The Editor's Mailbag

Purely as an onlooker and no longer a breeder I can sit back and enjoy my dogs—enjoy the offspring when they come to call—listen by the hour to “how really very clever they are” and, as an onlooker observe some of the comments from the public.

Shows have, I believe, become rather frightening to the average person—in fact they completely frighten away many a novice who has rather timidly come forth with probably a very good dog but without knowledge in showmanship and so goes down to a better handler. This feeling spreads quickly into our public as they search for a friendly and better sporting atmosphere at a show. High tension penetrates quickly—also to the dog.

Adding up the questions asked me in the past when selling a pup, the one outstanding is that asked by the novice approaching the responsibility of owning a well bred dog. “What is my dog going to look like when he or she grows older? May I see the parents?” English cockers are a late maturing breed.

For this coming Specialty Show it seemed to me a fitting gesture for the public that we show some of the older dogs who are not up to ring standards now but still running well in the field in spite of middle age spread, and being handsome, comfortable fellas for companions.

Members of the English Cocker Club of Ontario have come forth with eight Canadian champions over five years of age for the cover of January *Dogs in Canada*. They will be seen at the Specialty Show, Sportsman's Show, March 18th and 19th, 1955.

A Cocker Owner's Impressions of an English Championship Show

IN THE Spring I was present at the Manchester Show. It was held at the end of March, and is one of the largest Shows in England. It took on a special significance this year, as the world-famous Crufts had been cancelled at short notice the previous month.

The total number of dogs entered reached the astounding (to me) total of 2,567, and this included 153 Cocker Spaniels! These were all English Cockers, as the American Cocker is almost unknown in the British Isles.

What a wonderful sight it was to see bench upon bench of Cockers! All superbly groomed and all looking confident of success. To one who has only shown in Canada, the sight of a score of dogs in the ring for a single class was both challenging and frightening, but it did not seem to worry the exhibitors — or their dogs!

It took six hours of continuous judging in two rings before the final Challenge Certificates for the breed were awarded, and I came away thinking happily about dogs—especially Cockers!

Quo Vadis

By MRS. A. R. SACRE

THERE has been a good deal of comment lately among English Cocker breeders on the subject of size, weight and coat, among the comments an excellent article in one of our American Dog Magazines.

It appears that the American breeders of English Cockers are talking of increasing the weight (from 25 to 28 pounds as in England), up to 30 to 36 pounds for males and 28 to 34 pounds for females.

The height question is another point coming under review, while it must be agreed that you cannot judge a dog by the tape measure, it is a fact that over a great many years the height of the most typical cockers at the shoulder has been 15½ to 16½ inches, however, it must be remembered that the general conformity of the dog is of equal importance, and the greatest of all English Cocker Breeders, Mr. H. S. Lloyd says that measurement between the bottom of the upper lip to the tip of the withers should equal that between the withers and the root of the tail, and the withers to the ground.

It may be that the larger extreme of height could be desirable in this country for hunting dogs, due to the rough country, but even so the standard should not be changed to fit the dog, since by doing so speed would be sacrificed.

On the subject of coat it seems that some judges and breeders are completely ignoring the standard, which says the English Cocker should be well-feathered but not so profusely as to hide the true lines and interfere with his field work.

When people watching group judging, wonder why there are two American Cockers in the ring, because the English Cocker has such a heavy coat that it looks like an American, then it is high time for the judges and breeders to read the Standard again.

Anybody can breed dogs and change the standard to fit that which they breed, but it needs real skill to breed a dog to fit the standard that has been laid down by generations of people who have forgotten more than most of us ever knew.

Since people are always inclined to consider the winners as fair samples of the breed, the judges have a heavy responsibility to see that these winners are not only up to their personal idea of the breed, but are as near to the laid down standard as possible.

The Cocker Spaniel in America has already undergone one change, and that to such an extent that those breeding the English Cocker had to press for a division of Breeds in order to maintain the distinct English type. Having won this distinction for heavens sake do let us keep it, and try and breed in North America a true English Cocker.

New American Size Rule

IT is with some sense of shock that I have just been reading of proposals made by an American committee, that weight standards for the English cocker in the United States should be 30 lb. to 36 lb. for males, and 28 lb. to 34 lb. for females. I write before I know if these proposals have come to fruition. If they have, I hope our transatlantic friends will cease to talk about their English cockers. They will have evolved a new breed, needing a new name.

The standard of the English cocker in England calls for a weight of 25 lb. to 28 lb. It has been maintained as such (and not always easily) by generations of British breeders ever since the chaotic classification of spaniels was sorted out some 60 years ago.

So one shudders to read this comment from America: "Many breeds are finding their standard example dwarfed by large specimens which are fine animals but definitely outsize. Some have changed their standards to fit the new dog. Others are trying to fit the dog to the standard. What happens to the English cocker is up to the breeders."

This is dog breeding made easy—and runs to anarchy. We will be hearing next, at the opposite end of the scale, that because it is hard to breed good big danes and wolfhounds, little 'uns will be quite acceptable. To get a proper idea of how ridiculous the suggestion seems to us over here, one must reflect first that our Welsh springer weight specifications are 35 lb. to 45 lb. and our field spaniels 35 lb. to 50 lb. Then one must think back to the old days before the cocker received a place of its own in the Kennel Club stud-books. By an arbitrary figure of 25 lb. it could be ruled whether a spaniel was cocker (under) or a field (over). A dog which was a cocker spaniel first thing in the morning might eat a hearty meal and turn himself into a field spaniel by the afternoon.

Yet once the fixed weight division was scrapped, England's cocker breeders always strove to keep their dogs within a sensible distance of 25 lb. The cocker, with its different job to do, must never be compared with fields or springers. One Cocker Club was careful not to specify any hard and fast weight-and-height limits. It is nevertheless true that all the most typical cockers of the past 35 years have been between 15½ and 16½ inches at the shoulder. A cocker of 15 inches or under looks too small, one of 17 inches looks too big. Yet I see that the American committee's proposals suggest the most desirable height to be 16 to 17 inches.

All breeders of experience will concur with Mr. H. S. Lloyd that a too-big cocker never seems to have the essential characteristics of brisk action,

beautiful tail movement and joyous expression possessed by those of the proper size. Mr. Lloyd it is who voices a useful hint for finding out if a cocker is correctly proportioned. "I am no believer in weights and measurements," he says. "No bloodstock, in any animal, has ever been bred successfully by that method. But it is undeniable that if one measures really high-class cockers from the bottom of the upper lip to the tip of the withers, this should be exactly the same measurement as from the withers to the root of the tail. From the withers to the ground measures the same." Mr. Lloyd has, as a matter of interest, measured a large number of well-known dogs during the past 40 years, and those that have filled the eye as typical cockers have stood the test almost without exception.

The American proposal, as I say, is trying to make dog-breeding easy. The true breeder is always fighting the natural tendency for small dogs to get bigger and big dogs to get smaller and it is the duty of breeders, maintaining the standards set by the fathers of the breeds, to resist this drift.

The English Cocker Spaniel Is An All-Purpose Dog

IT is becoming evident that in this day and age the average Canadian thinks of a dog merely as a pet; in many cases this means a sort of "live toy" for his children. Expendable and easily replaceable, this class of dog receives a minimum of training both in indoor and outdoor living. The result is a group of Canine Delinquents who can make life miserable in any community and cause an unjust stigma to attach to the responsible dog owner and fancier.

The reason for this development is not difficult to analyze. Our world has become so mechanized that more and more people are falling out of sympathy with those natural things which make their presence felt mainly by their nuisance potential. The pigeons which grace many an Old World square are driven from the modernistic courts of the New World as filthy pests; the plodding milk horses with whom we made friends as children are cursed at now by the impatient motorists we grew up to be. The dog likewise is maligned as a wrecker of gardens and an upsetter of garbage cans by a generation too heedless to correct these faults in their children's pets, a generation for whom, to a large measure, the dog has lost his usefulness.

Anyone who buys an "expensive" pedigreed dog (and, unfortunately, the average citizen considers even the fifty dollar puppy expensive) takes on a considerable responsibility. His valuable dog must be as well looked after as his children—otherwise the Modern Era (in the form of an automobile in a hurry) will probably liquidate his investment. Since most children are too careless to give a dog protective supervision, this takes most registered dogs out of the "Child's Toy" category and pushes them into that of an "Adult's Companion." Dog breeders must therefore direct their attention to an adult market for their dogs, and in doing so fare better if they have something to sell that is more than a good show prospect. In a utilitarian age the dog that is useful is at a premium over one who merely reflects the glory of his ancestors.

