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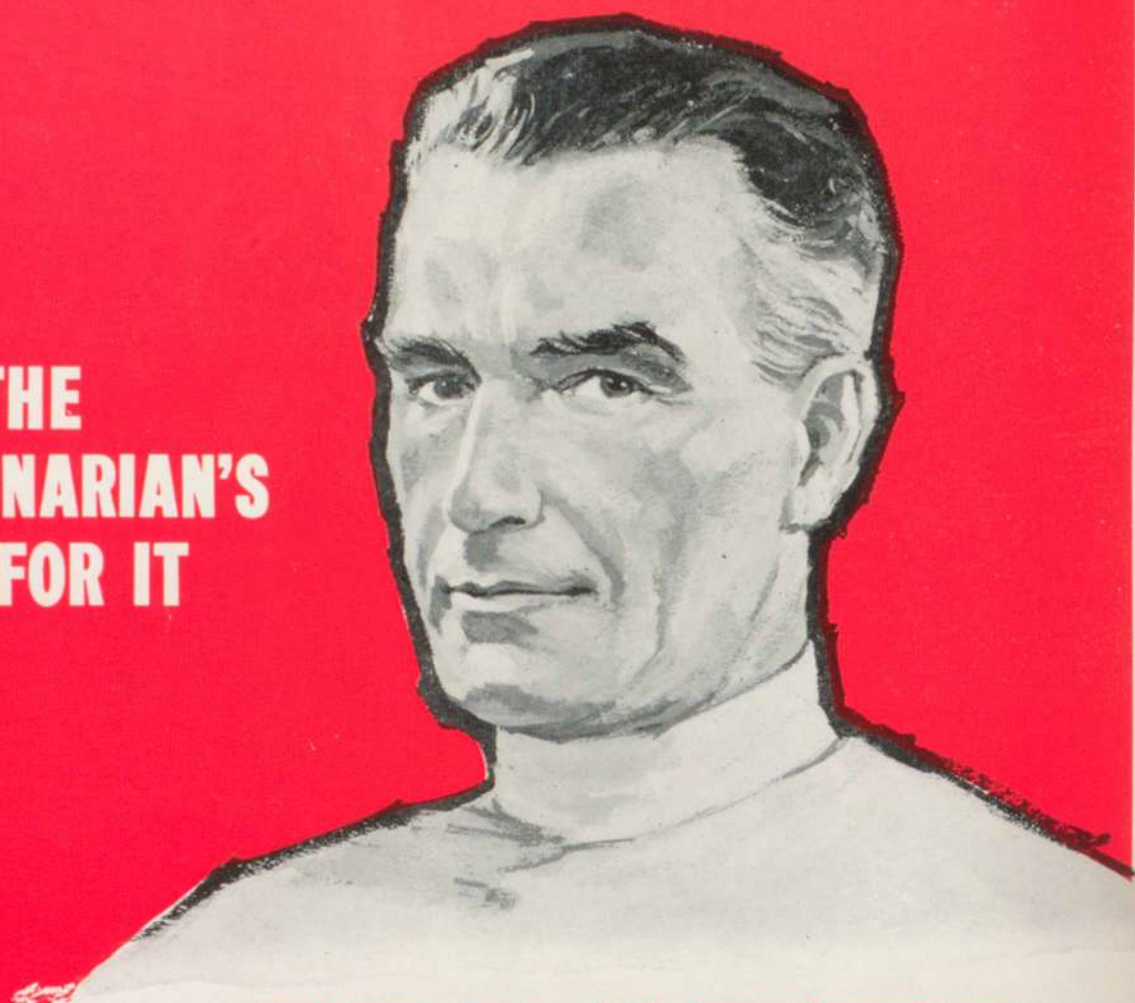

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FROM THE EDITOR

This is an era of benevolence to animals on one hand and on the other a time of incredible cruelty in the name of science.

In the United States, every year, research laboratories and pharmaceutical companies use more than 300 million vertebrate animals — killed in the production of drugs and the quest for knowledge. The extent to which dogs are used in experimentation in Canadian laboratories is not known at the time of writing.

Fortunately there are dedicated people working through respected organizations and individually, who not only bring to light the facts regarding both lack of proper care and the suffering inflicted on these animals, but are instrumental in helping clean up some of the situation. One such individual is Margo Nesselrod (*These Things I Saw*), previously reported in *Dogs*. Among the better known organizations are the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, The Canadian Council for Animals' Welfare, and perhaps the largest and most aggressive of all, the Humane Society of the United States.

