

"Sixth Sense" a Unique Possession

IT is of course, merely a play of fancy to attribute to the dog the thoughts of the human mind and yet when one considers the intelligence, the ready apprehension, the quick discernment and discriminative practical judgment displayed by it in times of need one cannot help believing that its in-tellectual capacity is more than ordinary canine understanding.

It is a mystery to us to know what is going on in the mind of the dog. We have no idea of its conception of time, space, sound or colour nor do we know with what perspective it considers them. Neither do we know the exact effect they have on its faculties. We do know, however, that some of the things that please us humans are painfully distressing to the dog but since we cannot talk things over with it and compare notes, dog and man can never be quite sure that their separate worlds are similar to one another.

We also know and can understand the feelings and emotions of the dog and we know that it has a conscience and is sorry for its sins and we know too that such sins are usually committed because of lack of understanding and training. To the dog, anything that displeases its master is a sin.

But quite aside from these observations and granted the dog's intellect to be in no way human, I maintain that it has yet another phase of intelligence distinctively its own. The fact that it has a highly sensitive instinct is well known to all who observe its actions but I truly believe there exists also in its nature in quite ample proportions, a psychic element, the essential nature of which is hidden to us but which automatically comes into play when occasion demands it.

It is perhaps on account of this phenomenal intuition or "sixth sense" that "Man's Best Friend" holds an honored place among the heroes of the world. It is probably for the same reason that it has been immortalized in literature. Literally thousands upon thousands of stories have been written about dogs, most of them having been founded on fact and each containing some striking instance of intelligence and courage.

Of course there are cases of viciousness and bad behaviour recorded against the dog, many of them un-merited, some true. Since it cannot offer any verbal defence for itself the charge is usually upheld and the whole dog fraternity suffers seriously from resultant propaganda.

But there are more serious indictments against the human race in this respect. It is not so many years ago that a man threw a dog into the hot furnace because it bit his child; another smashed his four-month-old puppy to death against a cement floor for a similar offence. Then there is the case of a well known surgeon who followed a dog for more than two miles one night for the purpose of cutting its throat because it barked too much; another man beat his Irish Setter with a piece of lead pipe until it could not rise from the ground because it snarled at him. In all probability you have heard about these for they happened right here in the City of Toronto. I sometimes wonder why some people have dogs at all. It is not because they had any need of them or any love for them and judging from the way they abuse them I am inclined to think that they have them for the purpose of appeasing their sadistic tendencies.

As I said before the dog commits a crime because of lack of understanding and ignorance but what justification has man to offer for his cruelty?

It is a tragedy for the dogs whose misfortune it is to fall into the diabolical clutches of such a person but thanks to our humane laws these offences are on the wane.

Returning to the subject of brave and heroic dogs, the following stories illustrate the presence of that unique possession which individualizes it and lends credence to the theory that its reasoning powers border on the psychic.

BOB O'NEW PITSLIGO

(Condensed from Paddy Slater's original story in The Yellow Briar)

In the Spring of 1850 there arrived in Canada a young Scotsman by the name of James Duffus and accompanying him was a young Collie pup. The two travellers were destined for the farm of Wm. Marshall, in Mono, where Duffus was to learn art of Colonial farming and the dog was to make itself generally useful.

Little can be said about James Duffus for he soon tired of conditions in Canada and in the fall returned to Scotland leaving the dog to Wm. Marshall's only

son Charlie.

Bob O'New Pitsligo, better known as "Bob" was a collie pup of high degree. The best blood of Scotland's dogs flowed in its veins. Its body was strongly built, the ears were small and erect, save at the tips, eyes small, keen and sharp, were set slightly oblique in a long pointed skull. The legs were strong and muscular. It was fleet and swift as a flash. In colour it was black and tan with a great white collar around its neck.

Charlie Marshall, a quiet spoken, barefoot boy of ten was thrilled to have as his first and very own, a big, fun loving, purebred dog like Bob. The warm attachment which had grown up between them soon developed into a fast friendship that lasted till death parted them. The two were chums who knew no quarrelling; there was never anything between them to

forgive or forget.

The only sad part of Bob's coming to the Marshall farm was that it stole from Paddy Slater the heart of young Charlie. Paddy Slater was a young Irishman who had lived with the Marshalls since the death of his mother, his father having died in Ireland. Mrs. Marshall was as kind as a mother to Paddy and Paddy in turn was greatly taken with little Charlie who was seven months his junior.

Time kept flying by on that Mono farm and by the Spring 1854 plenty of changes had taken place. Meanwhile Bob O'New Pitsligo had grown into a quiet sensible dog. Charlie was now a sturdy lad of fourteen and much to his father's joy, a thorough young farmer and Paddy was "one of the family" old beyond his years and very helpful to both Mr. and Mrs. Marshall.

The Marshalls always kept a hired man and wife who always lived in; and in the Fall of 1854 Wm. Edwards and his wife were completing their second year of service on the farm. They had come from down in New York state; and when their time was up that Fall they decided to go down home for the Winter.
As Paddy Slater relates, "One gets

to know people well after living on the same farm with them for two years. Edwards was a quiet spoken man, clean and tidy in his personal habits, and gentle with every creature about the place. Mrs. Edwards was a bit scatterbrained but a great worker. Edwards was religiously minded in an emotional sort of way and made a

practise of praying aloud.

The leaves were beginning to turn red when Edwards was paid off and the couple prepared to go on their way. Everybody about the place felt sorry they were leaving and the night before their departure the neighbours dropped in to wish them God-speed. The men cracked butternuts before the big fireplace and the womenfolk amused themselves in their simple way. Hymns were sung and victuals were served before the party broke up. Mrs. Edwards promised to write and tell them about their trip.

It had been arranged that Charlie Marshall would take the wagon and team and give the Edwards a lift as far as Toronto and to quote Paddy Slater "I wish you to know that this was a mighty important affair in the eyes of Young Charlie. He was being trusted with that valuable team of bays-all on his own."

There was great excitement around the Marshall farm in preparation for the trip and Charlie was all "spruced up" for the occasion. Dogs and Fishing

Many curious methods of catching fish are in vogue, but it will be news to many people to learn that there is at least one place in England where fish are regularly hunted with dogs, and hunted on dry land, not in the water. This is on the shore at the seaward end of the Quantock Hills, where the beach consists of muddy sands broken up by seaweed-covered rocks. Under certain conditions the sea retreats even further than usual, leaving great stretches of the shore exposed. Under the lee of many of the rocks there are little pools, in which great congers lurk until the sea returns. This is the time for hunting them. Clad in old clothes and good, stout boots, the hunters proceed to shore, carrying six-foot ash saplings, pointed at the end, and a roughly-shaped iron pole, called a "glad-hook".

A terrier or spaniel trained to the work accompanies the sportsmen. Down the shore the party of "fish-hunters" proceed, the dogs nosing at all the pools and digging under the rocks. When a favorable place is reached, the poles are brought into play, lifting up the rocks so that the dogs can get under them and drive out any congers that are lurking there. When disturbed, the ugly-looking fish makes a bee-line for shore, lashing its tail and snapping its powerful jaws. Those taking part in the sport for the first time get quite alarmed when a huge conger apparently makes straight for them, eager to take a succulent piece out of their legs; but the dogs soon make a dart for it, and the poles and iron are brought down on it until a well-directed blow stretches it out dead. It is quite an exciting sport while it lasts, for in the hurry to capture the fish one of the party may get the blow, and now and again the terrier utters an agonizing yelp as a too eager fisherman misses the conger and whacks him on the back. The novice soon learns why old clothes are worn, for the mud flies about everywhere as the sticks are slammed into the sand, and occasionally one of the sportsmen trips over a rock or slips on the mud. It is very seldom that no fish are captured, and sometimes some regular monsters are caught, these big 'uns naturally providing the best and most exciting sport.

