

Puttin' on the Dog

Is your dog troubled with ear canker or exzema of the ear? Try one of these two remedies that have just been brought to our attention . . .

a. 2 ounces of camphorated oil
1 tube of Zinc ointment
 $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ proportions, mix well and apply.

b. 2 drachms of oxide of Zinc ointment
1 ounce of almond oil
Mix well and apply 2 or 3 times a day. After 12 hours clean out with swab and cotton.



That . . . Rin Tin Tin's first picture was made when he was 4 years old. He made 21 pictures in his lifetime. Found by Lee Duncan in a German dug-out in France when only a few days old (in September 1918) Rin died in the arms of his devoted friend August 12, 1932.

That . . . A dog has 5 senses: Touch, Taste, Sight, Ears Nose. The percentage of uses: 10 per cent, 20 per cent, 50 per cent, 70 per cent, 100 per cent.

That . . . Kerry Blue Terriers are born black and may not get their permanent color till well over a year old. Yorkshire Terriers are black at birth. The blue begins to appear when they are 3 to 6 months old. The dark steel blue and tan may not be perfect till the dog is 18 months or more. Black and pink spotted noses will often turn

completely black before the dog is three years old. Some breeds of dogs have noses that turn a light brown in winter, and in the summer their natural color of black is restored.

That . . . Your dog has no lower eye lash — only upper one.

That . . . A deaf dog can hear through his paws and his body. Sound vibrations are transmitted through the ground and floor.

That . . . The beats of dog's pulses vary? In large dogs, 70 to the minute. In small breeds, 90 to the minute. A healthy dog's pulse is often intermittent, but if that intermittency is not regular, look out, something is wrong. The pulse is taken in the artery on the inside of the leg.

That . . . A dog should have 42 to 44 permanent teeth but only 28 milk teeth. Permanent teeth start coming at 4 months of age and are usually complete at 5 months. Toy dogs are more backward and are usually a month later in starting, and the set is often not completed until they are 7 or 8 months old.

Dog Tales



Hardiness of the terrier is exemplified in a story told by Mrs. J. H. Daniell-Jenkins of Pickering, Ont.

In 1935 Sir William A. Jenkins, mayor of Swansea at Glanmorgan, was master of the Penllergaer hunt. At one hunt he sent out two Parson Jack Russell terriers (a breed well-known in England, built along the lines of the old Fox terriers and kept only by huntsmen).

Both fox and terriers became lost in the broken countryside.

Twelve days later workmen reported strange noises were being heard from 200-foot mound of slate and waste from a mine.

Investigation found the squeaks were coming from where a tiny stream ran through the mound. It was here that the fox and dogs had squeezed under the mound—the fox seeking refuge, the terriers, the fox.

IT SHOULD HAPPEN TO A DOG

Bone, Blood Banks Boon For Sick

HE was in obvious pain as he lay on the X-ray table. His white sides trembled as careful hands passed along his body. -- "We think he's swallowed a pot cleaner."

POT CLEANER

Yes, a pot cleaner, one of those bundles of steel used to remove stubborn food particles from the sides of cooking utensils. Anyone who has scratched a finger on one can imagine what it would feel like in the stomach.

The dog on the table was but one of the 3,000 patients who pass through the small animal hospital at the Ontario Veterinary College in Guelph, Ont. The clinic-hospital receives patients from all across the Dominion, from nearby Buffalo, N.Y., and other U.S. points.

It is run by the Small Animal department of the college. An attempt is made to keep the hospital self supporting by fees collected for the treatment of animals.

About half the patients are dogs from the Guelph area. The other half are patients referred to the hospital by veterinarians who do not have the complete facilities offered by the college.

The pot cleaner episode was an actual event happening the day of DOGS IN CANADA'S visit to the college. Dr. James Archibald, head of the Small Animal department, showed us X-rays of fractures and how they healed. Also, the X-ray of a dog's stomach contain-

human hospital. It has been running in its present form for two years, but there has been a clinic at the college since 1922.

Three years ago new surgical equipment for the three-table operating room came. Each year new and more modern equipment is added.

In keeping with modern trends, the hospital has blood, plasma and bone banks. Blood and plasma banks have "donors" as do human blood banks. Dogs, like humans, feel no ill effects from a blood donation.

The first question to the mind is: "what about blood types? Don't dogs have blood factors that make it unwise to mix the blood?"

CROSS-MATCHED

Dr. Archibald explained that factors which make human blood so different are also present in dogs, but not to the extent that they cause trouble when mixed. To prevent any trouble though, blood to be used is cross-matched with the patient's blood. If it readily mixes the blood is transfused. If not, a different donor is used.

In the radiology laboratory the equipment, operated by Ted Bishop, is of the latest design. Wonders worked in this lab aids in the successful operation of the hospital.

For example, X-raying heads presents problems unknown in other bone X-rays. Because X-ray plates are flat, the whole skull appears pancaked together, bone upon bone, without the proper perspective.

In addition to the forementioned rooms there is the main kennel room where dogs and other small animal patients without infectious diseases are kept. The day of our visit there were dogs, cats and a monkey. Infectious

cases are kept in the isolation ward a different building.

Disinfectant doormats are at the entrances to the isolation ward and main kennel room. Ordinary mats sit in a pan of liquid disinfectant so shoes are cleaned and disinfected in the same wipe.

STAFF MEMBERS

On the staff of the hospital are Dr. Archibald; Dr. N. Brown, a 1952 graduate of the college, Dr. E. Nasti from Vienna, Austria, Dr. G. Sapegin, from Belgrade, Yugoslavia, who are all taking a year's post graduate studies at the college; and Dr. C. I. Chapel, who is studying at McGill University in Montreal for a year. Each year the staff has one O.V.C. graduate and one post graduate student from another country. The foreign student serves a double purpose of furthering his studies and bringing veterinary techniques and knowledge from his country to the college. Last year's foreign student was from Georgia.

Taking care of the operating room, the students, staff and generally the hospital is Charles Morrison who is known as the operating room technician.

The first step in admitting a patient is the taking of the case history by Mrs. Betty Weiler or Miss Grace Gray. Then the examination.

ing the end of a rubber dish scraper. The rubber evidently provided something "chewy" for the dog but ended as an unpleasant something when he swallowed it.

The hospital is a fascinating place, clean and spotless from one end to the other; as complete and modern as any

To overcome this, the old stereoscope principle has been used. Two plates, taken at slightly different angles, are then combined through the use of prisms to give a three-dimensional picture of the bones in their proper perspective.



Vaccinations and minor treatments are carried on in the clinic.

All the latest drugs, including ACTH and penicillin, are used.

A familiar piece of equipment is the electric dog dryer. This oven-like machinery has a glass front and fans which blow hot air up through the "floor" of the case. To see if the dog is "done" the attendant just looks through the glass. No towelling, no colds.

The latest methods and procedures are followed at the hospital. The use of vitallium plates and pins for mending fractures is a common practice. People aren't the only ones who can claim to be "pinned" together.

The pins and plates are screwed through the bones which, as in people, heal around them. They are not removed but remain in the limb.

The hospital has even done a bone grafting job. A Collie had a leg shattered in four places. The leg refused to heal even though the pins had been properly placed. So a piece of bone from the bone bank was grafted into place and the leg healed.

Research work at the college is mainly on animals of economic importance such as cattle, horses and swine. However, research has, and is being done, in the field of small animals.

Work in the transplantation of kidneys has been undertaken by the department. Research on infectious canine hepatitis also has been carried on.

O.V.C. Appoints Winnipeg Man

Dr. J. L. S. Anderson of Winnipeg has been appointed assistant professor of pharmacy and pharmacology at the Ontario Veterinary College in Guelph. Well-known to the Manitoba fancy, Dr. and Mrs. Anderson showed Boxers from their Derrybaird Kennels.

Dr. Anderson had practised in Winnipeg since his graduation from the Veterinary college in 1941.

The Fort Garry and Greater Winnipeg Kennel Clubs presented the doctor with a desk set and Mrs. Anderson with earrings prior to their move to Guelph.

Brushing Secret To Gleaming Coat

IF your dog's coat lacks lustre and looks greasy, regular brushing and good feeding may revive it.

CLEAN COAT

Veteran dog breeders say the first thing to do is to get rid of the dirt and dandruff, especially if it is a Toy variety. An effective brand of hair preparation is advocated, the kind advertised for human hair.

Then you must brush and brush every day to restore the sheen and healthy gleam.

Of course, short, scanty coats on dogs may be due to other causes. The dog may have been bred to a long line of short-coated dogs and it may be impossible to give it a long one.

From a feeding for the coat standpoint, many veterinarians are now suggesting a teaspoonful of lard be added to canned or packaged dog foods available on the market. Others suggest yeast preparations or a good tonic, including cod liver oil and malt.

Shredded suet, in small quantities, spread over the regular brand of dog food has the same effect for many dogs.

The foregoing suggestions have worked successfully for many dog owners but the veteran breeder will tell you that to assure a good coat you must breed for it. Some females always whelp pups with good coats. Others, unless breeding is closely watched, only come up with average-coated litters.

Is Your Dog Safe From Winter?

DOES your dog have long under wear? Well don't laugh—winter brings new problems for friend dog. He can't put on a heavier coat just to go outside and he's as susceptible to pneumonia as you are.

FORGET SWEATERS

If he's strong and healthy, he doesn't want to be mollycoddled with sweaters and blankets—no matter how small he is.

His best protection during the winter months is proper feeding, a dry, well-ventilated but draftless sleeping place and EXERCISE. No curling up all evening with a good book for you if you want a healthy dog. He needs daily exercise and lots of it.

The walk will keep you in shape too for he should start at a run to keep up with the sudden change in blood circulation when he leaves the heated house.

Don't stuff him during the winter, excess pounds weaken his resistance. Don't heat his food or give him hot water.

If your dog stays in the house keep the temperature constant—for your family's health too. Sudden changes from warm to cold and back are hard on him.

If he has his own house in the yard check it for drafts. Caulk cracks. Have the house face away from the wind, preferably against a wall. Build a storm lobby so he doesn't sleep directly in front of the door.

KEEP OFF FLOOR

He shouldn't sleep on the floor but have a bed of straw, a rug or blanket that is aired at least once a week and kept dry. If he sleeps in the house his bed should be off the floor, preferably under a piece of furniture, and away from drafts, radiators or hot air vents.

Despite all the attention to avoidance of drafts no dogs should sleep in an unventilated room. He should also sleep outside in a sheltered spot on sunny days.

For those with large kennels repair-work in the autumn months is an absolute necessity. All spots where cold winds can threaten the health of the dogs must be covered. Ventilation should be through the ceiling.

It cannot be stressed too much that beds must be dry and clean. Dogs do not have to be in a heated kennel, nor do they have to have fancy beds but they must be kept dry.

Wintertime baths should not occur oftener than once a week or 10 days. Then your dog should be kept in a warm place and rubbed dry. Some long-haired breeds take nearly two hours to get coat dry to the skin.

BRUSH YOUR DOG

Brushing should, for the most part take the place of baths during the cold months. This will remove the dead hair, prevent dandruff and produce a gleaming coat. Daily brushing keeps the coat in condition and lessens dog odors.

The keeping dry extends past the bed and bath too. When you return from that daily exercise period your dog's feet and coat should be thoroughly dried—you wouldn't sit around with wet hair or feet, why should you dog?

CANADIAN DOGS

Fight Sabotage

SOME of Canada's major defense and industrial plants may soon have new guards, according to a release from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Ottawa. The guards will be R.C.M.P. trained German Shepherds and Doberman Pinschers.

SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENT

According to the police spokesman, the R.C.M.P. has successfully conducted an experimental dog guard, at the request of industry, at one large eastern plant. Two German Shepherds assigned to guard duty successfully, and consistently located sabotage material and intruders while on their nightly rounds.

In the past police dogs have been used across the country in locating lost people, fugitives and stolen goods. The present canine R.C.M.P. force numbers about 14 to 16 specially-trained dogs who travel Canada and the north country. Together with their trainers, these dogs cover thousands of miles each year.

These two breeds, as well as many of the Terrier family, have successfully been used on wartime patrol duty, as

dispatch bearers and Red Cross aides. In addition, their natural instinct to protect what they consider to be their master's makes them excellent watch and guard dogs.

The well-known success of the German Shepherd and Doberman Pinscher as guard dogs has brought inquiries from large plants and industrial concerns in Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia. In response to these replies the R.C.M.P. experiment was conducted.

The result of the trial may be an upsurge of canine guards in industry.

The R.C.M.P. canine force is not for use as plant guards. Young dogs would be trained by the R.C.M.P. at its dog training centre in Sydney, N.S.

Due to the nature of the training as to which the dogs will be put, it would be necessary to train at the same time the human guard who would work with his canine partner.

The man who feeds him during his training is master of the dog. It is the man and this man alone who he obeys. If he is told to guard, he will do so and an intruder takes his life in hand for the dog knows only master-approved people are allowed.

For this reason human and canine guards are trained together for the work they will do together.

Many guard dog trainers report that their pupils at later dates will attack them because they no longer consider "teacher" as "master".

For this reason guard dogs are excellent as both alarm and defense systems.

WE ARE drawing near the close of another year. The harvest is in, the football season almost over and the shows and trials for 1952 now almost a matter of history. This is as good a time as any to take inventory. Now is the time when we need to examine closely all the workings of our national and local clubs, arrive at some conclusions.

This is a good time too, to examine the record of your representative to the CKC. Are you satisfied with what he or she has tried to do for your province during the year? Now is most emphatically the time when you should decide that if a club is worth belonging to it is worth participating in. This means attendance at meetings and it means voting. Too many members of CKC are neglecting this duty to their club. Leaving the voting to the other fellow too often sounds the death knell for an organization.

This is YOUR kennel club. It is YOUR business. And it is YOUR duty to yourself and your fellow members to vote. If there are 10 members of CKC in Saskatchewan or ten hundred, that is the number of votes which should arrive in Toronto.

WEAK ATTENDANCE

Have you noticed how often recently you have read local club notes and found the plaintive cry "nobody turns out to meetings"? Doesn't your club suffer from that malady too? It is beginning to look as though this decade will mark the decline and fall of local kennel clubs.

And why? On the one hand you have the lackadaisical member who excuses his non-attendance by saying that nothing interesting ever occurs at the meetings. On the other hand you have the executive and committee who complain, with justice, that there is no use in arranging lectures, films, discussions or other entertainment for a handful of six to 10 faithful. We are going to have to reconcile these two points of view before our local kennel clubs fall by the wayside.

Perhaps we need a "new look". In a city the size of Regina, for instance, we have a very limited number of members who are breeders in a really large way or who maintain large boarding kennels.

nels. Most of our membership is drawn from breeders who maintain a small home kennel and whose puppies are kept in the home until the time of sale. These people are usually eager, conscientious breeders, with a good knowledge of their own breed's qualifications and requirements.

