

... My purebred German Shepherd had her right rear leg severed at the elbow last July by a mowing machine. This unfortunate accident retarded her development considerably but she has since regained good health, a remarkable ability to get along on "three" and recovering from a strong sense of caution she acquired after the mishap. The severed limb was attended by the "Vet" here who cut the leg about one inch above the elbow and formed a pad with the resulting excess tissue and skin.

It has been suggested by many friends that I procure an artificial limb for her but, in view of the fact that she gets along well, I feel that said harness would hamper her movements, be extremely wearing on her coat, and only add a more marked look of disability. The "Vet" feels that she should be strong enough to provide a healthy litter providing proper care and assistance is given her at this time.

As I am well pleased with this animal and would cherish one of her pups to raise, I was thinking of having her bred to regular stock. I would greatly appreciate your advice in this matter along with your recommendations of good reliable sources of information on the care and training of this breed.

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## THREE GENERATION COATS

... I would like to express my opinions in the argument regarding three generations, same coat in the Dachshund.

Having just recently imported a wirehair Dachshund bred female from the United States, I know what a headache their interbreeding of coats can be. I searched for a year for a three generation wirehair female and was at last successful. I certainly feel it was well worth the trouble because when we have a litter of puppies we know they will be wirehair and not a mixture of smooth and wire.

In my search for a wirehair I found that the breeders I contacted knew whether their stock was three generation wire or not, and did not hesitate to say if they were not.

I very much hope the C.K.C. sees fit to uphold their stand for the three generation same coat in Dachshunds. Maybe if they adopted the plan of having the individual registrations marked with a W for wirehair, L for longhair and Sm for smooth, M for Miniature and S for standard the A.K.C. might follow them and end trouble in the future, of not being able to tell the coats in a pedigree.

Another point I would like to bring up is, how can an American Dachshund that isn't three generation same coat come to Canada and win a Canadian championship when he is not eligible for registration here?

## THE AFGHAN

The history of this exotic breed goes back to the days of the Ten Commandments, which perhaps accounts for the inscrutable distant gaze of the Afghan.

Whatever one may think about the slender graceful Afghan—it is an extraordinary animal.

Although he is a speedy hunting dog, working by sight rather than by scent, he is unsurpassed as a hurdle racer. Originating from a hilly country where to overcome obstacles was more vital than speed, he has developed this ability as has no other hound.

Consider his physique, which has remained almost completely unaltered through the centuries. Note the set of the hip bones—higher than in the usual dog, and despite the slimness set quite wide apart. This unusual assemblage somewhat resembles that of a monkey and enables him to swivel quickly without losing speed and yet packing power into his hips.

Bred in the mountainous country of Afghanistan and existing through the years in high altitudes and severe winters, he is a hardy animal despite his sometimes languorous appearance.

The coat, for example—long, silky, thick—stands away from the body. The areas most requiring protection are generously covered—quarters, fore quarters, flanks and ribs. The legs are well covered as are the long ears.

Look at the set of the tail—unusually low, but carried high. Again there is a reason for this arrangement. In their native Afghanistan the greater part of the hunting is done in the thickets. The high carriage is often the only way by which the action of the dog can be detected.

Born to wealth, the Afghan Hound became a recognizable type of dog in the location said to be where God delivered the Ten Commandments to Moses. At that time the area was a part of ancient Egypt, and the Afghans' existence was recorded over and over again—in the period of 3000 to 4000 B.C. Even then his hunting ability was noted frequently, and appreciated. As decades passed his ability grew, and although there are no early stud books, selective breeding is evident.

How did the Afghan become portrayed in the tombs in the valley of the Nile? Possibly some of these aristocratic hounds were given as a present or formed part of the entourage of a Sheik.

During the first World War British officers found the animal fascinating—to the extent that the breed not only became known in England, but through Arabia, Persia and India, where gazelles and leopards are hunted.

With this proud animal there is little danger of familiarity breeding contempt. An exotic creature, he stands aloof and inscrutable, appearing to gaze with almond-shaped eyes not only into the distance, but into past centuries. His long silky topknot is another feature for which there is no comparison.

In an interview with Mrs. Mary L. Matchett of Highland Creek, Ontario, we learned that the owner of El Myia Afghan Kennels became interested in the breed fifty years ago. As a tiny girl she saw Afghans illustrated in *Dog World* (England) and announced to her sisters that she would one day own some of these dogs. The girls laughed, but Mary had made up her mind. At the time the family owned a registered kennel of Terriers which is still maintained by her eldest sister, so that the idea of raising dogs was not foreign. Mary held steadfast to her dream however, and has not only owned but also bred Afghans for nearly twenty years.

We asked Mrs. Matchett if the dogs with the long silken hair require much special care. "Well, yes," she said, "You wouldn't let a show dog run around through the bush. They are easy in other ways—obedient, clean, almost human, yet stubborn and defiant in the wrong

hands. As a pet dog they just wish to be near their owner. Not a demonstrative breed, their love is very sincere and never wavers. Every moment that is spent in grooming is well rewarded. The finished product is so beautiful it's like painting a picture. To keep one Afghan is no hardship at all."

The breed is exceptionally free from disease, she has found in her experience of making around 27 champions.

"I would say they are very hardy, probably due to the fact that they are an old and natural breed. Nothing has been cut off them nor added on. They have great endurance, and their speed while running is beautiful to behold—just a flash and they are almost out of sight."

