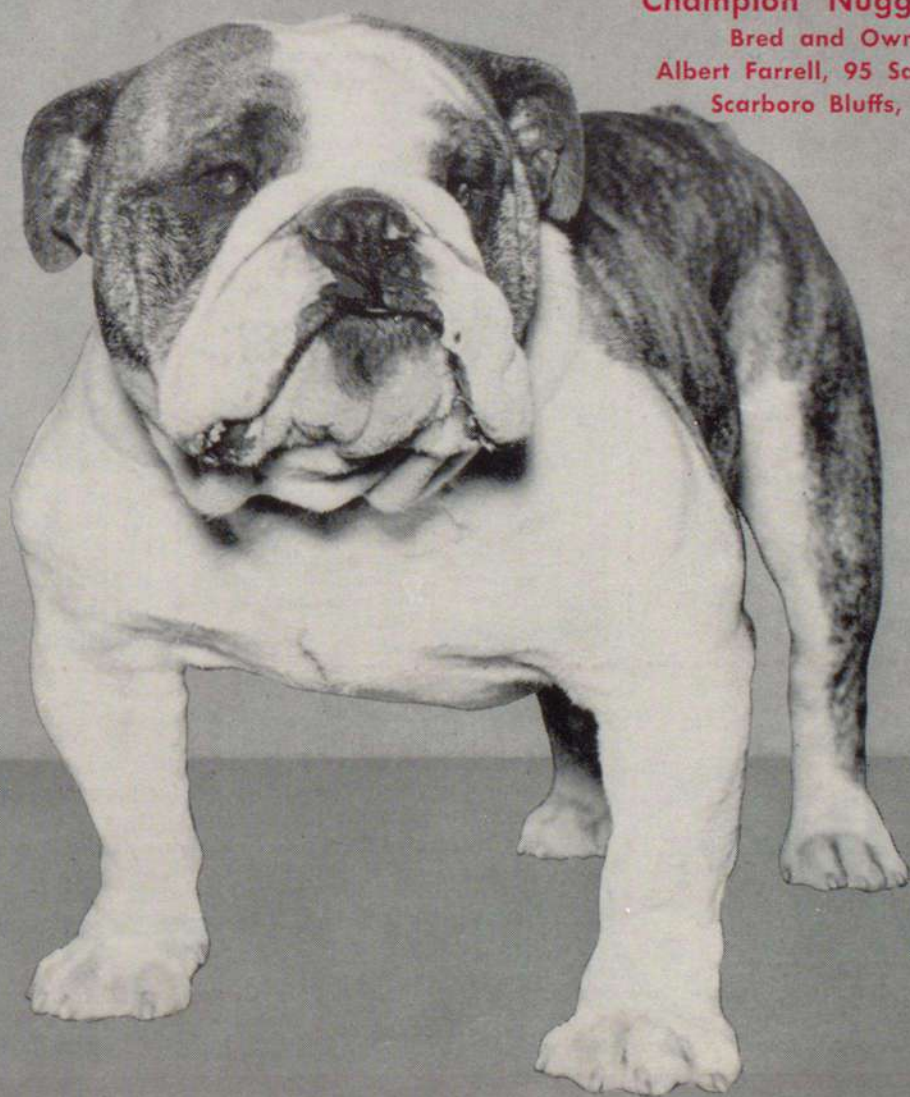

Man's Best Friend . . . An Inherent Worker

UNDER the present fashion of making show dogs work has come the popular pastime of what we might call 'dog cultivation' and we need go no further than to one of our great dog shows to be convinced of the successful accomplishment in this field of endeavour.

Here is a hobby which not only affords the utmost enjoyment but which has been turned into a profitable profession, alike to dog and man.

After countless centuries of the dog's renunciation of the animal kingdom for man, he is at last making rapid strides toward a return to his natural heritage and that heritage is to work, as is the incentive of every healthy living thing. In this the dog is supremely happy.

The stimulation of interest in the dog which is noticeably evident has created a marked demand for more and better dogs. Never in the history of "Man's best friend" has the trend of popularity risen to such heights and there seems to be no limit to this expansion as new breeds are being developed yearly whose ultimate destination is the "dog show".

There seems to be no reason at the present time why anyone should be pessimistic about the future of the dog. Indeed there is every reason to believe that a great cycle in dog cultivation is well on its way to perfection as this new trend of teaching the dog to work goes on and on into channels yet unexplored.

Man's recognition of his loyal and faithful friend, in providing a natural outlet for his instincts is being demonstrated daily, and the genuine interest which he is exhibiting in this comparatively new field is indeed worthy of note.

With the renewed and increasing interest in the great sport of bird and deer hunting the demand for good sporting dogs exceeds the supply and breeders of this attractive group would be well advised to augment their kennels with new and better blood, for the sportsmen of today are a discriminating lot and they are not going to be satisfied with a mediocre dog. They want the best. They want a dog that will meet all the requirements of both field and bench. In short they want a dog bearing the three requisite qualities; brains, beauty and stamina.

These sporting dogs are being worked perhaps more than any other group, yet every autumn we are confronted with the tragedy of the untrained dog as he tries with all the courage of his staunch and faithful heart to meet the requirements of this sport and fails. Literally hundreds of dogs throughout Canada are wantonly sacrificed due to their lack of training. To the hound particularly falls this uncharitable fate. In many cases, after having served his master to the best of his ability, he is left in the Canadian wilds to die a cruel and unmerited death for he may fall an easy prey to wolves.

Contingent upon the foregoing facts lies the need for more and better trained dogs, and a ready army of hounds, specially equipped for deer hunting in the fall of the year should be available. But the time is coming and not far distant, when our sporting dogs will distinguish themselves as experts in their particular field, as huntsmen realize and appreciate more than ever before, the advantages of a well trained dog and his performance is fast becoming a point of pride.

A most important group of dogs are those classified as workers. Chief among these are the shepherd type which includes the Collie, German shepherd, old English Shetland sheep dog and Welsh Corgis. The Great Dane, Newfoundland, St. Bernard, Mastiff, Eskimo and Siberian huskie are all classed as working dogs.

Obedience test competition gives ample evidence of the highly commendable form of achievement evolved from this fashionable revival of returning the dog to his heritage. A few years ago the German shepherd found himself in an altogether unknown vocation, that of being trained in the business of leading the blind. There is no gainsaying that this intelligent canine is making a success of this work in a most competent manner. The noble part he played in the Great War as sentry, messenger and Red Cross worker is now authenticated history and there seems no limit to his educational capacity.

The collie, immortalized in literature, claims Scotland for his native land. This industrious fellow is perhaps the oldest among the shepherd types. He has always been an efficient worker, essentially a guard and herder, his ability and willingness to learn however, has placed him among the most versatile of canines. In early Canadian farm life he was more or less a domestic servant, but with the progression of time came modern household utilities and the collie was relieved of these menial duties. Today he is being used more and more in his original capacity, thus perpetuating his skill in his particular line.

The Shetland sheepdog is a replica of the Scotch collie in miniature. This diminutive worker is rapidly increasing in popularity and his presence at sheep dog trials is already being felt. He is a sturdy little fellow and is particularly suited to working in rough farmlands and though he is conspicuously small he lacks none of the courage and brains of the larger and more formidable varieties. They make admirable pets and companions about the house and their size renders them suitable for either country or city home. They excel as watchdogs and their rise to popularity is inevitable.

