





. I am interested in gathering information concerning Retrievers and their proper training as I am trying to establish a preferred line in breeding Labradors and also to draw up a set of rules for dogs entering field trials.

I have found the CKC regulations inadequate when it comes to entering and running a young dog in trials. I have been to quite a few trials in B.C. and find each trial is run according to what the particular judges want and that these trials differ to the trials run in the Western United

When I started entering dogs I found that I lost more points for my dog than the dog himself and have noticed that this is a common fault with all new entrants. This is discouraging to a new entrant when he finds that his dog has made a good showing but due to his mistakes is not in the ribbon class while the honours have gone to a man who has been in the game for years and knows all the "tricks of the trade" and yet has not got quite as good a dog as the new entrant. I feel this is holding back people who would otherwise be new members and active entrants. Do you know of any articles that set out the do's and don't of this sport for dog handlers?

The Old Timer snorted. Then he reached onto the stripping table for his pipe, got it drawing nicely and leaned back in his old arm chair.

"Maybe it's my Scotch ancestry and the Presbyterian beliefs coming out in me, but I'd say it was pre-ordained about forty years ago that that little poodle was going to bite me today," he began.

"Never more serious in my life," he said. 

are lonely and trying to work out their own frustrations through their dogs.

"What too many don't realize is that a dog is a dog and not something that should be wrapped up in cotton wool and treated like a premature baby. A dog should be treated as a dog—nothing more nor less—and if that is done the dog, as well as the owner will be much happier."

"Surely you're not suggesting that it's a case of spare the rod and spoil the

dog," I said.

"Treating a dog as a dog doesn't mean the dog must be abused," said the Old Timer. "You can treat them as a dog and never lay a hand on them,—never even raise your voice enough to cause their tail to go down. But you use an adult approach, First of all you've got to develop the habit of obedience. Ninety-nine dogs out of a hundred live for the purpose of making their owners happy and if the habit of obedience is developed early, that little guy is going to know, a hundred times during the day, that in doing what you want he's pleasing you. And he's going to be the happier for it.

"He should be brought up in a regular routine—a regular time to eat, a regular time to go out-doors—a regular time to sleep and a regular place of his own in which to sleep. And I suggest that the owner's bed is not a place of his own. If the owner values his furniture,

the dog should be taught to stay off it or better still, as a puppy, never allowed to get on it. Early housebreaking is an essential to a happy owner-dog relationship."

"But isn't this just a little too much all work and no play?" I asked.

"If you'd let me finish, perhaps you wouldn't make such stupid comments," he snapped. "Of course there's got to be play. A rough-house in the back yard — fifteen minutes with a ball — a drive into the country and a long walk through a bush, evening walks in the city on lead and not for the sole purpose of getting the dog to exercise—all these are a part of a dog's life and treating a dog like a dog. Mix them in their proper ingredients, the fun and the discipline, and you're going to have a dog with a disposition that should be spelt with a capital "D".

The Old Timer looked ruefully at the gash on the back of his hand.

"And what's more, I wouldn't be using nearly as much disinfectant patching up after neurotic canines,"

DOGS AFIELD

by DAVID BLAKE

SPORTING TERRIERS and COURSING HOUNDS

Do we ignore the sporting characteristics of these breeds because they are not classified in the Sporting group?

Many breeds have suffered the loss of the sporting aspect of their heritage in our hands. Very few dogs, except those classified by the Kennel Clubs as sporting dogs and the scent hounds, are used today to function in accordance with the sporting purpose for which they were bred.

It is natural for dogs in general to hunt. By artificial selection, in stressing certain other desirable qualities, man has bred the hunting instinct out, or greatly reduced it. This is no great loss in the case of toys, sheep dogs, sled dogs, or any others which have been bred to serve another purpose well, but what of the sporting terriers and the sight hounds?

For many generations of men and dogs, little hardbitten tykes with dauntless courage were developed and trained to go to ground, each in accordance with the quarry and terrain of the locality. Size, bite, coat, spirit, and other characteristics were selected and typed until a varied and interesting array of sporting terriers evolved, sponsored by as many groups of sporting breeders. These were working dogs — in the sense that they were able to do well the job for which they were bred.

Not many years ago the late Franklin Fisher, then Art Director of National Geographic Magazine, was giving considerable thought to the publishing of a new series of dog pictures. The old Geographic series, painted so capably by Edwin McGargee, had shown the dogs in a background which implied the nature of the work they had been bred to do, but the dogs were posed to exhibit their conformation. In the new series Mr. Fisher proposed fourcolor photography of live dogs in action. He wondered if such a series could be completed successfully. I figured the sporting dogs as a sure thing and working dogs as presenting a problem of locating individuals trained to work stock, work in harness and so on, but I had qualms about the modern terrier. We decided that we would start with the terrier group. If we could get representative pictures of a few terriers we would complete the group and be well started on a dynamic series.

With a professional photographer in tow, I visited one of our veteran terrier handlers to whom I had explained

our problem. We took his spunkiest wire hair, trimmed for the occasion. I won't go into the details of our varmint hunting, some of which would have convinced witnesses that we belonged in the booby hatch, but we were unable to get our hero to so much as scratch or sniff at an occupied woodchuck hole. We tried the best prospects of a Wire Hair breeder next with similar results. Although, believe me, I know dozens of dogs that will turn themselves inside out at the sight of a cat, the bench champion we were using wouldn't so much as look at a cat we put in a tree. This went on with other terrier breeds until we were convinced that our task would sorely tax our patience and ingenuity. There are many terriers, I'm sure, that would have demonstrated their true terrier temperament in convincing fashion, but the percentage of bench champs was apparently too small to warrant the time and expense that would

In my childhood we always had a terrier or two on the place — an Airedale who was kept pretty busy coon hunting in season — and a Fox Terrier, whose job it was to keep the barnyard varmint population down and double as the alarm system in the house. These dogs never lacked courage and ingenuity.

One of our best known judges, whose preceding years of professional handling of bench dogs was equally successful, relates the experiences of his boyhood, spent in the land of his birth, where game belonged to the landlord and not to the government, as it does on this side of the Atlantic. Hunting was poaching and had to be done effectively, or under cover of darkness. One of his methods of getting food for the pot involved a team of Scottish terrier and Whippet. He'd walk the highway with the Whippet on leash, sending the Scotty into the hedgerows from which it would flush any hare it could locate. As soon as the game was in the open, he would unleash the Whippet who would usually come up with the quarry after a brief, but exciting, chase.

This brings us to the sight hound activity on this continent or, should I say, the lack of it. In their case the development and use for sport has been practiced for centuries. Sleek speedsters

MEMO FROM THE EDITOR

How do you feed your dogs - stuff their stomachs or feed them health? Do you consider that the meal you feed today will be contributing, in a small measure, both good and bad qualities to future generations? Most serious breeders pay a great deal of attention to feeding - but it is their recommendation to their customers which can have a great bearing on the health and worth of the dogs they sell.

Today's grocery shelves present a quandary to the average dog owner. The variety of prices for canned dog food raises the question "If I buy the cheaper food, will I be cheating my dog?"

If you buy the cheapest foods, chances are you will. To date no legislation has required that manufacturers show the contents of the can, nor has a minimum of contents ever been laid down for dog food, although most other foods are controlled. Some of the better manufacturers have volunteered the contents on their can labels. These reliable producers are now taking things in their own hands and recommending to Ottawa that legislation cover contents of dog food.

To this end The Canadian Kennel Club has formed a committee consisting of Dr. Alan Secord, Messrs. Norman Brown, Bob Blyth and Mrs. Mary Southcott to meet with company representatives this month. Officers of the Humane Society and the Ontario Veterinary Association will also attend the meeting. Interested veterinarians will likely draw up a suggested list of minimum ingredients to be submitted to the government.

Since this step is being taken on behalf of both individual dog owners and breeders you as an individual can help. Write to the Pet Food Ingredients Committee, c/o The Canadian Kennel Club, 667 Yonge St., Toronto. Your breed or specialty club can add weight as well in expressing approval by letter to this committee. Your veterinarian will undoubtedly co-operate with a letter, since much of the illness he must treat can be directly traced to poor feeding through lack of knowledge.

The wheels of government turn slowly, and it will undoubtedly be many months before such legislation comes to pass - after the standard of minimum ingredient requirement has been decided upon. The purpose of the committee is not to remove inexpensive foods from the shelves, but rather to maintain a proper standard of nutrition.

Won't you help start the ball rolling by writing your own recommendation to the Committee?

Too many dog shows? Just as we look with pride on the fact that shows, obedience and retriever trials have increased tremendously up pops the question - are there too many shows? Here's how competitions have grown:

Are there too many shows in specific locations and not enough in others? Is the frequency of shows harming the entry and the number of spectators? Is it the quality of existing shows? Is your club's show the cleanest, brightest, best managed? Does it start promptly and close in good time? Are out-of-towners made welcome? Could you do anything about supplying really appetizing food and good coffee? It's doubtful that in Canada there are too many shows that are "too good to miss."

What are the opinions of Dogs readers who are real troupers - arranging home and business to take in as many shows as possible? Let's hear from you for the July issue.

The silver Toy, Ch. Barlanark Toccata is a Group Winner and six times Best Canadian-bred Toy in the show, Can, and Am. Ch. Barlanark Joseff Noir has won six groups, two Best Canadian Bred in show and a Best in Show. In the U.S. he won four majors with a five-point win at Westchester. His son, Barlanark Zauberlehrling, won his championship in 1958.

MRS. CAMILLE DONIPHAN, owner of the Wangza Kennels of Toys has many well-known winners, and has exported some excellent dogs. While not so active in the ring as in the past, it's always nice to see Mrs. Doniphan at the shows. More recently she has added King Charles Spaniels to her winning Pekes.

MR. and MRS. JOHN ECCLES, for many years associated with the Coila Collie Kennels of Mr. Ormiston Roy, have done much to enrich the knowledge of the newer Collie breeders in this province.