However, the machine age has caused other changes. With a steadily increasing amount of personal cars in use, more and more people are able to get out of the city to indulge in the hunting of waterfowl and upland game. Drive out of the city on Opening Day or on any long weekend during the hunting season, and the Dawn Barrage would put the Battle of Britain in the shade. Probably 50% of the birds shot down are recovered; the remainder fall out of reach in

water, fall into thick swath or tall grass, or in the case of pheasants run hundreds of yards before their wounds overcome them; these are never found. Many of these wasted birds would be retrieved, and possibly more would be flushed to shoot at if the hunters had a dog for a partner. The day would be more satisfying from every standpoint. "If only I had a dog," is the most common statement one hears during the shooting season.

Here at last we find one of the few remaining non-sentimental uses of a dog left to the average city-dweller. As a member of a working partnership a good dog can pay for him—or herself many times over by services rendered during a single season. Here again we can run into objections. The hunting season is a short one; most field dogs run to a large size with large sized habits and large sized appetites. "Why," asks the average citizen-sportsman, "should I maintain an undersized pony in my home for ten months of the year in order to increase the efficiency of my sport for the other two months? What's more, during the ten months when my dog is primarily a pet I would like to have him in the house, but my wife says that if that overgrown nuisance comes into the house he'll have to spend his time in the cellar unless I want to see my house wrecked. How will I exercise such a dog in the limited time I have most of the year? Sure I'd like a partner, but the way things stack up he won't have much of a life."

Now in case anyone was wondering what this has to do with English Cocker Spaniels, this is the point they come into the picture:

The English Cocker Spaniel, though sadly out of fashion as a hunting dog, was developed primarily for just the above conditions. Somewhat larger than his American descendants, he has all the stamina of the larger Spaniel breeds and all of their versatility in being able to deal with any normal situation. Although he was originally an upland game dog, he is able to meet the needs of the duck hunter with all necessary efficiency. In a rigorous climate his staying power is admittedly less than a larger dog, but this is not as serious a bar as it would appear on first inspection. The usual city-dwelling Saturday morning hunter does most of his shooting between dawn and eight o'clock in the morning, nine perhaps in the later season. After that time the birds are generally flying high and out of range and most of us tend to call it a day and go home. For the all-day enthusiast with a boat,

blind and decoys, the larger breeds are unquestionably the best—especially under very cold conditions. In field shooting, whether the quarry be ducks or upland game, the English Cocker will keep up with the best of them, easily outlasting the liberated chair-bound city-man.

The English Cocker has on the other hand many practical advantages over the larger breeds. On the way to and from a shoot he doesn't have to have the whole back seat of the car to himself. Curled up on the seat or on the floor he takes less room than the average suitcoat. Returning to a boat he is hardly likely to overturn it scrambling aboard. At home, off duty, he is as happy in an apartment as he would be in a three-storey mansion. At one time I lived in a small motel for eight weeks with three of them, without affecting their disposition by the crowding. To a Cocker a fenced back yard is as satisfactory an exercise ground as a ten-acre field. That is to say, he can remain sound in mind and body even in the protected confines of a city lot. A homebody, he will rarely stray far if he does get out, and when he returns he will probably be in one piece, and have forborne to upset every garbage pail in the neighbourhood. He isn't heavy enough to upset the usual "legal" garbage pail. His disposition is recognized as being the most trustworthy and loving of any breed known. He is not over-friendly, his alleged timidity being really a deep reserve, an advantage when any stranger might try to lure him off, or a distant acquaintance who doesn't like dogs drops in unexpectedly. The loyal and gentle qualities ascribed to the breed are accentuated in the bitches, who are, be it known, as keen in the field as the dogs. One last point, the English Cocker is no sissy. I have often seen our dogs, from puppyhood upwards, put to flight intruders many times their size, more by the valour and determination of their challenge than by the weight of their attack.

To conclude, I would say that the English Cocker stands out from all other breeds as an average man's dog. One has to go far to find other breeds who can match them for gentleness, loyalty, usefulness, and convenience taken together, and for the first two, one never would.

FROM TRAINER TO OWNER

By P. R. A. MOXON

AT THIS season of the year many shooting men are taking over dogs from trainers. Some will be puppies which they bought and sent to a training kennel for education; others will be completely strange dogs which have been bought ready-trained. Whichever may be the case, it is a very testing time for both dog and owner, and, moreover, a period during which the trainer's work can be completely wasted unless the owner puts into operation a few elementary, but very essential, precautions.

If the best is to be obtained from a trained gundog, there must be a very firm bond of understanding between handler and dog. This can be achieved only if the owner is prepared to devote a little time and much thought to the task of winning the confidence of the dog and establishing complete control over him. Dogs are remarkably like schoolboys in that they have an irresistible desire to play up a new master. If a dog is allowed to get away with it the first time it is tried, any chance of making a success of him, from the working point of view, is greatly diminished.

The most common mistake the owner makes when first taking over his newly-trained gundog is to assume that he is foolproof, and to put him to work without first establishing the essential bond of confidence and control. A dog who has been trained by somebody else is very definitely not foolproof, and time spent in getting him accustomed to his new home and master, and working to his orders, is never wasted.

First of all, the dog must be made to feel at home. No attempt should be made at working him until he seems happy and contented, and you can feel that he has confidence in you. To this end you should see as much of him as you conveniently can — take him into the house, out in the car, etc. In other words, try to make him feel that he is your dog now. It is helpful if the diet can be similar to that to which he has been accustomed, and if he can be housed in a kennel with another dog so much the better. He will settle in all the more quickly.

I am assuming that you have taken the very obvious—but, alas, all too frequently ignored precaution — of watching the dog work for the original trainer, and that not only have you done your best to learn by heart the words of command used, and have obtained an identical whistle to that which the dog knows, but have tried to adopt the handling technique of the trainer as far as possible. If you have not done all this, the chance of success is remote. However, if you are a wise man you have done so, and once the dog shows that he is happy and at home you can begin to put him through

his paces in order that he may realise that the obedience which he gave to the trainer must now be transferred to yourself. If you encounter any serious difficulties, you should immediately contact the original trainer and seek his advice.

Bearing in mind any particular hints given to you by the trainer, you can start to practise the dog in the obedience commands which he knows—dropping to command, staying on the drop until whistled or called up, walking at heel, dropping at a distance to command or whistle and retrieving a dummy or dead rabbits to hand. These items should be practised in the first instance on the lawn or in a field where no game is likely to be encountered—and while you are alone with the dog and without your gun.

Most dogs are spoiled by being put to practical shooting work too quickly, before the new owners have established their authority over them. Twenty minutes or half an hour once or twice a day for a week are never wasted when practising work of this nature. If you cannot control the dog when you are not shooting and away from the excitement of game, it is certain that you will never be able to do so in the shooting field.

Although gundog training and handling is a specialised art, it is not beyond the capability of anyone with sufficient enthusiasm and patience to be able to make a reasonable success of a well trained dog. There are certain simple rules which must be observed, and if they are thought about, they are perfectly logical and understandable.

In the first place, you must always be consistent, never giving an order without making certain, as far as possible, that it is obeyed. If you stop to talk to somebody and command your dog to sit, see that he does, in fact, sit, and remains seated. If, as so often happens, he gets up and starts wandering about while you chat, and no notice is taken, your authority over the dog is weakened immediately. He begins to lose respect for you and that is the beginning of the end. When practising retrieving, do not send the dog out the moment you have thrown the dummy, but make him wait patiently on the drop for a minute or more before giving the command to retrieve, just as, later, you should always make him wait while you reload your gun before allowing him to retrieve.

Once the dog has shown that he will retrieve to you willingly and right up to hand, always throw the dummy into cover, and ring the changes by hiding the dummy—unseen by the dog—and working as on a blind retrieve. Too much practise on simple retrieves in the open—particularly short ones—will bore the dog stiff. In the shooting field, avoid giving him retrieves of stuff lying in the open, which could be

picked up by hand, and do not let him retrieve every bird you shoot, at any rate to start with. If you do, the dog will quickly assume that everything he sees down is to be picked up, and he will tend to become unsteady.

Having the dog under control and obtained his confidence, take him for a stroll around the shoot — preferably without the gun the first time or two. Practise him on retrieving the dummy where rabbits are sitting out and—if he is a spaniel—questing in suitable cover. Be prepared the moment game rises or rabbits bolt to give the command or whistle to drop. I always tell the owner of a newly-trained dog to "hope for the best but anticipate the worst"—in other words, do not trust the dog but assume that he is going to succumb to temptation and chase, always being ready with the command or whistle.

Walking to heel should be practised, and any attempts to lag behind and dwell on scents, or get in front of you, should immediately be checked. A flick with the lead or a switch, and the command "Heel" should suffice to do this.

If all goes well and your dog will walk steadily to heel and take no notice of rabbits as they bolt for the wood, or birds that may rise, and will quest steadily (if a spaniel) and drop immediately to command, you can take out the gun on the next occasion. Fire an occasional shot in the air as something flushes, and check any tendency to run-in. Concentrate on the dog.

