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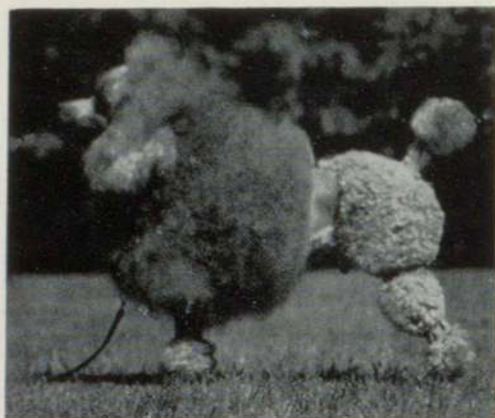

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Must Encourage New Exhibitors

TWO indictments of the harmful actions of some exhibitors at dog shows on the United States west coast and pointed up by breed columnists in the KENNEL REVIEW are forwarded to DOGS IN CANADA for publication by a prominent Canadian breeder-exhibitor. He feels the remarks are "very, very timely" and the editors whose constant objective is to promote the growth of bigger and better dogs shows in Canada agree that similar conditions here would only destroy the achievements of years of toil and tears.

With the old axiom in mind—an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure—DOGS IN CANADA reprints these like commentaries.

The first item is by the Poodle contributor Miss Violet Boucher:

"We notice of late, especially among the Toy fanciers (not only Poodles), the constant cry of protest whenever a decision goes against them. Oddly

enough nothing comes of it, and the reasons are without foundation. The only accomplishment is all around ill will.

"This ridiculous bickering is fast discouraging present exhibitors and certainly not encouraging new ones. Could it be that these people are deliberately trying to discourage competition? Under these conditions there are many much more pleasant ways to spend a Sunday than at a dog show."

The other item is by the Dalmatian columnist:

"Entries on the West Coast have been on the wane and I cannot help but state that this condition is the fault of the exhibitors and their pettiness. It is my opinion alone but I believe they will continue to fall until the exhibitors themselves awaken to the fact they are doing irreparable harm to the breed.

"Malicious gossip, petty jealousies, ringside judging of other's dogs and casting stones at their competitors in the ring, are doing more to destroy and discredit our fine breed than any other factor. Dog shows would be a lot more fun if such conditions did not exist, but I suppose it is hard to change human nature. The absence of comradeship among the exhibitors and the utter lack of trying to promote the breed—instead of the individual dog is much too prevalent.

"The malicious tongue wagers, I have found in several years of exhibiting, are those few who cannot stand defeat. A drop of water on a stone soon wears a cleft and by the same token continual wrangling on the bench among the exhibitors causes such a breach that it becomes impossible to maintain harmony."

Morris and Essex Cancelled for '54

CANADIAN exhibitors who look upon the yearly safari to Morris and Essex at Madison, N.J., as an annual "big event" will have to look elsewhere in 1954.

TURNED DOWN

Morris and Essex officials have announced the great exhibitors' show will not be held next year. Cancellation followed the club's failure to obtain the American Kennel Club's sanction of its requested date.

According to a press release, Morris and Essex requested the 1954 show be held on the fourth Saturday in May. The AKC, it was reported, took the stand that the last Saturday in May was the date reserved each year for the show and refused to allow the change.

It was explained that the fifth Saturday in 1954 would fall on Memorial Day and that the show would run into increased police protection and traffic problems. About 100 special officers which are employed for security reasons would be tied up elsewhere because of the holiday.

John C. Neff, executive vice-president of the AKC, explained that Morris and Essex was being treated no differently than 642 other show-giving clubs in the U.S. He said that the request for the fourth Saturday was based on a letter written in 1948 to Morris and Essex by an AKC official but failed to reckon with the fact that due to the Gregorian calendar's characteristics there would be two years "when the club's corresponding date" would fall on the fifth Saturday—1954 and 1955.

"The Morris and Essex Kennel Club has expected and demanded compliance with the unauthorized and well-intentioned letter of 1948. It knows that approval will be granted to it for any 1954 date which it may request and which does not conflict with the interests of another club within 200 miles," said Mr. Neff.

But the AKC Board of Directors took the stand, said Mr. Neff, that it "must disavow the 1948 letter and that it cannot and will not operate on the basis of a favor."

Leading the Best in Show parade in Canada this year is the outstanding Kerry Blue Terrier, Can. and Am. Champion Miss Show Off of Congewaugh, owned by Mrs. M. Eileen McEachren of Tailteann Kennels, R.R. 1, Todmorden, Ontario, about 12 miles north-east of Toronto.

Of her 20 Best in Shows both in Canada and the United States, eight have been awarded in the Dominion alone in 1953. Nine BIS awards in the U.S. were topped recently by Miss Show Off's great win over more than 2,050 dogs at the Westchester K.C. show at Rye, N.Y. Another great win was at the big Detroit show earlier this year.

Undeclared in her breed — 20 Best of Breed in 20 times shown — in Canada, she has won the Terrier Group 19 times. Prior to 1953, she had three BIS in Canada and her record includes four Reserve Best in Show. Her Canadian title was finished in four shows and the American Ch. — where she was shown as a puppy — in six shows.

Another outstanding American victory came when Miss Show Off went Best of Breed at the great Morris and Essex event.

The Tailteann Best in Show record exceeds the 80 mark in less than seven years. And with the fine Kerrys being bred at the beautiful and elaborate Tailteann Kennels, the number is steadily growing. Already this home of several international champions is producing progeny which are winning sensationally both in the U.S. and Canada.

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Missing the (Show) Boat?

(The following article which points out the benefits of clever promotion among the public to boost attendance and fill the coffers of the show-giving clubs is reprinted with credits to PURE-BRED DOGS, The American Kennel Club Gazette.—ED.)