Among the life savers we have the Newfoundland and the St. Bernard. These large animals, in spite of their economic liability, maintain a growing popularity. They are being used in other capacities and are an adjunct to winter sports for children.

Much is to be said of the other working dogs but space does not allow for a more replete history.

It is hardly necessary to go into the terrier group extensively. This breed need little or no introduction, and, although there are many types, they all have a big following. They are all "diggers of the soil" and derive their name from the Latin word "terra" the earth. Originally most of these dogs were vermin hunters and they still are, whenever the opportunity affords. The fox terrier was used a century ago for routing the fox from his lair. The smooth type antedates the wire, but the wire hair is the most fashionable of all the terriers today. This dapper fellow is a development of the old black and tan wire and the smooth. His advent into the dog realm is due to the untiring efforts of the Duchess of Newcastle. He is a stylish little dog and is a prime favourite at the dog shows — frequently going best in show.

Mention should be made of the Irish terrier. This highly intelligent and aggressive species has long been a devoted pal of the Irishman. He is capable of being put to many uses, though as a rat exterminator he probably tops them all.

The airedale too merits special mention for besides being an efficient vermin chaser his cross with the otter hound renders him adaptable for work both in and out of the water. Some years ago, he became noted for his work in aiding police and today he is used extensively as a guard in large factories and private properties. He is a handsome, upstanding, impressive fellow and is one of the most amenable of the terrier group. He thrives on work and is fast finding favour with the farmer.

There are the miscellaneous or non-sporting dogs and here we have some erstwhile workers, though most of these dogs are of pet heritage. The poodle and schipperke can and will work, if afforded the opportunity. The poodle, originally a water dog, later became a herder and hunter. Today he is carrying off top honours at obedience test trials, and he is very apt to find himself back in his old capacity. He is the star performer of the stage, and has found great favouritism with Royalty who are responsible for his shorn and oddly fashioned coat. Many years ago he was trimmed to ape the lion's appearance.

The schipperke is more or less a pet in Canada although his native country of Belgium hail him as a highly intelligent working dog. He is a very old breed and his work on canal boats renders him indispensable in that country. He is highly regarded as a protector of property and is becoming more and more popular at the dog shows.

The bulldog, symbol of British tenacity, is also included in this group. He is a highly publicized dog and no show is complete without him. He was used many centuries ago for the sport of bull-baiting but since that sport has

become lost in the midst of tradition the bulldog is now used as a protector and companion.

The chow who hails from China is one of the oldest breeds in existence, his history dating back two thousand years or more. He is accredited with having had a fierce disposition and it is said once used to fight robber bands in Tibet. His luxurious fur was once the pride of Manchurian and Mongolian markets and his flesh was once a popular household commodity. The word "chow" in this country meaning "something to eat" no doubt found its origin in this unique manner. Due to his long existence he has become a cultured and reserved creature, he makes a splendid companion and shows no sign of exhibiting his inherent fierceness unless he is unduly molested. A peculiarity of this dog is his blue tongue.

Some other dogs coming under this category are the dalmatian, Boston terrier, and keeshond, the latter being the National dog of Holland. He is rather a newcomer in this country but someone is soon bound to sponsor his breed as he is one of the finest of housedogs.

With the astonishing increase in demand for apartment homes, in ratio, has come a marked demand for the smaller or toy dog, among these are the pekingese, pomeranian, chihuahua, dandie dinmont and many others. All these are active, alert little watchdogs and they serve their purpose in the apartment and smaller home as the larger dog serves in a more pretentious manner.

The foregoing abbreviated resume of the adaptability and capability of a small representation of each group of dogs, gives a proportionately small idea of the real value of dogs in their diverse capacities.

Many hundreds of centuries have passed since that eventful time when dog and man struck up their strange friendship, a friendship which was henceforth destined to become imperishable. Their egression from the dark ages found the dog still closely allied with man, the animal kingdom forgot-ten.

In the intervening lapse of time man and dog were co-workers in their primitive way and much of dog's intelligence is a result of this partnership.

As time advanced and the reality of civilization began to dawn upon an ignorant world, the future for both man and dog took on a brighter aspect. Life at this stage was not easy for either, the dog being "Jack of all trades" did everything that lay within the scope of his knowledge.

Man soon became educated however, and the results of his own civilization began to deprive the dog of his economic usefulness. Within the history of our time, and through no fault of his own, the dog suffered the loss of that which made him happiest, his work.

Shift the scene now to the present day and we find the dog doing more work than he has done in years. This work is fast developing his inherent instincts and he is becoming a "thing of beauty" with brains as well.

The inspiration back of this movement in dog civilization gives rise to

numerous, speculative thoughts, as to the reason for this interest. Many could be cited but among the most important is the sporting competition provided by the dog show, the field trials and obedience test trials.

There is a theory extant which teaches "that all things eventually return to their source" and so it is with the dog. Today we find him well on his way back to his natural heritage, and that heritage is — to work.

Announcements

The following information is provided for clubs holding championship shows and exhibitors at such shows:

1. Clubs holding championship shows and championship specialty shows under the rules of The Canadian Kennel Club should note that a Fifty Cent Recording Fee is payable to The Canadian Kennel Club for each and every dog entered in competition at each show. This fee applies and is payable regardless of whether the dogs are absent and regardless of whether the clubs collect the usual entry fees. Such fees must be remitted to The Canadian Kennel Club, along with listing fees for unregistered dogs, within ten days after the show. (This same recording fee applies to licensed field trials and obedience trials held under the rules of The Canadian Kennel Club).

2. The classes in American Cocker Spaniels now have four divisions, the additional division being for "black and tan". The four varieties in American Cocker Spaniels compete for Best of Breed and Best of Breed winner only competes in the Sporting Group. The Best of Variety ribbon is to be blue and white in colour. This rule applies for shows to be held after May 29th.

3. The dog show rules in effect prior to May 29th, 1951, required that an indoor all breed championship show must be benched. This rule will no longer be effective after May 29th, but the application for date must indicate whether the show is to be benched or not.

4. After May 29th all applications for championship and specialty championship shows must reach the Canadian Kennel Club not less than four months before the date of the show.

5. For some time the rules have required that a Best Canadian Bred and Best Canadian Bred Puppy be selected in each breed and in each group, this to facilitate the subsequent selection in Best Canadian Bred in Show and Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Show. This procedure is not to be followed after May 29th. The former practice whereby all Canadian bred dogs, not directly or indirectly defeated by another Canadian bred dog at the show, were brought before the judge after the award of Best in Show is now reinstated. The same policy applies in connection with selection of Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Show.

6. The rules have been amended to provide for the selection of Best of Opposite Sex in each breed. It is now permissible to offer a prize for Best of Opposite Sex in a breed. The ribbon for this award is to be red and white in colour.

7. Any dog excused by the show superintendent or show veterinarian for any reason shall not, after being excused, compete in any class or for any award for the balance of this show. This applies also to any dog for which permission is given to be removed from its bench.