Finally, shoot a rabbit or pigeon for the dog and, after a due interval, on the drop, allow him to retrieve. If you can, return home and tell your wife that the dog behaved just as you would have wished, and the few hours interesting work you have put in upon him will have been amply rewarded. It costs quite a lot of money to train a dog, and good trainers are jealous of their reputations. All too often dogs are ruined simply because the owners will not co-operate by winning the dog's confidence and carrying on where the trainer left off, thereby wasting their own money and the trainer's time.

SPANIEL (ENGLISH COCKER)

Standard of the Breed

General Appearance — The English Cocker Spaniel is an attractive, active, merry sporting dog; with short body and strong limbs, standing well up at the withers. His movements are alive with energy; his gait powerful and frictionless. He is alert at all times and the carriage of head and incessant action of his tail while at work give the impression that here is a dog that is not only bred for hunting but really enjoys it. He is well balanced, strongly built, full of quality and is capable of top speed combined with great stamina. His head imparts an individual stamp peculiar to him alone and has that branny appearance expressive of the highest intelligence and is in perfect proportion to his body. His muzzle is a most distinctive feature, being of correct conformation and in proportion to his skull.

Character — The character of the English Cocker is of extreme importance. His love and faithfulness to his master and household, his alertness and courage are characteristic. He is noted for his intelligence and merry disposition; not quarrelsome, and is a responsive and willing worker both in the field and as a companion.

Head — The skull and forehead should be well developed with no suggestion of coarseness, arched and slightly flattened on top when viewed both from the stop to the end of the skull as well as from ear to ear, and cleanly chiseled under the eyes. The proportion of the head desirable is approximately one-half for the muzzle and one-half for the skull. The muzzle should be square with a definite stop where it blends into the skull and in proportion with the width of the skull. As the English Cocker is primarily a sporting dog, the muzzle and jaws must be of sufficient strength and size to carry game; and the length of the muzzle should provide room for the development of the olfactory nerve to insure good scenting qualities, which require that the nose be wide and well developed. Nostrils black in colour except in reds, livers, parti-colours and roans of the lighter shades, where brown is permissible, but black preferred. Lips should be square, full and free from flews. Teeth should be even and set squarely.

Faults — Muzzle too short or snipey. Jaw overshot or undershot. Lips snipey or pendulous. Skull too flat or too rounded, cheeky or coarse. Stop insufficient or exaggerated.

Eyes — The eyes should be of medium size, full and slightly oval shaped; set squarely in skull and wide apart. Eyes must be dark brown except in livers and light parti-colours, where hazel is permissible, but the darker the better. The general expression should be intelligent, alert, bright and merry.

Faults — Light, round or protruding eyes. Conspicuous haw.

Ears — Lobular; set low and close to the head; leather fine and extending at least to the nose, well covered with long, silky, straight or slightly wavy hair.

Faults — Set or carried too high; too wide at the top; insufficient feathering; positive curls or ringlets.

Neck — Long, clean and muscular; arched towards the head; set cleanly into sloping shoulders.

Faults — Short; thick; with dewlap or excessive throatiness.

Body — Close coupled, compact and firmly knit, giving the impression of great strength without heaviness. Depth of brisket should reach to the elbow, sloping gradually upward to the loin. Ribs should spring gradually to middle of body, tapering to back ribs, which should be of good depth and extend well back.

Faults — Too long and lacking depth; insufficient spring of rib; barrel rib.

Shoulders and Chest — Shoulders sloping and fine; chest deep and well developed but not too wide and round to interfere with the free action of the forelegs.

Faults — Straight or loaded shoulders.

Back and Loin — Back short and strong. Length of back from withers to tail-set should approximate height from ground to withers. Height of the dog at the withers should be greater than the height at the hip joint, providing a gradual slope between these points. Loin short and powerful, slightly arched.

Faults — Too low at withers; long sway-back or roach back; flat or narrow loin; exaggerated tuck-up.

Forelegs — Straight and strong with bone nearly equal in size from elbow to heel; elbows set close to the body with free action from shoulders; pasterns, short, straight and strong.

Faults — Shoulders loose; elbows turned in or out; legs bowed or set too close or too wide apart; knees knuckled over; light bone.

Feet — Size in proportion to the legs; firm, round and catlike with thick pads and strong toes.

Faults — Too large, too small; spreading or splayed.

Hindquarters — The hips should be rounded; thighs broad; well developed and muscular, giving abundance of propelling power. Stifles strong and well bent. Hock to pad moderately short, strong and well let down.

Faults — Excessive angulation; lightness of bone; stifle too short; hocks too long or turned in or out.

Tail — Set on to conform with the top-line of the back. Merry in action.

Faults — Set too low; habitually carried too high; too short or too long.

Colour — Various. In self colours a white shirt frill is undesirable. In parti-colours, the colouring must be broken on the body, and be evenly distributed. No large portion of any one colour should exist. White should be shown on the saddle. A dog of any solid colour with white feet and chest is not a parti-colour. In roans it is desirable that the white hair should be distributed over the body, the more evenly the better. Roans come in various colours: blue, liver, red orange and lemon. In black and tans the coat should be black; tan spots over the eyes, tan on the sides of the muzzle, on the throat and chest, on forelegs from the knees to the toes and on the hind legs on the inside of the legs, also on the stifle and extending from the hock to the toes.

Faults — White feet are undesirable in any specimen of self colour.

Coat — On head short and fine; on body flat or slightly wavy and silky in texture. Should be of medium length with enough undercoating to give protection. The English Cocker should be well feathered but not so profusely as to hide the true lines or interfere with his field work.

Faults — Lack of coat; too soft, curly or wiry. Excessive trimming to change the natural appearance and coat should be discouraged.

Weight — The most desirable weights: Males, 28 pounds to 34 pounds; Females, 26 pounds to 32 pounds. Proper physical conformation and balance should be considered more important than weight alone.

A.K.C. Devises "Litter Kits" To Simplify Registration

HAILED by all who have seen it as the greatest advancement in registration procedure since the introduction of litter registration a score of years ago, the AKC's new "Litter Kit" will be received by breeders of newly registered litters shortly after these lines appear in print. Briefly, it is a simplified process that eliminates a large part of the applicant's work formerly entailed in subsequently registering the individual puppies in a litter.

Like all really great improvements, the "Litter Kit" appears so simple in its set-up and operation that upon seeing it for the first time the viewer's first thought is, "Why wasn't this done before?" Actually its simplicity was not easy to achieve. It required not only a close knowledge of the checking steps that have always been employed before the eventual registration of any dog, but the full co-operation of experts in the production of business forms. Even so, it would not have been possible even a few years ago. Its perfection depended in large measure on fairly recent technical and scientific advances in multi-form printing and binding. Needless to say the "Litter Kit" is the end result after a number of other experiments in the search to lighten the burden of the breeder through making it mechanically easier to register individual members of a litter. So much for the background; now let's examine the "Litter Kit," which is illustrated below.

The "Litter Kit" consists of the Litter Registration Certificate and a packet of Individual Registration Applications corresponding to the number of puppies in the litter registered. The Certificate is on white paper; the Applications are on blue paper. All are attached to a stub, and all sheets are scored so that they may be detached easily from the stub.

The face of the Litter Registration Certificate contains all the data that customarily appears on such a document: name of breed; date whelped; name and number of sire; name and number of dam; breeder's name; owner's name and address; number of males and number of females in litter; and the litter number. This information is typed by AKC employees and, with the exception of the number of males and females it is all duplicated on each application for individual registration, i.e. on each of the blue forms.

The first act of the breeder upon receiving the "Litter Kit" is to tear off the Litter Registration Certificate and file it with his permanent records. On the back of it appears the statement that these blanks must be used when registering individual members of this litter.

The remainder of the "Litter Kit" is then ready for easy use, whether the

Beneath this he finds on blue paper a set of Individual Registration Applications—one for each puppy in the litter. He needs only fill in the sex and markings of each pup, the new owner's name and address, and then sign it. Below (top) is the face of the individual application for registration as it will appear when completed. It is necessary that typewriter or pen be used. Below (bottom) is the back of the individual application as completed with the necessary signatures and address of new owner.

There were eighty-two championship shows in Canada during 1954; thirty-nine Obedience Trials and thirty-seven Field Trials. In the United States there were three hundred and eighty-six All Breed Shows, three hundred and four Speciality Shows, and three hundred and fifty-six Obedience Trials. It is noticeable that there were only thirty more All-Breed Shows than Obedience Trials in the United States.

We do not like to keep repeating ourselves but \$75,000.00 in property damage and livestock is recorded for those whom we are assisting. The body of Member Gerald Newing, whose home was swept away, was recovered a week after that of his mother; his fourteen-year-old son is among the nineteen still missing. Mr. and Mrs. H. Sparrow have purchased some property on the Barrie Highway, some eighteen miles north of Toronto where they will build a new home and kennel, many, many miles from the river which took their home and dogs that tragic night.