CLUB SUPPORT

It is to these people and the one dog owner and just plain dog lover we must look for support of our local clubs. The big breeder, the large boarding kennel man, just has too much on his hands to be bothered with his local club's meetings. He gives his support so far as possible to the shows—he does his best to build up the entries at the shows, but beyond this he cannot or will not go.

Shall we then begin to gear all our kennel club activities to the novice? Should we make quite certain that every simplest step in operating a dog show or paper-breaking a puppy is explained in full detail. And if we do are our older members going to be bored to sobs and stay away in large numbers? Well, the answer would seem to lie in the fact they are staying away anyway.

Isn't this a spot where CKC might step in and give assistance? What local club but would be happy to have CKC send out a list at the beginning of the year containing suggested topics of study for the monthly meetings? Not in any way arbitrarily, simply as helpful suggestions for getting your club's meetings informative and interesting?

Couldn't we have a little directive from CKC giving the names of books and publications pertinent to the subjects suggested? And in this way wouldn't each local club feel it was participating with the Canadian Kennel Club as it should.

Don't you feel that it is high time CKC began to act as a parent body to

the local clubs—no better way than by giving some direction and assistance at a time of dire need.

Make no mistake—this is a time of need. Unless we take some action in our local clubs we might just as well elect a good executive and give it authority to run the club's business making a report to the members once a year. After all, isn't this what is going on now?

How extensive is your club's membership? And what percentage do you get out to the meetings? If it is anything less than 30 per cent you might as well give them the authority to act for you and save yourself and them the embarrassment and tedium of unattended meetings.

This isn't the ideal remedy. Far from it. But unless you and you, Mr. and Mrs. Member, want to get out and carry your share of the load it seems you are going to have to give up some of your rights and privileges.

Remember this—it is your local kennel club to whom you look when your community wants to raise the license fees; it is your local club which puts on the dog shows at which you hope to make that coveted title; and it is your local kennel club which makes it possible for you to meet with the fancy to discuss the difficulties and problems, the joys and distresses of dog breeding, dog care and dog ownership in your locality.

Don't you think you owe that local kennel club at least the duty of two or three hours once a month?

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Talk About Bad Losers

(Bickering among British dog show exhibitors is becoming a serious state of affairs, according to James Ferris, writing in the English DOG WORLD. He says: "We have lost the sight of the dog and are looking too much at its parts." In the following article, he takes sharp issue with persons who want judges' criticisms which, he says, create discord and dissension.—ED)

THREE has been a lot of talk lately about bad losers. Whatever the right or wrong of this talk does not matter. It is the fact of it that counts for it means that people are bickering. There is an awful lot of dissatisfaction which is ending in recriminations.

SERIOUS STATE

This state of affairs is serious, and it certainly must not be dismissed lightly. There is considerable unrest not merely in the breed which I know best (the Bull Terrier), but in the canine world almost as a whole.

It is an unrest which is destroying goodwill and which, coming on top of the financial strain of these days, is destroying entries, too.

It just is not good enough to say that if you have a good one you will go to the top. It is a specious argument, because it puts the cart before the horse. As a matter of fact, I use that sort of argument in a totally different way. When people shout at me that, in the political field, they must have equality of opportunity, I reply that they have always had it.

"Lipton," I say, "was born with the dice heavily loaded against him. He was born in very lowly circumstances, yet he died one of the wealthiest ones of this world." He made his opportunities and he went to the top.

Lipton chose the world at large. But there is no doubt that if he had entered the canine world he would equally have gone to the top.

It had nothing to do with your opportunities, nor, for that matter, with your dogs. It depends on you, and you alone, whether you go to the top. Believe me, if you are a doggy Lipton you will get there and you will stay there.

TOO MANY LIPTONS

But when most of us enter our dog for a show we do not seriously expect to come home with nothing but red cards. There are not many Liptons among us. For the most part we are just ordinary folk entering our dog for the fun of it, hoping, of course, that the judge will see what we see in our exhibit—hoping, but not expecting. When we don't get recognition we are not seriously offended.

Bad losing is incompatible with this sort of outlook. We entered for fun; we did not expect to win; we therefore take our licking as a matter of course.

Yet it is these very people who are being called bad losers, because they are beginning to grumble, because they

are not prepared to take their licking as a matter of course.

There is no doubt that they are grumbling, but it is unkind to dismiss it all as bad losing if for no other reason than that it is bad form for winners to call losers names. It is ungracious and ill-fitting for victors to say, "Yah—" The wise would stop and listen to these grumblers and try to discover the truth. For something is wrong to evoke them.

TALKS TO LOSER

As a matter of fact, a short while ago I was talking to one of these "bad losers" and I was very impressed by a remark she made.

"Before the war," she said, "when you went in the ring and had a look round, you quickly assessed your rightful place—and you were seldom very far wrong. But nowadays—well, you just can't anticipate anything. One week you're right up, the next you're right down. You might just as well draw the numbers out of a hat."

Make no mistake about it, this exhibitor is well known. She has bred and owned some famous dogs. But she has more or less given up showing because she is dissatisfied.

"When we used to be beaten by a dog we all recognized as a worthy dog we were all quite happy; we were satisfied that the best dog had won. Nowadays it is nothing more than a lottery—and a bad one at that, for the prizes aren't big enough to make it worth while playing that way."

Superficially, this complaint appears to be a complaint about the judging we have to suffer these days. Yet, fundamentally, it goes much deeper than that.

When this exhibitor said that they all used to go into the ring and assess their rightful places, she was saying, in effect, that judge and exhibitors all thought along the same lines. It meant that there was a common body of opinion which, after allowing for personal predilections, knew what it was looking at and more particularly, what it wanted.

There is no such opinion today. It was destroyed ostensibly, by the war, and has not been replaced.

In my view (and I say it without wishing to offend) that pre-war body of opinion was prejudiced and very parochial in outlook. It was not what could be called informed opinion. It was due for "busting up" anyway.

Yet it was a foundation, a basic plan that served an all-important purpose of giving everyone a common foothold. The trouble is that this body of opinion which wanted reforming has not merely been "busted up"; it has been annihilated and the result of annihilation is nothing.

NO COMMON BODY

We have no common body of opinion as to what a Bull Terrier should look like. No two people appear to have ideas in common. It is really a desperate state of affairs.

Without mutually-shared endeavour we are stumbling in the dark, at best

frightened to speak for fear of showing our whereabouts as "bad losers," at worst, yelling our heads off in the hope at least of raising a chant. For a chant will mean unison somewhere.

As I move round the show rings I hear one chap praise Tom Cobley's dog to the skies and dismiss Jan Steven's as "tripe." The next chap dismisses them both as "rubbish," and is all for Bill Brewer's, whilst the next man can only see good in Jan Steven's.

The only opinion that they are likely to hold in common is that Harry Hawke's and Daniel Whiddon's are both no good at all, but that is probably sheer cussedness, as they were two the judge liked. The only thing I find obviously in common to all these critics is there vehemence.

But wait a bit; there is perhaps something else as well. If we listen carefully we notice that the criticisms and the praise are always of a part, never of the whole. "I can't understand John Peel liking that dog. It's a disgrace to the breed. It's got bad feet!" "Blimey! Ain't it a shocker!" Just look at its hindquarters!" It works the opposite way, too. A dog is put up because it has "remarkable fill-up" or "wonderful sweep of fore-face."

We are betwixt and between because we have lost sight of the dog and are too busy looking at its parts.

A good fill-up does not make a good Bull Terrier any more than bad feet ruins one. A good dog is a corporate living entity, not a collection of parts and it is dangerous to think of him in those terms.

Now I blame this sad state of affairs this lack of corporate opinion, these recriminations, on this craze for detailed criticisms, which has its roots in the demand for judges' criticisms. Although anybody ever wants honest criticism anyway! Any more than they ever want advice even when they ask for it. All people ever want when they ask for criticism or advice is confirmation and commendation for their own opinions. And anyway, as that old shepherd used to say to me, "Criticism and advice that are given freely are worth exactly as much as they cost."

BANE AND BUGBEAR

The judge's critiques are a bane and a bugbear. They bear heavily on the judge who has the ability to place dog in order, but who has not the ability to put pen to paper. They create discord and dissension because they please nobody but possibly on occasion the writer, and, on occasion, the other chap who reads with glee of his competitor's discomfiture. They stir up trouble.

After all these critiques do not help the initiated; they are often not worth the paper they are printed on, even with the best of intentions, for a judge is often totally unable to explain his correct preferences. But, above everything, they are so very very wrong because they divert attention from the whole to the part.

They destroy our dreams and illusions of good dogs and leave us nothing—but bad losers.

Kerry National Dog of Ireland

THE national dog of the Irish Republic gains his name from the place of his origin and his color. The Kerry Blue originated in the mountainous area of County Kerry. His coat is any shade of the blue and grey combination.

IRISH—KERRY

It is thought by some authorities that the Kerry was at one time identical with the Irish Terrier whose main coat shade wasn't always the popular russet it is today. In the early days both breeds had black dogs. Kerry puppies today are born black and grow lighter in color with age.

Gentle in nature, the Kerry is a working and sporting terrier used in Ireland and England for hunting birds and small game. He is excellent on an otter hunt.

Many Irish Kerries imported to this country did not have the gentle disposition so favored by Canadian breeders. Through careful breeding his disposition has been greatly improved to the gentle, happy dog he is today.

He first came to world-wide notice when he became the national dog of the republic.

In addition to his retrieving and tracking qualities—he has a remarkable nose—he had great endurance and will fight to the death in combat. Despite this he is gentle and careful with children and adults who are accredited. To those who are not he is immediately aggressive and is an excellent watchdog.

Because of his intelligence and capacity for rapid learning he has been used at times for police work in England.

He is one of the larger terriers and has a soft curly or wavy coat.

First Canine Cops Included Airedale

AMONG the first breeds to be used for police work was the Airedale Terrier who has also served in several wars as a dispatch bearer. The breed is supposed to have descended from the Broken-haired or Old English Terrier which is now extinct.

BELIEVED PROGENITOR

The Old English Terrier is believed by some authorities to be the progenitor of the Airedale, Irish, Welsh and Fox terriers.

In an attempt to foster a better and bigger breed of terrier for hunting fox, badger, weasel, fomart, otter, water rat and other small game, sporting Yorkshire men crossed the Old English Terrier type with the Otterhound whose keen nose and swimming ability were lacking in the terrier.

Early types, which appeared from 1864 on, were called Bingley, Welping and Waterside terriers. Airedale classes were first held in 1879.

CHARACTERISTIC OF AUSTRALIAN

By MRS. D. A. ANDERSON

A USTRALIAN in name and character is the Australian Terrier. A sporting terrier to Canadians, he is a working dog in his native land. The Aussie, although a fairly recent arrival in North America, originated in Australia about 150 years ago. As with many other breeds, his ancestry is somewhat vague but popular opinion is that he developed from the original rough-haired Scotch Terrier, the Yorkshire Terrier and Dandie Dinmont Terrier.

SIMILAR TYPE

The first Aussies were very similar in type to the present dog with the exception of hairy faces and legs, and wheaten color.

No drastic changes in type took place until 25 years ago when a Mr. Marten of Victoria, Australia, began improving their coats. He succeeded in producing a harsher coat and richer tan color.

Over the next 10 years careful breeding and constant weeding out of non-true type puppies succeeded in producing the blue and tan variety.

At this time the Victorian Kennel Control Council acknowledged the breed as pure, drew up the present Australian standard and controlled pedigrees. From that time the breed has been true to type.

A working breed in his home-land, the Aussie is a fleet-footed, powerfully-muzzled dog who spells death to rats and rabbits. He is an affectionate and playful one-family dog who is loyal, clean and an exceptional watch-dog.

The Australian Terrier recently found his way into the hearts and affections of the Duke of Gloucester. While Governor General of Australia, the Duke bought an Aussie for his eldest son Richard. They were so pleased with the dog that on their return to England they imported another for their younger son William.

He is far from a pampered pet, being rough and ready for all things.

CAIRN TERRIER

All-Weather Hunter

THE old-time working terrier of the Isle of Skye has come down to us as the Cairn Terrier, and has come down in true form. This courageous little dog is a direct descendant of the old "earth dogs" from whom most of the Highland terriers are descended.

HARDY SOUL

Still a hardy soul, although more a pet than a worker today, he was originally used for bolting otter, fox and other four-footed vermin from the rocky landscape of the Isle of Skye. He was equally at home with laird or crofter, never a snob.

His double coat has made him an

all-weather hunter. The harsh outer coat can be of any color but white.

Although the original breed had many variations a type soon became fixed through selective breeding. The result was the game little Cairn of today. However, it has only been during the 20th century that the breed has been before the public eye. Prior to the last 50 years the breed was little known below the Cheviot Hills which divide England and Scotland. They were not shown in England until 1909.

Differing from many of the terrier group, he has a head that is not too blocky but has plenty of furnishings. He looks keen, varminty, intelligent and very hard-bitten.

Hepatitis Picture Clearer

(The following article regarding research on Infectious Canine Hepatitis conducted at the Ontario Veterinary College was taken from a paper published in the American Journal of Veterinary Research by Dr. L. T. Smith of Guelph.)

A DEATH-DEALING virus that in some cases kills suddenly enough to cause suspicion of poisoning has been the object of recent research on the North American continent. This deadly disease is Infectious Canine Hepatitis. Much has been written about this disease but so far no definite cure has been found.

DEATH RAPID

In one-sixth of cases autopsied during a set period death was so rapid that the owners suspected poisoning. However, in another one-sixth of cases autopsied during the same period the only symptoms noted by the owners were a partial lack of appetite and listlessness for a period of 12 to 24 hours before death.

General symptoms are a lack of appetite, listlessness, high fever that tends to become subnormal as death approaches, abdominal tenderness and pernicious vomiting.

In Canada researchers at the Ontario Veterinary College headed by Dr. L. T. Smith, after deciding that Infectious Canine Hepatitis was one of the major virus diseases affecting dogs, experimented with 17 mongrels, out of four litters, to see if tetrachloroethylene has any effect on the disease.

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They were led to this experiment by the fact that in five of the 18 cases of Infectious Canine Hepatitis found in autopsies during the period March 31, 1947 to March 31, 1949, tetrachloroethylene had been given just prior or during the course of the disease as treatment for internal parasites.

MAINLY YOUNG

The 18 victims of the two-year period were mainly young dogs — 16 were under six months of age, one was a year old and the other seven years old. It was also discovered that mortality due to this disease rarely hits two dogs in the same neighborhood or kennel.

This led researchers to investigate the possibility of an agent which breaks down the animal's natural defense to infection having significance in the disease.

