DIANA IS GONE

By JACK BAIRD

WHAT to do. . . My veterinarian, Dr. Frank Pallotti who loved Diana, said it was hopeless, and described the exact condition. From experience with my old man Boxer, I knew he told the truth. "Make up your mind and let me know," he said. I knew what the decision should be, but you just don't order the destruction of one you love—of one that has meant so much to you.

"Yes, I'll let you know." I came away from the phone with kaleidoscopic pictures flashing through my mind and a pain thru my heart. I had fought cancer for 20 years and always there was a chance for me. What right had I, with the human breaks to prolong the life of the sweetest thing that had ever touched my life, when there was no hope?"

Was I a God that could will life and death? Had I a right to say let her live on, when I hadn't a God's power to cure her? Could the maybe foolish little thought in my mind prevail—that as long as Diana lived, I'd be all right? Maybe it was an omen—but better Diana out of her suffering and I take my chances alone. The pictures flashed back thru my mind and the pain thru my heart as I decided upon the merciful thing. Late that night I wrote the doctor authorization to put Diana into her last sleep.

There was no sleep for me that night, as scenes came back to me—but in the morning I mailed my letter and went on to New York for a new check on my cancer. Was it an omen? That day for the first time in 11 years I failed to get a year off and was ordered back in 15 days for another operation. The great grey dog is gone—now will the big greying man go down the trail, too?

In a sense it doesn't matter, for much of the heart has gone from me. . . . Again the sequence of pictures flash thru my mind—Picture one—early March 1941, and Margo Horn says, "Take your pick for what you have done to help the breed become known." The gorgeous grey pup came to me and we were one. "She is mine," I said, and away we went to travel for five days, before starting for home, with Diana a sensation, far more than the Weimaraners of today can be. She was a crowd stopper, whether at a cross road or on Fifth Avenue, and it was she, at four months of age, that sold the

AKC on the worth of the breed. That was salesmanship and adaptability. . . .

Picture two—we arrived home and there is wood to pile and the pup is under foot so I toss sticks to get her away. Gradually I sense that perhaps I not only have a retriever, but a tracker. I work bit by bit and by seven months of age she can track anything for better than two miles. . . .

Picture three—she sensationally finishes her title under Hal Correll's expert handling, and her pose of that day is today's model of what every Weimaraner should be—not just sheer beauty—but character showing thru. She was kindly and gentle and loved all who loved or liked me, and we reciprocated.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

THIS is the story which won the Dog Writers' Award as the best magazine human interest feature for 1952, and its author has perhaps one of the finest human interest life stories of any person in the dog fancy. Jack Baird has lived with death hovering in the background for many years, his first brush with the inevitable end came in 1937 when cancer of the neck stopped his activities for awhile. His life since then has been most precarious, in hospital most of the time and at the time of writing he is faced with the threat of amputation of both legs.

Briefly his record of achievement is as follows: President of the Dog Writers' Association four years, kennel editor of the Hartford Courant, 1937-1940, then kennel editor of the Hartford Times, which together as kennel editor of the New York World-Telegram, he continues to date. Won the Gaines Award as Dog Dom's Man of the Year, the highest honour in the United States. Founded Obedience Trial Clubs, and has judged them both in Canada and the U.S.A. Used his writing ability to help save the dog food industry, shows and trials during World War II. and was cited for his work in Washington for this cause.

While all who love him will worry as he faces another ordeal, he probably will bounce back again as always the "Indestructible Baird", ready and willing to help others whom he considers are not so fortunate as himself.

Picture four—the big greying man has been in an auto accident, suffering a head injury. Domestic pressure forces him on an errand before he has recuperated. . . . he collapses over a strong current and is wedged between a rock and a hummock. The cold water revives him with a laughing thought—"what a heck of a way to die—conscious but unable to get out." A tug is felt on the mackinaw of the 200-lb. man and the 78-lb. Diana pulls until she raises him high enough to free his arms. For this she's awarded a hero certificate, thanks to Brother Judy. . . .

Picture five—a then scrawny midget came out to see the dogs and to pick up material to help with the Obedience trials at Belmont Park. The woman-shy Diana took the small one to her heart a once—and I consequently lost mine. . . . That's how I have Midget as my wife. Diana, after having saved my physical life, proceeded to save my sanity thru Midget—after a first marital nightmare.

Picture six—the sight of Diana and her various litters, her mothering of them and all things small—her way of shuffling her feet when walking thru the chicken yard lest some little chick be hurt. . . . The vision of her leaping a six-foot fence with a five-pound pan of food the night before her first and greatest litter was whelped. . . .

Picture seven—a night during the war years. . . . Diana and I are weary from doing a stint of road patrol to thwart small livestock thieves. . . . It's three a.m. and I pour a drink and prepare for bed. Suddenly Diana is alerted and I know something is wrong outside. Grabbing gun and flashlight I follow her down the country road ¼ mile in time to drive off three men in a small truck, ready to deplete a neighbor's stock pen. How could she sense trouble 440 yards away? No one knows but that it was uncanniness of a great dog that some folks said could read minds. . . . These are the pictures that race thru my mind—and will ever continue to race. . . . And so I prepare to meet the surgeon again—determined to whip the odds once more in memory of Diana—so that when the great grey dog looks down from her corner on a big pink cloud she will be proud of the man whose life she once saved. . . . Diana is gone in the physical sense, but her spirit will be with us always. May God make me eventually worthy of having shared 10 years with so great a personality—my Diana.

Record Number of Shows in 1953

THE total number of championship shows held under C.K.C. rules in 1953 set an all-time record of 90, this total including 81 shows open to all recognized breeds, seven single breed specialty shows (for German Shepherd Dogs (2), Boxers, Beagles, Scottish Terriers, Doberman Pinschers, and Boston Terriers), one two-breed specialty show (for American and English Cocker Spaniels), and one single Group specialty show (for all Terriers).

For purposes of comparison, the table shown below indicates, by provinces, the number of shows held in the last four calendar years. Of interest, too, would be a comparison with 1938, the last complete calendar year before before World War II, although it should be noted that in 1938 the C.K.C. celebrated its 50th anniversary and show-giving activity in that year reached a then all-time high.

While there are now more organizations staging championship shows than in 1938, another contributing factor to the increase is the practice of many clubs in staging two or more shows during the year. This is borne out by the fact that while 42 different organizations sponsored the 52 shows held in 1938, 62 different organizations sponsored the 90 shows held in 1953.

The number of cities and towns which saw one or more championship shows staged within its boundaries or immediate environs totalled 34. Fifteen shows were held in metropolitan Toronto, but this total was very nearly equalled by Vancouver where 14 shows were held. Nova Scotia was unique in that not more than one show was held at any of the five points where shows stimulated local interest in pure-bred dogs.

The following is a list of places at which one or more championship shows were held in 1953 (number in brackets indicates number of shows held at that point if more than one):

ALBERTA: Calgary (4), Edmonton (4).
BRITISH COLUMBIA: Vancouver (14), Victoria (7), Esquimalt (2).

MANITOBA: Winnipeg (6).

NEW BRUNSWICK: Fredericton (2), Moncton.

NOVA SCOTIA: Halifax, Truro, Sydney, New Glasgow, Lunenburg.

ONTARIO: Toronto (15), Ottawa (4), London (2), Fort William (2), Windsor (2), Chatham, Sarnia, Barrie, Guelph, Richmond Hill, Brooklin, Streetsville, Burlington, Oakville, Cobourg, Kingston.

QUEBEC: Montreal, Hull.

SASKATCHEWAN: Regina (3), Moose Jaw (2), Saskatoon (2).

Two championship shows were held in conjunction with the Canadian National Sportsman's Show at Toronto, three in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto, two in conjunction with the Pacific National Exhibition at Vancouver, two in conjunction with the Lakehead Exhibition at Fort William, and one in conjunction

with the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto.

May was by far the most popular month for show-giving activity, there being 23 shows held in that month. Shows held in other months were as follows: March, 5; April, 6; June, 6; July, 13; August, 9; September, 14; October, 11; November, 3.

On one day, July 25th, all-breed championship shows were being staged simultaneously at Lunenburg, N.S., Toronto, and Vancouver. On 20 of the 31 days in May there was championship show activity in at least one point in Canada. As will have been noted, there was no championship activity in January, February and December, and of the remaining 275 days in 1953, one or more championship shows were taking place on 78 days.

The Canadian National Sportsmen's dog show on March 20th and 21st (the second of two two-day dog shows) boasted the largest entry of dogs, with a total of 762 dogs entered. Many breed specialty clubs considered breed classes at this show as their respective breed specialties, and this no doubt was a major factor in this record entry.

With regard to shows in the other provinces, statistics furnished by the Show Records Dept. indicate that the following shows had the highest number of dogs entered at shows within the provinces named:

Alberta: Alberta Kennel Club show at Calgary on May 4th—137 dogs.

British Columbia: Kiwanis Club of Kerrisdale show at Vancouver on April 25th—238 dogs.

Manitoba: Coronation Kennel Club show at Winnipeg on August 6th—109 dogs.

New Brunswick—Moncton Kennel Club show at Moncton on September 26th—128 dogs.

Nova Scotia: Halifax Kennel Club show on July 4th—139 dogs.

Quebec: Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc. show at Montreal on April 26th—390 dogs.

Saskatchewan: Regina Kennel Club show at Regina on July 29th—81 dogs.

Of the shows held independent of an exhibition, fair or other type of show activity, the Ascot Kennel Club's show at Toronto on October 10th had the largest number of dogs entered—488 dogs.

The specialty show with the largest number of dogs entered was the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada's specialty show, held at Toronto on September 26th, at which 109 German Shepherd Dogs were entered.

The Boxer and the American Cocker Spaniel share a unique distinction in that at every one of the 82 shows at which these breeds were eligible for entry, there was at least one specimen of each breed in actual competition. At least one Smooth Dachshund was in actual competition at every one of the 81 shows at which this breed was eligible for entry. Not far behind we find the German Shepherd Dog represented in competition at 79 of 83 shows, the Collie at 77 of 81 shows, the Pomeranian at 76 of 81 shows, the Pekingese at 75 of 81 shows, the Doberman Pinscher at 75 of 82 shows, the Chihuahua at 73 of 81 shows, and the English Springer Spaniel at 72 of 81 shows.

The 95 German Shepherd Dogs in actual competition at the specialty show staged by the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada represented the greatest number of dogs of a single breed in actual competition at a single show. Next were Boxers of which breed there were 53 in actual competition at the second of the two Canadian National Sportsmen's dog shows. Other breed records were as follows: 51 American Cocker Spaniels at the Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Ontario specialty show; 48 Collies at the second Canadian National Sportsmen's dog show; 43 Beagles at the Central Ontario Beagle Club's specialty show; 37 Boston Terriers at the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto's specialty show; 32 Samoyeds

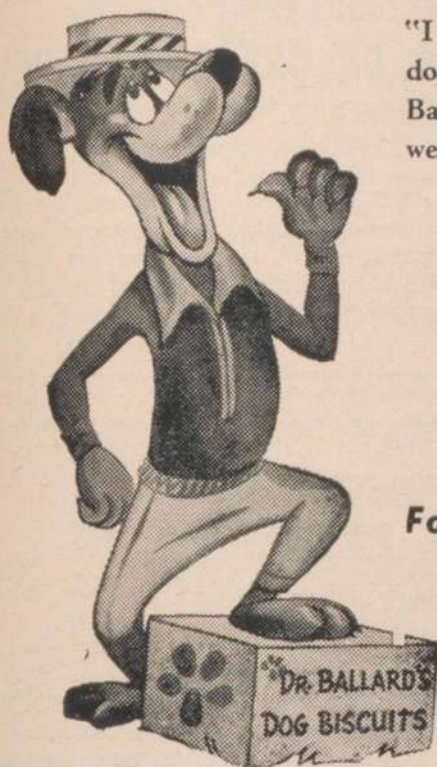

and 31 Great Danes at the second Ascot Kennel Club show; 31 Kerry Blue Terriers, 30 Cairn Terriers, 27 Irish Setters, 25 Labrador Retrievers, all at the second Canadian National Sportsmen's dog shows; 24 Bulldogs at the Barrie Kennel Club show; 23 Scottish Terriers at the Scottish Terrier Club of Canada's specialty show, and 22 West Highland White Terriers at the second Sportsmen's dog show.

As a high entry of dogs of a single breed at a single show is not necessarily indicative of the numerical extent of breed competition generally, the 1953 show records were reviewed with a view to finding the one breed having the highest cumulative total of dogs at five shows at which the breed was best represented numerically in competition. This breed was found to be the German Shepherd Dog with a cumulative total of 263 made up of five shows where 95, 48, 43, 40 and 37 German Shepherd Dogs were in actual competition.

Carrying this same line of research to all other breeds, we find the next ranking breeds to be as follows:

American Cocker Spaniels—51, 44, 28, 28, 27—Total 178.

Boxers—50, 30, 28, 28, 27—Total 163.

Collies—48, 26, 24, 24, 23—Total 145.

Great Danes—31, 29, 28, 27, 25—Total 140.

Boston Terriers—37, 25, 20, 20, 19 — Total 121.

Labrador Retrievers—25, 23, 22, 17, 15 —Total 102.

Beagles—43, 14, 14, 14, 12—Total 97.

Cairn Terriers—30, 20, 14, 13, 12—Total 89.

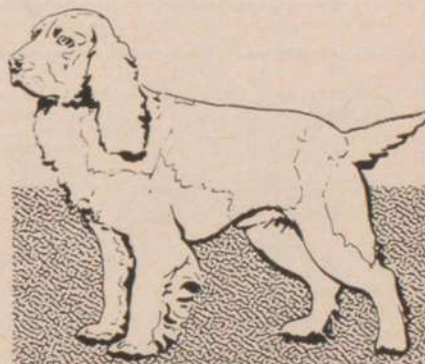
Number of breeds (by groups) represented in competition at one or more shows during the past year were as follows: Group 1—16; Group 2—18; Group 3—18; Group 4—19; Group 5—13; Group 6—9. Total—93.

A check of the breed records was made to determine in what province each breed had its greatest number in actual competition at a single show. Three breeds had the greatest number in competition at a single show, in Alberta, 13 breeds in British Columbia, 1 breed in Manitoba, 1 breed in New Brunswick, 1 breed in Nova Scotia, 71 breeds in Ontario, 14 breeds in Quebec, and 2 breeds in Saskatchewan. This totals out to more than the 93 breeds represented in competition at 1953 shows because of the fact that in some breeds two or more provinces were tied.

In closing this brief review of 1953 show activity in Canada, we should point out that all of the foregoing comments and statistics refer solely to championship events (all-breed and/or specialty) for no statistics are maintained in connection with sanction (non-championship) shows.

1953 Field Trial Activity

IF the number of field trials held under C.K.C. Rules in 1953 did not show an increase over the previous year, field trial enthusiasts would have every reason to regard the slight drop in number of licensed trials as no accurate barometer of interest in field trials and field dogs generally. The number of licensed trials dropped from 39 in 1952 to 34 in 1953 although two trials in 1953 were cancelled because of unsatisfactory weather conditions.

Licensed Retriever trials continue to lead other breeds in number of trials held, although the grand total of dogs entered at Beagle trials far surpasses that of other breeds.

Honours for the largest number of dogs entered at a single trial belong to the Beagle trial held at Forest, Ont., on August 15th to 18th inclusive by the Canadian National Beagle Club, where a grand total of 305 dogs entered in four stakes must have proved a gruelling test for the winning dogs and presiding judges alike.

Of the Beagle trials held in Nova Scotia, the Cape Breton Beagle Club's trial held at Mira, Cape Breton, on May 16th and 17th drew the largest entry—34 in number.

The English Springer Spaniel Club of Canada's annual trial for Spaniels was held at Cook's Mills, Ont., on Sept. 26th with an entry of 36 Spaniels.

The lone trial for pointing breeds was staged near Saskatoon on Sept. 5th to 11th inclusive by the Saskatchewan Field Trials Association with a total of 23 dogs entered.

The 1953 renewal of the Canadian National Championship Stake for Foxhounds was staged at Qyon, Que., by the All-Canadian Foxhunters' Association on October 30th and 31st with 39 dogs entered. Entry in this stake was restricted to the dogs which had placed in local trials staged in 1953 by organized Foxhound clubs in Ontario and Quebec. A report of this stake appeared in the December issue of "Dogs in Canada".