The Society's latest release, "the blackest spot in the history of medical science" states that help must come through law. "Many eminent scientists deeply explore the cruelties and suffering to which laboratory animals are subjected. The scientists, however, cannot achieve any real reform without help from law — Federal law. The field is too vast, the crime too great, to be handled by voluntary, spontaneous reform from within."

"It is a mistake to think that scientists are in full control of the huge laboratories of the nation or that only scientists are to be found working there. Many of the cruelties visited on laboratory animals are the responsibility of university or commercial laboratory business managers, ... and of the more than 150,000 persons employed today in laboratories using animals, the great majority are non-professional and often untrained laborers."

An excellent bill (which might well be considered in Canada) designed to eliminate the greater part and the worst of cruelty to laboratory animals has been introduced in the United States Congress by Rep. Morgan Moulder of Missouri, and has been endorsed by the HSUS and many other national, state and local humane societies. The bill would demand that (animals) "shall be spared avoidable pain, stress, discomfort and fear, that they shall be used only when no other feasible and satisfactory method can be used to obtain necessary scientific information..." The rules would be enforced by an agency for Laboratory Animal Control under a commissioner protected by the law from political pressures. The Moulder bill also requires "humane shelter, food, water, exercise, sanitation, light, temperature, humidity and ventilation."

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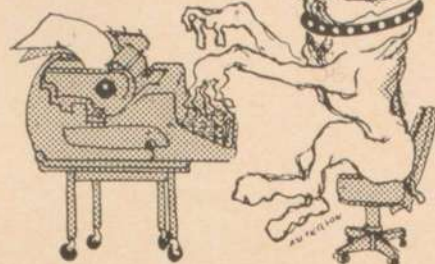

OBEDIENCE JUDGES

... I have heard some Obedience judges and other persons in authority on Obedience matters, say that an Obedience judge should train a dog every three years and should not be allowed to judge any class in which they have not trained a dog.

I do not see how any judge can be expected to train a dog every three years. Are they supposed to train a dog, then dispose of it, buy another, train it, dispose of it, and so on? Some judges are lucky enough to own a kennel or live in a large space where they can have any number of dogs, but the majority do not. The majority, if they have a job other than their training of dogs, do not have time to train their dog, or other person's dogs in the advanced classes.

I understand that Alan Sharp has never taken a dog through to its CD, yet he is looked upon as being an excellent judge. If a judge were expected to be training a dog all the time, this would certainly let out several people who are excellent judges. If he or she trained other people's dogs for them just to keep in practice, they would need to keep the dog with them at their home so they could become acquainted with it and gain its confidence. No one who does not have a kennel can do this!

Instead of crucifying our good judges here in Canada, let's turn our thoughts to American judges and put through a rule that will make sure that they have to try exams and pass before they are allowed to judge here in Canada. The Canadian judges going to the States have to write exams, pass, and apprentice at three trials before they are approved to judge any trial in the States. We want to keep the standard of Obedience judging up, granted, but we should not expect the impossible from our judges!

GSD BREEDERS TAKING STEPS

... In your January issue, you presented an article entitled "Hip Dysplasia in German Shepherds" by Dr. A.-J. Cawley. Although the medical facts presented by Dr. Cawley are universally accepted as correct, his method of presenting the facts and his ideas on correction give an extremely misleading impression and add one more burden on the backs of sincere Shepherd breeders who have been working for years in efforts to breed out this condition.

Upon reading Dr. Cawley's article, the

uninformed would be led to believe this is a condition exclusive to German Shepherds and the breed is heading towards complete infestation without cern by the breeders.

Dr. Cawley could not dispute the fact that most hip x-rays taken are of German Shepherds. This does not indicate dysplasia exclusive to Shepherds, but Shepherd breeders are doing something about it. For example: We only breed bitches who have been cleared by x-ray breed them to dogs in the same category. Any pup we buy has to be of similar cleared parentage. At the approved pups are x-rayed and, if they are not normal, one way or another eliminated from breeding. We have had much heartbreak over this policy, but we are not alone. Some German Shepherd breeders throughout Canada bear this burden, sincerely believing in the eventual elimination of the condition to a minimum of hip dysplasia in the wonderful German Shepherd breed.

Dr. Cawley could better serve this breed (rather than by writing misleading, ambiguous articles, which do nothing but hurt German Shepherd popularity) by using his extensive medical knowledge and experience to read x-rays submitted for publication in *Dogs* those German Shepherds found normal. This could be done immediately with very quick benefits.

We would take pleasure in having our dogs come under such scrutiny.