Results of the experiment showed that tetrachloroethylene has no significant effect on the disease as doses of the drug was in considerable excess of the normal dose in cases where the drug is used and none of the dogs died.

The experiment did indicate that the virus must be augmented or the resistance of the dog lowered in some way before the infection results in death. This disease seems to produce its effect largely through damage to the liver and it is assumed that deficiency of the liver-protective factors of the body contribute to the severity of the disease.

As in all cases of illness such symptoms should be noted and mentioned to a reliable veterinarian if they persist. High fever, abdominal tenderness or pernicious vomiting should cause the owner to immediately contact a veterinarian while the other symptoms may indicate only a slight internal disturbance, but should be carefully watched for persistence.

BULL TERRIER

IT was in the English fighting pits of the 1800's that the Bull Terrier was first evolved. Well might we say that from the cruelties of the 19th century "sport" of dog-fighting have we inherited its one redeeming feature.

GENTLEMAN NOW

Happily today, and for many years past, he has been raised and respected for more noble reasons than were his less fortunate ancestors. We recognize him now as a gentleman with a remarkable devotion to children, an unshakable love of his family and an ability to protect his loved ones with a confidence that earns the respect of friend and foe alike. The courage, tenacity and strength of bull-dog forebears combined with the lithe agility of his other ancestor, the old English Terrier, makes the Bull Terrier a formidable enemy.

Popular in hot climates, where their tough constitution stands them in good stead, they have been known to tackle bears, jackals, baboons and tigers. They also have an obdurate determination. My father once chained one to a large barrel while he went off shooting, only to be overtaken two miles away by a delighted Bull Terrier with chain and barrel attached.

Today, the breed is divided into "coloreds" and "whites". Although on this side of the Atlantic they are shown in separate classes, in Britain the two types compete against each other. In view of the present shortage of the breed and for the sake of greater competition the British idea might be worth a little thought.

The over-all picture of the show dog must be one of strength and alertness. A broad chest and short back, small, dark eyes and a keen expression.

One thing is sure—whether or not your Bull Terrier makes a good show specimen, he will make a good pal.

VIVID PICTURE

Charles Dickens, the master story teller, had a rare capacity of creating vivid pictures. What dog lover can't picture "Mr. Alfred Jingle's" anecdote in the well-known "Pickwick Papers".

"Ah! you should keep dogs, fine animals, sagacious creatures. PLUCKY WATCHMAN

Westie Ideal Companion

By J. NEILL MALCOLM

THE all-white Terrier of Scotland—the West Highland White—may have changed his coat color through the centuries of its existence but it has not changed its nature, stamina or courage.

LOST ORIGIN

The Westie is but one of the many breeds whose real origins are lost in antiquity and incomplete records. As far as the writer is aware no Westie fancier has claimed the breed's affinity with ancient Egyptian bas-reliefs or portraits by old masters. Though the writer has an antique Persian rug, whose border is decorated with heraldic-looking animals, one of which could just as easily be taken for a terrier as anything else.

There is no need to indulge in lengthy arguments as to the antiquity of the breed but to the writer's own knowledge these dogs have been bred true to type for over 250 years in at least one kennel—the Malcolms of Poltalloch in Argyllshire.

The need for a tough little dog to go to earth (in French "terre" - hence "terrier") after fox, otter, badger and other vermin has produced quite similar types the world over, and each has been developed along lines dictated by local needs and tastes. Of these the Westie was bred as a hunting and working terrier perfectly suited to the job he has to do in the western Highlands of Scotland and especially around Loch Fyne.

An old document tells us that King James (he authorized the famous translation of the Bible) sent for "Earth Dogges or Terrieres out of Argile" as a present for a friend in France.

Originally the West Highlander was of any color and was usually called by the kennel from which he came. "Poltalloch Terrier," "Roseneath Terrier" and breeders would use the blood to improve their own strains.

With the advent of the modern quick-action shotgun, the breeders, under the leadership of Col. E. D. Malcolm, concentrated on the white color as it shows up so very much better in tangled undergrowth, in a bad light and against a neutral background such as a heather-clad hillside.

KILLS FOX

The Westie's jaws are much more powerful than are imagined by a brief glance at his mouth. Many years ago, when the breed first appeared on the show-bench a writer for a doggy paper (not a judge) chose to criticize Col. Malcolm's well-known dog "Boidheach" for being "too light in the jaw" - nobody bothered to tell him that this same dog, when 10 months of age had killed a fox by fastening onto its breast and squeezing the life out of it.

That the breed has not lost its usefulness is shown by its continued extensive use as a hunt terrier and ratter.

The Westie's native intelligence and alertness makes him an ideal companion, both at home and in the field, and house-dog-watchman. He is long-lived and free from deafness associated with some white breeds, nor has he that "dourness" of which some terriers are accused. He requires not too much grooming but enjoys it.

The type has changed remarkably little since the breed started to appear on the bench some 50 years ago. Their courage, powerful jaws, agility and strength, intelligence, sturdy feet and strong coat are still as much in evidence today as in yesteryear.

I ken the Terrier o' the North,
I ken the towsy tyke;
Ye'll search frae Tweed to Sussex' shore
But never find his like.

For pluck and pith, and jaw and teeth,
And hair like heather coews,
Wi' body lang, and low, and strang,
At hame in cairns or knowes.

He'll face a fowmert, draw a brock,
Kill rats and whiterits by the score,
He'll bang tod-lowrie frae his hole,
Or slay him at his door.


He'll range for days, and ne'er be tired,

Many Terriers Once "Scotties"

THE "Scottish" Terrier has probably been more breeds than any other dog today. As contradictory as this may seem it was so prior to 1874 and was the cause of a bitter battle through the "letters to the editors" columns.

NO AGREEMENT

Reason for the great argument was that no one could agree on what the Scottish Terrier was. The final result was the selecting of the hard-haired Highland or cairn terrier who was also known as the short-haired Skye. He was found on the Isle of Skye along with his long-haired cousin, the Skye of today, and also in the western Highlands.

At one time the Scottie, Skye, Paisley and Aberdeen terriers were all classed as the Scottish Terrier. In addition many Irish and Fox Terrier type dogs were classed as "Scottish" for want of a better classification.

The battle waged in journals of the day until editors put an end to it all as useless. But in 1874 there appeared in the "Fancier's Gazette" a description of the Scottie that conforms with the present standard.

Today many people think of the Scottie as an all-black dog but the standard allows any shade of brindle, wheaten or black and it is acknowledged that the coat of the brindles are better textured than the black.

In the old days he was more often sandy, which is still quite acceptable, than any other color.

The very early books of the 16th and 18th century describe what is believed to be his ancestor—the "earth dog" used in hunting the fox and the brocke". In Scotland he was used extensively on foxes who took a devastating toll on sheep herds, on badger and otter.

The name "die-hard" came about because of the courageous nature of the Scottie who would "die hard" in a fight to the finish with an adversary.

OLDEST VARIETY

The noted English authority Rawdon B. Lee wrote of the Scottie: "The Scottie is the oldest variety of the canine race indigenous to Britain . . . For generations he has been a popular dog in the Highlands where, strangely

enough, he has always been known as the Skye Terrier, although he is different from the long-coated, unsporting-like creature with which that name is now associated."

Although perhaps unfair to the Skye, Lee's fixing of the Scottie's age is notable.

The first show to have a class for Scottish Terriers was at Birmingham, England, in 1860. Dogs shown were not Scotties but Skyes, Dandie Dinmont and Yorkshire.

It wasn't until 1883 that John Naylor imported the first Scotties to North America. TAM GLEN and BONNIE BELLE were the pair.

By 1879, five years after the first modern description of the breed appeared in print, Scottie, Skye and Paisley became separate breeds—much to the betterment of all three.

After all the discussion of what a Scottie was and should be, it was left up to ardent breeders to prove the Scottie's worth.

Today this compact little dog has a dense wiry coat, powerful jaws, indomitable courage and the varminty look characteristic of all true Highland dogs.

Wales Developed Sealyham Terrier

A WELSHMAN developed the Sealyham Terrier from an obscure strain of dogs. Desiring a dog with gameness and endurance who could dig and battle underground, the late Captain John Edwards developed the Sealyham from a strain noted for the quarrying of badgers, otters and foxes.

From his estate, Sealyham, the breed derived its name. For 41 years, Captain Edwards was responsible for its development. The working ability of the Sealyham drew attention first in Wales and later in England. After the turn of the century they began spreading to all parts of the world.

White or lemon colored with tan or badger coloring on head and ears, the Sealyham is a low, powerfully built dog but extremely companionable.

RED IRISHMAN IS DARE-DEVIL

THE Irish Terrier can lay claim to both the sporting and working groups for he is a natural water dog, can be trained to retrieve on land or in water, and has created an excellent reputation as a messenger and sentinel war dog.

ALMOST MINIATURE

Almost a miniature of the Irish Wolfhound, the Irish had a raciness of form and greater freedom of action than the other terriers and is one of the larger breeds.

Long before his entrance to the show ring in 1879 he was being bred true to type in his native land. His red jacket makes him distinctive as do his talents. His coat can also be wheaten and yellow red but the bright red is preferred.

As a hunter he is well-known around the world having hunted big game in both the northlands and tropics as well as smaller game in other lands.

A game terrier, he will stand up to dogs of any size but is not a drop-of-the-hat scrapper. His "dare-devil" attitude makes him popular with children and adults alike.

BRED IN WALES

LOOKING much like an undersized Airedale, the Welsh Terrier is one of the very oldest of terrier breeds. Some authorities believe that he is the old English black and tan wire-haired terrier.

He has always been known as a sporting terrier in his homeland of Wales where otter, fox and badger were his game.

With a coat like the Airedale and body closely resembling the Fox Terrier, the Welsh is still a breed in his own. He was originated by a John Jones whose Ynysfor prefix was well-known to sportsmen both for terriers and Otterhounds.

"Foxy" Cousins Very Similar

FURNISHINGS and coat make the great difference between the smooth and wire-haired Fox Terriers although both are descended from different ancestors. The smooth variety weighs slightly more than its wire-haired cousins but much infusion of smooth blood into the wire-hair has closely related the two.

DIFFERENT ANCESTORS

It is believed that the smooth variety, which antedated the wire-hair in the show ring by some 15 to 20 years, came down from crosses of the smooth coated black and tan working terrier, Bull Terrier, Greyhound and Beagle. The wire-hair is believed to be a direct descendant of the rough-coated black and tan working terrier with generous out-crosses of smooth blood.

The smooth variety which is an English originated line, was originally classed as a sporting breed due to its keen nose, remarkable eyesight and staying powers.

Purpose of crossing the smooth with the wire-hair was to gain for the latter the cleaner cut head and more classical outline of the former. A reverse crossing of wire-hair to smooth was not common with the T-line, descending from DUSKY D'ORSAY, being the only pedigrees containing this cross. They are all believed to be in Australia now.

Inter-breeding of the two varieties as a serious practice has been discontinued for some time.

That the Fox Terrier is an old breed is exemplified by the recording in print and of canvas of the smooth Fox Terrier COLONEL THORNTON'S PITCH—in the year 1790.

A small, hardy dog who loves to hunt the Skye does his best in company with others of his breed. With almost human strategy, they plan and execute the capture of four-footed vermin.

About the end of the 19th century the Skye's coat, which is about 5 inches long, lost him some of his popularity. While it generally does not reach the ground many felt it brought dirt into the house.

Throughout its history the Skye has been kept as nearly the same in character and standard as possible. That he has always been a courageous and a dangerous adversary is characterized by the motto adopted by the Skye Club of Scotland—"Wha Daur Meddle wi' Me".

GREYFRIAR'S BOBBY

Terrier Defends Self In Court

GREYFRIAR'S Bobby, one of history's most famous terriers, won his own trial before three magistrates. Brought to court as a nuisance with a restaurant owner who took compassion on the masterless dog, Bobby was set free and gained eternal fame when his life story won the mercy of the court.

DEVOTED MOURNER

Bobby's master, one Gray, died in 1858. Gray's only devoted mourner was his dog Bobby who refused to leave his grave in Greyfriar's churchyard. For 14 years Bobby remained to mourn his master's passing.

His patient watch and evident grief were captured by painter Gourlay Steel who found Bobby an excellent model.

At first the churchyard attendants drove Bobby away from his master's grave but always he returned. For years the dog loitered around the grave, long after Gray had been erased from the memory of his human friends.

For 14 years he lived on charity, often extended by the restaurant owner whose windows overlooked the yard where Bobby spent his days. It is unusual that a dog who mourned so deeply would live as long as Bobby did.

When he died in 1872 he was buried in Greyfriar's where he had lived for so long.

At the street corner near the churchyard gate, a granite fountain was placed. The effigy of a dog sitting on guard is on the fountain and the inscription reads:

"Greyfriar's Bobby, from life, just before his death. A tribute to the affectionate fidelity of Greyfriar's Bobby. In 1858 this faithful dog

followed the remains of his master to Greyfriar's Churchyard, and lingered near the spot until his death in 1872. With permission erected by the Baroness Burdett Coutts."

CARLO IN COURT

Another dog who won a court case was Carlo, a giant St. Bernard, who swayed the scale of justice to his master's rightful favor.

Carlo was stolen from his master and sold to a livery stable keeper for \$50. His master, a farmer, who lived near Boston, Mass., advertised for the return of his dog, who was a beloved companion of his tiny daughter.

A year later he and his daughter were driving down the main street of Boston when suddenly the child cried.

"Look, pa! Oh, look! look! Carlo! Carlo!"

There on the green with great body trembling in excitement at the sound of his tiny mistress' voice stood the kidnapped Carlo.

"Oh, come Carlo!" she called.

In a second the dog was to her side, prancing with doggy glee, tail wagging.

The farmer took the dog home with him, happy at his return to the family but the livery stable keeper took the matter to court.

The case lasted two days.

GAVE EVIDENCE

The livery keeper gave evidence to show he had purchased Carlo from the man who had reared him. But the farmer described every mark and scar on the dog.

"I think I'll postpone the trial in order to have the dog in court as a witness," said the judge.

A deputy sheriff brought the dog to court.

"Carlo!" called the livery stable

keeper. But Carlo only sniffed and moved uneasily.

"Carlo, Carlo," called the farmer's daughter.

Immediately the St. Bernard's tail beat the air in circles and he bounded down the corridor to the little girl.

Five minutes later the jury returned a verdict for the farmer.

How To Trim Your Terrier

MARK of the Terrier is the clean-cut outline of his body. Hardy and courageous, this group of breeds, the largest of the six, strengthens this quality by its appearance.

DANDIE EXCEPTED

With the extreme exception of the Dandie Dinmount, the Terrier shape is angled to a greater or lesser degree. The rugged appearance of breeds like the Australian, the Cairn, the Skye is helped along by their sturdy, low-set bodies.