The Portuguese Water Dog is famous for his fishing prowess and without this dog the fisherman of Portugal would be at a disadvantage. The dog has a strange duty, and its appearance is almost as weird. Its tail is clipped close, yet the tip which is invariably curled over its back wears a long tuft like that of a male lion. In fact the complete dog is leonine in semblance and spirit, for it brooks no nonsense from those other than its owners. is best left alone by the non-fisherfolk, because it has, for centuries, been accustomed to the rough environment of the fish hunters, and in consequence intensely dislikes the "coddling" of people employed in less hardy vocations.

For thousands of years the Portuguese Water Dog, or Cao d'Agua as the native name goes, has been the ally of the native fisherman, and at one time was common to the complete length of the Portguese coast.

Hardworking fisherfolk utilize it in several ways. Should one of their nets break, the dog will jump overboard, and swimming strongly, will quickly retrieve the broken part. If a fish worth "saving" happens successfully to slip the net or hook, the dog, voluntarily dives for it, seldom missing his piscine quarry.

Like all fishermen, the Portuguese have their means of communicating by signalling, but under circumstances where the means usually employed are not satisfactory, they attach their messages to dogs of the Cao d'Agua breed and these canine couriers make the necessary contacts from one craft to another, or from the boat to the mainland

It is no wonder that the Portuguese highly value this breed that they have been training for generations.

There seems, as a matter of fact, no particular reason why a taste for fishing should not be cultivated in a dog. Some years ago there was a Newfoundland dog at the sea-weir at Llandillo-Rhos, belonging to the weirkeeper, which achieved some local The weir, composed of wattled hurdles on a rocky headland running out into the sea, not far from the Little Ormo, was filled by the tide. As, during the ebb, the water drained off, fish of all sorts were, of course, trapped in the weir, and some fine catches of herrings, codlings, sea trout, and other fish, not to mention bucketsful of whitebait, were often made. At a word from his master the dog would plunge into the weir and return with a sizeable fish, which would immediately bring to his master.

One of the best stories we have read on dogs and fishing is contained in Dogs and Their History by E. C. Ash, tells of the poodles who used in the year 1784 to assist fishermen. Apparently when the fish feel the net they endeavor to escape directly out to sea and it was the dogs' duty to wait in shallow water for the escaping fish. As soon as the school of fish appeared the dog would race up and down in the shallow water turning them back towards the net. If some of the fish escaped, the dog would not attempt to swim after him, but would return to land and race down the banks of the river until it was sure of again being sea-ward of the salmon where it took its post again ready to divert the fish from escaping to the sea.

The Stewards Club of America

IT was in 1948 that a group of interested people from the Union County (New Jersey) Kennel Club headed by Robert B. Griffing, met to discuss the need of more efficient stewarding in the dog show ring. It was felt by this live group of dog fanciers that better stewarding would facilitate the judging procedure by relieving the judge of responsibility of numbers, ribbons, prizes, trophies, et cetera, the better for him to devote all his attention to his one duty in the ring, namely, to judge the dogs whose owners paid their entry fees to receive his decision as to the merits of their dogs. An organization to study the problems and train stewards in proper ring procedure would improve conditions. Thus the

Stewards Club of America was ben Interested people from other clipioned the parent club until now membership numbers 192. Two an ated clubs have been formed with same objective, i.e., to train and vide better stewards for the shows their sections of the country; Stewards Club of Northern Californ and the Eastern Pennsylvania Stewards Club. Several other clubs are in a process of formation.

Stewards are as signed to work with experience stewards until they feel qualified handle a ring alone without error, and to avoid unjust and unjustified critcism by disgruntled exhibitors, steward does not work in a ring when his own breed is being judged if I can be avoided.

Stewards receive no compensation for their services other than the knowledge that they have done their work well and shared in a better run show while upholding the honor and reputation of the Stewards Club of Americand promoting better relations between all factions of the dog show sport.


Know Your Breed

The Irish Setter


Of all breeds of dogs, the one which is most typical of the people of the country from which it originated is the Irish Setter. The happy-golucky air, which no amount of training can change, remains with the dog from the puppy stage into old age. The burnished mahogany coat is a colour which nature has endowed on but one breed of dog and despite years of experimentation, the colour cannot be developed in any other breed. Four centuries ago the red and white Irish Setter was preferred because it was more easily discernible when hunting as the red Setter colour blends with

the background. The original red and white Setter was heavier and more powerfully built, and when a self-coloured dog was born, it most likely was inbred to other self-coloured dogs in a desire to keep the colour, thus developing a finer and more beautiful type of dog. The mahogany colour became a matter of national pride in Ireland, and by careful selection and breeding the self-coloured dog became established without losing its identity. For a time it appeared that because of the demand for the beautiful dog with a happy disposition, it would be used for show and companion-ship only but wise sportsmen insisted on retaining the dog's natural ability to work in the field and today the Irish Setter is an outstanding field trial dog. Like most breeds of Irish origin, the Irish Setter can be tough when necessary yet wonderfully gentle and loyal around the home. While slow to learn, once the dog masters its lessons it never forgets and does not need retraining. Being strong and sturdy, it makes an ideal companion in the field and home, and being blessed with the stamina to live to an active old age, is most desired as a member of the family.

Dog Show Ethics

I'T may not be untimely to say something on "The Ethics of the Show Ring" and possibly to digress sufficiently to include the whole show generally.

As a foundation ethic nothing could be more substantial than this one: "Let the best dog win no matter to whom he belongs." Worthy building material might easily be "rectitude and common honesty"; material to be rejected might be "selfishness, jealousy and bickering."

Everyone ought to be content to start the race from scratch and to be satisfied with their placing when they reach the finishing tape. The duty of each exhibitor is to secure the best specimen of the breed of his choice that it is possible for him to obtain, and having done so, his constant concern should be for its general welfare. Well balanced diet, plenty of clean drinking water, comfortable kennel quarters, generous exercising facilities, sufficient grooming and preparation for the show, and then you may have every right to expect your dog to be ready for the judge to inspect in the ring.

The dog that is or has been wormy, the dog that is or has been constipated, the dog that is or has been neglected more or less, may well be in the ring with you, but he will very often be beaten at the very outset and very often the jov of the show will be lost at this point. The loser may easily becloud the atmosphere by semi-secretly inferring that he "knew all the time that he was going to lose," that he "had been tipped off" that so and so dog had to win. Nothing is so detrimental to dog showing than the methods of the unethical and insinuating loser.

After many years of association with judges I am thoroughly convinced that 99 per cent of our judges are honest. It is quite true that I would not say, could not say in fact, that 99 per cent of our judges were competent, but honesty and competency are two widely separated virtues, and the 99 per cent of judges who are honest are entitled to our utmost respect, as the 100 per cent mark represents perfection and perfection calls for wings and harp and one-way transportation to the realms above. If it is human to err remember that judges and exhibitors alike are human. Most of us are more or less selfish in many things and selfishness amongst civilized people is simply a throw-back to savagery.

A lot of ink has been spilled on the matter of faking and breed representatives of Canadian National Live Stock Record annual meetings have made it quite clear that dog fanciers are really novices in the art of clever faking. Exhibitors are no doubt justified in doing everything within their power to win in a legitimate way, but by the same token they are not justified in trying to win by unlawful means, such as trying to influence a judge, making a dog look what he is not, etc. Novice fanciers are quite liable to consider their geese to be all swans. The novice hears so much talk about "favoritism The novice that he is apt to get harmful impressions which he will never be able to properly unload and this in itself should induce experienced exhibitors to play the game fairly. To fool the

novice is a practice that no self-respecting fancier should tolerate or indulge in. To have a novice exhibit his dog on unreliable advice, and when he loses, to suggest that favoritism beat him and not quality is a crime against the sport of exhibiting to say the least. To raise hope in the mind of the novice and to see that hope cruelly dashed to the ground is a terrible thing, but to place the failure to favoritism or to lack of knowledge on the part of the judge is likely to drive the novice right out of the game, and is quite contrary to the ethics of the show ring.