Eleven different clubs were responsible for the seventeen Retriever trials held in 1953, and twelve different clubs were responsible for the 14 Beagle trials held in 1953.

Vic Grainger, C.K.C. Field Trial Representative for Alberta, very kindly forwarded a report on Retriever activity in Alberta in 1953, and with his report included C. A. Lindquist's detailed report on the results of a questionnaire circulated among field trial enthusiasts in August dealing with arrangements in connection with Retriever field trials. Space limitations precludes our reporting, at this time, the results of the questionnaire, however, we are pleased to conclude this brief report on field trial activities in 1953 with Vic's comments in 1953 Retriever activity in Alberta:

"I cannot refrain from getting in a bit of bragging of the continued interest shown by owners of hunting Retrievers in Alberta as shown by the official reports published in our good informative magazine. I have been successful in persuading some of the local Secretaries to send in a report of activities of their own clubs.

"Sorry Ponoka missed the boat last June when that club had made the highest record of entries in all of Canada to that date. They did not hold the highest record very long as Calgary beat it a short time after. Calgary club officers were very proud to out do Canada's record, but this was soon shattered when The Ontario Labrador Retriever Association outnumbered Calgary's all-age entry with 31 entries against Calgary's 25 entries. However, the Alberta Field Trials Club of Calgary still tops them all in Non-Winners and other stakes with a total of 68 entries against the Ontario Labrador Retriever Association with 63. This is close but considering Alberta's population, and figure it per capita we really have something to boast about.

"The fall trials here in Alberta as usual dropped considerably on account of the shooting season. It is quite evident that our field trial dogs have been trained to be used for shooting companions, and game conservations. Many hunters prefer shooting and their dogs are tired and slowed down and not in condition for competition. Even with this handicap, Alberta easily outnumbered all entries in western Canada.

"Drumheller Fish and Game Association did not hold a spring trial but they arranged for a fall trial in a hurry which was up to the usual standard. The boys in the club are all practical hunters. Every test proved a dog's ability to hunt in a natural way which always creates a lot of interests to hunters and all spectators.

"One of our Alberta handlers, who won the Jefferies Trophy for the Retriever winning the most C.K.C. championship points in the Prairie Provinces in 1953, sold his dog to Mr. C. Brignall, owner of the winner of the Canadian National Retriever Championship and American National Championship stakes, Ch. Brignall's Gringo. This dog, a Chesapeake named F.T.Ch. Nelgard's Baron, believed to be the youngest dog to win such high honors, was trained, owned and handled by Munroe Coleman of Edmonton and sold for \$1,500.00."

Obedience Activity Increasing

STATISTICS published elsewhere on this page show an ever-increasing interest in obedience trials. What these statistics do not reveal, however, is the increasing number of obedience training classes which ultimately will prompt a still greater number of obedience trials and an increasing number of dogs in active competition.

In previous years the tendency was for obedience trials to be held in conjunction with dog shows, however, the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club, the Mountain City Obedience Club (Montreal), the Greater Victoria Dog Obedience Training Club, the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada, the Ontario County Kennel Club (Oshawa), and the Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club all held obedience trials as separate events. Their combined trials accounted for nine of the licensed trials held, the balance having been held in conjunction with championship shows, although many of the latter trials were actually promoted and supported by active obedience clubs.

Statistics furnished by our Show Records Dept. show that the obedience trials held in conjunction with the Windsor Kennel Club's championship show on April 19th boasted the greatest number of dogs entered—42 in all. This was closely followed by the Mountain City Obedience Club's trial at Montreal on May 30th with 41 dogs entered. The Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club's trial at Vancouver on November 28th drew the largest entry of dogs (35 in number) of any trial held in British Columbia last year.

Developments relating to obedience trials and training in 1953 lend credence to a belief that this branch of doggy activity is bound to appeal to an ever-expanding number of dog owners who, whether or not they place their dogs in obedience trial competition, will have reason to take pride in those dogs which have responded to proper obedience training.

We are happy to have an opportunity of rounding out this all too brief resume of 1953 obedience activity with reports received from three obedience clubs.

The Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club

THE fall activities of this Club have been the most successful yet.

In the fall classes, 72 dogs and owners have been trained, with by far the largest registration in the two large beginners' classes. The classes met on eleven Monday evenings, including registration night, movie night and "graduation" night. The progress of the owners and dogs in this short space was very great, and when the final night came, it was extremely difficult to pick three of the dogs as "the best". However, Mrs. Covernton's

standard poodle "Beau" finally came first, Mr. Simpson's German Shorthair second, and Mr. Bowness's Shepherd third.

The other major activity of the Club this fall was the sponsoring of two obedience trials on Nov. 28. These were the first trials put on in Vancouver as a separate event. To help overcome the handicap of the large distances and expensive water journeys in the North-West, it was decided to hold two completely separate trials on one day, one in the afternoon and one in the evening, with different judges, and with the lowest possible entry fees. The experiment was a great success. The entries in the trials were 35 and 33 respectively, much the largest in any B.C. Obedience trial so far, and it was gratifying to find entries coming from all the Vancouver Island Clubs and from many American points, some as far as 400 miles away. The quality of the work done by the dogs was extremely high, and the impetus thus given to obedience work in general, made the effort well worth while. A great deal of publicity was given the Trial in the press, and much more interest is now being shown in our activities by the general public. A noteworthy feature of the Trials was the almost faultless work done by both the entries of Miss Lorraine L. Jensen of Portland, Oregon. Her two beautiful white standard poodles, Am. Ch. Palmares Diacre Jan, Am. C. D. X. and Palmares Etrennes, Am. C. D. won scores of 200 and 200 in the first Trial and 199½ and 200 in the second Trial, and were very much admired by all spectators.

Several Club members won qualifying scores for their dogs at the above trials, and these qualifying scores completed their C. D. for: Mrs. Blanche Marshall's collie "Sultan", Mr. B. W. Markham's springer spaniel "Duchess", Mrs. Schaeffer's wirehaired pointing griffon "Gipsy", Mrs. C. C. Covernton's standard poodle "Beau" and Miss Judith Harker's corgi "Tess".

A great deal of credit must be given to our Trainer, Mr. Kurt Henze, for his untiring work and unfailing humour in "training us to train our dogs." The great progress of the dogs under his direction is a great tribute to him.

Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club

Notable Friends of the Newfoundland

TODAY Newfoundlands are comparatively few in numbers, the pure blacks are not common, and the beautiful black and white Landseer is seldom seen on this continent.

It was otherwise at the end of the 18th century, and through much of the 19th century, then the Newfoundland, along with the Collie and certain Hounds were eulogized in the literature of the day, and all tended to be endowed by the writers and artists with almost embarrassing nobility, while "homo-sapiens" by comparison was not at all nice.

One example of this tendency towards anthropomorphism is seen in "The Two Dogs", written in 1786 by Robert Burns. That Burns mood was sour towards his fellow men is understandable, when we realize that he wrote the poem to "confer such immortality as he could on his old friend Luarth," his favorite collie, which had been killed by the "wanton cruelty of some person" the night before his father's death. Luarth, the "gash and faithful tyke" discusses with Caesar, his friend, the failings and foibles of mankind, especially of the rich international set of his day. They kept at it until the "sun was out o' sight. . . ."

"when up they gat, and shook their lugs,
Rejoiced they were na men but dogs;"
Caesar of the poem was not any particular dog, but he has been identified as a Newfoundland by this description, "His hair, his size, his mouth, his lugs, Showed he was nane o' Scotland's dogs; But whalpit some place far abroad, Where sailors gang to fish for cod. His locked, lettered, braw brass collar Showed him the gentleman and scholar; But though he was o'high degree, The fient a pride, nae pride had he,

In 1808, before he was twenty years of age Lord Byron had written the most famous "dog poem" of all; beginning with the epitaph to Boatswain—A Dog. He writes to a friend of this unfortunate Newfoundland, "that he expired in a state of madness on the 18th, after suffering much, yet retaining all the gentleness of his nature to the last, never attempting to do any injury to anyone near him." Later, by a will executed in 1811, Lord Byron directed that his own body should be buried in the vault, in the garden near his faithful dog. The epitaph is the very well known

"Near this spot
Are deposited the remains of one
Who possessed Beauty without Vanity,
Strength without Insolence,
Courage without Ferocity,
And all the Virtues of Man without
his Vices.
This Praise which would be unmeaning Flattery
If inscribed over human ashes,
Is, but a just tribute to the memory of
'BOATSWAIN,' a Dog,

NORAH and NONA NAVIN

Who was born at Newfoundland, May 1803,

And died at Newstead Abbey, Nov. 18, 1808."

These lines are familiar to all dog lovers, but the poem goes on for twenty-six lines praising dogs as contrasted with men, of men he says—"Thy friendship all a cheat, Thy tongue hypocrisy, thy heart deceit," yet they are rewarded by fine memorials . . . "When all is done upon the Tomb is seen

Not what he was but what he should have been.

But the poor dog, in life the firmest friend,

The first to welcome, foremost to defend

Whose honest heart is still his Masters own,

Who labours, fights, loves, breaths for him alone,

Unhonoured falls, unnoticed all his worth,

Deny'd in heaven the Soul he held on earth;"

They do not mention the colour of Boatswain, but there are rumours that he was black with considerable white. It is known however that Lord Byron had a link with Boatswain's birthplace, which went back to his grandfather Commodore Byron, who was an early Governor of Newfoundland.

The influence of this somewhat emotional attitude towards animals, affected

not only the writers but also the artists of the period; notably the great animal painter Sir Edwin Landseer. True Landseer did not debase his human models, but there is often a sickly sentimentality about his compositions, especially in the titles he gives his pictures. This tends to obscure the fine quality of his drawing and painting, which is a pity as his skill in picturing animals was the result of years of painstaking study of his subjects.

Landseer pictured many dogs, of various breeds, but few of his paintings are better known than the one showing a beautiful black and white Newfoundland, resting on the seaward end of a pier, with the high tide causing the waves to come within a few inches of his resting place, and a threat of dirty weather in the darkening sky behind him. The picture is entitled "A Distinguished Member of the Humane Society"; the inference being that the Newfoundland is ready and waiting to do his duty as a rescue dog should the need arise.

Actually, when Landseer first saw the dog . . . Paul Pry . . . he was carrying a basket of gaily coloured flowers. The painter obtained permission of its owner, Mr. Newman Smith, to paint its likeness, and in due time Paul Pry arrived at Landseer's St. John's Wood Road (London) studio where, lying upon a table, the Newfoundland posed patiently for its portrait.

This picture was exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1837. In 1856, Landseer exhibited "Saved" which might be called a companion piece to the above. It shows another fine black and white Newfoundland bringing ashore a child rescued from drowning.

Other "Newf" pictures are "The Two Dogs", the subject taken from Robert Burns' poem of the same name, with Mr. Gosling's Newfoundland Neptune as Caesar. In 1824, he painted Mr. W. H. DeMerle's Newfoundland "Lion" in a picture of the same name; and in 1835, under the name of Prince George's Favorites, we have a painting of the Duke of Cambridge's Newfoundland "Nelson" in the company of the pony "Selim".

The list of other breeds pictured by Landseer reads like the catalogue of an all breed show, with "miscellaneous" and a few cross breeds to make it complete—and as his popularity grew, the list of the owners was a combined "Who's Who" and Burke's Peerage of the day. The dogs he pictured included the pets of the Royal Family, Queen Victoria's Scottish Terrier "Islay", and later her Dachshund "Dackel"; Prince Albert's favorite Greyhound "Eos"; "Lambkin", belonging to the Duchess of Kent, also the Duke of Grafton's bloodhound as Dignity in "Dignity and Impudence". "Impudence" was a terrier named Scratch. The Count D'Or-

say's French Poodle, in "Laying Down the Law" and Sir Walter Scott's favorite Deerhound "Maida".

So far as we know Sir Edwin Landseer did not own a Newfoundland at any time. We are told that he loved his old rough-haired white terrier "Brutus" so consumedly that he never entirely got over its loss, and never again attached himself to one favorite, but ever afterwards had several dogs around at one time. His friends, Charles Dickens and Sir Walter Scott, were both at one time "Newf" owners, and have left records of their dogs.

Sir Walter Scott wrote a short article in "British Field Sports" praising the Newfoundland. When his grandson Johnnie Lockhart was born, Scott wrote that he hoped "Mungo" (his Newfoundland) "approved of the new arrival." Some years later in 1889 Charles Dickens wrote about his Newfs "Don" and his son "Bumble . . ." The other day Bumble got into difficulty among some floating timber, and got frightened; Don who was standing by me shaking off the wet and looking on carelessly, when all of a sudden he perceived something amiss and went in with a bound, bringing Bumble out by the ear, the scientific way in which he towed him along was charming."

Of all the people (other than the breeders) who were interested in the Newfoundland at this time, none has had more influence on the breed than the painter, Landseer. His name has been given to the black and white variety. The official description calls for a dog "which follows the black in everything but colour; the preferred markings—black head with narrow white blaze, evenly marked saddle, black rump extending to tail."

The Newfoundland government paid a tribute to the Newfoundland when the head of a Newf appeared on the stamps of his native country in 1887. Few others have been thus honoured.

Compliments such as this, and those of Burns, Byron and Landseer, and the high regard Dickens and Scott had for their Newfoundlands, have found an echo, from their day to this, in the heart of every dog lover.

J. H. DANIELL-JENKINS

BORN at London, England, resident of Ontario for fifteen years. Served in Canadian Army (Active) in World War II also Welch Regiment and R.C.S.C.C. (S). For some years on editorial staff of the Toronto Evening Telegram and helped to found the "Enterprise" in Scarborough, Ontario.

Thirty years of dog activity include being Master of Otterhounds for two years. Has owned Irish Setters, Collies, Airedales, Wire Fox Terriers and Scottish Terriers. Has exhibited dogs in Canada, England and the United States and is actively interested in obedience work.

At present operates, with Mrs. Daniell-Jenkins, kennel of Bullmastiffs and West Highland White Terriers, also retail dog food business. Has bought a Papillon, and intends to start in this field as well. Daughter Mary, at present in England on exchange scholarship, also helps with a kennel management and handling at shows and owns and intends to breed Westies and will train to become a veterinarian.

Member of the Board of Governors of the West Highland White Terrier Club of America, Director of the Bullmastiff Club of America and The Honourable Company of Bullmastiff Fanciers in Canada. Delegate to the Association of Canine Clubs (Ontario), and member of the Progressive Kennel Club of Canada, Ontario County Kennel Club, and Canadian West Highland and White Terrier Club of Canada. Developing Canadian Judges

IN a few weeks from now, as the 1954 dog show season gets under way, hopeful exhibitors from one end of Canada to the other will be leading their dogs into the ring, starting on the annual hunt for championship points. There'll be the annual crop of hopes sustained and of hopes dashed—and we're willing to bet this early in the season there will be the annual crop of judging criticism.

Which highlights what is, in our opinion at least, one of the most pressing problems of the dog show game in Canada today—production of Canadian judges who will do a competent job—who will call the dogs as they see them—and who won't cost the show-giving clubs all chance of making a profit on their show.

Let's take a look at the situation as it exists at the present time. Across Canada we doubt if there are more than a dozen Canadian judges who are getting assignments reasonably regularly. Look at those judges and a large percentage of them are men definitely in the older age brackets. Try to think of someone in his mid-thirties who has held a judging assignment in your area. There may be some but we think you'll have to do a great deal of head scratching to come up with the names of even one. American judges do not come cheaply.

It means that the majority of show giving clubs are operating, from the standpoint of finances at least, for the benefit of the judges, printing companies, arena owners and trophy and ribbon manufacturers. The clubs which can hold a show and make money for themselves are few and far between.

If this is the situation, is there an answer to Canada's dependence on American judges and to the problem of too few Canadians coming on. We have no crystal ball. We make no claim to being able to pull either rabbits or competent Canadian judges out of a hat—but this suggestion is offered for what it is worth.

Across Canada today there are numbers of keen dog fanciers, who devote perhaps 75 per cent of their off-work hours to their dogs, who, while not all rounders perhaps, are definitely experts on some breeds and have a good sound knowledge of others, particularly within the groups where they normally exhibit their own dogs. Many of these are young men—and women—some of them veterans of World War II who took up dogs as a hobby after their discharge and who now find it almost an avocation.