MRS. BEATRICE EVERETT, of Acadia Lodge Kennels, noted for her fine Bedlington Terriers and other breeds has been a consistent breeder and always a loyal supporter at the shows.

MR. ARTHUR GREENWOOD, while not a breeder is a well-known all-breed judge and has judged from coast to coast. We are all sorry that Arthur has suffered a recent illness and hope to see him back with us very soon. It just doesn't seem like a dog show without "Art" to cheer us on.

MISS OLIVE HOSMER, a long-time member and a lover of the Toy breeds, particularily Pekingese, of which she has owned many fine specimens.

MRS. JAMES DEMPSTER of Hudson has a very well known kennel of Standard and Miniature Poodles and her Petitcote Kennels have sent out some top specimens.

MR. and MRS. L. J. LAGIMODIERE of Como, with their Dachshunds, have had some excellent dogs and nearly always can be counted on to be in the top placings with a good home-bred. Mr. Lagimodiere also is well known as a top Dachshund judge.

MISS W. M. STEGGALL, well known owner of the famous Winna Pugs which have a very enviable record both here and in the U.S.A. Nearly all her top dogs are homebreds and Miss Steggall and her Winna pugs have done much to help the breed in popularity and prestige.

DR. and MRS. E. M. TRENOUTH of Quebec City, among the founders of the Quebec City Kennel Club. Dr. Trenouth has always been a popular exhibitor and is well known for his Wire Fox Terriers and Dachshunds.

MISS VALERIE REID, with her lovely Sunlock Poodles is a regular exhibitor and always has her dogs in such beautiful condition.

There are, I know, many other breeders and exhibitors in this province who deserve our warmest praise for their efforts and any I may have missed I hope will forgive me.

The clubs in Quebec province, while not numerous are very sincere in their efforts. Among them are the Hull and District Kennel Club who can always be counted on to put on a good show, and whose members show a wonderful spirit of co-operation and make the out-of-town exhibitors so very welcome and at home.

The Ladies Kennel Club of Canada, incorporated in 1929, with headquarters in Montreal, have been holding dog shows for many years. This year their annual Spring event, always so eagerly anticipated by the breeders as the start of the dog show season, was by popular demand a double show event and proved that the exhibitors and breeders in this district are anxious for more shows. We hope that this double header will become an annual event.

The Canadian All Pets Association's three shows held in Montreal's beautiful Show Mart Building in the Fall are a fitting climax to the dog show season in this province and attract many exhibitors from all over Canada and the U.S.A.

Last year for the first time a dog show was held in conjunction with the Three Rivers Regional Fair. It proved that a new locale is excellent for a dog show and steps up the interest in purebred dogs. There will be another show this year in conjunction with the Fair.

In the Field events, the oldest and certainly the best known is the Ta-I-O Beagle Club founded in 1934, and still chasing the elusive bunny. This club has held about 20 Beagle trials and has over 100 members. President is the popular Dr. Ray Lawson. The Treasurer is the hard working Alvin Florea who is also editor of their news bulletin.

Other well-known Beagle clubs in the province are the Frontier Beagle Club at Huntingdon, The Lachute Beagle Club, and the newly formed Val D'Or Beagle Club which last year held a fun trial the farthest north of any club.

The Montreal Gun Dog Club, under the able presidency of Richard Grier who is also the Retriever representative for Quebec, have come a long way since their organization a few years ago. They are fortunate to have an enthusiastic membership and their trials are always well attended. It is most interesting to see how much the local dogs have improved at each event.

Our other representatives in this province are Frank Mingie for Obedience, who can always be counted on to give a helping hand at any trial, and Ray Lawson always in there with his beloved Beagles. Dr. Lawson has sent his Beagles as far north as Fort Chimo and Hudson Bay, and F/S Chuck Hamilton has sent Beagles to Labrador.

Last but not least, our Fox Hound representative for the province is Alec Learmonth, who has been such a pillar of strength with his sound advice and counsel.

Truly we in Quebec are fortunate to have so many sincere breeders and dog lovers, and I am sure that the younger members coming along will gain their experience wisely and inherit a worthy tradition to carry on as the breeders and exhibitors of purebred dogs in Quebec.

The members who have done so much for obedience in Quebec will be written up in "Around the Obedience Ring" by Alan Sharp elsewhere in this issue.

POODLE STANDARD...

FOR NOVICE OR JUDGE?

by ALIDA MONRO

This world-famous Poodle authority compares the Standard for Miniatures and Toys as set for France, England, and America.

I'N my opinion Standards were devised originally first for the breeder and secondly for the judge. The definitions are not, as some critics have averred, meant for the novice pure and simple. No one can properly admire a piece of architecture without some knowledge of its principles. In the same way, no one can properly assess the points of a breed until they are conversant with the animal which the breed standard concerns. Some critics have seized on the definition of tail-set and asked how can a novice be expected to understand the description of the tail, "set on rather high, well-carried, never curled or carried over back"? I, personally, consider that anyone who wishes to acquire or to breed a Poodle that conforms to the standard should, first of all, get the Standard of Points from the Kennel Club. Secondly, attend as many dog shows as possible. Observation of dogs in the ring will soon show very different angles of teil-set. Comparison of these with those placed by the judge will very soon be a guide to the novice. The same applies to the head and to the other points in the Standard.

First, and most important of all, is the definition of General Appearance. In this lies the essence of the breed. The English Kennel Club Standard describes the Poodles thus: "A very active, intelligent, and elegant looking dog, well built, and carrying himself very proudly." The American standard adds that he is "squarely built, well-proportioned." The French Standard says "The Poodle has the appearance of a very intelligent animal, always on the alert, and giving an impression of elegance and pride. He has a light dancing action and must never move smoothly or 'all in one piece.'" This, to my mind, excels both the English and American definitions in that it insists on the lightness of movement which is so characteristic of the Poodle and which is entirely absent in them. I would like to see the French definition of General Appearance incorporated in ours if, and when, the definitions are re-written. Judges would then have no excuse for putting up the animal that plods across the ring.

Head, long and straight and fine, the skull not broad, with a slight peak at the back. This is the Kennel Club's description of what is wanted in the skull. The older club standards gave more indica-

tion of what is required and stated that the foreface should be a fraction longer than the distance from the Stop to the Occiput (the pointed bone at the back of the skull). Incidentally, an apple or round head has no peak to the bone. The American standard says the skull should "be slightly full and moderately peaked with a slight stop. Cheek bones and muscles flat. Eyes set far enough apart to indicate ample brain capacity." The French simply states that the "head is distinguished and well carried. The length should be a little more than twofifths of the height of the dog, from the ground to the withers." It seems to me that the two Anglo-Saxon definitions give more of an idea of what is wanted, but I would like to include parts of the older original Poodle Club wording, with reference to the "skull large, and with plenty of room for brain power."

Muzzle. Both the American and the English standards agree on this definition basically. It must be long and strong, but not snipy, and there must be no lippiness. The French is more specific: "The top of the muzzle must be straight and about nine-tenths of the length of the skull. The upper and lower jaws must be parallel and must be solid and elegant, but not pointed." This to my mind is very clear, and I would like our definition to be amended accordingly. So often one sees the very long muzzle which has depth from the stop depthwards, but which tapers off and is pointed at the nose. The French wording makes it quite clear that such a muzzle is incorrect.

Mouth of course, must be level, and the teeth white and strong. All three standards agree that eyes must be al-mond-shaped and both English and American stress they must be full of fire and intelligence. The French also agree that they should be almond-shaped, but insists they must be level with the stop and flat as well. It states that the eye in blacks and whites must be black or dark brown, and amber in browns. I think it would be a distinct advantage to express an opinion on colour in our definition and perhaps save some otherwise lovely dog from being demoted because his eye is brown and not black. A definite statement with regard to colour would assist inexperienced judges, anyway, if it were not needed for the others.

Ears. All are agreed that they must be long and low-set, falling close to the face and their substance must be thick and they must be wide. America adds that when pulled forward they should almost reach the nose. I observed in France that unless the leather reached at least to the canine tooth when pulled forward, it was considered too short, and there is a general belief there that English Poodles have very short leathers. This belief is based on dogs exported from here.

Neck. England and America express the same opinion, but in the English definition there is one serious omission. This states the neck should be "well proportioned and strong to admit of the head being carried high and with dignity." America says: "well proportioned, strong and long enough (the emphasis is mine) to admit of the head being carried high and with dignity." You will observe the omission. As no mention is made of length no inexperienced person can be expected to know the head must be carried high, as proportion and strength in themselves cannot provide the carriage necessary to give dignity and bearing to the head. I consider that the French put the right emphasis. They say neck must be "well proportioned, arched, with the head carried proudly and high." The telling word missing in both the American and English definitions is "arched." The beautiful, almost swanlike arch of the correct neck is a pleasure to feel and is often missing. I hope this word will be added to future definitions. All three are agreed that the skin of the neck must be tight, no loose skin allowed. It is only occasionally that one sees this loose skin in Miniatures but I have very often observed it in Standards, together with lippiness, either of which detracts considerably from the smart and elegant appearance required.

Shoulders. All three express themselves in the same way with regard to placement, i.e., sloping well to the back, strong and muscular. England says: "Legs set straight from shoulder with plenty of bone and muscle"; America thus, "Strong, muscular, angulated at the point of the shoulder and elbow joint." France again is more explicit and naturally of more help to the searcher after perfection. She says, "Shoulder well laid back, the shoulder blade making an angle of 90° to 100° with the foreleg. Length of foreleg should be equal to that of the shoulder-blade."

Body. England and America are agreed on this. "Chest deep and moderately wide. Back short, strong, and slightly hollowed, the loins broad and muscular, the ribs well sprung and braced up." This makes it clear that slab-sided and herring-gutted Poodles

covered with huge coats are not required. Curiously, in this instance, France does not give a clear direction. The definition reads: "General appearance of the Poodle is well proportioned the length of the body being roughly the length of the foreleg to the withers." The last statement is helpful and clear but the earlier part tells one nothing.