Trimming may make all the difference between a good-looking dog and

It is a combination safety razor and comb. Its blade, which is run over the dog much like a comb, is sheathed in a steel-toothed protector so that the razor edge cannot harm the dog and that no clearly defined cut edge can mar the outline.

With the blade held higher than the comb-like sheath the stripper is run over the dog. The long hairs come out without discomfort to the dog and leave a neat outline.

EASY TODAY

Stripping is a joy today compared to the early attempts at a clean outline. At first a razor or knife and a strong thumb were all that were used. Naturally it was a painful event for



a poor-looking specimen. Trimming removes the dead and shaggy hairs which spoil the outline. Longer-haired Terriers especially need trimming to keep their coats in shape. The close-haired breeds must be carefully trimmed to preserve their clean outline.

The Dandie Dinmount is the only one of the Terrier family who has a rounded body. His silky topknot is also not found in other terrier breeds although many have hairy heads.

To the novice the task of making his dog appear at its best seems mountainous. What and where to trim are as big problems as how to trim.

Tools for trimming are very simple. A good stiff brush, a comb and a "dresser" or stripper are all that are needed. Whiting or chalk sprinkled on the hair at the start of the operation prevents the hand slipping and injuring the coat.

Once the novice knows what his dog's outline should look like—he's studied pictures or the standard of the breed—he is ready to begin.

First thing he does is to look doubtfully at the stripper in his hand.

the dog and thoroughly tried the patience of both dog and man for it was a several-days operation.

One very noticeable fact about terriers is that while many are trimmed very closely much of the facial hair is left. Purpose of this is to accentuate the terrier expression. The shaggy brows, brushed forward, make a varmity look more so. The beard or chin whiskers, if properly trimmed and kept in shape, accentuate the blocky or rectangular shape of the head. Ears should be stripped inside and outside and on the edges leaving them trim and neat.

Legs should appear straight and round with feet adding to the round look. Forelegs should not be trimmed other than removing hairs which offend the rounded look. Hair on the feet can be clipped near the toes to accentuate the rounded look.

Terrier are noted for straight fronts. Careful trimming can often make a not-too-straight front look perfect. On the clean-cut breeds the long frill down the side of the neck must be stripped. Shoulders are trimmed

down to the legs on the sides and in the front. This presents the desired square front and allows careful trimming to cover front "faults".

The hindquarters are the most likely to present problems to the novice trimmer. If the upper leg is not sufficiently bent to follow the standard it can be made to look so by trimming close to the front and sides of the leg and leaving more hair at the back. Below the hock the round trim appearance of the forelegs should be gained. Feet should be round.

Between the fore and hindquarters is a straight back. Sides and back should be levelled off. The tail should leave the back at a clear-cut angle. A slight dip or "roach" just before the tail sets it off. Tail trimming should be done with an eye to balance.

VARYING TRIM

Different breeds have different tail trims. The Scottie's short tail must taper to the end with heavy hair at the root, the Bull Terrier's whip-like tail must taper while the Kerry Blues must be trimmed close.

Teeth and nails play a part in canine grooming as they do in human grooming. Regular attention to terrier teeth prevents tartar from pushing up the gums and loosening them. Constant applications of the file to the nail keeps them in shape but the trimmer must be careful not to cut them to the "quick".

The general trimming aids apply directly to the Wire Hair and Scottish, Welsh, Sealyham, Airedale and Irish terriers. Both Scottie and Sealyham require a longer coat and if the dog is to be shown stripping should be done in sufficient time for the coat to gain its proper growth before he goes into the ring.

The Kermie has a single non-shedding coat which should never be stripped but merely tidied with a pair of scissors after bathing. The tidying can be quite a clipping if the coat becomes long and unruly. Close trimmed are the neck, shoulders, ears and skull while the back should be levelled off.

Longer-haired terriers like the Cairn require the inside and edges of the ears trimmed.

Daily grooming keeps the short coat of the Smooth Fox and Bull terriers in trim and removes shedding hair. The front and back sections must be kept very short.

As the top coat of the Airedale, Irish and Welsh terriers is darker than the undercoat, time is required after stripping to have the two colors blend. If the owner has a show mind he must allow for this color blending when he plans the stripping.

After the stripping is completed it is best to step back and judge the silhouette. It is doubtful if a perfect silhouette can be gained at the first attempt.

The old adage "practise makes perfect" applies and before too long the novice will be able to achieve the results with the minimum of effort and trouble.

GERMAN BREED

Schnauzers All-Round Guards

THE Schnauzer is one of the few breeds which can be found in more than one group. The giant variety belongs to the working group while the standard and miniatures are classed as terriers. In Germany, the land of their origin, and England all Schnauzers are found in the working group.

STANDARD PROTOTYPE

The standard is the prototype of both the giant and miniature. He is probably derived from the crossing of the black poodle, wolf-grey Spitz, and the old German Pinscher stock. The miniature is the result of crossing small standard Schnauzers with the Affenpinscher (a small, black German toy dog). A cross with the Great Dane resulted in the giant Schnauzer.

By vocation the Schnauzer is a sheepherd, guard and stable dog, a great destroyer of vermin. Due to their small size the miniatures are not as active in vermin destroying as the larger varieties.

Reason for the three varieties is that the standard guarded the farmer's sheep, the giant his farm buildings and the miniature his house. They had their origin along the Austrian-German border.

A statue dating from the 14th century and paintings by Durer at the end of the 15th century mark the Schnauzer as one of the older breeds.

Among their uses have been work as Red Cross aides and dispatch car-

riers during wars and police work in Germany. They are also good water dogs and quickly learn to retrieve.

They were not introduced to this continent or to England until after World War I.

Their harsh, wiry coat is usually pepper and salt colored but may also be pure black or light and dark equal mixtures.

Dandie Popularized By Scott's Novel

A TERRIER who gained his name and popularity from a novel is the Dandie Dinmont whom Sir Walter Scott made famous in his book "Guy Mannering".

SIX IMMORTALIZED

Dandie Dinmont was a farmer who supposedly raised the six terriers immortalized in "Guy"—Auld Pepper, Auld Mustard, Young Pepper, Young Mustard, Little Pepper, and Little Mustard. "Dandie" was supposedly James Davidson of Hindlee in the Cheviot Hills where the breed was developed, like the Border terrier, from the native dogs of the area.

The Dandie also had his portrait painted by the famous Gainsborough—of course he shared the picture with Henry, the third Duke of Buccleuch.

Today his hunting qualities are not the major feature of his popularity as he is an excellent companion and guard.

Rather than having the squarish form of the terriers, the Dandie is all curves with a topknot and ear points of silky white hair. Despite his civilized modern life he is very adaptable to a rough and tumble existence.

Lion Dog Gift of Dalai Lama

THE lion dog of Tibet is the Lhasa Apso, a small dog well known for its watchdog qualities. With a history dating back at least 800 years the Lhasa is raised in the Lamaseries and villages around the sacred city of Lhasa.

Because of the location of his homeland, not much is known about the Lhasa's origin. However it is evident from his lack of fixed coloring that the Tibetans did not practise selective breeding.

Although not connected with the Tibetan religion the Dalai Lama sent, from time to time, specimens of this breed as gifts to the emperors of China.

They resemble all Tibetan dogs in that they have tightly curled tail carried up over their backs. A notable feature of the breed is their heavy furnishings and coat which give it a lion-like appearance.

Staffordshires Once Called "Pit" Dogs

THERE are two types of terriers named for Staffordshire—the English Staffordshire Bull Terrier and the American Staffordshire Terrier. The former was derived from crossing the English Bulldog with the old English Terrier. The latter was derived from an English Bulldog and terrier cross.

Although the two have nearly the same ancestors they are distinctly different breeds with the American Staffordshire being the larger of the two.

Like the Bulldog, they were originally fighting breeds being called "pit dogs". The present day breeds are true sportsmen and not vicious.

It is believed that the all-white English Bull terrier was obtained by crossing the Staffordshire Terrier with the white English terrier and adding a dash of Pointer and Dalmatian blood.

COLLEGE FAD DOG

A BREED that became a fad upon its introduction to England is the Norwich Terrier. These dogs were introduced in 1880 and rapidly became a fad among the undergraduates at Cambridge University. They were so popular that many felt the breed should be called "Cantab" in honor of the university.

The original name of the breed, and the one under which it was introduced to the North American continent, was Jones—after an Irishman who was whip to the Norwich stag hounds.

From Jones' breed of terriers and the Trumpington terriers owned by Mr. Hopkins, came the Norwich breed.

A sturdy little terrier who loves to follow the horse, the Norwich soon proved its worth for the Hunt clubs who bred them. He is an excellent rabbit dog.

SPORTING TERRIER

THE city of Manchester, England, gave its name to a black and tan terrier and gained a great pet. The Manchester district had long been noted as a centre for two "poor man" sports—rat killing and rabbit coursing.

In an effort to produce a dog which would be proficient at both sports John Hulme bred a Whippet bitch with a cross-bred black and tan terrier. The result was the first Manchester Terrier. The breed rapidly became popular throughout the area and then the British Isles.

The name was then considered too restrictive and changed to the Black and Tan Terrier. In 1923 it was changed back to Manchester in honor of its birthplace.



Springer Trials Impressive

(Jim Newport of Kinsale, Ont., northwest of Oshawa, a prominent Springer Spaniel breeder, tells in the following article of experiences and impressions at his first Springer Spaniel field trial.—ED.)

By JIM NEWPORT

"DUCK," someone yelled. And we did—right in a patch of pitchfork burrs.

SUFFER PRICKLES

You don't think twice when there might be the possibility of a stray bullet flying over your head. You suffer the prickly burrs and like it.

It's better to play safe even though it is highly unlikely that shots at any field trials would be fired in the direction of the spectators, even though a pheasant flushed by a dog swished over their heads.

You can never be sure the way a bird is going to fly was one of the many things we learned at our first field trial recently. The trial was run by the Springer Spaniel Club in Crowsland Township near Welland, about 150 miles from our home. But the trip was well worthwhile.

Although Mrs. Newport and the writer did not arrive until everyone was ready for the wonderful lunch prepared by the ladies of the club, it wasn't long before we were initiated into the gun dog field trial fraternity.

Two live pheasants were taken into a large and thickly-weeded lot and hidden about 200 yards from a pair of Springers. The dogs, then, were given the command to "hunt".

They took little time to flush the birds from their hiding place and as the pheasants soared into the air, the dogs were ordered to "keep" or sit while the gunners brought down the birds. Then the dogs were told to "fetch" and they

ran to retrieve their quarry. Most of the dogs succeeded.

RUNNING BIRD

In one case, a dog had a running bird going in the direction of his brace-mate. When the bird was flushed, the first dog was ordered to sit while its mate retrieved the slain pheasant. Only then was the motionless animal allowed to continue on the hunt.

The owners had different ways of controlling their dogs and each seemed to have its own way of hunting. Gestures to the right were orders to the dog to hunt at the right of the owner and gestures to the left meant the Springer was to work to the owner's left side. Some dogs were controlled by whistles.

We were impressed by the careful way the members handled the birds, the sporting chance the gunners gave their quarry and the spirit of the dogs which gave the impression that they really enjoyed the hunt.

Hen birds were permitted to fly away which should help the pheasant population, especially in the Welland area.

Our only wish as we left the trial was that we may soon see more of them closer to home, around the Toronto area.

CAESAR

One of the proudest dogs in the England of King Edward VII was a rough-coated Fox Terrier named Caesar. This dog was the constant companion of the monarch and was always seen by his side or trotting at his heels. His collar bore the inscription "I am Caesar the King's Dog" and many wagered the terrier was well aware of this.

Results of the trials and bench show were supplied to DOGS IN CANADA by the Western Ontario Foxhunters' Association through George A. Cowan.

The first five in the all-age field trial were Alex Lambert; Rex, owned by Frank Martin of Galt; Flapper, owned by Krum David of Kitchener; Dr. Jester, owned by G. McWhitter of Port Credit; Molly's Ranger, owned by H. Hawes of Orangeville.

First five in the derby trial were Jack Hawk; Jim, owned by O. Baxter of Caledon East; Hydro Lambert, owned by A. F. Cook of Stratford; Joe, owned by O. Baxter; Judy, owned by E. V. Hagedorn of Kitchener.

Best In Show at the bench show was taken by C. B. Jacob's dog while Best of Opposite Sex went to O. Baxter's. Best Derby dog belonged to F. A. Mitchell of Stratford.

Dr. G. A. Mitchell of Hespeler was judge and W. P. Hanley of Galt, ringmaster.

Winners in the Trigg (males) competition were owned by Carl Morrison of St. George; A. F. Cook and F. A. Mitchell, both of Stratford. Winners in the Trigg (female) class belonged to A. F. Cook, D. C. Jones of Stratford, and Carl Morrison.

In the Walker (male) competition dogs owned by C. B. Jacobs of Port Credit, Ont., G. McWhitter, and K. Treadwell of Barrie, Ont., were winners. In the Walker (female) owners were O. Baxter (first and third), Stan Krafchek of Kitchener.

PACIFIC TRIAL

Conservation Lesson

A SUCCESSFUL venture of the Pacific National Exhibition was indoor retriever field trials held by that organization at its 1952 exhibition in Vancouver.

IN PUBLIC EYE

In an effort to bring to the public eye all kinds of animals and to give them a conservation lesson, the trials were organized and were successful in this and in bringing to public attention the qualities of Retrievers.

A series of three stakes was provided—a Derby open to all non-winners of any stake including a puppy stake, a junior open stake open to all dogs except champions of record and an open stake open to all including champions. These stakes were run in the afternoon and evening each day. Cash prizes were provided for the first four placing in each event and a grand cash prize for the dog acquiring the highest aggregate of points over the two day meet.

All events were keenly contested and the judges had a very difficult task picking out their winners; many run offs having to be made to ascertain the winning dogs.

The dogs worked out of a cleverly camouflaged "blind" in single, double, triple and even hidden bird contests.

The large crowds attending these events were ample proofs of the interest taken by the general public, and should provide encouragement to the Exhibi-

tion directorate for bigger and better indoor field trials in the years to come.

Success of the mechanics and general arrangements fell squarely on the broad shoulders of Director William H. Pym and his very able assistant Albert O'Kell in charge of guns, the throwing of birds which went off without a hitch.

Field trial enthusiasts and sportsmen in general appreciated the educational promotion work of the Pacific National Exhibition in sponsoring these indoor trials for the conservation of game.

Highly appreciated were the efforts who set up the trials and had such a job choosing the winners. It was fitting that a senior director of the exhibition board and one who is such a keen field trial man as P. H. Moore should be one judge. Jack Lillington, well-known in the sporting world, was the second.