These people are students of dogs. They breed good ones and they show good ones. In one club, of which I am a member, I can name at least half a dozen who come into this category and under whom I would be very happy to show.

This is a potential source of judging

material which could and should be tapped and which I believe could be tapped quickly and with a minimum of red tape. How to do it?

First of all we think it's a responsibility of the Canadian Kennel Club to provide leadership in the matter of discovering and developing Canadian judges. For what it's worth here's the suggestion.

Let the Canadian Kennel Club write to the show giving clubs in Canada asking each club to submit a list of breeders and exhibitors in its area who, in the club's opinion would be capable of handling judging assignments, the club in addition to provide a list of the breeds its nominees are capable of judging. On receipt of this list the Canadian Kennel Club publishes the list in *Dogs in Canada* and keeps the list standing during the show-giving season. In that way people in Windsor, for instance, will know that in the London area there are potential judges that the London club feels competent. People in Calgary and Edmonton will know of potential judges in Regina. It will be an interchange of names right across Canada.

The suggestion is just as simple as that.

Now what are the weaknesses? First of all will the clubs co-operate in recommending people in their area? Certainly it places a measure of responsibility on them. They may be criticised for suggesting John Doe and omitting to suggest Joe Dox. They may be unwilling to accept this criticism. They shouldn't be, if they are sincerely interested in the dog game, and if, in their opinion Joe Dox is competent and he has been overlooked honestly they can always add to their nominees.

There will be some club executives

who want to be good fellows and who will nominate anyone requesting nomination. This will result in a percentage of incompetents being included in the listing. Well we've had incompetents in the ring before. They may get one assignment, but they are unlikely to get a second one, and no lasting harm will be done through their one appearance in the ring. To balance this the competent judges will be talked about and will get a chance to add to their knowledge and experience. And we think the executives of most dog clubs in Canada are sincerely interested in the welfare of the game and that the competent judges will far outnumber those whose fitness to judge is debatable.

If these are the weaknesses, what are the strengths? First of all, we would suggest the speed with which the plan could be put into operation.

Secondly, we would suggest that if the plan is successful, it would very quickly develop an adequate number of experienced, young Canadian judges and so very greatly lessen our dependence on judges south of the border.

And finally, we think it would restore to circulation a category badly needed in Canada, the amateur judge who would officiate purely because of his interest in the game, whose services could be secured probably for expenses only and in some cases at no cost and who would pass, on fewer breeds, but then again perhaps do it much more expertly than those so called "all rounders".

There are modifications and additions which perhaps could be included in any basic plan. It may be desirable, for instance, to have a club's nominees act as apprentice judges, perhaps at their own club's show, with the judging sheets passed on to the C.K.C. for comparison with the rating of the officiating judge. Frankly, however, we're not impressed by the apprentice system, for we think it is only as effective as the work of the licensed judge. We'd predict that under any apprenticeship system there'd be occasions and breeds where the placing of the apprentice judge would be more in line with the actual quality than the placing of the expert.

If licensing seems desirable, these club nominees could be licensed for only one show at a time, until such time as they had judged at sufficient shows to really demonstrate their ability at which time an annual license could be issued.

Perhaps this proposal has merit or perhaps it's away off the beam. If it is, we'll undoubtedly hear from some of you. But if this piece does serve to provoke discussion of what I believe to be one of the really great problems in the dog game today I'm happy. I'll take the criticism, but I'll still like the idea.

MEETINGS OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

OCTOBER 30th, 1953

2611. A special meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, on Friday, October 30th, 1953, commencing at 10:00 a.m., with the Second Vice-President, Walter Brown, in the Chair, and the following Directors present: S. Back, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, G. P. Davies and W. J. Monaghan.

The Chairman stated that this special meeting of the Board had been called by five members of the Board of Directors (Walter Brown, S. Back, G. P. Davies, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, and W. H. MacKendrick) for the purpose of dealing with a situation prompted by a letter, dated October 1st, received from Mr. Ian H. McIntosh.

2612 (2532). "DOGS IN CANADA" (LETTER FROM IAN H. MCINTOSH)

The Secretary read a letter, dated October 1st, from Mr. Ian H. McIntosh, wherein Mr. McIntosh:

(a) Stated that "Because of outside conditions beyond my control which make it impossible for me to realize my objectives both for the betterment of DOGS IN CANADA and myself, I wish to resign from the conditions of employment under which I was hired in May, 1952," his letter to be considered notice terminating agreement as of October 31st, 1953;

(b) Stated that following an "acceptable adjustment of commissions and bonuses owing under the present agreement," he would be prepared to continue his services in the present capacity, on a week-to-week basis, for a salary of \$70.00 per regular work week, and a car allowance of \$5.00 per regular work week.

The Secretary was asked to report on developments following receipt of Mr. McIntosh's letter.

The Secretary reported that:

(a) On October 2nd a copy of Mr. McIntosh's letter had been forwarded to the President with a letter seeking his instructions on the action to be taken;

(b) A letter was received from the President on October 8th wherein the President instructed the Secretary to consult the Club's solicitor "and ascertain if the letter of resignation and proof of receipt of same together with official acknowledgment of the resignation automatically cancels any further obligation by the C.K.C." and on receipt of the solicitor's opinion, "the whole Dominion Board be notified of the exact conditions as they now exist before any further commitments are made by way of contract or terms of employment to anyone" (foregoing followed by a postscript reading "On receipt of lawyer's advice I shall instruct you further in this matter");

(c) On October 9th the file, together with minutes of Board meeting at which Mr. McIntosh was employed were forwarded to solicitor;

(d) On October 15th, during the course of his weekly visit to the office, the Second Vice-President had asked him to convey to the President a recommendation that a special meeting of the Board be held, before October 31st, to deal with the matter;

(e) On October 16th he had conveyed, by letter, to the President the Second Vice-President's recommendation, and had sought a clarification of the President's earlier instruction (letter received October 8th);

(f) On October 19th the solicitor's opinion was received, the solicitor being of the opinion that:

(i) The contract of service would end on 31st of October, 1953, except for the settlement of any outstanding claims under it;

(ii) Almost all of the amounts owing to Mr. McIntosh could be calculated as of the 31st of October, 1953;

(iii) There are some difficulties with regard to "the acceptable adjustment of commissions and bonuses under the present agreement" as referred to in Mr. McIntosh's letter of October 1, 1953, but once those questions are resolved by a payment satisfactory to both parties, there would not be any further obligation by the Club under the arrangements made with Mr. McIntosh as disclosed by the minutes;

(g) A copy of the solicitor's opinion had been forwarded to the President on October 19th with a letter seeking the President's instructions on the action to be taken, and advising the President that as at September 30th, 1953, the balance of the reserve set aside for possible advertising commissions payable to Mr. McIntosh had amounted to \$76.04;

(h) A letter, from the President, was received October 22nd, acknowledging the Secretary's letter of October 19th, and suggesting that the Secretary forward to all members of the Board a copy of the then solicitor's opinion of February 26th, 1953, with regard to the Editor's employment, a copy of the solicitor's opinion of October 19th, a copy of Mr. McIntosh's letter of October 1st, with a covering letter "asking the Board to express their individual opinions on this matter and if they agree to the matter being brought up on the first order of business of the new Board." The President's letter further stated "I feel the fact that the resignation has been made automatically terminates the employment";

(i) On October 22nd, he addressed a letter to the entire Board, as directed by the President, with which was forwarded copies of the letters referred to by the President;

(j) On October 23rd a letter was received from the President, acknowledging the Secretary's letter of October 16th, wherein the President:

(i) stated that he "had no specific objection to calling a special meeting but I feel and insist that this matter be dealt with by the Dominion Board";

(ii) stated that "You have on file the solicitor's opinion of the binding terms we are faced with—it being considered the terms arranged by a two man committee and on the

direction of last year's President, in fact became a binding contract when it so appeared in our official minutes";

(iii) stated that "At any rate no new contract, verbal or otherwise, should be agreed to by a special meeting Board at this time," and further stating that "two thirds of the Ontario Board are in effect the nucleus of the publishing Committee referred to in Mr. Wright's opinion and I can only imagine that any opinions so expressed by such personnel serving in a dual capacity could be subjected to challenge";

(k) On October 23rd there had been delivered to him a letter (signed by Walter Brown, S. Back, G. P. Davies, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, and W. H. MacKendrick) advising that they had decided to call a special meeting of the Board of Directors for October 30th, 1953, "in view of a serious situation having developed in connection with 'DOGS IN CANADA,' it being felt that it is vital and essential that the local Board meet to discuss and deal with this situation, and make arrangements for the carrying on the business of the Journal";

(l) Reported that following consultation with the Club's solicitor, he had forwarded a copy of this communication along with a notice calling this special meeting of the Board of Directors.

The Secretary read:

(a) A letter from Mr. Monaghan dated October 23rd wherein Mr. Monaghan:

(i) acknowledged the Secretary's letter of October 22nd;

(ii) strongly disapproved the suggestion that this matter be brought up on the first order of business of the new Board, stating that such a proposal meant delay until next January or February;

- (iii) requested a special meeting of the Board be called immediately to deal with the matter;
- (iv) stated that Mr. McIntosh was employed under the authority of a resolution of the Board in the first instance and his opinion was that Mr. McIntosh's resignation should be considered by the Board, in special meeting, before it is officially accepted;
- (v) stated that if Mr. McIntosh's services are to be retained for a period commencing November 1st, this means a new agreement and such an agreement required prior Board approval;
- (vi) stated that until the Board has considered such new agreement he recommended that no action be taken to accept Mr. McIntosh's proffered resignation;
- (vii) stated that Mr. McIntosh's resignation is a matter to be dealt with by the Board and he opposed the acceptance of it by any one or two individuals pretending to act in an official capacity and endeavouring to usurp the authority of the Board;
- (viii) deplored the delay in notifying the members of the Board of Mr. McIntosh's letter of resignation.
- (b) A letter from the President dated October 28th wherein the President:
 - (i) stated that he was pleased that a special meeting of the Board had been called to discuss the matter;
 - (ii) stated that he considered it imperative that the magazine be continued without interruption;
 - (iii) stated that he trusted that the incoming Board of Directors will not be burdened with any form of contract which will "endanger the future of the Canadian Kennel Club";
 - (iv) stated that it appeared to him that Mr. McIntosh had tendered his resignation of his own free will and privilege and that his resignation could and should be accepted as of October 31st, 1953;
 - (v) stated that the Secretary was capable of and did satisfactorily carry on with the magazine pending the appointment of a new Editor in 1952, and such an arrangement is worthy of the Board's consideration at this time.
- (c) A telegram from the President dated October 29th wherein the President among other things:
 - (i) stated that he considered Mr. McIntosh's resignation should be accepted;
 - (ii) strongly urged appointment of Secretary to carry on continuance of magazine without interruption until matter is deliberated by new Board in 1954.
- (d) A letter from Mr. Irving wherein Mr. Irving among other things:
 - (i) Stated that Mr. McIntosh's letter left a member of the Board with "very little premises to make any remarks";
 - (ii) stated that until such time as some more suitable arrangement could be made either with Mr. McIntosh or some other person, he favoured retaining Mr. McIntosh's services.
- (e) A night letter from Dr. Watson wherein Dr. Watson:
 - (i) recorded his opposition to employing Mr. McIntosh on a weekly basis;
 - (ii) considered his contract terminated;
 - (iii) suggested that Board consider asking Secretary to assume duties until replacement found, with whatever additional staff felt reasonably necessary;
 - (iv) suggested appointment of a new Editor await incoming Board.

The Chairman stated that on the afternoon of October 22nd he had a brief discussion with Mr. McIntosh during which Mr. McIntosh had informed him that he had tendered his resignation for financial reasons, that he had a new position and in order that he could take up his new work on or after November 15th, he had submitted the required one month's notice in accordance with his terms of employment. The Chairman stated that Mr. McIntosh had offered under certain conditions, to remain on as Editor on a week-to-week basis as it was not definitely known whether he would commence his new duties on November 15th or shortly thereafter.

The Chairman reported that immediately following his discussion with Mr. McIntosh, he had sought to reach the President by telephone, without success, and had finally despatched a telegram to the President informing him that Mr. McIntosh's services would be terminated in near future, that local members of the Board considered continuation of the magazine essential and for that reason had called a special meeting of the Board for October 30th to deal with situation.

Mr. Monaghan enquired whether the Chairman of the "Dogs in Canada" Committee appointed by the Board had any report. Mr. Back stated that the Editor had consulted him on a number of occasions, that he had assisted the Editor in connection with matters referred to him as well as in connection with advertising, and he felt that he had rendered the Editor all assistance possible as Chairman of the Committee.

Mr. Monaghan referred to part of the President's letter of October 17th and said: "I take exception to his statement because I am of the opinion that it is not in accordance with the facts as recorded in the official minutes. Reference Items No. 2238, No. 2247 and No. 2267. Mr. MacKendrick and I, as a Committee last year, interviewed the applicants and made reports to the Board. In Item No. 2267, a motion that the Committee report be received was unanimously carried, and this was followed by a motion, made by Mrs. Mack, seconded by Mr. Back, that Mr. McIntosh be hired in accordance with the Committee's report. This motion was unanimously carried. I just wish to be recorded as resenting the implication that any agreement entered into with Mr. McIntosh had not received the prior approval of the Board. Reference to Item No. 2238 will indicate that all members of the Board had been forwarded full details of the proposed arrangements with Mr. McIntosh well in advance of the meeting, and the replies received were considered, it being noted that there was no unanimity in the reactions."

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins enquired whether, at this special meeting of the Board, it would be proper for the meeting to receive and consider the first interim report of the "Dogs in Canada Committee" of which he is Chairman. The Chairman stated that while he would like to hear the Committee's report, he did not feel that he could rule that the report could be received by this meeting, this being a special meeting called for another purpose. Mr. Daniell-Jenkins stated that he accepted the

Chairman's ruling, and would arrange with the Secretary for distribution of the report to all members of the Board.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, we request the Editor to appear before the Board."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

—Mr. McIntosh entered the meeting at the Board's request. The following discussion then took place:

CHAIRMAN: Mr. McIntosh, I reported to the Board my interview with you of last week, however, the Board feels that it would be better to hear direct from you your reasons for submitting your resignation. I believe they could deal with the situation more intelligently. You referred to "outside conditions" and they would like to know what they were.

MR. MCINTOSH: Gentlemen, I will go this far now, and say that my resignation was prompted strictly by my financial earning power with "Dogs in Canada," and that is what motivated it. At the present time I don't wish to comment on anything that I have referred to. I think it sufficient what I have said about outside conditions. I think there is no onus on me to qualify it, and I am not taking an arbitrary attitude toward it; I think that you gentlemen are pretty well aware of those conditions, and actually they would definitely effect my earning power under the conditions under which I was hired.

MR. DANIELL-JENKINS: Have you had any reason to feel that you have not had sufficient co-operation from members of this Board?

MR. MCINTOSH: I would say that in my opinion I could have had more co-operation. At the same time I wish to qualify that by saying that under the circumstances that would be their opinion. They may have opinions along that line too.

MR. DANIELL-JENKINS: The reply is not clear to me; would you mind illustrating it?

MR. MCINTOSH: I have no direct criticism of the Board. I will say this: I have had more co-operation from some than I have had from others.

MR. DANIELL-JENKINS: Thank you, Mr. McIntosh.

MR. MCINTOSH: I do not want this resignation on a personal basis at all because that has nothing to do with it at all. No personalities are entering into it.

MR. DAVIES: Have any members of the Board done anything detrimental to your progress?

MR. MCINTOSH: I do not wish to answer that.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. McIntosh, you really want that resignation, to be accepted as of the 31st and anything for the future, if there is to be anything, you wish to be an arrangement with the Board. Is that right?

MR. MCINTOSH: That is right, sir.

CHAIRMAN: You have nothing further to say Mr. McIntosh? Say anything you want to say. Give us all the information you desire.

MR. MCINTOSH: That is all I have to say at this time.

Mr. McIntosh then left the meeting.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, we thank Mr. McIntosh for appearing before the Board and giving us the information we desired."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

In the discussion which followed it was unanimously agreed that there was no alternative but to accept Mr. McIntosh's tendered resignation.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, after the appearance of Mr. McIntosh before the Board and his explanation in reference to his resignation, we sincerely regret that we have no alternative but to accept his resignation."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

Mr. Davies expressed the view that if Mr. McIntosh's services would not be available for more than two weeks, it would be just as well to make other arrangements.