It is true that there is a wide range of diversity of opinion as to the merits and demerits of dogs, and perhaps this is caused by the study and education of the modern dog and the interpretation of standards and this difference of opinion, when legitimate, although it may hurt plenty when it clashes with the opinion of one's self or with the opinions of others, it is really a blessing in disguise since it furnishes that great uncertainty in showing dogs which gives a piquancy to the sport that is relished by all true sportsmen and sportswomen everywhere.

Then there is the exhibitor that must win at any price—or so some folks say—whether their dog is good enough or not. Such fanciers are unethical and sportsmanship is quite an unknown quality with them. Then there is the exhibitor who may be willing to pay a price to get certain dogs removed out of a show before the judging starts, because certain other dogs have been entered or are present. Can anyone say that such a type of sportsman is any advantage to dog showing? To offset this type of exhibitor we happily have fanciers who could never appre-

ciate any win that was not fully deserved. Such fanciers are always the best and most gracious winners.

An exhibitor knows when he looks at his premium list before he makes out his entries everything about a show—the show-giving Club, the place, the judges, the prizes—and so he has the privilege of confidently writing out his cheque and signing the entry form on the dotted line. He also has the privilege of placing the premium list in the wastepaper basket if he is not interested, but once he agrees to the terms of the contract by signing the entry form, then he should be satisfied to win or to lose as the judge may decide on the day.

A good judge is born, not made, and such a judge is capable of quickly comparing degrees of merit. He has studied the anatomy of the dog, and the sense of feeling tells him of structural faults when they are present. His eye quickly appraises proportion of quality. His method of handling and placing his dogs all show his knowledge and ability, and as he finally arranges the placings and hands out his degrees of favor he is justly entitled to your approval of his work. The chances are mostly all in favor of his having been honest, that he knows more about the dogs than you do—therefore, show him that you entered your dog to get his opinion and now that you have it, first one in ten, or last one in ten, show him that you acknowledge his judgment.

It is good to be a winner.

It is much better to be a good loser. Anyway, it is unethical to be "in the game" and not to "play it".

Some Ancient Facts on Inbreeding

By no stretch of the imagination should this article be considered as one intended to be authoritative. I have nothing to sell, no point of view that I would like to put across. But I hope that the subject of inbreeding may be sufficiently provocative to induce some comment from experts.

Line breeding, as everyone knows, is considered desirable; it has been long employed in dogs of all breeds, horses, cows, cats, pigs, sheep, and other animals. Generally speaking, line breeding may be defined as matings between grandparents and grandchildren or cousins. Inbreeding is loosely thought of as the mating between parents and children or brothers and sisters. This is not completely accurate because although matings between parents and children represent exceedingly close breeding they are not true inbreeding: The blood line of the parent is not identical with the blood line of the child. True inbreeding is between brother and sister.

It is accepted that inbreeding accentuates dominant traits. In other words if faults are dominant the breeding of brother and sister emphasizes them, if virtues are dominant brother and sister breeding gives the same emphasis. But there are a number of other ideas on the subject, many of which have little root in fact. For example, offspring of inbreeding are supposed always to tend towards weakness, to be always the bearer of congenital defects, to bring about always feebleness of mind, deaf mutism, and, insofar as dogs are concerned, to produce off-spring that are either cessively sharp or lacking in stability of temperament. As far as I have been able to find out these things are not so. It has been said that it took five generations of brother and sister breeding to produce the well known strain of Laverack Setters, and if any memory is correct, this was accomplished about a century ago; setter men have told me that the influence of the La-verack can be seen today. All students of Boxer genealogy will remember that Zorn v Dom and Esta v d Wurm were both sired by Sigurd and were, therefore, half brother and half sister. They will also remember that this pair when mated produced, in different litters, Lustig and Utz; and almost anyone who reads this article can recall many other successful litters that have come as the result of half brother and half sister. True this is not inbreeding. I mentioned it because it represents about as close breeding as can easily be found in the history of Boxers.

Prepare yourself for an enormous

Prepare yourself for an enormous jump—all the way from Boxers in 1951 to kings and queens who lived about 2000 years ago, because strangely enough it is from humans that we can learn much about inbreeding, particularly from a study of the Ptolemaic kings, four of whom were from nonconsanguineous marriages, and nine of whom came from consanguineous, i.e., brother and sister, marriages. As you know, these people flourished not very many years before Christ, and the most famous of the line, at the end of the thirteenth generation, was Cleopatra. Neither their existence nor their his-

tory will settle the matter of inbreeding but, if you study who they were, what they were, what they accomplished, their physiques, their mentalities, the question of the effect on the offspring of marriages between brothers and sisters certainly must remain open. There is no evidence that idiocy, deaf mutism, or any of the other unfortunate things generally at other unfortunate things generally attributed to consanguineous marriages, ever occurred among the Ptolemies, and, insofar as could be ascertained from mummies, masks, and statues, their features, both kings and queens, were distinguished and handsome. As a mat-ter of fact, even before the Ptolemies, a study of the 18th Dynasty kings, a royal family in which consanguineous marriages was the custom, nine great rulers were produced, among whom were Ahmose, the liberator of his country; Thutmose III, one of the great conquerors and administrators the world has known; Amenhotep IV, fearless religious reformer; Queen Nefer-tari, so beloved that she was worshipped for six hundred years after her death; and Hatshepsut, considered to be the greatest queen of Egypt. Generally speaking the 19th Dynasty kings and queens, the 21st Dynasty kings and queens, and the Ethiopian kings and queens, had a distinct bent toward brother and sister marriages and, again generally speaking, were able people.

But it is the case of the Ptolemies that is most interesting in this connection because, as I have said, the first four generations of this family were the issue of non-consanguineous, i.e., perfectly ordinary marriages, not from brother and sister matings. The nine generations that followed the first four were all the result of brother and sister marriages. The first four Ptolemaic kings suffered to a certain extent from gout and from obesity. They were intelligent. They were cruel. The next nine Ptolemaic kings, the ones that were born from brother and sister unions, were neither better nor worse fom a health standpoint than the four from the non-consanguineous matings. They had the same general characteristics. They had gout and obesity to contend with but no more than had their forebears. They were able in foreign affairs because at the time Egypt was an exceedingly powerful country and had they not been able Egypt would have lost its power. Their administration of internal affairs were energetic and in many cases remarkable. They were popular within the country and their people followed them eagerly during the Roman wars. They were mentally sound, and both men and women were equally strong in body. The dominant traits of the first four kings seem to be intelligence and cruelty because the last nine kings were perhaps just a shade smarter and perhaps a little more cruel than the first four. There was no sterility, no case of idiocy or deaf mutism, and if these kings and queens had suffered from any hereditary disease the satirist of the day would probably have made capital of and exaggerated it. The fact that they maintained silence is of the utmost importance. Five of the thirteen Ptolemies were murdered, but not

before they had children. There isn't any rcord of how Ptolemies VI, whose name was Eupator, died. The remaining seven had an average life of 64 years, an unusual figure even today and truly amazing when one considers the medicine of the era before Christ. The times in which the Ptolemies lived, like our own times, were outstanding because of intrigues, murders, wars, and debauchery.