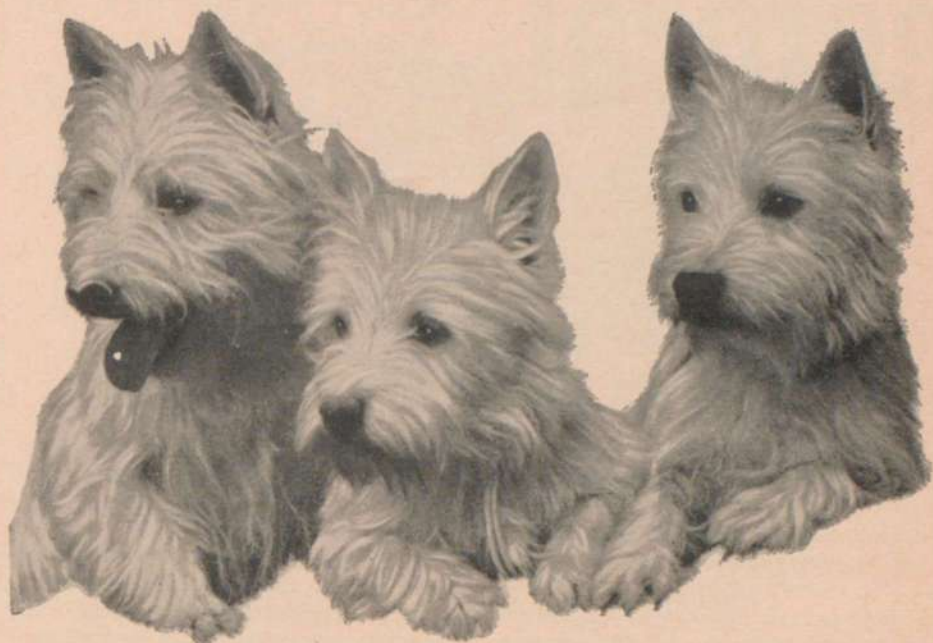
AN EMPTY DRUM IS HEARD AFAR

When I was a young boy my dad demonstrated his remarks by first kicking a drum, then by kicking an empty one. His actions I understood what he meant.

In the newspapers and magazines there are letters to the editor, where many people give their suggestions and criticisms to the editor. This is our way of life. We do criticize our publishers, our government and city fathers or any one son or persons who we feel are not of the same mind as we are. This tends to let the steam off and ease the pressure whether or not our criticisms are justified. The majority of the people shrug their shoulders and let it go at face value. This dog breeding hobby that I like so many more have devoted so much time and money I feel it is time to write my views in defence of the breed of dog that has been my fancy ever since I could remember the Collie dog. In defence

my beliefs, and endeavours in the past 14 years of serious breeding of the Collie, it would be my obligation as a breeder and an exhibitor to ask who is Mr. Wellwood? Yes, I have met him several times, have seen him exhibiting Collies both in Canada and the U.S.A. and I question his actions and attitude in the articles he has taken upon himself to write (including Deterioration of Collies in Canada, by Harold Wellwood Jr., June 1961.) Thank goodness this article never reached the public. I have read and reread Mr. Wellwood's article published in *Dogs in Canada*, November issue with amazement. Why should he declare that unknowingly we breeders appear not to have made up our minds as to whether the Collie dog is a working dog or not. If Mr. Wellwood hasn't made up his mind as to the status of the Collie dog by now, then there is little hope for him whatsoever.

I could name you so many intelligent men and women who have made up their minds and have devoted years of their lives breeding and promoting the Collie Dog, always trying to promote and improve towards the accepted standard. They knew what they wanted and worked tirelessly for it, like myself, having encouraging results at times and at other times not so good, but they have produced a magnificent and intelligent dog to carry on with. Mr. Wellwood, in a previous edition, mentioned several of these Collie greats. I personally have met several of these people and it was always an education in itself to talk Collie with people such as Mr. Ormiston Roy, Dr. J. P. McCain, Mr. Wm. Swinger, Mr. Ed Myres and many others. There are many men and women who have worked hard to improve this dog, intelligent people, many who own and operate their own business and know where they are going in the business world and in the dog breeding hobby. Yet Mr. Wellwood can sit down and write such an article and declare that we haven't made up our minds and that the Collie is nothing but a companion dog, the Border Collie is the only working dog! How does he know about the Border Collie? Does he breed them? Does he work them? Maybe there would be a better market for Border Collie puppies. I do hope that the Border Collie dog does not get so popular as the show Collie. There is no limit to what the "In and Outers" could do to that game little, hard-working dog. There are those today who breed dogs, just as in the past, who never did dare to understand the Standard, let alone the reasons for it. We call them the "In and Outers", when they finally realize that it is not the money-making game they thought it was and that breeding good stock is not a matter of breeding one's female to the neighbour's dog and then sitting back and waiting for the customers to come. Most kennels have had and some still own a kris; there will always be a kris. That we expect. We still want the intelligent Collies, plus the inherited beauty created by years of conscientious breeders. As for the high cost of living and the small kennels wanting their young stock off to a fast start, I ask, what fast start? Where are we going? *I know many breeders who very seldom show their dogs and some of us have to hold back our stock until they are three years old before we show them in Open Classes.* When a breeder makes up his mind to breed dogs he must first learn the facts. There are no fast bucks, there are no real fliers, everyone has a little different opinion. But with the same aims in mind, when you have made up your mind (and that sometimes takes a more overleaf

