RAISES OBJECTION

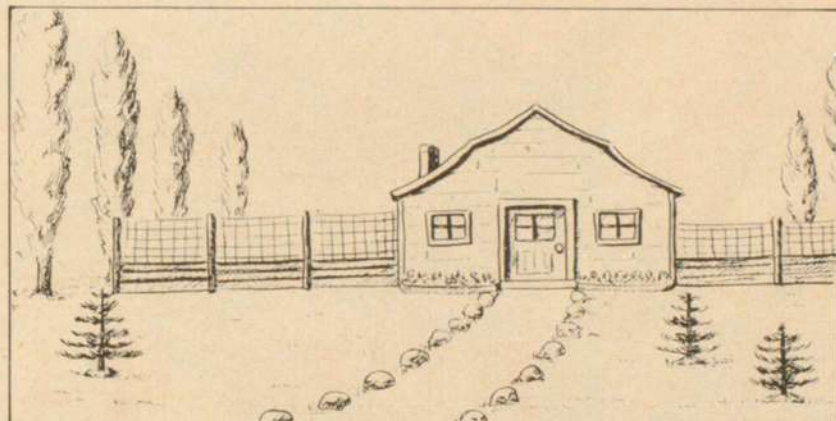

Sportsmen's Shows Success

AN all-time record for dogs benched at a Canadian show was the highlight of last month's Canadian National Sportsmen's Show, March 20-21, in Toronto. A total of 617 dogs were benched at the second, two-day show.

Mrs. Geraldine R. Dodge gave Best in Show to a Toy Poodle, Wilber White Swan, owned by Bertha Smith of Long Island, N.Y., and reserve to Mrs. M. Eileen McEachren's Kerry Blue Terrier, Ch. Miss Showoff of Cognewaugh, which went Best in Show at the preceding two-day show. A Labrador Retriever, Ch. Blyth's Ace of Spades owned by R. Blyth, was reserve to Miss Showoff.

Although it was not the first time that Canadian dog shows have been prominently portrayed on television, the CBC's Toronto outlet, CBLT, did a bang-up job on its coverage of the show.

While the 12 specialty shows attracted wide interest, the spectator crowd enthused over the demonstrations of the R.C.M.P. trained dogs. Officials said the 1953 shows were the best yet. (A full report of official results may be found starting on page 24.)

This Spring edition combines the MAY, 1953, issue with APRIL, 1953. Next number will be the "Coronation" issue, appearing late in May.

Manitoba Director Dies

Death of Mrs. John F. Kerr, Manitoba director of The Canadian Kennel Club, came as a shock March 23. A dog fancier for more than 30 years, she was in her second term as a CKC director. She replaced Clifford Biggar when he moved up to the post of second vice-president last year.

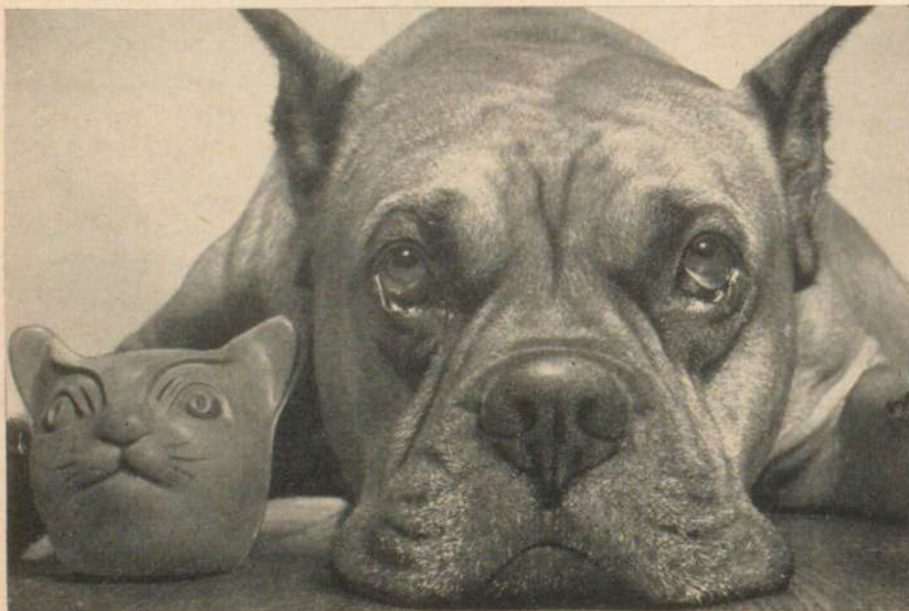
Mrs. Kerr's death came after an illness which forced her return to hospital recently. Illness had prevented her from attending the annual meeting of the CKC Board of Directors early in February.

Born in Wallaceburg, Ont., Mrs. Kerr went to Winnipeg in 1915 and lived in Norwood.

She was secretary of the Greater Winnipeg Ladies Kennel club at the time of her death, and for many years held the same position with the St. Vital Agricultural society dog show. Mrs. Kerr was also known for the many Boston Terriers she raised.

Surviving are her husband, John, one son, John Henry Mitchell, of London, Ont. Pallbearers were George Kynoch, Roy Borse, Harry Baker, Hugh Crozier, Clifford Biggar, and Alec Gostick.

In a stop-the-press report for DOGS IN CANADA, Mrs. Susan Borse said: "Mrs. Kerr's death is a great loss to our Manitoba fanciers who were out in full force at the funeral." She was buried in Winnipeg's Brookside Cemetery.

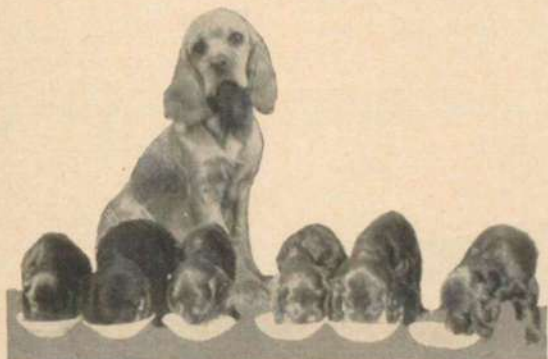

Puppy Buying Hints

By IAN H. McINTOSH

SO YOU are in the market for a good puppy! And you are afraid your lack of knowledge of dogs and their breeding may result in a poor purchase—that you may not get value for your money.

Well, let us give you a few tips about buying a good dog and some of the things for which you should look when you seek a new pup this Spring. And so that you may feel more at ease when you visit a kennel, we'll point out a few of the "taboos" and whys.



At the outset, you can't afford to be a "bargain" hunter. There is no such thing as a cheap puppy and a good puppy. Prices may vary from one kennel to another, but usually you'll find that breeding accounts for the difference.

Breeding, of course, can only be ascertained when you seek a pure-bred puppy. And a pure-bred is the only safe kind to buy, for only with a pure-bred can you safely predict what the pup will look like when it becomes full grown.

In pure-bred dogs which are registered (in Canada with The Canadian National Livestock Records at Ottawa), bloodlines are kept true through careful breeding. Each breed of a dog has a pattern and breeders often can tell you just the personality and temperament of their stock.