I imagine there are many books which discuss the Ptolemies but I have only read one and I will tell you about it because I think it is a good one. It was published in 1921 by the University of Chicago Press and was written by Sir Marc Armand Ruffer, Kt., C.M.G., M.D., who had been President of the Quarantine of Egypt, a Director of the British Institute of Preventive Medicine, Professor of Bacteriology in the Cairo Medical School, and a member of the Indian Plague Commission. The book was edited by Roy L. Moodie, Ph.D., at a time when Dr. Moodie was Associate Professor of Anatomy in the University of Illinois. The book's title is the Palaeopathology of Egypt, and one of the chapters which was made a part of the proceedings of the Royal Society of Medicine, carries the title "On The Physical Effects of Consanon the Physical Effects of Consan-guineous Marriages in the Royal Fami-lies of Ancient Egypt." It will be diffi-cult to get this book although some medical school libraries will probably have it. My son, Dr. Richard C. Putnam, borrowed it for me from the library at Temple University. If you want to go to the trouble to find it, it is well worth reading. I was amazed at the intellectual, political, and physical abilities of some of the kings and queens who lived so long ago and did so much to shape the world. Cleopatra, the last offspring of many consanguineous marriages, is a particularly startling example of inbreeding. She was a musician, an artist, a patron of science. She was good natured, well educated, spoke many languages. Admittedly she was cruel -she had a right to be because that was her heritage. She murdered her sister Arsinoe IV and was supposed to have mur-dered her brother Ptolemy XV. But if she hadn't murdered her sister, Arsinoe would certainly have murdered her because they were at war. She had, as you remember, quite an affair with Julius Caesar. If poor old Julius hadn't been stabbed by Brutus, Cleopatra might have been Empress of the World.

might have been Empress of the World. Whether you like the Ptolemies or not, or whether you are interested in them or not, you have to admit that they were extraordinary people. And they were inbred. The point as applied to Boxers is a simple one. What Boxer, everything considered, came closest to perfection? Think of the finest male. Think of the vnest female. Suppose that Dorian had had a full sister that was just as good or better than he was. Or suppose that Sigurd had had a sister just as good or better than he was. Or that Serenade, or Wendie, had had a brother equal in conformation. What would have happened if brother and sister matings had been arranged?

To shatter that old bogey "never buy a dog unseen" Dr. Davis purchased his dogs "sight unseen" and has the utmost respect for the Boston Terrier breeders who have shown only honesty and integrity in their dealings with him. .





The Montreal Dog Fanciers' Club First and Second Championship Shows

WHEN the Club decided to run its first point shows so late in the year, two deliberate gambles were taken. The first was the risk that the taken. The first was the risk that the date would be too late in the season to attract a good entry, and the second was the risk of the weather at such a late date. So there was a great sigh of relief when the closing of entries assured us that one gamble had come assured to the restrict with the avoiding the second of the second control of the secon off successfully, with the excellent entry of 300 dogs per day for the two days — and at that the entries for 17 dogs had to be returned as received too late.

Collies topped the list of entries with the splendid total of 29 and 28 dogs, closely followed by American Cockers with 27 each day. Other breeds providing over 10 dogs per day were Labradors (13) Dachshunds (16) Boxers (17) Great Danes (15) and Wire Fox Terriers (11).

Geographically, the entry was very pleasing in its results, including dogs from as far West as Vancouver, B.C., and from as far East as Sydney, N.S., and St. John, N.B., and good representation by our friends from Ontario, and a splendid crop of over 70 entries from the USA, which gave the events a really international flavour. Nor have we forgotten the very excellent local support which was given to us. The Club thanks every exhibitor.

With regard to our second gamble, with the weather—Phew! It "blew and blew and snew and snew, and also it did friz" and if I say it was raining at the same time I don't expect you to believe me but it will give you an idea of what the weather felt like! That was the first day, and what it did to our gate certainly shouldn't happen to a dog show! The second day was somewhat better in both weather and gate, which was at least a tempering gate, which was at least a tempering of the wind to the shorn lamb for which we were grateful. However, the two gambles averaged out into a successful show all the same, and the organizing officials were encouraged by the receipt of a large measure of compliments, and very few complaints. Most of the latter were on the score of the late finish on the first day. In reply to this, we would point out that reply to this, we would point out that it was largely due to a late start in judging. This was not due to bad organization — judges and officials were all ready for a prompt start at 10.00 a.m.—but due to consideration for those exhibitors who had arrived late due to the inclement weather. Judges and officials worked through without a supper break to catch up the arrears, and we considered the finish not too bad when all things were con-sidered—and particularly when win-ners of early breed classes who wander away from the ring when required for further consideration for "winners" are considered. This fault on the part of exhibitors is one of the most consistent causes of judging delays at all

This is usually a good build up for the other trials, and is held well ahead of the point trials to give them a chance. Zimmer, with a pup named Tex, and fourth to Taffy, owned and handled by Geo. E. Wilson.

Judges for this trial were Walter Corey, our Calgary president, Glenn Williams and Vic. Grainger, with Dave Blacklock and C. A. Lindquist as alternate judges, who were kept busy re-lieving the other judges, who were all willing to give them a turn.

We owe a lot of credit to Dick Foulds and his little wife Evelyn, for the wonderful rehearsal for which they were responsible, and which was held two weeks in advance of this Amateur trial. It brought out many new entrants and new members for our Calgary Club. Let's hope this good work is kept up. Remember Dick and Evelyn are willing

to accept any kind of help.

The Edmonton Sporting Dog Club was next to run their Trials near Ed-monton. This was held on Sept. 9th and what an improvement took place since last spring. It appears that Pat. St. Peter had plenty to do with this. The new Field Marshall, Bob Shaw, was right in there doing his stuff, and of course, the President, Bill Brownlee always tries to do a good job, the Secretary, John Phillips, co-operating with them all and apparently making a

grand job of his work. The first improvement was discontinuing the two championship trials in one day and a half. Second, the tests were set and a copy sent to all prospective con-tenders well in advance of the trial and not a trick test in the lot. The gun was placed near the dog and slightly forward, giving every dog a natural chance to mark his birds by watching the pointing and firing at each bird while in the air. Looks like the Edmonton boys are out to resemble natural hunting conditions for their trials. There were about forty entries in the one day trial, which is good proof that the contestants are seeing

things differently.

The next trial was Missoula, Montana, U.S.A. Seven of us from Alberta made this trip, Mr. and Mrs. Linc Phil-lips, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pratt, Marion McCoy, Ruth Lowe, and myself. The greatest difference from our trials is that they shoot live birds, and it is interesting. The tests were not long and there was nothing tricky; in fact the only stake having a blind or direction test was the Open-All-Age. We noticed that in the handling test, a dog mot responding to the signals was severely penalized, and in all the marking tests, dogs that were over handled were out. I was surprised not to see the marking better on account of the live birds shot out in front. I talked with the Judges, and they remarked that the marking was not so hot. We did see some marvelous handling when it came to the blind retrievers, especially in the water, where the idea was to have the dog take direction to a little island up a narrow strip of water and without taking to the bank. Mr. and Mrs. Phillips took along their F.T.Ch. Mah's Golden Sandy, and he had the honor of being braced with the famous Int. F.T.Ch. Oakcreek Van Cleve, sold for \$5,500.00. Can. F.T.Ch. Crailing Dick, trained by Mel McCoy and under his new handler from Portland, was a contender. This was very exciting, but unfortunately none of these three good dogs made the money. Seventy-seven entries were run in two days, consisting of Derby, Non-Winners, Amateur All-Age, and Open All-Age. We saw over 250 pigeons and pheasants shot.