Mrs. Matchett finds the puppies play quite differently from other breeds, standing on their hind legs and wrapping their arms around each other. Interestingly enough, she finds they don't fight.

While puppies run and play a good deal, this noted breeder finds that all the grown Afghan asks is to be near its owner.

"They are wonderful house dogs. They will greet visitors, then curl up on their beds and ignore them. Most people like this because what friends, dressed in good clothes, want a dog jumping all over them?"

As evidence that Afghans are very much sight hounds, Mrs. Matchett recounts the following experience: "I remember years ago standing by the ring-side while they called frantically for the rest of the class. Other dogs moved along the passage way, but the moment an Afghan appeared at the far end of the building my dog wagged his tail and pranced around ready to go in the ring. They always know their own breed, and as I also breed Keeshonden they love Kees and would like to jump up to greet every one they see benched. The funny thing is they think Norwegian Elkhounds are Kees too, much to the disgust and anger of many a Norwegian!"

Mrs. Matchett has also successfully obedience-trained members of her Afghan kennels.

## KAYT CANINES

This is the first of a series of story "shorts" on people who have, usually through some exigency, made a vocation of an avocation—Dogs.

A tall, well-dressed woman, her trim suit topped by a perky pink flowered hat stopped at the *Dogs in Canada* display at the Westminster show. She introduced herself as Mrs. Thompson. We recognized her as the entrepreneur of the famous Kayt Canines—true-to-life reproductions of pure bred dogs.

Behind most careers lies what is known as a "break"—lucky or unlucky. In Mrs. Thompson's case it was a literal break. One wintry day, about six years ago, she was leading her three dogs up a flight of icy steps. A moment later she found herself with a badly fractured leg which laid her up for weary months.

To this naturally active woman, the prospect of inactivity was shattering. Her family suggested there was nothing wrong with her fingers and brain. Why not take up her formerly interesting hobby of painting animal figures. She had no argument for that, so just as an experiment, she made a model of a friend's pet, then a few more. When relatives and acquaintances saw the finished product they lost no time in requesting reproductions of their own dogs. But to the invalid's surprise, they were more than willing to pay for them. And that was the beginning of the thriving business known as Kayt Canines, 23 West 8th St., New York. Never one to stop halfway in her work, Mrs. Thompson developed a formula of mixing paints by which she can match any dog's natural colouring. This persistence in perfection

meant two years of development, but the effort was worth it. The paint is waterproof, chip-proof and fade-proof, and results in a beautiful finish. She now does individual portraits of more than 40 standard breeds, including pets and champions, with her colouring and conformation approved by The American Kennel Club.

This talented artist works from photographs, preferably several for accuracy, and of course must know the sex, breed, age, and have a true description of colouring and markings.

Inspiration is provided by the live dogs with which she surrounds herself, among them Julie, a graduate of the ASPCA. Julie, a fine critic, has never modelled for a figure.

"It's like the shoemaker's children all over again," says Mrs. Thompson. "I'm so busy I can't get around to doing my own dog."

One of the few untouched and "unimproved" breeds known today, the Basenji, because of his isolation in the heart of Africa for centuries, has remained almost completely pure as to coat, color, size and shape. Even his temperament, which is a happy one, has remained unaltered.

Almost every feature about the African Basenji is remarkable. Perhaps his outstanding characteristic is that of not barking. On the jungle trails the Congolese make their dogs little bells of fibre so that they can be trailed to their prey. In the modern home, where so many pets make an unnecessary racket when the doorbell or telephone rings, the Basenji quietly stands his ground, probably figuring the family is smart enough to catch the household signals without help. But he is not oblivious by any means. He will tiptoe to the doorway and take up his guard, and heaven help the intruder.

The breed, though barkless, has many ways of communicating his ideas. When other dogs are barking frantically, the barkless dog emits a menacing growl of proportions one might expect in a much larger animal. His snarl has the threat of a wild animal, and in rare sheer fright, he might scream.

Some Basenjis talk and chortle with each other and with their master in a voice much like that of a Siamese cat. Only the words are missing. Never to be accused of monotony, other members of the breed are accomplished yodelers with an incredible range. Others crow like a young rooster giving his vocal chords their first workout; a crow of surprise, of

greeting, amazement, or in triumph over some mission of mischief completed unnoticed. Sometimes the crow is released simply because the world in general seems all right. Strangest of all is a night call, usually heard when a number of Basenjis are kennelled together—a sort of pack call which resembles bird notes, rather than an animal sound.

A mimic of the first degree, the Basenjis will lure a wildcat or even a whole colony of birds in Africa to their masters, by sheer perfection of mimicry. The birds, according to authorities, are not necessarily lured for killing, but kept as pets much as we keep budgies and canaries.

One of the oldest breeds in the world, the "barkless" dog has been known on this continent only in recent years. Mrs. Byron Rogers brought a pair to New York around 1937, but unfortunately the first litter and the dam were lost through distemper. The only survivor was the male, Bois. When a young female was brought from Africa four years later, Alexander Phemister of Kingston, Mass., obtained her and Bois as well. The result of their mating was the first litter of Basenji puppies to be successfully raised on this continent. The late Dr. A. R. B. Richmond of Toronto is credited as being the first to register and show a litter of Basenjis in Canada. His Wildrush Basenjis are now well known throughout the United States as well as Canada. The name Wildrush, incidentally, is adapted from the home of the Brownings of poetic fame, to whom Dr. Richmond was related.