Your first move is to decide your breed preference, taking into consideration your environment—whether you have a large home or acreage or whether you must keep the animal in the rather confining quarters of an apartment. Pups are like children and will usually acclimate themselves to your home or yard.

On the subject of which sex is best, you've probably heard many arguments but one is as good as the other. Many experienced owners will tell you females make even better pets than males because they generally lack the roving spirit. Females, too, are apt to be more cleanly and their breeding season comes only every six months for about three weeks. At other times, they won't and can't be bred.

The next step is to find a reliable breeder, one who is just as interested as you that you will be satisfied with your purchase. If you wanted to make sure of a product offered for sale on the open market, you would probably choose one which was nationally-advertised.

When a breeder goes to the expense of nationally advertising his stock, he must have good reason. He must have something good to offer.

But that should not prevent you from shopping around amongst these advertisers. You can obtain prices and pedigrees. But you should be suspicious of very low offers when others are higher on the average.

Here are some of the whys substantiating fair prices: stud fee for a good sire, caring for and feeding the dam, veterinarians bills, whelping, early feeding of pups, serums, registrations, etc., can easily put costs up to \$50 or more by the time puppies are ready for weaning.

You may visit as many kennels as you like — but DON'T pick up the puppies in your hands. If you have been visiting other kennels, especially, you should, in all fairness, tell the owner or manager of the kennel you are visiting. He can then decide whether he will let you touch the pup.

But DON'T feel put out if you are refused. Many litters have been wiped out because would-be buyers have communicated diseases from one kennel to another.

If you want to see the puppy close up, ask the breeder to show it to you. You can tell if it can hear by snapping your fingers by the puppy's ears or that its eyesight is good by waving something in front of the eyes.

Other details about pedigree and registration may be discussed with the breeder.

You'll be very proud to own a pure-bred dog for it is a sign of quality. And if you're looking for top quality, as in any other item you should expect to pay the price for quality.

FIRE WIPES OUT DREAMS OF FAMILY

(Circumstances, sometimes, force the publishers off their fence of neutrality in the individual promotion of the sale of one dog over another. We feel our readers will agree, when they read the following story, that the plight of a young Toronto area widow, this should be one of those times.—Ed.)

UNTIL the grim morning of March 15 last, Jack Cramp and his wife, Dorothy, had many of the things a young and growing Canadian family desires. They had four young children, a modest but comfortable suburban home near Agincourt, Ont., in Toronto's eastern suburbs, and a beautiful pure-bred family pet—a female Newfoundland, 1½ years old.

Although "Duchess" had not been brought beyond the stage of a couple of Sanction Shows, the Cramps planned to campaign their pride and joy this year for her championship.

Then, in the space of a few minutes, all their dreams for the future were wiped out—and with them four precious lives. A devastating fire swept through the Cramp home, destroying it. Jack Cramp lost his life when he fought through the flames to attempt to save Janis, 5½, and Allen, 4½. A few minutes before, he had rescued Deanne, 2½, but she later died in hospital from severe burns.

Mrs. Cramp escaped with their year old baby but could do nothing to save her husband or the other three children.

Among the few things saved was their pure-bred pet who has since been boarded in Scarborough. With no home left for her dog, Mrs. Cramp is forced to sell her but wants to see that she is placed in a good home. The young widow may be reached by phoning Toronto KENwood 3356.

The black Newfoundland is registered as "Mill Creek Duchess" and was bred by John J. Patterson of Edmonton, Alberta. She was sired by Champion Mill Creek Domino and the dam was Ch. Pride's Jet.

DOGS IN CANADA feels its readers will aid the magazine in finding a fine, new home for this Newfoundland and a new owner who will see to it that this young widow gets a fair price for one of her few surviving possessions.

TWO OWNERS FINED IN RABIES CASE

Believed to be the first prosecution since the recent outbreak of rabies in the northern prairie provinces, two Manning, Alberta, men were each fined \$50 and costs for allowing their mongrel dogs to run at large. Charges were laid by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police under the Animal Contagious Diseases Regulations. The owners destroyed the dogs as soon as the charges were laid. Manning is more than 200 miles northwest of Edmonton, in the Peace River district.

Popular Mrs. "A" Passes

ONE OF Canada's well-known dog judges and a breeder of many international champions, Mrs. Lillian Alsen, 65, died in Royal Columbian Hospital at Burnaby, B.C., March 12.

She had operated a small animals hospital for more than 30 years and had been superintendent of the cat show at the PNE and assistant superintendent of the dog show there for many years.

A past-director of the Canadian Kennel Club for B.C., she was born in London, Eng., and acted as assistant to Dr. T. E. Sleeth, pioneer B.C. veterinarian during World War I.

She founded the hospital about 1922 and for about 10 years operated a dog and cat beauty parlor.

She was a noted dog judge, both in Canada and the U.S., and bred many international grand champion Doberman Pinschers before changing to Chihuahuas several years ago.

She leaves her husband, George, Burnaby's poundkeeper, and one daughter, Mrs. Howard Elliott, Hamilton, Ont.

Among the tributes to Mrs. Alsen was one from CKC President Vic. W. Williams of Vancouver. In expressing sympathy to the family from CKC members, he said, in part:

"Canadian dogdom has received an irreparable loss. . . Mrs. 'A' as she was so fondly known . . . was the spirit of kindness and thoughtfulness. She was never happier than when she was doing a good turn to help someone with their dog or cat problems. Always a good sport, humble in conquest, and most gracious in defeat, her achievements and successes in the preparation, handling and judging dogs will be equalled by few and excelled by none. She was a staunch and loyal supporter of the Canadian Kennel Club and one of our best Directors in British Columbia.

"Her memory will live on and should be an inspiration to those of us left on earth, to try to perpetuate her good deeds."

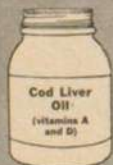

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How To Form A Dog Club

(The following article is written by Mrs. Jean M. Lyle, British Columbia obedience enthusiast, in the hope that it will help in the formation of obedience training clubs across Canada. She is secretary of the Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club.—Ed.)

WHEN a small number of people get the "obedience bug", it sounds so simple to suggest forming a training club, either for one breed or dogs in general. The number of pitfalls which these nice people can encounter before a successful club is formed is alarmingly large. I write the following in the hopes that future clubs can avoid most of the difficulties.

First of all decide whether you are going to keep the club very small and meet in someone's recreation room, or whether you are going to aim at a class of 20-50. This is vital. If you aim at a large class, it is imperative to organize properly, to apportion duties to people who are dependable enough to carry them out, and to face the necessary expenses at the outset.

The next thing is to get together and form a constitution. At this time I would suggest that you discuss and put on paper your decisions as to HOW you are going to train. There are many divergent ideas on training methods, and this decision will prevent later discord. The safest method seems to be to adopt a sound training book as the club bible, and to stick to it in case of dispute.