Hindquarters. I consider that the (English) Kennel Club has pruned the definition down until it is almost worthless. Here it is: "Legs very muscular and bent, with the hocks very well let down." What image does that make in your eyes? Now read the American: "Hind legs very muscular, stifles well bent, and hocks well let down. Hindquarters well developed with the second thigh showing both width and muscle. Now the French: "Loins strong and well muscled. Quarters well rounded and not straight. Hind feet seen from the back must be parallel and well muscled." How superior is the latter wording. I do not think one can over-emphasize the need for "Hind feet seen from the back must be parallel." This means when the dog is standing naturally, and not when he is standing correctly, by having been placed thus.

Feet. America and France agree that feet should be "Rather small and of good oval shape, pads hard and thick." The French definition states that as well as being oval they should be compact. The English definition has again been pruned (too far in my opinion)" Rather small and of good shape, the toes well arched, pads thick and hard." By leaving out 'oval,' no indication of the shape is given, except that it should be good, which means exactly nothing unless the "good" shape is mentioned. Once more I suggest we adopt the French wording for this important feature.

Tail. The Kennel Club standard says: "Set on rather high, well carried, never curled or carried over back." The American K.C. says: "Set on rather high, docked, and carried gaily. Never curled or carried over the back." The French say: "Well set in angle to the quarters. Should be about one-third of the natural length. The tail must be carried at an oblique angle (between perpendicular and parallel) (my emphasis) when in movement. Note again that the French are more explicit, and that they and the Americans mention docking, this important factor is left out of our Standard.

Coat. The English K.C. says regarding Coat: "Very profuse and of good hard texture: thick and strong, of even length, the curls close and thick without knots or cords. It is strongly recommended that the traditional Lion Clip should be adhered to." American standard says: "Very profuse, of harsh texture, even length, frizzy or curly, not at all open.' French definition: "The Curly Poodle must have a thick coat of fine texture, woolly, curly, springy. It must be dense and of a uniform length and well combed." Note that all three Standards call for a harsh, curly coat. Where is this coat to-day? It has been superseded for the most part by a soft coat, no spring, and on the quarters no curls, but plush.

All are agreed that whatever the colour, black, white, brown, blue or grey (the two latter only recognised in England and America) it must be solid. Therefore, dark ears on browns and silvers, hocks, rings and bracelets, tail poms are a fault, and yellow or brown markings similarly on whites are faults. All three standards agree that over or undershot mouths, cow hocks (hind feet not parallel) flat or spread feet, thin pads, are faults. So are light eyes, coarse heads and clumsy gait.


GREY POODLES - FOR THE COMPLETE NOVICE

- Q. What colour are grey poodles born?
 A. Nearly always black, but occasionally grey.
- Q. What is the first indication that a Black puppy will be grey?
- A. The hair underneath the toes will be silvery, almost white, at birth. But this applies to puppies of grey breeding only; it may be just a mismark in other colours.
- Q. Is a small amount of white on the chest or on the toes, at birth, a serious fault?
- A. It is a fault, but not too serious a one, as it will probably disappear by the time the puppy is a few weeks old, and if not it will blend in with light grey colouring, so long as there is only a very little white.
- Q. At what age can you be reasonably sure a puppy will develop into a light grey?
- A. By six weeks, puppies will be definitely light around the eyes and muzzle. If the face is clipped at that age, it will be a light grey all over.

- Q. At what age does a darker grey become apparent?
- A. At any age after this. Possibly they will be black until they are three or four years old, then gradually become dark grey. From a breeding standpoint, this is not a true grey.
- Q. Is it a good thing if a puppy first shows signs of grey up its front legs, on its chest, and under its tail?
- A. No. It will probably be a "phantom", and so will be automatically disqualified from the show ring.
- Q. At what age should a dog have "cleared" or become an even grey?
- A. By the time it is 18 months, so far as the show ring is concerned.
- Q. What is the difference between platinum, silver, and grey?
- A. It is a matter of individual description. The very pale ones are sometimes called platinum, the lighter greys are usually called silver.

- Q. Is any particular shade of grey preferable in the show ring?
- A. No. But it is essential that the colour be clear and even.
- Q. Why are there not more people specializing in greys?
- A. (a) For economic reasons, as purebred greys are inclined to have
 smaller litters than some other colours, although in recent years the
 size of grey litters appears to be increasing. (b) Having been born
 black, any injury may bring the coat
 in black at that particular spot. Also,
 an occasional female will develop a
 black spot, usually on the quarters,
 when they are nursing puppies. After
 18 months of age, any black patches
 on a grey are considered mismarks, so
 the dog cannot be shown until a new
 coat has come in and the dog is once
 more an even grey.
- Q. What are two important "selling" points for greys as pets?
- A. They do not show the dirt, and do not sunburn i.e., fade to a different shade, so much as some other colours.



PRESENTING YOUR POODLE

THE labour involved in presenting a Poodle of any size must become a labour of love before the ideal perfection can be produced and those people who don't like the hard work of grooming, clipping, washing and the like would be well advised to part with their Poodles now and find an easier breed which does not require the vast amount of attention for the show-ring or, for that matter, for the everyday smartness which should be every Poodle's birthright.

Miss Bowring recently remarked on anklets and the enormous sizes of bracelets which we see nowadays and I must admit that far too many, on all sized Poodles, do look completely out of place and as if they had been designed to suit dogs twice their size or for a breed with bone like a St. Bernard.

The fantastic coats we see nowadays also need trimming. Length of body coat is required in addition to texture, but these heavy manes do not require terrific length from the saddle to the head. Otherwise we get top heavy coats which flop all over the place and completely hide an otherwise good outline.

Outline and balance can be obtained by careful elipping and scissor work. The latter plays a far bigger part than the clipper.

In the illustrations I have used exactly the same basic drawing. It can be seen under each sketch in dotted line.

In figure A we see a Poodle like the countless number which are being presented at the present time. Note the padded rump which hides all natural outline and all the muscular hindquarters which should be there; the enormous bracelets and bands which either hide angulation or else try to produce it when it isn't there. Note also the enormous length of untapered mane which hides the dog beneath. It hides the forelegs so much that one has to lift the coat to examine the legs and feet and, as for action, well, can one ever hope to get it high stepping and free if the legs are so hampered by wool. With such a coat one is unable to see a good outline at all. In fact the

Poodle becomes so cluttered up as to appear a giant snowball instead of an active-looking, well balanced dog,

Figure B shows exactly the same dog but it has had the scissors at work on it. On the hindquarters, the natural rump is scissored close and the tight even curls, so much desired, show off to advantage the naturally lithe outline of the loins and muscular quarters. The stifle bands set in the proper place. over the joints, are again scissored close so that the natural outline is retained. The hock bracelets, just up the top of the hock, are small and rounded so that the hind feet can easily be seen. In fact here we get an uncamouflaged rear end and, if the Poodle is solid, sound and well made beneath the hair, why try to hide the fact

Note that the length of coat above the shoulder and the head is not shortened at all, but all the waste hair toward the saddle is tapered in an angulated line toward the head from the saddle. I think from this sketch you will see at once why the Poodles which are trimmed this way do not need repeated brushing during a class. The hair is cut into position and not brushed there so that it is able to fly out with the least movement of the body. The undercarriage of the Poodle's mane is also tapered, again from the underside of the saddle, cleared from under the front leg, bracelets (not too high mind you) and the frill on the chest is tapered also to give the desired rounded effect.

Front anklets, again just covering the joints, are scissored off small so that the tiny feet and fine bone in the leg can be seen and a high-stepping action given the liberty to work.

Figure C shows the dog which has been prepared in the same way as the one in figure B, but the hindquarters have been shaved off into semi-Continental clip. The full Continental-clip has no mid-stifle bands. The Continental clip surely shows off better than any other a really good, sound, well built Poodle. While I know it is not everybody's idea of presentation, to some it does appeal.

While the foregoing can be generally taken as being a betterment of presentation and trimming, I do urge all owners to use their imagination and eye on their own individual dogs. It must always be remembered that no two Poodles are alike and that each needs individual treatment to show off its own good qualities. Imagination and the creative eye can alone do real justice to an already naturally made good Poodle.

I do not advocate the naked look in Poodles. All I ask is that the aim for better presentation should be that of every Poodle breeder and exhibitor. There is no excuse whatsoever for showing a Poodle in bad condition and trim and when it comes to the point of showing them dirty, well it is high time that something was done about it. Presentation does not only help the exhibitor to win but it also wins the respect and admiration of the ringside and judge too.

I should probably begin by statingas they do in many books-that the thoughts and opinions, grammatical errors and all, expressed herein, are entirely my own and have no relation to persons living or dead!

TOY POODLES to me can become the jewels of dogdom, and yet be every -(inch I was going to say, but a better description might be quarter inch) of a dog; belonging as they do to the canine specie and being the product of evolution over the centuries.

Tiny, well-proportioned, exquisite, fastidiously groomed, humorously gay, ridiculously clownish, sophisticated,-in fact, all the adjectives describing my every mood can be wrapped up in one small bundle of love which I can tuck under my arm and know he is welcome wherever I go. They remind me of Dresden figures which miraculously have been given the breath of life. Intelligently raised they can have strength, vitality, character, staunch devotion, and an overwhelming pride in their appearance, seeming to own the show ring when they walk into it, and be, in fact a well balanced - proportionately reduced - specimen of many of the great Standards and Miniatures of the past and present.

They should conform in every detail to the Standard of their Breed as presently accepted by the C.K.C. which I quote, underlining what seems to me to be the most important points for thought and study.

1. General Appearance, Carriage and Condition. That of a very active intelligent, smart and elegant-looking dog, squarely built, well proportioned and carrying himself proudly. Properly clipped in the traditional fashion and carefully groomed, the Poodle has about him an air of distinction and dignity peculiar to himself.

2. Head and Expression. (a) Skull, should be slightly full and moderately peaked with a slight stop. Cheek bones and muscles flat. Eyes set far enough apart to indicate ample brain capacity. Muzzle, long, straight and fine, but strong without lippiness. The chin definite enough to preclude snipiness. Teeth white, strong and level. Nose sharp with well defined nostrils.