A NOTICE from a show-giving club the other day said that all that is necessary to make a dog show an outstanding success, was the site, officials, competition, and prizes. They failed to mention one requirement for a successful show of any kind—the spectators.

Unfortunately, this is not unusual in the dog fraternity. They collect trophies, select the judges and stewards, send out the premium lists, and consider the job complete. If they get an entry, the show is a success. And perhaps it is, from their standpoint, if the exhibitor foots the bill, as he usually does, even though he has played to an empty house.

This is perhaps a natural result of the arrangement for promoting dog shows, but it fails to realize the possibilities for the exhibitors, and for pure-bred dogs generally, if the public is urged to attend and to learn about what a purebred dog is and what it can mean to them.

To "show" anything pre-supposes an audience to show it to. It is all well enough to compete for prizes at a dog show, but if there is no audience it becomes mere competition.

What is it gives the larger shows their prestige? Is it merely that they have large entries? No, because other shows often have larger entries in particular breeds. The real reason is the tremendous crowd of spectators, and the glamour that goes with them.

Why, then, do not other shows give more emphasis to sales of tickets, programs to encourage audience attendance, and "box office appeal?"

Probably the principal reason is that so few show-giving clubs recognize the need for professional assistance at this point in their shows. Superintending, in the dog show business, usually includes only the management of the actor end of the show—it commonly has nothing to do with the public's participation.

The dog show is no novelty in its conception. Carnivals, antique shows, home shows, auto shows, flower shows, circuses—all contend for the attention of the public in

greater or less degree, and the exhibitors are often quite as much competing among themselves as the exhibitors in a dog show.

There is this difference, however. The other shows usually have some organization or group behind them, solely or principally interested in the "gate." It may be the show superintending organization itself, or the show may have a sponsoring group, as a church, fire department, etc., but it usually has someone whose chief interest lies in how many of its group or of the public can be urged to attend, and how well they are entertained after they get there.

How unlike this is the usual attitude toward the public in a dog show! The "WALL STREET JOURNAL," describing the operation of the National Home Show organization not long ago, for example, gave the planning of the show, the sales of floor space, and the arrangement of booths, which roughly corresponds to the mechanics of a dog show as the club usually envisions it.

But a month before the show a big scale advertising drive is aimed at the public. Billboards, radio and TV spots, and special sections of the local newspapers are loaded with ads on the show. In addition to this, local exhibitors boost the show and help encourage attendance. All during the show itself, attention is devoted to the "crowd," to see that it moves around and sees the exhibits, and to see that it is "refreshed," entertained, and gets its money's worth.

In many dog shows the visitor is forgotten once he pays his admission. He is just a nuisance from then on. Perhaps a few chairs are furnished, but no attempts are made to see that he doesn't become bored, and the show drags on interminably, with often long gaps between judging assignments. Someone without a dog to care for, or friends to talk to, finds it monotonous indeed.

Even little things like seeing that the affair gets adequate publicity after the show—for the benefit of the public that couldn't get to the show—are often neglected. Press representatives often get short shrift at dog shows.

Antique shows, carnivals, flower shows, almost all other large gatherings devote far more effort to getting out the crowd than does the average dog show. The management behind other shows actively pushes the

attendance all during the time the show is in progress, advertising, broadcasting, announcing—in short devoting full time to getting John Q. Public in to see it.

It must be admitted there is often no great inducement to a dog-show-giving club to make special efforts to get out "gate" where resulting profit, if any, inure to no individuals, and serve only to build up a treasury serving no useful purpose.

But dog shows can be made to yield decided profits, if the public interest is cultivated. A "sponsor" organization, whose interest is chiefly in the public and admissions, and whose object is a worthwhile charity is one way to encourage public participation in a local show.

A show thus sponsored may perhaps take on some of the aspect of a "charity ball," with "patrons," "boxes," full dress, and flowers, even perhaps some entertainment not strictly dogs, but as a device to get the public interested in pure-bred dogs, there is no doubt about its efficacy.

If the local sponsor is sufficiently interested, and it usually takes two or three years of experience with such a group before they realize all the possibilities of the show, there are innumerable tie-ups with the community that will bring in the public and make a dog show a truly community project. It can be pushed in schools, announcements can be made at public meetings, merchants will devote displays in their windows to the show and there are many contacts of such a group within the community that can be used to publicize the show.

CHARITY SPONSOR

Selection of a good local charity as a sponsor project is of tremendous intangible benefit. All local people, even exhibitors, have more interest if the show has a more useful purpose than to just compete for prizes. There are numbers of people and business houses that willingly subscribe to charities where they have no interest in dog shows as shows. Prominent people will participate, and attendance is better if they do. The newspapers accordingly are more interested in giving space to news items, and will report the show at more length.

There is no reason why a dog show cannot be of interest to all the people of a community, and not solely to those breeding dogs.

WANE OF LOCAL K.C.

WHAT has happened to the local kennel clubs? What has happened to those tight-knit, happy groups who used to meet once a month and compare notes, discuss mutual difficulties and arrange for dog shows? Where are all the members? Everywhere you go, east or west, the same cry rings out: "What has happened to the local kennel clubs?"

SAME PEOPLE

A quick glance at DOGS IN CANADA for the past year or two should serve to prove, if proof is necessary, that something is vitally amiss with our local kennel clubs. Month after month you find reported the same people doing all the work. This doesn't necessarily mean they are the valiant "few" who work among a large membership. On the contrary, I have found it to mean too often that they are the only members of the kennel club.

I think that this slump into which local kennel clubs have fallen is of extremely great importance to the dog fancy and to the Canadian Kennel Club. As the family is the important unit upon which our society is built today, so is the local kennel club the very foundation of the Canadian Kennel Club. Within your local kennel club is, or should be, engendered the knowledge and enthusiasm which turns a "dog lover" into a good dog fancier and a good member of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Our own local kennel club (Regina) put on a dog show not long ago. Exhibitors were kind enough to tell us it was a good show and an enjoyable show. But all the work, all the worry and all the effort was carried by a handful of people. And every single member of the club was working. You see there ARE only a handful of people in the club. We are not unique in this. I wish someone would show me a kennel club today with a good, active membership of 50 or more.