At this same time matters of discipline should be discussed, of people and dogs, and incorporated in your constitution. Unruly class members or spectators who will not acknowledge the authority of the instructor, or unruly owners of unruly dogs who discipline their dogs in a manner which 95% of your class finds revolting, can ruin a happy club within a month. Discuss these possibilities before they arise, and decide what you are going to do about them in advance.

If you agree thus far, you are well on your way! But there are other matters which must be arranged:

1. You will have to find and make financial arrangements for a suitable building for the training. And to find a big enough building which will accept dogs and which is within the club budget is not always easy. I note that a truly responsible club executive is essential here, not only for your club's sake but for all dogs—you must promise, and keep your promise, to see that after each training session you turn the building back with nary a sign or a trace that a dog has been in it. There should be a club routine for accidents, but if one member is not conscientious in carrying it out, the executive should not be above soiling their hands for the sake of dogs in general.

2. Decide exactly how long your "course" is going to be, when it is going to start, and what is going to be covered. Write down, and stick to it, the lessons for each session of that course. Enrol the dogs who wish to train, and do not take in any new dogs after the second night of the course. Make them wait until a later course. Otherwise first members get thoroughly fed up with the classes being continually slowed down to the pace of the late-comers. Start and finish your classes on time.

PICK INSTRUCTOR

3. Pick out an instructor and make your arrangements with him. Preferably he should have some experience in obedience training dogs and in teaching people, for this job combines both. Whether you pay him depends on the circumstances. If the man is keen, it should not be necessary unless he is a professional. But in practice it often turns out that an unpaid instructor is not conscientious about coming to class if something more attractive turns up. In any event, be sure that your instructor is a person who keeps his appointments punctually, and who behaves in a dignified and considerate manner with the class—and be sure that he is keen to help the people learn how to train their dogs—he is not there to train the dog himself.

4. Decide what social or business sessions your Club is going to have in addition to the training sessions and where and when these are to be held.

5. Have a nucleus of people who will assist the instructor with dogs having problems, who can pinch hit if the trainer is ill, who will train and study to be ring stewards and judges, etc. One person cannot run a club by himself.

6. Arrange to have available all the necessary training equipment, either through your Club or a local pet shop, this to include heavy closed link training collars in various lengths, heavy 6 ft. training leads, 30 ft. training leads, various sizes of dumbbells, scent discrimination sets, and an ample supply of whatever training book you have adopted. Insist on class members having proper equipment. (These things are available in Canada and if any Club is not able to locate them, the writer would be glad to supply such data privately).

7. Advertising over the radio and through newspaper and magazine publicity should be arranged, as well as direct mail advertising to people whom you expect to be interested such as breeders and dog show exhibitors, recent purchasers of pups, etc. Don't forget to contact your S. P. C. A., the pet shops and the veterinarians.

8. Before you start, collect a cleaning equipment for your building—papers, rags, broom and pan, paper bags for refuse, disinfectant, etc. b. application blanks for members, c. receipt book, d. whistle for instructor, e. signs with club rules and a disclaimer of club liability for accidents (see a lawyer!), f. table and chair for secretary, g. solid, bar, and broad jumps, h. dog training movies.

9. When you have gone over the above items, you will discover that quite a number of them entail a cash outlay. Add up all the expenses which will be necessary for your club in your area, and then divide them by the number of class members you expect. This will enable you to find out roughly what you will have to charge for each dog for each course he takes. Allow a little leeway for class graduation diplomas, class prizes, trophies donated to obedience trials, etc., and other unbudgetable items like visiting experts and judges, etc. Do not charge too little, as then you will have to cut so many corners that will be inefficient and uninteresting. In a city I do not think it is possible to operate for less than \$10 a dog unless you have a great deal donated (and this is not a sound basis on which to organize a club which you expect to have a future), and it is likely to be considerably more if you do not have a large enrollment.

CAN BE FUN

In spite of the foregoing, forming a club should not be formidable. It can actually be a great deal of fun and if the above suggestions are dealt with systematically, the result should be a club which will give the enthusiastic newcomer to dog training exactly what he is looking for.

In this last connection, may I say that it is my personal opinion that in regions where obedience training is new, a club is well advised to train all breeds and to concentrate at first on developing a really satisfactory beginners' course from 8 to 12 weeks. This gives the ordinary pet owner what he is looking for and he will form perhaps 75% of your members. And it will give the keener training enthusiast training for his C. D. degree and it is then likely that he can go on with later training on his own. When training has a good start and there are a fair number of C. D. dogs in your vicinity it is time enough for your club to worry about more advanced classes. But do take care, good care, of the owner who is approaching dog training for the first time—he is the secret of whether or not your club will last.

Guelph Progress Rapid

IT IS not by accident that Guelph Kennel Club's annual dog show has become generally recognized as one of Canada's foremost. The club has adhered to certain principles. Best obtainable judges have been engaged with the committee selecting those who should have no personal interest in any dogs shown.

Another important factor is time. The club realizes that exhibitors want to get away early and Guelph shows proceed smoothly and finish on schedule. Ring stewards are experienced.

And then, the club has always tried to have extra good prizes. This year, for instance, bronze plaques have been purchased as trophies for each Best of Breed win. Each plaque has the club's coat of arms.

The club owns its own show equipment, valued at more than \$8,000. There is plenty of room for each dog, both on the benching and in the ring, for the show is held in Guelph's big Memorial Gardens arena and the adjoining market building where the benching is erected.

Earliest records show that the Guelph K.C. staged its first dog show in 1901. Held outdoors, it attracted an entry of 129 dogs. This year, officials anticipate

an entry close to 700, plus those entered in obedience.

Guelph Kennel Club was re-organized eight years ago and since has expanded rapidly. Despite the fact that most of the proceeds of the shows have been given to charity, the club has bought and paid for its show equipment in that time. Each year some worthy cause is assisted. The club has helped the blind, for instance, with substantial cash gifts. Last year the Canadian Legion troop of Boy Scouts acted as ushers at the show. In return, the club made the boys happy by sending the lot of them to camp.

Earl Rudd was president of the club for seven years. After guiding it carefully he stepped aside this year and was succeeded by Jack Tolton. Earl is still active however, and is taking a leading part in arranging this year's show, May 23.

Other members come from all walks of life but are united in the common goal of the club: bigger and better shows; introduction of pure-bred dogs to the public; earning of money for worthy charitable purposes; and establishment of dog shows where bickering and hard feelings are abolished and everybody goes home happy.

INFORMATION FOR NOVICES

What Your Show Dog Can Win

THE COVETED tricolor rosette of the Best In Show award is a prize proudly displayed by its winners. There are several lesser wins a dog must have before he reaches the top award.

Most of the entries in a dog show first compete in one or more of the regular classes for their particular breed. Each class is divided into two groups—male (dogs) and female (bitches). To compete in any of these classes a dog must be over six months old.

Classes are: Junior puppy, dogs six to nine months; Senior puppy, dogs nine to 12 months; Novice, dogs who have never won a first prize nor a Winners ribbon; Canadian-bred, dogs born in Canada; Bred by Exhibitor, dogs who have never won six first prizes in this class, champions excluded; Open, all dogs, including champions.