Miss Irene Ball has renovated her beauty parlour and is trying to forget the cruel blow dealt her by the Hurricane. Mr. Jack Fry has recovered sufficiently to travel home to Halifax for the Christmas holidays. Everyone is quite cheerful and so grateful to the members and dog lovers who have contributed toward their relief.

The Christmas season was saddened by the death of two of our members; William Withers Rooney of Montreal, who represented the Province of Quebec as a Director of the C.K.C. for eleven years and who had been a member of the Canadian Kennel Club for twenty years, died over the holiday. Mr. Rooney was an authority on the bull terrier and bred many champions. A veteran of the First World War, Byron C. Berry, well known breeder of golden retrievers, passed away on Christmas Eve at Sunnybrook Military Hospital after a lengthy illness. Mr. Berry served in the 41st Battery in World War I and was a Flight Lieutenant in the R.C.A.F. during World War II. Mrs. Berry will

Fld. Ch. and Can. Fld. Ch. Major VI Wins U.S. National

Fld. C. and Can. Fld. Ch. Major VI the hard going 6½-year-old Black Labrador owned by Mrs. Fraser M. Horn of Long Island, N.Y., added further glory to his name, his owner, and Ray Staudinger his handler, by winning the American National Retriever Trial at Weldon Spring, Missouri, November 18th-20th.

Having won the Labrador Retriever Association of Ontario Spring Trial in Toronto this year and completed his Canadian Championship, Major won four Open All Age Stakes in the U.S. this season before competing in the U.S. National with an entry of 33 dogs which included Labrador, Golden and a Chesapeake.

It was quite obvious from the start that Major, who had a perfect score at the end of the first day, was the dog to beat in this annual classic event.

With five series on land and five in water over a three-day period Major was practically faultless. At no time during the marked tests was the dog handled, while his response on the blind retrieves was perfect and made these difficult tests seem easy.

One dog was picked up in the 1st series while 19 dogs were dropped after the 5th series. Two dogs broke in the 6th series and five more were dropped after the 7th series. This left 6 dogs for the final three series, and while Major was pressed up to the 7th, his greatest threat faltered badly in this series and Major romped home in the remaining series.

It was a great win for a great dog and a lot of credit is due Ray Staudinger who campaigned him. Congratulations to the owner, Mrs. Fraser Horn.

A.K.C. Devises "Litter Kits" To Simplify Registration

breeder retains the puppies himself or sells them to others. Besides the data already typed by the AKC the Individual Application for Registration contains space where first and second choices of name must be typed in or printed in with pen. This is to be done by the person registering the individual puppy. Also there is a line where the sex, color, and markings must be inserted by typewriter or pen. This is to be done by the breeder.

On the back of the Individual Application for Registration are: Sec. 3, which the breeder signs. If he wishes to register the dog in his own ownership this is the only place on the back completed. Sec. 4, Transfer Certification, which the breeder fills in with the month, day, and year of sale of the dog and also the name of the new owner or owners; Sec. 5, to be filled in with the signature or signatures of the new owner or owners, with address or addresses.

No longer will the breeder have to fill out a complete form every time he wishes to register a dog of a certain litter. Now he will just go to his "Litter Kit," detach another partially completed Application, sign it as indicated above, make sure that the pup has been supplied with a couple of choices of name, and has been described. That's all the work there is to do. Within a matter of five minutes he will have finished what often took him considerable time; to say nothing of the bother he often was caused if he had mislaid his records on a litter.

Without doubt, the "Litter Kit" is one of the greatest improvements in the procedure of registering dogs since the AKC was organized in 1884. It is another great step forward.—END.

The 1954 All Canadian C.K.C. National Championship Trial

WITH the running of the All-Canadian C.K.C. National Championship Trial at Peterborough, November 4, 5 and 6th, the 1954 program of the All-Canadian and its affiliated associations was brought to a close.

It was a good program and ran according to schedule. First there were the district qualifying trials and then the official Championship Trial.

The set-up of the All-Canadian Program is best explained by the following material that appeared in the program announcement published during the summer months which is as follows:

1. The purpose of the All-Canadian Trial is to select the official 1954 All-Canadian C.K.C. National Field Trial Champion.
2. The purpose of the District Trials is to give all hounds an opportunity to compete for district honours and to qualify themselves for entry in the All-Canadian Championship Trial.
3. Only qualified registered hounds, six (6) per affiliated association, are eligible to compete at the All-Canadian.

The program as outlined above and which is being followed by the majority of fox hunters in this country appears to be meeting with general acceptance and is giving most of the foxhound people, that follow Field Trials in Canada, what they want.

The program is set up by the Directors that are appointed to the All-Canadian Board by the District Associations affiliated with the All-Canadian Trial.

As a result of the qualifying trials, all hounds that finished the All-Canadian Trial have been submitted to a testing period of twenty to twenty-five hours, and performed before at least two different sets of judges. At the All-Canadian Trial they work in pairs and are re-grouped each day of the trial. This method is followed to ensure as high a degree of uniformity as possible in judging under the set-up.

The 1954 Trial

All things being considered, the trial this year was a good one and was most successful. All of the eight affiliated associations were well represented and all but two associations had their full quota of hounds which, as stated above is six per association. These were registered hounds and hounds that had run the gauntlet of the district qualifying trials.

Wednesday, the day before the trial, snow was in the air and one was a bit doubtful as to what was in store in the way of weather. As everyone knows that runs hounds even in a country where there are lots of foxes, weather

plays a big part in the running of any field trial. However, the hunters kept pouring into Peterborough from different parts of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Rain or shine the show was on its way. There were the boys from all the districts in which affiliated clubs were located — Montreal, Cornwall, Ottawa, Quyon, Peterborough, Lindsay, Orangeville and Kitchener—they were foxhound people who, with their hounds were eager for the chase. By daylight on Thursday morning the Master of Hounds, Cecil Taylor of Brampton, had the entries checked and the hounds lined up ready for the cast—with a wave of his hand the BIG TRIAL was on.

There was a mixture of hunting, trailing, speed and driving on the first day, probably still more speed and driving on the second day, and mostly hunting and trailing on the third day—with enough of everything to make the trial a success.

To say that there was not some excellent speed and driving would be wrong. After the cast on the first day, the hounds jumped a fox that really stretched them for a short time. In fact, so fast did they drive that fox that he took to the ground to save his life.

On the second day there were a number of terrific drives, the straight-away kind with the hounds really turning it on. Then, just after the trial was completed (on the last day), the hounds started a fox that took to the open fields and ended the trial in the manner that everyone likes to see a trial end, which

is with the hounds hot on the tail of a big red fox.

As is the case with all field trials the opportunity of meeting hunters from different parts of the country is most pleasant and refreshing. The All-Canadian Trial is tops in this respect insofar as the country is concerned, for so many more districts are represented than in the case of the district trials. In fact, the All-Canadian is fast getting to be one large family, with good fellowship the key note.

The host club (the Kawartha Club in Peterborough) had done a grand job in making all local arrangements. Everything was in order, and to that club in particular the All-Canadian is most appreciative.

Second in importance at a trial of this kind is the banquet where the winners are announced, the prizes and trophies awarded, and the trial in many cases re-run all over again. The banquet was prepared by the Ladies' Guild and held in the Town Hall at Keene, where there was ample room for everyone that wanted to attend and where there was more food, tastily prepared, than an average army of men could consume. The banquet was a great success, and when the ceremonies (which included addresses from some of the leading men of that district) had been completed, the Master of Hounds took over and that was it—everyone was naturally eager to hear the results, and the names of the winners.

Selecting the Judge

Apparently they have troubles in Australia too. The following appeared in a recent issue of the Kennel Club Control Council (Australia) Gazette:

"Who are we going to select to judge our next Championship Show?"

Should this question be decided at a meeting of members; at a full Committee meeting; or at a sub-Committee meeting specially appointed for the purpose?

It may be that three knowledgeable Committee men together with a President and Secretary could do the best job for all concerned. They should know the judges, best suited to their Club and conditions; the judges likely to do the best jobs in the interests of all members and likely to draw the best entries.

They could readily decide upon the necessary number required; upon their remuneration; get all available information relating to transport and accommodation and advise the prospective judges accordingly, enclosing a stamped addressed envelope to encourage an immediate reply.

Instead of this procedure, most clubs find the selection of judges one of their greatest bug-bears. Generally, after long discussion, often none too happy, the Secretary is left with the stereotypical task of sending out circular letters to a half-dozen or so judges asking their availability and their fee. News travels fast and when judges realise the situation, is it any wonder that some are not very interested in the circular letters that lie unanswered at home.