A couple of years ago we had a grand rejuvenation. We found a whole group of new members and revived a number of old members. We had a club membership of over 40. But one by one they drifted away until now we are back at the same old stand with that harried handful. Of course we can trace some of the contributory causes—for two years we had no dog show, without which any club falls by the wayside. We are often in the unfortunate position of having to hunt for a meeting place. But these are minor points. Other clubs without these two problems have yet the same declining interest and declining membership.

Are people losing interest in well-bred dogs and the clubs and organizations that sponsor them? I don't think so. Sales of well bred dogs would indicate that interest is rising not falling. Are there, perhaps, so many other organizations, service clubs, sports and entertainment offered that it is difficult to find sufficient people to spread over the whole picture and still come up with some enthusiasts for the kennel clubs?

There may be something in this angle, for many service club officials tell me they are having trouble in keeping up their active memberships. It cannot be the full answer. We have more people with good dogs today than we had years ago. We should be able to spread our larger population over a larger field of activity and still not feel the pinch in the kennel clubs.

Is it possible we are not offering enough in the kennel clubs? These are days when everything seems to come with a premium attached. Do you suppose we should be giving a premium with every active membership? No, I'm not trying to be sarcastic. I really mean this. I am not going to suggest that the "premium" consist of a new puppy or a five pound bag of dog meal. I am going to suggest that it will have to consist of help, education and shared knowledge for the novice. It will mean

a return to the fine camaraderie which used once to exist among kennel club members.

Competition in plenty, yes—but competition softened by a spirit of mutual kindness and helpfulness. If we offer new members the knowledge we had to get the hard way; if we offer them advice and counsel which we were not fortunate enough to get; if we offer them friendship and companionship within that very specialized sphere of dog fancy—do you think these things would help?

Some time ago I suggested that the Canadian Kennel Club might very well take the lead in an educational project for local kennel clubs. The idea was that CKC would supply numerous short, informative pamphlets on phases of the dog fancy for distribution to local kennel clubs which could be used as a basis for study and discussion among the members at meetings. We all know that 1952 has been a year of the most stringent economy for CKC—one which is, fortunately, paying off in increased revenue and decreased debt. But because it is an economy year, I do not feel we should press for any expenditure no matter how justifiable. This is, however, an idea to be kept in mind for the future.

FINANCES POOR

As a result of depleted membership, of lower entries at dog shows and of increased costs in every phase of club

activity, many of the local kennel clubs are in exceedingly poor financial condition. And this is one place CKC could help at no cost to itself whatsoever.

I'm talking about ribbons. Dozens of them. Hundreds of them. And all of them costing a show-giving club a small fortune. You've all watched — many have had the experience themselves — the exhibitor in the ring alone, not a competitor in sight. Next time this happens watch the show secretary's face when the judge awards the ribbons. I've seen it happen — First. Winners, Best of Breed, Best Canadian Bred and Best Canadian Bred Puppy —quite a handful. When you next see your current show secretary ask her what cost was involved in such an award.

Many of us feel that ribbons might some day be dispensed with entirely. If that seems too extreme we suggest the award of a single ribbon to dogs not actively competing in the ring with another dog. We expect someday to see the ribbon replaced with a small printed card announcing the award but until that day comes surely some relief might be given to small clubs from the terrific expense involved in getting all the ribbons presently required. We think the day has passed when exhibitors dashed home after the show and tacked up their red, yellow and white ribbons on the wall for the uninitiated to see and wonder at. The advantages

of such a change are so immediately apparent one wonders why the idea hasn't been given serious consideration sooner.

And now suppose we do all these things—we have sound educational projects at our meetings; our members are kind, courteous and helpful among their colleagues; we put on dog shows with a minimum of expense and a maximum of enjoyment and efficiency—do you think it would go some of the distance toward solving the urgent question—what has happened to the local kennel clubs?

Armor Demanded For Mau-Mau Dog

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Experimental Facts

By WILL HALEY

(Further information on the much-discussed subject of Monorchidism and Cryptorchidism is contained in the following article by Will Haley which appeared in the British paper, **OUR DOGS**. It has been drawn to **DOGS IN CANADA'S** attention by readers who believe the information sound and most worthy of republication.—ED.)

PARTLY because of my life-long interest in the study of heredity, and mainly because of my own experience gained from experiments, I have assessed the following facts, regarding cryptorchidism. I have read most of the literature on monorchids and cryptorchids, and two outstanding features emerge from it.

One is that not even the most rabid anti-monorchidist has been able to controvert the fact that if canine monorchidism had been banned in earlier years, many of the most valuable lines and families in every dog-breeding country would never have come into existence.

The second fact is that though those anti-monorchidists assert that monorchidism is hereditary, they cannot discover the method of inheritance. They admit, too, that monorchidism is only occasional—that it skips many generations and that it is not governed by the ordinary laws of heredity.

Some writers claim that cryptorchidism is also hereditary and then in the next breath they tell us that cryptorchids are sterile! The anti-monorchid and anti-cryptorchid crusade began in Germany—a country in which many livestock breeders have doted on fads and fictions—and it is mainly from there that its propagandists have endeavoured to convert the doggy world to their theories.

If those theories were valid, the dog fancy should long ago have been populated by monorchids and with cryptorchids ever increasing their numbers. There have always been monorchids and cryptorchids (the latter very, very few), but proportionately

they are no more numerous to-day than they ever were.

In its modern phase, this subject started in a breed column at the end of 1948, and the origin of the argument was that monorchids are sterile; they were therefore condemned as valueless in the reproductive sense. When, however, the crusaders discovered that monorchids are as potent sires as are dogs in which both testicles are visible, they promptly shifted their ground. They then asserted that monorchidism is hereditary, that it automatically leads to cryptorchidism and that both orchidisms should be banned from our show rings.