It is possible for one dog to be entered in several classes. Champions can be shown only in the Puppy, Canadian-bred and Open classes.

In each of the six regular classes the judge awards ribbons for first, second, third and fourth prizes. First and second prize winners are eligible to compete further according to this schedule:

Winners dog: first prize winners out of the six classes for males compete for Winners Dog.

Reserve Winners Dog: second prize winner in the class in which Winners Dog was entered competes with the first prize winners of the other five classes for Reserve Winners Dog.

Winners Bitch and Reserve Winners Bitch: the same procedure is repeated in judging the females to select the Winners Bitch and the Reserve Winners Bitch.

Best of Winners: the Winners Dog and Winners Bitch are judged next and one is chosen Best of Winners.

Best of Breed: the Best of Winners is matched against dogs entered "For Specials Only" for the Best of Breed award. Dogs entered "For Specials Only" do not undergo judging previous to that for Best of Breed, and are also ineligible for championship points. Most of the dogs entered "For Specials Only" are usually champions. If there are no specials entered, Best of Winners automatically becomes Best of Breed.

Best of Group: the 113 recognized breeds are divided into six Groups. The Best of Breed for each breed competes for the Best of Group prize ("Best Sporting Dog", "Best Working Dog", etc.) Second, third and fourth prizes are given in each Group.

Best In Show: the six Group winners are judged for the top award, Best in Show.

The ribbons for Best in Show and Best in Group are in the form of rosettes. All winnings are symbolized by ribbons of the following colors:

Best of Breed, red, white and blue; Best of Winners, purple and gold; Special prize, green; Winners, royal purple; Reserve Winners, mauve. Regular classes (Senior Puppy, Junior Puppy, Novice, Canadian Bred, Limit, Open) blue, first prize; red, second prize; yellow, third prize; white, fourth prize.

Group awards, same as regular classes except they are rosettes instead of ribbons.

Best In Show rosette is red, white and blue.

Best of Variety awards are for American Cocker Spaniels only. These ribbons are red and white.

Some dog shows include judging for the best brace and team in show. This occurs only when the show-giving club allows for brace and team judging in every breed. A brace is two dogs (either sex or mixed) of one breed belonging to the same exhibitor. A team is four dogs (either sex or mixed) of one breed belonging to the same exhibitor.

Handling Under Fire

CERTAIN aspects of handling dogs in British show rings have come under the fire of the noted writer and judge, Macdonald Daly.

For the purpose of contrast with the accepted practices now in vogue in Canada and the United States, CKC Director J. A. H. Irving of Vancouver brings two articles by Mr. Daly in the foremost dog paper, OUR DOGS, to the attention of the editor.

Here are comments voiced by Mr. Daly in his column:

Some of the Afghan exhibitors at Birmingham, they tell me, were puzzled by the fact I threw my judging book to the ground as I studied each exhibit from the front. They were puzzled on their assumption that since the Afghan's expression is a look of "far-away, distant regard," such expression needs no near-at-hand aid.

Of course I was seeking all the time for that far-away Afghan look—that look which always reminds me of Mrs. Jellyby, the Dickens character who never appeared to see anyone any nearer than Africa!

But I threw my judging book to the ground—as I throw it when necessary for Boxers, Whippets, Labradors, Terriers, indeed for all breeds, even sometimes for Cocker—for other reasons than to see expression.

I was brought up in the school which always declared that the way to judge a dog properly was to see him "using himself"—and under that head comes the arching of the neck, the raising of the ears, the standing up on the toes which unfortunately seem so foreign to present-day standards of handling.

The old-timers would violently thrust away the hand of an exhibitor who even attempted to stroke his dog's tail upward. They would turn in their graves to see some of the present-day fashions in handling which so irritate me at practically every show I attend. Among these are:

The pulling of a Cocker Spaniel's ears over its face and down to its muzzle, where they are held with a clenched hand, evidently in an attempt to impress the judge with the length of the neck.

The kneading of Boxers' ears into an odd half-upright position, apparently an attempt to let the judge see what they would look like if they were cropped.

The hand-over-muzzle, hand-under-belly position which is now apparently accepted for the Whippet and the Greyhound.

These and other "conventions," even including the placing of small breed exhibits on a table to judge them, tend more and more to a situation where exhibitors are trying to make all dogs look the same—because it is astonish-

ing how "levelling" is the influence of "table-top" judging.

Observe three good dogs of almost equal merit, ranged in line, strung up on tight leads in identical positions by their owners. The differences between them may not appear to be so very great.

But make the owners loosen the lead, toss your judging book to the ground to wake the dogs one by one from the apathy which, heaven knows, a succession of dog shows makes excusable. See the exhibits in alert and natural position—and ten times out of ten the faults and the virtues stand there revealed in nakedness or glory.

Similarly, let no one imagine that when I send, say, the top two in a class on a progression up and down the ring, it is merely to see which is the sounder. It is to fill my eye for the last time with a picture of the dogs in action, and to satisfy myself finally that earlier ideas, born of handling and of moving, are completely justified.

I admit there was once a time when I too thought it was clever to stretch a Cocker or a Pointer or a Setter with one hand clenched over his face and the other grasping his tail, ramrod-straight, with such concentration that it was hard to know which expression was the more distressed, the dog's or mine.

It was the late Herbert Hignett who taught me otherwise. "Let me see his face," he snapped. "Let me see him use his ears." And when afterwards, over a drink, I said, "But surely a Pointer isn't one of the breeds that you have to see use his ears," he said, "You've got to see all breeds use their ears."

And how right he was. Really to see a dog, really to know him, you must see him in repose, see him in action, above all see him as a whole.

So if on occasion it is ill-temperedly that I say, "Madam, I can't see that dog's face for your thumb" or brusquely that, at the second time of asking, I push away a hand that obstructs my vision, it is because in the ring I want to see nothing but DOG, and if it were possible for them to come in handlerless, what an added joy to judging that would be!

In a later issue of the paper, he wrote: "There have been several letters of 'Hear, hear,' about my recent criticism of the over-handling which is so prevalent in certain breeds.

I instanced particularly the habit of pulling a Cocker's ears over its face in apparent attempt to impress the judge with the length of its neck (even if it means the obscuring of its expression) and the singularly inelegant up-ending of the ears of a Boxer or Great Dane, in apparent attempt to impress the judge with what the dog would look like if cropped.

Gem among my letters comes from Lt.-Col. H. F. Whitehead, our outspoken and downright Caledonian friend, who first of all says, regarding his favourite breed: "We've managed, in Cairns, to get rid of tail-lifting and that business of dead mice on strings and bouncing balls, so irritating to other people's dogs." And then he talks of Boxers.

"I was at one show some time ago where an exhibitor pulled the ears up by the tips. Personally I thought that he was, as you say, trying to impersonate the cropped ones, with rather disappointing results.

"But what do you think the ringside comment was when he won? It was—

and some of the crowd were 'sure of it'—that he must be signalling to the judge to put him up!"

Winter Fair Show To Be Run Again

ONE OF THE most popular dog shows in Eastern Canada until it was discontinued in 1947, the Royal Winter Fair show, will likely be resumed this year.