LAW IS JUST

THE "law" is really a just organization as far as a 10-year-old Windsor lad is concerned. Bobby Moroz was on his way to school when he saw a police constable on a motorcycle run over his dog.

Two hours later the long arm of the law had reached out to comfort his sorrow. The constable, Jack Moxon of the traffic division, arrived at Bobby's home with a six-week-old puppy to replace the dog who was killed.



German Shepherd Twice Wins B.I.S.

A CO-OPERATIVE effort on the part of the Forest City Kennel Club, London Canine Association and Western Fair Board brought three consecutive one-day shows to London, Ont. early in October. It was the first time a combined effort had been put forth.

U.S. ENTRIES HIGH

The shows enjoyed a large percentage of American entries. Four large judging rings kept things moving.

An outstanding Shetland Sheepdog OAKLAWN'S LITTLE MISS MUFFET took 199½ points in the obedience trials. The half point was lost. Judge Randall Perry told the audience, by the handler making a wrong turn.

Two time top winner was the German Shepherd bitch CH. MINKA-V-STEGLICH, owned and handled by Sam Back of Toronto. She took Best In Show awards at the first and third shows. Best In Show the second day was taken by Kerry Blue Miss Show Off of Cogenwaugh, owned by Mrs. M. Eileen McEachren of Todmorden, Ont.

For the first time in the show ring, it was a big three days for the 12-month-old female bulldog, Picadilly My Fancy, owned by William E. Cooper of R.R. 3, London. She was three times Best of Breed, three times Best Canadian Bred in Show and twice won the Non-Sporting Group.

Dogs were benched in the new government livestock building and exhibited in the arena. A covered walk between the buildings protected the dogs.

Dog Catcher Proves Friend

SOMETIMES the "dog-catcher" can be a dog owner's best friend.



Alberta Trials Well Planned

(Vic Grainger, Alberta field trial representative, gives his impressions of the fall field trial circuit in his province.—Ed.)

IT appears that the Alberta clubs are realizing more than ever the necessity of the field committee setting the tests in advance and having everything in readiness in order to lose no unnecessary time during the trial.

At the Drumheller trial this was very noticeable. In checking over the tests by the judges I felt they were too difficult. The committee and judges were called together and the judges were overruled. The field committee proved the judges were wrong as only two of the 12 dogs failed on this test. The club gained experience from a similar test at the previous trial.

EDMONTON GOOD

Edmonton had the tests all set and even staked out—I have never seen a trial so well run off. They had selected new grounds and they were perfect. Judges at that trial seemed to have clamped down on too much handling on a marking test and no response when handling was needed. This turned out to be about tops on this fall circuit.

Ponoka, as usual, ran off a good one. It always has been well organized. The general search test proved a good handling dog and a good hunting dog combined. The handler could only go so far with his handling and then the dog had to show his stuff by hunting it out.

Calgary judges and committee met and had the tests well set on paper, but perhaps the judges had too much to say and the committee lost some interest. Bill Gault, the field marshal, was very short handed as his right-hand man was unable to be there. Two other assistants were running dogs. This made things a bit slow between tests.

The test causing the most excitement was a very practical handling test. It was a combination. Two birds were thrown, shot at and marked by the dog BUT while the dog was going for his second marked bird another man about 100 yards away fired at a bird which dropped. Here is where the handling started to control the dog not to go fetch the stranger's bird.

Ten dogs out of 14 made this by showing good control and handling. According to the rule book, control and direction is next in importance to marking. We need more of these practical shooting tests.

Brooks left the setting of tests entirely to the judges and the trial ran smoothly and they seemed to have lots of time. The entry was not too heavy to start with and five dogs were out of the running on the first test and not many left for the final.

Derby, novice and open all-age were held in the one day, finished in good time and presentations all finished well before dark.

Labrador Becomes Real Trouper

HERE'S one dog in Canada who knows the meaning of "on with the show". "Vicky", a Labrador Retriever known in show circles as CH. HIGH PARK BUDDY, U.D., was to perform at the 64th annual fall dog show of the Alberta Kennel Club in Calgary. It was to be his first show—a display of obedience with his master, J. H. Green, of Victoria, B.C.

DESPITE ACCIDENT

He went to Calgary just to put on the show and went "on with the show" despite an accident the morning of the performance date.


As he walked along the Macleod Trail near the cabin where his master was staying a truck loomed up and struck him. Dazed and hurt by the blow, Vicky fled past his master into the bush near the cabin.

For five hours he remained in the bush, then staggered back to the cabin where attendants tried to get near him to see how badly he was hurt.

But Vicky held them at bay until Mr. Green returned.

That night Vicky performed before a delighted Calgary audience.

He now has another title to go with champion and utility dog—trouper, first class.

TERRIERS, HOUNDS ONCE ONLY GROUPS

IN the very dim past dogs were considered either "terriers" or "hounds" no matter to what purpose they were put, whether they hunted or were house dogs. Today the terriers have the largest of the six doggy classifications or groups.

HUNTED TOGETHER

In the early centuries terriers and hounds hunted together—the hounds to seek out with their noses and the terriers to follow the quarry to ground.

The ability of the terrier to follow to ground gave him his name—the French "terre" or "ground" became "terrier" or "one who follows to ground".

He is unequalled in the destruction of vermin and many varieties have been shepherds to huge flocks of sheep.

Many terriers have been nicknamed "die-hards" which denote their habit of fighting to the death no matter what size the adversary.

From Scotland comes many of our present-day terriers. The fact that they are all sorted out as to breed and type perhaps would have astonished our great-great grandparents for from "Scottish" Terriers have come at least five distinct breeds—the Scottie, West Highland White, Cairn, Skye and Paisley, to mention a few.

Many more were produced in the agricultural counties of England, where they were used as shepherds, and also in Ireland.

The British Isles were indeed mainly responsible for the development of the terrier family—with the exception of the Schnauzer, the Australian Terrier and the Lhasa Apso.

Generally they are an angulated group of breeds—the Dandie Dinmont and Lhasa Apso providing the exceptions. All are sturdy dogs with untold courage and stamina.

One of the notable features of the Scottish or Highland breeds is the "varminity" expression. This expression is perhaps best summed up in the motto of the Skye Club of Scotland—"Wha Daur Meddle Wi' Me".

Excellent as watchdogs, terriers are gentle with children, full of fun and frolic for friends of the family. Strangers are regarded with suspicion and unless approved by the family driven away with promptness.

BEDLINGTON BORN IN MINING SHIRE

A MINING shire, Northumberland, gave its name to the Bedlington Terrier. First known as the Rothbury Terrier, the Bedlington was bred by sporting squires who loved a game terrier and a fighter.

BRED TRUE

The terrier as we know it probably resulted from the mating of COATES PHEOBE and ANDERSONS PIPER, both of whom were terriers of a type.



Perky West Highland White Terrier Ch. Tyndrum Katrine, owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Daniell-Jenkins of Pickering, Ont., completed her championship July 26 at the Streetsville and District Kennel Club show where she was Winners Bitch, Best of Winners Best of Breed and fourth in the Group. She was Best of Breed and third in the group at both Lakehead Kennel Club shows, Aug. 1 and 9. Katie's sire was Can. and Am. Ch. Shiningcliff Symmetra Statesman and her dam was Rossarden Marie.

Despite many crosses which occurred later, many faithful breeders kept the dog true to the original breed.

Soon after Pheobe's litter came, a colony of Nailers in Bedlington took up the breed and soon were noted for their plucky terriers.

Miners and Nailers of Bedlington often had terrier scraps and large sums were usually at stake.

A hardy dog, afraid of nothing, the Bedlington found his way into the homes of the common and the elite with the same success. His colors are liver or blue with the latter being the more popular today.

LAKELAND BRED FOR USEFULNESS

FROM the area extolled by the English poets comes the Lakeland Terrier. Calling Cumberland County his home, this terrier was bred strictly for his usefulness.

ORIGINALLY PATTERDALE

Originally called the Patterdale Terrier, this breed was used with hounds long before the days of the famous John Peel. The work of these packs gotten together by farmers of the area was solely to destroy the marauding foxes who made their lairs in the mountain caves.

Bred for their gameness, these terriers were considered a valuable possession and were shown at agricultural shows. They were judged by masters of the hounds or other experienced hunting men who considered the working abilities first.

Later they became divided into white and colored classes, the white being most valuable when hunting otters as dark terriers had been severely mauled by excited hounds when otters had been routed.

They are believed to share some ancestors with the Border Terrier and there is sound evidence that they are an offshoot of what later became Bedlington.

Minutes of Meetings of Board of Directors

AUGUST 5th, 1952

2311. The meeting of the Board of Directors which adjourned on June 11th, 1952, reconvened, at the call of the President, on Tuesday, August 5, 1952, at 10:00 a.m. in the Club's offices, 677 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario. The President, J. J. Farmer, presided. Present at the commencement of the meeting were G. Getty, W. H. MacKendrick, and W. J. Monaghan.

2312 (2273) MINUTES

The Secretary presented, for adoption, that portion of the minutes of this meeting held on June 11th, 1952.

—Mrs. A. McColl entered the meeting.

Following discussion a number of corrections were ordered in the minutes prepared by the Secretary. (Secretary's note: These corrections were incorporated in minutes published in DOGS IN CANADA).

It was regularly moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Getty:

"THAT, the minutes of the proceedings on June 11th, 1952, as corrected, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Getty, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. MacKendrick. Motion carried unanimously.

—S. Back entered the meeting.

2314 (2276). AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

The President reported that letters received from the Department of Agriculture dated June 25th and July 22nd with regard to Ministerial approval of all those amendments to the By-laws which received a majority affirmative vote on the 1951 referendum ballot and the withholding of Ministerial approval on the proposed amendments to the scale of fees, re exported dogs, approved by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting, had

been forwarded to all members of the Board, along with his report of discussions with the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and other officials of the Department of Agriculture at a meeting arranged following receipt of the Department's letters of June 25th.

Letters received from Directors Irving and Pratt in connection with the President's report were read.

The President reported that a notice informing the members of Ministerial approval of the amendments would appear in the August issue of DOGS IN CANADA, and he suggested that the Board consider the advisability of commencing an educational campaign with regard to the approved amendments and all other proposed amendments received for the next referendum ballot.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the following be published in the September issue of DOGS IN CANADA for the information and consideration of the membership:

- (a) A letter addressed to the Club's solicitors on June 4th, with attached points raised by the President in connection with the Club's present By-laws, and the reply received from the solicitors dated June 11th;
- (b) The summary of various points considered in connection with the amendments to the By-laws submitted for Ministerial approval following the 1951 referendum ballot;
- (c) The proposals which were forwarded to all members of the Board on July 14th on the order of the President.

2315 (2282). STANDARD FOR AMERICAN COCKER SPANIELS (BLACK AND TAN)

The Secretary reported that:

- (a) The proposed addition to the standard of the American Cocker Spaniel with regard to the "Black and Tan" variety had been published in the July issue of DOGS IN CANADA (page 4) as ordered by the Board;
- (b) No letters had yet been received with regard to the proposed addition to the standard.

The matter was ordered held over for a further report to the Board at its next meeting.

2316 (2301). FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Secretary presented financial statements, prepared by the auditors, for the six months' period ending June 30th, 1952, copy of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Getty, seconded by Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, the financial statements be received."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. Getty, Mrs. McColl, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan. Motion carried unanimously.

2318 (2278). STUD BOOKS

The Secretary read a letter from Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records stating that "In view of the fact the Canadian Kennel Club is not contemplating the publication of Stud Books, and due to the shortage of cabinet space, we are discontinuing the typing of index cards, animal and Breeders and Owners." The letter stated that their perpetual Index for animals would be continued, and if the indexes included in earlier stud books were to be continued, such indexes could be made up from the copies of certificates of registration forwarded to the Club.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would inform the Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records that:

- (a) Contrary to the information apparently received by the Director, the Board of Directors was considering ways and means of bringing the stud books up-to-date as well as plans for the publication of future stud books;
- (b) The Board of Directors had no objection to the discontinuance of the indexes referred to by the Director provided the decision to discontinue said indexes was the decision of the Record Committee and applied to all affiliated associations.

2319 (2280). COMMITTEE ON BENEFIT SHOW

The Secretary read a letter (unsigned) dated July 30th and addressed to the Board of Directors seeking clarification of the powers of the Committee created as result of the following resolution adopted at the annual general meeting: "That, the President of the Canadian Kennel Club appoint a committee from the City of Toronto to consider the advisability of running a dog show for the benefit of the Canadian Kennel Club."

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary address a letter to the Convener of the Committee reporting the receipt of the letter read by the Secretary and request that the Committee submit a report in line with the terms of the resolution adopted by the annual general meeting.

The Secretary was directed to obtain an opinion from the Club's solicitors regarding the legality of the Canadian Kennel Club sponsoring a dog show.

2320 (2281). STANDARD CERTIFICATES

ARTICLES OF AFFILIATION

The Secretary reported that, as directed by the President, he had obtained the opinion of the Club's solicitors with regard to the position of the Club in respect to amendments to the Articles of Affiliation particularly with regard to the proposed two-generation standard certificate. The opinion of the Club's solicitors, as set out in their letter of June 27th, was read.

The Secretary read a letter from the Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records with regard to a resolution adopted at the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board meeting on March 25th instructing the Records to draft a standard certificate of registration (two generations). The Director's letter reported a decision of the Record Committee to install I.B.M. equipment at the Records Office with a view to replacing the present manual method of producing certificates by the installation of a punch card system, arrangements expected to speed up production and issuance of certificates and lower production costs for stud books (where six copies only desired).

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that copies of the following be forwarded to all members of the Board for study and opinion:

- (a) The Secretary's letter to the Club's solicitors dated June 4th;
- (b) President's memo which accompanied Secretary's letter to the solicitors;
- (c) The opinion of the Club's solicitors as set out in their letter of June 27th;
- (d) Letter received from Director of Canadian National Live

- It was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would ask each member of the Board to register a vote for a one-generation certificate, a two-generation certificate, or a three-generation certificate.

2322 (2291). TUTTLE CRATES (AIR SHIPMENTS)

The Secretary read a letter received from the Trans Canada Air Lines in answer to a letter addressed to them by order of the members attending the last annual general meeting. The Secretary reported that a copy of the letter had been forwarded to all members of the Board, and a letter received from Director Irving indicating his dissatisfaction with the reply received was read.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that no further action be taken and the correspondence be filed.