There is no excuse for such communications remaining unanswered for long, but the fact must not be overlooked that some Club Secretaries or Committees keep judges waiting a long long time before they arrive at a decision, and in some cases never reply to judges. Just as it is bad form for a judge not to reply as soon as possible to a Club's request, so it is bad policy for a Club or Club Secretary to treat this important matter as casually as is often the case. It has been suggested that the answer would be found in a controlling body keeping an up-to-date list of judges' appointments. However owing to unavoidable delays on both sides it is considered that such a list could not be of any great value.

The answer is not simple but if all Secretaries approached judges with a well conceived plan, clearly setting out the fee their Club was prepared to pay, complete particulars relating to accommodation, travel expenses and time-tables—as some good Secretaries have done for years—they would find that most judges would then be in a much better position to make an immediate reply.

Secretary and judges—think it over. And judges, when you do reply to Club Secretaries, make sure that you advise them of the appointments for which you are already booked.—K.C.C. Gazette, Melbourne, Australia.

MINUTES OF MEETINGS OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

OCTOBER 12th, 1954

2873. A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, called by the President, was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge St., Toronto, Ontario, on Tuesday, October 12th 1954, commencing at 10:00 a.m. The President, Mrs. Alva McColl, presided. Other members of the Board present at the commencement of the meeting were: Mrs. M. E. McEachren, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, J. A. H. Irving, J. W. MacCallum, Mrs. Pamela Mack, W. J. Monaghan and Mrs. N. T. Smith.

The President expressed the Board's pleasure on the attendance at this meeting of Mr. Irving, Director for British Columbia and Mrs. Mack, Director for Quebec.

2874 (2838). MINUTES

The Secretary placed before the Board the minutes which he had prepared of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on September 14th, 1954.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, seconded by Mrs. McEachren:

"THAT, the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors held on September 14th, 1954, be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Pamela Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

2876. LETTER FROM FEDERAL CIVIL DEFENCE CO-ORDINATOR

The Secretary read a letter from General F. F. Worthington, Federal Civil Defence Co-ordinator, with which was enclosed copies of correspondence received from the Director General of Training for Civil Defence in the United Kingdom regarding the use of dogs for locating casualties buried in the debris of collapsed buildings.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Irving who reported that at the request of the co-ordinator of Civil Defence in Victoria, Mrs. Mellish was there organizing a training class for dogs to be used in Civil Defence work, and that it was understood that the Federal Civil Defence Co-ordinator would ask that the Club co-operate in establishing similar training classes throughout the country.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mrs. McEachren:

"THAT, the Secretary communicate with the Federal Civil Defence Co-ordinator and inform him that we are willing to co-operate."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

2878 (2848) STUD BOOK FOR 1955

The Secretary reported that as soon as additional required information had been obtained from the printers of the Stud Book, a letter had been despatched to members of the Board on September 30th along with a questionnaire, which included the question of whether or not members of the Board were in

favour of an order being placed for sufficient copies of the 1953 Stud Book to give every member a copy. The information forwarded to members of the Board indicated that the cost to supply sufficient copies was estimated at approximately \$6,000.00.

The Board was informed that in response to the questionnaire, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith had indicated their approval of the proposal that sufficient copies be ordered to provide every member with a copy of the 1953 Stud Book, and that Mrs. McEachren had indicated a vote in favour of limiting the printing order to 500 copies.

In the discussion which followed Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. Mack indicated that they were in favour of the order being for 500 copies of the 1953 Stud Book.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mrs. Mack, seconded by Mr. Irving.

"THAT, the Board of Directors sanction the printing of 500 copies of the 1953 Stud Book, and that the printed copies should be available to those who wish to purchase them at \$1.00 per copy."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. Mack.

ABSTAINED FROM VOTING: Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

The Secretary sought an instruction with regard to the soliciting of orders for the Stud Book.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:

"THAT, an order form for Stud Book be enclosed with membership reminder form to be sent to membership on December 28th."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Chairman of the Committee appointed by the Board at its annual meeting to handle advertising in the 1953 Stud Book, sought an instruction with regard to soliciting of advertising for the volume. In the discussion which followed, it was agreed that the soliciting of display advertising for the Stud Book may detract from advertising in the Club's official magazine, however, it was agreed that the publication of a kennel register in the Stud Book would not prove detrimental to advertising in the Club's official organ.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McEachren, seconded by Mr. Davies:

"THAT, the Chairman of the Stud Book Advertising Committee confine soliciting of advertising in the 1953 Stud Book to a kennel register listing similar to the Register appearing in 'Dogs in Canada'."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

ABSTAINING FROM VOTING: Mr. Daniell-Jenkins (being named in the motion).

Motion carried.

It was agreed that the rate to be set for listing in the kennel register in the Stud Book to be left to the Committee of which Mr. Daniell-Jenkins is Chairman.

The Board recessed for lunch and later reconvened with the President in the Chair and the following members of the Board present: Mrs. M. L. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan and Mrs. Smith.

2880 (2853). PENSION PLAN

The Secretary reported that proposed pension plans had been obtained from four different companies, but the costs, benefits, and conditions attached to each plan was so varied that it would be exceedingly difficult to prepare a brief report for the consideration of the Board, and as an employee he did not feel that he should recommend any particular plan, or the conditions to be attached thereto, to the Board.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. MacCallum, seconded by Mr. Irving:

"THAT, the Board appoints a committee composed of W. J. Monaghan (Chairman), J. J. Farmer and Rodney Hull to consider the submitted plans, and present a report to the Board with recommendations."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack and Mrs. Smith.

ABSTAINED FROM VOTING: Mr. Monaghan (being named in the motion).

Motion carried.

2881 (2863). OBEDIENCE MATTERS

Mr. Irving referred to the present requirements of a person applying for approval to judge obedience trials under the Club's rules, and expressed the view that any person who has taken a course at a recognized school where instruction on obedience trial judging is given and is recommended for approval as a judge of obedience by those conducting the school, should not be required to serve as an apprentice at more than one licensed obedience trial.

Mr. Irving referred to the existing policy with regard to minimum elapsed time between judging engagements of a single obedience judge, and suggested that this policy should be implemented with discretion where the number of available approved judges within a zone are not sufficient to accommodate all licensed trials.

These questions were referred to the Standing Committee on Obedience.

On Mr. Monaghan's suggestion the Secretary was instructed to obtain the opinion of the Club's solicitors on whether or not the non-voting member of a partnership membership is eligible for appointment to an Advisory or other committee or as Field or Obedience Trial Representatives.

Mrs. Mack stated that, apparently a number of persons who were participating as trainers or assistant trainers in training classes were unaware that they were not eligible to enter or handle dogs in the Novice A and Open A classes even though they received no remuneration for such activity. Following discussion, it was agreed that the Secretary would draw attention to the existing rules in this connection in "Dogs in Canada" and also to arrange for a notice to appear in premium lists for future obedience trials.

Mr. Irving referred to the outlined procedure with regard to approval of obedience judges and suggested that in order to expedite the approval of judges for obedience trials, the Secretary should be empowered to at once approve the person as a judge of an obedience trial when he receives a favourable report concerning the ability of a person applying for approval to judge obedience and where he receives favourable reports from the judges under whom said person has apprenticed the required number of times. It was agreed that the Secretary would proceed as suggested by Mr. Irving and that any application would be referred to the Standing Committee on obedience for further instructions where any one of these reports on an application is not favourable.

2884 (2817). LONG RANGE PLAN, IMPROVEMENT OF STOCK

The President reported that while some members of the Board had been heard from with regard to her suggestion regarding the development of a long range plan for the Club, it would be preferable to postpone a full scale discussion on these items until all members of the Board had a reasonable opportunity to submit their comments and ideas on these subjects.

Following discussion it was agreed that:

- (1) Discussion on these subjects be deferred to the next meeting of the Board;
- (2) The President would prepare for publication in the next issue of "Dogs in Canada" an article on the subject of the proposed long range plan, the article to refer to some of the proposals already advanced, and to invite the members to submit their comments and suggestions.

2885 (2860). SHOW AND TRIAL MATTERS

The Secretary referred to applications for 1955 show and trial dates already received and other applications likely to be received during the balance of the current calendar year, and sought an instruction on the action to be taken with regard to these applications.

Following discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mrs. Smith:

"THAT, the Secretary be authorized to approve 1955 show and trial dates for shows and trials outside Ontario, on the recommendation of the present provincial Director."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

It was then regularly moved by Mr. MacCallum, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, the President, the Vice-President, and the Secretary be appointed a Committee authorized to grant show and trial dates for Ontario for 1955."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, and Mrs. Smith.

ABSTAINED FROM VOTING: Mrs. McEachren, being named in the motion.

Motion carried.