This show ranked with the best in Canada during the years of its operation. Held at the Canadian National Exhibition's Coliseum building in Toronto, this benched show in November was considered a great windup to the year's dog shows.

The annual meeting of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto March 25 decided to resume a number of the old features while stressing many of its post-war innovations. A two-day, all breed event is planned and application will be made for dates.

The 1953 show opens November 13. Stewart G. Bennett of Georgetown, Ont., is the new president.

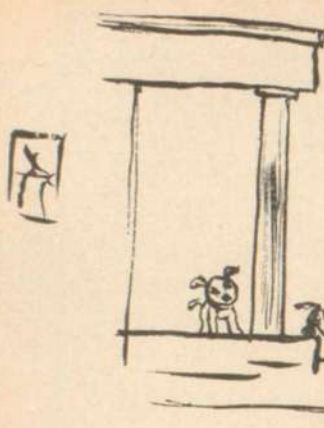
B. C. Enthusiasts Trek 3,000 Miles

Three-quarters of an hour later the 'coon was dead and three weary little dogs returned from their "walk".



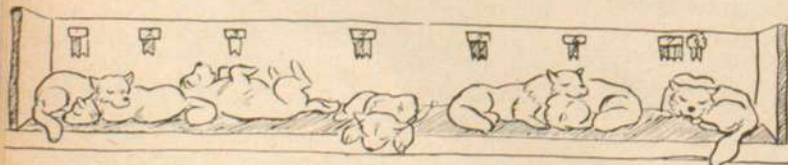
DID YOU KNOW . . .

WHAT TO EXPECT

Before Those New Pups Arrive

By EVELYN DYSON

SPRING SHOW-TIME finds most breeders with many a good bitch to show and others expecting a family. To decide the bitch should be bred and have her litter born and out of the way in time for the show season is like deciding you'd like a full moon in the old moon's phase—it isn't in your hands. Finally she comes in season and is bred.

Then to the new breeder comes the period of waiting—and wondering. He wonders if she has the right food, if she's getting enough to eat, the right kind of food, too much of this, too much or too little exercise . . .

The tendency becomes to watch her constantly, fussing and pampering until she realizes what a wonderful centre of interest she has become. If this becomes the case, she will have no hesitation in taking full advantage of the situation, and life will become a constant round of preparing tempting dishes to coax a fickle appetite, with one or other of the family crawling round on hands and knees tempting her to eat!

Provided the bitch is in good condition she will eat and enjoy plain wholesome food.

Maybe she will refuse it on occasions, but how many mothers-to-be (human ones) know only too well that feeling of utter revolt at the sight of food, and then a few hours later are ready to eat and enjoy anything edible?

The bitch has just the same feelings. When this happens, give her half a teaspoonful of pure bismuth powder and leave her for an hour or so before you try her again. If she persistently turns away, then see your veterinary without delay.

A seasoned breeder spends far more time and thought on the choice of a stud dog for his bitch than to her whims when she is carrying her litter.

Her own natural instincts will teach her far more than we can ever hope to do.

LITTLE ALTERATION

It will usually be found that the future mother will make very little alteration in her usual habits for the first few weeks. She will gallop freely and walk as far as you care to take her, but generally takes care not to become involved in any rough and tumble games with other dogs, happy to join in the noise, but keeping to the outer circle and maybe taking longer rest periods than usual.

About the third week of pregnancy worm her with a reliable vermifuge to make sure that she is deriving full benefit from the food given to her, and not utilizing it to rear a multitude of worms to pass along to her embryo family.

After the fourth week increase the proteins in her diet. A little extra meat each day, an egg, some liver—all these are beneficial, body building, but not fattening. Keep down the biscuit meal—she does not require fattening food. Cod liver oil every morning, a bit of calcium phosphate sprinkled on her food at night, and on some milk in the mornings, will help her to "deliver the goods" in sound condition.

If she is highly strung, excitable, or of nervous tendency, double the calcium phosphate. It has a very beneficial effect.

Let her take her exercise alone after the sixth week so as to avoid any possible accident which may happen if other dogs are playing around her. Discourage leaping or jumping over obstacles. Most bitches do take noticeable care, but there always are the madcaps who persist in vigorous horseplay despite their interesting condition. Let her enjoy herself by all means but within reason.

Probably, at this stage, the increasing size and weight are making it difficult for the bitch in whelp to be able to eat more than a little food at once. She will find it much easier to digest three small meals daily than one large one. It will help her too, if you divide her exercise periods, allowing time for rest in between. She will enjoy three

short walks far more than one long one.

If her family is to be born in the bed or kennel where she usually lives, very little extra preparation is necessary, but should she be having a change of accommodation, introduce her to it in plenty of time for her to have become familiar with it before the event. If she doesn't take kindly to the new environment at first, don't insist that she stays there. A short time each day, nosing around, will soon reassure her that everything is all right.

A couple of sacks, loosely filled with straw will make her a comfortable bed during the last week or so.

A guard rail, three or four inches from the floor and sides, makes certain that puppies do not get crushed if the mother settles in rather clumsily in the early days.

Let your veterinary surgeon see her about a week before the family is due to arrive, to make certain that everything is in order, and arrange for him to be on call should there be any difficulty at the time.

The average bitch gives very little anxiety. Nature has taught her what she needs to know, but, of course, there are always the odd ones who present difficulties (and some of them live with us!) If your veterinary surgeon has examined her, he will be able to set your mind at rest, or make necessary preparations if he is not satisfied.

By-Law Amendments Officially Approved

On February 16th, Ministerial approval was granted to all of the amendments for which application for Ministerial approval had been made, this approval including the few minor changes referred to.

Said amendments, therefore, became effective on February 16th, 1953.

BRITISH FLOOD

Rescues Dramatic

ALTHOUGH kennel losses from the devastating floods along England's east coast recently were comparatively slight to the amount of destruction at first anticipated, many were the stories of dramatic rescues.

While property damage from the turbulent waters ran high, especially in the vicinity of Canvey Island, scores of dogs escaped the peril. There were some heavy losses, however, such as that of Mrs. Bernard Cuthbert who lost 18 Chow Chows and her kennels on Canvey although she was rescued from her flooded home.

Others were more fortunate with their dogs like Mrs. Alexandre Coudrey at Burnham-on-Crouch, Essex, whose newly-wed son and daughter-in-law lost all their furniture. She reported:

"I opened the kitchen door and noticed a trickle of water. I ran right round through the front and my son tried to stop me, but I sent him back for a light and got into the first kennel.

"We waded about and I was up to my knees in water. My son was up to his waist.

We managed to get the last of the puppies out, and before we could close the front door we were absolutely flooded. We have got the dogs upstairs in rooms, and we are all 'pigging' in together."

The adventures of Miss D. Walsh of Oysterville, Whitstable, a Dachshund owner, were of the nightmare variety. Awakened in the small hours by the boisterous barking of her two youngest puppies, she got up to find them jumping into the icy cold water as a new sort of game.