Boxers came prominently into the controversy in our columns and you may be interested to know that the Boxer Club of America is one of those few organizations I have just referred to. It bans cryptorchids but not mon-

orchids and its reason for this discrimination is that monorchidism is not hereditary and that cryptorchids are considered to be sterile.

By their rampagous rigmaroles, our anti-monorchid crusaders gave many potential foreign buyers the impression that monorchidism is rampant in our stock, and because of that and the hue and cry about heredity, a great number of foreign sales were cancelled. One of those crusaders proposed that all monorchids be castrated. That is a simple operation, but so also is the one which brings down the hidden testicle. If a ban were imposed and I had a monorchid that was a first-rater—as monorchids often are—I could have the dog operated on and, having seen such operation, I would defy anybody to discover that it had been a monorchid.

RESULTS OF STUDY

Here is a brief summary of my own experiments in monorchid production. There were three of them, the first and second being carried out entirely on my own. I started both with several monorchids and other stock, mostly bitches, of monorchid ancestry. I inbred and inbred, and line-bred and line-bred. I tried every sort of mating and although I learned a lot in various ways, I failed to breed even one monorchid.

The third experiment was made some years later and in company with two friends who were particularly interested in monorchids and cryptorchids. All three of us had then plenty of money and it was as well, as our experiments were carried out on a big scale, up to the tenth generation, and ultimately involving several hundred dogs. (We could not secure a cryptorchid, so I am unable to say anything about that.) We kept the most accurate record of pedigrees and matings, and especially in our determination to find the "carrier" bitch, we inbred to extreme limits. We even mixed up the breeds in our search for the hereditary factor. The result of all that expenditure and effort was—one solitary monorchid puppy (and it appeared in an early litter that was not inbred) and not one cryptorchid.

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Don't Pamper Your Pet

PSYCHIATRISTS tell us that babies need plenty of T.L.C. (Tender Loving Care) in order to become well-adjusted, tension-free individuals. Now, this tender loving care is a good thing but if overdone it can spoil many an otherwise good child, and an otherwise good dog, too.

KILL BY KINDNESS

We all have heard the saying, "killed by kindness" and unfortunately this can be true! A pampered pet, like an over-spoiled child, if not KILLED by kindness is often just alive—an eating, sleeping robot devoid of any charm or individuality.

Take the case of Judy, for instance. Judy is an American Cocker belonging to an acquaintance living in a distant city. This pup is seldom unleashed, and her exercise consists of being led to the backyard to do her duty—and that's it for the day!

Poor unhappy Judy must stay indoors if it's raining—she might get her feet wet! She must wear a long-sleeved sweater when outside in winter—she might catch cold! Judy has no bed of her own but sleeps on the end of her mistress's. It would be too bad to have her sleep in the kitchen where she would be by herself all night—"she would get so lonely."

Now, Judy is loved by all the family—she gets T.L.C. in abundance. Her meals are prepared carefully and she can only eat certain foods. Lots of things don't agree with her, "a weak stomach you know." Indeed, she is leading a dog's life—a DOG'S life and that's all!

Then we have Mimi. Mimi was a Pekingese a veterinarian friend told me about. She was the pampered

pet of a well-to-do business executive and his wife, who asked Dr. Blank to keep their "deah, deah 'little Mimi'" while they spent several months in Florida.

When they carried her into the vet's, she was a fat, bored old lady, although only two years old! Along with her came a carefully type-written formula—stating what she should eat, what she shouldn't eat, when, and how much.

After the doting owners had driven off, the first thing the doctor did was tear up the formula. He then gave Mimi a good purgative and started her on a new doggy diet—one which she had never seen. The rich menu of cookies, cake and ice-cream was out!

Mimi was taken for regular walks three times a day. Short ones at first to condition her, then longer ones and finally good runs off the leash. The Peke began to really enjoy herself for the first time in her young life! She began to look like a dog instead of a roly-poly toy.

But then, and this is the sad part, the lady and gentleman returned from their trip and were shocked when they came to pick up Mimi. "Why, the poor little thing is starving," they said. "She is so thin!" No amount of persuasion and pleading would show them they were wrong—that Mimi was now living as a dog should—that the weight she had lost was excess fat—that the "skin and bone" was really muscle.

Scottie and a Dachshund, who are almost as fat as their doting mistress. Fortunately, Patsy and Mac get a certain amount of exercise romping together, but they still are "pampered puppies." Mrs. Plump is a childless widow who gives the dogs all her motherly devotion. Either one or the other is constantly being gathered up and cuddled and take turns sleeping beside her with a pillow under their heads.

Now, we are not advocating a complete lack of care, kindness or consideration for our pets—far from it! Dogs are members of the family-circle and should be treated as such—TO A POINT. However, although we may not know it, there is a line—and a very thin one if we're not careful—between kindness and cruelty.

Some breeds were made for a rugged life and actually an indoor existence was not meant for them. For example, the Huskie often sleeps out on the snow and who could be healthier? Most large breeds can sleep outside all year provided they are protected from draughts and have a comfortable, warm bed.

Also, if you are hiking with your pet, don't be frightened if he takes a short drink from a muddy stream or puddle. If no clean water is available, the not-so-clean is better than his going thirsty, and animals don't get typhoid. In the winter, blankets are unnecessary. If your pup is kept moving so that his blood circulates, he will be warm enough.

Remember, love is important, but it should be coupled with REASONABLE care and common sense if you desire a healthy, happy companion.

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Novice Notion Nonsense Nipped

FOR each one of our millions of dogs—it is estimated that there are 22 millions in the U.S.A. and over a million in Canada—there is at least one human who can qualify as a dog expert, plus at least another person who is ready and willing to contradict any assertion the expert may make.