8. The attention of show-giving clubs is drawn to the following new Dog Show Rule effective on May 29th:

"A Club or Association, desirous of obtaining priority rights to any given date or dates upon which it wishes to

hold a championship show annually, may apply to the Board of Directors, on a form provided for the purpose, and if such application is approved, shall pay a non-refundable fee of \$10.00. A Club or Association granted priority rights to any given date or dates must, in order to retain that priority, apply for permission to hold a championship show on that date or dates not less than three months before such date or dates, and in the event such application does not reach the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club before the three months period referred to, such priority rights shall be deemed to be voided and the date or dates may be granted to any other Club or Clubs until priority is again granted as previously provided."

Clubs holding licensed obedience trials are asked to note the following special regulations in respect to ribbons for such trials:

"A ribbon shall be provided only for a dog which receives a qualifying score at an Obedience Trial held under these Regulations and the Obedience Trial Rules adopted by The Canadian Kennel Club. Each ribbon must identify the club holding the Trial, its colour must be blue, it must carry the crest of The Canadian Kennel Club Incorporated, and it must bear the words "Qualifying score"."

As general information to members of the club and others interested attention is drawn to the following:

1. The By-laws adopted at the Annual General Meeting on March 30th, 1951, received Ministerial approval on May 5th and became effective on May 5th. These By-laws are now being printed and any member of the club may obtain a copy by sending a postcard request to the Secretary-Treasurer, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario.

2. The new By-laws provide that the initial membership fee is Six Dollars and the renewal of membership fee is Five Dollars. Members in 1950 who have not renewed for the current year should note that the renewal fee is now Five Dollars. The signature of sponsors on an application for membership is not now required. Only ordinary members in good standing at June 30th, 1951, will be eligible to participate in the election of Officers and Directors for 1952.

3. Persons who contemplate applying for registration of a kennel name should note that the new By-laws provide that such new kennel names may be used as a prefix only. This requirement should be borne in mind in selecting a suitable name.

4. Apropos of the resolution adopted at the Annual General Meeting with regard to residents of the United States judging in Canada, information obtained from the American Kennel Club indicates that whether applicants for judging licenses are residents of the United States, Canada, or any other country, all applications receive identical treatment in the American Kennel Club's Licensing Department. Residents of Canada who do not hold a judging license issued by the American Kennel Club but are desirous of judging at shows held under the American Kennel Club's rules may apply to the American Kennel Club direct. There is no change

in the Canadian Kennel Club's requirements insofar as it concerns residents of the United States judging in Canada and clubs desirous of obtaining approval of the Canadian Kennel Club for residents of the United States to judge at their shows should apply to the Canadian Kennel Club in the usual way.

5. A charge is now made to the Canadian Kennel Club in connection with recording, on records at the Live Stock Records Office, of dogs which now receive confirmation of championship status or having attained an Obedience Trial title. To offset this charge, the Board of Directors has set a charge of 50c which is to be paid to The Canadian Kennel Club before the Live Stock Records Office is notified of a dog having attained championship status or having attained Obedience Trial title. No record of a title will be made at the Live Stock Records Office until this fee is received by the Canadian Kennel Club.

6. All members and others applying for membership, renewing membership, applying for registration of litters, individual dogs, kennel names, and leases, should note that all such applications and fees should be forwarded DIRECT to The Canadian Live Stock Records at Ottawa, Ontario. No special attention is given to the foregoing items if forwarded through the Club's Toronto office.

7. In preparing these applications extreme care should be taken in seeing that the information furnished is correct in every detail and that the applications are completed in every detail. In one three-week period recently no less than 177 applications were returned to applicants because of errors or omissions in the applications. This not only delays the issuance of certificates for these applications, but also delays the issuance of certificates of other applications received at the Live Stock Records Office.

8. Any person desirous of obtaining information as to the number of championship points earned by a dog at championship shows or licensed trials held under C.K.C. Rules should note that money order for \$2.00 must accompany the request for such information. A charge of \$2.00 is also made for information regarding the pedigree of a dog.

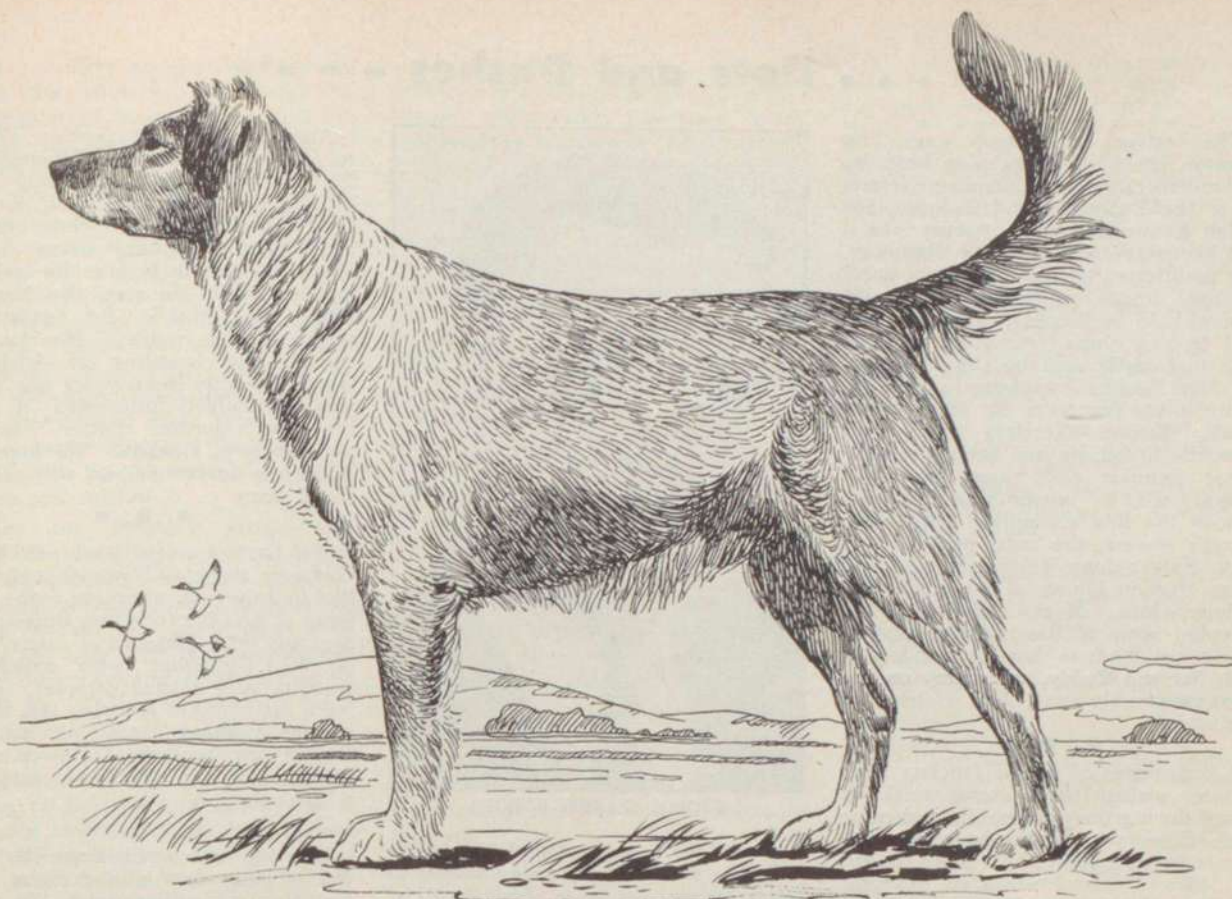
9. The charge for a specially engraved championship certificate, for an obedience trial certificate or for a field trial championship certificate is now \$2.00. The charge for a Certificate of Merit (Field Trial) is 50c. Such fees should be remitted direct to the Canadian Kennel Club.