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins enquired of the present position with regard to the publication of the November issue. The Secretary reported that according to information furnished him by the Editor, the November issue had not yet reached the dummy (page layout) stage.

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins pointed out that the December issue of the magazine is usually a larger issue with more advertising, and even if, in an emergency, the January and February issues were combined, these facts together with the fact that there was still much work on the November issue should be borne in mind when temporary arrangements are made. Mr. Daniell-Jenkins referred to the suggestion of the President and another Director with regard to the Secretary carrying on, and enquired of the Secretary what such an arrangement would mean to him from the work point of view.

The Secretary-Treasurer stated that the addition of the Editor's duties to his own regular duties would add greatly to and naturally affect his regular duties, however, he was prepared to carry on as acting managing editor of the official organ, pending other arrangements, if the Board so desired.

Mr. Back suggested that the Board consider the advisability of retaining Mr. McIntosh on a temporary basis, if possible, until the December issue was produced and mailed.

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that it took from three to four months to find a suitable new Editor in 1952, that during Mr. McIntosh's period of employment Mr. McIntosh had acquired much valuable information and experience as editor of the Club's official magazine, and if it was again necessary to find a new editor, a further time loss would likely be experienced apart altogether from the loss of a person who had acquired much valuable information and knowledge about the operation of the magazine. He suggested that the Board seriously consider the advisability of asking Mr. McIntosh to state new terms under which he would be prepared to remain as Editor of the magazine, such terms, if obtained, to be referred to the entire Board, assuming that the local Board members felt that any terms proposed by Mr. McIntosh could be seriously entertained by the Board.

Mr. Back, Chairman of the "Dogs in Canada" Committee was asked to discuss this with Mr. McIntosh, and left the meeting for that purpose.

Mr. Back subsequently returned to the meeting, and reported

that Mr. McIntosh was not prepared to remain as Editor under any circumstances, that he was committed to taking a more "lucrative" position, and was not able to state how long he could remain in the club's employ if employed on the suggested week-to-week basis.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that should anyone ask a reference from the Secretary in connection with Mr. McIntosh, he should be authorized to give an excellent recommendation.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, in the event of the retiring Editor desiring a recommendation as to his services in connection with this Club, we will be only too pleased to give him an excellent reference."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

The meeting adjourned (for luncheon) and later reconvened with the Second Vice-President in the Chair and the same members of the Board present.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that in order to complete the work on the November issue and to get best possible results in connection with the December issue, it would be advisable to temporarily retain the services of Mr. McIntosh if possible.

The Board noted that Mr. McIntosh was prepared to remain on a temporary week-to-week basis subject to an "acceptable adjustment of commissions and bonuses under the present agreement."

The Secretary reported that the financial statements for the nine-months period ending September 30th, 1953, indicated that all advertising commissions due the Editor from 1952 and the first nine months of 1953 had been paid with the exception of an amount of \$76.04 which was being withheld until all advertising in that period subject to advertising commission had been paid by the advertisers.

Mr. Back was authorized to enquire of Mr. McIntosh what he would consider an acceptable adjustment, and later reported to the meeting that Mr. McIntosh suggested a payment of \$40.00, this to constitute a full and complete payment of all advertising commissions due the Editor up to and including October 31st, 1953.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Davies: "THAT, Mr. McIntosh be paid the sum of \$40.00 which constitutes payment in full of all commissions due and payable up to and including October 31st, 1953."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

It was then regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, Mr. McIntosh be employed for a period of several weeks at a salary of \$70.00 per week and a car allowance of \$5.00 per week and such employment may be terminated by either the Club or Mr. McIntosh on a one week notice ending on a Friday."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

The Board then discussed the action that should be taken to ensure continued publication of the official magazine should Mr. McIntosh terminate his employment before the end of the year.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, in the event that Mr. McIntosh terminated his employment, Mr. N. F. Brown be appointed Acting Managing Editor of DOGS IN CANADA until the Board directs otherwise."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

The Board then discussed what steps should be taken in order to expedite consideration by the new Board of Directors, of a new Managing Editor, should the new Board wish to take action along that line. Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Davies, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, advertisements be placed in the first week of December, the replies to remain unopened and be presented to the incoming President."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

It was agreed that the wording of the advertisement be left in the hands of the Publication Committee.

It was pointed out that temporary office help may be necessary should it be necessary for the Secretary to carry on the Editor's duties. It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, the Second Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to make such arrangements with regard to temporary office help that may be considered necessary between now and the end of the year in connection with the magazine."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2613. ADJOURNMENT

It was unanimously agreed that this meeting should adjourn to reconvene at the call of the Second Vice-President should anything develop with regard to the matter dealt with at this meeting that would require the Board's further consideration and action, and it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, this meeting adjourn to reconvene, if necessary, at the call of the Second Vice-President."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

A special meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc. was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, on Monday, November 16th, 1953, commencing at 10 a.m. with the Second Vice-President, Walter Brown in the Chair, and the following Directors present: S. Back, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, G. P. Davies and W. J. Monaghan.

The Secretary reported that this special meeting of the Board had been called by the President after the President had been informed that the members of the board in Ontario felt that such a meeting should be called to process, as far as possible, all business requiring the attention of the Board.

2615 (2567). MINUTES

The Secretary presented for adoption the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on September 9th, 1953, and read a letter from Mr. Monaghan pointing out two errors in the minutes distributed to members of the Board.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the following corrections be made: (Note: Corrections incorporated in published minutes of September 9th).

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Irving who referred to Item No. 2571 and stated that when Section 1 of Chapter 7 of the Dog Show Rules was adopted it was anticipated that the "geographical zones" referred to in that Section would be governed by the areas accepted for the Provincial Committee in which event there would be two zones in British Columbia, one for the Mainland, the other for the Island.

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that when this was discussed at the last meeting of the Board it was decided that for the time being, and in order to prevent arrangements from becoming too unwieldy, it would be advisable to follow electoral zones. Mr. Monaghan stated that had the Provincial Committee distribution been followed, it would be necessary to designate four zones for the Maritimes instead of one as at present.

No action was taken.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on September 9th, 1953, as corrected, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2616 (2608). FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Secretary placed before the Board the auditors' financial statements for the nine-months period ending September 30th.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:

"THAT, the financial reports, as submitted by the auditors, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

It was unanimously agreed that the Board's adoption of the audited statements for the nine-months period ending September 30th, constituted its approval of the expenditures reported in the statements.

The Secretary reported the standing of the Accounts Receivable for "Dogs in Canada", as at October 31st, as follows:

The Secretary reported that in accordance with the Board's instructions (Item No. 2568) he had consulted a financial collection agency (Dun and Bradstreet) with regard to collection of long overdue accounts, and outlined a service provided by Dun & Bradstreet for \$20.00 a year. Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, we recommend to the new Board of Directors that it give serious consideration to taking this service for next year."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

The Secretary read a letter received from Mr. Monaghan following distribution of the nine-months audited statements in which he recommended that the statements and the Secretary's report which accompanied the statements forwarded to the Board be published in the November issue of the magazine. Mr. Monaghan stated that he had made the recommendation for the reason that the Secretary's report was very informative and included comparative figures, information which he felt would be of interest to the members. The Secretary reported that following consultation with the President, arrangements had been made for the inclusion of only the audited statements in the November issue of the magazine.

The Secretary reported on the Club's current balance in the two bank accounts, and enquired whether the Board wished to further reduce the loan obtained from the bank sometime ago.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, this subject be left to the new Board of Directors."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2617 (2532). DOGS IN CANADA COMMITTEE (BOARD)
Mr. Back, Chairman of the Committee appointed by the Board, reported that Mr. McIntosh had terminated his employment as Executive Publisher of "Dogs in Canada" effective November 13th, 1953, that the Secretary-Treasurer was carrying on temporarily as Managing Editor as previously decided by the Board (Item No. 2612), and if the Board so desired the Committee would carry on for the balance of the year giving as much assistance to the Secretary as possible.

It was unanimously agreed that Mr. Back's report be received, and the Committee carry on its usual functions for the balance of the year.

2618 (2570). "DOGS IN CANADA" COMMITTEE (ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING)

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Chairman of the Committee, placed the following interim report of the Committee (dated October 25th) before the meeting (a copy of the report having been previously forwarded to all members of the Board):

"The Committee appointed to consider the financial affairs of DOGS IN CANADA and suggest improvements has met on various occasions with this end in view and submits the following report of progress to date:—

We have requested the following to appear before us to give such useful information as they possess:—

Mr. Sam Back, Chairman of the Operating Committee of DOGS IN CANADA.

Mr. Ian McIntosh, Editor, DOGS IN CANADA.

Mrs. Alva McColl, formerly Editor, DOGS IN CANADA.

In addition, Mr. W. J. Monaghan, a member of the Operating Committee of DOGS IN CANADA has offered to appear before us if required. Up to the present, only Mr. McIntosh has been heard.

We have examined financial reports for some twenty years covering the period 1932-1952 inclusive, also reports for the first

nine months of 1953, kindly supplied by Mr. Norman Brown, Sec-Treas., C.K.C.

We find that over the long term DOGS IN CANADA has about broken even financially. This likewise holds true for the most recent period of 8 years 1945 to 1952. It also appears reasonable to expect a very considerable improvement in results for 1953 vs. 1952.

We are informed that considerable expense was incurred during the second half of 1952 with a view to effective improvements, but we are not yet in a position to report fully on this point.

We consider that so long as the C.K.C. offers a free subscription to DOGS IN CANADA to each of its members, the C.K.C. should expect to contribute to the income of the magazine a sum equivalent to one year's subscription per member. It appears from the information so far available that, whereas a year's subscription to D.I.C. is \$3.00 to the general public, the C.K.C. only contributes \$1. per member.

The principal income of any magazine is derived from (a) Advertising, and (b) Subscriptions, usually in the proportion of about 3 or 4 to 1. In 1951 and 1952 the advertising income for the reasons set out below this proportion appears gratifyingly high.

The C.K.C. has for a number of years also contributed to DOGS IN CANADA a sum estimated to be equal to the cost of publishing C.K.C. official business (minutes of meetings, financial statements, official messages, complete show results, etc.). Whereas in former years this official information was mailed separately to each member at considerable expense.

We find an impression prevalent that the C.K.C. "subsidizes" DOGS IN CANADA. For the reasons stated above, we find this to be a fallacy.

Moreover it is noted that the incorporation of official business increases the mailing cost considerably (e.g. the Sept. issue with official business cost \$25. to mail while the Oct. issue with official business cost \$99. to mail). This is caused by a Post Office ruling arising from the fact that only member's copies contain official business. There seems, at the moment, little point in limiting circulation of official business to members only, when this results in such greatly increased postage rates.

We find that under prevailing conditions it is not profitable to distribute the magazine to news-stands as the high proportion of "returns" more than effect any profit on the few copies sold.

We find a gratifying increase in revenue from advertising for the first nine months of 1953, which at \$12,059 nearly equals the revenue from this source for the whole of 1952 (\$13,232) and actually exceeds that for 1951 (\$11,748). Considering the limited circulation of D.I.C. this reflects credit upon those responsible for selling advertising.

We note that DOGS IN CANADA shows a profit (unaudited) of \$2470 for the first 9 months of 1953 as against a loss of \$355 for the corresponding periods of 1952 and a small profit of \$1246.13 in 1951.

From the information so far available it seems clear that D.I.C. will not regularly attract the national advertiser (e.g. Dog Food Manufacturers) until paid circulation has reached 10,000 copies per issue. There is little hope of achieving this circulation on a 12-month basis within the foreseeable future. However, serious consideration might be given to an annual or even semi-annual special issue, similar to those published by many British magazines (e.g. Our Dogs and Dog World). An energetic and aggressive effort might very well achieve this result and, in addition help increase C.K.C. membership.

We are strongly of the opinion that a publication in sufficiently complete form, controlled by the C.K.C., is a necessary means towards fulfilment of one of the C.K.C.'s prime objects, namely to promote the interests of pure-bred dogs in this country.

The successful operation of D.I.C. demands an experienced Editor, capable of taking full charge of both the editorial and advertising departments. Such a person can command a good salary. The C.K.C. cannot expect to attract and hold such a person unless emoluments are proportionate.

"THAT, the Committee's interim report be received, and the Committee thanked for its endeavours."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary reported that Mrs. W. F. C. Driessen, LaSalle, Ontario, had applied for the registration of a number of Poodles, registered individually in the record of Raad van Beheer Opkynologisch Gebied in Nederland, Holland, although the Dutch certificates did not show ancestry for the dam of the imported dogs beyond the dam's sire and dam. The Secretary reported that Mrs. Driessen had furnished a certificate of registration issued by the Belgische Kennel Club which furnished additional information regarding the ancestry of the dam, however, it had not been the previous practice of the Club to recognize certificates issued by the Belgische Kennel Club.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary communicate with the Kennel Club in Holland and seek additional information regarding the ancestry of the dam of the dogs imported by Mrs. Driessen, after which the file be referred to the Registration Committee.

2620 (2573). STUD BOOKS (MICROFILM). CERTIFICATES FOR EXPORTED DOGS

The Secretary read the letter addressed to the Canadian National Live Stock Records, following the last meeting of the Board, with regard to microfilm records for the Bureau of Animal Industry and possible arrangements with regard to an extra copy of certificates for exported dogs.

The Secretary read the reply received from the Director of the Live Stock Records who reported that:

(a) A sample microfilm of 100 registrations had been prepared and forwarded to the Bureau with advice that the films could be arranged and indexed in a manner to suit their requirements.

(b) The following costs would be involved in microfilming the registrations for the years 1948 to 1952 inclusive: Cost of microfilm—\$4.56 per thousand images (registrations) (approx. 76,000 registrations to be microfilmed); Records office costs in handling—likely about \$75.00; cost of transporting records from Records Office to Toronto and return.

(c) Immediate advice would be forwarded when the Records Office receives the reaction of the Bureau to the sample forwarded for their examination.

Mr. Monaghan stated that whether or not the Board provides the Bureau with microfilm records in order to ensure continuing present favourable tariff arrangements on dogs exported to the United States, it should give serious consideration to bringing the publication of the Club's stud books up to date. He expressed the view that many breeders wished to obtain the stud books and in any event the publication of stud books was an aid to discovering possible irregularities in registrations.

It was unanimously agreed that in the event the Bureau indicated its acceptance of microfilm records for the past five years, it would be advisable to proceed at once to supply the films. It was also unanimously agreed that the entire Board should be consulted on this matter before any microfilming was proceeded with, and in order to expedite action, if a favourable reply is received from the Bureau, the question should be referred to the Board while the reaction of the Bureau is being awaited.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:

"That, subject to a majority affirmative vote of the entire Board of Directors, and in the event the Bureau of Animal Industry indicates that it will accept microfilm records in lieu of printed stud books, of registration effected during the years 1948 to 1953 inclusive, the Secretary be and is hereby authorized to proceed to have the microfilms made and delivered to the Bureau."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

A brief discussion followed on the action that should be taken with regard to publication of stud books. It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, this Board considers the time is ripe and essential that something should be done toward issuing of stud books, and we recommend to the incoming Board that they give it their most favorable consideration."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

The Board then discussed the observations of the Records Office, with regard to special export certificates, as discussed at the last meeting of the Board. It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, the Secretary be authorized to continue gathering information on this proposal for the consideration of the incoming Board of Directors."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2621. LETTER FROM WM. H. PYM

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. W. H. Pym, Vancouver, who observed that apart from occasions when dog shows are quite properly held in conjunction with legitimate agricultural fairs, exhibitions and sportsmen's shows, the local Director, when asked to submit his recommendation with regard to approval (or otherwise) in connection with a proposed championship show, has no way of knowing whether the show will be staged in connection with other activities to the possible detriment of the show and dog game in general. Mr. Pym suggested that the Board of Directors bring in a standing regulation to the effect that applications for show dates should disclose the nature of all activities which the applicant intends to carry on in connection with the dog show.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary seek the recommendation of the B.C. Director, and make such administrative arrangements as necessary to carry out his recommendation.