Between them, these two groups have cooked up a great many fallacious notions about dogs. Here are some of the most common misconceptions, with the facts about each.

Every adult dog should have bones to chew on. While it is true that a dog can digest bones, the amount of nourishment that is derived from them is practically nil, and the damage to the tooth enamel may be considerable.

A well-balanced ration will supply all the elements needed for strong teeth and healthy gums.

If you want to give a dog a bone as an occasional treat, be sure it is the kind that will not splinter. This goes double for puppies.

When a dog's nose is cold it shows he's healthy. Don't depend on this. Believe what the thermometer tells you if you suspect your dog is ailing.

A dog with a fever may often have a hot, dry nose, but he can be heading toward the grave and still have a cold nose.

Country dogs live longer than city dogs. Statistics show that the average life span of the city dog is two to three years longer than the country dog, despite the ravages of the motor-car. This is due chiefly to better care and more intelligent feeding.

All dogs have fleas. No more true than the fiction that all red-headed people have terrible tempers. With all the products that are now available for flea control on pets and their surroundings, no dog need harbour these pests.

A lump of sulphur in the drinking pan is of value to the dog's health. Since sulphur is insoluble in water, a piece of stone would be just as beneficial.

The mongrel is smarter and harder than the pure-bred. One of our most universal fallacies. If this were true, it would be reflected in market prices. While as for intelligence, how many mongrels do you find used for guiding the blind?

You can't teach an old dog new tricks. Should be corrected to read, "You can't teach an old dog-owner new tricks!"

But it is true that you can't teach a young dog much. Most obedience trainers do not want dogs under nine months of age.

A good watchdog must be big and savage. Even a six-pound Pomeranian, with his warning bark, can be a good watchdog.

The Great Dane comes from Denmark. In fact, the Great Dane was "made in Germany." So was the Boxer, despite its English-sounding name. On the other hand, the Dachshund, universally considered a typical German dog, was known long before there was a Germany.

A dog eats grass because he has worms. Incorrect. He may just like to eat grass, or he may require roughage in his diet.

The Bloodhound is the most ferocious of dogs. On the contrary, it is one of the most gentle, affable dogs on earth. The name does not mean that it is bloodthirsty, as most people think. It is derived from the old term, "blooded hound," i.e. pure-blooded.

One year of a dog's life is equivalent to seven human years. Experts no longer go for this theory. Because a dog can produce when it is one year old, whereas a seven-year-old human can't, they now figure something like this.

A year-old dog corresponds to a 16-year-old person; a two-year-old dog to a 24-year-old human; a three-year-old dog to a 30-year-old; and a four-year-old dog is considered comparable to a person of 35. After that, each succeeding year in a dog's life is equivalent to five human years.

All of which is interesting in view of the fact that the oldest dog known died not long ago at the age of twenty-six; about the same as 145 years for us humans.

When a dog froths at the mouth it is a sure sign that it has rabies. Quite false: frothing is an accompaniment of a number of dog ailments.

Dog days are days when dogs get rabies. No, no! Dogs suffer from heat just as we do, but the term "dog days" comes from ancient Egypt and meant the time of year when the appearance of the dog star, Sirius, in the sky foretold the rising of the River Nile and gave the valley people warning to move their flocks and families to higher ground.

A dog instinctively eats what is best for him. Dogs are just as silly as we are in this respect, and if left to their own devices some dogs would gorge themselves on sweets and garbage. Neither is recommended.

Dogs have an instinct for chasing cats. Not so; they do it only if they have learned it from other dogs. Countless homes have a dog and cat who are as devoted to one another as any two dogs.

Different breeds require different food. You can feed exactly the same diet to a two-pound Chihuahua or a 130-pound Irish Wolfhound. Only the Wolfhound might like a teeny bit more!

Reddish-brown dogs are untrustworthy. Plain hokey—just like saying all blondes prefer gentlemen.

A dog's diet should consist mainly of lean meat. False. Any dog that had to exist on lean meat alone would not be as well nourished as the dog who receives a balanced diet in which proteins, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins are in proper proportions. Many dogs have been raised successfully with no meat at all in their diet.

A dog's food must be appetising or he won't eat it. Appetising to whom—you or the dog? There is nothing the average dog loves better than the old, foul-smelling bone he has just dug up from the geranium bed.

Dogs need cooked vegetables in their diet. Correct, if you prepare the entire meal yourself—which is really a waste of time. There are plenty of prepared dog foods on the market these days which are as wholesome and more nourishing than anything you can cook.

Since these are perfectly balanced rations, including elements you probably never heard of, why bother steaming up that droopy celery!

"We can't have a dog. We have such beautiful rugs and things." Wrong again. The solution is, get rid of the rugs. Ever see a rug that could wag its tail and bark a hearty welcome when you come in at night?

The sum and substance of all this is that, despite the wealth of misinformation which exists on the subject, the dog is here to stay.

Since before the dawn of civilization, Man has kept dogs, and vice versa. And even though some very cock-eyed notions about the canine persist—so, thank goodness, does the dog! He'll always be what he has been so long, Man's best friend.—Condensed from "The Kiwanis Magazine."

DOG SHOW DON'TS FOR NEWCOMERS

DON'T stuff your dog for a show without giving him proper exercise to form muscle and a hard springy condition. Fat is not condition and you are only piling up future trouble for your dog with it.

Don't speak to the judge while in the ring unless he speaks to you. The judge is supposed to know his business without prompting.

Don't stand in the ring with a dog with the idea that you are on view and not the dog. The best dog requires showing but not too much; the how much and how you will learn by experience.

Don't take your eye off the judge till the awards are made. When the judge is looking your way show your dog for all he is worth.

Don't lead a dog into the ring with a heavy chain. It will be in the way most of the time. Use a leather lead that will just allow the dog to run easily alongside of you.