Back to Alberta again. Drumheller Trial was held on Sept. 23rd and as usual they put on a real trial, in spite of a cold miserable day. We had the pleasure of a visit by Dr. Sproston, President of the National Field Trial Association of B.C., and Mr. Irving C.K.C. Director for B.C. A meeting was held attended by members from the various Field Trial Clubs in Alberta and Saskatchewan, where Dr. Sproston ably explained the details of the National Association, and urged the support of the Prairie Clubs in putting on the National Trial, which is to be held on Nov. 23rd, 24th and 25th. The Calgary club has already voted \$25.00 for five shares, and I feel sure that the other Clubs have supported them financially. The next thing to do now is get the entries from the Prairies. We have fifteen dogs eligible here on the Prairies, but the deep snow and winter coming on soon will make it very difficult to train for the big event. We are looking forward to holding the National in Alberta next year.

It was very nice to see so many from Saskatchewan attending this Drum-heller Trial. I believe there were ten, and next year they say there will be at least twenty. I would not be sur-prised to see several Field Trials going strong in Saskatchewan and Manitoba before very long. Then a big Prairie circuit with a Prairie Championship would be one grand thing for the hunting-dog men to look forward to, if conducted to suit conditions here, as hunting conditions are so different and I think so much better.

The tests at Drumheller were very practical, except for a few too many long water swims, which slowed up the trial a little. The final test was a blind bird over a little hill, about 75 yds. away. I heard some criticism saying that when out of sight of the handler, the dog may loaf, and the handler could not guide him to the bird. How could he loaf much, as there was a short time limit, and the dog had to return in a hurry, or out. I personally think this test is one that happens on many shooting trips, where a bird will soar and fall over a hill or behind trees, and a dog that can be directed to the general area and then hunt on his own and find the bird is of great value. It was nice to see every dog in this test come over the hill with the bird and on time. I do think the guning was a bit sloppy at first almost behind the dog, but it was better for the All-Age. However, we were sure there were no gunshy dogs performing, and their marking was good. To add to this Club's wonderful hospitality a beautiful banquet was ready for us which was enjoyed

I will not give the winnings of these trials, as they would have already been published. I was glad to see new blood brought into the judging. They are all practical dog men, and apparently have made a study of and are familiar with the C.K.C. rules and Standard of Procedure. We must have more of this. They were J. H. Van Impe, of Saskatoon; A. Goddard, Saskatoon; Earl Parsons, Drumheller; and R. Nibblet, East

Coulee, Alberta.

The Ponoka Sporting Dog Club held their usual good trial on Sept. 30th,

near Ponoka. These boys have a real natural set up, with lots of water, good cover, and always able to put on a stubble shoot and a walk-up test. Their President, Secretary, Field Marshall and Field Trial Committee strike me as a very capable lot, with plenty of executive ability and always working as a team and right on their toes. Everything seems to be done with an aim for natural conditions, and a thorough knowledge of all rules and regulations. What might have proved serious were the two cases of breaking. A dog made a slight break in his first test in the JUNIOR stake but was immediately brought under control; and this dog was being eliminated and ordered to be picked up. The owner and handler put up an argument and the rule book was produced, which proved that the dog should not be eliminated and given another chance. He was placed third. Then again in the ALL-AGE stake a dog did the same thing and one of the judges seemed to insist on keeping that dog in this time. One of our new Alberta judges lost no time in getting his ruling confirmed by consulting the rules which eliminated this dog. It beats me why any judge who has judged many times does not yet know the difference between the various kinds of breaking and how they should be applied and in which stakes. However, if the majority of the judges know their stuff and the Field Committee is on their toes, nothing serious can hap-pen, but this kind of thing does make it a bit unpleasant.

The highlight of the Ponoka Trial was the winning of second place by Mah's Golden Sandy. This made Sandy a Field Trial Champion, and the first golden colored Labrador to be honored with this title. He is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Line Phillips, of Calgary, who have made this their hobby and have both worked hard for these points. I know the little woman did the strong-arm work by throwing birds for training. He is a real hunting dog, and I feel safe in saying that Sandy has retrieved more ducks for Linc and his friends than any dog I know of. Another golden Labrador came near this honor by winning First place at this Ponoka trial. He is Sommers' Rusty Boy, owned by Frank Sommers, Regina, formerly of Saskatoon. This fellow is only two points from his championship, and if he had been able to make the Brooks and Calgary trials and in his usual form, I feel sure he would have made

Judges for this Ponoka trial were Mr. H. C. Lowes, Vegreville, Mr. R. V. Siddon, Drumheller, and Mr. C. C. Siddon, Drumhe Stowell, Ponoka.

Brooks Field Trial was next on Oct. 7th. The weather and roads just previous made this trial look impossible right up to the day before. However entries came from Edmonton, over 300 miles, Ponoka, Drumheller, Magrath, Calgary, and even over the Rockies from British Columbia. Some were stuck on the roads and were a little late, but the weather turned out to be perfect for a real good trial. The tests were set and mailed out labeled 'proposed tests'. The judges checked the grounds and the tests with the committee before the trial and approved them. This system worked out well, and the proper common-sense tests brought nine of the dogs right up to the final. The judges placed four win-ners and one Certificate of Merrit, and this was a unanimous decision. They had a Derby stake which brought puppies and juniors into one and deserving of mention was a young pup competing in this strong class. He is owned and handled by a boy of fourteen years, Buddy Watson, of Ponoka, and he finished third. Buddy is going to make it tough for his Dad, Harold Watson, who is bringing his dog, Lecoy's Bob, up in a hurry to a Field Trial Championship. There will be real rivalry in that family when Buddy gets some age on his dog. The boys in the Brooks club deserve a lot of praise for putting on such a nice trial, in spite of the fact that they could not expect entries from the U.S., and not many from B.C., on account of the closed season on

pheasant shooting.

The judges for this trial were David
L. (Dick) Foulds, C. A. Lindquist, and

Vic Grainger.

The Calgary Club held the biggest trial of the circuit on Oct. 13 and 14th. Our regular date was not applied for and then Oct. 7th and 8th was to be applied for but we also missed that, and had to take the late date. The first day was cold enough but was carried out nicely with the Junior and Non-Winners. The second day was free for the All-Age only, and turned out to be a very cold disagreeable day. The tests were to have been mailed as before, but this was not done and the next best thing was to have them printed in the program. These tests were nicely conducted as printed, and most of the dogs showed some mighty nice work until the fifth test, which was supposed to be a blind retrieve, with a diversion shot. This was changed to a combintaion across water marked retrieve and a long blind retrieve to an island in the lake. This was far too much for one test, considering the weather, with the result that only three out of the thirteen dogs trying this made it, and the judges had little left to do. If the Club officers or the Judges had been consulted, this would not have happened. It was what promised to be the best trial of the circuit, but simply ruined. This is where team work and co-operation comes in useful. Judges were Dick Foulds, Dave Black-lock and Jack Miller, with H. Chris-tianson and K. J. Morgan as alternate

I have noticed on several occasions where handlers have made a big mistake by being afraid of making a little mistake. In a marking test, where the handler knows his dog will be penalized if he directs him, it looks better to me to see a handler direct his dog once or twice if needed before it is too late, than to wait and then have to handle many times and receive a heavy penalty. Better take a slight penalty and keep your dog in than take the risk of a severe penalty and having him

put out.
In a handling test you know your dog will be penalized each time he fails to respond to direction, so be careful that your dog is in a good position to take the signal, rather than whistling, waving and hollering your head off for

I have mentioned the new judges at the Drumheller trial, and I want to

The other Show gave best of breed in Labradors to Duke of Grainger's, a black owned by H. L. Robertson, of Huxley, Alberta. This good black Labrador also won second place in the

Sporting group.

Now for the Field Trials. The Alberta Amateur Trial was held by the Alberta Field Trials Club. This is usually a good build up for the other trials, and is held well ahead of the point trials to give them a chance. The Amateur Championship Trophy was won by Golden Alamo Ariel, owned by Charles Pritchard, Calgary. Runner up was Ethel of Grainger's, owned by A. C. Maines, Calgary. In third place was Prince of Drumheller, owned by R. Defoor, of Drumheller, and in fourth place, Saunders' Duke, owned by C. A. Lindquist, of Calgary.