(b) Eyes, OVAL shape, very dark, full of fire and intelligence.

(c) Ears, set low and hanging close to the head. The leather long, wide and heavily feathered-when drawn forward almost reaches the nose.

3. Neck. Well proportioned, strong and long enough to admit of the head being carried high and with dignity. Skin snug at the throat.

4. Shoulders. Strong, muscular, angulated at the point of the shoulder and the elbow joint, SLOPING WELL BACK.

5. Body. The chest DEEP and MOD-ERATELY WIDE. The ribs well sprung and braced up. The back short, strong and VERY SLIGHTLY hollowed, with the loins broad and muscular. (Bitches may be slightly longer in back than dogs.)

6. Tail. Set on rather high, docked and carried gaily. Never curled or carried over the back.

7. Legs. The forelegs straight from shoulders with plenty of bone and muscle. Hind legs very muscular, STIFLES WELL BENT, and hocks well let down. Hindquarters well developed with the SECOND thigh showing both width and muscle.

8. Feet. Rather small and of good oval shape. Toes well arched and close, pads thick and hard.

9. Coat. (a) Quality, Curly poodles. Very profuse, of harsh texture, even length, frizzy or curly, not at all open.

Corded Poodles, Very thick, hanging in tight, even cords. (Author's comment -has anyone ever seen a corded toy poodle?)

(b) Clip. Clipping either in the traditional "Continental" or "English Saddle" style is correct. In the "Continental" clip the hindquarters are shaved, with pom-poms on hips (optional), and in the "English Saddle" clip, the hindquarters are covered with a short blanket of hair. In both these clips the rest of the body must be left in full coat, leaving bracelets on all four legs and a pom-pom at the end of the tail. The top-knot and feather on the ears must be long and profuse so as not to lose the very essential Poodle expression. A dog under a year old may be shown with the coat long except the face, feet and base of tail which should be shaved. Any Poodle clipped in any style other than the above mentioned shall be disqualified from the


10. Color. Any solid color. All but the browns have black noses, lips and eyelids. The browns and apricots may have liver noses and dark amber eyes. In all colors toenails either black or same color as the dog.

11. Gait. A straight, forward TROT, with light springy ACTION. Head and tail carried high.


12. Size. The Toy Poodle is 10" or under at the shoulder.

13. Description and Standard of Points of the Ideal Toy Poodle.


NOTE: So long as the dog is definitely a Toy, diminutiveness is only the deciding factor when all other points are equal: SOUNDNESS and ACTIVITY






















are every whit as necessary in a Toy as they are in a Large Poodle and as these traits can only be seen when the dog is in action, it is imperative that Toys BE MOVED IN THE RING AS FULLY AND DECIDEDLY AS LARGE POODLES.

The illustrations at the bottom of page 18 give my idea of what the above Standard actually means. This has been arrived at through constant study for twenty-five years, not only of the Poodle but other breeds which I have raised or bred, whose standards use many of the same terms, and should be consistently interpreted. Preparing and handling all breeds for the show ring also requires a knowledge of standards and how they are used. Let us remember that a Toy poodle is an active dog and its anatomy must compete with those of other breeds in order to honestly win Groups and Best in Show. The rigorous Canadian climate demands that our specimens be sturdy and full of vitality with ample lung space, strong running gear, and excellent feet, if they are to survive and be a credit to this beautiful country of ours. Their heads should be in balance with their structure, and a well known fact to be kept definitely in mind is that an exaggerated length of head is more susceptible to respiratory diseases.

Other factors to be kept in mind also, are that we show our dogs here in competition with United States, English, French, etc., and we have to breed better specimens if we are going to win over imported stock, which honestly or otherwise carries with it the glamour resulting from excessive publicity.

It is true we can show in the United States, but it is also true that it is wellnigh impossible for the average person to show a Canadian Bred specimen in Great Britain without the necessary funds to maintain a dog in rabies quarantine for six months before it ever enters a show ring. Canadian breeders of every breed should forget their inferiority complex. Toy Poodles in particular, are a young specimen in the show ring. 1943 was the first year the American Kennel Club accepted them for registration, and as late as 1949, only ten years ago-Popular Dogs magazine had only one picture and no advertisements from Toy Poodle breeders.

After all is said and done, our Canadian livestock is the best in the world -being exported to the farthest frontiers, and by using our heads, with help from available geneticists, there is no logical reason why our Toy Poodles should not join this distinguished company.

My over all impression of Toy Poodles as they compare with all the other small dogs in various groups is this:- They are in the Toy Group and in order to win over other specimens in the same group, as well as other groups, they should not be much larger, in full coat, than many of the other heavy coated dogs in the same group.

TOY POODLES, what are they now? Since I believe in the saying, one picture is worth a thousand words, I include the line drawings at the top of this page, of specimens as I see them in the ring to-day. Some are excellent, some good, others not so good, but from all I can study and learn.

Poodle trimming can change the visual proportion to some extent, but to the judge with an "EYE" it cannot hide the Overly heavy feet and head of the

TOY POODLES - What have they been?

No article on early Toy Poodles in America would be complete without reference to Mrs. Leicester Harrison, Massapequa, N.Y., and I'm sure she will excuse me for quoting from her articles in magazines as they have appeared from time to time.

1952. "The specimens of a decade ago bore little resemblance to the larger varieties-in fact, had they not been trimmed in Poodle Style, most of them would have been undistinguishable from the Maltese. They were low on the leg, long in body, pop-eyed, short in muzzle, round headed and cheeky, with highset, short leather, soft silky coat and flat feet."

What an inheritance!

"It was not until AKC sanctioned the mating of Toy and Miniatures in 1943 by registering their offspring that the true Poodle in toy size was evolved."

The pedigrees of most of our Toy Poodles in the show ring to-day go back to these times and careful study of the different types contained therein is absolutely necessary if we are to steadily improve for "It must be borne in mind that the factors which reduce the size and shorten the back will, concomitantly, shorten the foreface and throw back to the round head and eye." "The objectionable genes are still latent, and the recessive faults will become dominant again with very little encouragement.

"Some really representative Toys have been ignominiously defeated by flagrantly oversize specimens, actually Miniature runts. Incidentally, those of you who have the interest of the Toy Poodle at heart can best serve that interest by protesting at ringside any and all Toys which you consider oversize.'

I suppose we all hope to breed the perfect dog but great results are seldom arrived at accidentally. Constant, intelligent study of pedigrees, and genetic factors involved, will certainly help us toward that goal, but these things are seldom hurried.

Mrs. D. T. (Susie-Mae) Weir, Tyldesley, Willowdale, Ont. is well-known as a Poodle fancier, specializing in Toys, but also a devotee of the Miniature and Standard. Earlier she was noted as a breeder of Great Danes, was licensed to handle all breeds and is well known as a judge. Mrs. Weir is actively interested, although not a breeder, in Miniature Schnauzers and Boxers and is frequently seen in the ring as a handler.

CANADIAN KERRY SENSATION OF EUROPE

Dogdom in this country was put on the map by a lone Canadian entry who showed like a dream throughout the variations of European shows

A CANADIAN dog accompanied her owner to Europe and created a sensation by gaining her international title in four shows in four different countries under four different judges—all in two weeks. As far as is known, no other dog has matched this record in Europe.

Tailteann's Rare Gem, Kerry Blue Terrier, has earned the title of Can., Am., Dutch, Italian, French and Monagesque Champion. Mrs. M. Eileen Mc-Eachren, Todmorden, Ont., her owner, was in Europe as a guest of honour at the meeting of the Federation Cynologique Internationale—the first time an outsider has been invited by this august group—and was a guest speaker at six of their functions.

The magnificent winning by Rare Gem has done an inestimable service in calling attention to Canadian dogdom. Prince Pierre, father of Prince Rainier of Monaco, made a special point of attending the Monte Carlo show when he heard a Canadian dog was competing.

The Amsterdam Show, a one-day benched indoor affair, drew 1,500 dogs. Twenty-two rings were in action at one time. Despite the enormity of the show it was concluded by six o'clock. The Amsterdam KC was founded in 1790 and features "aluminum benching, the best benching I have ever seen," remarked Mrs. McEachren.

"It was a noisy affair, but extremely well run. You can enjoy luncheon or cocktails while watching the judging. During the Best in Show judging six photographers and the luncheon cart mingled in the ring with the final contestants and the judge. To add to the excitement the cart upset in the ring."

Under the Dutch KC ruling there are eight groups with four placings for Best in Show. As is the case throughout Europe, no ribbons are given, but little cards accompany wins of medallions and other trophies. All judges' decisions are written. No points are given. Puppies are judged but do not earn points and do not compete for the top placing known as Excellent.

Champions go in with Open Class dogs — leaving little chance for younger stock to progress toward titles. In Holland the whole eight group winners come in for Best in Show.

The second show was held at Nervi, Italy (famous for its huge carnations) and a five-hour drive from Monaco. The show was held in the beautiful gardens near Genoa, birthplace of Columbus. Marking his discovery of America is his statue overlooking his three ships done in flowers.

"At Nervi the entrants were apportioned into 11 Groups in three divisions: Gun Dogs, Utility and Companion Dogs, the latter Toys and small breeds. No Best in Show award is given. This is a memorable show held outdoors in beautiful gardens. The Sunday show started off with a Mass of St. Hubert. Trumpeters in medieval costume traditionally face the Cross. The trumpet mouthpieces are turned toward the audience of thousands. The cages open in the back and are on stands, three to a stand, about three feet from the ground with an over-all roof. The stands in turn are placed along the paths winding through the formal gardens.

"The system at Monaco is completely different. There are two placings for Best in Show, but neither Best of Breed nor Group awards are given. All Winners Dogs and Females come into the ring simultaneously while three judges assess them. All the reports are written, while dogs and exhibitors as well as judges stood in the sun on the terrace of the Casino de Monte Carlo.

Mediterranean. The benching was exceptionally gay with individual shade umbrellas over the benches and orange trees in low containers marking the end of each row."