Don't, after a class is judged and you are feeling a little hot under the collar, worry the judge with a lot of questions as to the why and wherefore. He has no time to bother about it. Wait until his work is done then ask him his reasons for the decision

as a gentleman should do and he will answer you in the same way.

Don't make a scene in the ring, the judge gains the crowd's sympathy and you lose it.

Don't talk down the other man's dog because it beat yours. You might own that dog some day and some people have good memories.

Don't bother the superintendent with a lot of senseless questions. He is neither a walking hardware store or an encyclopedia. He provides all that is necessary and you and the dog are expected to do the rest.

Don't presume on personal friendship to pester the superintendent to allow you to take your dog out before the proper hour. It places him in an awkward position when all exhibitors should be treated alike.

Don't think you know it all. Everyone can learn something at a dog show.

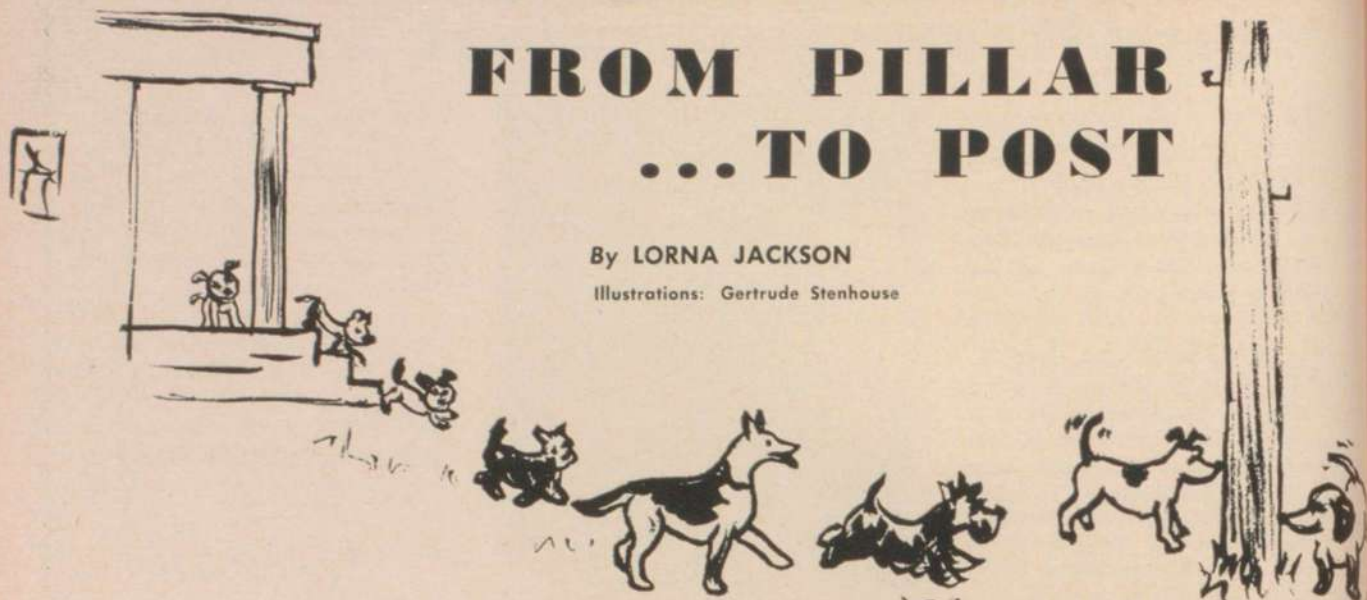
Antis's story can still not be fully told nor can his master's name be given for the two of them had to flee for their lives from somewhere behind the Iron Curtain.

Bulldog Viewed From the Front

By ALLEN H. SMITH

THE shoulders should be broad, sloping and deep, very powerful and muscular and giving the appearance of having being "tacked on" to the body.

The brisket should be capacious round and very deep from the top of the shoulders to the lowest part where it joins the chest and be well let down between the legs.

The forelegs should be stout and strong, set wide apart, thick, muscular and straight, with well developed forearms presenting a rather bowed outline, but the bones of the legs should be large and straight, not bandy or curved. They should be rather short in proportion to the hindlegs but not too short to make the back appear long. If you get the legs too short you lose that all important agility. Lowness to the ground must come from depth of the brisket and body, not from stumpy little legs.

The elbows should be low and stand well away from the ribs. The posterns should be short, straight and strong.

(I still expect Bulldogs to be able to face a bull and stand a chance.)

TORADOR BULLDOGS

A BULLDOG is not classed as a Sporting dog yet history would seem to contradict this popular belief.

The Bulldog for years was the hero of the bull fight arena where he played the role of the handsome torador in bull baiting. The bull was fastened to a stake with a tether rope about eight or nine yards long to allow sufficient liberty for the fight.

The Bulldog was then led into the ring where he instinctively "slipped" at the bull in an endeavor to seize him by the nose. Victory was proclaimed when the dog succeeded in clinging to his hold until the bull stood still.

The Well Dressed Bulldog

By TED WRIGHT

THE coat of a Bulldog requires very little care. A good brushing two or three times a week, good food and lots of free exercise will do the rest. The head, of course, does require more care. The ears should be checked and cleaned. Any signs of canker can be detected by smelling the ear. Dust well in with B.F.S. powder.

Now for the wrinkles. Wash them out well with boracic and water solution; dry, then dust with talc. Examine the teeth. A bone every other day will usually keep the teeth clean. Otherwise, clean with a solution of salt and soda.

Do not cut the whiskers except when preparing for a show as they tend to get too brittle.

The nails should be as short as possible, the shorter the better for appearance. When trimming take off a little at a time and use the proper equipment. To bring out the lustre on a dog's coat, use coconut oil and a petroleum jelly, but use very little and rub well in. On a white dog some people use chalk, but it tends to make the coat harsh. Above all, do not forget the most important is good food with the necessary vitamins and minerals—and plenty of exercise.