## THE SILENT HUNTER

Another breed makes good in Hollywood. You'll be seeing and hearing more about the adventurous, admirable "barkless dog."

Although city life is so far removed from the original habitat, the little hunter is a delight in the home. Born practically house-broken, he is immaculate. In fact, this canine Beau Brummel is so fastidious he rarely needs a bath. He grooms his coat himself, and is particularly fussy about his feet and tends them much like a cat. A brisk towel rub and a daily treatment with a soft brush will bring out a glister like burnished copper in his coat and please him mightily. Another fine quality is his complete lack of doggy odour. In its place is a freshness like that of fields.

Very much a one-man dog, the little hunter really strives to please, and several members of his breed have gone to the top in Obedience. Others in Canada and the United States are well on their way. An idea of their tractability is evidenced in the success of their acting in the recently made movie "Goodbye My Lady" (*Dogs in Canada, Dec. 1955*) in which several Basenjis owned by Sheila Anderson of Glenairley Basenji Kennels, Victoria, B.C. and Pharis and Fleck of Story Book Ranch, Uniondale, Pa., were members of the cast.

The dapper little dog's coat is short and silky, usually a golden red, set off with neat white feet and tailtip, white chest and belly, and sometimes a white blaze and collar. Occasionally a handsome tricolor appears in the form of glossy black with clearly defined edgings of lustrous tan, tan triangular markings above the eyes, and white in similar placement to that of red dogs. His tail, as would be expected in this alert perky dog, shows animation, and curls tightly to one side of his back. In a truly animated animal, it curls even more tightly, like a pompon.

The whole keynote of the character is shown in the head and expression. His prick ears indicate constant alertness, his brown eyes have a slight slant, but most unusual of all is the wrinkled forehead which gives a misleading anxious expression. You may be certain he is not as worried as he appears.

# LET'S ERADICATE RABIES

These facts about Rabies are presented with the hope that readers will help dispel rumours that abound wherever the epidemic threatens. This article has been approved by the Toronto Academy of Veterinary Medicine.

**R**abies scare or eradication? The answer, in great part, lies in the hands of dog lovers everywhere. Authorities report that the scourge can be totally obliterated if only dog owners will co-operate. Veterinarians in Southern Ontario, and particularly in Toronto have been working overtime on vaccination and education.

Addressing this article to owners of pure bred dogs might appear somewhat like a minister preaching to faithful members of his congregation on absenteeism. But you, as conscientious breeders and owners can help immeasurably with the program by urging people to have their dogs and cats vaccinated against rabies, or at least to keep them under supervision.

While the principal source of rabies is wild life, vaccination of pets is essential because they, in turn, are the greatest danger to humans, apart from other animals.

The vaccination is available at low cost. It becomes effective about 21 days after it is received, and is protective for a period of about three years. However, under epidemic conditions, a booster shot is recommended after a period of 18 months.

When a dog is vaccinated a tag is attached to the collar which states the animal has been given the shot and the date. As further proof the owner is provided with a certificate which testifies that the animal has been protected. Except for an occasional short period of sluggishness, the animals show no ill effect.

## Facts about Rabies

Rabies is a virus disease, usually communicated by an animal being bitten by a diseased one. Strangely, the disease may lie dormant for varying periods of up to six months. But once it becomes apparent, the animal dies within one week. Contrary to general opinion, the disease is not confined to "dog days", but is prevalent in late winter and spring, although it could break out at any time of year in any climate.

Rabies in dogs comes under two headings, usually classified as "furious" or "dumb".

## Furious Rabies

Characteristics change noticeably during the early stage of the disease. The dog may appear fairly normal, possibly more affectionate than usual. But watch out for a quick change to irritability and nervousness. The dog may tend to roam,

and bite at people or objects without any apparent cause. This is where children run into danger. It is natural for them to try to pick up a friendly looking dog, and equally natural for the animal to try to get away. If not released promptly a bad bite may ensue.

Another tendency is to eat sticks, dirt, and other indigestible items. After one to three days the animal may become extremely nervous and even vicious, biting any living thing it encounters. Other changes become apparent. The eyes become glazed and have a staring appearance. A paralysis of the throat may be present, changing the bark to a sort of howl.

Within a few more days, the stage of paralysis is reached, which first becomes obvious in a stagger or wobbly walk, matched by a paralysis of the lower jaw which allows it to hang open and prevents the dog from eating or even drinking water. Gradually the immobility takes over the whole system and the victim dies.

## Dumb Rabies

Sleepiness and depression are the main symptoms in the early stages of this type of the disease. The dog prefers to get away by himself. Paralysis of the jaw, throat and leg muscles follows fairly promptly. In this case there is no unusual irritability or tendency to bite people or objects, but it is a risky business to attempt to look into the throat or give medicine.

Animals afflicted with rabies tend to become absolutely fearless, particularly in wildlife, when ordinarily shy animals will invade farms and attack almost anything in sight. They also appear to be insensible to pain.