The Lady Handler Stake is growing rapidly and has always been a very rapidly and has always been a very interesting event at these Amateur Trials. The Ladies deserve a lot of credit for helping all they can, and I hope our next year's executive will do all they can to encourage and welcome the work the ladies are willing to do to make these trials a success. First in this Stake was won by Mrs. Richard Defoor, handling Prince of Drumheller. Second went to Mrs. F. W. Mitchell with Elboya Rickey. In third place was Mrs. J. Bell, handling Mike's Little Imp, and fourth to Vi. Coodrich who handled Benjamin's Belle of Grainger's. This was a real contest, and the many ladies who failed to get in the money are determined to win next year.

The Junior Stake brought out many

more new handlers, all set for another contest. First place was awarded to contest. First place was awarded to Candy of Riverdale, owned and handled by Jim Currie, of Calgary. Second was won by Mike's Little Imp, owned and handled by J. Bell, of Calgary. Third went to Golden Alamo Ariel, owned and handled by C. Pritchard, Calgary and fourth to Prince of Drumheller, owned and handled by Richard Defoor,

of Drumheller. Notice how well these winners are doing in the open Championship Trials.

The Puppy Stake was contested by all new owners, and the winner of First has placed in many of our Al-berta Open Trials. This pup is owned by Mrs. Ruby Hastie, of Drumheller, who unfortunately was stricken with polio the day following this, her first trial and was placed in hospital in Edmonton. We are all looking forward to seeing her continue in the Trials next spring. I have been informed that she is coming along nicely. Best of luck and a speedy recovery Ruby' is the sincere wish of all of us. This pup is a black Labrador named Trixie and since this trial has been well cared for and handled by Ray Lemay, Second place in this stake was won by Tim, owned by Dr. J. Gordon Anderson, and handled by Don Brooks, a young handler coming nicely. Third went to A. Zimmer, with a pup named Tex, and fourth to Taffy, owned and handled

by Geo. E. Wilson.

Judges for this trial were Walter
Corey, our Calgary president, Glenn
Williams and Vic. Grainger, with Dave
Blacklock and C. A. Lindquist as alternate judges, who were kept busy re-lieving the other judges, who were all willing to give them a turn.

We owe a lot of credit to Dick Foulds and his little wife Evelyn, for the wonderful rehearsal for which they were responsible, and which was held two weeks in advance of this Amateur trial. It brought out many new entrants and new members for our Calgary Club. Let's hope this good work is kept up. Remember Dick and Evelyn are willing to accept any kind of help.

The Edmonton Sporting Dog Club was next to run their Trials near Edmonton. This was held on Sept. 9th and what an improvement took place since last spring. It appears that Pat. St. Peter had plenty to do with this. The new Field Marshall, Bob Shaw, was right in there doing his stuff, and of course, the President, Bill Brownlee always tries to do a good job, the Secretary, John Phillips, co-operating with them all and apparently making a

grand job of his work. The first improvement was discontinuing the two championship trials in one day and a championship trials in one day and a half. Second, the tests were set and a copy sent to all prospective contenders well in advance of the trial, and not a trick test in the lot. The gun was placed near the dog and slightly forward, giving every dog a natural chance to mark his birds by watching the pointing and firing at each bird while in the air. Looks like the Edmonton boys are out to resemble the Edmonton boys are out to resemble natural hunting conditions for their trials. There were about forty entries in the one day trial, which is good proof that the contestants are seeing things differently.

The next trial was Missoula, Mon-tana, U.S.A. Seven of us from Alberta made this trip, Mr. and Mrs. Linc Phillips, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pratt, Marion McCoy, Ruth Lowe, and myself. The greatest difference from our trials is that they shoot live birds, and it is interesting. The tests were not long and there was nothing tricky; in fact the only stake having a blind or direction test was the Open-All-Age. We noticed that in the handling test, a dog mot responding to the signals was severely penalized, and in all the marking tests, dogs that were over handled were out. I was surprised not to see the marking better on account of the live birds shot out in front. I talked with the Judges, and they remarked that the marking was not so hot. We did see some marvelous handling when it came to the blind retrievers, especially in the water, where the idea was to have the dog take direction to a little island up a narrow strip of water and without taking to the bank. Mr. and Mrs. Phillips took along their F.T.Ch. Mah's Golden Sandy, and he had the honor of being braced with the famous Int. F.T.Ch. Oakcreek Van Cleve, sold for \$5,500.00. Can. F.T.Ch. Crailing Dick, trained by Mel McCoy and under his new handler from Portland, was a contender. This was very exciting, but unfortunately none of these three good dogs made the money. Seventy-seven entries were run in two days, consisting of Derby, Non-Winners, Amateur All-Age, and Open All-Age. We saw over 250 pigeons and pheasants shot.

Back to Alberta again. Drumheller Trial was held on Sept. 23rd and as usual they put on a real trial, in spite of a cold miserable day. We had the pleasure of a visit by Dr. Sproston, President of the National Field Trial Association of B.C., and Mr. Irving C.K.C. Director for B.C. A meeting was held attended by members from the various Field Trial Clubs in Alberta and Saskatchewan, where Dr. Sproston ably explained the details of the National Association, and urged the support of the Prairie Clubs in putting on the National Trial, which is to be held on Nov. 23rd, 24th and 25th. The Calgary club has already voted \$25.00 for five shares, and I feel sure that the other Clubs have supported them financially. The next thing to do now is get the entries from the Prairies. We have fifteen dogs eligible here on the Prairies, but the deep snow and winter coming on soon will make it very difficult to train for the big event. We are looking forward to holding the National in Alberta next year.

It was very nice to see so many from Saskatchewan attending this Drumheller Trial. I believe there were ten, and next year they say there will be at least twenty. I would not be surprised to see several Field Trials going strong in Saskatchewan and Manitoba before very long. Then a big Prairie circuit with a Prairie Championship would be one grand thing for the hunting-dog men to look forward to, if conducted to suit conditions here, as hunting conditions are so different and I think so much better.

The tests at Drumheller were very practical, except for a few too many long water swims, which slowed up the trial a little. The final test was a blind bird over a little hill, about 75 yds. away. I heard some criticism saying that when out of sight of the handler, the dog may loaf, and the handler could not guide him to the bird. How could he loaf much, as there was a short time limit, and the dog had to return in a hurry, or out. I personally think this test is one that happens on many shooting trips, where a bird will soar and fall over a hill or behind trees, and a dog that can be directed to the general area and then hunt on his own and find the bird is of great value. It was nice to see every dog in this test come over the hill with the bird and on time. I do think the guning was a bit sloppy at first almost behind the dog, but it was better for the All-Age. However, we were sure there were no gunshy dogs performing, and their marking was good. To add to this Club's wonderful hospitality a beautiful banquet was ready for us which was enjoyed

I will not give the winnings of these trials, as they would have already been published. I was glad to see new blood brought into the judging. They are all practical dog men, and apparently have made a study of and are familiar with the C.K.C. rules and Standard of Procedure. We must have more of this. They were J. H. Van Impe, of Saskatoon; A. Goddard, Saskatoon; Earl Parsons, Drumheller; and R. Nibblet, East Coulee, Alberta.

Coulee, Alberta.