2622. CHANGE OF AUDITORS & ELECTION COMMISSION

The Secretary reported that letters had been received on September 24th from Craig, Norman & Co. and Trafford & Co. with regard to Craig, Norman & Co. taking over the practice of Trafford & Co., and after consultation with the Second Vice-President, the approval of the Board had been sought by mail of the change of auditors and election commission in order that the October issue of "Dogs in Canada", containing the list of members and nomination forms required in connection with the current election, would be mailed on time and all members enjoy the full period allowed for nominations.

The Secretary reported that the following members of the Board had, by letter, approved the change: Mr. Biggar, Mr. Gostick, Dr. Watson, Mrs. Margeson, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Mack.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Back:

"THAT, the change of auditors and election commission from Trafford & Co. to Craig, Norman & Co. be and is hereby confirmed."

FOR THE MOTION: All present

Motion unanimously carried.

2624. LETTER FROM D. VAN DER MEER (LANGHARIGE DUTSCHE STAANDE HOND)

The Secretary reported that Mr. D. Van der Meer, Colwood, V.I., B.C., had submitted certificates of registration issued by Raad van Beheer Opkynologisch Gebied in Nederland for two Langharige Duitse Staande Hond and desired to register these dogs in the Club's records, also five puppies said to have resulted from a mating of these two dogs. The Secretary reported that Mr. van der Meer had sought to register a Langharige Duitse Staande Hond with the Club some years previously but at that time the Board had decided that it was not prepared to consider recognition of the breed until such time as there were at least five specimens of the breed in Canada available for registration.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would communicate with the Kennel Club in Holland and request a copy of the official standard for the breed (with English translation if possible) after which the standard would be forwarded to the Director (British Columbia) with a request that he and Mr. W. H. Pym inspect and submit a report on the two imported dogs.

2625 (2585). STANDARD CERTIFICATES AND APPLICATIONS

The Secretary reported that, as requested by the Board, the Registration Committee had met for the purpose of considering and reporting on the form and content of standard applications and certificates, and reported that the Committee recommended as follows:

LITTER APPLICATION:

- Where applicant is to show number of males and females in litter, change words "Number in Litter" to "Number Living";
- The application be amended to require the signature of owner of sire of litter certifying to the service, and owner of dam of litter certifying to the service, which resulted in birth of the litter;
- The fees in connection with registration of litters be stated on the application.

INDIVIDUAL APPLICATION:

- After consultation with the Live Stock Records Office, decided to delete the words "For Office Use Only" and centre word "DOGS" in box in upper right hand corner of the application;

- The following words to appear below the line where signature of applicant is required: "Signature of owner of dog at birth, or importer, or foreign owner" in order that the single type of application may be used in connection with the registration of dogs born in Canada, dogs imported to Canada, and dogs owned by residents of the United States;
- Application for transfer of ownership form to be placed on back of application, and in order to save space, delete reference to service if a female and bred;

- The fees in connection with registration of individual dogs and transfer of ownership to be stated on the application. The Secretary further reported that the Committee:

- Had noted that the application for registration of an individual dog did not provide for the name of the importer and date of importation in connection with the application for registration of an imported dog, that this point had been taken up with the Live Stock Records office, and advice had been received to the effect that in due course a complete study would be made of the requirements in this connection, the intention being to draft a proper form satisfactory to all breed organizations;
- Had deferred consideration of the content of standard certificates of registration pending a solution to the problems of how to code colors and titles.

Mr. Monaghan referred to the Board's earlier discussion and decision (Item No. 2533) regarding the non-splitting of the location of tattoo markings, and stated that he believed the Board should reconsider its earlier decision on this point, for, in his opinion, in certain breeds the splitting of the markings is imperative.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Board should pass a regulation permitting the splitting of the markings and requiring that where the markings are split the breeder's identification letters must be placed in the right ear (or flank as the case may be) and the numeral and year letter in the left ear (or flank as the case may be). It was unanimously agreed that under this arrangement the use, by the applicant, of the plural "ears" or "flanks" on new type applications would automatically mean that the markings had been placed in accordance with the foregoing arrangement.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the words "of dog being registered (by code)" should be inserted below the words "Colour or Colours" on the application for registration of individual dog.

The Board adjourned for lunch, and reconvened with the Second Vice-President, Walter Brown, in the Chair and the following present: J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, G. P. Davies, and W. J. Monaghan.

2626 (2585). ALLOCATION OF REGISTRATION NUMBERS

The Secretary reported that in accordance with the Board's request, the Registration Committee had considered the registration numbering arrangements proposed by Mr. Monaghan at the last meeting of the Board, and the Committee had the following recommendations to offer for the Board's consideration:

- That no new numbering arrangements be ordered by the Board without prior consultation with the Live Stock Records Office so that any new numbering arrangements ordered by the Board may be adaptable to Records Office procedures and filing arrangements;
- That no new numbering arrangements be ordered without prior consultation with the entire Board;
- That Mr. Monaghan's proposals be considered by the entire Board along with the following alternative numbering arrangements:
 - Each litter to be numbered with a numeral prefix (commencing with No. 1 each year) followed by a letter designating the year of registration; each puppy in the litter, when registered individually, to be numbered with the same number as the litter registration number followed by a numeral to differentiate between puppies in the litter;
 - Each breed be numbered and the year in which a dog is registered individually be identified by a letter, each specimen of the breed to be numbered starting with No. 1 in each year. (Example: Airedale Terriers may be breed number 80; "A" may designate year of registration, say 1954; thus first Airedale registered in 1954 would be numbered "80A1", second Airedale registered in 1954 would be numbered "80A2" and so on.)

The Secretary reported that pending consideration of the matter by the Committee and the Board, the Records Office had been asked to not proceed with the printing of office records where numbering (of individual dogs registered) was required, and read a letter from the Records Office stating that new forms were required in the near future.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that the Records Office be asked to continue with its present numbering arrangements, and that this matter be placed on the agenda of the annual meeting of the Board. This proposal was unanimously approved.

2627 (2589). CONVENTION RATES (ANNUAL MEETINGS)

The Secretary reported that the matter of convention rates on members of the Board travelling to the Club's coming annual meetings had been discussed with the Department of Agriculture (Ontario), and had been advised that the Club had been listed with the other live stock associations to whom information in this connection would be mailed in due course.

The matter was left in the Secretary's hands.

2628 (2588). COMMITTEES AND REPRESENTATIVES

The Secretary reported that immediately following the Board's last meeting a communication was received from Director Alec Gostick recommending the appointment of George Kynoch to the Manitoba Advisory Committee.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, Mr. Gostick's recommendation be approved."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2631 (2605). ARRANGEMENTS FOR ANNUAL MEETINGS (1954)

The Secretary reported that the following reservations had been made with the King Edward Hotel in connection with the Club's annual meetings for 1954:

- Room 215 for the annual meeting of the Board of Directors on February 1st, 2nd and 4th;
- The Yellow Room for the annual general meeting of members on February 3rd;

- (c) Bedroom accommodation: commencing the evening of January 31st for members of the Board travelling from distant points; February 1st for local and nearby members of the Board.

The Secretary placed before the Board draft of notice calling the annual general meeting which, in a letter addressed to the Board on October 26th, he proposed be placed in the December issue of "Dogs in Canada".

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the notice calling the annual general meeting of the Club, in the form submitted to the Board under date of October 26th, be published in the December issue of "Dogs in Canada".
FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.
It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, the Secretary be authorized to forward notice to the members elected to the Board of Directors for 1954 that the annual meeting of the Board of Directors will be held on February 1st, 2nd and 4th, 1954, in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, the meeting to commence at 10:00 a.m. on February 1st."
FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

2632 (2600). RENEWALS OF MEMBERSHIP
The Secretary placed before the Board a proof of the notice, regarding renewal of membership, to be forwarded to all members as previously ordered by the Board (See Item No. 2600), and read a letter from Director Mr. Irving who referred to the practice of another organization who, when sending out notice regarding renewal of membership, specifically designated the percentage of the membership fee to be regarded as the subscription fee to the organization's official organ.

The Secretary read a letter from the Live Stock Records Office enquiring whether a member renewing in 1954 would be required to complete a new application for membership form.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that:

- (a) Inasmuch as the notice to be mailed to members on December 28th is not an application for membership form, and inasmuch as members renewing had previously completed an application for membership form wherein there had been designated the part of the membership fee to be credited to the official organ in lieu of subscription fee, no change be made in the notice previously approved by the Board;
(b) A member in 1953, when renewing his membership for 1954, would not be required to complete a new application for membership form.

2633 (2597). ELECTION MATTERS
The Secretary reported that all members of the Board had been asked to vote on the resolution as to whether candidates would be permitted to withdraw from the current election provided notice of withdrawal was received before the ballots were printed (See second resolution—Item No. 2597), and reported that the voting had been as follows:

FOR THE RESOLUTION: Mr. Biggar, Mr. Brown, Mr. Irving, Miss Hammond, Dr. Watson, Mrs. Mack, Mrs. Margeson, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Monaghan.

AGAINST THE RESOLUTION: Mr. Williams, Mr. Gostick, Mr. MacKendrick.

NO VOTE CAST: Mr. Back.
The Secretary reported that in view of the voting on this resolution, the Election Commission had been instructed to be governed by the terms of the resolution.

The Secretary reported that on October 27th a letter had been received from Mrs. Alva McColl who enquired whether members nominated for office had been informed that they may withdraw, whether any stated deadline had been set for withdrawals, and whether all candidates would be notified of withdrawals.

The Secretary reported that as a result of this communication he had prepared and forwarded to all members of the Board for approval, the draft of a proposed notice to all candidates informing them that they may withdraw, that notice of withdrawal must be received by the Election Commission not later than 12:00 o'clock noon on November 10th, that notice of withdrawal by telegraph or orally would not be accepted as a valid withdrawal, and that all candidates for a given office where a withdrawal had taken place would be promptly notified of the withdrawal.

The Secretary reported that:

- (a) The President and Directors Mrs. Mack, Miss Hammond and Mr. Monaghan had approved the proposed notice;
(b) Director Mrs. Margeson approved the notice but expressed the view that such information should have been included with other information published in the October issue of "Dogs in Canada";
(c) Director Mr. Irving stated that when he voted in favour of the resolution permitting withdrawal of candidates, it was his thought that a withdrawal would only be permitted should circumstances justify a withdrawal, and as he did not favour encouraging nominated candidates to withdraw he opposed the proposed notice.

The Secretary reported that following consultation with the Club's solicitor, the proposed notice had been forwarded to all candidates with the list of nominees.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the action of the Secretary be and is hereby confirmed."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary was ordered to place the question of withdrawals on the agenda of the next annual meeting of the Board in order that a policy for 1954 may be established after a thorough discussion by all members of the Board.

2634 (2572). COMMITTEE ON OBEDIENCE TRIAL JUDGES (PROCEDURE)

The Secretary reported that all known obedience clubs had been written as directed by the Board at its last meeting, and read letters received from the Obedience Association (Ontario) and the Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club commenting on the reports of the Committee.

The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Pamela Mack, Chairman of the Committee, who reported that the Committee had met on November 9th at which meeting the Committee had noted that

the Board was seeking suggestions on a report which it had adopted, and advising that the Committee was of the opinion that the Board, having adopted its reports, should place the Committee's findings into effect without further delay.

Following discussion, it was unanimously agreed that in order to give effect to the Committee's report it was imperative that the appointment of Obedience Trial Representatives for 1954 be made at the next annual meeting of the Board. It was unanimously agreed that:

- (1) The Secretary would ask each Director elected in electoral zones other than Ontario to consult local clubs active wholly or partly in obedience training and/or trials to nominate a member of the C.K.C. for appointment as the Province's Obedience Trial Representative;

- (2) The Secretary would write each club in Ontario wholly or partly active in obedience training and/or trials to nominate a member of the C.K.C. for appointment as Ontario Obedience Trial Representative;

the appointment of representatives be made by the Board at its annual meeting in February.

The Secretary was directed to forward the Committee a copy of the letters received in connection with the Committee's reports, and to inform the Committee of the action being taken in connection with the appointment of Obedience Trial Representatives in order that the Committee's reports would be placed into effect at the earliest possible date.

The Secretary was directed to thank the Obedience Association (Ontario) and the Vancouver Dog Obedience Training Club for their comments on the Committee's reports, and advise that copy of their letters would be forwarded to the Committee.

The Secretary reported that the Dates and Judges Committee wished a direction from the Board in connection with the application of the Hamilton Obedience Club for approval of Mrs. Alex Casgrain as Judge of its licensed obedience trial to be held on January 23rd. The Committee was authorized to approve the selection.

Mr. Monaghan stated that when the Committee's recommended application for approval to judge obedience trials in Canada has been considered by the Board he had then objected to the application being in affidavit form, being of the opinion that such an arrangement was not legally permissible. Following discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the application be not in the form of an affidavit.

2635 (2576). LETTERS FROM THE TOWNSHIP OF TORONTO'S DOG BREEDERS' PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

The Secretary reported that since the last meeting of the Board, the Second Vice-President and himself had a meeting with Mr. R. D. Smuck, President of the Association, during which the situation with regard to the licensing of kennels in Toronto Township was thoroughly discussed. The Secretary reported that in the opinion of Mr. Smuck the situation did not warrant any action by the Canadian Kennel Club at this time. The Secretary further reported that he had forwarded to all members of the Board copy of a memorandum left with him by Mr. Smuck in which Mr. Smuck detailed all developments to date in respect of the situation which had prompted the Association's letter to the Club.

Mr. Brown suggested that the Board should decide on a definite policy with regard to any action which the Club might take in situations of this kind.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the opinion of the Club's solicitor be obtained with regard to the rights of the Club to take action in matters of this kind."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

2636 (2594). APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP
The Secretary sought confirmation of the approval given lists (numbered 22 to 24 inclusive) of the applicants for membership. It was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the approval given applications for membership (lists numbered 22 to 24 inclusive) be and is hereby confirmed."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

2637. CHINESE CRESTED DOGS

The Secretary reported that Mrs. Clyde Ritchie, Vancouver, had written seeking recognition by the Club of the Chinese Crested Dog and indicating a desire to register two dogs of this breed which she had imported from the United States. The Secretary reported that the breed had not yet been recognized by the American Kennel Club, although permitted to be entered in the Miscellaneous Class at shows held under its rules.

The Secretary was instructed to write the Kennel Club (England) and determine whether the breed is one recognized by the Kennel Club or by the Hong Kong Kennel Club.

2638 (2595). KENNEL NAMES

The Board unanimously confirmed the approval given to the following applications for registration of kennel names:

ARION, BARFORD, BOXERDALE, CYPRUS, DAGMAR, DOBE-LANE, DUN-RAVEN, ERRISLEA, GLEN EL-TEE, KAR-KAY, MERRIVALE, NIMROD, PRIMROSE PATCH, SILVER SPRINGS, ST. GEORGE'S, WIL-SHIR, WYNDE RUFFE, and ZISKA.

The Secretary reported that Mrs. Ella Ellis, Woodbridge, Ont. (Kennel name DE LA FONTAINE) had submitted an objection to Alfred R. Pelissier's application for registration of the kennel name DE LA FAYADE. The Secretary was directed to point out to Mr. Pelissier that under the By-laws now in effect, a kennel name registered after May 5th, 1951, could only be used as a prefix, and his proposed kennel name did not appear to be a suitable name to be used as a prefix. It was unanimously agreed that if Mr. Pelissier was prepared to accept FAYADE as a suitable kennel name (prefix only) said name is to be considered approved by the Board.

The Secretary reported that approval had been granted to an application for registration of kennel name, reported and approved as DUNROLIN, when it was later pointed out by the applicants, M. Patricia Green and Mrs. Kenneth A. Green of Ottawa, that the name applied for was DUNROBIN. Mr. Monaghan pointed out that "DUNROBIN" was a postal district in Ottawa. Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that if the applicants desired their name to be changed from

DUNROLIN to DUNROBIN, it would be necessary to hold the application in abeyance pending the Board's decision on applications having a geographical connotation.

The Secretary read letters received from members of the Board in reply to the enquiry whether there should or should not be any restriction on approval of kennel names having a geographical connotation (in Canada). Following discussion it was unanimously agreed since the replies received from members of the Board indicated a diversity of opinion on this subject, the matter be referred to the next annual meeting of the Board, and in the meantime those whose applications for registration of kennel names are being held in abeyance be informed of the action being taken and advised that they may elect to select other kennel names.