2886 (2870). COMPLAINTS

The Secretary reported on the procedure being followed in dealing with complaints regarding alleged non-delivery of certificates of registration by sellers of pure-bred dogs, a procedure necessitated by the present provisions of Article XV of the Club's By-laws, and suggested that if the Club was to continue to deal with complaints of this nature that the Board consider the advisability of arranging for a proposed amendment to Article XV in order that such complaints could more readily be disposed of.

In the discussion which followed Mr. Monaghan stated that the Live Stock Pedigree Act provided the means by which complainants in cases of this nature could readily proceed against sellers of pure-bred dogs failing to deliver certificates of registration as required by the Act, and suggested that instead of the Club dealing with complaints of this nature that the complainants be informed of the procedure which they should follow in taking legal proceedings. He pointed out that Section 7 of Article XV of the Club's By-laws provided the means by which the Board, without necessity of a formal hearing could take immediate disciplinary proceedings against any person convicted of any offence set out in Sections 16 and 17 of the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Following further discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mrs. McEachren:

"THAT, the Board, having considered the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act (1949), the policy in future with regard to complaints alleging non-delivery of certificates would be to inform the complainant that his proper procedure would be to proceed in accordance with the provisions of the Act."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

The Secretary was instructed to consult the Club's solicitors with regard to the form of letter to be addressed to complainants.

2888. COMPOSITE PICTURE OF BOARD

Mr. Monaghan remarked that the composition of the present Board of Directors was unique in that for the first time in the Club's history a member of the fair sex held the post of President, and he suggested that the occasion be marked by the compilation of a composite picture of the Board such as had been published in the official magazine in the past.

The matter was ordered referred to the Publications Committee, and the Secretary was instructed to write members of the Board seeking their co-operation in providing the necessary photographs.

2889 (2768). CANADIAN DOGS AT AMERICAN SHOWS (CUSTOMS)

Mr. Monaghan enquired as to the action taken to publicize in American show premium lists the use, by Canadian exhibitors, of Y-38 Forms for customs purposes. The Secretary reported on correspondence with Mr. Neff of the American Kennel Club. Mr. Irving reported that American customs authorities on the west coast were not prepared to allow the use of Y-38 forms for dogs entering the United States for show purposes.

The matter was left in the secretary's hands for further report to the Board.

2890. EMERGENCY REFERENDUM BALLOT (ON AMENDMENTS)

Mr. Monaghan stated that some members are under the impression that a special referendum ballot, as referred to in Section 16 of Article XXXVIII, may be held only in a "crisis" whereas the several definitions of the word "emergency" would, in his opinion, allow the Board to order a special referendum ballot where a "pressing necessity" exists, and he suggested that in order that the Board may order a special referendum ballot in connection with any or all of the proposed amendments received by the Secretary before October 15th, or on any proposed amendments which the Board feels that a vote of the members, at an early date, is imperative, that the Board interpret the word "emergency" to mean "a pressing necessity; a conjuncture".

Following discussion Mr. Monaghan served notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would propose the following resolution:

"THAT, the Board under the provisions of paragraph 2 of Article XXXVII, officially interpret the word 'emergency', wherever it appears in Article XXXVIII, as a pressing necessity; a conjuncture; this in order to avoid confusion with the other interpretation implying a 'crisis'."

2892 (2844). "DOGS IN CANADA"

Mr. MacCallum, Chairman of the Publications Committee, suggested and it was agreed that the Secretary would, within the office, act as a liaison for the Committee and otherwise assist it in the production of the magazine.

It was then regularly moved by Mrs. McEachren, seconded by Mr. Irving:

"THAT, the Committee take the necessary steps to ensure the production of the publication of 'Dogs in Canada' on schedule."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. Irving, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, and Mrs. Smith.

Motion carried.

2893. ADJOURNMENT

At 7:45 p.m. it was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, duly seconded and carried:

"THAT, this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourn."

NOVEMBER 23rd, 1954

2894. A special meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, called by the President, was held in the Club's offices, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, on Tuesday.

November 23rd, 1954, commencing at 1:00 P.M. The President, Mrs. Alva McColl, presided. Members of the Board present were: Mrs. M. Elleen McEachren, J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, G. P. Davies, Mrs. Pamela Mack, W. J. MacCallum and Mrs. N. T. Smith.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. W. J. Monaghan who advised that because of pressure of business he was unable to arrange to be present at this meeting on such short notice.

The President congratulated Mrs. McEachren on her re-election, by acclamation, as Vice-President of the Club for 1955 and Mrs. Mack on her re-election, by acclamation, as Director representing the Province of Quebec. The Secretary was instructed to convey the Board's congratulations to Mr. Irving on his re-election, by acclamation, as Director representing the Province of British Columbia.

2803. CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB RELIEF FUND

The President reported that as a result of the loss suffered by a number of members occasioned by the floods which had followed Hurricane "Hazel's" path through the Toronto area, steps had been taken to set up a relief fund to aid the rehabilitation of these members and disbursements had been made to these members. The President then reported that the advice of the Club's solicitors had been sought on the setting up of this fund and also a permanent relief fund to aid members in distress in the future.

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins suggested that the best method of procedure would be to set up a trust fund administered by trustees on behalf of the Club.

The President stated it is hoped that full information with regard to setting up a trust fund would be available for the next meeting of the Board.

It was regularly moved by Mr. MacCallum, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, this Board endorse the action taken by the President to solicit and accept donations to the relief fund, the disbursements made to date, the request made to the Club's solicitors for advice and guidance on how to set up a permanent trust fund, the President to continue to administer the donations received to the fund until the next meeting of the Board of Directors or until the trust fund is set up."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. N. T. Smith. Motion carried.

The Board was informed that the amount donated to the fund to the date of this meeting was \$879.61.

The Secretary read letters of appreciation received from those members who were rendered assistance.

2806 (2874). MINUTES

The Secretary presented for adoption the Minutes which he had prepared of the Meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 12th, 1954, and pointed out that in Item No. 2863, fifth paragraph, the words "Open B" should read "Open A". The Board agreed that this correction should be made.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McEachren, seconded by Mrs. Smith:

"THAT, the minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 12, 1954, as corrected be adopted."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. Smith. Motion carried.

2808 (2876) DOGS FOR CIVIL DEFENSE

The Secretary reported that the Federal Civil Defense Co-ordinator had been informed of the Club's willingness to co-operate with the Department in the matter of dogs for civil defense.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Irving who suggested that because of the present activity in British Columbia in connection with the training of dogs for civil defense purposes, he be authorized to co-operate with the Civil Defense Co-ordinator should further correspondence develop.

Mr. Daniell-Jenkins suggested that because of the importance of the subject that a member of the Board or the Secretary be authorized to discuss the matter with the Federal Civil Defense Co-ordinator in Ottawa.

Mrs. Mack reported that Mr. J. Malcolm McDougall, a member of the Club active in obedience work at Montreal, had lunched with the Federal Civil Defense Co-ordinator in Ottawa recently and had then discussed with the Co-ordinator the subject of dogs for civil defense. Mrs. Mack suggested that the Board consider the appointment of Mr. McDougall to discuss this subject with General Worthington on behalf of the Club.

Following discussion, it was regularly moved by Mrs. Mack, seconded by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins:

"THAT, Mr. J. Malcolm McDougall be authorized to interview General Worthington, the Federal Civil Defense Co-ordinator, on behalf of the Club with a view to setting up training procedure and requirements for dogs to be used for civil defense."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. Smith. Motion carried.

It was then regularly moved by Mrs. Smith, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:

"THAT, Mr. J. A. M. Irving be appointed to represent the Canadian Kennel Club in any negotiations regarding dogs for civil defense in British Columbia."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacCallum and Mrs. Smith. Motion carried.

2800 (2851) DUES OF FIELD TRIAL REPRESENTATIVES - AN OBEDIENCE TRIAL REPRESENTATIVE

The Secretary reported that a compensatory report had been received from Dr. H. L. Watson, Chairman of the Field Trial Council, in connection with the duties of Field Trial Representatives.

The Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of the report to all members of the Board for their study and comment before the next meeting of the Board.

Mrs. Mack reported that it was anticipated that the Standing Committee on Obedience would have their report in connection with the duties of Obedience Trial Representatives available for the Board's consideration at their next meeting.

2805. TABULATING OF REFERENDUM BALLOT VOTES

The Secretary referred to previous arrangements made with the auditors and the Canadian Opinion Company regarding the tabulation of votes cast on referendum ballots, and reported that he had discussed the question of tabulating the votes on the referendum ballot, such to be mailed, with the current auditors and the Canadian Opinion Company. The Secretary sought authority to proceed with the same arrangements, as in the past, for the current referendum ballot.

It was regularly moved by Mr. MacCallum, seconded by Mrs. Smith:

"THAT, the Secretary, through the Election Commission, arrange for the tabulating of votes on the current referendum ballot, by the Canadian Opinion Company, the cost of such tabulation and report to be borne by The Canadian Kennel Club."