The Ponoka Sporting Dog Club held their usual good trial on Sept. 30th,

near Ponoka. These boys have a real natural set up, with lots of water, good cover, and always able to put on a stubble shoot and a walk-up test. Their President, Secretary, Field Marshall and Field Trial Committee strike me as a very capable lot, with plenty of executive ability and always working as a team and right on their toes. Everything seems to be done with an aim for natural conditions, and a thorough knowledge of all rules and regulations. What might have proved serious were the two cases of dogs breaking. A dog made a slight break in his first test in the JUNIOR stake but was immediately brought under control; and this dog was being eliminated and ordered to be picked up. The owner and handler put up an argument and the rule book was produced, which proved that the dog should not be eliminated and given another chance. He was placed third. Then again in the ALL-AGE stake a dog did the same thing and one of the judges seemed to insist on keeping that dog in this time. One of our new Alberta judges lost no time in getting his ruling confirmed by consulting the rules which eliminated this dog. It beats me why any judge who has judged many times does not yet know the difference between the various kinds of breaking and how they should be applied and in which stakes. However, if the majority of the judges know their stuff and the Field Committee is on their toes, nothing serious can hap-pen, but this kind of thing does make it a bit unpleasant.

The highlight of the Ponoka Trial was the winning of second place by Mah's Golden Sandy. This made Sandy a Field Trial Champion, and the first golden colored Labrador to be honored with this title. He is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Linc Phillips, of Calgary, who have made this their hobby and have both worked hard for these points. I know the little woman did the strong-arm work by throwing birds for training. He is a real hunting dog, and I feel safe in saying that Sandy has retrieved more ducks for Linc and his friends than any dog I know of. Another golden Labrador came near this honor by winning First place at this Ponoka trial. He is Sommers' Rusty Boy, owned by Frank Sommers, Regina, formerly of Saskatoon. This fellow is only two points from his championship, and if he had been able to make the Brooks and Calgary trials and in his usual form, I feel sure he would have made it.

Judges for this Ponoka trial were Mr. H. C. Lowes, Vegreville, Mr. R. V. Siddon, Drumheller, and Mr. C. C. Stowell, Ponoka.

Brooks Field Trial was next on Oct. 7th. The weather and roads just previous made this trial look impossible right up to the day before. However entries came from Edmonton, over 300 miles, Ponoka, Drumheller, Magrath, Calgary, and even over the Rockies from British Columbia. Some were stuck on the roads and were a little late, but the weather turned out to be perfect for a real good trial. The tests were set and mailed out labeled 'proposed tests'. The judges checked the grounds and the tests with the committee before the trial and approved them. This system worked out well, and the proper common-sense tests

brought nine of the dogs right up to the final. The judges placed four win-ners and one Certificate of Merrit, and this was a unanimous decision. They had a Derby stake which brought puppies and juniors into one and deserving of mention was a young pup competing in this strong class. He is owned and handled by a boy of fourteen years, Buddy Watson, of Ponoka, and he finished third. Buddy is going to make it tough for his Dad, Harold Watson, who is bringing his dog, Lecoy's Bob, up in a hurry to a Field Trial Championship. There will be real rivalry in that family when Buddy gets some age on his dog. The boys in the Brooks club deserve a lot of praise for putting on such a nice trial, in spite of the fact that they could not expect entries from the U.S., and not many from B.C., on account of the closed season on

pheasant shooting.

The judges for this trial were David
L. (Dick) Foulds, C. A. Lindquist, and

Vic Grainger.

The Calgary Club held the biggest trial of the circuit on Oct. 13 and 14th. Our regular date was not applied for and then Oct. 7th and 8th was to be applied for but we also missed that, and had to take the late date. The first day was cold enough but was carried out nicely with the Junior and Non-Winners. The second day was free for the All-Age only, and turned out to be a very cold disagreeable day. The tests were to have been mailed as before, but this was not done and the next best thing was to have them printed in the program. These tests were nicely conducted as printed, and most of the dogs showed some mighty nice work until the fifth test, which was supposed to be a blind retrieve, with a diversion shot. This was changed to a combintaion across water marked retrieve and a long blind retrieve to an island in the lake. This was far too much for one test, considering the weather, with the result that only three out of the thirteen dogs trying this made it, and the judges had little left to do. If the Club officers or the Judges had been consulted, this would not have happened. It was what promised to be the best trial of the circuit, but simply ruined. This is where team work and co-operation comes in useful. Judges were Dick Foulds, Dave Black-lock and Jack Miller, with H. Chris-tianson and K. J. Morgan as alternate

I have noticed on several occasions where handlers have made a big mistake by being afraid of making a little mistake. In a marking test, where the handler knows his dog will be penalized if he directs him, it looks better to me to see a handler direct his dog once or twice if needed before it is too late, than to wait and then have to handle many times and receive a heavy penalty. Better take a slight penalty and keep your dog in than take the risk of a severe penalty and having him put out

put out.

In a handling test you know your dog will be penalized each time he fails to respond to direction, so be careful that your dog is in a good position to take the signal, rather than whistling, waving and hollering your head off for no results.

I have mentioned the new judges at the Drumheller trial, and I want to

I refer specifically to "the poor man's dog", those companions of poverty who by virtue of their un-selfishness and faithful courage have given to the less fortunate of mankind companionship, friendship, love, devotion and protection unexcelled.

These dogs are heroes too for it takes fortitude and courage to endure the suffering of adversity. So when we pay tribute to our canine heroes, let us not forget those brave fellows whose luck it is to live and die ingloriously but who nevertheless "play the game."

The club puts out each month a bulletin called "The Ring Steward" that goes to the membership to keep everyone informed about club activities and any new problems that come up at different shows and are solved at the meetings. When necessary, an official decision is secured from the American Kennel Club in writing and the membership informed. Thus members at a distance that are unable to attend meetings are prepared for their duties when they serve as stewards.

Twice a year, the members get together during slack time for shows and play just as efficiently as they have stewarded all year at all the shows in the Metropolitan area (23 big shows for 1950). During the Summer, usually on July 4th, Independence Day, a picnic is held on the Griffing estate in Mountainside, N.J., where the members fun and frolic and picnic to their hearts' content. In the Winter, a Christmas party or dinner-dance brings the club members and their friends together for an evening of fun.

The Stewards Club of America is a friendly, informal group of true dog fanciers who work in harmony for the general good and welfare of the dogs and better run dog shows. The membership is entirely free of the petty rivalries and jealousies sometimes found in clubs—each person does willingly the assignment by ingly the assignment he receives and that he is best qualified to do. It is a democratic club governed by the officers and board of governors who formulate the policy that is decided by vote of the whole membership at the meetings.

It has been felt, since the Stewards club came into existence, that the smooth running of the shows, the fact that shows are over earlier, that judges are unharried by details that a good steward attends to in the ring, that spectators are able to follow the judging procedure and are kept informed of absentees, that there are fewer mistakes in judges book markings and that the superintendent is relieved of stewarding worries the better to superintend, is all due in no small way to the efficient work of the members of the Stewards Club of America.

Head.—Should be long and lean. The skull oval (from ear to ear), having plenty of brain room and with well-defined occipital protuberance. Brows raised, showing stop. The muzzle moderately deep and fairly square at end. From the stop to the point of the nose should be long, the nostrils wide and the jaws of nearly equal length, flews not to be pendulous. The color of the nose dark mahogany or dark chocolate and that of the eyes (which ought not to be too large) rich hazel or brown. The ears to be of moderate size, fine in texture, set on low, well back and hanging in a neat fold close to the head.

Neck.—Should be moderately long, very

Neck.—Should be moderately long, very muscular but not too thick, slightly arched, free from all tendency to throati-

Body.—Should be proportionately long, shoulders fine at the points, deep and sloping well back. The chest deep, rather narrow in front. The ribs well sprung, leaving plenty of lung room. The loins muscular and slightly arched. The hind quarter wide and powerful.

Legs and Feet.—The hindlegs from tip to hock should be long and muscular, from hock to heel short and strong. The stifle and hock joints well bent, and not inclined either in or out. The forelegs should be strong and sinewy, having plenty of bone, with elbows free, well let down and like the hock not inclined either out or in. The feet rather small, very firm, toes strong, close together and arched.