Competitors from other countries were regally entertained at cocktails, luncheons and dinners at each of the four shows. In Amsterdam guests were dined as only the Dutch know how and taken on a tour of the world famous Keukenhof Gardens where Dutch bulb growers show their tulips in an estate setting. Flowers and innate courtesy were out-

standing at all the shows. One problem was in keeping ice for dog food. Since no one knew what a Scotch cooler is, Mrs. McEachren purchased a yellow plastic pail with lid which served the purpose and created some amusement.

Mrs. McEachren was presented with a club pin and made a member of the Airedale Club of France. She was also made an honorary member of the Monagasque Kennel Club.

Apart from Rare Gem herself, much attention was created by her crate and stand, a style familiar in Canada but completely unknown in Europe. Rare Gem's individual wins will be set forth in the Cover Story of the July issue of Dogs.

The F.C.I. consists of three representatives from each of 27 countries. Canada and the United States are not members. The meeting place is selected in a different country each year. Next year's conference will take place in Austria. The policies of standard, health and many other important phases are decided at these meetings. A traditionally "closed" affair, this was the first time in its history an outsider has been invited to speak. Mrs. McEachren's brief remarks given in French and English at the closing session were very well received:

"Monsieur le President, Madame Nizet de Leemans, les distinguees delegates et mesdames et mesieurs. Je voudrais exprime mes sentiments en connection de ma viste a Amsterdam. Avec—ou sans votre permission, c'est necessarire pour moi de continué mes remarks en Anglais.

"It has been a great honour and a most rewarding experience to have been an invited guest to attend the meeting of the F.C.I. You have truly an international organization, amalgamating as it does so many countries spread over the world. You have scientists, doctors, lawyers, businessmen – all united. The motive, purebred dogs. And last, but not least, you have your beginner. Without him or her your dog shows would not exist. Hence the necessity for your existence.

"As a governor of the United States Kerry Blue Club of America I bring you greetings from our president, Mr. Justin Mills. From the Canadian Kennel Club, a 3,600 membership club extending from British Columbia to Newfoundland, I also extend our best wishes.

"No doubt some one else will more adequately express the admiration I feel for the efficiency of your perfectly arranged hospitality. As for me, Mr. President, all I can say, from the bottom of my heart, is thank you!"

PRINCE ALBERT KC SANCTION

Forty-five dogs were judged by Mrs. Pat Randall at the first all-breed sanction show held by the new Prince Albert Kennel Club. Fifteen dogs travelled from Saskatoon to enter. All six groups were well represented, with Sporting and Working the largest.

Best in Show honors went to the black Miniature Poodle, En Rico von Koelnischen Wald, owned by Mrs. I. Steiniger, Saskatoon. Rico, still under one year, was imported from Germany. Thirteen-year-old Carl Steinger, handling for the first time, showed his dog to victory.

Best Canadian Bred and Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Show went to an eight-months-old Collie, Hillfred's Bonnie, owned by Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Murphy of Saskatoon.

Mrs. Joan Wilk writes it was around 1928 that Prince Albert held its last show.

DOGS ARE BIG BUSINESS

"Man's best friend has really become big business," Capt. Will Judy told members of the Rotary Club at Youngstown, Ohio recently. The following figures are excerpted from his speech:

The (U.S.) canine population approaches 22 million, or one dog for every 2½ families. Based on retail prices, those paid by dog owners, dry dog food ran up \$75 million in sales with canned or so-called moist food \$225 million or approximately \$300 million to feed Fido.

Other expenditures during 1958 by American dog owners: for collars, leads, blankets, crates and other supplies, an estimated \$5 million. For ready-prepared medicines, soaps and remedies, another \$2 million. Veterinarians' fees totalled \$18 million. Dog shows, field trials, etc. required an expenditure of around \$3 million.

For the purchase of dogs, approximately 600,000 mostly at three to five months of age, at a conservative average of \$40 each, a total of \$24 million.

In the United States there are approximately 80,000 dog breeders, exhibitors, judges, trainers and kennelmen. These surely spend not less than \$24 million (or a low average of \$300 each).

Guide dog schools (approximately ten recognized schools) a total of \$1 million. And if we add \$3% million for all miscellaneous items (and the average dog owner can think of surprisingly many things to buy for his dog) we have a grand total of \$403,500,000 spent last year by dog owners.

DOGS and PEOPLE

The Pembroke Welsh Corgi Club of America has named Mrs. Pamela Mack of Montreal a director-the first time a Canadian has been elected to serve in this position. Other honours have also come to Macksons Kennels Reg'd: when the annual awards of the Pembroke Welsh Corgi Club of America were announced (for Corgis all over the U.S.A.) four were won by Can. and Am. Ch. Macksons The Best Man. At the Pembroke Welsh Corgi Specialty of America held in Trenton, N.J. May 3, her Cleden's Provocative won the Puppy Sweepstakes. An unusual sight at this show was 31 titled Corgis in the Parade of Champions.

Believed to be the first Can, and Am. Ch. Miniature Schnauzer to earn a C.D. degree and the only champion in the breed whose sire and dam are obedience-titled champions, Can. and Am. Ch. Rik-Rak Rebel's Banner recently finished her title via the Saw Mill River, Old Dominion and Baltimore County trials. Banner, owned by Mrs. F. W. Ackerman, Morristown, N.J., needs two legs to complete her Canadian C.D. Her sire, Am. Ch. Richmda's Jaunty Rebel, Am. C.D. and her dam, Am. Ch. Brenhof Katrinka, Can. and Am. C.D. (both Group winners in the U.S.) also were campaigned in conformation and obedience under Mrs. Ackerman's ownership.

Among American shows recently judged by Mrs. Mary Southcott, Milton, Ont. was the Centennial All Breed Dog Show and Obedience Trial sponsored by the Ingham County KC where she assessed Novice B, Open A and Utility. She also judged at the Specialty Show held by the German Shepherd Dog Club of Long Island, Long Island, N.Y., where the entry was 141 Shepherds. show was held outdoors on level ground," Mrs. Southcott tells Dogs, "and the rings were huge. It was a very well organized and smoothly run Specialty, and the hospitality and courtesy shown me by the club would be hard to surpass.

The Silky Terrier, newly admitted to registry in the Stud Book of The American Kennel Club is the 113th breed for which the AKC provides registry service. The Silky, a native of Australia, is an appealing blue and tan, moderately low-set Toy dog of from nine to ten inches in height, ranging in weight from eight to ten pounds with a glossy coat of silky texture from five to six inches long from behind the ears to the set-on of the tail.



The breed has had several names in Australia where it is known as a Sydney Silky and as an Australian Silky Terrier. It derives mainly from the Australian Terrier, which is recognized by The Canadian Kennel Club, but Yorkshire Terriers have played a role in the breed's creation. Silky Terriers have been regarded as a distinct breed in Australia for more than 25 years. At the present time the Silky is not yet recognized by The Canadian Kennel Club.

Fred Tremaine (Fredella German Shepherds) Burlington, Ont., lost his new kennels and stock in a fire May 2. The flames destroyed six adult dogs, eight two-day-old puppies and two boarders. Mr. Tremaine, a past president of the Hamilton Obedience Club and an approved obedience judge, was due in hospital for surgery three days later. The Hamilton KC is holding a benefit show to help meet expenses.

DOG PORTRAITIST

Artist Patricia Detmold of Ste. Sophie, Que. has given up painting people because "they always turn out with expressions like animals." We know of one other artist whose talents have the same trend — fashion artist Jean Miller, famous for her beautifully garbed creations with feline faces.

Miss Detmold's preference is for dogs, because that is what she is most frequently commissioned to do. She had no original intention of making canine portraiture a specialty. It was one of those things that just happened. Recuperating after a motor accident she did portraits of a Skye Terrier and a Corgi for a friend.

Miss Detmold, whose oils are becoming well known throughout Eastern Canada and the United States, knows dogs better than most artists. She raises and trains English Setters, with her mother Mrs. Joan Detmold, for show, field and obedience. Mrs. Detmold has bred Setters for 25 years.

With the exception of Poodles, she finds she can keep a dog reasonably still for about an hour. Her method is to persuade the dog to sit for a short time while she does sketches and makes notes, of colour in particular. In many instances she works from photographs, but will travel some distance in order to see the colouring for herself.

This energetic artist keeps the sketches of every canine sitter. A recent incident confirmed the wisdom of the habit. A portrait of Bruce, a German Shorthair, had barely been hung when it was stolen. A second portrait was immediately ordered.

One of her first large canvases was of a Poodle. The finished work measured about three by four feet and weighed 45 pounds when packed. She delivered the treasure personally, en route to New York, with two lively English Setters about to be entered in a show. While many artists work to mood, Miss Detmold has schooled herself to the rigid discipline of eight hours a day, six days a week. Occasionally she paints horses and sometimes cats, most restless of all her sitters. Christmas cards are another important part of her work, which she frequently resolves to give up. She sometimes does as many as

25 reproductions of the original painting. Bench and kennel signs are still another forte. The figures of dogs are cut out with a saw, a somewhat dangerous skill for an artist.

Miss Detmold studied at the Canadian School of Commercial Art in Montreal and worked as a commercial artist in Drummondville and Montreal.

The Secretary; reported that in a report to the Board dated September 20, 1958, the Obedience Council recommended that any resident of Canada who, before January 1st, 1960, is added to the American Kennel Club's list of persons eligible for approval to judge Tracking Tests be automatically added to The Canadian Kennel Club's list of approved Tracking Test judges; reported that this recommendation was approved at a meeting of the Board of Directors held on October 7, 1958; reported that by letter dated February 11, 1959, The American Kennel Club had informed Mrs. Donald Lyle, Vancouver, B.C. that she had been added to their list of approved Tracking Test judges;

judges; reported that upon receipt of confirmation from The American Kennel Club Mrs. Lyle had been added to the list of persons eligible for approval to judge Tracking Tests held under the rules of The Canadian Kennel Club.