## If a Dog is Bitten

To help prevent hysteria, it should be realized that not all dogs frothing at the mouth have contracted rabies. Nor does paralysis apply only to this disease. However, a dog which has been bitten by an animal suspected of being rabid should be immediately confined and attended by

a veterinarian, with a series of the vaccine doses started immediately. The reason is that because of the tardiness in the development of the disease, there is frequently still time to build up the dog's resistance to the virus.

## If a Person is Bitten

During an epidemic in your community, it is wisest to assume a biting dog is rabid and immediately wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water, at the same time encouraging bleeding, which helps remove some of the infected saliva in the event rabies is present. A doctor should be called promptly. The dog or other animal involved should be quarantined for a period of two weeks, preferably in a veterinary hospital. The dog should not be killed immediately, because as the disease progresses and the animal dies through the usual process, microscopic examination of the brain will indicate whether it was rabid.

In the meantime, children should be warned not to play with stray animals. Families planning to take their pets to the country for a visit or even for a run in the fields, are advised to give them protection now, rather than waiting until just before the trip.

Remember, four or five weeks are required before the protection develops.

The Toronto Academy of Veterinary Medicine believes that although vaccination is important in controlling rabies it will certainly not eradicate the disease. Eradication can only be accomplished by diluting the wild life reservoir to the point where it becomes difficult for a rabid animal to bite another animal. The Academy has made recommendations that government spending be directed towards this. If the wild animal hosts are not controlled then Ontario will remain a rabies endemic area and dog owners will be obligated to have them vaccinated every 18 months. The Department of Lands and Forests say that this would be too costly, however, the cost would be less in the long run than would be repeated vaccinations.

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# HELPS IN THE TRAINING OF A HERD DOG

Natural instinct is only the start of a good herd dog. This article prepared by the Gaines Dog Research Center deals with the other half of the partnership.

While almost every country has its own variety of sheep dog or shepherd dog, in England, Scotland and America, the most often seen herding dog is the oldtime shepherd-collie, known as the Border Collie. These dogs are smaller than the show type collie, usually black and white or black and tan in color, and are blunter in muzzle and head than the show type Collie.

In choosing a dog to be developed for hard work, working qualities should come first, type and looks afterwards. Intelligence, agility and sound physique are of prime importance for work with cattle, sheep, and horses. Dull or timid dogs should not be used for herd work as they never make satisfactory helpers. A dog that comes from working parents and hence has the herding instinct "born in him" is liable to prove to be superior to one from a family of dogs which has never been used for herd work. An aggressive dog that is inclined to fight or bite is not an ideal herder. Some trainers believe that males are preferable to females. They are usually a little more forceful and headstrong and the problem of their coming into season does not arise. This is not by any means true in all cases, though, as many very good workers and winners at sheep dog trials have been females, and there are a great many owners who consider them more obedient and easier to train than males.

Puppies from herding parentage often display an active interest in sheep as young as seven weeks of age, but the trainer should not be discouraged if the dog does not show any interest until a much later age, as long as the breeding is right. The first step in training is to gain the dog's confidence and affection. He should be given a name, preferably a short one with a distinctive sound that will carry well when he is at some distance away, such as Kep, Glen, Boy, Tess, Jay, etc. The name should be used whenever the puppy is spoken to, so that he will know it at an early age.

Until the puppy is six months of age he should get three meals a day, and two thereafter. A mature dog needs only one meal a day, unless he is being worked hard, in which case a light meal should be fed in the morning, in addition to the regular evening meal.

At four to five months of age the puppy should be taught to lie down on command. Use any word of command you like, but be sure to use only one, and the same one every time, such as "down" or "stop." There are trainers who prefer giving a short soft whistle instead of a voice command, as a whistle does not convey your feelings and so guards against the bad effect of possible ill-

temper or exasperation on the trainer's part. A good way to teach the dog to lie down on command is to have him on a lead and pressing down on his rump give the command or whistle. As he learns, gradually increase the distance you are from him, making the sound suit the distance. Give him plenty of practice at dropping down at any odd moment when you give the order. It is essential that he learn to obey this command instantly. It is important that the same word always be used for the same order. Using different phrases such as "down!" on occasion and "get down!" another time will confuse the dog.

The dog must also be taught to come to you immediately when you call him. Usually learning this is very easy, but if you have any difficulty, put him on a long cord and pull him towards you while saying "Come, Boy" or whatever the dog's name may be. When the dog is close to you, praise him and give him a tid-bit to show him that he has done the right thing. Never call the dog to you to punish him, and don't jerk or scold him as it will only frighten him. A few days of practice, first with the long cord and later without it, should teach him this order. If he disobeys when the rope is discarded, use it again until he is well grounded in this command.

The next step is teaching the dog to walk at heel. This can be taught at 6 months of age. It is a mistake to permit a dog to run ahead frightening sheep or perhaps even chasing them, or chasing rabbits that may jump up, especially if he is not yet under proper control. A dog at heel is always ready to carry out an order should one be given, and that is the position from which you will cast him later when you start working him. Having the dog walk at your left heel frees your right hand for other work, and he is out of the way. To teach this lesson, grasp the leash short with the left hand, start walking and keep him at heel by gently pulling him back into position and saying "heel!" if he pulls ahead or lags back. If he is stubborn, jerk him back, using the command. Sometimes a tap on the nose with a light switch or a rolled newspaper helps to keep him in position, but be careful of his eyes. Another good method is to walk close to a wall or fence so the dog cannot crowd past you. Gradually the leash can be discarded, but lessons with the leash should be resumed if the dog shows signs of forgetting to obey the command "heel!"