Tail.—Should be of moderate length.

Tail.—Should be of moderate length, set on rather low, strong at root and tapering to a fine point; to be carried in a slight scimitar-like curve or straight, nearly level with the back.

Coat.—On the head, front of legs and tips of ears should be short and fine, but on all other parts of the body it should be of moderate length, flat and as free as possible from curl or wave.

Feathering.—The feather on the upper

as possible from curl or wave.

Feathering.—The feather on the upper portion of the ears should be long and silky, on the back of fore and hindlegs long and fine, a fair amount of hair on belly, forming a nice fringe, which may extend on chest and throat. Feet to be well feathered between the toes. Tail to have a nice fringe of moderately long hair, decreasing in length as it approaches the point. All feathering to be as straight and as flat as possible.

Color and Markings.—The color should

Color and Markings.—The color should be a rich golden chestnut or mahogany red, with no trace whatever of black; white on chest, throat or toes, or a small star on the forehead, or a narrow streak, or a blaze on the nose or face not to disqualify.



In 13 inch Bitches, Bill Wilson's "Burnside Beauty" was first, in 15 inch Bitches the winner was nrst, in 15 inch Bitches the winner was Cliffords "Burnside Princess", and in 15 inch Dogs, Olaf Larsen's "Middle-stone Findy" won out. Charlottetown K. C. and Moncton K. C. held, what I am told, were most successful Trials for pointing breeds recently, but I have not, as yet, received any reports of these meetings. I did hear, however, that "Al" Gray of Moncton, was able to make his Brittany Spaniel, "Lady Mitz-Mac", a Field Trial Champion (subject to C.K.C. confirmation).

The circuits arranged for the Maritimes this season are now completed, and I thought that it might prove interesting, to consider a few of the outstanding features of the several different Shows, one of them in particular impressed this writer, and that was the coming into the limelight of a very old, and once very popular breed, but of late years, not so popular, but if one might be permitted to coin a phrase, one might almost call our recent circuit the "Renaissance of the Pug" for after years of just an occasional Pug being seen at our Shows, they came back this year with a bang, and two representatives of the breed made a most unusual and impressive record on our Maritime circuit. Commencing with the two Shows in Halifax, the Pug "Winna Chip O'Gold" owned by Mrs. J. L. Illsley, was best of all breeds at one Show, and Best Canadian Bred, and the next day he was Reserve Best in Show, after winning the Toy Group at Moncton, he decided to go home. However, moving on to Saint John, another Pug took over, Am. Ch. Mighty Jim, owned by Pugsville Kennels of New Jersey was awarded Best in Show; the next day he won the Toy Group, the next day he copped another Toy Group, and at the final Show he took Best in Show, in all then, the breed in seven Shows took 3 Supreme Bests, 1 Reserve Best, 1 Best Canadian Bred, and 7 Groups, which is, I venture to say, a most outstanding record for any breed.

Another dog that stole the limelight, this time a Bulldog Puppy, "Canning Town's Playboy", owned by Roland Wasson of Saint John, N.B., this young hopeful appeared at all Maritime Shows Groups and he walked off with 3 Groups and was seven times Best Canadian Bred Puppy. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

THE Auditor's Financial Statements dated Sept. 30-51, as published in this issue, supply their picture of the Club's book position at the end of the first nine months of the year.

FINANCIAL POSITION

Operating Profit June 30/51-\$2921.54.

Operating Profit Sept. 30/51-\$1985.06.

This shows an operating Net Profit decline of \$936.48 in comparison with the statements of June 30/51. In our monthly assessment remittances to Ottawa, it would seem that we were considerably overpaid on our charged costs there. The Records Office have provided us with their total cost for the first nine months of this year. They are unable to supply distribution figures on this total and thereby provide us the total of our costs for this period. We can estimate by way of comparison and estimated figures, that we could have at Sept. 30th last, a possible overpayment or credit balance there of approximately \$4,000.00. This is not just a guess, but is done from figures that can in no way be definitely determined at this time. We feel it would be fair to state that we should have an overpayment at Ottawa of at least \$250.00 on Sept. 30/51, as applied to our Club's proper share of costs on work done, for this Club up to that date this year. If this should be correct, our operating net profit on Sept. 30/51 would show a figure of approximately \$4500.00. In view however, of the inability to determine our actual Records Office Costs for the first nine months and the fluctuation of balance position that may yet take place in the year, we suggest that any present apparent favourable position not lead us towards too much optimism in respect to what the year end results may show. Our Bond Investment and Bank Loan position is unchanged. Accrued Accounts and reserve for Doubtful Accounts are included. Allowed depreciation on Fixed Assets for this portion of the year has been absorbed. Readily Liquid Assets of Cash in Banks and Accounts Receivable (Less Reserve) total \$8,327.81.

REVENUE

The income at Ottawa, shows an increase of \$3,009.82 over the same period last year. The income from Recording Fees shows an increase of \$3,750.25. (The 50c Recording fee was not materially in effect during the first six months of last year). Date fees and Listing fees show an increase of \$564.25. This income represents largely Listing Fees and indicates a larger number of unregistered dogs exhibited, and is also probably favourably affected by the greater number of Shows that took place in comparison with the same period last year. To determine the actual number of Members at any specified date, requires checking with Ottawa, etc. but it would seem that our total Membership on Sept. 30/51 is about 250 less than it was on Sept. 30/50.

EXPENDITURES

The \$16,650.00 is the amount we have paid Ottawa for the nine months period, under our set monthly Assessment. The Salaries plus Janitor service total \$13,602.91. This exceeds the amount for the same period of last year by \$521.22. The cost for Rent, Light, Telephone, is \$422.23 less than for this period last year. (This decrease in cost is largely revenue from subletting part of the Office space, at a saving of \$1200.00 per annum). Travelling expenses are \$762.58 less than for the same period last year.

DOGS IN CANADA

The Revenue from Advertising, shows an increase of approximately \$60.00 over the same period of last year.

In Expenditures, salaries of the Editor and Assistant, show a decrease of \$170.10 in comparison with this period of last year.

The cost of printing the Magazine for the nine months, shows an increase of \$848.78. This increase results from publishing fuller Show reports, and increased printing costs.

GENERAL COMMENT

The month of October shows some slight increase in income at Ottawa in comparison with the same month in 1950. The last quarter of the year is however, normally a period of lesser income. The months of November and December are also subject to some extra expenses. The rather heavy expense of printing New By-laws, Dog Show Rules, more complete Show reports, etc. have been absorbed in the enclosed statement. The extra expense of publishing the more extensive dog show reports will continue into December, and we will in the last quarter of this year, be subject to considerable additional printing costs in supplying the Election Commission with mail referendum ballots representing proposed amendments etc., to our existing legislation. There is also the important and material extra expense of the increase in postal rates to be absorbed. It would appear that the net profit shown by the enclosed statement, may be wiped out by the end of the year. It is probable however, that the December 31st next statement will show profit done for the Club during the year. We feel there may be an actual net Operating Profit on the year, but to arrive at any given year's results the cost of processing of all Registrations, etc. received by December 31st should be determined, i.e. we are credited with income from Registrations etc. as received, but not charged with the cost of processing until the work of doing so is completed. If for example it takes the Record Office an average of one month to put through these transactions, the month of December 1950 would receive the benefit of this income and the month of January 1951 would be charged with the cost of processing them. The Secretary was directed to obtain further information in this connection from the Superintendent of the show and from the ring steward during the judging of this breed.

The Board considered the Secretary's report in connection with a protest having to do with a Saskatchewan show, and directed the Secretary to secure additional information from the owner of the protested dog.