The Secretary read a letter from W. J. Simpson, Bridgeport, Ontario seeking clarification of his eligibility to enter dogs in the Novice A and Open A classes at licensed trials in view of previous activity in the training of dogs.

(1) pointed out that on the pages in the private breeding record book where the owner of a stud dog records matings of his stud dog to females, whether owned by the same person or others, there is provision for the "identification" of each female to be stated but no provision for information as to the date of birth of each litter;

(2) suggested that when the record books are again printed, the reference to "identification" be deleted and in its place the words "Date of birth of litter" be substituted.

It was agreed that this was a desirable change, and the Secretary was instructed to be governed accordingly when the record books are again printed.

COMPLAINTS, CHARGES AND PROTESTS

(2) pointed out that The American Kennel Club has a Beagle Advisory Committee composed of one representative for each federation of Beagle clubs;

(3) recommended the appointment of a similar Beagle Advisory Committee to advise the Board on Beagles and Beagle field trial matters, principally the latter;

(4) recommended that a C.K.C. Beagle Advisory Committee be national to the extent that initially it is composed of a representative (or representatives) for each area in which there is presently held licensed Beagle field trials, other zones to be represented on the Committee when field trials for Beagles are held in such zones;

(5) reported that at present the geographical distribution of entries in licensed Beagle field trials held under C.K.C.

entries in licensed Beagle field trials held under C.K.C. rules is as follows: Ontario, 80%; Quebec, 6%; the

Maritimes, 14%; recommended that, with a view to allording representation on the basis of entries reported in (5) above, the Committee initially be set up on a 3-1-1 basis (or any multiple thereof), that is: 3 representatives from Ontario, 1 from Quebec, and

the basis of entries reported in (5) above, the Committee initially be set up on a 3-1-1 basis (or any multiple thereof), that is: 3 representatives from Ontario, 1 from Quebec, and 1 from the Maritimes;

(7) recommended that the Committee be composed exclusively of experienced Beaglers (members of the C.K.C.) and the capacity of these Committee members be recognized by the Board when the Committee be regarded as being quite distinct from the Field Trial Council, and if the By-laws do not presently permit of the appointment of such a Committee, then allow the Association to set it up and the Board be prepared to consider its recommendations;

(9) stated that it is not intended that the Committee would assume any of the duties and powers of the Board, but rather it would act solely in an advisory capacity of the Board;

(10) reported that the Association, anticipating that the Board may take immediate steps to set up such a Committee, had selected a number of members in Ontario considered eminently qualified to serve as members of the Committee, it being left to the Board to arrange for appointments from Quebec and the Maritimes;

(11) reported that the Association felt that the following would be amongst the duties of the Committee:

(a) to submit recommendations with regard to the granting of dates for Beagle field trials, and the setting up of policies for future guidance as the number of clubs holding licensed trials increases and the availability of satisfactory field trial dates presents a problem to C.K.C. and the trial-giving clubs;

(b) to advise the Board regarding the setting up of a list of approved judges for Beagle field trials, and the requirements and procedure with regard to the approval of additions to the initial list;

(c) to advise the Board regarding the setting up of requirements and procedures in respect of the official measuring of Beagles, and the issuance of official measurement certificates;

(d) to submit recommendations to the Board with regard to the appointment of Field Trial Repr

Mr. Blyth, Chairman of the Field Trial Council, stated that he considered the proposal placed before the Board to be one

worthy of the Board's consideration provided that it is approved by the appointed Beagle Field Trial Representatives.

Following discussion it was agreed that the delegation and the Beagle Field Trial Representatives present would retire from the meeting and discuss the proposal and the list of persons whom the Association had recommended for appointment to the proposed

(5) one of the two persons who had objected had voluntarily submitted a statement to an American dog publication in which that person had commented favorably on the standard proposed by the Canadian Samoyed Club;

(6) the fact that there were only two objections indicated, in the opinion of the Canadian Samoyed Club, that there was general satisfaction with its proposed standard;

(7) in the drafting of the proposed standard every effort had been made to meet the wishes of all interested in the breed;



CERTIFICATES:
(a) Type of coat will not be specified on the litter certificate but 'breed' will be identified either as 'standard' or miniature';
(b) For individual registration of a dog the applicant must show classification as either 'standard' or 'miniature' and type of coat (i.e. Smooth, Wirehaired, or Longhaired) which information shall be included on the individual certificate issued for each Dachshund.

INTERBREEDING:
Interbreeding between the coats is permissible, but not between the main divisions (i.e. standard, miniature).





COMPLAINTS CHARGES AND PROTESTS

8 C 19. REGINA vs. MRS, IDA McLEAN

The Secretary:

(1) reported that in Magistrate's court at the Township of North York on the 27th day of November, 1958, Mrs. Ida McLean was convicted and fined \$50.00 for selling to John H. Douglas as pure-bred a Pekingese bitch without furnishing the certificate of registration together with duly recorded transfer of ownership thereof to the said John H. Douglas;

(2) reported that Mrs. McLean's appeal of the conviction was heard before His Honour Judge MacDonell in the County Court of the County of York on Tuesday March 31st, 1959;

(3) read Judge MacDonell's judgment as follows:

"The charge here is that the accused did sell as purebred a Pekingese bitch, which is an animal of a class or breed in respect of which an association has been incorporated, without furnishing a certificate of registration. This is contrary to Section 17 (e) of the Dominion Livestock Pedigree Act.

"There is no doubt that the accused did sell a female Pekingese to J. H. Douglas for the sum of \$25.00. There is no doubt that the animal was as a matter of fact purebred. There is some conflict of evidence, but on the evidence I must find she was sold as a purebred. It is suggested that the animal was sold not as a purebred but as a pet and therefore there was a reduction in the price. I can see no reason why a person cannot buy a purebred animal as a pet and that, I think, was the intention here.

"There is no doubt that the provision of the Act requiring the furnishing of the certificate of registration has not been complied with. The evidence shows that the papers could have been obtained but they have not been furnished and the accused refused, and as a matter of fact still refuses to furnish the papers although the complainant has offered the sum of \$10.00 which he says was agreed upon as the cost of the papers, and indeed has offered to pay a larger amount in order to obtain the papers.

"The principal defence urged was that the animal was not a says of a class or breed in respect of which an association."

"The principal defence urged was that the animal was not of a class or breed in respect of which an association has been incorporated. I have carefully considered the argument and the statutes and I have reached the conclusion that the Canadian Kennel Club is an association incorporated in respect of Pekingese dogs. Being of this opinion, the appeal fails and must be dismissed. Under the circumstances,

I do not think it is a case for costs."

A presentation was prepared, as per the attached, and submitted to Mr. Bob Hurlbut, advertising manager of Gaines. Mr. Hurlbut's reaction to our proposal was most gratifying and I believe we can expect to see this program reach a successful conclusion. It is possible that Gaines will decide to approach this slowly. Should the program prove to be successful it would undoubtedly be expanded to other provinces.

In the last two days I have had further discussions with Mr. Hurlbut and at his suggestion I will be contacting two or three departments of education -- Toronto and possibly Hamilton -- to explore their reaction to distribution of such a booklet in their schools. If such reaction is Iavourable, it is safe to assume hat other educational departments in Ontario municipalities will be quite agreeable to our suggestion.

"KEN-L RATION ANNUAL DINNER AND AWARD

As everyone knows, this particular phase of our publicity program has been brought to a successful conclusion. Good newspaper coverage was given to the first dinner and undoubtedly, as the years go by, prestige and publicity attached to the Annual Awards will increase. Considerable time and effort were expended in meetings with the agencies and the company to sell them on the value of this project. In our opinion, the inauguration of the Ken-L Ration Award will have far reaching beneficial effects on the purebred dog world. It is another incentive for breeders from coast to coast to enter more shows and compete for the award in their respective section. It is my understanding that the company is most pleased with all the publicity and good will attached to their undertaking.

APPROVAL OF DATES & JUDGES FOR ONTARIO & QUEBEC

SUBJECT: Possible new policies with regard to the approval of dates and judges for championship shows and licensed obedience trials in Ontario and Quebec.

For some years past the following have been our policies with regard to the approval of dates and judges for championship shows and licensed obedience trials in Ontario (except the Lakehead area) and

ensed obedience trials in Ontario (except the Lakehead area) and obec:
Ontario (except the Lakehead area) and Quebec have been considered as ONE zone.
No two clubs would be granted permission to hold shows on the same date within this zone, nor would two clubs be granted permission to hold licensed obedience trials on the same date within this zone. In the granting of dates for shows (or obedience trials) on consecutive dates, consideration was given to the distance between the events, and if the distance was regarded to be such that exhibitors could not readily move from one show to the other, than for the purpose of processing applications for dates both would be regarded as being held on the same date. (For example, we would not grant dates for championship shows at Toronto and Montreal on consecutive dates for it is believed that for all practical purposes such shows would be conflicting with one another.)
When a person is approved to judge a given breed (or breeds) at a championship show within this zone, approval would not be given the same person to judge the same breed or breeds at another show inthe zone within a period of three months less two weeks. For example, a person approved to judge all Terriers at Chatham on April 20th would not be approved to judge all Terriers at Ottawa if the show at Ottawa was scheduled to be held prior to July 6th. Similarly, a person approved to judge all Terriers at Ottawa on July 1st would not later be approved to judge all Terriers at Chatham for a show on April 20th. Approval depended on which club's application first reached this oflice.

In the case of licensed obedience trials there was no time limit between a judge's judging engagements, but we insist on four licensed trials within the zone between engagements for the same judge to judge the same obedience class or classes. For example,

between a judge's judging engagements, but we insist on four licensed trials within the zone between engagements for the same judge to judge the same obedience class or classes. For example, a person approved to judge the obedience classes at a trial at Windsor on April 15th would not be approved to judge the same classes at Kingston (regardless of the date of the Kingston trial) unless four distinct licensed obedience trials were held in the zone between the Windsor and Kingston trials.