2324 (2288). PRIORITY DATES (SHOWS)

The Secretary reported that a schedule outlining calendar dates for the next five years (starting 1953) covered by applications for priority rights received had been forwarded to all members of the Board and no member of the Board had submitted an objection to the schedule. The Secretary further reported that the dates for the Barrie Kennel Club's shows in 1953 and 1954 respectively should be changed to May 16th and 15th respectively instead of as shown on the schedule.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, the schedule of priority dates for the years 1953 to 1957 inclusive covered by the applications received from the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show (two), the Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Ontario, the Kent Kennel Club, the Windsor Kennel Club, the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc., the Ottawa Kennel Club (two), the Sarnia Kennel Club, the Barrie Kennel Club (as revised), the Aurora & District Kennel Club, the Canadian National Exhibition (two) and the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto, be approved subject to the Dog Show Rules presently in force or as later amended."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Getty, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. McColl. Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary reported that the Guelph Kennel Club had submitted an application for priority rights, with required fee, but had shown only the date of May 23rd, 1953. The Secretary reported that while this date for 1953 fitted in with the already approved schedule, the same Saturday was not available, on a priority rights basis, for the years 1955, 1956 and 1957. Following discussion the Secretary was directed to inform the Guelph Kennel Club of the situation, but to grant May 23rd, 1953, to the Guelph Kennel Club on a single show basis if they so desired.

The Secretary reported that the Fort Garry Kennel Club and the Greater Winnipeg Ladies' Kennel Club had applied for priority rights on show dates in May and September. It was unanimously agreed that these applications be included in the schedule already approved provided these applications receive the approval of the Manitoba Director.

The Secretary reported that the Toy Dog Breeders' Association of Canada had withdrawn their application for priority rights, and he had written the Ontario County Kennel whose application for priority rights on the same dates asked for originally by the Toy Dog Breeders' Association had been received after that of the Toy Dog Breeders' Association. The Secretary reported that a reply had not yet been received as to whether the Ontario County Kennel Club wished reconsideration of their original application.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that the 1953 dates covered by the approved applications for priority rights be reported in DOGS IN CANADA in order that other show-giving clubs would know what dates are no longer available when making plans for their 1953 shows. This suggestion was unanimously approved, and Secretary was directed to be governed accordingly.

2325 (2300). STATISTICS ON BREED REGISTRATIONS

The Secretary reported that work on the computation of statistics showing the number of registrations in the various breeds over the past few years had commenced, and a further report would be made to a later meeting of the Board.

2326 (2308). LETTERS RE CERTIFICATES OF REGISTRATION AND SALE OF DOGS

The Secretary reported that copies of letters received with regard to the sale of dogs with and without certificates of registration (at different prices), and the sale of dogs falsely represented as pure-bred had been forwarded to all members of the Board. Letters received from Mr. Williams, Mr. Irving and Dr. Watson were read.

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that from time to time complaints are received regarding:

- (a) persons representing dogs to be pure-bred when they are not registered or eligible for registration;
- (b) non-delivery of registration certificates;
- (c) persons requesting additional money if papers are to be furnished; and he suggested that a definite procedure be followed in dealing with these complaints (received in writing).

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, our policy in dealing with complaints regarding the sale of dogs and/or delivery of certificates of registration be as follows:

- (a) a complaint is to be acknowledged the day of receipt;
- (b) the complainant is to be requested to furnish such additional information as may be required regarding names, dates and other pertinent details (of he has not included sufficient information in his letter);
- (c) the person complained about is to be communicated with by registered letter, informed of the nature of the complaint, requested to forward, before a specified date, his version of the matter in dispute along with such additional information as may be pertinent, and to indicate what steps, if any, he intends taking to satisfy the complainant and/or to comply with the Act;
- (d) the Secretary is then to take such further steps as he deems necessary in order to bring the file up to date;
- (e) he is then to refer the full file to the Complaints Committee with a request that a report be submitted to the Board at its next meeting;

- (f) the Board shall take such action as it deems necessary as if the file is to be referred to the Department it shall be accompanied by a request that the matter be investigated and also the authorization to enter prosecution if the evidence gathered warrants such action."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Getty, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Back, Mr. Monaghan, and Mr. MacKendrick. Motion carried unanimously.

Mrs. McColl expressed the view that possibly a number of complaints regarding non-delivery of certificates arise through the breeder failing to identify a dog before it leaves his possession thus often creating difficulties in respect to identification in order that registration may be proceeded with in the regular way. Mrs. McColl suggested that the members be asked to vote in connection with the next referendum ballot, on a proposed amendment to the By-laws requiring that a breeder identify each dog before it leaves his kennel. This matter was ordered placed on the agenda for discussion at the next meeting of the Board.

2327 (2309). APPROVAL OF JUDGES (PROCEDURE)

Mr. Monaghan reported that committee had been formed as requested by the President, each member of the committee having signified his willingness to serve on the committee, each member of the committee was asked to submit an outline of his ideas, each member of the committee had been supplied with a copy of the views of the other members on the committee, and each member was then asked to submit specific proposals for procedure in approving judges. Mr. Monaghan reported that some but not all of the committee members had already submitted their proposals.

The matter was left over pending a further report from Mr. Monaghan or the committee.

2328 (2299). MANAGED INVESTMENT

The President reported that the Secretary, as directed, has supplied information showing the present market value of the Club's present bond holdings.

Mr. MacKendrick submitted proposals on the sale of part of the Club's present holdings and purchase of other bonds, which at present market prices and without altering par value of present investments, would increase annual income (from interest) on the bonds involved from \$210 to \$250 annually.

The Secretary was directed to obtain additional information and proposals for the Board's consideration.

2329 (2211). TERM OF OFFICE (BOARD OF DIRECTORS)

The Secretary reported that no report had yet been received from the Committee appointed to consider and report on changing the term of office of part (or whole) of the Board of Directors.

Matter ordered held over pending a further report to the Board.

2331. LETTER FROM THE SASKATCHEWAN FIELD TRIALS ASSOCIATION

The Secretary read a letter from the Saskatchewan Field Trials Association setting forth their views with regard to approval of judges for field trials held under CKC Rules, procedures in amending CKC Field Trial Rules, procedure in appointing the provincial field trial representatives, and alleged failure of CKC to recognize points earned at a trial held under its rules.

The Secretary reported that a copy of this letter had been forwarded to all members of the Board, and the replies received from Mr. Williams, Mr. Pratt, and Mr. Irving were placed before the Board.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Saskatchewan Director be asked to submit a report with recommendations, Dr. Watson's report and recommendations, when received, to be forwarded to the entire Board.

2332 (2175). FIELD TRIAL RULES (REQUIRING OFFICERS BE MEMBERS)

The Secretary pointed out that at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors, Mr. Pratt had suggested that a proposed amendment to the Field Trial Rules be placed before the members in the next referendum ballot calling for the officers of a trial club holding a trial under CKC rules to be paid members of the Canadian Kennel Club (as in the case of show and obedience trial clubs).

The Secretary stated that he had, as decided by the Board at that time prepared a proposed amendment to the Field Trial Rules.

The Secretary was directed to forward the proposal to Director Pratt with a suggestion that he arrange for the necessary sponsors.

2332 (2254). FOXHOUND TRIALS AND REGISTRATION

As Chairman of the Committee authorized by the Board, Mr. Monaghan reported that a meeting would be held that evening for the purpose of discussing Foxhound field trial rules, and a report would later be presented to the Board.

The Secretary reported that a number of applications for registration (based on three generation pedigrees) had been held for some time in abeyance, and sought an instruction with regard to action to be taken on such applications. Following discussion it was agreed that registration of Foxhounds on this basis would not be proceeded with at this time pending adoption of contemplated policies with regard to registration of Foxhounds and certain other breeds in a similar position.

2333 (2289). MEDALS

The Secretary reported that on June 16th a letter was received from Mrs. Margeson indicating her approval of the resolution regarding the offering of the William H. Pym Medal and James D. Strachan Memorial Medal for 1952, and on June 18th a letter was received from Mrs. Mack asking that her negative vote on the motion to continue these medals be changed to an affirmative vote.

A review of the balloting now indicating a majority in favor of offering these medals for 1952, the Secretary was directed to announce in DOGS IN CANADA that the medals would be offered for 1952;

(b) Place on the agenda of the 1953 annual meeting of the Board the matter of whether these medals are to be offered in 1953.

2334 (2244). LETTER FROM J. A. H. IRVING (RE PROTECTION OF JUDGES)

The Secretary reported that, as directed by the Board, he referred to the Club's solicitors a proposal that the Board adopt a resolution requiring clubs holding shows under CKC rules to publish in their premium lists and catalogues a notice to

effect that "It is the duty of clubs holding dog shows under C.K.C. rules to see that no officiating Judge is subjected to indignities of any kind during the progress of a dog show held under C.K.C. rules." (see Item No. 2244.)

The Secretary read a letter from the Club's solicitors whose letter concluded with an opinion to the effect that a resolution in the form suggested by Mr. W. H. Pym could be passed by the Board of Directors, but respectfully suggesting that a better way to deal with the matter would be to have the Dog Show Rules amended to the same effect.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary prepare proposed amendments in line with the resolution suggested by Mr. Pym, the proposed amendments to be forwarded to Mr. Pym for the required signatures.

The Secretary reported that lists of applicants for membership had been mailed to all members of the Board on June 6th, June 18th, June 20th, June 24th, July 7th, and July 21st, and no objection to any applicant having been received from any member of the Board, the applications had been approved and returned to the Live Stock Records Office promptly after the expiration of a ten-day period following the mailing of each list to the Board.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"That, the approval given the applications for membership reported by the Secretary be and is hereby confirmed."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McColl, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Back, Mr. Getty and Mr. Monaghan. Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary sought an instruction with regard to the inclusion, on the lists of members used in connection with the election of officers and directors for 1953 and the distribution of the referendum ballot, of those applicants whose applications are received on or before June 30th, 1952. Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would include on said list of members the names and addresses of all those whose application for membership was received, either at the Live Stock Records Office or the head office of the Club, on or before June 30th, 1952, provided that approval was later given said applications in accordance with the procedure now followed on applications for membership.

The Secretary read a suggestion from Mr. Williams that "all Directors and Officers be supplied with a list of all paid up members so that we may enlist new members." No action was taken in view of the earlier procedures that had been followed to obtain renewals of membership and new applicants for membership.

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McColl, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Back, Mr. Monaghan, and Mr. Getty.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary reported that Mr. John R. Clapp, Toronto, Ont. had submitted JONDORTH as an alternative selection of kennel name (JONDORTH not approved because of objection from recorded owner of RONDOR), that the recorded owner RONDOR had indicated no objection to JONDORTH provided it is not used in connection with the registration of Cocker Spaniels, and that Mr. Clapp had indicated his willingness to sign a statement that the use of JONDORTH would be restricted to Dachshunds.

The Secretary was directed to obtain the signed statement from Mr. Clapp, and to then issue certificate of approval on JONDORTH on the conditions stated.

The Secretary reported that an application for registration of MONT-REAL as a kennel name had been received from a resident of Montreal, and in accordance with past policy the applicant had been requested to submit another selection of kennel name. The Secretary's action was approved, and the Secretary was directed to take no action on the application pending receipt of one or more alternative selections.

The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. H. D. Sparrow (kennel name RACEWAY) appealing the Board's decision to not sustain her objection against the kennel name ROSEWAY. The Secretary reported that following approval given by the Board to the name ROSEWAY, a certificate of approval had been issued to the applicant for that name.

Following discussion the Secretary was directed to inform the person who had registered the kennel name ROSEWAY of the objection that had been received leaving the choice with that person to either permit the name to stand registered or to select another kennel name.

2338. DEATH OF R. C. VAUGHAN

The Board was informed that Mr. R. C. Vaughan, a former Director representing the Maritime Provinces, had passed away. The Secretary was directed to forward a message of sympathy to the family of the late Mr. Vaughan.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Irving with regard to the application for handler's license received from J. Long, Tacoma, Wash., Mr. Irving recommending the approval of Mr. Long's application. The Secretary was directed to include Mr. Long's application with those approved by the Board.

The Secretary reported that show-giving clubs had been asked to include a notice in their premium lists, the last part of the notice reading, "A person acting as an agent who handles a dog in the ring is also required to be licensed", and sought a clarification of this ruling. It was unanimously agreed that any person acting as agent must obtain a license as required by the Dog Show Rules, and this applies to any person identified by the Dog Show Rules, and this applies to any person identified

on the entry form as agent for an exhibitor whether or not said person receives pay.

2340. RECOGNITION OF THE "SHIH TZU".

The Secretary reported on correspondence with the Live Stock Records Office regarding registration of two Shih Tzus, registered with the Kennel Club (England), and imported to Canada.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, the Shih Tzu be recognized and added to the list of recognized breeds for registration, show and trial purposes, and the breed be listed in Group 4 for show purposes."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McColl, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Getty, Mr. Back and Mr. Monaghan.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary was directed to obtain a copy of the standard of the breed from the Kennel Club (England).

2341 (2305). DATES, JUDGES, SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

Mr. Loveridge reported on the show and trial dates approved by the Dates and Judges Committee. The Board endorsed the Committee's action (see report No. 7 to the Board).

Mr. Loveridge reported that the Thames Valley Beagle Club had applied for permission to hold a licensed field trial for Beagles on dates already granted to the Central Ontario Beagle Club for that purpose. A letter from the Thames Valley Beagle Club was read. The matter was left in the hands of the Dates and Judges Committee.

Mr. Loveridge reported that the Saskatchewan Field Trials Association had applied for permission to hold a licensed trial for the Pointing Breeds on September 1st, 2nd and 3rd, 1952, and read a letter from that Association wherein reference was made to a letter previously addressed to the Secretary by the Association (see item No. 2331). Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the application of the Saskatchewan Field Trials Association was approved conditional that said application received the approval of the Saskatchewan Director, said trial to be subject to the present Field Trial Rules of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Mr. Loveridge reported that the Ontario County Kennel Club had applied for permission to hold a sanction show at Oshawa on either November 14th or 21st, this application having been held in abeyance for the Board's consideration in view of the possibility of there being one or more shows at or about the time of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair. It was unanimously agreed that inasmuch as there was no definite indication of any shows in conjunction with the Winter Fair, the application for November 14th be approved.

Mr. Loveridge reported on the lists of proposed judges approved by the Dates and Judges Committee. The Board endorsed the Committee's action (see report No. 8 to the Board).

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Irving with regard to procedure on approval of dates and judges. The Secretary was directed to ask Mr. Irving to draft, for the Board's consideration, a resolution setting out the procedure which he recommends.

2344. NEXT MEETING OF BOARD

The President stated that it may be advisable for the Board to meet again before its regular monthly meeting in September. Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that this meeting of the Board would adjourn to reconvene at the call of the President if he considered that necessary, and in the meantime the Secretary would mail a notice calling the regular monthly meeting of the Board for September 9th.