The Board adjourned for dinner and later reconvened with the Second Vice-President, Walter Brown, in the Chair, and the following present: J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, G. P. Davies and W. J. Monaghan.

2639 (2615). MINUTES

The Secretary placed before the Board the minutes of the special meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 30th, 1953.

It was unanimously agreed that the words "help that may be considered necessary" (last resolution in Item No. 2612) be deleted and the words "help as may be considered necessary" be inserted in their stead.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the minutes of the special meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 30th, 1953, as corrected, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion unanimously carried.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that the Secretary be authorized to forward to all those members elected to the Board for 1954 who are not members of the current Board, a copy of the minutes of this meeting and of any other meetings of the Board held before the end of the year, in order that said members may be familiar with the matters before the Board, particular business which will require the attention of the incoming Board. Mr. Monaghan's suggestion was unanimously approved.

2640 (2586). RECOGNITION OF OTHER STUD BOOKS

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that when the special regulations were drawn and presented to the Board in connection with the recognition of other American stud books, it was anticipated that the special regulations would go into effect at an early rate, and suggested that in view of the delay that had taken place, the deadline date set for the registration of Canadian-born dogs registered in these stud books be extended to November 15, 1954.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, in view of the delay which was beyond our control, the deadline date previously set in connection with the registration, in our records, of dogs previously registered in either the International Foxhunters' Stud Book or the Field Dog Stud Book be changed to November 15th, 1954."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

After discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would apply to the Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture for the approval of the special regulations, as amended at this meeting, the applications to be personally handed to Dr. Leslie, Chief Registration Officer, on behalf of the Club, by Mr. Monaghan.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, when the approval of the Chief Registration Officer has been granted to the proposed special registration regulations relating to the registration of dogs previously registered in the International Foxhunters' Stud Book, the Secretary inform the Secretary of the All Canadian Foxhunters' Association of the new regulations."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Secretary reported that:

- Prior to Ministerial approval of new By-laws on May 5th, 1951, the Constitution of the Club in effect for many years prior to that date contained a list of many British and foreign stud books recognized by this Club for registration purposes.
- The new By-laws effective May 5th, 1951, contained an abbreviated list of recognized stud books and where applications for registration of imported dogs registered in any stud book or record other than the few stud books listed were received, it was necessary for the imported dogs to be inspected and registration authorized by the Registration Committee, procedures which delayed registration.
- In order to overcome delays and inconvenience to importers, the Board had arranged for a proposed amendment to the By-laws to appear on the last referendum ballot, the proposed amendment had received a majority of affirmative votes and later Ministerial approval.
- The proposed amendment provided for the Board to add, to the list of recognized stud books, other stud books and records, subject to the approval of the Chief Registration Officer, and subject to any special registration regulations, also subject to the approval of the Chief Registration Officer, which the Board may prescribe.
- On October 5th he had forwarded to the Board a list of other British and foreign stud books which he recommended be added to the list of recognized stud books now appearing in the By-laws (said stud books having been recognized by the Bureau of Animals Industry and/or the Kennel Club (England), along with proposed special regulations relating to the registration of dogs imported to Canada and registered in any of these stud books.
- Mr. Biggar, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Mack and Mrs. Margeson had, by letter, expressed their approval of the proposed additions and special regulations, and Mr. Irving had also expressed his approval although expressing the view that the proposed regulations should be amended to afford greater protection for the Club's records where the accompanying certificate, for an imported dog, did not show the ownership of the importer.

After discussion it was unanimously agreed that:

- Application be made to the Chief Registration Officer for approval in connection with the addition of the following

stud books to the list of recognized stud books now set forth in Article XXVIII, Section 1 (b), of the Club's By-laws: South African Kennel Union (South Africa); Dansk Kennel Club (Denmark); Norsk Kennelklub (Norway); Raad van Beheer op Kynologisch Gebied in Nederland (Holland); Ente Nazionale Della Cinoitalia Italiana (Italy); Societe Centrale Canine pour l'Amelioration des Races de Chiens en France (France); Svenska Kennelklubben Stambok (Sweden); Hong Kong Kennel Club (Hong Kong); Union Cynologique Saint-Hubert (Belgium); Ceskoslovensky Kynologicky Svaz (Czechoslovakia); Osterreichischer Kynologen-Verband (Austria); German Stud Books: Boxers—Boxer-Zuchtbuch; Doberman Pinschers—Zuchtbuch der Fachschaft fur Dobermanpinscher; Great Danes—Stammbuch fur Deutsche Doggen; Rottweilers—Reichs-Zuchtbuch (Abteilung: Rottweiler); German Shepherd Dogs—Reichs-Zuchtbuch (Abteilung: Deutsche Schaferhunde); German Shorthaired Pointers—Zuchtbuch und Zuchtprüfungsstelle; Terriers—Reichs-Zuchtbuch Abteilung: Fachschaft fur Terrier e V.

- Application be made to the Chief Registration Officer for approval of the following special regulations to apply to the registration of any dog imported to Canada when such dog is registered in any of the stud books listed above: "A dog imported to Canada and registered in any of the stud books listed on the attached page shall be eligible for registration in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club provided that:

- A certificate of registration issued by an organization whose stud book is recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club accompanies the application for registration. Such certificate shall show all the information required for registration and must (except as hereinafter provided) indicate the ownership of the person who imported the dog. If the certificate does not include known pedigree to the minimum of three generations (14 ancestors), such certificate must be accompanied by a certified pedigree, issued by the same organization, showing known pedigree to the minimum of three generations (14 ancestors).
 - If the certificate of registration accompanying the application for registration does not show the ownership of the importer, the application and accompanying documents shall be referred to the Registration Committee who may require such evidence as it shall prescribe in connection with ownership of the dog before authorizing registration.
 - The importer submits a Canadian Kennel Club application for registration of individual dog, said application to be properly completed in every respect.
 - The dog must be identified in accordance with Article XXVII (Identification) of the By-laws of The Canadian Kennel Club.
 - The required registration fee accompanies the application.
 - The importer is not a person ineligible to use the recording services of The Canadian Kennel Club.
- (NOTE: Notwithstanding the foregoing, a dog, not born in Canada, imported into the United States from any country other than Canada, shall not be eligible for registration in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club, except as otherwise agreed between The American Kennel Club and The Canadian Kennel Club, until it has first been registered individually in the records of The American Kennel Club. This exclusion shall not apply, however, to any dog imported to Canada, by a resident of Canada, from any country other than the United States, where, for convenience in transportation, the dog is routed through the United States.)"

It was unanimously agreed that these applications be placed before Dr. Leslie by Mr. Monaghan acting on behalf of the Club.

2641 (2599). MINIATURE DACHSHUNDS

The Secretary reviewed correspondence with Mrs. Peter Van Brunt of Lake Placid, N.Y., Mrs. Smith-Rewse of England, and Directors Miss Hammond and Mr. Irving, with regard to the difficulty of importers supplying definite information on the weights of sire and dam of an imported dog, there being no records maintained either in the United States or England in this connection.

It was agreed that every effort should be made to comply with the Board's previous decision in connection with the registration of Miniature Dachshunds.

2644 (2584). OFFICE SURVEY

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mr. Irving who protested vigorously against any expenditure of funds for a survey of the office administration as referred to in Item No. 2584.

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mrs. Mack who asked to be recorded as being opposed to any survey of the office or job analysis being made if such a survey and analysis would cost the Club money, and stated that if the rest of the Board voted in favour of the survey, the entire Board should be notified before the survey is undertaken who the "qualified person" is to make the survey, what firm he represents, and what the entire fee would be.

Mr. Monaghan stated that the survey had been proposed in order to assist the Board in arriving at a proper salary schedule for the individual members of the staff, to determine what, if any, office procedures should be altered or installed in order to reduce costs, bring about maximum efficiency, and assist the staff in their duties, and what, if any, office equipment could be installed to advantage. Mr. Monaghan stated that the proposal to conduct a survey was not intended as a reflection on the staff.

It was unanimously agreed that the matter be referred to the Board at its annual meeting.

2645 (2607). ABBREVIATED SHOW REPORTS

Mr. Monaghan stated that:

- When the Board met on September 9th, he had served notice of his intention to ask the Board to consider the advisability of abbreviating show reports to the extent of reporting only dogs receiving "Winners" and higher awards;
- The cost of reporting show awards in "Dogs in Canada" in 1952 was approximately \$3,000, and having in mind the number of dogs exhibited in 1952, the cost per dog per show was approximately 21c;
- In his opinion the money thus saved could be used to publish other information of more value to breeders and exhibitors, such as more detailed information regarding dogs earning titles (name of breeder, sire and dam, etc.), and a system of informing breeders and exhibitors of the winning offspring

of sires and dams, information which he felt would point up the good producers.

Mr. Monaghan proposed and the Board unanimously agreed that this matter be referred to the Board at its next annual meeting.

2646 (1970). SUB-LEASE OF PART OF OFFICES

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that the lease between the Club and tenants of part of the Club's offices, entered into in 1951, expired on June 30th, 1954, and suggested that it would be helpful to the incoming Board to know whether there was any possibility of the present tenants renewing the lease for a further period to be agreed to between the Club and the tenants.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary discuss the matter with the present tenants and be prepared to report to the Board at its next annual meeting.

2647 (2584-2543). SALARIES

The Secretary reported that following consultation with the President and Second Vice-President, the entire Board was written with regard to increasing, by \$5.00 per week, the salary of Mrs. M. Overland. The Secretary reported that the following members of the Board had submitted their written approval of the increase: Mr. Williams, Mr. Irving, Mrs. Mack, Mrs. Margeon, Miss Hammond, Mr. Gostick and Mr. Monaghan.

The action taken was confirmed, and the Secretary was instructed to record the written replies received.

2648 (2612). "DOGS IN CANADA"

The Secretary read the following letters received since the special meeting of the Board on October 30th:

- (1) A letter from Director Mrs. Mack who was of the opinion that the services of Mr. McIntosh should be retained on a weekly basis until the end of the year, preferably until the annual meeting of the Board in February, and in the meantime the Publication Committee should endeavour to have available for the consideration of the Board at its annual meeting applications for the post of Editor, this in order that an appointment may be made while the Dominion-wide Board is in session.
- (2) A letter from Director Mr. Gostick who reserved comment on the matter of Mr. McIntosh's resignation pending receipt of a report of proceedings at the Board's special meeting of October 30th.
- (3) A letter from Mr. McIntosh, dated November 6th, tendering his resignation from the post of executive publisher (managing editor), said resignation to be effective November 13, 1953.
- (4) A letter from Mrs. Patricia Hearn, assistant to Mr. McIntosh, who, believing that Mr. McIntosh's resignation would entail increased work and responsibility for her, asked the Board to consider her application for an increase in salary of \$15.00 per week.

The Board discussed the letter received from Mrs. Hearn, and unanimously agreed that as the temporary arrangements ordered in connection with the magazine did not entail increased work or responsibility for Mrs. Hearn, the Board, while hoping that Mrs. Hearn would remain a member of the staff, did not see its way clear to change the present salary schedule.

Mr. Monaghan pointed out that it was now clear that the Secretary-Treasurer would temporarily hold the position of Managing Editor of "Dogs in Canada", as previously decided by the Board, and suggested that the Board now consider proper remuneration to the Secretary-Treasurer for the additional responsibility and work involved. With the Secretary absent from the meeting, the matter was discussed, and it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary be asked to keep a record of overtime work, that a report of this overtime be placed before the Board at its annual meeting, the members of the Board present, whether re-elected or not, to seek the new Board's co-operation in recompensing the Secretary for the additional work involved.

2649 (2596). SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Pamela B. Mack who sought the Board's ruling on her claim that a dog awarded Winners and Best of Opposite Sex should, when championship points are computed, be credited with having defeated any dogs, of the same sex, entered for "Specials Only".

The Board noted that the only specific reference to Best of Opposite Sex in Chapter 21 (Champions and Championship Points) read as follows: "SECTION 3. Best of Opposite Sex. In any breed where Best of Variety awards are required by these rules, the dog awarded Best of Opposite Sex in the breed will be credited with the highest point rating earned by any specimen of the same sex in the same breed at the show."

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that had the rules intended that the award of Best of Opposite Sex would have any bearing on the computation of championship points, then this rule would have been so worded as to take in all breeds, rather than being restricted to those breeds having Best of Variety awards.

The Secretary read a letter from a member who complained that information published in a local newspaper about the winnings of a particular dog contained misinformation, and attributed this to the owner of the dog. The member having asked that her name be not communicated to the owner of the dog in question, the Board unanimously agreed that it was not prepared to entertain the member's complaint unless a formal complaint was submitted without restriction as to informing the defendant of the name of the complainant.

The Secretary reported that, as instructed by the Board (Item No. 2596), he had written Mr. George Potts regarding a member's complaint that he had exhibited a dog before a judge for whom he had ring stewarded at the same show. The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Potts who reported that he had not officiated as ring steward at the show referred to by a member, but had placed arm bands on exhibitors at the ringside for a short time. A letter from Mrs. Mary Hart, Show Superintendent, corroborated Mr. Potts' statement. The Secretary was instructed to inform the member that according to information received from Mr. Potts and the Show Superintendent, Mr. Potts had not officiated as ring steward at the show referred to in her communication.

The Secretary read a letter from the show-giving club which referred to the provisions of the Dog Show Rules with regard to ring stewards exhibiting under judges for whom they had ring stewarded, at the same show, and expressed the hope that "more

rigid control of this matter can be expected in the future". Following discussion the Secretary was instructed to thank the club for its interest in the matter, and to state that its communication would be referred to the incoming Board of Directors with a suggestion that all show-giving clubs be asked, when they apply for dates, to take such action as may be necessary to see that the rules with regard to ring stewards are fully observed.

The Secretary read a letter from the show-giving club enquiring whether a show-giving club is liable for injury incurred by exhibitors or spectators, and if so, the best method of protecting the club in the event of claim. The Secretary was instructed to suggest to the show-giving club that they consult their solicitor.

The Secretary read a letter from Miss V. E. Meyers, Toronto, who enquired whether it would be permissible to offer a trophy, to be known as the Paragon Trophy, to be awarded to the Canadian owned Poodle (any variety) winning the greatest number of Groups in Canadian shows in 1954. Following discussion, it was unanimously agreed that such an offering would be permissible provided an announcement was made prior to the commencement of shows in 1954, such offering to be not regarded as an individual prize to be reported in premium lists.

The Secretary read a letter from W. J. Simpson, former President of the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club, requesting the Board's consideration of the Dates and Judges Committee's decision to not grant the date of April 24th to any show-giving club in Ontario because of the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada's scheduled championship show at Montreal on April 25th. The matter was left in the hands of the Committee when the Secretary reported that the date of June 12th, an alternative date selected by the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club, may be relinquished by the Ontario County Kennel Club (presently held as a priority date) in view of its application to hold a championship show in March.

Mr. Monaghan suggested that until the new Board of Directors decides on the policies and/or procedures to be followed in connection with the approval of judges, the Dates and Judges Committee should be asked to not approve judges for any shows or trials to be held after March 31st, 1954.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the Dates and Judges Committee be asked to not approve any judges for shows or trials to be held after March 31st, 1954."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

2650. ADJOURNMENT

It was unanimously agreed that this meeting of the Board should reconvene at the call of the Second Vice-President in order to deal with the President's recommendation on a particular file being referred to the President for review and recommendation, and any other matters then requiring the Board's attention.

At 10:45 p.m. it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, duly seconded and carried unanimously:

"THAT, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourn to reconvene at the call of the Second Vice-President."

2651.—The meeting of the Board of Directors which adjourned on November 16th, 1953, to reconvene at the call of the Second Vice-President, reconvened at the call of the Second Vice-President on Tuesday, December 1st, 1953, at 7:30 p.m. The Second Vice-President, Walter Brown, presided. Directors present were: S. Back, G. P. Davies, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins and W. H. MacKendrick.

2652 (2633). ELECTION MATTERS

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mr. Monaghan who suggested that when the election results are known, the names of the elected members should be communicated to the press in order that members throughout the country would learn promptly of the results of the election and need not await receipt of the issue of "Dogs in Canada" in which the results are reported. The Board unanimously approved Mr. Monaghan's suggestion, and the Secretary was directed to be governed accordingly.