It is inevitable that from time to time, with changing conditions, we must review our existing policies with a view to determining whether any changes would be best for all concerned. For reasons not hard to visualize, most show and trial-giving clubs prefer to hold their events on a Saturday (occasionally a Sunday). With an increasing number of clubs seeking satisfactory dates on which to hold their shows and trials, we are finding it increasingly difficult to satisfy their needs. Arenas seem to be, at least in some places, the only satisfactory venue for the holding of shows, yet where that is the case the clubs concerned have only a limited period during the year when they will be able to hold shows, if at all. For this and other reasons it appears likely that the existing problem will become further accentuated, rather than diminish, in future years. Similarly, with an increasing number of shows and trials, clubs will likely find it difficult to obtain the services of judges whose services they would like to engage.

The Board of Directors has been considering the existing situation and likely prospects for the future with a view to determining what changes (if any) should be made in our existing policies.

One suggestion has been put forward and that is that all of Ontario and Quebec south of 46° North Latitude be zoned as follows:

ZONE "A" -- the area west of 80° West Longitude which would take in Guelph, Kitchener, Brantford, London, Windsor

ZONE "B" -- the area between 80° West Longitude and 78° West Longitude which would take in Hamilton, Burlington, Toronto, Barrie, Peterborough, Port Hope and Cobourg.

ZONE "C" -- the area in Ontario and Quebec east of 78° West
Longitude which would take in Belleville, Kingston,
Ottawa, Hull, Montreal, etc.
(See Chart enclosed. The area north of 46° North Latitude would
be considered a separate zone.)

It has been suggested that adoption of such a zoning arrangement would necessitate the following changes in the policies reported earlier

championship shows (also obedience trials) may be held simultaneously, or near simultaneously, in Zones "A" and "C", but no confliction would be allowed between championship shows (and between obedience trials) in Zones "A" and "B" and between Zones "B" and "C"; judges for championship shows may be approved without regard to time between anagographic when judging at shows in Zones.

to time between engagements when judging at shows in Zones "A" and "C", but the present policy be continued where it concerns engagements in Zones "A" and "B" and Zones "B"

judges for licensed obedience trials may be approved without regard to the number of trials between engagements when judging at trials in Zones "A" and "C", but the present policy be continued where it concerns engagements in Zones "A" and "B" and Zones "B" and "C".

Some examples of a practical application of the suggested policy are as follows:

championship shows (also obedience trials) may be held

championship shows (also obedience trials) may be held simultaneously at Ottawa and Sarnia; a person may be approved to judge at Montreal without regard to any engagement to judge at a show at London, subject only to travelling time between such engagements if held on dates very close to one another (the same would apply to judges of obedience trials);

simultaneous shows would not be permitted at Cobourg and London, nor Toronto and Ottawa; similarly near simultaneous shows would not be permitted if it was felt travelling time did

The B. ard feels that no decision should be reached on this plan, or any alternative plan, without prior consultation with clubs in Ontario and Quebec holding championship shows and licensed obedience trials under our Rules. Accordingly, I have been instructed to forward details of this suggested plan to each club and association in Ontario and Quebec, requesting their reaction to the plan as outlined in this memorandum. The Board will welcome any alternative arrangements any club or association believes worthy of consideration. All comments and suggestions must reach the Secretary of The Canadian Kennel Club before July 10th, in order that a report may be prepared for distribution to the Board prior to its semi-annual meeting in August.

NOTICE

SUBJECT: Processing of applications for registration and/or applications for transfer of ownership.

Having regard for the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, 1949, and the By-laws of The Canadian Kennel Club, members and others selling dogs as pure-bred are asked to note that the following instructions have been given to the Canadian National Live Stock Records with regard to the acceptance and processing of applications for registration and/or applications for transfer of ownership.

#1 --- In the case of a dog born in Canada the application for registration is to be processed and a certificate of registration issued ONLY if the application for registration is submitted to the Live Stock Records office by the person who owned the dog AT BIRTH.

#2 --- Where a dog already registered in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club has been sold, transfer of ownership is to be recorded ONLY if the certificate of registration and application for transfer of ownership is submitted to the Live Stock Records office by the last recorded

#3 --- Where a dog has been imported to Canada, the application for registration is to be processed and a certificate of registration issued ONLY if the application for registration is submitted by the person who imported the dog to Canada.

A person selling a dog as pure-bred should not give an application for registration and application for transfer of ownership, or a certificate of registration and application for transfer of ownership, to the purchaser. Where a dog is sold as pure-bred the purchaser is entitled to a C.K.C. certificate of registration showing that transfer of the dog to his name has been duly recorded in the records of the Club.

MEMO TO DACHSHUND FANCIERS AND CLUBS

As breeders of Dachshunds are aware, it has been the policy of The Canadian Kennel Club, for a number of years, to regard the two sizes and three different coats in Dachshunds as separate and distinct breeds both for show and registration purposes. This policy did not permit of interbreeding between any two of the six different "breeds" of Dachshunds.

On several occasions the Board of Directors has been faced with the question as to what action should be taken, or policy adopted, with regard to litters in which there was one (or more) dogs of a coat different from its sire and dam (i.e. a long-haired Dachshund in a litter resulting from the mating of two Smooths; or a smooth coated Dachshund in a litter resulting from the mating of two wire-haired Dachshunds.

Doubtless the present breed divisions came into being when those interested in the breed felt that steps should be taken to prevent the registration of dogs resulting from interbreeding between coats. If the breeding of Dachshunds in Canada was confined to Dachshunds presently in Canada, and if breeders would voluntarily refrain from using for breeding purposes any Dachshund having a coat different from its sire and dam, then with each passing year one could reasonably expect a continuing decrease in the birth of litters represented by more

We are however faced with the fact that in certain other countries to which Canadian breeders of Dachshunds look for breeding stock from time to time, there is no ban on interbreeding between the coats, and it is not always possible for Canadian breeders to obtain thoroughly dependable information about the ancestry of dogs which they are contemplating purchasing or breeding to.

The existing situation has prompted the Board to consider the possibility that Dachshund fanciers in Canada might prefer a different over-all policy. It referred the question to the Registration Committee for consideration, and at a recent meeting of the Board the Committee suggested a new policy as a basis for consideration. It was the Committee's recommendation that this alternative arrangement be published in "Dogs in Canada" along with an invitation to all interested to submit their comments on the plan outlined by the Committee, and to submit counter proposals for the Board's consideration.

The Board has directed that the Committee's alternative plan be published with advice that all comments, suggestions, and counter proposals must be submitted so as to be received by the Scoretary, The Canadian Kennel Club, 667 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario, by July 15, 1959. Each person or organization writing The Canadian Kennel Club on this subject must state their interest in the matter.

The following is the Registration Committee's suggested alternative to the present policy. It is put forward solely as a basis for consideration and is not to be considered a firm recommendation to the Board:

FOR DOG SHOWS

No change in present six "breeds" except that in the case of the Miniature varieties the breed standards be amended to call for the disqualification of any Miniature over nine pounds in weight.

FOR REGISTRATION PURPOSES

1. There be two main divisions: (a) standard; (b) miniature

WEIGHT LIMITATIONS:

(a) None on the standard; (b) Miniatures:

Miniature':

(i) None where both sire and dam are registered individually in C.K.C. records as 'Miniature';

(ii) Where the dam is C.K.C. registered as a 'Miniature' and she is mated to a stud dog in another country, the litter application must be accompanied by a signed statement from the owner of the stud dog that said dog does not weigh more than nine pounds;

(iii) Where an imported dog is to be registered as a 'Miniature' the importer must forward with the application for registration of such dog a signed statement that the imported dog does not exceed nine pounds in weight; and to the application there must also be attached the signed statement of the owner of the sire of the imported dog that the sire does not exceed nine pounds in weight, and the same form of statement from the owner of the dam of the imported dog;

CERTIFICATES:

CERTIFICATES:

(a) Type of coat will not be specified on the litter certificate but 'breed' will be identified either as 'standard' or 'miniature';

(b) For individual registration of a dog the applicant must show classification as either 'standard' or 'miniature' and type of coat (i.e. Smooth, Wire-haired, or Longhaired) which information shall be included on the individual certificate issued for each Bacheburd. individual certificate issued for each Dachshund.

INTERBREEDING: Interbreeding between the coats is permissible, but not between the main divisions (i.e. standard, miniature).

The same policy need not apply to the two main divisions (standard, miniature) if the wishes of those interested in each division are not identical.

FURTHER COMMENTS:

Since the above-outlined plan was placed before the Board the Registration Committee has considered still another possible arrangement which is put forward for the consideration and comment of Dachshund fanciers. In the main it consists of a different arrangement than that set forward under the heading of "3. CERTIFICATES" above. It is as follows:

When a breeder registers a litter of Dachshunds he will not only indicate the number of males and females in the litter but will also indicate on the application for litter registration form the different coats represented

when an individual dog out of a litter which included a specimen having a coat different from its sire and dam, all dogs in the litter, when registered individually, will be identified by an asterisk (*) immediately following the bread designation. breed designation

NOTICE

On the recommendation of The Canadian Samoyed Club the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club has approved the following new standard for the Samoyed, effective July 1st, 1959.

General Appearance — The Samoyed, being essentially a working dog, should present a picture of beauty, alcriness and strength, with agility, dignity and grace. As his work lies in the cold climate, his coat should be heavy and weather resistant, and of good quality rather than quantity. The male carries more of a "ruff" than the female. He should not be long in the back as a weak back would make him practically useless for his legitimate work, but at the same time a close coupled body would also place him at a great disadvantage as a draft dog. Breeders should aim for the happy medium, a body not long but muscular, allowing liberty, with a deep chest and well sprung ribs, strong arched neck, straight front and especially strong loins. Males should be masculine in appearance and deportment without unwarranted aggressiveness; bitches feminine without weakness of structure or apparent softness of temperament. Bitches may be slightly longer in back than males. They should both give the appearance of being capable of great endurance but be free from coarseness. Because of the depth of chest required, the legs should be moderately long. A very shortlegged dog is to be deprecated. Hindquarters should be particularly well developed, stifles well bent and any suggestion of unsound stifles or cowhocks severely penalized. General appearance should include movement and general conformation indicating balance and good substance.