THE TOLLING DOG

THE NOVA SCOTIA DUCK TOLLING RETRIEVER

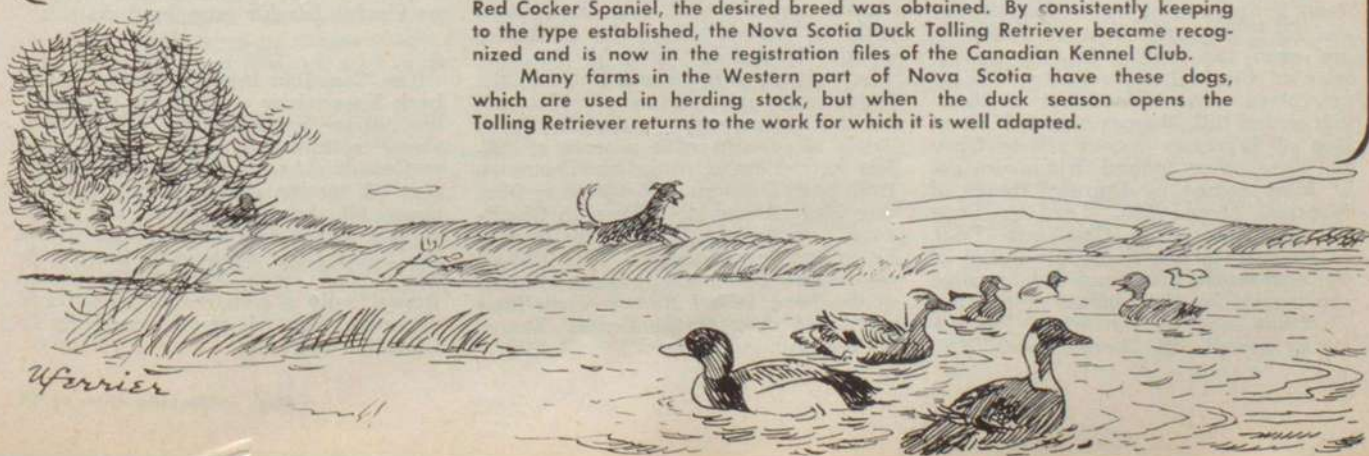
In the Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever, Canada has created a breed of dog all its own. While dogs were used in Europe for luring water fowl into nets, no country considered this type of dog important enough to breed and perpetuate.

Years ago, in the days of wooden ships, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia was a port-of-call, and as the Little River, with its vast marshes, was a haven for wild ducks, the sailors spent much of their time hunting. It was the custom for the sailors to have dogs with them on the ships as pets, which were most useful in retrieving objects that had fallen overboard, and as these dogs were of the Newfoundland and Labrador type, they were taken into the marshes to help retrieve the fallen birds. In those days, the fire arms were anything but adequate for long range shooting, with the result that the ducks would have to be shot very close to shore.

The red fox was very adept at catching wild ducks; it would run up and down the edge of the marsh and crouch down, periodically rising and waving his brush or tail quickly to and fro. The ducks flying overhead would be attracted by its colour and actions and come down to the edge of the marsh, whereupon they were seized and eaten.

It was necessary then to produce a dog the colour of a red fox with some of its tolling qualifications; so by many crossings of the black Labrador and the Red Cocker Spaniel, the desired breed was obtained. By consistently keeping to the type established, the Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever became recognized and is now in the registration files of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Many farms in the Western part of Nova Scotia have these dogs, which are used in herding stock, but when the duck season opens the Tolling Retriever returns to the work for which it is well adapted.



The esteem in which our late director, Paddy Boughs, was held by the members of the Canadian Kennel Club, the Daily Star of Toronto, for which he worked some twenty years, and his comrades in the 19th Battalion, was manifested by the number of floral tributes and the largely attended funeral held in Toronto. Flowers were sent by dog clubs from coast to coast both in Canada and the United States, for Mr. Boughs had been a familiar figure in the dog fancy for many years. While Boston Terriers were his favourite breed, he had been a professional handler and judge of many breeds with outstanding success. Among the fine champions which Mr. Boughs owned, the most popular was Lady Sylvaenglens Valentine, who had many Best in Shows to her credit. His widow, Mrs. Muriel Boughs, has accepted some of the judging engagements assigned to her husband, and with her son Teddy, will carry on the business so ably established by her late husband.

Director of the Canadian Kennel Club for the past three years and well-known breeder of Boston Terriers, and judge of all breeds of dogs, died at his home in Toronto last month. He was president of the Boston Terrier Breeders' Association, vice-president of the Toy Dog Breeders' Association, and honorary-president of the Professional Handlers' Association. A sergeant in the 19th Battalion in World War I, he was wounded at Vimy Ridge and had suffered considerably for the past few years. He was born in Maiden Head, England, in 1895, and had planned to visit his homeland during the coming summer. Surviving are his widow, two sons, William in Sarnia and George (Teddy) in Toronto, and two grandsons, Jimmy and Paddy Jr.

A contingent of poodle fanciers from Canada visited three shows in Long Island during the past month, and came back filled with enthusiasm for the wonderful reception given them by Mr. and Mrs. Harland Meistrell, director and Mrs. Helen Grant Biddle, president of the Westbury Dog Training Club. At the Poodle Club of America's Specialty Show the Canadian bred Miniature Poodle, Invincible Juliet of Paragon, owned and trained by Miss Bay Meyers of Toronto and bred by Mrs. D. I. Smart, of Vancouver, competed in the Bench Shows of the Poodle Club of America Specialty Show, the Ladies' Kennel Club Show of America and the Long Island Kennel Club Show, where she won three 2nd ribbons. Obedience Trials were held at the three shows with the following results. At the Poodle Club of America Specialty Obedience Trial, in an entry of 51, Invincible Juliet of Paragon won her American Companion Dog degree with the score of 187 placing 4th in Novice B. The standard poodle Peticote Becky, owned and trained by Mrs. Alec Casgrain, of Montreal, and bred by Mrs. J. Dempster of Hudson Heights, Que., won 2nd Novice B with a score of 194. Itou of Saguenay U.D., also owned and trained by Mrs. Casgrain won a score of 175 in Open B. Another Standard Canadian bred poodle, Bonzer C.D., owned by Mrs. R. H. Bryson, of Montreal, and bred by R. O. Johnston, scored 188½ in Novice A. At the Ladies' Kennel Association of America Obedience Trial, in an entry of 122, Peticote Becky tied for first place with a score of 197½ and won the trophy for the poodle winning the highest score any variety any class. Invincible Juliet of Paragon scored 192, Bonzer scored 177 and Itou of Saguenay scored 189 in Open B. The Cocker Spaniel Griffintown Pal O' Mine owned by Dorothy Budge of Montreal scored 185. At the Long Island Kennel Club Obedience Trial, in an entry of 98, Invincible Juliet of Paragon scored 199½ and was awarded the trophy for the highest score by a Canadian dog at the trial. Peticote Becky scored 196, Bonzer scored 187.