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mr. Monaghan who suggested that the election commission be asked to tabulate, and include in their official report of the election voting, the votes, by electoral zones, for the offices of President, Vice-President, and Second Vice-President. The Board unanimously approved Mr. Monaghan's suggestion, and the Secretary was directed to communicate such a request to the Election Commission.

Following discussion it was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would ask the Election Commission to arrange for Mr. Shepherd, of their staff, to personally tabulate the votes.

2653 (2552). PRINTING OF DOG SHOW RULES

The Secretary:

- (a) Reported that the existing supply of printed copies of the Dog Show Rules was now exhausted;
- (b) Stated that there would be no amendments to the Dog Show Rules during 1954;
- (c) Tabled a quotation on the printing of the Dog Show Rules in two styles:
 - (i) 500 copies in present style (6" x 9")—6 point type—\$160.00;
 - (ii) 500 copies in pocket folder style (4" x 9")—8 point type—\$190.00.

It was unanimously agreed that the larger type face would be more easily read, and the pocket style would be easier to handle. The Secretary was, therefore, directed to order 500 copies in 8 point type in the pocket folder style.

The matter of whether a charge should be made for extra copies supplied to show-giving clubs and for copies supplied to other persons on request was ordered referred to the annual meeting of the Board.

2655 (2636-2616). FINANCIAL MATTERS AND MEMBERSHIPS

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the Secretary be and is hereby authorized to inform any member having an overdue account with "Dogs in Canada" that renewal of their membership will not be accepted until their account is paid or satisfactory arrangements for payment have been completed."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

2656 (2648). DOGS IN CANADA

The Secretary stated that in the past the annual financial statements were received from the auditors about January 20th, and pointed out that if the February issue was mailed at its usual mailing date (January 31st) it is extremely doubtful that members would receive their copies, in which the annual financial statements would be published, in time to have an opportunity of studying the statements before attending the annual general meeting on February 3rd.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, the January and February issues of 'Dogs in Canada' be combined into a single issue to be mailed as soon as possible after the financial statements for 1953 are received from the auditors, date of mailing to be not later than January 24th."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

2659 (2644). OFFICE SURVEY

The Secretary read a letter from Director Mr. Monaghan who advised that since the Board met on November 16th he had had a conversation with the Chief of that Branch of the Civil Service Commission which does the overall work in connection with job analysis, appraisals, qualifications, salary range, etc., and said official would be pleased to arrange for one of his senior officials to make a survey for the Club on his next trip to Toronto, the official to remain over an extra day for the purpose, the cost likely being nothing more than the official's out of pocket expenses for the day. Mr. Monaghan asked to be advised if the Board authorized him to make the necessary arrangements.

Mr. Monaghan stated that when the survey was originally proposed, it was intended that the report and recommendations of the person making the survey would be forwarded to the entire Board, and any action resulting from the report would only follow after the views of the entire Board had been obtained.

The Chairman stated that he was opposed to a survey of the kind proposed, and that he felt it preferable for a committee of the Board, who would be familiar with the nature of the Club's operations, to make a survey with recommendations to the Board.

The Secretary referred to the resolution adopted by the Board (Item 2613) regarding the placing of advertisements, early in December, seeking applicants for the post of Managing Editor of 'Dogs in Canada.' It was understood that the Committee would supply the copy for the advertisements in order that the advertisements could be placed as previously decided.

2664 (2412). CHRISTMAS BONUSES

The Chairman pointed out that it is customary for the Board at its last meeting before Christmas to decide what action will be taken with regard to Christmas Bonuses for members of the staff.

After discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Back, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, the following Christmas bonuses be given as an appreciation of services based on the length of service to the Club: employees with more than two years service to receive \$25.00, those with more than one year but less than two years to receive \$15.00, the other staff employees to receive \$10.00 each; the office caretaker to receive \$5.00; the postman \$2.00."

FOR THE MOTION: All present.

Motion carried unanimously.

How To Tattoo Your Dog

RECORDS, now kept for 25 years, show that every popular breed of dog has been successfully tattooed. The tattoo marks placed in the ear, or in the flank or the lip, make it possible to find a satisfactory place to tattoo any breed, and the marks remain permanent and legible the lifetime of the dog. The instructions are simple, but must be

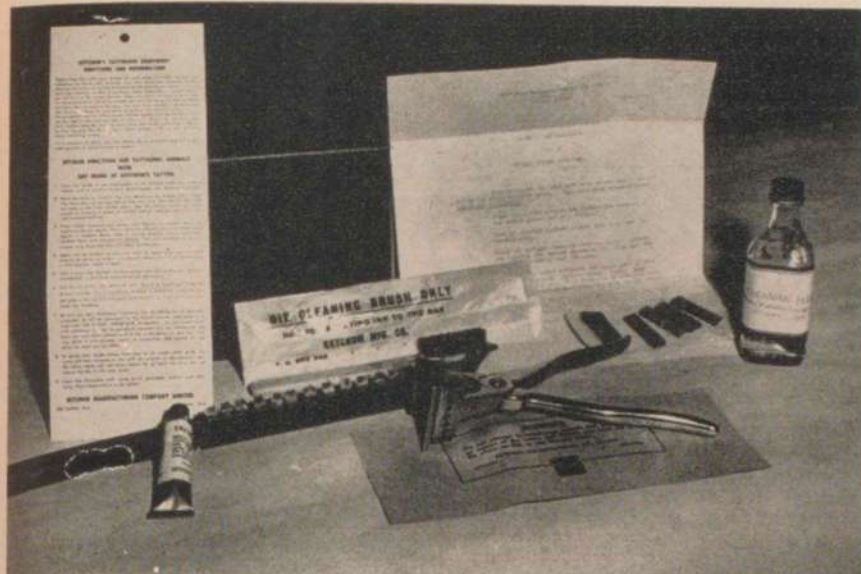
nickel plated pliers, your registration letters, the year letter, 1 leather stripper, 4 rubber strippers, a tube of Ketchum's black paste tattoo ink (unless you prefer green paste ink), a brush to clean the letters and figures, a small bottle of carbon tetrachloride, instructions, (see introduction picture).

Whether a new set or one you have

to shove the first one down on the pins. Thick corrugated paper may be used instead of the second rubber stripper. (See illustrations No. 2 and 3.)

No. 3. Carefully prepare the area to be tattooed by (A) removing all hair with an electric or hand clipper (not scissors, unless you take great care). See illustration 3A. (B) Wipe off the area with carbon tetrachloride as is provided with the set. (See illustration 3B). Do not use coal oil or turpentine, as they will affect the ink. If you do not have carbon tetrachloride, the next best thing is alcohol or in an emergency you may use soap and water. With the latter, be sure the area is dry before you start to tattoo.

No. 4. Put a very small amount of liquid or paste ink right on the area to be tattooed—don't smear it all over so that you cannot see the veins. See illustration 4. Also, put a small amount over the the pin points of the letters and figures which protrude beyond the rubber strippers. Be care-

followed exactly as outlined below. (Over and over again a breeder reporting failure, has had complete success by finding out where he had gone contrary to the instructions.) The basic method is the same for any location.

Tattoo the pups when they are two to three months old for best results. The marks will grow with the puppy.

The ear is the most popular, and the easiest to do. One need only choose a spot which is usually to be found in the centre of the ear quite close to the head.

Should you decide to tattoo the flank, you will need an assistant and it requires a little more care.

If you would like to lip tattoo, you will need a pair of specially designed tattoo pliers, called Model 50DL.

Always use a special tattoo ink—no other type of ink will withstand the cleansing action of the blood stream.

The first time you use your set check contents and read all directions carefully. You should have—1 pair of

already used, be sure you have (A) the year letter you need; (B) the ink; (C) Clippers, electric or hand; (D) Carbon Tetrachloride; (E) a table or bench of a convenient height and size on which to set your pup, and to lay your pliers, with the carbon tetrachloride and ink, so that you can reach them.

Read the directions carefully, they are as follows:

No. 1. Put the letters and figures through a wash of the carbon tetrachloride to be sure they are clean, then place them in the pliers, as shown in illustration No. 1. You will note that these dies can only be inserted in one way. The slot for the lock bar goes to the front of the pliers. Be sure you have the right letters and numbers by testing them first on a paper, or the blotter that is provided.

No. 2. Place the rubber strippers over the letters and figures to prevent ear from sticking to the pin points. This is done by placing one over the letters and figures, squeeze down, take a second stripper, place over the first, squeeze down, and remove the second. The purpose of the second stripper is

ful that the ear is held firmly so that there are no wrinkles in it.

No. 5. With a quick firm motion, squeeze pliers and pierce the ear. Release immediately. With the thumb and forefinger massage more tattoo ink on the tattooed area. See illustrations 5 and 6. Some type of ears have a tendency to bleed, and it is the cleansing action of this bleeding which washes away the ink and causes faint or obliterated marks. **It is important that you continue to massage the ink into the pin holes until all danger of bleeding is past.** (Since the previous printing of these instructions January 1953, we have found, by careful recording of tattoo markings of dogs, that in every case where the ink was carefully rubbed into pin holes, until and after all bleeding had subsided that the marks were 100%.

Do not wipe off the excess tattoo ink, or clean the ear in any way. Simply allow the ink to dry, and disappear. This will take about ten days. When the surface ink has worn away, you will have a clear and legible mark. This will take about three weeks. See illustration 7. Clean the letters and figures well, using the brush provided for this purpose, both before and after using. Oil the pliers occasionally and keep the equipment stored in a dry place.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR FLANK TATTOOING. There should be no difficulty in tattooing in this location, but more care must be taken. You must have an assistant, who will hold the dog in a comfortable position, stretching his leg until the skin of the flank is quite taut, but **not uncomfortable**. Follow the regular instructions in every way, continue to hold the dog after you rub the ink in so that he cannot move his leg until the ink has dried slightly. This should be about five minutes. If you allow the dog to walk around immediately he will probably rub the ink off on the other side of the flank.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR LIP TATTOOING. Lip tattooing is completely successful, but requires a special size letter, as supplied in a model 50DL. The method is the same, except that you must be sure that the lower lip is held firmly, and is completely dry and free of saliva, both before and after tattooing.

Recommendation — We recommend that any dog, but particularly large eared dogs, be tattooed in both ears—the year letter and number in one ear—the registration letters in the other. This will allow you to leave a blank space between your letters and figures, and the resulting marks are especially clear. See illustration 8.

ROYAL AWARD

W. H. Pym Receives Queen's Coronation Medal

An honor unique in Canadian dogdom was last year conferred on William H. "Bill" Pym of Vancouver.

In connection with the award of the Coronation Medal, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II had approved the establishment of a category for national organizations in the charitable, professional, labour and other fields, and through the Under Secretary of State for Canada, the Canadian Kennel Club was asked to name one person to receive the Coronation Medal. Acting on the recommendation of then President V. W. Williams, the Board of Directors had no hesitation in naming Mr. Pym as recipient of the Coronation Medal in recognition of his twenty years of faithful service on the Board of Directors of the Club, and other services rendered the Club and Canadian dogdom over a much longer period.

Born in Lindsay, Ontario, in 1888, Bill Pym was used to having hunting dogs around the house throughout his childhood. He began exhibiting Bulldogs in Calgary, where he had gone to sell insurance, in 1910.

In 1922, a judge for a dog show in Saskatoon became ill and Mr. Pym was asked to take his place. From then on, he was kept constantly on the run, judging in all the principal cities in the United States, from coast to coast in Canada, Alaska and in Hawaii. He officiated as judge of Best in Show at the 1939 renewal of the "Morris & Essex", and on numerous occasions since 1932 has "donned the ermine" at the internationally known Westminster Kennel Club show in Madison Square Gardens, New York.

This writer recalls one occasion when, following the annual meetings of the C.K.C. which Mr. Pym had attended as a member of the Board, he judged at the Westminster Kennel Club show the following week. From New York he proceeded to Edmonton to keep a judging engagement. He moved from Edmonton to Tucson, Arizona, to keep another engagement; then on to a judging engagement in California, before reaching his home at Vancouver. All of this took place in such a short period of time that one could only wonder at the marvels of modern transportation.

Mr. Pym's last judging engagement in Canada was at the National Kennel Club's show held in conjunction with the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto last November.

Mr. Pym's activities in connection with dog shows have not been restricted to judging, for he has bred and exhibited dogs of many breeds, and has acted in many capacities at dog shows. For some years he has been Chairman of the Dog Show Committee of the Pacific National Exhibition at Van-

couver, whose two annual shows are a lasting credit to the dog game.

Whether it was his sponsorship in 1933 of the present method of determining championships which replaced an antiquated and much criticised method in effect prior to that time, whether it was his activity in concert with our present B.C. Director and others which led to the adoption in 1934 of field trial rules for Gundogs thus paving the way for this highly desirable type of doggy activity to come within the orbit of C.K.C. operations, or any

acts of C.K.C. legislation or formulation of C.K.C. policy, all were sponsored or supported by Mr. Pym with the ultimate objective of a bigger and better Club, and for the greater enjoyment and benefit of dog fanciers generally.

As a reporter in the *Vancouver Sun* said: "For the 65-year-old city insurance executive and director of the P.N.E. dog show who has spent his life presenting awards to the world's finest dogs, has himself received a Royal award in recognition of his work."

SPORTSMEN'S DOG SHOWS EXPAND

TWO international all-breed Dog shows will be among the features of the 1954 Canadian National Sportsmen's Show which will be held in the Coliseum and Industry Wing during the last four days of this big springtime exhibition, March 17, 18, 19 and 20.

Indications are that this will be one of the largest Dog Shows ever held in Canada and some of the most outstanding and prize dogs of this continent will be on display.

The Canadian National Sportsmen's Show, which in seven years has grown to be the biggest event of its kind on this continent, is owned and operated by the Toronto Anglers' and Hunters' Association. Profits of the Dog Shows will be used to establish a Seeing-Eye Dog Fund for the purchase of Seeing-Eye Dogs for worthy blind people in Canada.

an extent that the Danish section of the male choir obviously came in too soon with its baritone chorale.

The querulous tones of an Oboe d'Amore in some of the accompaniments proved tedious, despite the lame explanation of the program notes that it was "in season". Improper use of this instrument should be considered unseasonable at all times.

Even the standard of music apprecia-

tion as revealed by fragments of lobby conversation was of a calibre with the performance. Pseudo-technical nonsense about high and low scores from one group was matched by the general bandying about of another misunderstood musical word used incorrectly in the plural, for actually there was but little composition that could be recognized as counterpoint. The Six Essentials of A Judge of Dogs

By

MACDONALD DALEY

THE ideal dog judge, that *nonpareil*, if ever he were to exist, would be an all-rounder capable of placing in order, to the satisfaction of juries of specialists in each breed, to whom he would explain the logic of his placings, classes of specimens of every one of the recognised breeds of dogs.

Several living judges, of various nationalities, are probably, in their own estimation, capable of passing such a test. A few judges, in the opinion of their peers, come close to the ideal.

What are the physical and mental requirements which go to the make-up of a judge of such a calibre? How does he attain them?

A judge, to be first-class, must have:—

1. An eye for an animal.
2. A knowledge of the features peculiar to a breed, and the historical reason for these features being desirable.
3. A capacity for decision, the ability to make up his mind, and moreover to know *why* it is being made up in that way.
4. A methodical approach to his task, so that he can make it plain to the spectators what he is about.
5. Considerable physical fitness, so that tiredness as the day wears on does not interfere with—
6. The faculty of intense mental concentration, which allows no outside consideration to interfere with the job in hand.

Let me enlarge on, and explain, these six qualities.

An eye for an animal, it is often said, is something with which a man has to be born. I prefer to say that it is most often found among those who have been associated with animals, worked with animals, studied animals, from childhood days. Thus you will find that a boy who has grown up among horses, and knows how to differentiate between the good ones and the bad ones, does not take a lot of teaching to acquire an eye for a dog or the ability to judge a cow. Or the other way about. . . .

The best all-round judges in the history of dog showing have always come from the ranks of the men who buy and sell dogs. They have acquired an infallible knowledge of a dog's quality and value because they had to be infallible.

They had to be right because if they were wrong they would so swiftly be "in the red"—it wouldn't do, for instance, to spend £500 on a dog, to fill an order for a wealthy client, if that client was not sure to agree that the dog was worth that sum and a bit of profit.