Do not wash too often in the winter, a good rub down with a damp cloth then dry well. In the summer bath only when necessary and make sure that the soap is well rinsed. Use good soap which will not irritate your dogs

She also came up from the classes, winning 1st Open Bitch and Winners Bitch, for the second time in three years at this Show.

The trophies were magnificent and covered every class down to 4th place. A very welcome addition to the show this year was the refreshment booth, presided over by several hard-working members, the food for which was donated by club members and netted a goodly sum for the Special Activities Committee and the Training Committee.

A dinner following the specialty was enjoyed by a large number of people.

SHEPHERD SPECIALIST

Long associated with obedience and other training has been the German Shepherd. This breed has always been comprised of true workers and during the past half century breeders have worked toward the perfection of temperament and structure so desired.

As is indicated by his name, the German Shepherd was originally a herding sheep dog, and one who was not afraid of any and all attackers.

Since that time he has become known for his police and war work, for training as a seeing-eye dog, and for guard jobs at large industrial plants.

Like many humans, the German Shepherd is often a specialist. He may attend R.C.M.P. schools where he learns to become a canine Red Coat, or learn guarding. Several of Canada's industrial and defense plants use German Shepherd guards.

His natural aptitude for training and responsiveness are important factors in his many jobs. He is a working dog and is happy when working.

After attending training school for the blind he becomes the "eyes" of a sightless human.

Like the Poodle, the German Shepherd is often thought of as one of the "obedience" breeds, one of the breeds always connected with obedience trials. Many German Shepherd breeders and owners have said their dogs really need obedience training to gain the complete maturity.

His close connection with man has enabled the German Shepherd to work well with man—as long as he is shown positively what is expected of him.

COLLIE EVOLUTION

THE BEAUTIFUL Collies appearing in modern show rings have passed through a gradual change from the smaller, broader, less luxuriously-coated shepherds who appeared in the early woodcuts of Thomas Bewick (before 1800.) The early shepherds were bred for the work they did, not to appear in the show ring. If their coloring was not perfect it did not affect their work.

Collie breeders today claim that their dogs still, with the proper training, can herd sheep and do the other jobs their ancestors handled so well. The instinct is there, the training is all that they do not have.

Working Collies today are the Border Collie (a breed very close to the original Rough Collie and not recognized by the CKC) and the Scottish Bearded Collie (closely resembling the English and Welsh sheepdogs with the exception of a long, instead of bobbed tail).

The Smooth Collie is the counterpart of his long-haired cousin with his short coat making the major difference between the two breeds.

First Collie to be chosen "top dog" at a bench show was a "pure Scotch bitch" who won in a class of five at a show in Birmingham, England in 1860.

Since then the evolution of the Collie has been gradual but continual.

Pedigrees were almost unknown for centuries due to the fact that Collies were strictly working dogs and there was no reason to know what line they were from. When they first came to wide attention they were found mainly in northern Scotland. They stood about 14 inches at the shoulder compared to the 24 inches of modern Collies.

Many early writers mention crosses with the Gordon Setter and Newfoundlander but these are mainly discounted. It is known that a Collie bitch was bred to a Gordon Setter in the development of that breed and that her black coat and plumey tail occasionally appeared down the line.

Stimulation in Collie breeding was immediate after Queen Victoria saw the breed on a visit to Balmoral Castle. Her liking for the Collie caused an upsurge in demand for them but it

was little in comparison to that later of American fanciers.

Collies were on the North American continent as early as colonial days but they drew little attention until about 1880. Since that time they have held considerable popularity.

The name Collie has many beginnings. One of the widest accepted theories is that it comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "Coll" or black meaning the black-faced sheep this breed herded. The sheep became known as "colleys" and the dogs who herded them "colley" dogs.

One argument in the question of whether or not the Rough and Smooth Collies are varieties of the same breed or distinct breeds is the belief that the immediate ancestor of the Smooth Collie is the Scottish "ban-dog," a descendant of the Mastiff or Canis Molossus which is regarded as one of the basic breeds of the world. It has been said, on the other hand, that Rough and Smooth coated Collies have been found in the same litter.

Both breeds have long drawn high prices for the best dogs in their breed. In the days of the fabulous J. Pierpont Morgan and Samuel Untermyer \$5,000 was nothing to pay for a good Collie. It is claimed that Mr. Morgan paid \$10,000 for Ch. Wishaw Clinker, a noted dog of his time.

Coat color today plays an important part in the point-winning of a Collie. The abundant coat of the Rough Collie together with clear black and white, sable and white, or black and white with tan markings makes him a stand-out in the ring.

Some American breeders have been developing a "white" Collie—one which has a white body but a colored head (to heighten good expression). This coloring is not familiar in Canada.

SHELTIE DISTINCT

LIKE THE Shetland pony, the Sheltie (Shetland Sheepdog) would lose much of its charm and grace if bred to a larger size. Recently their height at the shoulder was set down as 13 to 16 inches.

In appearance the Sheltie is much like a miniature rough Collie but the Sheltie is as much a distinct breed as the smooth Collie and Scottish bearded Collie. Undoubtedly he has as a progenitor the working Collie from whom the rough Collie was bred to his present larger size.

Tucked away among the rocky crags of the Shetland Islands, the Sheltie was kept from popular attention until after the turn of the 20th century. Royal Navy personnel stopping off at the islands often brought back one of the tiny herders as pets. This helped bring the breed to public attention.

Despite the fact the Sheltie is a working dog and is bred and raised in his homeland for the express purpose of tending sheep, he makes an excellent companion dog and fiercely guards his master's home as he would a flock of sheep.

His small size makes him ideal for city dwellers who like the structure, coloring and coat, of the rough Collie but do not have room to keep a large dog. The Sheltie's sweet disposition helps enhance his value as a pet.