FOR THE MOTION: Mrs. McEachren, Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, Mr. Davies, Mr. MacCallum, Mrs. Mack and Mrs. Smith. Motion carried.

2804. CERTIFICATES OF REGISTRATION

The Secretary read a letter from the Director of Canadian National Live Stock Records with regard to a proposed rearrangement of information on certificates of registration, the rearrangement being for the purpose of increasing production of certificates by the typewritten method until certificates are later produced by IBM equipment. The Secretary placed before the Board a sample of the proposed new arrangement.

Following discussion the matter was referred to the Registration Committee for consideration and decision.

2807. ADJOURNMENT

At 7:30 P.M. it was regularly moved by Mr. Daniell-Jenkins, duly seconded, and carried, that this meeting of the Board of Directors adjourn.

REPORT OF A COMMITTEE CONCERNING "DOGS IN CANADA"

1. This Committee was set up as the result of a resolution of the Annual General Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, 24th February, 1953, and was appointed by the President, Mr. Victor Williams, on the advice of the Club's solicitors and pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors of 12th May, 1953.

2. The purpose of the Committee has been to enquire into and consider the affairs of the magazine, Dogs in Canada, and to suggest improvements.

3. The Committee was composed of:
J. H. Daniell-Jenkins, Director of the C.K.C., Chairman.
Mr. J. Neil Macdonald, Banker.
Mr. William L. Powell, Printer and Publisher.
Mr. W. Gottschalk, Printer and Publisher.
Mr. Rodney Hall, Insurance Executive.
(Unfortunately Mr. Rodney Hall found himself unable to attend meetings due to illness and in consequence he has not been asked to sign this report. Mr. Macdonald has acted as secretary to the Committee.)

4. The Committee has met seven times between May, 1953, and January, 1954 inclusive.

5. The following have appeared before the Committee and have willingly given a quantity of information which has been of great assistance:

Mr. Sam Bask, Chairman of the Operating Committee of Dogs in Canada for 1953.
Mrs. Alva McColl, President of the C.K.C. for 1954 and former Editor of Dogs in Canada.
Mr. Norman F. Brown, Secretary of the C.K.C. and former Editor of Dogs in Canada.
Mr. Alan H. McIntosh, former Editor of Dogs in Canada.

The Committee has also interviewed several individuals.
6. The Committee has examined the financial reports of Dogs in Canada for the 22 years 1932-1953 and finds that over the long term the magazine has just about broken even, while for the nine years 1944-1953 inclusive it has shown a profit of over \$3000. This profit is reached after transferring from C.K.C. funds to Dogs in Canada account the cost of printing show reports, trial reports and other official business, plus a subscription of \$1 per member per annum.

7. The Committee considered whether the official business now published in the magazine might more economically be distributed in pamphlet form, mailed separately. It seems that to do so would cost the Club between \$2000 and \$2500 per annum and that the present method is more economical.

8. The Committee considers that so long as the Club offers a free subscription to the magazine to each member, the Club should expect to contribute to the income of the magazine a sum equivalent to one year's subscription per member. It is noted that one year's subscription is \$1 to the general public whereas the Club only contributes \$1 per member. This dollar is contributed at a reasonable price for one year's subscription, however many members continue their membership in the Club, after they cease to be active members, simply in order to receive the magazine.

9. Inasmuch as the Club is structured as a non-profit Company, no dividend, including the magazine, should be expected to make any money, even when it is sold at a reasonable surplus, as protection against possible future losses and to insure its ability to continue to publish.

10. The Committee considers the cost of publishing official business a proper charge to Club funds (as distinct from Dogs in Canada account), as an alternative, however, to having the public absorb this business, so the Club takes steps to inform members of its activities. The Club has no objection to receiving from this material an occasional profit, provided that

11. The Committee finds an impression prevalent that the Club "subsidizes" the magazine. The conclusions reached above indicate that this is a fallacy.

12. If the official business contained in any issue were to be included in every copy of such issue and distributed to non-members and members alike; a more favourable postal classification would result. This would mean a saving of some \$75 on each such issue.

13. It appears that in 1952 a considerable sum, about \$2,000, was spent to promote newsstand sales. A proportion of the revenue from these sales was not received until 1953, but it was not possible to reflect this in the 1952 accounts as the books were closed before the returns came in. The loss shown for 1952 and the profit for 1953 were both increased somewhat in consequence.

14. No doubt the wider distribution resulting from newsstand sales would tend to attract new members, promote goodwill and react beneficially on the advertising revenue for the following year. However it is most difficult to assess the value of these benefits in terms of money over a short term.

15. The Committee notes an increase of \$2,250 in advertising revenue for 1953 over 1952 and a decrease of about \$2,300 in the cost of printing and mailing the magazine (NOTE: Advertising rates increased in 1953, and in 1953 ten issues of the magazine published instead of the twelve published in 1952).

15B. In 1953 advertising revenue produced an average \$1,548 per issue against \$1,102 in 1952; printing and mailing cost an average of \$928 per issue vs. \$965 for those years respectively. Advertising increased by almost \$450 per issue while the controllable cost of printing and mailing decreased by about \$40. A substantial saving was also attained by omitting two issues in 1953; the advertising revenue thus lost does not appear to have been proportionately large.

16. During some nine months of 1952 and ten months of 1953 the editor was paid a commission on new advertising and subscriptions obtained by his efforts. It is noteworthy the advertising revenue increased by some \$1,500 in 1952 and \$2,250 over the previous years.

RECOMMENDATIONS

(a) Publication of Dogs In Canada should be continued. Ownership and direction of policy should remain with the Canadian Kennel Club. All witnesses questioned, as well as the undersigned, are strongly of the opinion that a publication in attractive and sufficiently complete form, controlled by the Club, is a necessary means toward fulfilment of one of the Club's prime objects, namely to promote the interests of purebred dogs in this country.

(b) That an Advisory Committee, with a member of the Board as Chairman, be formed to assist and advise the Editor. The undersigned consider that the 1953 Operating Committee made a valuable contribution in this respect and that such a committee could well be continued, but in an advisory capacity. Apart from the chairman the members of this committee need not be chosen from the Board of Directors.

(c) A competent Managing Editor, to be so styled, is essential. He must be sufficiently experienced in this class of work. He should be responsible for:

- Editorial operations,
- Soliciting advertising, and
- Circulation and distribution of the magazine.

A person with the necessary qualifications can command a good salary; the Club cannot expect to attract and hold such a person unless his emoluments are proportionate.

(d) The accounts of Dogs In Canada should be separate from other departments to such an extent as will permit preparation of a separate Balance Sheet. Profits earned should be allowed to build up in Surplus account sufficiently to provide for future contingencies.

(e) A larger circulation is necessary to attract and hold advertisers. To achieve this a selected list of retail stores, newsdealers, and other outlets should be supplied with the magazine and a campaign undertaken for new subscribers. A proportion of profits should be earmarked for promoting circulation.

(f) Tenders should be called for printing the magazine on a yearly basis, specifying, for example:

- Cover for 200M paper,
- Inside of 100M paper,
- 3,000 copies per issue, and
- A price for each subsequent quantity of 500 copies to be prepared for odd quantities.

(g) To promote circulation and attract advertising the management should most seriously consider producing a Special Annual Number on lines similar to those issued by some British magazines. Such an issue was once produced very successfully by Dogs In Canada in December, 1943, under the management of Mrs. Phyllis Robson.

(h) The management should also consider omitting one or two of the less profitable monthly issues so as to concentrate more closely on those which experience and probability indicate to be more profitable. It has been noted that in 1953 two issues were dropped without apparent harm and at a considerable saving in printing costs.

(i) Owing to the heavy mechanical cost of printing official business, this matter should be curtailed as much as possible.

We, the undersigned, concur in the foregoing report and recommendations.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

These Standing Resolutions, approved by the Board at its last annual meeting, are published by order of the Board of Directors:

LATE SHOW AND TRIAL RETURNS (Item No. 1885)

"THAT, the date fee for any championship show, licensed field trial, or obedience trial, be automatically forfeited when the official returns for such show or trial are not received in the office of the C.K.C. within fifteen days after the date of the show or trial."

LIST OF SUSPENDED PERSONS (Item No. 1935)

"THAT, in future, when names are added to the list of persons suspended, expelled or deprived of the privileges of this Club, the Department of Agriculture be informed and provided a brief digest of the reason or reasons for the disciplinary action taken by the Board of Directors."

DEFINITION OF CANADIAN-BRED (Item No. 2057)

"THAT, for dog show purposes a Canadian-bred dog shall be considered a dog that progeny of a female owned by a person residing in Canada at the time of service."