The cocker spaniel Griffintown Pal O' Mine scored 194 and placed 2nd in a big class. The three poodles completed their American C.D. tests. Unfortunately the cocker spaniel could not compete at the poodle specialty, but he has two wins towards his C.D. title. Itou of Saguenay, the standard poodle, and the first of his breed to win the Utility title in Canada, has two wins on his C.D.X. title in the U.S. Congratulations to the above Canadian fanciers and their Canadian bred dogs who are doing so much to further the good work of obedience training, both in Canada and the U.S. At the Kennel Club of Buffalo show, the miniature poodle, Invincible Juliet of Paragon, won through to Reserve winners in the Breed class and then won the trophy for the highest score in the Obedience Trials all classes with a score of 198. Her kennel mate, Canadian Champion Hollycourt Osmium, also owned by Mrs. Bay Meyers, was not shown in Obedience, but he won through to best of breed and best of variety at the Buffalo Show, 2nd Open and Reserve winners at the Long Island Kennel Club Show and third open at the Ladies' Kennel Club of America Show.

Another good dog fancier was lost to us when James Robertson, of Toronto, passed away suddenly on the 17th of May. Mr. Robertson served in the first World War where he was awarded the Military Cross and the French Croix de Guerre for gallantry on the field. He was also honoured with the M.B.E. for outstanding services to his country. Mr. Robertson started the breeding of Irish and Gordon Setters some years ago and he was particularly interested in bringing the Gordon Setter back to popularity in Canada. We hope Mrs. Robertson and their son will carry on these plans.

May we once again draw the attention of the show giving clubs to the fact that we will publish the photographs of the group and best in show awards, if the photographs are supplied. The response to this offer made in March of this year has been disappointing. The only club to avail itself of the opportunity was the Sportsmen's Show in Toronto. Next month we will feature the Collie and Shetland Sheep Dog. Photographs and the reports of the Collie and Shetland Sheep Dog Specialty Show will be featured in this issue. The latest standards for these two breeds will also be published, and photographs of champion dogs will be featured at a greatly reduced rate.

This Obedience fever is spreading rapidly across the country. At the recent Ladies' Kennel Club Show held at Montreal the owner of the Welsh Corgi, Bracken of Ballybentra was more excited over the score of 193 won by her dog in Obedience than if the dog had won Best in Show honours. Could it be that the dog has to do the work in the Obedience ring, and if it doesn't score 50% in each exercise it cannot win? Or could it be that tension of watching the dog work and the enthusiasm when it finally scores for the degree is worth the efforts. Whatever it is they certainly are doing a wonderful job for pure bred dogs.

The Canadian bred fox terrier, Foxback Entertainer of Harham, who won the terrier group at the New York show, continues to bring much credit to Canada. At time of writing, he had won 12 terrier groups and 8 best in show all breeds. Owned by Mrs. Harold Florsheim of Deerfield, Ill., it has never been defeated in the terrier group since being shown at American shows, truly a remarkable record and apparently an all-time record for a Canadian bred dog.

While writing of the Westminster Kennel Club show, we mentioned the performance of Frank Weed and his sporting dogs assisted by the antics of the trained pheasant, Boston Blackie. Frank Weed and his wife were at the Sportsmen's Show in Toronto, and on hearing of our enjoyment of their act in New York, they volunteered to repeat for the Dog Show exhibitors. Mrs. Frank Weed, who is a director of the American Pointer Club and also chairman of their field trial committee, together with Miss Donna Hart, secretary of the Pointer and Field Trial Club of America, were visiting at the show and assisted with the demonstration of the pointers and setters.

Before the sporting group was judged on Saturday evening Frank Weed demonstrated field trial technique, using several quail, the pheasant Boston Blackie, and some pigeons as part of the act. The four-months old pointer puppy became so keen that he caught one of the pigeons and as a result feathers flew in all directions.

Shortly after, the Pointers, Setters and Spaniels entered the ring for the judging of the sporting group and it was quite amusing to the crowd when two of the sporting dogs went on point when they scented the game birds. Who said a show dog cannot work in the field?

The Distemper Question

THE approaching heavy season of dog shows brings to our minds the aftermath of health disturbances to which show dogs may be subjected. No matter how carefully veterinary inspection and supervision is carried out at a show, sickness is liable to break out amongst the hundreds of exhibits gathered closely together.

The sudden change of surroundings, sights and sounds, great variations of temperatures, changes in foods and water, will have an upsetting effect on even the most placid animal, and fanciers should take into serious consideration the possibility of their young dogs contracting distemper.

This great canine scourge has been a world-wide problem wherever interest is manifested in the welfare of the dog. Its prevalence used to be taken as a matter of course; dogs had to take their chance of contracting the disease, although bacteriologists sought from time to time to find a positive causative agent of distemper, without success. There were no means of safeguarding dogs that mingled with other dogs.

About 25 years ago, after five years of intensive study and investigation, a means of providing permanent immunity against distemper in the form of vaccine and virus, which may be given by hypodermic injection in a manner somewhat similar to the treatments which are given for infectious diseases of human beings, was developed.

It is generally accepted now by authorities on the diseases of dogs, that distemper, while highly infectious, is not necessarily a serious or fatal disease; in fact, quite a few dogs undergo distemper while manifesting only slight disturbances of health. But when an infected animal is attacked by distemper there is the danger that its resistance may be lowered so much that other germ diseases are readily contracted, giving rise to dangerous complications involving the nervous, respiratory and digestive systems that are most difficult to control and satisfactorily treat. Dogs of certain age and breeds invariably die from these secondary invaders, regardless of what treatment is administered.

However, if a susceptible dog is given protection against infection by distemper, little or no opportunity is given for these complications to establish themselves.

It has now been definitely proven that a young dog, fortified with distemper preventative treatment, may mingle with dogs suffering from the complaints that follow distemper, without showing any signs of sickness or contracting the diseases.

Fanciers should take up the question of having their dogs safeguarded against distemper with their veterinarian. There is a great sense of relief in knowing that valuable stock is insured against the ever-present danger of distemper.

Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever

DESCRIPTION AND STANDARD

General Appearance

The Nova Scotia Duck Toller should be very muscular and heavy in bone, the head and neck should be carried slightly above a straight line with the back. When the dog is in action, the tail should be carried curled high up over hind quarters. Size is absolutely necessary. There is a half sad expression, until the dog is put to work, when that sad expression springs to inquisitiveness and the dog trembles with excitement, alertness and determination. He should resemble an overgrown red fox.

Height

The minimum height of an adult dog over 18 months must be 20½ inches, that of a female 18½ inches.

Weight

The minimum weight of an adult dog over 18 months should be 50 lbs., that of a female 35 lbs.