In the effort to set and maintain a standard for the Sheltie, breeders have had many ups and downs. As there was no need to keep stud books or pedigrees for a shepherd dog, the islanders had no record of breedings. It was enough that their clever little dogs could handle and care for the flocks. The small size probably was a result of generations of dogs living among the rocky islands where only the sturdy survived and only the tiny and sure-footed could race after a stray sheep.

Inbreeding, and interbreeding with Collies have been tried. The Collie cross produced larger dogs, leggy ones and so on. A spaniel cross helped produce their excellent disposition but produced undesirable structural qualities.

Another cross which left its mark on the breed was with the small yellow Icelandic dogs who have smutty muzzles and prick ears.

In color Shelties are any color except solid white or brindle with the most usual colors being black, sable or merle with varying amount of white and tan.

YOUR ADVERTISING FREEDOM GUARANTEE

IN a recent edition of the Daily Mail, reference was made to the International Advertising Conference then meeting in Britain. The newspaper commentator went on to write as follows of the role of advertising in the free press.

"Advertising, like news, is the essence of the freedom of communication and exchange.

"News is the older, because it is primal. But commercial advertising is of a respectable antiquity. It is thousands of years older than newspapers and printing. In fact, it is as old as civilization.

"But it has found new life in our era—active, fast moving, dynamic as it is. The last international convention was held here in 1924, the year of the Wembley Exhibition. There is a world of difference between advertising then and in this Festival year of 1951.

"Methods and techniques have improved out of all knowledge even in a quarter-century, and so has the size and scope of this great profession.

"Today's conference will be attended by 2,600 delegates from 38 countries. They represent many thousands of gifted men and women who have been attracted to advertising by its rising standards and widening appeal.

"Modern advertising embraces nearly every human activity. It demands not merely the flair of artists and writers of the first rank, but also the meticulous accuracy of the mathematician.

"Not merely does it buy and sell, but it helps to save life, to reduce disease, to give advice, to interpret government to the people, and to serve industry, the State, finance, and the law.

"The expansion of advertising has coincided with the enormous increase in newspaper circulations. For though there are many kinds of advertisements, the art and science of advertising is particularly associated with the Press.

"It is well—because advertising enables the newspapers to serve the public, as independent organs of news and opinions. Their sales revenue would be insufficient to maintain them in their familiar form.

"Without advertisements they would either have to be sold at a prohibitive price, or they would have to die, or (which would be worse) to live as the hired creatures of some political party or dictatorship.

"The advertisement in the paper is its guarantee of freedom—from the advertiser as much as from anyone else.

"The volume of advertising is so great, and competition so keen that there is no possibility that any one of those who pay the piper shall also call the tune.

"But if any doubts on this point remain, the report of the Royal Commission on the Press should have ended them. 'We have no evidence that advertisers are able to influence the treatment of public questions in the Press'."

What is a Show?

(The following article was written for **DOGS IN CANADA** by the Show Chairman of the Bulldog Club of Central Canada, Mr. H. Ince. His ideas for improvements of dog shows are contained therein.—ED.)

WHAT is a show? Webster's dictionary defines the word "show" as "an exhibition, a spectacle, proud display or parade" to which we add the words "of dogs".

There are two types of dog shows—namely **SANCTION** and **POINT**. Primarily, Sanction Shows are held so that the exhibitor may complete the training of, shall we say, a future champion, and secondly to raise funds for the show-giving clubs, and last but not least as a social get-together.

It is from Point shows, however, that the title of "champion" may come to be added to the registered name of a particular dog. This is the significant difference between Sanction and Point shows.

Point show dogs are usually benched for about 12 hours, giving the exhibitor an excellent opportunity of meeting the public, people who may just be admiring your dog but may possibly resolve into future clients. Bearing this in mind the exhibitor should endeavor at all times to keep the bench attractive, to be courteous to spectators whether their interest is superficial or intense, with

due regard for all the well known business principle—the customer is always right!

Show-giving clubs have a great responsibility to both the public and the exhibitor. It is their duty to see that the show is well managed and attractive to prospective exhibitors, and that the exhibitors will prove well satisfied with the entire program.

But do not forget the public, they should be the most important part of the show, for without spectators the whole intent and purpose would be lost.

A few suggestions on my interpretation of a successful show are:

(a) All rules must be strictly enforced, both those laid down by the Canadian Kennel Club and those of the show-giving club—with special reference to the late arrivals, and the non-benching of dogs.

It should not be necessary for the spectator to have to look in corners, under the table or in boxes for a particular dog entered in the catalogue, but not on the bench and not declared absent.

(b) The spectator must be kept informed as to which class is being judged. This can be done either by signs or public address, provided the latter is adequately handled by an experienced person. In this way the spectator who may not be completely

familiar with the intricacies of dog shows, is kept informed of the whole procedure.

(c) Speed up the judging; start on time; have the next class ready in an adjoining room with a strict time limit for lateness, and no exceptions.

(d) Ensure better exercise rings with an attendant there at all times whose responsibility it will be to see that they are kept scrupulously clean.

(e) Arrange a suitable place for grooming, with a full-time attendant to be responsible for its appearance and who would report to the show superintendent any, and all, infractions of rules, such as crating of dogs without written permission from the superintendent.

(f) Good washroom facilities are essential.

(g) Encourage the exhibitor by some method such as awards, to make and keep attractive benches.

(h) Refreshments are a necessity.

The net result would be better and more attractive shows, larger entries and gates, and last but not least, larger revenues.

With regard to the recreational and social values of shows which are of paramount importance to many exhibitors since many long and lasting friendships have been made whilst exhibiting dogs. These can be given a fuller and more sincere interpretation if a little more effort and good sportsmanship prevailed amongst the participants.

A spirit of co-operation, a common aim and the desire for progress are the factors which will help create a better era.