A puppy may be taken on the rounds, kept by the master's side, as early as five months of age. If he takes too active an interest in things he should be chained up when there is anything to chase and

also at night, when not under the owner's eye. He should be made perfect at dropping (lying down), coming to heel and walking at heel before actual training on stock begins. At seven or eight months he should be strong enough (and fast enough) to head off stock and should be showing a keenness to do so.

It is well to keep in mind that patience and persistence are necessary. The methods outlined here are those of successful trainers, but each master must adapt the system to the needs of his own dog, changing the procedure as conditions develop. As every dog has his own individual reactions, a fixed set of rules will not hold for every dog.

The first lesson should be to teach the dog to drive animals and to drive them in any given direction. The first driving practice should take place on a narrow fence road so that the animals cannot scatter. It is important for these lessons that no sheep or cattle be used that are liable to turn on the pup and fight him and so scare him. This command to drive animals should be given with both voice and motion with the left arm. All commands for herding work should be given with both voice and motion. In bad or stormy weather motion may be the only way a command can be given, and the dog should be trained to watch for orders by eye as well as ear. Well-trained dogs can often get commands given from as far away as three or four hundred yards. The command "hup em," "drive on," or any words you choose, should be given supplemented by the arm being pointed horizontally. A staff, stick or white cloth in the left hand will be helpful to the dog in observing the motion even if he is at a considerable distance. The dog should be urged to drive on the flock. If the dog is too aggressive, it may be necessary to keep him on a leash for the first lesson or two, later a long cord may be used to restrain him from driving cattle or sheep too fast, which he is liable to do at first. The command "slow!" should be given, and he should be checked with leash or cord. To stop the dog, the command "stop!" or "down!" should be given, accompanied by the left hand held high. It usually requires about twenty to thirty days to teach a dog to drive a flock in the direction indicated and to make him understand that he must listen and watch the trainer for directions and commands.

The next important step is teaching the dog to encircle the flock and bring them up to you. The trainer should give the command "around," pointing in the direction and advancing a few steps in the direction. A circling motion with the arm

# HOW TO TATTOO YOUR DOG

Because of the many requests for information on tattooing for identification, this article is again repeated with instructions given verbally and pictorially.

**R**ecords, now kept for over 25 years show that every popular breed of dog has been successfully tattooed. The tattoo marks placed in the ear, or in the flank or the lip, make it possible to find a satisfactory place to tattoo any breed, and the marks remain permanent and legible the lifetime of the dog. The instructions are simple, but must be followed exactly as outlined below. (Over and over again a breeder reporting failure, has had complete success by finding out where he had gone contrary to


fully. You should have—I pair of nickel plated pliers, your registration letters, the year letter, 1 leather stripper, 4 rubber strippers, a tube of Ketchum's black paste tattoo ink (unless you prefer green paste ink), a brush to clean the letters and figures, a small bottle of carbon tetrachloride, instructions, (see introduction picture).

Whether a new set or one you have already used, be sure you have (A) the year letter you need; (B) the ink; (C) Clippers, electric or hand; (D) Carbon

is done by placing one over the letters and figures, squeeze down, take a second stripper, place over the first squeeze down, and remove the second. The purpose of the second stripper is to shove the first one down on the pins. Thick corrugated paper may be used instead of the second rubber stripper. (See illustrations No. 2 and 3.)

No. 3. Carefully prepare the area to be tattooed by (A) removing all hair with an electric or hand clipper (not scissors, unless you take great care). See illustration 3A. (B) Wipe off the area with carbon tetrachloride as is provided with the set. (See illustration 3B). Do not use coal oil or turpentine, as they will affect the ink. If you do not have carbon tetrachloride, the next best thing is alcohol or in an emergency you may use soap and water. With the latter, be sure the area is dry before you start to tattoo.

the instructions.) The basic method is the same for any location.

Tattoo the pups when they are two to three months old for best results. The marks will grow with the puppy.

The ear is the most popular, and the easiest to do. One need only choose a spot which is usually to be found in the centre of the ear quite close to the head.

Should you decide to tattoo the flank, you will need an assistant and it requires a little more care.

If you would like to lip tattoo, you will need a pair of specially designed tattoo pliers, called Model 50DL.

Always use a special tattoo ink—no other type of ink will withstand the cleansing action of the blood stream.

The first time you use your set check contents and read all directions care-

Tetrachloride; (E) a table or bench of a convenient height and size on which to set your pup, and to lay your pliers, with the carbon tetrachloride and ink, so that you can reach them.

Read the directions carefully, they are as follows:

No. 1. Put the letters and figures through a wash of the carbon tetrachloride to be sure they are clean, then place them in the pliers, as shown in illustration No. 1. You will note that these dies can only be inserted in one way. The slot for the lock bar goes to the front of the pliers. Be sure you have the right letters and numbers by testing them first on a paper, or the blotter that is provided.

No. 2. Place the rubber strippers over the letters and figures to prevent ear from sticking to the pin points. This



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
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No. 4. Put a very small amount of liquid or paste ink right on the area to be tattooed—don't smear it all over so that you cannot see the veins. See illustration 4. Also, put a small amount over the pin points of the letters and figures which protrude beyond the rubber strippers. Be careful that the ear is held firmly so that there are no wrinkles in it.