An attempt was made to mop up the big pool, which was at first blamed on a broken pipe. But the more they mopped, the more it grew, and a glance out of the window showed a wind-

whipped lake as far as the sea-wall about a mile away.

With the assistance of another Dachshund owner, and his friends, a human chain was formed and every dog in the kennels—24 in all—was saved "without getting a paw wet." Evacuation was effected by boat and all got away safely, including Miss Walsh's mother, who was celebrating her 85th birthday.

At the time there was 18 inches of water in the bungalow, Miss Walsh said. "I saw one kennel go floating down the road, and where that ended up I don't know."

TO THE RESCUE!

One story of the recent floods along the eastern coast of England concerns an Irish Setter bitch, a good friend, a marmoset and a cat in the adjoining bungalow. The monkey and cat took refuge on a high shelf and refused to come down as the flood waters poured in.

The next day, the bitch was taken along in a boat and put through the top of a small window. She swam to the shelf and barked.

Both animals immediately jumped on her back and rode to safety.

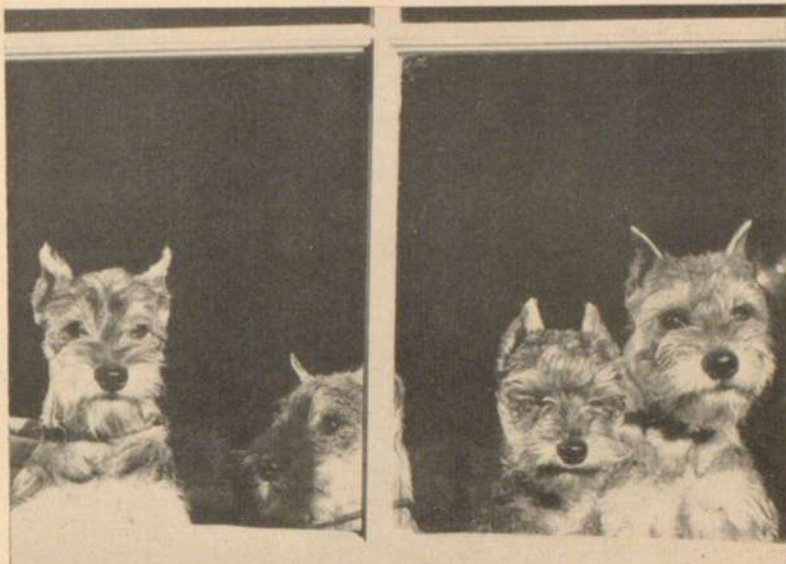

But no one has seen more of the wonderful spirit of the people of the ravaged areas than Miss Jameson, of the Bowerscroft Cocker, Benfleet, who, as Superintendent of the local St. John Ambulance Brigade had 1,000 persons through her rest centre in five days. Among the animals that accompanied them were dogs, cats, rabbits, parrots, budgies and even geese. A remarkable thing was that all the animals seemed to be on their best behavior and there were no fights.

Among the animals was a Bulldog bitch nursing a month-old litter of six puppies in the upper storey of a house. When the time came to evacuate them only five puppies could be found, and the sixth was discovered swimming at the foot of the stairs.

Now the bitch and puppies are all doing well.

But it wasn't only human beings that were being philosophical about the whole affair, as witness the pig which, on search being made of a flooded house, was found fast asleep in a double bed.

Great Dane Wins Cruft's '53 Show

A MID loud applause, Eng. Champion Elch Elder of Ouborough, a Great Dane, handled by his owner W. G. Siggers, went Best in Show this year on the second day at Cruft's—biggest dog show in the world.

The Dane was chosen over an Afghan, Eng. Champion Netheroyd Alibaba, which went Best in Show the first day of this gigantic British dog show, held in early February. Third place went to H. S. Lloyd's famed Cocker, Tracey Witch of Ware.

The Dane's victory was one of following in his mother's footsteps. She was third Best-in-Show all breeds at the first post-war Cruft's.

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Record Year Indicated

By IAN H. McINTOSH

A RECORD year in Canada for dog shows, obedience trials and field trials is forecast for 1953. A banner year is almost a certainty with indications of well over 150 shows and trials being held across the Dominion before the end of the year.

These indications are based on the fact that already there are 47 all-breed championship shows and specialties scheduled to the end of July and the fact that obedience trials are bounding ahead in popularity.

In 1952, the total benched and unbenced shows to the end of July was 41 and even in the record year of 1951, there were just 46 such shows to the end of July. And, although there were 87 benched and unbenced dog shows in that record year, there were only 21 obedience trials and 38 field trials.

Obedience trials last year had increased by 10 over 1951 and there was one more field trial. Due mainly to the outbreak of hoof and mouth disease in Saskatchewan, championship shows dropped to 77. But still there was a total of 147 shows and trials last year, one more than in 1951.

While more shows and trials are excellent signs for purebred dog activity in Canada, their increase and many more entries means much more work to record the wins. This is done by The Canadian Kennel Club's show and trials department under the direction of a longtime dog enthusiast, Alf Loveridge.

Last year this staff of three checked and recorded the wins for 15,433 dogs entered at Canadian shows and trials, as well as preparing these many thousand names for publication in the official DOGS IN CANADA. And this is only part of the work done by that department during the peak period of shows and trials across the country. Included were 14,110 registrations and 14,427 transfers also processed last year for CKC files.

That the shows and trials department will be "up to its ears" in extra work for the remainder of 1953 is almost an understatement. For the more shows and trials there are, the more checking and recording is necessary. There are 38 definite operations necessary to record a dog show, according to Mr. Loveridge.

DOGS IN CANADA, too, will be playing a part in the expected expansion. There will be more reports to handle, although the job done by the magazine staff in this connection is small in relation to the contribution made by Mr. Loveridge and his capable staff.

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Dog Heroine Wins Medal for Bravery

"TINY" holds the bronze medal and citation. But then "Tiny" deserves them for she is a three-times heroine, tested by fire.

This little Fox Terrier twice saved the life of her mistress, Mrs. Doris Roman of Toronto, and once saved Mrs. Roman's nine-year-old niece when fire threatened their lives.

"Tiny's" medal and citation came from the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and was awarded in March at the annual banquet of the Toronto Humane Society.

Three years ago the little dog saved her mistress when flames swept through her basement apartment while she was sleeping. Last November "Tiny" again came to the rescue when Mrs. Roman was overcome by smoke in another fire. Her barking brought firemen who carried Mrs. Roman to safety. Her latest deed was in Haliburton, Ont., when she rescued the young girl from a third fire, dragging her to safety.

"Tiny's" caution with flames is extended to cigarettes. Her mistress reports she carefully watches anyone smoking until they crush out the cigarette. "If a lighted cigarette is dropped, she'll wet her paw and stamp on it until it's out," says Mrs. Roman.