2345. ADJOURNMENT

At 6.50 P.M., on motion by Mrs. McColl, duly seconded and carried, this meeting of the Board adjourned to reconvene at the call of the President.

OCTOBER 1st, 1952

2346. A regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, on Wednesday, October 1st, 1952, commencing at 10.00 A.M. The President, J. J. Farmer, presided. Directors present at the commencement of the meeting were: S. Back, George Getty, J. A. H. Irving, Mrs. P. Mack, Mrs. Alva McColl and W. J. Monaghan. The President reported that Director W. H. MacKendrick was absent being in Vancouver to attend the funeral services of a brother who had passed away.

The Secretary was directed to convey the Board's deepest sympathy to Mr. MacKendrick.

2347 (2312). MINUTES

The Secretary read a letter from Director Monaghan who suggested a number of corrections in the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on August 5th.

Following discussion the following corrections were unanimously approved: (Secretary's note: Corrections incorporated in published minutes).

It was regularly moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:

"THAT, the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on August 5th, 1952, as corrected, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. Mack, Mr. Irving, Mr. Monaghan.

AGAINST THE MOTION: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Getty.

ABSTAINED FROM VOTING: Mr. Back.

Motion carried.

2350 (2314). AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

The President reported that apart from any proposed amendments which the members of the Club submitted to be balloted upon in connection with the next Referendum Ballot, the Board itself should seek to give some leadership by presenting to the membership at large, proposed amendments which they felt were necessary and beneficial. He suggested that if the time required to complete the business on the agenda of this meeting did not permit discussion of possible amendments to the By-laws and the Rules, that the Board should meet again prior to the deadline for proposed amendments. The matter was left over for further discussion later in the meeting.

2351 (2315). STANDARD FOR AMERICAN COCKER SPANIELS (BLACK AND TAN).

The Secretary reported that only the one letter had been received in response to the notice published in DOGS IN CANADA regarding a suggested addition to the Standard of the American Cocker Spaniel. The matter was left over for further discussion and consideration at the next meeting of the Board.

2352 (2332). FOXHOUND FIELD TRIAL RULES.

As Chairman of the Committee authorized by the Board, Mr. Monaghan reported as follows:

1. A number of district Foxhound field trial clubs operated in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec and these clubs, with one exception, held their district trials under running rules approved by the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association, the exception holding its trial under rules approved by the International Foxhunters' Association (U.S.A.).
2. With the exception of the one district club which held its trial under American rules, the other district clubs all had representation on central body known as the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association.
3. From each district trial held by a district club affiliated with the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association, a number of qualifying dogs competed in an annual stake staged by the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association and it was desired that the winner of this stake be known as the National Foxhound Champion of the year in which the stake was run.
4. When the President had named him Chairman of the Committee authorized by the Board, he had invited representatives of All Canadian Foxhunters' Association and the lone district club holding trials under American Rules, to meet with others familiar with the setting-up of Field Trial Rules. At a meeting of the Committee, which had not been attended by any representative of the Club holding its trial under American Rules, rules and procedure had been discussed.

Mr. Monaghan placed before the Board a set of proposed rules and recommended that until these proposed rules could be thoroughly studied by the Board and any modifications arranged for, that the said rules be approved on a temporary basis in order to accommodate the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association's annual stake scheduled for October 31-November 1, 1952, the winner of this stake to be known as the National Foxhound Champion of 1952 if and when registered individually in the records of the Canadian Kennel Club.

In the discussion which followed, the President and Mr. Irving suggested that the number of dogs qualifying in district trials which may be invited to compete in the National Championships Stake be not specified but rather the number of qualifying dogs from each district trial to be left to the discretion of the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association, subject to approval by the Board of Directors. This recommendation was unanimously approved.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, the running rules for Foxhound Field Trials recommended by the Committee be approved and become effective immediately, such approval to be on a temporary basis and be subject to modification or other changes as the Board may subsequently direct."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. Getty, Mr. Irving, Mr. Mack, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Monaghan.

Motion unanimously carried.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, the application of the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association for permission to hold its 1952 Championship Stake under rules approved by the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club be approved subject to subsequent approval, by the Board of Directors, of those whom the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association select to judge the stake."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. Getty, Mr. Irving, Mr. Mack, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Monaghan.

Motion unanimously carried.

2353 (2320). STANDARD CERTIFICATES

The President reported that all members of the Board had been written as decided by the Board at its last meeting, and written replies had been received as follows on the matter of standard certificates of registration for individual dogs:

- (1) Mr. Irving, Dr. Watson, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Biggar, Mr. Williams and Mrs. Margeson favoured adoption of the two-generation certificate (sire and dam and four grand-parents).
- (2) Mrs. Mack, Mr. Pratt, Mr. MacKendrick and Mr. Monaghan favoured adoption of the one-generation certificate (sire and dam).
- (3) Mrs. Kerr favoured continuation of the present three-generation certificate.

Mr. Back and Mr. Getty stated that they favoured adoption of the two-generation certificate.

(RECAP OF VOTING: Favouring two-generation certificate—eight members of the Board.

Favouring three-generation certificate—one member of the Board.

Favouring one-generation certificate—four members of the Board.


The President referred to the Secretary's letter to the Board of August 7th, and drew attention to the following points:

1. Adoption of a single generation pedigree would require the punching of two cards by the I.B.M. Punch card system plus one additional card for each transfer of ownership to be recorded.
2. Adoption of a two-generation pedigree would require six cards (one for each ancestor), plus one additional card for each transfer of ownership to be recorded.
3. It is not considered practical to reduce a three-generation certificate by the I.B.M. equipment for fourteen separate cards; would be required (one for each ancestor), plus an additional card for each transfer of ownership to be recorded; this would mean a continuation of the present manual (typewriter) method of producing certificates if three-generation certificates are to be required for dogs.
4. Assuming no change in the present purchasing value of the dollar, a slight decrease in production cost is anticipated if the two-generation pedigree is adopted; a much greater saving in production costs is anticipated if a one-generation certificate is decided on.
5. Installation of I.B.M. equipment is expected to result in a saving of money, improved service in the issuance of certificates, and greater efficiency, but only if a one-generation or two-generation certificate is authorized.

Mr. Monaghan read the following notes which he had prepared following a study of the subject:

"Some years ago, the Board decided to discontinue the distribution of the Stud Book in the hope that a saving would

be made for the Club and instituted a charge of one dollar per copy for the book. The result was that very few members would subscribe for the book and it has turned out that the cost of printing the few hundred required is far in excess of the direct revenue return. Today, the situation is that no Board since 1947 has seen fit to have the book published and we are now five volumes behind. It is estimated that it will cost \$20,000 to do this printing and there is no money in sight to pay the bill.

With the installation of the I.B.M. machine, it is estimated there will be a \$20,000 reduction in salaries in the Records office. It is expected they will go into operation at the beginning of 1954.

The rental cost for them will be \$12,000 yearly and the service engineer will cost \$3,000—a total of \$15,000. This means a saving of \$5,000 a year.

The total budget of the Records office is approximately \$160,000 annually and the saving of \$5,000 represents slightly over three per cent. The unit cost in 1951 was 46 cents and because of necessary increases it may be 48 cents for this year.

By adopting the two-generation pedigree, I do not see where there is any hope of reducing the unit cost below what it was last year, and therefore, our Club will be no further ahead financially in comparison with last year.

If we were to adopt the one-generation certificate, it would mean the processing of only two or three punch cards instead of six or seven for the two-generation one.

It is only reasonable to assume that our unit cost would be materially reduced and the savings made could be allocated to improving the Club's services to the members.

The other point I wish to make is this: The processing of a registration certificate constitutes one unit and the fee is a dollar. Likewise the processing of a litter registration and of a transfer each constitutes one unit and the fee is only fifty cents. In these, the margin of profit over the unit cost is less than four cents—not even enough to pay the postage. Is it any wonder that our Club is in the financial doldrums? I must say it is very unbusinesslike and uneconomical to endeavour to carry on in this way.

Other breed associations have set their fees for those operational items, where the unit is one, at a minimum of one dollar and officials have intimated that our Club would be well advised to do likewise.

Desirable though the retention of the three generation certificate may be, I venture to predict that the unit cost of it will soar to 60 cents or more within three years—and then where will the Club be financially.

In my opinion, the members of the Club have a legitimate reason to protest when they say they are not receiving services today for their membership fee comparable with what was received up to about five years ago. Nevertheless, we should not lose sight of the fact that the purchasing power of the dollar has dwindled and that our membership fee has not kept pace with other increases in our economy. If there had been a gradual increase in fees, keeping pace with other increases, over the last ten years the pill would not be so hard to swallow. Consequently, the making of a decision should be no longer postponed and serious thought should now be given to seeking a satisfactory solution. In view of the seriousness of the situation, and to avoid bankruptcy I would suggest the following for consideration:

1. Commencing with 1953, allot registration numbers by groups in the same manner as followed by the A.K.C.
2. Arrange for the publication of the stud book, or pedigree record as it should be called, in six volumes, instead of one, supplying each member with a free copy of the volume of the group or groups in which he is registering dogs.
3. Solicit advertising to assist in defraying printing costs.
4. Allocate the money received from the increase in the fee for "transfers to non-residents" to a special account to be used to pay printing costs.
5. Agree to accept a one-generation registration certificate at the present fee for a three for the purpose of preventing any further increase in unit cost and possibly decreasing it substantially, increase all our fifty cent items to a dollar, and authorize the Board to proceed with the printing of the back volumes without further delay (with the stud books up to date, breeders would have a complete record of ancestry available and would be able to compile extended pedigrees without difficulty).
6. Agree there will be no increase in the present membership fee.

If we do not bring our stud books up to date and keep them up to date, we shall be in grave danger of losing the favourable tariff concessions at present enjoyed in the U.S. market.

With the improvement in DOGS IN CANADA, and its increased circulation not only in Canada but in the United States, I feel confident there will be a worthwhile increase in sales, along with a new enthusiasm and desire on the part of many who are not dog owners at the present time to participate in the C.K.C.

It goes without saying that the future can be bright if only we have the vision and foresight to make a wise decision at this critical time.

W. J. MONAGHAN."

Mr. Monaghan then suggested that the Board consider the advisability of consulting the membership at large, through the next referendum ballot, on whether the Club would adopt the one-generation certificate or the two-generation certificate.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, as this Board of Directors feels that a decision on this question is beyond its authority, a questionnaire on this subject be placed on the next referendum ballot with a view to determining whether the members wish a one or two generation certificate, and the authorities concerned with the proposal that a standard certificate be adopted by all affiliated associations be informed that the Club's decision will be communicated to them when the results of the next referendum ballot are known."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. Getty, Mr. Irving, Mrs. Mack, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Monaghan.

Motion carried unanimously.

2354 (2147). REGISTRATION COMMITTEE

The Secretary reported that the Registration Committee had authorized:

2356. LETTER FROM MRS. L. LYMBURNER

The Secretary read a letter received by the President from Mrs. L. Lymburner, Port Colborne, Ontario, who expressed concern in connection with a notice published in recent premium lists regarding handlers' or agents' licenses and seeking information as to the authority for the publication of said notice. The President's reply was read wherein the President pointed out that the Board's action in connection with said notice was merely a move to implement the rules approved by the members.

Following discussion, it was agreed that only in respect of the word "agent" need there be any clarification of the notice which was published at the Board's direction, and it was unanimously agreed that an "agent" is "a person who receives compensation". No action was taken on Mrs. Lymburner's letter.

2358. POSTAGE ON MAGAZINES MAILED TO MEMBERS

Mr. Monaghan reported that at the request of the President, he had a meeting with officials of the Post Office Department with reference to the continuation of special mailing privileges for the Club's official magazine. Mr. Monaghan reported that as a result of his discussion with Post Office officials, he wished to report that in order to remain qualified for the special postal rate, it would be necessary for the Club to amend its application for membership form by adding the words: "which includes the subscription price of \$1.00 for the publication, 'Dogs in Canada', which I desire to receive", and for every present member in renewing his or her membership for 1953, to complete an application form too, so that there will be a permanent record for inspection by postal authorities. Mr. Monaghan pointed out that for postal purposes, it would not be necessary for a member to complete an application for membership every year provided the amended application for membership form, as above referred to, is completed and on file at the Live Stock Records office.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that a notice be published in the November, December, January and February issues of DOGS IN CANADA, drawing attention to this matter and with such notice there be published the amended application for membership form required for Post Office inspection.

Following discussion, Mr. Monaghan's recommendation was unanimously approved.

The Board adjourned for lunch and later reconvened with the President in the Chair and the following members of the Board present: Mr. Getty, Mr. Irving, Mrs. Mack, Mrs. McColl and Mr. Monaghan.

2359 (2341). DATES, JUDGES, SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

Mr. Loveridge reported on the show and trial judges approved by the Dates and Judges Committee (report No. 9 of the Board). The Board endorsed the Committee's action.

The Secretary reported that on August 14th application had been received from the Progressive Kennel Club of Canada for permission to hold a championship show on June 6th, 1953, that on September 24th an application had been received from the Ontario County Kennel Club for priority rights on the first Saturday in June (June 6th in 1953), and on September 25th an application had been received from the German Shepherd Dog Breeders' Association for permission to hold an All-breed championship show on June 13th, 1953.

Following discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary ascertain from the Progressive Kennel Club of Canada whether or not it is prepared to move the date of its championship show to June 13th, and in the meantime these applications be held in abeyance.

Mr. Loveridge reported on the lists of proposed judges approved by the Dates and Judges Committee (see report No. 10 to the Board). The Board endorsed the Committee's action.

Mr. Loveridge reported on the list of proposed judges selected by the Boston Terrier Breeders' Association do not propose to announce the name of the Best in Show Judge but rather that a draw would be made at the show and the judge of Best in Show would thus be selected from the panel of judges selected to judge the breeds and groups. This being a sanction show the Board agreed that it had no objection to this arrangement.

2361. NOSE-PRINTING (IDENTIFICATION)

The President pointed out that when nose-printing had been approved as an alternative method of identification in June, 1950, it was on the understanding that this method of identification was subject to review, between officials of the Club and the Department, before the 1953 annual meeting of the Club.

The President pointed out that since that time the referendum method of balloting on changes in the Club's By-laws had been introduced, and in order that any proposed change in the existing identification regulations could be placed before the members before the 1953 annual general meeting, the matter of nose-printing had been discussed with officials of the Department.

The President then read the following letter, dated September 24th, from the Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture: "Confirming the conversation which took place at our meeting yesterday afternoon, this is to advise that this Department is agreeable to a continuation of the nose-printing of dogs as an alternate method of identification with tattooing as presently provided for in the By-laws of your Association."

2365 (2319). BENEFIT SHOWS

The Secretary placed before the Board an opinion received from the Club's solicitors in response to the Board's desire for an opinion as to the position of the Kennel Club engaging in the holding, or in any way sponsoring, of a championship dog show.