No. 5. With a quick firm motion, squeeze pliers and pierce the ear. Release immediately. With the thumb and forefinger massage more tattoo ink on the tattooed area. See illustrations 5 and 6. Some type of ears have a tendency to bleed, and it is the cleansing action of this bleeding which washes away the ink and causes faint or obliterated marks. *It is important that you continue to massage the ink into the pin holes until all danger of bleeding is past.*

We have found, by careful recording of tattoo markings of dogs, that in every case where the ink was carefully rubbed into pin holes, until and after all bleeding had subsided that the marks were 100%.

Do not wipe off the excess tattoo ink, or clean the ear in any way. Simply allow the ink to dry, and disappear. This will take about ten days. When the surface ink has worn away, you will have a clear and legible mark. This will take about three weeks. See illustration 7. Clean the letters and figures well, using the brush provided for this purpose, both before and after using. Oil the pliers occasionally and keep the equipment stored in a dry place.

**Special Instructions for Flank Tattooing.** There should be no difficulty in tattooing in this location, but more care must be taken. You must have an assistant, who will hold the dog in a comfortable position, stretching his leg until the skin of the flank is quite taut, *but not uncomfortable*. Follow the regular instructions in every way, continue to hold the dog after you rub the ink in so that he cannot move his leg until the ink has dried slightly. This should be about five minutes. If you allow the dog to walk around immediately he will probably rub the ink off on the other side of the flank.

**Special Instructions for Lip Tattooing.** Lip tattooing is completely successful, but requires a special size letter, as supplied in a model 50DL. The method is the same, except that you must be sure that the lower lip is held firmly, and is completely dry and free of saliva, both before and after tattooing.

**Recommendation** — We recommend that any dog, but particularly large eared dogs, be tattooed in both ears—the year letter and number in one ear. This will allow you to leave a blank—the registration letters in the other. space between your letters and figures, and the resulting marks are especially clear. See illustration 8.

## Report on THE CRUFTS SHOW

Mecca of Dogdom, the Crufts Dog Show held at Olympia, London, England, February 10 and 11 under the British Kennel Club, broke records for entries with a grand total of 6,433 dogs, making 12,328 entries altogether.

Visitors from other countries included a large German crowd, interested in German Shepherds, Poodles and Terriers, Brits Soderberg who came over from Sweden to buy Poodles, Mr. Brainard, U.S.A. who judged one of the finest entries of Wire Fox Terriers in years. The Ceylon Kennel Club was represented by Dr. de Silva and friends, and the respective presidents of the Dutch Kennel Club, Professor Hirschfeld and Mr. Nagel Errie Erichson of the Norwegian Kennel Club and parties. Mr. Green of South Africa judged the Rhodesian Ridgeback class.

To give some idea of the difficulty in sorting and assessing this gathering of thousands of the world's greatest dogs,

there were 921 entries in Hounds, 865 in toys and 1,124 in Terriers, all judged the first day. The second day saw 2,117 non-sporting competitors judged and 346 Gun dogs.

Highlight of each day was the parade of all Best of Breed Winners. Best in Show was awarded to Mrs. W. de Casembroot and Miss H. Greenish, for their Greyhound Treetops Falcon. Near winners were a Keeshond and a Bullmastiff, with a Wire Fox Terrier runner-up.

A tradition of the show is a dinner given the leading professional handler of the year. Top handler for the second time was Ernie Sharpe, who specializes in Welsh and Wire Fox Terriers.

# DOGS and PEOPLE

Mrs. Patricia Mowatt, New Toronto, complained that her dog was unmanageable. Her solution was to tie the dog to a radiator with a nine-inch cord. The dog's neck measured fourteen inches. Result—the cord was imbedded so deeply it could be removed only after the animal had been destroyed. Mrs. Mowatt, who claimed she did not know the animal's neck was gashed, and used the cord after her dog had broken collars and run away several times, was fined \$25 and costs for permitting unnecessary suffering to an animal.

Oak Gables Carousel, owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Reid of Stittsville, Ont., came fourth in a class of eleven, in the Miniature Schnauzer Open Females.

The two-year-old white Bull Terrier female, Ch. Stormalong's Jewel of Ermi-



cor, won the open class and was judged Winners Female. This is the second con-

secutive year for this honour, writes her owner, Mrs. H. M. Williams of Lambeth, Ont.

Owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. G. McFarlane, Toronto, the Cairn Terrier Badenoch Hamish Ruadh went second in the Puppy, 6-9 months class, and Ch. Badenoch Bonny Heather took 1st, Bred by Exhibitor. Mrs. Betty Hyslop, whose Cairndania Kennels made a hit at the Westminster Show as reported in part in March issue, also triumphed in many classes in the Specialty Show, to the extent that space does not permit reporting them in detail.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Price, Willowdale, Ont., placed third in Tri-color Open Females with Sunnybrook Sweet Sue 2nd.

Covington Free Lance Reporter, owned by Mrs. Lilah S. Lymburner, Port Colborne, Ont., an 11-month-old puppy won the Puppy Class. show success to reach the rank of Champion. Miss Devlin, who handles her own dog, expressed the hope of being able to enter Skysyl in Canadian Dog shows.