Gait -- A Samoyed should gait with a good, well-balanced movement. He should move with an easy, agile stride that is well timed. The gait should be free with a good reach in the fore-quarters and a sound, driving power in the hind-quarters. A choppy or stilted gait should be penalized.

Coat -- The body should be well covered with a thick, close, soft and short undercoat, with harsh hair growing through it, forming the outer coat, which should stand straight away from the body and be quite free from curl. The legs should have good feathering.

Head — Powerful and wedge shaped with a broad, flat skull, muzzle of medium length, a tapering foreface, not too sharply defined. The stop should be not too abrupt — nevertheless well defined. Ears should not be too long but rounded at the tips, set well apart and well covered inside with hair. Eyes dark, set well apart and deep with alert intelligent expression. Lips black, flews should not drop predominantly at corners of the mouth. Hair short and smooth before the ears. Nose and eye-rims black for preference, but may be brown. Strong jaws with level teeth.

Back -- Medium in length, broad and very muscular. Bitches may be slightly longer in back than males.

Chest and Ribs -- Chest broad and deep. Ribs well sprung, giving plenty of heart and lung room.

Hindquarters -- Very muscular, stifles well let down, cowhocks or straight stifles should be severely penalized.

Forelegs -- Straight and muscular. Good bone. In or out at the elbow to be severely penalized.

Feet -- Long, flattish and slightly spread out. Soles well padded with hair.

Tail -- Long and profuse, carried over the back when alert, sometimes dropped when at rest. A Judge should see the tail over the back once when judging. A double hook should be penalized.

Size and Weight -- Dogs twenty to twenty-two inches at the shoulder; Bitches eighteen to twenty inches; weight in proportion to size.

Colour -- Pure white, cream, biscuit, or white and biscuit.

Disposition -- Alert and intelligent and should show animation. Friendly, but conservative. Unprovoked aggressiveness to be severely penalized.

GUNDOG TRAINING

by JACK CHUDLEY

People often ask me which dog I like best: a labrador or a spaniel? The answer to this is quite simple, I like a good dog, and I don't care what breed it is, as long as it does its job properly.

Handling a good dog is like riding a good horse: it gives one an awful lot of pleasure - and a good horse is never a bad colour. I sometimes suspect that people want me to say that I prefer one to the other, but the truth is that I don't!

If I am out picking up, and the bag is likely to be big, then give me a good Labrador. That is his job and I have yet to handle a dog that can beat him at it. If I am out with a party and we have to flush our own game, then give me a good Spaniel. A Spaniel's chief job is to hunt and to flush game for the guns to shoot, and this they do to perfection.

There is no doubt in my mind that a good Spaniel will not beat a good Labrador at his job any more than a good Labrador will beat a good Spaniel at his

If you have a lot of birds down in heavy cover, a good Labrador will collect them all without damaging any game but not so the Spaniel. And the reason for this is not difficult to find, for the latter's job is to hunt fearlessly through all cover, not to go over it as a retriever

often does after collecting game. So quite a few birds get damaged when the Spaniel is weaving his way back through the brambles with a bird in his mouth.

Do not think for one minute that I am saying Spaniels are hard-mouthed; they are not; but if they are taught their job properly you will get a certain number of birds damaged when retrieved from heavy cover.

I always get a great deal of pleasure out of training a Spaniel and it is certainly a much easier job to produce a top class Spaniel than it is to produce a top class Labrador.

With a Labrador you have probably got a year of very exacting work before you start to get much pleasure from your training.

Moreover, you cannot train a Labrador at home. The moment he gets to the stage when he is ready to shoot over. he must have fresh ground, and I find the more often he gets fresh ground the better he becomes, and the quicker he advances. It is then, of course, that you start to get pleasure from your training!

With a Spaniel, the fun often starts from the word go. He is usually such a happy and gay dog that "there is never a dull moment." I can train a Spaniel up to Novice Stake class without going more than 300 yards from the kennels. Provided that there are a few rabbits about he doesn't mind how often he has been over the ground.

It is so easy to organize things at home with a Spaniel; he can be shown and taught what he will come up against in his later shooting career, and I find that if a Spaniel does it at home, he will do it on any and every kind of ground.

But not so the Labrador; you can get him perfect on his home ground, then take him to fresh ground, and one would sometimes think he had not been taught anything at all! That is my reason for saying that Labradors must have fresh ground continually during their later exercises.

Obedience in Quebec

Dog fanciers in the Province of Ouebee had their first real look at obedience in action in 1946. Late that year the well known Miss Blanche Saunders came to Montreal at the invitation of the S.P.C.A. to give a demonstration of dog obedience training in Victoria Hall, Westmount. The following year saw the first dog obedience training class in action in the Province of Quebec. This class was held in Montreal under the very capable guidance of Mrs. Alex Casgrain, who has continued to run an obedience training school in Montreal since 1947. In 1948, the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club was formed and a few years later the Mountain City Obedience Club came into being. These two clubs, both operating in Montreal, are the oldest and by far the most active obedience clubs in Quebec.

During the past dozen years or so, obedience has come a long way in Quebec. While there are strictly only two obedience clubs in the Province of Quebec, nevertheless, these two clubs and others offered a total of nine obedience trials in 1958, plus one tracking test. Close to 370 entries were judged in the nine trials, or an average of just over 40 per trial. The Province of Quebec should be proud of the fact that the four largest obedience trials held in Canada in 1958 were held in Quebec. The largest trial in Canada was run by the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club when 61 entries were judged. In 1957, this same Club had the distinction of running the largest trial that year with 68 entries. The second largest trial in 1958 was held by the Mountain City Obedience Club with 60 entries. The next largest trial in Canada was held by the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club when 59 entries paraded before the judges. The fourth largest trial in 1958 was run by the Mountain City Obedience Club with 57 entries. This is indeed quite an enviable record which should stand for some time to come.

The Province of Quebec is responsible for tracking tests making a start in Canada. The first tracking test held in Canada was put on by the Montreal Dog Obedience Training Club in the fall of 1954 when ten entries were judged. Your editor judged that tracking test with Miss Lucy Lane and yours truly thus became the first approved Canadian Tracking judge. We have

judged the other tracking tests in Quebec, held in 1955, 1956, 1957 and 1958. Of the eight tracking tests held in Canada up to the end of 1958, five were held in Quebec, two in Ontario and one in British Columbia.

Quebec has made a good contribution to the list of approved obedience and tracking judges in Canada. There are three approved obedience judges and three approved tracking judges in Quebec. Mrs. Alex Casgrain and your editor are obedience and tracking judges. Mr. J. Malcolm McDougall is a tracking judge and Mr. Gerald McNally is an obedience judge.

Obedience enthusiasts of Quebec have travelled all over the province, Eastern Canada and the United States, and have done credit to the sport wherever they have travelled. Some residents of Que-bec have done extremely well in the obedience ring, not only in their own home towns, but, in other parts of the country and also south of the border. Space does not permit to relate even the outstanding wins but certain names come to mind. We, in Quebec, cannot talk about obedience without mentioning the names of those who have done so much for the sport throughout the years. We immediately think of Mrs. Alex Casgrain, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Newcombe, Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Mingie, Mrs. R. H. Bryson, Miss Dorothy Budge, Mrs. Mae Birch, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Tyner, Miss Sheila Houstoun (who ran an obedience training class in Venezuela), Mr. J. M. McDougall, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. McLellan, Mrs. Evelyn McCullough, Mrs. Eja Martinsson, Mrs. Jean Ferrabee, Miss Kay Harrison, Miss Edith Henderson, Mrs. Pamela Mack, Mr. Gerald McNally, Miss D. Valerie Reid, Mrs. J. Dempster, Mr. Jean Gascon and Mrs. T. G. Hawkins. These are names that quickly come to mind and if we have omitted anyone, it is not intentional and we ask your forgiveness. These people and many others in Quebec have done a great deal to further dog obedience, not only in their own province, but in other parts of the country. They are an enthusiastic group and their kind are mainly responsible for the great strides that have been made in Quebec during the past dozen years. Of course, we must not forget all those other wonderful people whom we have not mentioned by name, who have been entering trials in Quebec and by so doing have helped to

raise the standard to what it is today. We, in Quebec, feel certain that there is a great future for the sport in Canada. Much has been done in the past, but as always there is a lot to be done in the future if we are to keep the sport at the high level it now enjoys.

Recent Trials

Licensed obedience trials were held on April 25 and 26, 1959 in the Hussar's Armoury, Montreal. The trials were run by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada, Inc. in conjunction with their 38th and 39th Annual All Breed Championship Dog Shows. Mr. Milo D. Pearsall and Mrs. Margaret E. Pearsall of Holbrook, Long Island judged the trials on Saturday and Sunday, respectively. Mr. Pearsall held an obedience clinic while in Montreal, which was very well attended by an enthusiastic group of obedience stalwarts.

The winners of the trials follow: Mrs. T. G. Hawkins of Montreal handled her Boston Terrier, "Fay-Don's Candy Jones", to first place in the Utility Class on Saturday while Mr. Jean Gascon of St. Jerome, P.Q. handled his Standard Poodle, "Baronne", to top position in that class on Sunday. A Miniature Poodle, "Glenmount's Golden Mocha" owned by Mrs. Robert A. Williams of Pointe Claire, P.Q. placed first in Novice "A". In the second trial, Mrs. Jane Frances Stoeckel of Montreal handled her Miniature Poodle, "Maydique's Babette", to first place in Novice "A". In Novice "B", Mr. Jean Gascon, St. Jerome, P.Q. and his Standard Poodle, "Muguette Ghia de Montreuil", took first place honours on both days, "Summit's Golden Shelly", a Shetland Sheep-dog, owned by Mr. A. Tafler of Montreal, took top place honours in Open "A" in both trials. In Open "B", Mrs. T. G. Hawkins' Boston Terrier "Fay-Don's Star of Perfection", lived up to its name in both trials by placing first.