Following discussion, the Secretary was directed to forward a synopsis of the solicitor's opinion to the convener of the Committee authorized by the last general meeting.

2366 (2329). TERM OF OFFICE OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Secretary reported that no report had been received from the Committee authorized by the annual general meeting to look into and recommend on the proposal that the term of office of part or whole of the Board be extended.

2367 (2332). AMENDMENT TO FIELD TRIAL RULES

The Secretary reported that Director Pratt had arranged for the proper submission of a proposed amendment to the Field Trial Rule, which amendment, if approved by the members on the next referendum ballot, would require that the Officers of a club holding a licensed trial under C.K.C. Rules must be members in good standing of the Canadian Kennel Club.

The Secretary advised that Director Pratt felt that additional sponsors should be secured in connection with this proposed amendment. The matter was left in the hands of the Secretary.

2368 (2283). "STUFFERS" re ADVANTAGES OF MEMBERSHIP

The Secretary reported that he had corresponded with the Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records with regard to "Stufflers" on the advantages of membership being mailed to non-members along with certificates of registration. The Secretary reported that a satisfactory message had been arranged but that the Director had advised that there would be an operational charge of $\frac{1}{4}$ item for each such stuffer mailed from the Records Office.

Following discussion, the Secretary was directed to take no further action at this time to provide the stuffers, but to arrange to place this matter on the agenda of the first meeting of the 1953 Board of Directors.

2369. ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

The Secretary reported that in recent weeks two members had enquired about the status of puppies resulting from artificial insemination. The matter was left over for further consideration.

2370. "PRAIRIE RETRIEVER CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY".

The Secretary reported that in recent weeks two members had Alberta and Saskatchewan, holding Retriever trials under C.K.C. rules, wished to offer, for annual competition, a trophy which they wished to identify as the "Prairie Championship Retriever Trophy".

Following discussion the Board agreed that the inclusion of the word "championship" in the name of the trophy was not advisable, and directed the Secretary to take the matter up with the Club Secretary who had written for official approval of the offering.

2371. STANDARDS FOR RECOGNIZED BREEDS.

The Secretary reported that while the breeds—Shih Tzu and Staffordshire Bull Terrier—had been recognized by order of the Board of Directors, provision had not previously been made for the approval of standards for these breeds. The Secretary tabled copies of the standards for these breeds as approved by the Kennel Club (England).

It was regularly moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mrs. McColl:

"THAT, the standard for the Shih Tzu and the standard for the Staffordshire Bull Terrier, as recognized by the Kennel Club (England) be and are hereby confirmed the standards recognized by this Club."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Getty, Mr. Irving, Mrs. Mack, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Monaghan.

Motion unanimously carried.

2372. REFERENDUM BALLOT

The Secretary reviewed the arrangements completed in 1951 for the counting of votes on the various amendments included in the last referendum ballot, and sought an instruction with regard to again completing similar arrangements in connection with the next referendum ballot.

The Secretary was authorized to discuss this matter with officials of the Canadian Opinion Co. (who conducted the count in 1951) after it is known how many proposed amendments are to appear on the next referendum ballot, a report to be made to the Board for authorization as to final arrangements.

2380 (2327). APPROVAL OF JUDGES (PROCEDURE)

Mr. Monaghan, Chairman of the Committee authorized by the Board, reported that there has been an exchange of views

between members of the Committee, and that he was now drafting a report which he expected to have ready for submission to the November meeting of the Board. Mr. Monaghan reported that the Committee had already agreed on a suitable amendment to be submitted to the membership via the next referendum ballot, and said proposed amendment would be placed in the hands of the Secretary on or before October 15th.

Mr. Monaghan advised that the Committee's report would run to approximately fifty pages, and he recommended that the Secretary be authorized to have the report printed and enclosed with each referendum ballot. The Board approved the recommendation.

2381 (2322). TUTTLE CRATES

Mr. Irving referred to the reply received from Trans Canada Airlines regarding the use of Tuttle Crates on air shipments via T.C.A., and expressed the view that the matter should not be considered closed until a satisfactory answer had been forwarded in reply to the letter received from Trans Canada Airlines.

Following discussion, it was left to Mr. Irving and the Secretary to draft a suitable reply.

2382 (2275). APPROVAL OF JUDGES (OBEDIENCE TRIALS)

Mrs. Mack reported that the committee authorized by the Board was making progress and tabled a copy of a proposed application for approval to judge (obedience trials) drafted by the Committee which was being circulated to many obedience trial enthusiasts for opinion as to suitability. Mrs. Mack advised that a report would be submitted to the Board at an early date.

2383 (2359). DATES, JUDGES, SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

The Secretary read a letter received from John R. Kennedy who suggested that ribbons be provided for the dogs declared winners of Best Canadian-bred in Group and Best Canadian-bred Puppy in Group, and further that the judging of Reserve Best be confined to the five remaining group winners after Best in Show has been selected. The letter was ordered held over for consideration.

2384. ADJOURNMENT

The Board discussed the advisability of reconvening on October 15th for the purpose of discussing and perhaps arranging for any amendments to the By-laws and rules which members of the Board felt should be placed before the members to be voted upon, and to deal with any other matters requiring the Board's attention.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Irving:

"THAT, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourn to reconvene in the Club's office, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, on Wednesday, October 15th, 1952, at 10:00 a.m. (E.S.T.)."

Information regarding Financial Statements

SO that the members may be in a better position to assess the Club's financial position as at the end of September this year compared with its financial position at the end of September, 1951, the President has directed that the following information be published with the statements:

Elsewhere in this issue, there appears an explanation of the procedure followed in determining the amount of money which an association maintaining its records at the Canadian National Live Stock Records shall pay for the work done on its behalf by the Live Stock Records Office. As the exact amount payable by an affiliated association for the work done on its behalf during the calendar year cannot be finally determined until after the end of the year, each affiliated association pays a fixed amount monthly to the Live Stock Records Office in order that the Live Stock Records Office can meet its expenditures during the year. These monthly payments are considered on account, and after the exact amount for the year has been determined, there is a balance owing the Club because of overpayment on account, or there is a balance owing the Live Stock Records Office should the total amount of the monthly levies paid during the year be insufficient to cover the actual total cost for the year.

At the end of September, 1951, the total amount which the Kennel Club had paid on its account to the Live Stock Records Office totalled \$16,650.00. There was a considerable overpayment on our 1951 account, and for that reason, the monthly payment to the Live Stock Records Office in 1952 was lowered quite considerably with the result

that up to the end of September, 1952, we had paid on account an amount of \$15,300.00. In other words, our payment on account this year is \$1,350.00 less than it was at the end of September last year.

The financial statements for the nine-month period ending September 30th, 1951 indicated an operating profit on all of the Club's operations in that period of \$1,985.06. The statements published in this issue show an overall operating profit of \$2,579.86. Unfortunately, a clear-cut picture of our actual expenses at the Records Office cannot be obtained before the end of the year, but for the purpose of comparing our position at the end of September, 1952 as compared with 1951, it seems reasonable that we should deduct from the calculated profit at the end of September this year, the above-mentioned decrease (\$1,350.00) of amounts paid on our account at the Live Stock Records Office.

It has been considered advisable, after reviewing accounts receivable, to further increase the reserve for doubtful accounts (re advertising). This increase, amounting to \$155.00, appears as an expense in the revenue and expenditure account of the magazine. We might explain that it is considered good accounting practice to set-up a reserve to cover any accounts which have been payable for more than a stated period, say six months, even though some of these accounts, it is felt, will be paid.

Invariably, it has been found that our expenditures in the last three months of the year are well above our revenue during that same period.

The same procedure is followed for all associations (ratings may not be identical in every case). Then the grand total of all operational items for all affiliated associations is determined. After deducting any particular money grants or expenses directly chargeable to a particular affiliated association (preparation of stud book copy, etc.), the net total expenditures for maintaining the Records Office for that year is then divided by the grand total of all operational items handled for all affiliated associations, and an average per

operational cost is thus determined. To fix the amount payable by an association all that is then necessary to do is to multiply the total of operational items handled by the Records office for that association in the year by the average per operational cost determined as above described.

The Board of Directors has directed that a break-down of operational items charged to the Canadian Kennel Club in the years 1941 to 1951 inclusive be published in DOGS IN CANADA along with a statement of the total charges paid by the Kennel Club, each year, for the work handled on its behalf by the Records office. For each year there has also been worked out an average per operational item charge which is also shown in the table.

Reflecting the universal increase in operational costs, the attached statement will show that the average operational item charges to the Canadian Kennel Club has increased from 21.75c in 1941 to 45.84c in 1951. It will be noted that the Canadian Kennel Club paid the Canadian National Live Stock Records the sum of \$19,365.93 for the work which the Records Office handled on behalf of the Kennel Club last year. Another graphic example of how operational costs have increased will be realized when it is pointed out that had the average operational cost in 1951 been the same as in 1941 we would have paid the Canadian National Live Stock Records, for the work which it did on our behalf last year, \$9,188.07 as compared with the actual cost of \$19,365.93. It is presently anticipated that the average cost per operational item this year will be about 48c.

Further information on the matter of finances will be published later. In the meantime it is felt that information published on this page will be of great interest to the membership at large.

Maritime Circuit Shows Successful

The second portion opened Sept. 13 with a one-day show in Moncton, N.B. The show was held in the spacious forum and was splendidly arranged. The club is the fortunate possessor of first rate equipment and both visitors to the show, and exhibitors and their dogs were given every comfort. The result was a smoothly running show and one that was a joy to attend.

There were about 125 dogs entered, coming from as far west as Ontario. There were also from Quebec and a goodly number from the United States. One dog came from California. The home provinces were well represented, and it is a most pleasing fact that these locally-owned dogs gave a very good account of themselves.

Judge of all-breeds and general specials was Mrs. Alva McColl of Toronto.

That grand old veteran of many shows, the Samoyede, CH. SPARK OF ALTAI, owned by Dr. C. S. Bezanson, of Aylesford, N.S., emerged winner of the top award of Best In Show, well deserved and most popular win, while Reserve BIS went to a very beautiful Irish Setter, CALDENE ANGUS O'DARE, owned by G. Bartlett Taylor, of Saint John, N.B. Best Canadian Bred in Show went to Dr. M. J. Macaulay of Sydney, N.B. with CH. DINAH MITE'S LITTLE PETER and the Best Canadian Bred Puppy was awarded to Miss Judith Anne Ritchie's, ALHAMBRA POLLY PIGTAILS, a product of the "Alhambra Kennels" at Milligerville, Saint John, N.B.

On Sept. 15, the Monday following the Moncton Show, Saint John held the first of two one-day shows, under the auspices of the New Brunswick Kennel Club Inc. The club was particularly fortunate this year in being able to hold their show in the Thistle Rink, a beautiful building, centrally situated, and admirably suited to the holding of a dog show. There were, roughly 130 dogs entered, from widely scattered parts of the Dominion, as well as the United States.

Judge on the first day was the much-travelled Percy Roberts, of Norton, Conn., who has judged dogs all over the world. This being his first visit to the Maritimes, his advent was most eagerly anticipated by the exhibitors, and they were not in any way disappointed for Mr. Roberts gave a most finished and clean cut display of judging. The large ring-side that watched his work was thrilled at the speed and accuracy with which he reached his decisions.

He found his Best in Show in the solid black American Cocker Spaniel, CH. ALHAMBRA KINGFISH bred and owned by Alhambra Kennels and Farm, at Milligerville on the outskirts of Saint John. This outstanding animal, was cleverly "jockeyed" to his win by Pat Kiley and is owned by Miss Eileen K. Ritchie. He also took the award for Best Canadian Bred Dog in Show while another Alhambra-bred dog, owned by Miss Judith Anne Ritchie, ALHAMBRA POLLY PIGTAILS, won Best Canadian Bred Puppy.

Reserve Best in Show went to an Ontario-owned dog, a very smart Boston Terrier, CH. PUFFER'S ACE PERFECTION, owned by Fay-Don Kennels, Pickering, Ont.

The second show, Sept. 16, was judged by Jack Fry of Ottawa. Jack is no stranger to Maritime exhibitors and his work was watched with much interest by another crowded ring-side. His decisions were well received and although it is a long time since he worked among us, it was plain to see that his skill and ability to pick winners has in no wise deteriorated with the years.

He found his Best in Show in Boston Terrier that was Reserve BIS the previous evening, CH. PUFFER'S ACE PERFECTION. Reserve Best in Show, went to the Halifax-owned Beagle, CH. MINTIS NELLIE, bred and owned by Roy Montague.

BIS award was a very beautiful silver tray, given by a friend in memory of the late Ronald C. Vaughan, and presented by Mrs. Vaughan. Best Canadian Bred in Show went to W. E. Vaughan's Bulldog, GINGER OF VANILLA. Best Canadian Bred Puppy, was awarded to LOCHELL RIPPLE, an English Setter, owned by G. W. Cameron, of Fredericton, N.B.

Fredericton was the venue of the final two shows on the circuit. This progressive and hardworking club, had everything arranged to perfection for the comfort and welfare of both "man and his dog". The Show was held in the armoury, a large building that lent itself in every way to the holding of a good show.

The two judges were Alf Mitchell of New York, and Arthur Greenwood of Montreal. Mr. Mitchell was no stranger to many of the older exhibitors who had met him at other shows. Mr. Greenwood was quite new to us in a judging capacity, and he made himself a great favorite by his patience and thorough work.

Mr. Mitchell found his Best in Show on the first evening in a Doberman Pinscher, owned by J. P. McInnes, of Summerside, P.E.I., TROLHATTAN CHRISTIN'S CONTRALTO, handled by Miss Phyllis Fulton, of Truro, N.S. Reserve BIS went to the Boston Terrier, CH. PUFFER'S ACE PERFECTION.

At the second show, Mr. Greenwood picked as his Best in Show, the very showy Irish Setter "CALDENE ANGUS O'DARE", owned and handled by G. Bartlett Taylor, of Saint John, N.B. Reserve Best in Show, went again to CH. PUFFER'S ACE PERFECTION.

For several years now the Annapolis Valley Kennel Club has, for many reasons, been inactive, but this year a few of the old die-hards made up their minds to revive the old interest once so strong in the valley. On Oct. 11 they staged a very good show and, late

in the season as it was, they had a very nice entry of 100. Although the date of the show coincided with the opening of the Woodcock season, there was a particularly fine entry of sporting dogs. Valley sportsmen have fallen for the German Shorthaired Pointer in a very big way and there was a really fine class of this breed at Kentville on the 11th.

Those responsible for the show were very much encouraged by the fact that the interest in the pure-bred is still very much alive in this very sporting community. 

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
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
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