Mrs. R. Dafeo, Challenger Kennels Reg'd., Port Nelson, Ont., reports her Irish Setter female, Can. Ch. Red Barn Red Stardust, took a major Irish Setter Show—3 points—at Hartford, Conn., on February 18. She writes: "While Dusty is American bred, we imported her as a puppy in 1953 and it is interesting to note that she has two litter sisters, Red Barn Royal Holly and Red Barn Royal Charm, who have both secured their American Champion titles, and one litter brother, Red Star Talent Scout, who has also secured his American title. This remarkable record for one litter is the result of a breeding between Am. & Can. Ch. Red Star of Hollywood Hills C.D.X. and Am. Ch. Boxley Holly Anne. Mrs. Wm. Neville of the Red Barn Kennels, Orangeburg, N.Y., is the breeder."

Mrs. Elizabeth V. Sharen recently had a reminder that the exchange of dogs between Canada and California is not a one-way affair. In October she sold a Dachshund puppy to Mrs. Harry Brekwedel, who was then living temporarily in Sarnia. The Brekwedels returned to their home in Los Angeles in January, taking Betsy with them. Mrs. Brekwedel wrote that Betsy had withstood the long auto trip, which included a crossing of the Texas desert, very well and was enjoying the California sunshine with gusto.

A 136-year-old secret has been given up by the archives of the Isle of Sark in the Channel Islands.

For more than a century a man who coveted a Corgi or wished to own any other type of dog was "dogged" by an impending jail sentence.

Under this ancient law, passed by the Sark Parliament, the maximum number of dogs permitted was 40—one for each of the original settlers in 1785. A recent nose count of the dog population totalled 75—which called for a convening of Parliament to discuss the fate of the extra 35 canines. The sad faces of the audience brightened considerably when Hillary Carre, the Island's Chancellor of the Exchequer, emerged from his research. Although the 40-dog law was passed in 1785, the records showed that it had been repealed 35 years later.

However, he divulged, it is still the law that only one person on the island is permitted to own a female dog. The statute, dating back to the mid 1500's, gives the right to the hereditary Dame of Sark, Mrs. R. W. Hathaway, who owns a poodle named Bella.

Mrs. Hathaway already has plans. "I," said she, "am going to start breeding poodles."

Dogcatcher John Chadwick asked the council of the northern Ontario mining centre of Wawa for permission to carry a revolver "for protection against dog owners". Request was refused. Mr. Chadwick stated that he had been threatened bodily harm, beatings and even having his house burned down if he did not stop picking up dogs running at large.

To help him carry out his duties, however, the council agreed to write provincial police urging that charges be laid against citizens violating the dog by-law.

Somerset Solomon, owned by John H. Jansen of Riverside, Ont., is the first Canadian-bred Miniature Poodle to become an American and Canadian champion, reports his owner. His litter sister, Somerset Sugar n' Spice is the first female to achieve this honour, he adds.

Can. Ch. Polyanna, English Setter, female, owned by Mrs. H. R. Hills, Carp, Ontario, has been named Dam of the Year by the English Setter Association of America. Polyanna not only won over all American contestants, but records show she is the first Canadian Bred to win this award.

Selected as the dam producing the most American Champions and points during 1955, Polyanna is the dam of Am. & Can. Ch. Hillsdale Betty, Am. & Can. Ch. Hillsdale Susan, Am. Ch. Hillsdale Surprise, and Can. Ch. Hillsdale Bob.

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

An interview with Basenji-breeder Sheila Anderson reveals the unusual circumstances which brought about her interest in the species. In her own words:

All during the war years our son, David, then a little boy, clamoured for a dog. But how could he have one? His father was a P.O.W. in Hong Kong, and the rest of us refugees in Canada, living in other peoples' houses and facing a gloomy future. However I used to promise him that when things got better we would get a dog.

Finally the happy day arrived when we returned to Hong Kong and during the trip on the Washington Mail, (so recently and tragically in the news) we studied the little dog book we had.

What breed should it be? We had many ideas, but they, I must confess, were rather negative ones. We were going to live in the Tropics again, we did not want a dog with a heavy coat, or one with short legs, or one that might have trouble breathing in the torrid summer heat. Neither did we like docked tails or cropped ears. Over and over again we looked at the picture of the Basenji. It seemed just what we wished for. Small, smart, and trim, with the added attraction of being barkless. We decided we would get a Basenji not knowing that the breed was so rare, that as well as not being able to obtain one in Hong Kong most people had never heard of such a dog. So we ended by getting a Greyhound and a pair of Dalmatians from Australia. Lovely dogs which gave us many, many happy times, and breeds which I hope to have again some day with my Basenjis.

Time rolled on and David went to school in Switzerland. By then I had got in touch with Basenji breeders in England, and was reading all I could about the Breed. They fascinated me and I determined to get a pair. So after putting David into his school I went to England and stayed with Miss Tudor Williams of the famous Congo Kennel. Needless to say I was completely captivated by her lovely dogs and purchased Lotusbud of the Congo, (later a Canadian Champion) in whelp to Ch. Black Magic of the Congo, and a little puppy called Magician of the Congo. Lollypop and Nikko travelled out to Hong Kong by sea. A formidable journey, but Basenjis are strong and healthy little animals and they stood it very well. They were the first Basenjis ever to be seen in the Far East and Lotusbud's litter of five (of which Can. Ch. Joss of Glenairley C.D. is a member) created a wonderful impression.