Head

Generally the head should resemble that of the Golden Retriever. The muzzle or foreface more desirable if broad. The skull should be flat and about 5 inches wide across the base. The size of the head varies but not necessarily depending upon the size of the dog. For the entire length from the tip of the nose to the back of the occiput, 9 inches is a good measurement. The length from the end of the nose to the point between the eyes should be about equal or preferably of greater length than from this point to the back of the occiput. The occiput peak is not prominent. The stop is concave and gradual.

(a) Lips. The lips should hang rather curved in front. Flesh color preferable.

(b) Underline. The underline of the head, i.e., profile, should run almost in a straight line from the corner of the lip to the corner of the jawbone. The underline of muzzle from tip of nose to back end of lip is a lean convex curve.

(c) Jaw. Lower jaw thin. Lower side teeth fit inside upper side teeth. Soft in mouth.

(d) Nose and nostrils. The bridge of the nose should be fairly wide, about 1½ inches, and taper somewhat at tip. Nostrils are well open. Flesh color preferred, no objection to black.

(e) Ears. The ears are medium size set high and well back on the skull and carried very slightly erect with tips falling forward. They are well feathered at back of the fold. The tips are nicely rounded to conform to round muzzle, the hair at ear tips is short.

(f) Eyes. Golden brown to match coat. Flesh around eye flesh color. Eyes should be set well apart.

Neck

The neck should be of medium length, the junction between head and neck is not well defined, owing to long hair on neck and at throat.

Shoulders

The shoulders should be muscular and well sloped back, elbows well under the body.

Forelegs and feet

The forelegs should be perfectly straight, and big in bone. The feet should be well hardened for rough work, toes well arched, strong curved nails, and most important, feet to have strong web.

Deep chest, belly fairly well drawn up.

Back and loins

The back and loins should be strong.

Tail

The tail should be about 12½ to 13 inches long and well feathered. Normally it is carried below the level of the back until the dog goes into action, when it should be arched up above the line of the back but not touching the hindquarters.

Hindquarters

The hindquarters should be muscular and good in appearance, square across the top. The hock is not set too low, turning neither out or in.

Coat

The hair is long, sleek and soft or silky, with a still softer undercoat. Coat at throat and ears extremely soft. These dogs retrieve from fresh and salt water during the coldest seasons, and therefore require the undercoat. Hair on face, legs, and tips of ears is short. The coat is straight except down centre and back, where it is wavy. The coat does not curl. There is, however, a tendency sometimes in winter coats for the hair at the throat to have a long loose curl.

Movement

Quick speedy action—a headlong rush, regardless of obstacles. The dog is docile, very playful. In action, the head is carried almost straight out on a level with back, and the tail is always in motion.

Colour

Red or fawn slightly lighter than that of an Irish Setter. Belly and underside of tail slightly lighter. No objection to white blaze on forehead, chest, toes and tip of tail. Most tollers show white patches on chest and belly, and while this is not entirely objected to, it is more desirable to eliminate all white. White on shoulders and around ears or across back or flanks is not permitted. Colour throughout should be that of a red fox.

Characteristics

Docile, non-roamer, exceptionally easy to train, born retriever on land or from water, cleanliness, timid, good guard dog, will fight as last resort, great swimmer, endurance, playful. The moment the slightest indication is given that retrieving is required, he sets himself for springy action.

Obedience Trials and Special Announcement

Following are the changes and deletions made in the Regulations and Standards for Obedience Trials, 1951 Edition, which become effective July 1, 1951.

Chapter 1 (Sections 5 and 10)

"Owner or any other person" instead of "Amateur or professional."

Chapter 1 (Section 34)

"For the dog with the highest combined score in the Open B and Utility Classes" instead of "For the dog with the highest combined scores in one of the Open Classes and Utility."

Chapter 1, Section 35

A club must prepare a program showing time schedule for the judging of the various classes.

The program is to be based on the formula as stated in this section.

A new paragraph is added to the effect that a judge's assignment must be scheduled so as to insure the completion of judging (based on formula) prior to the closing hour of the show.

Chapter 2, Section 4

Definition of a single signal. "It must be a single gesture with the arm and hand only, and the arm must be promptly returned to its normal position."

In the same section in connection with the use of a dog's name before a command, we now say "but may not be used under any circumstance when a signal is employed." This is to prevent a misunderstanding in cases where a command and signal are permitted should an exhibitor think that as long as a command is given the use of a dog's name once before the command would be permissible.

Chapter 2, Section 9

Long sit (and also long down), in the Novice Classes. The following has been added "In the Novice Classes the judge shall take a position in the ring where he can observe both the dogs and the handlers."

Chapter 2, Section 15

Scent Discrimination. We have added the following, "The articles in a set must be legibly numbered 1 to 5." Also, "Immediately after picking up an article, and before imparting the scent, the handler must show the number on the article to the judge and one of the stewards." Also added is the following, "Should a dog retrieve a wrong article in any of the three exercises it should be placed on the judge's table and the handler's article must also be taken up from the remaining articles. The remaining exercises shall then be completed with fewer than twelve articles left in the ring." The purpose of this is to clearly define correct procedure should the retrieve of wrong articles occur.

Chapter 2, Section 17

The latter part of this section formerly read "Then on specific signals from the judge, etc." Judges and exhibitors had been given the sit and stay signal simultaneously, and in order to get away from this we added, "Then on separate and specific signals, etc." However, where the sentence formerly read "will give the signals to drop, to sit, to stay, to come to a sit in front," the order "to stay" has been eliminated on the theory that when a dog came to a sit, it should stay.

Chapter 2, Section 18

Directed Jumping. In the 1950 Regulations at the very end of this section was the following sentence, "The handler may give the command, or signal 'over' for each jump." This sentence has now been placed in the body of the section (about the middle). Immediately following the sentence, the description of a single signal is also given with this preface, "A signal used in either case, etc." A line or so down in this section we have also added the following, "A word of praise is allowed after the order 'finish' and before the dog is in heel position for the second part of the exercise." There appeared to be some controversy over whether a handler at this point could praise his dog.

Chapter 3, Section 8

This section on the subject of "ties" has been expanded. "In the case of a tie in Utility the dogs shall be tested again by performing, at the same time, all or some part of the signal exercise."

Chapter 3, Section 17

Recall. The middle of the section formerly read "A dog which does not stay without extra command or signal from the time the handler leaves until he is called, must receive less than 50% of the points." We did not feel that this fully covered all conceivable situations; for example, a dog which got up from a sit,

moved a few feet, sat down again and stayed while the handler (with his back to the dog) was in the process of going to the other end of the ring. With a handler's back to his dog he certainly was not in the position to give an extra command or signal for the dog to stay and there was some question as to whether the regulations, as they existed, gave the judge full authority to deduct more than 50% of the points where a dog moved, but had not received an extra command or signal to stay. The middle of the section will now read as follows, "A dog which does not stay without extra command or signal, or which moves from the place where he was left, from the time the handler leaves until he is called, must receive less than 50% of the points." The underscored portion of this sentence is the new addition.

Chapter 3, Section 18

Sit and Down. In place of the words "from the position in which he was left", we now say "from the place where he was left, etc." Instead of saying in the sentence which starts "A substantial deduction shall be made, etc., from the spot where it was left" we now say "from the place where he was left."