(d) instead of recording these corrections and deletions in his notebook, he had marked the corrections and deletions in the copy of the minutes which was to be forwarded to the solicitors in the usual way before publication;

(e) after the copy was returned from the solicitors, the minutes, less the deletions indicated by the Board or solicitors, but showing the corrections ordered by the Board, were published in the November issue of DOGS IN CANADA;

(f) on October 16th, a letter was addressed to members of the Board located outside the Province of Ontario to which was attached copy of the proceedings of October 1st as originally prepared by the Secretary, and a list of the corrections ordered by the Board on October 15th (the Secretary read letters received from Directors Mrs. Margeson, Mr. Pratt and Dr. Watson confirming that this letter dated October 16th, the minutes and the list of corrections had been received by them);

(g) he was satisfied that on October 16th, there was mailed to members of the Board present on October 15th, a list of the corrections ordered by the Board on October 15th (Mr. Monaghan, Mr. Irving and Mrs. Mack confirmed the receipt of these corrections);

(h) it was later pointed out to him that the minutes of the proceedings on October 15th did not indicate that the Board on October 15th had taken any action with regard to the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st, and he had thereupon addressed a letter to the Board on December 4th reporting the corrections and deletions ordered by the Board on October 15th;

(i) following the mailing of the letter, December 4th, the President had informed him that Mr. Monaghan had a list of the corrections which had been mailed to him (Mr. Monaghan) shortly after the Board meeting on October 15th;

(j) in his note-book there was no record of a motion to adopt, as corrected, the minutes of the proceedings on October 1st, but he was satisfied that such a motion had been adopted for the reason that it is the custom of the Board to adopt the minutes after noting any necessary corrections, and furthermore the corrected minutes would not have been published without such a motion;

(k) he accepted full responsibility for the failure of the minutes of the proceedings on October 15th failing to disclose the corrections and deletions ordered by the Board on October 15th and the motion to adopt the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st, as corrected by the Board.

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mr. Irving who stated that on his return to Vancouver following the October 15th meeting, he found a list of the corrections which the Secretary had mailed following the meeting of October 15th, that he recollected that Mr. Monaghan had requested the correction of Item No. 2380, that he thought it was Mr. Monaghan who had made the motion to approve the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st with corrections, that he knew that he had seconded such motion, and that the motion was carried without further discussion.

Mrs. McColl stated that the Board on October 15th had not ordered any corrections in connection with the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st, nor had the Board adopted the said minutes for it was her intention on October 15th to seek certain corrections with regard to the minutes of the proceedings on October 1st. Mr. Getty and Mr. Back stated that they had no recollection of the Board on October 15th correcting and adopting the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st. Mrs. McColl, Mr. Getty and Mr. Back stated that they had no recollection of having received the list of corrections which the Secretary claimed to have mailed to members of the Board on October 16th.

Mr. Monaghan stated that after the Board had concluded its discussion on proposed amendments, the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st were before the Board, but that said minutes were left over until later in the meeting, and later in

the meeting a number of corrections and deletions were ordered and a motion moved by himself, seconded by Mr. Irving, was carried adopting the minutes of October 1st as corrected.

The President stated that if the Board was not prepared to accept the Secretary's explanations, then the only conclusion that could be reached was that the Secretary had, without authority from the Board, proceeded to make corrections and deletions in the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st and had published those minutes in the November issue of DOGS IN CANADA. Mr. Back, Mrs. McColl and Mr. Getty stated that it was not their intention to question the honesty of the Secretary.

It was regularly moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mrs. Mack:

"THAT, we have confidence in our Secretary".

Mrs. McColl objected to a vote of confidence being taken.

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. MacKendrick.

ABSTAINED FROM VOTING: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Getty, Mr. Back.

The President stated that he wished to go on record as having full confidence in the Secretary-Treasurer.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, we discuss the minutes of October 1st relative to corrections and adoptions".

The President stated that he was declaring this motion out of order, feeling that it was contradictory to the previous motion. Mrs. McColl stated that the motion was not out of order.

—The meeting recessed briefly in order that the opinion of the Club's solicitors could be obtained on a point of order.

2404. Mr. Loveridge sought a ruling in connection with transfer of a dog from the Open Class to 'Specials Only'. The Board ruled that the provisions of Chapter 16, Section 9 of the Dog Show Rules must apply.

2405 (2403). The Secretary reported that the Club's solicitors had been consulted on the point of order, and informed the Board that the solicitors were of the opinion that having in mind that the point in dispute concerned what did or did not take place on October 15th in connection with the minutes of October 1st, that the question could be best resolved by dealing with the minutes of October 15th, and resolving the point in dispute. If, in making any necessary corrections in the minutes of the proceedings of October 15th, said corrections indicated that the minutes of the proceedings on October 1st had previously been corrected and adopted, then it would not be necessary to deal with the minutes of October 1st. If, however, in dealing with the minutes of October 15th, nothing was done to indicate that minutes of the proceedings of October 1st had been previously reviewed, corrected and adopted, then it would be the logical step to proceed to deal with said minutes. The Board proceeded to deal with the minutes of the proceedings of October 15th.

In connection with Item No. 2388, Mr. Monaghan stated that inasmuch as he had been named in the motion referring to that item, he had abstained from voting on the motion included in Item No. 2388. It was unanimously agreed that this item be corrected to show that Mr. Monaghan had abstained from voting on the resolution.

It was unanimously agreed that "Article XXVII" in the resolution set forth in Item No. 2389 be corrected to read "Article XXII".

Mr. Monaghan reiterated his previous statement to the effect that on October 15th, the Board had corrected the minutes of the proceedings of October 1st, had ordered a number of deletions, and had adopted the motion adopting the minutes as corrected.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mrs. Mack:

"THAT, the minutes of the proceedings of the meeting of the Board on October 15th be appropriately corrected to include the following corrections:

1. Item No. 2352—section numbered No. 3—delete words "staged by the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association, and the winner of this stake was known", and insert "staged by the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association and it was desired that the winner of this stake be known";

2. Item No. 2353 (page 7)—delete paragraph commencing "Mr. Monaghan then suggested that the Board consider . . ." and insert the following: "Mr. Monaghan then suggested that the Board consider the advisability of consulting the membership at large, through the next referendum ballot, on whether the Club would adopt the one-generation certificate or the two-generation certificate";

3. Item No. 2353 (page 7)—amend resolution by adding the words "with a view to determining whether the members wish a one or two generation certificate" to follow the words "on this subject be placed on the next referendum ballot";

4. Item No. 2365 (page 13)—delete the words "copy of the solicitors' opinion" and insert "synopsis of the solicitors' opinion";

5. Item No. 2380 (page 20)—delete paragraph reading "The matter was held over pending receipt of the Committee's report" and add the following to the first paragraph on this page: "The Board approved the recommendation"; and the motion, which was adopted, moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Irving "that the minutes of October 1st, as corrected, be adopted".

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mr. MacKendrick.

AGAINST THE MOTION: Mr. Back, Mr. Getty and Mrs. McColl.

The President cast an affirmative vote to break the tie.

Motion carried.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, the minutes of October 15th, as corrected, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mr. MacKendrick.

AGAINST THE MOTION: Mr. Getty, Mrs. McColl, Mr. Back.

The President cast a vote for the motion.

Motion carried.