The Basenjis were the adored friends of Han Suyin the author, and those who have read her book, *A Many Splendoured Thing*, which was written in our house will recognize the dogs. In fact Han Suyin used to say that Lollypop helped her write it as she used to read bits from the rough draft to her while Lollypop lay on her bed in the comfort all Basenjis expect to have!

In 1951 we left Hong Kong for good

and we brought Lollypop, Nikko, Joss, and Tattibogle the Greyhound, with us by air. It was a journey which was a saga in itself. It nearly killed me. But the Basenjis never turned a hair, in fact they could have entered in a point show on arrival and would have got compliments on their condition.

So that in brief is the start of the Glenairley Basenjis. Little did I think in those war years when David was asking for a dog that the time would come when I would have a kennel, with my dogs all over the North American continent, and through them get a taste of Hollywood film life.

## Training a Herd Dog

should be made when the command is given to show the dog the direction in which he is to go. A good beginning for this training is to get a few sheep (about a dozen) up against a fence in an open space, walk in amongst them—making them scatter—and encourage the dog to head them back into the flock. Do this several times, sometimes catching one of the sheep to help the dog understand that the idea is to bring the animals to you. Repeat this operation until he learns to hold the flock up against the fence. Drop the dog every now and then while he is working to keep him under complete control. Next the sheep should be driven into the center of a large open paddock. Order the dog down, and then encourage him to run around the flock and bring the flock to you, give the vocal command and arm gesture. As he circles in one direction, advance along the opposite side of the flock, and when he is half-way around (at the head of the flock) give the "come!" command and he will circle around and meet you.

Even if this first performance of bringing sheep to you has not been carried out perfectly, pet and praise the dog if he succeeds at all, as it will encourage him. This step will probably have to be repeated many times. Should the dog attempt to come around in front of the sheep (between you and the flock), drop him before he can do so and start him over again. As you increase the distance that you send him to bring sheep, you will have to cast him wider. If the dog shows a preference for always running out on the one hand (side), let him do so for the meantime as he can be taught later to circle from whichever side is indicated. Suppose, for instance, he prefers to go around on the right (as you are facing the flock), to cast him properly and wide, drop him a few yards behind you on your left then with a wave of the right arm bring him around behind you on your right, giving the command "fetch them!" at the same time. This should start him out wide. To start him out still wider, once he learns to come around behind you nicely, increase the distance between you and the dog. Follow the same procedure when the sheep are some distance away, so that eventually he will learn when to cast far or near

depending on the distance between you and the dog at the start of the cast. When he has learned to cast properly on the one hand, then teach him to do so on the other.

To teach him to take direction, use the following procedure. Place him between you and the sheep. If you wish him to circle to the right, step to the right, with the right hand extended, saying "this way" and giving the fetch command. Do just the opposite to get him to go to the left side. When he is casting efficiently and working steadily at all distances, he can then be cast from a distance or even be sent to fetch sheep that are out of sight.

To train the dog to bring sheep from a distant point to the trainer or to a pen, take the dog with you to a point fairly near the flock. Cast him, giving the fetch command and walking part of the distance with him. Urge the dog on until he has circled the flock half-way, then turn and walk toward the pen, commanding "drive on" at the same time. Repeat this daily and gradually increase the distance from the flock at which the fetch command is given.

To teach the dog to bring stray animals into the flock, point to the strays and give the command "this way." When he has reached the strays make a sweeping gesture toward the main body of the flock and give the command "fetch them" at the same time taking a few steps in the direction of the flock so that the dog will understand that he is expected to drive them into the flock. The same method should be used to train the dog to gather up sheep that have been left behind the flock, except the command "go back" is used. If the dog starts to dart off in the wrong direction, drop him until he has cooled off and looks at you and is prepared to think about what he must do next.

When animals are being driven along a road, the dog must be taught to prevent them from turning off into a side road. To teach this, the dog should be urged forward to the front of the flock and stopped at the turn-off and told to "stay," so that he will station himself at the intersection and head off any animals that are showing an inclination to run up the side path.

Some dogs have what is known as "style" and "eye." The two qualities generally go together. "Style" is the crouching approach a herd dog makes as he nears the flock, and is much admired in trial and exhibition dogs. "Eye" is fixed gaze when approaching sheep. No sheep can endure having a dog stare at it while he is approaching it. A dog, to be a good herd dog, should have some style and eye, at least enough that he can walk steadily up to a stubborn sheep until it turns and retreats. He should not rush up to the sheep and frighten them. Biting can only be tolerated if a sheep charges him, in which case he should hold his ground and defend himself.

The main points to be kept in mind in the schooling of a sheep dog are: First, keep your patience, if you find yourself

losing your temper, quit training for the day and start over again tomorrow; Second, always use the same words of command for the same duty; Third, remember that praise and a hand pat will do much to encourage the dog in his attempts to please you; Fourth, don't let anyone else work your dog; Fifth, do not expect or demand too much of the dog at the start of training—bear in mind that an inexperienced dog, like a child, may make many mistakes just because he has not yet had an opportunity to learn what is expected of him; Sixth, do not attempt to start the dog working on stock until he is thoroughly grounded in the fundamental commands of "down," "come" and "heel." Instant obedience to these basic exercises is of great importance for his future training and his usefulness as a herd dog depends entirely on how well he has learned these first lessons.