Chapter 3, Section 23

Scent Discrimination. Two thirds of the way down in the section the sentence starts as follows, "The handler may give the judge his articles in any order he may choose and is responsible for seeing that the judge and a steward have noted the number on each." Underscored words have been added.

Chapter 3, Section 25

Signal Exercise. Two thirds of the way down the section formerly read, "A dog which fails, on a single signal from the handler, to stand, or to drop, or to sit, or to stay, or to come, etc., etc." This sentence has been changed to read as follows, "A dog which fails, on a single signal from the handler, to stand, or remain standing where left, or to drop or to sit and stay, or come, or which receives a command or audible signal from the handler, etc." We were having problems of interpretation in cases where a dog stood but moved from the place where the handler had left him. We also eliminated in Chapter 2 the judge's order and handler's signal "to stay", on the assumption that when a dog came to a sit he automatically stayed and no signal was necessary. In order to more clearly state the circumstances under which more than 50% of the points were to be deducted, we added "or remain standing where left"; "and stay" also was inserted

after "to sit" as describing the dog's action after he had come to a sit and before he received a signal to come. Formerly the section read "an audible command or signal, etc."

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. held on April 18th, 1951, the Board decided that there would be no specified number of competitors in the Utility Class; in other words, although there may be only one dog entered in the Utility Class at a particular Obedience Trial, said dog may be judged and may be awarded a qualifying score. It should, however, be noted that during the Group Examination test (Utility) there must not be less than three dogs in the ring while this test is conducted, and should there be less than three regular entrants in this class, other dogs from any of the other Obedience Classes must be brought to the ring while this test is conducted.

Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc. Show

The 30th Annual Dog Show of the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc., was held at Montreal April 29th, with the financial benefits, as usual, to be devoted to that wonderful institution, the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (Seeing Eye Guide Dog Service).

Once again the show was a great success, and it is hoped that as a result the L.K.C. of C. will be able to continue its policy of increasing the number of dogs provided annually. Last year, 3 were provided, being a record for the Club.

Congratulations are certainly due to the Hon. President, President, Secretary, Directors, Show Committee and all the other hard working officials whose efforts were crowned with such success.

The attractive list of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place cash prizes, plus the long list of general special prizes, plus the annual attraction of the event itself, resulted in the excellent total of 347 dogs benched, reportedly the biggest show ever to be held in Montreal.

The "gate", though I have no official figures, certainly looked like a record one, and was worthy of the excellent cause which will benefit from it. Judging rings were large and well laid out, and the general arrangements reflected much forethought, and little criticism could be made, apart from a little inconvenience due to benches being somewhat close together in places. The average breed entries were good all round, and it was good to see more than usual of such breeds as Poodles, Skye Terriers and Bull-Mastiffs. Breeds which provided 20 or more entries each were American Cocker 42, Boxers 38, Collies 37, Labradors 33, Welsh Corgis (Pem) 20. As full details of the winners are printed in this issue, I do not propose to comment, except on the major ones, and those of local (Montreal) interest.

The award of Best in Show to Mrs. G. W. Hyslop's Cairn Terrier, Ch. Kindon Saucy Sue was a popular one, and this sweet little dog was then automatically Best Canadian Bred. Reserve Best in Show was taken by Mr. John B. Royce's Pekingese Dah-Lyn Kai Jin of Caversham, whilst top honours for Best Canadian bred puppy were taken by Mrs P. Godfrey's Miniature Poodle Petite Oui-Oui of Waitcombe.

The outstanding win for Montrealers was that of Mrs. Hill's Golden Retriever Tony (Roving Sailor) whose 5 point win as Best of Group 1 was very well received by the ring-siders. In Group 2, local success was not so great, the only local dog to figure being Mrs. J. Laurie's Saluki. Ch. Diamond Hill Hadjie, which took 4th place in the group. In group 3, local honours sank to zero, the placings going to our visitors, 3 to Ontario and third place to Mr. Orlowski's Welsh Corgi Furnace Brook Esquire from U.S.A. but which however, is not entirely without local interest. Group 4 saw a restoration of local pride, with 2nd place in the group going to Mrs. R. Adams' Skye Terrier Silver Chum of Merrymount and 3rd place to Mr. Baird's Scottish Terrier Ch. Aboyne Show Master. In group 5, second and fourth placings again went to local dogs, the places being taken in

Montreal Dog Fanciers' Club Notes

The holding of this Club's first Annual General Meeting in the last week of April marked the end of a very successful year, during which the original prime policy of the club—to hold as many shows as possible—was put into working shape, and implemented in December 1950 and March 1951, in which months very successful Sanction Shows were held.

The meeting was well attended, almost a full complement of members turning up, and the main business of the meeting, the Election of Officers for 1951, was the occasion of some lively, keen, but withal friendly discussion. Let's keep it that way.

Confidence in the policy and effectiveness of the existing board of officers and directors was shown by their re-election en bloc for the ensuing year, following the reading of a very satisfactory progress and financial report. The officers and directors were authorised to proceed with arrangements for a point show at the tail-end of the year.

In forming this "men only" club, it was felt that, with every respect to the magnificent annual event held by Montreal's only remaining "live" club, the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc., this city of 1½ million people could easily carry more shows than one, or occasionally two per annum—and also, the men, vain creatures that we are, felt that we should also have a chance to show what we can do! I can assure the Ladies that, in starting this rival organization, we men hope that the

rivalry, though keen, will remain pleasant and co-operative in its nature, and that as a result the popularity of Dog Shows and Dog Showing will become even greater in Montreal.

The Editor of "Dogs in Canada" has very kindly placed this column at the Club's disposal and progress reports and news of general interest to Montrealers will appear here periodically.

On April 28th, an open Meeting of Members and Prospective Members of the C.K.C. was held in Westmount. The meeting was organized by our well-known Director from P.Q., Mrs. Pamela B. Mack, and was well attended in spite of the deluge of rain that marked the evening. Appreciation was due, and was given, to Mrs. Alva McColl, Editor of Dogs in Canada and a Director of the C.K.C., and to Mr. Farmer, Director from Ottawa, who were speakers of the evening. The object of the meeting was for Mrs. McColl and Mr. Farmer to explain and sum up in general terms, the various alterations in Rules and Regulations recently made effective, and to explain the present "set-up" of the C.K.C. as now constituted.

Taking the floor first, Mrs. McColl got through her task ably and well, in spite of the handicap of a severe cold, and when "Any further questions" was called, only a few minor questions needed to be asked.

When Mr. Farmer's turn came, he too made his statements in a clear and forthright manner, but perhaps because he was dealing with more contentious and unpopular subjects, and perhaps a little because of his very forthrightness, his statements were challenged, and we had an entertaining and enlightening discussion, with the occasional barbed shaft flying. Nevertheless, let it be quite clear that good-humour marked the exchanges, and it is to the credit of both Mr. Rooney and Mr. Farmer that, in spite of keen disagreement on principles, no unpleasant note crept into the discussion.