Your amateur might afford that sort of luxury once in a while—could spend his £500 on a dog which somehow didn't look quite as good when he got him home. But your man who was to make

a living out of dogs could not afford a blunder.

It is well known among horsemen that the main difference between the amateur enthusiast and the horse-coper is that the copier, with more horses going in and out of his yard in a month than the amateur handles in a lifetime, achieves more knowledge of horses in the end of his little finger than the amateur has in his whole body.

Such a horse dealer will tell you: "My eye is my partner, my purse is my backer." And so it is in dogs—much practice, on many different animals, polishes the judgment.

It is often suggested that no judge can be really capable of judging every breed, and that it is impossible for him to pick the actual best in a ring of, say, fifty different varieties, such as one sometimes gets at a big stake class or "champion of champions" final at a big show.

Quite apart from the wisecracking answer, that it is unnecessary for a man to have laid an egg to know a bad one when he sees it, and that it is similarly unnecessary for a judge to have owned a breed to know it, there is the logical and true explanation of what happens when a proficient judge takes on one of these big variety classes.

If there are fifty dogs in the ring, he should see a hundred! Behind each dog, as he judges it, he should envisage the ideal — which usually means the shade of the greatest champion of the breed he remembers from the past. It is against the outline of such a "ghost" that he should judge each exhibit.

Knowledge of breed features, and of historical reason for them, is naturally an affair of book-learning, and here, of course, it is possible for the student with little practical experience to learn parrot-wise, and talk as if he knew a dog.

But a man can no more hope to be the complete judge, on book lore alone, than he could hope properly to judge, say, a Pointer without knowing the

reason why the original breeders demanded a "dished" face and an uptilted nose.

How long does it take, then, to acquire this knowledge? That depends on the man. "After all" (as I sometimes say to old-timers who sneer at a comparative youngster who has been showing dogs for only ten years or so, and is thus, in their opinion, a "mushroom" expert) "it takes only seven years study to make a doctor. If an enthusiast can't apply himself to becoming a judge of at least one breed of a dog in that time, then he had better thrust his moronic skull into some different and less difficult pursuits, like golf."

Decision, by which one means a crisp confident, not too-long-delayed making-up of the mind, is the third of the virtues I have listed, and perhaps is best illustrated in inverse, by telling of the lengths to which indecision can go.

To continue to be a good judge, a judge must continue to judge. A long lay-off from activity is no more good for him than a long lay-off from activity is good for a pugilist.

A judge can lose his eye as a boxer can lose his precision of punch. He can become flabby-minded as the boxer becomes flabby-waisted. He may — worst of all — lose the capacity for decision.

There were examples of such deterioration when championship shows were resumed in 1946. Several judges, recalled because of their pre-war reputations, showed, by their inept and unconvincing manner in the ring, that lack of practice had robbed them of assurance, method, style and even "eye". Some of them panicked—and the judge who panics is lost.

A wonderful story of the lengths to which panic and indecision can go comes from the period between the wars.

This central figure, now dead, was a well-known breeder, but none too convincing a judge in public. He was rash enough to accept an appointment to judge a breed not his own.

Because he was so well known in his other capacity, he received an enormous entry.

On the night before the show this judge, some of the others, and the show secretary foregathered. At the end of the evening the judge called the secretary aside and said: "I'm not going to judge."

"But why?"

"Because," he said, "they tell me there are over twenty dogs in the first class alone."

He was persuaded to sleep on it, and the following morning he entered the ring. A few minutes later a messenger arrived in the secretary's office and said: "Mr. So-and-so wants you in his ring at once."

The secretary, when he reached the ring, found the judge gazing blankly at a concourse of puppies and novices circling round him.

"What's wrong?" asked the secretary. "I can't start," whispered the judge. "I tell you, they all look the same. . . ."

The secretary was a man of resource. He stopped the circling dogs, took the judging book, and walked round the ring, saying "Aren't you all here? Who's missing? We'll have to start anyhow—exhibitors can't expect shows to wait for ever for them."

Then he walked back to the judge. "There you are," he said, handing back the judging book. "I've ticked off the best five. If you play about with them, and ignore the others, you can't go wrong."

All very improper, of course—but in the end, I should say, not a lot worse (since the secretary was quite a judge in his own account!) than would have been achieved by the indecisive gentleman working *au solitaire*.

Once, too, in the days when it was permitted to enter champions at sanction shows, I watched indecision go to such lengths that there was literally no decision at all.

Two champions of different breeds were entered, and met in the first variety class.

Long and carefully the judge pondered. "If only," you could almost hear him thinking, "I didn't know that each of them was a champion. . . ."

At last—decision. He turned to the ringside.

"Ladies and gentlemen," he said. "I cannot separate these dogs, I award them equal first."

And equal first they were, right through to equal best-in-show.

Method, the fourth of my requirements for a judge, usually determines whether he is to interest his ringside or is merely to bore and confuse them. In other words, whether the spectator is to know "what the judge is up to." Method does more to give drama to a show from the spectator's viewpoint, than any other factor.

The need for physical fitness, I feel, explains itself. Some day I will wear a pedometer and find out how many miles a judge really does walk, in addition to his bending and stretching exercise, in the course of a day's judging of a dozen breeds at a sultry summer show.

Only by intense concentration, the sixth of the virtues, can a judge become impervious to the outside considerations which arise.

He must be deaf to applause and cajolery.

He must be hard of heart to his friends

and determinedly just to those he dislikes.

He must not be swayed by a pretty face (in a handler) or impressed by wealth and title.

He must not seek popularity and he must not seek the notoriety which comes of being too different.

He must, indeed, have all the negative virtues except blindness!

The ideal judge would will himself into a type of trance in which he is oblivious of everything save the dogs, in which the handlers do not exist for him above their waist level, in which the ring is peopled only by dogs steered by a few pairs of flannels, a pair of breeches, a few skirts. . . .

On occasion a judge will concentrate to such an extent that this trance is to all intents and purposes what happens to him, and then how annoying to encounter at the bar in the evening, the stranger who says: "Tell me what you thought of my dog," expecting you to remember him and from him the dog. Who regards you with black disbelief when you tell him that you never noticed him, but if he will fetch his dog from the bench you will remember that.

Procedure on Amendments

ENQUIRIES reaching your Secretary's desk indicate that many members wish to be better informed on the action which may be taken at the annual general meeting on February 3rd with regard to the proposed amendments published in the December issue of "Dogs in Canada". For the information of those members who will be able to attend the meeting, and for the information of all members who will later have an opportunity of expressing their views in writing, there follows a complete quotation of Article XXXVIII (Amendments) of our By-laws. Section 4 indicates the action which may be taken at the annual general meeting, and Section 5 indicates the procedure which will be followed after the annual general meeting.

ARTICLE XXXVIII AMENDMENTS

1. These By-laws, and all other rules and regulations of the Club, may be amended by a majority affirmative vote on a referendum ballot. All amendments to these By-laws approved by the Minister shall be effective immediately. Amendments to any rules and regulations shall be effective sixty days after the next annual general meeting. The procedure to be followed in connection with proposed amendments shall be as set out in the following sections of this Article.

2. Notice of all proposed amendments shall be in writing and shall be mailed or delivered to the Secretary so as to be received by him not later than October 15th. Each proposed amendment must be signed by no less than five ordinary members of the Club and shall be on a special form obtainable from the Secretary, and all sections of the form must be completed. On the form the proposers shall designate, by name and address, the one member to whom the Secretary shall promptly acknowledge receipt of the proposed amendment and with whom the Secretary shall correspond as hereinafter provided. Said member shall, for the purposes of this article, be known as the "principal proposer".

3. All proposed amendments received by the Secretary on or before October 15th shall be published in the official organ or otherwise printed and mailed to all ordinary members on or before December 10th.

4. All proposed amendments shall then be placed on the agenda of the next following annual general meeting of the Club at which time the members present may, at their discretion, discuss each proposed amendment, suggest (by affirmative vote of those present) revisions in the original proposed amendment, and indicate by vote whether they endorse the proposed amendment in its original form.

5. As soon as possible following the

annual general meeting, all ordinary members shall be provided with a verbatim copy of the minutes of the annual general meeting so far as said minutes relate to all proposed amendments placed before the meeting, or a brief resume of the discussion on said proposed amendments, of any suggested changes and a record of the voting on original proposed amendments and revised amendments (if revised). With the publication of said verbatim report or resume there shall also be published a notice requesting interested members to submit their written opinions with regard to the original proposed amendments and any changes suggested at the annual general meeting, such written opinions to be received by the Secretary not later than June 30th.

6. As soon as possible after June 30th, the Secretary shall provide each member of each Amendments Committee with a copy of each original proposed amendment, a copy of the verbatim minutes of the annual general meeting relating to the proposed amendments and a copy of all written opinions received from the members.

7. On or before September 10th next, each Amendments Committee shall submit a report to the Secretary, which report shall include a record of the vote of the Committee on each original proposed amendment (total number for and the total number against), and any suggested changes which a majority of the Committee feel should be passed on to the principal proposer.

8. As soon as possible after September 10th, the Secretary shall forward the following to each principal proposer:

- (a) A copy of all written opinions received in connection with the proposed amendment for which said member has been designated "principal proposer";
- (b) A copy of the result of the deliberations of the Amendments Committee on that proposed amendment;
- (c) Any revisions suggested by the Amendments Committee.

9. On or before October 25th next, each principal proposer, after having consulted those members who sponsored the proposed amendment of which he was designated principal proposer, shall advise the Secretary, by registered mail, whether:

- (a) The proposed amendment is withdrawn (if so, the proposed amendment shall not appear on the referendum ballot); or,
- (b) The proposed amendment, as originally submitted, to appear on the referendum ballot; or,
- (c) The proposed amendment, as revised by the Amendments Committee, is to appear on the referendum ballot instead of the original proposed amendment.

Where the Secretary does not receive written notice from the principal proposer, as provided above, before

November 1st, the original proposed amendment shall appear on the referendum ballot.

10. After November 1st, the Secretary shall arrange for the referendum ballots to be printed. Each proposed amendment shall be numbered and space provided for each member to indicate whether his vote is for or against each proposed amendment. Following each proposed amendment, the following shall appear:

- (a) the names of those members sponsoring the amendment, first name to be that of the principal proposer;
- (b) if the proposed amendment is that originally submitted, the names of the members of the Amendments Committee for or against the proposed amendment;
- (c) if the proposed amendment is the amendment revised by the Amendments Committee, a statement to that effect.

11. Only those ordinary members in good standing at June 30th of the current year shall be entitled to vote on such proposed amendments. A referendum ballot on proposed amendments shall be distributed along with, and at the same time, as the ballots in connection with the election of Officers, Directors, etc., and only referendum ballots received by the Election Commission on or before the deadline for receipt of election ballots (see Article XII, Section 11 of the By-laws) shall be counted. The Election Commission shall forthwith, after the last day for receiving referendum ballots, open the envelopes and proceed to count the votes. On or before the 28th day of December immediately following the closing of the balloting, or as soon thereafter as possible, the Election Commission shall furnish the Secretary with a report of the votes cast for and against each proposed amendment.

12. The report of the Election Commission on the balloting on proposed amendments shall be placed before the next following annual general meeting of the Club.

13. Following the annual general meeting application shall be made to the Minister for approval of such proposed amendments to these By-laws as received a majority of affirmative votes.

14. Should the Minister notify the Club that he is not prepared to approve of any of the amendments to these By-laws as approved by majority affirmative vote, the Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a committee to interview responsible officials of the Minister's Department. The Committee shall have the power to revise amendments in order that they may receive Ministerial approval, however, any amendment when reworded must not be contrary to the intention of the amendment as approved by majority affirmative vote on the referendum ballot. ments shall have the same effect as if they had been approved by majority affirmative vote on the referendum ballot, and shall become effective on Ministerial approval.

15. Upon receipt of a certificate from the Department of Agriculture certifying to the approval of amendments to these By-laws as approved by majority affirmative vote or as subsequently revised, the Secretary shall, in the next succeeding issue of the official organ, or by postage prepaid, advise the members of the amendments so approved.

16. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Article, whenever, in the opinion of a majority of the Board of Directors, an emergency exists and early amendment of an existing By-law or Rule is considered imperative in order to remove, or deal with, the emergency, the Board of Directors, by majority recorded vote, shall have the power to order a special referendum ballot. All ordinary members in good standing at the date of the decision to so conduct a special referendum ballot shall receive thirty days notice, by mail, postage prepaid, of the exact proposed amendment to appear on the ballot. All ordinary members in good standing as at the date of the mailing of the referendum ballots shall be entitled to vote. The Election Commission shall handle the mailing, receipt and counting of the ballots, and shall deliver a report of the result of the balloting as soon as possible after balloting closes, which shall be twelve o'clock noon, twenty-one days following the day on which ballots were mailed to those eligible to vote (if a Sunday, twelve o'clock noon on Monday immediately following Sunday). If an amendment to the By-laws and a majority of voting members vote for the amendment, the Secretary shall promptly submit application for approval to the Minister. The provisions of Section 14 above may apply, if necessary, in connection with an amendment to the By-laws. If an amendment not requiring Ministerial approval and said amendment is approved by majority affirmative vote, said amendment shall be effective thirty days following receipt by the Secretary of the report from the Election Commission. The provisions of Section 15 above shall also apply.

GROOM UP SHOWS NOT ONLY EXHIBITS

This article is plain snobbery and I apologise at the outset.

However, I was delighted to see so many of my doggy colleagues hiding behind boiled shirts during the final judging at the recent Winter Fair Dog Show in Toronto. We have all become much too slack about external appearances and our dog shows have lost ground because the uninitiated can only judge by what they see.

It was not always like this. Mr. William Pym writes me from Vancouver: "Reference to old photographs will disclose that the average exhibitor dressed for a dog show as he would for the Queen's Plate at Woodbine." Further on in the letter he adds: "It was the bounden duty of members of local clubs to assist with the decoration

of the dog show building, and our so-called best citizens were not afraid to do their share. In other words, dog shows were important events."

After some years in the wilderness, the dogs have at last returned to the Royal Winter Fair, to the mutual benefit of both parties. For this important social event lacked a vital contribution, and the dog fancy lost prestige through being excluded.

Essential contributions are made in England and the United States by all classes of the community, Wingfield Digby's and Rockefellers joining with John Doe and Joe Doakes to contribute from their resources of money, knowledge, enthusiasm, or all three, to the one main purpose which is the improvement of canine stock.

A healthy Dog Fancy should not only be democratic but also representative. In order to achieve this end it may be necessary to hold, in addition to the more enjoyable informal gatherings, certain events which in the summer imitate, as does the U.S. Morris and Essex, a smart garden party, and also indoor winter displays such as the one under discussion.

It seems that an attempt to introduce an element of ceremony into some dog shows cannot help but assist the whole fancy. In this the Royal Winter Fair, the C.N.E., and the Sportsmens Shows are already pointing the way. But in Canada we still lack a garden party event.

In a previous article I mentioned the decoration of benches by breeders and their clubs. This does so much to lighten the drabness of the average dog show, for benches, however well constructed, are not in themselves objects of beauty. May I congratulate those Canadian breed clubs for dogs of British origin, which took such splendid advantage last year of the opportunities offered by the Coronation.

Finally, I firmly believe that when we exhibitors have spent the day in congenial and comfortable surroundings what the judges have done or have failed to do will matter less for then we could always console ourselves with the thought that they might have been blinded by the splendor of the decorations.

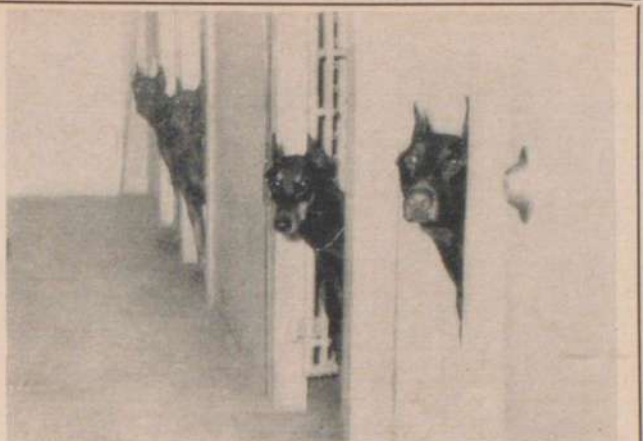