RE CHAMPIONS IN CANADIAN-BRED CLASS (Item No. 2057)

"THAT, hereafter the words "champions excluded", as referred to in Chapter 4, Section 2 (f), be recognized to mean a champion in any country."

OVERDUE ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE (MAGAZINE)

(Items Nos. 2065; 2502; 2508)

"THAT, when an account (of a member) is 60 days overdue which would be three months from the time contracted, the Secretary be authorized to inform the debtor of the provisions of the By-laws, and to state that unless the account is paid or satisfactory arrangements are made for its payment, that his membership will be automatically terminated 30 days after that date, and a progress report be made to the Board of Directors at the Directors meeting; that in connection with all other accounts outstanding at the end of sixty days, the Secretary shall send a written request for payment; if, at the end of ninety days, the account is not paid, the Secretary shall forward a written request for verification that the account is in order or an explanation as to why the account has not been paid; that if, at the end of 120 days, the account is still unpaid, the Secretary will bring the account to the attention of the Board of Directors for action; that a list of persons whose accounts are unpaid after 120 days shall be furnished to the Managing Editor with instructions that no business of any kind can be transacted by such persons until such time as their accounts have been brought up-to-date."

ATTENDANCE AT BOARD MEETINGS (Item No. 2063)

"THAT, if any member of the Board cannot attend any meeting of the Board, he must notify the Secretary as far in advance of the meeting as possible, and furthermore, that as a matter of policy and in the interests of the Club, if an elected Officer or Director (Ontario members of the Board) finds that he cannot attend regular meetings of the Board, he or she should tender his or her resignation."

DELETIONS FROM PRINTED MINUTES (Item No. 2078)

"THAT, in view of the reply received from the Club's solicitors in respect to our enquiry regarding the publication of information relating to complaints and disciplinary action, our policy continue to be based on the advice given us by the solicitors."

STUD SERVICES AS PRIZES (Item No. 2435)

"THAT, the Secretary be instructed that when passing on future premium lists submitted for his approval, he is not to approve the offering of a stud service as a prize."

INFORMATION ON BALLOT PAPERS (Item No. 2190)

"THAT, the Secretary, when preparing the ballots for the annual election of Officers and Directors, arrange for the ballots to disclose the names and place of residence of all those nominated for election to the Board of Directors, including those elected by acclamation."

TRIALS AND OTHER DEMONSTRATIONS AT CHAMPIONSHIP SHOWS

"THAT, it is the duty of show officials to see that trials or demonstrations given at championship shows must be completely out of the ring before the hour set for the evening session of judging, and the published hour at which judging of Groups, Best in Show and Other General Specials is set must be adhered to."

SCHEDULE OF POINT RATINGS IN CATALOGUES

"THAT, show-giving clubs be requested to include the local scale of championship point ratings in their catalogues."

Mr. Monaghan suggested that there should be included in the book of "Standing Resolutions", a motion authorizing the Secretary to pay any necessary travelling expenses in connection with the attendance of Ontario members of the Board at regularly called meetings of the Board.

It was regularly moved by Miss Hammond, seconded by Mrs. Mack:

"THAT, the Secretary be and is hereby authorized to pay any necessary traveling expenses of members of the Board in Ontario attending regularly called meetings of the Board of Directors; this authority to be included in the book of 'Standing Resolutions'."

Motion carried unanimously.

INSTRUCTION TO SECRETARY RE STANDING RESOLUTIONS

It was regularly moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Williams:

"THAT, the foregoing standing resolutions together with any other resolutions adopted at this annual meeting which the Secretary was instructed to place in the book of "Standing Resolutions" be entered in the book of "Standing Resolutions" and remain in effect until otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors."

Motion carried unanimously.

Shows How Money Can Be Raised for Dog Shows Without Dogs

Want to sell more folk recordings? Then beam your efforts at a city audience. Use every means to make city people aware of the fun and frolic the old-time jigs and reels can be. That's the considered opinion of Herby Webber, a music dealer here, who handles all the standard labels.

His opinion stems from an experience he had as president of the Fredericton Kennel Club. A winter ago he landed the dog fanciers right in the middle of the Jamboree business, simply because they needed a few hundred dollars for show benching.

His basic idea, translated into "Saturday Night Jamboree," worked out something like this: The Kennel Club would produce a show in Teach-

ers College Auditorium each Saturday night for 21 weeks. Each program would be built around six established artists in order to give the audience a solid value for its admission price.

In addition, there would be six contestants each week. These were to be judged on the spot each night by using an applause meter. To let the audience know at once just what they were doing for their favorites, the dial of the applause meter was amplified on a curtain.

Winning Trip

For the final event of "Saturday Night Jamboree," judges were brought from outside points. The grand prize winner was Freddie McKenna, blind fiddler who comes from the Fredericton suburb of Nashwaaksis. He promptly chose the trip to Wheeling, W. Va., and last August was heard with Doc Williams on WWVA's "Saturday Night Jamboree."

Webber is familiar with both classical and popular music circles. He is concert master of the Fredericton Civic Orchestra, a member of the executive board of the Fredericton Community Concert Association and was for two years local chairman of the Kiwanis Concert Series.

On the proceeds of "Jamboree" the Fredericton Kennel Club staged a successful kennel and bench show in September, while a new series of guitar and fiddling contests was set to begin a winter's run in Teachers College this month. Only this year "Saturday Night Jamboree" would be louder and funnier. Thirty minutes of it would be broadcast each night from CFNB. Sponsor would be Capital Co-operative, Ltd., big marketing agency for the farmers of Central New Brunswick.

Most important, of course, is that Webber is selling a lot more of his stock of country music records and plenty more of all types of records.—The Billboard.

Ottawa Leads the Way

HOW long does it take to get a sanction show on the road? Members of the Ottawa Kennel Club believe that they established something of a speed record when, with only two days' notice to complete final arrangements, they staged a sanction show that drew approximately eighty entries and raised one hundred and twenty-five dollars for the C.K.C. Hurricane Relief Fund.

It is true that the show committee had a bit of a head start on the two-day dealing—but to offset the head start, they had to overcome an announcement that plans to hold the show had been cancelled.

Cause of the last minute rush was confusion over the show locale. With halls in Ottawa scarcer than hen's teeth and very expensive, the show committee felt the only possible chance of staging a show that would make any worthwhile contribution to the fund was to secure use of the Ottawa armories. The local officer commanding was co-operative and promised his support for the application but somewhere along the channels of communication something happened and word came back that the basis on which the armories could be made available was with the club paying insurance on the building and contents. Cost of the premium was prohibitive and announcement was made that the show plans would have to be abandoned.

The General Officer Commanding was contacted and regulations giving him the authority to waive insurance in the case of a worthwhile charity was stressed. He agreed that the Hurricane Relief Fund was a particularly worthwhile project and accordingly the insurance was waived.

That was on December 8th and the application had been made to use the armories on December 11th. There was a hurried telephone meeting of the club executive. The decision was to go ahead with the show. Newspaper editors and radio station managers were appealed to. They promised 100 per cent co-operation. The original slate of judges was informed the show was on again and all three again made themselves available at no cost. They were S. W. Scarpa, of Point Fortune, who judged terriers and working dogs, as well as best in show; Peter Hopkinson, of MacDonald's Corners, hounds and non-sporting and John A. Loftus, of Hazeldean, sporting dogs and toys.

The Second novice group was headed by Mrs. Baly with her Poodle "Winkie" and this miniature Poodle also received a scholarship for advanced instruction

as the dog most likely to succeed in obedience trials. Mrs. Sloane with her Corgi "Susie" was second, and the handling prize went to Mrs. Crabtree with her Kerry "Smokey". Mrs. Brown's Collie "Rusty" carried off the improvement prize. These awards were well received by the capacity crowd, and Mrs. Evelyn McCullough received many congratulations as Directress of Training for the very fine showing.

The Executive feel that with three Obedience Trials held in 1954, as well as Canada's first Tracking Test under CKC rules at which T.D. titles were gained, the Club continued to make progress. Tyner of Senneville, P.Q., is a member of the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club of Montreal, and is the first dog in either Canada or the U.S. to complete all the obedience and tracking tests in both countries.

Born in Montreal in February 1951, by Puttencove Gay Gaspard and an English import, she has 18 first placings to her credit. She started her career in 1952 in Mrs. Alex Casgrain's Obedience Training School in Montreal. By May, 1953, she had her Can. and Amer. C.D. with a high of 199½.

By August, 1953, her C.D.X. was confirmed in both countries, with a high score of 199. On October 3rd, 1954, she had her Can. and Amer. U.D.T. with one score of 199 in Utility.

Mandy is a natural when it comes to tracking. During the month of October she passed her first three tracking tests — Canada's first one organized by the M.D.O.T.C. and sponsored by the C.K.C. at Ste. Adele, P.Q., one at Long Island, N.Y. and the third at Concord, Mass.