However, as neither gentleman would budge one iota from his respective viewpoint, no compromise of views was effected. Personally, I sympathised with some of Mr. Rooney's defence of the past, but even so, I am more concerned with the present and future of the C.K.C. and as it seems that we must accept the new "set-up" of the C.K.C., I would suggest that we leave the past to its memories (whilst remembering and benefiting from some of its lessons) and that all interested parties should first and foremost get together and concentrate on getting financial health and strength back into our central authority. That done, we can then turn to the new "set-up" and adjust it to accommodate sectional interests as and when possible. But a healthy central authority is certainly the very first essential.

Mr. Farmer made a strong point of the necessity of greater revenues for the C.K.C. and so far as the need for increased registration fees goes, I think he justified his case. But another of his revenue-raising schemes raised many misgivings, in my mind at least. The suggestion for charging ALL licensed judges an arbitrary fee of \$25 per year will in my opinion be a retrograde, unnecessary and unpopular step. Confine the tax to professional judges Mr. Farmer, and I might go with you—if the

C.K.C. in imposing the tax, will accept the implied responsibility that goes with it—to give protection and encouragement to those who pay it. And certainly, in Mr. Farmer's expressed opinion at the meeting, I failed to find any encouragement that the C.K.C. was prepared to accept such responsibility in return for the fee.

Professional judges apart, the imposition of a \$25 fee for any licence to judge is to my mind indefensible. There has been much talk that "we need more Canadian judges". We do, most certainly. But taxing a judge \$25 for giving his services (which most, and probably all, new judges do) won't encourage many to make a start, to say the least of it. Mr. Farmer says student judges will only be charged \$1. Peanuts! If the C.K.C. is going to encourage student judges, by all means let it do so. I don't suppose anybody, the C.K.C. included, will haggle over \$1. It's the \$25 when the judge applies for his first "on his own" appointment that I'm kicking at. There was talk at the meeting of a "school" (examination) for judges. On paper, and in a speech, it's a good idea. But in practice it won't work. The only real school for judges is in the ring, with exhibitors and public as "judges of the judges". And if Canada wants to encourage Canadian Judges, that is the best school to use. With a little constructive thought and effort, and a little courage, the Clubs and the C.K.C. between them could in ten years build up a stock of good "up and coming" young judges. No scheme will do it in under ten years. Sure, the novice judge will make some occasional mistakes—but if he has what it takes to make a good judge, he will benefit from the error—and provided it is in a good cause—and the education of judges IS a good cause, the error will do no harm to the "game".

I'll leave the subject now. If you think it is worth further discussion, write to the Editor about it, and air your views.

To get back to the meeting, Mrs. Mack proposed that the Quebec notes should occasionally be printed in French. This suggestion was actually well-received by the meeting, but it was decided not to proceed with it, as our French speaking members, in view of certain technical difficulties which were made apparent, seemed to think that whilst the offer was appreciated, it was not necessary, and might not work out satisfactorily.

The meeting closed with a note of thanks to Mrs. McColl and Mr. Farmer for the time and trouble they had devoted to the meeting, and appreciation of the special arrangements which Mrs. McColl had made in advance to get the current issue of "Dogs in Canada" in to post early, so that members could have printed copies of the various amendments before them at the meeting. These arrangements did not bear fruit, but as the explanations were made so lucidly by the speakers, the support of the printed word was not necessary.

- Declined to authorize the transfer of the Collie, TREASURE LADY (281388) from the recorded owner to the names of the persons in whose care the dog had been left but whose recorded owner had not reclaimed the dog.

"THAT, Mr. Risewick and Mr. Boughs be authorized to make representations to the new President of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in respect to the holding of a Dog Show or Dog Shows in conjunction with the Royal Winter Fair." Motion carried.

1902. LETTER FROM GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION

The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the German Shepherd Dog Breeders' Association, an Association considering the classes for German Shepherd dogs at the Guelph Kennel Club show to be held on May 12th as its Specialty show, advising that through error four prizes for major awards in the breed at the Guelph Kennel Club show had been omitted from the premium list, and seeking permission to offer these prizes at the Guelph Kennel Club show. The Club agreed to send out a supplementary notice to prospective exhibitors regarding these additional prizes.

"THAT, the lists of proposed judges reported by the Secretary be approved conditional that:

(a) For shows and trials to be held outside the Province of Ontario approval is given by the local Provincial Director;

(b) Residents of the United States listed are approved by the American Kennel Club to judge the breeds in their respective assignments."

Motion carried.

Reference was made to the late application of the Ontario Bird Dog Association for permission to hold a trial of all Pointing breeds, and it was reported that this Association did not propose holding its scheduled trials under C.K.C. rules because of the 50c recording fee, but more particularly because of the requirements applicable in connection with the registration of American-born Pointers and Setters registered in the American Field Stud Book. The matter was ordered held over for further consideration.

The Secretary pointed out that the rules for Obedience trials did not require any specified number of competitors in the Novice and Open classes in order that dogs entering these classes may earn qualifying scores, but no similar change had been ordered by the Board of Directors in connection with the Utility class.

Following discussion, it was agreed that the following words would be deleted from the second paragraph of section 18, of Chapter 1, of "Regulations and Standards of Obedience Trials":

"at three Obedience Trials in each of which classes three or more dogs were competing. This applies to Division No. 1 (East and North), Division No. 2 (West and South), Division No. 3 (California), Division No. 4 (Pacific Northwest) and Division No. 5 (Hawaii)".

It was however agreed that in the Group Examination test in the Utility class, there must not be less than three dogs in the ring during the judging of this test, and in order that this requirement may be complied with, additional dogs, in any other Obedience class, may be brought into the ring while this test is conducted.

Reference was made to the practice of some show-giving clubs in allowing dogs to enter the show building on the evening previous to a show where the dogs are not examined by a veterinary surgeon until the following morning. Reference was made to a particular occasion on which a dog was benched in the show building on the evening previous to the show, but following veterinary inspection on the morning of the show the dog was ordered removed from the show building.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, show-giving clubs be instructed that no dog be allowed within the show building or precincts of the Dog Show without veterinary inspection, and that when dogs are admitted the night before the show such dogs must pass veterinary inspection before being allowed to enter the show building, the show-giving club to announce the hours at which dogs may enter the building and when veterinary inspection will be available for those taking dogs into the show building the night before the show."

Motion unanimously carried.

The Secretary read a letter from the Pacific Coast Retriever Association, objecting to their being required to pay a non-refundable date fee in connection with the sanction trial staged by that Association on March 25th. The letter was ordered filed.

The Secretary reported on a suggestion advanced by Director C. G. Biggar, to the effect that the Application for Date form should be amended to include a section regarding the 50c recording fee.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, the Secretary prepare an amended Application for Date form and that a copy of the proposed new application be sent to every member of the Board, with a letter seeking their approval."

Motion carried.

The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the Boston Terrier Breeders of Canada asking permission to donate a trophy to be given annually to the Canadian-bred Boston terrier winning the most Best of Breed Awards at three point shows or better, the Boston Terrier Breeders of Canada to have the responsibility of keeping the record of wins.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. Brown, seconded by Mr. Boughs:

"THAT, approval be given this request, conditional that an announcement of the offer is made in DOGS IN CANADA."

Motion carried.

The Secretary reported that an approach had been made to him, asking whether or not extracts from the Dog Show Rules need be reprinted on the back of entry forms. It was agreed