When the annual meeting of the Board of Directors reconvened following the Annual General Meeting, the Board, by resolution unanimously adopted, approved the conducting of a special referendum ballot as indicated by the above-stated resolution, the Club's solicitors to be consulted as to procedure.

Ministerial approval was granted to the new Article XXXVIII of the Club's By-laws on February 16th, and since that time action has been taken, as advised by the Club's solicitors, to formally authorize the conducting of a special referendum ballot.

Also, with an imported dog, the increasing schedule of fees shall take effect from the date upon which it becomes possible to make registration in Canada, without respect to the actual age of the dog, and the fees so charged will be according to Club status of the new owner.

The above schedule of fees is the same as in effect at present, except for the changes indicated in the resolution adopted at the Annual General Meeting — See previous Page.

The special referendum ballot will be mailed after the expiration of thirty days following the mailing of this notice, and said ballot will be accompanied by the financial information referred to in the concluding part of the resolution unanimously approved by the members attending and voting at the Annual General Meeting. With regard to special referendum ballots the Club's By-laws state "All ordinary members in good standing as at the date of the mailing of the referendum ballots shall be entitled to vote."

2407 (2393-2373). Mr. Monaghan referred to the Board's decision at a previous meeting when it was decided that all remittances in payment of advertising, registrations, etc., must be payable in Canadian funds, and stated that he had been approached with a view to the Board reconsidering its decision in this connection. After a brief discussion, no action was taken.

2410 (2353). The Secretary reported that in accordance with the Board's direction (Item No. 2353) a questionnaire had been included in the current referendum ballot on the matter of standard certificates, and that a draft copy of the message preceding the questionnaire had been forwarded to all members of the Board, for any suggestions as to desirable changes, before the ballots were printed.

The Secretary reported that with a letter dated November 5th the Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records had forwarded samples of the style of applications (litter and individual dogs) for use with I.B.M. punch card system, and also a draft of the standard certificate of registration produced by this method. These draft samples were examined by the Board.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that further action on this subject could not be taken until the results of the questionnaire are known to the Board. The matter was ordered referred to the incoming Board of Directors.

2421 (2365). The Secretary reported that no communication or report had been received from the committee since the convenor of the committee had been supplied with a synopsis of the solicitors' opinion on the matter of benefit shows.

The matter was ordered referred to the next annual general meeting.

2422. COMMITTEE ON TERM OF OFFICE (BOARD).

2422 (2366). The Secretary reported that a report had not been received from the committee.

The matter was ordered referred to the next annual general meeting.

2424 (2331). Following discussion it was agreed that this matter be left over to the annual meeting of the Board when the Saskatchewan Director would be present and could personally report on the several points raised in the communication.

2426. The Board confirmed arrangements in connection with the counting of votes in connection with the referendum ballot.

2428. The Board approved notice to be published in the January issue of DOGS IN CANADA calling the annual general meeting.

2429. The Secretary presented lists of expenditures for the months of September, October, November and December. Mrs. McColl stated her objection to the printing of the "Repeat of The Committee on the Approval of Judges (Procedure)". The expenditures were approved on motion proposed by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Back (supported by Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Mack, with Mrs. McColl and Mr. Getty voting against the motion).

Resolutions were passed authorizing change of location of the Club's safety deposit box.

The Secretary reported that mail ballot had been taken regarding an increase in the salary of a member of the staff (stenographer) and the following members of the Board had approved the increase: Mr. Williams, Mr. Irving, Mr. Back, Mrs. Kerr, Mr. Pratt, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. Biggar, Mr. MacKendrick, Mrs. Mack and the President.

The Secretary sought an instruction with regard to the inclusion, in the annual statements, of separate statements for the "subsidiary departments". It was agreed that such statements should include all known items of revenue and expenditure and such other accounts were reasonably accurate figures are available.

After considering an objection submitted by Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Mittag (HILMAR) to A. L. Hill's application for HILMAR, the Board approved Mr. Hill's alternative selection of Mark Hill.

2435. The following members of the Board approved a motion to prohibit the approval of stud services as prizes in premium lists: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Irving, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. MacKendrick, Mrs. Margeson, Mr. Pratt, Mrs. Kerr, Mrs. Mack, and Mr. Back. Motion ordered included in book of standing resolutions.

Request of Cornwall Kennel Club to hold fourth sanction show not approved until that club holds a championship show.

Letter from Hull & District Kennel Club with regard to rule re suitable ground covering for judging rings at outdoor shows (Chapter 20, Section 18) read. Agreed that any members dissatisfied with present rule could submit proposed amendment to be voted on in regular way.

2436. Letter from Director Mrs. Mack re Tuttle Crates read. Drafting of suitable letter to TCA on this subject left in hands of Director Irving and Secretary.

2438. Report of Committee (Mrs. Pamela Mack, Miss Dorothy M. Budge, Alan A. Sharp and Frank Mingle) on approval of judges (procedure) for obedience trials received and referred to incoming Board of Directors.

2439. Letter from Cape Breton Kennel Club dated October 15th read. A motion was adopted to the effect that the matters referred to in the communication do not appear to come within jurisdiction of the Club (For the motion: Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. Getty, Mr. Back, Mr. MacKendrick; Against the motion: Mrs. McColl).

2441. Matter of overdue accounts referred to incoming Board.

5. The Executive Publisher reported on the arrangements made for newsstand distribution and for the return of unsold copies, which copies are to be used to send to former members and others.

6. Since there will be upwards of 700 un-renewed members for the year 1951, it was also agreed that the returned copies, as far as they will go, be mailed to them.

Following a brief discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, the report be received."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Mack, and Mr. MacKendrick.

AGAINST: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Back and Mr. Getty.

The President voted in favour of the motion. Motion carried.

2443. The meeting adjourned at 8.15 p.m.

## Many Insect Pests Scourge of Spring

SPRING is a gentle reminder that the show season is here once again. It is also a very ungentle reminder that fleas, lice, ticks and chiggers are ready and eager to make your dog's life miserable. The bites of these creatures are not nearly as dangerous as their after effects and the continual scratching they produce.

Ticks are particularly dangerous and can ruin the vitality of good dogs, to say nothing of nearly driving them crazy with itch and that crawly feeling. Daily brushing with a good brush, a firm hand and lots of elbow grease can help cut down on ticks and other vermin. But the brushing must get right to the skin and must be daily and vigorous to be effective.

Ticks can be removed from the dog's coat by pressing them to the skin to make sure you have the head. Then pluck them out. Ticks left in the coat cause trouble.

There are several good commercial products to use against ticks and the use of dips is also good. However, when using dips (weekly please) make sure the eyes and ears are carefully protected.

For all types of vermin commercial powders and lotions can be purchased. Veterinarians can recommend other treatments. It is best to remember that all preparations used to fight vermin must be gotten right down to the skin or they are useless. Daily application and allowance for the preparations to work must be given. At least a week should be allowed for good results.

There are other skin ailments that come to light in the spring. Here, too, a veterinarian's services can be invaluable. A recommended skin lotion or salve should be applied at least daily and rubbed gently, but well, into the skin. Skin diseases are often stubborn and take weeks to clear away. Patience is of utmost importance in such cases.