where it is the aim of every breeder to produce the best, experience is invaluable. In the production of canine vaccines, too, where the aim is safety and reliability, there can be no substitute for experience.

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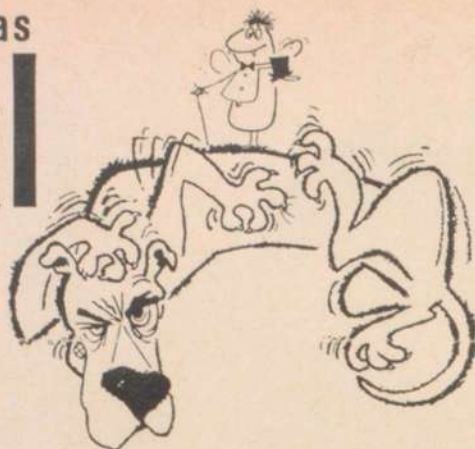

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lot of bumps and heartaches before you finally get the message) then and only then are you out to work for your chosen breed, disregarding the fast starters, the fliers and work for a sound and intelligent animal. You yourself should know if your stock is good. It should not take three judges to confirm your belief. One should know as much if not more than the judge about the dog he breeds.

Mr. Wellwood admits that "he has bred for show stock, disregarding the working ability . . . he owns a dog that is a Canadian and American champion, yet the same dog could not win a blue ribbon under a Collie specialist and that if we want to win we will have to disregard breeding for the working instinct." This is a man that has a Canadian and American licence to judge Collies. What does he look for when he is judging, who is he kidding? No one but himself. No, we are not kidding ourselves as Mr. Wellwood would maintain. The herding instinct is there and we have so many occasions to recall, and I could tell many true facts of the Collie herding sheep, watching the cattle, guarding the home and family in the later years. The herding ability is there and so is the form to which we breed to, as laid down in the Standard, a Standard that was adopted by the Ottawa Valley Collie Club many years ago, adopted by the Collie and Shetland Sheepdog Club of Canada, The Eastern Ontario Collie Club and the Dominion Collie and Shetland Sheepdog Association. This is the same standard as laid down by the Collie Club of America, and with the exception of two changes the standard is the same. The first change: Dogs—22" to 24" is now 24" to 26" in height; bitches from 20" to 22" is now 22" to 24" in height. The second change: monorchids a disqualification. The same Standard, in principle, still stands the Standard that many serious minded breeders created. They knew the Collie's ability to work and yet agreed it could be improved both in appearance and working ability. There are no breeders screaming at your remarks, most of them realize that the empty drum is heard afar. We are not following the leader as you may suggest. If it means listening to the "Mables" at the ringside, of which there are many, to listen is to become one of them. There is no dilemma, only with the "In and Outers", mostly the fast buck and the quick starters. They are the breeders that do no good to any breed. We have a few of them, too many in fact, however, it is good to realize that as a breeder of Collies we still have many conscientious people that do realize the difficulties of breeding good intelligent dogs and maintaining the Standard, keeping the working heridity which is so necessary if we want to achieve the ultimate in our chosen breed, the Collie Dog.

Our constitution is to encourage and promote the exhibition of the purebred Collie and Shetland Sheepdog at all times, wherever possible and in the best manner possible and to advance and protect the interests of the breed, to foster goodwill amongst all members. Mr. Wellwood, in his article, admits that he does not do this. Therefore I would suggest that he should not only refrain from breeding more Collies, but also decline any further judging assignments. We do not need this type of thought and publicity. It is a difficult enough task as it is with the "Mables" and "In and Outers", the quick starters and the fast bucks to maintain our aims. However I would like to say to the conscientious breeder, we must at all times be on guard to promote, also encourage the new breeder, to keep striving for our aims, to

put before the public and judges the best type of Collie at all times. Then there is no fear that the Collie Dog should ever lose his working instinct.

The only obligation of members is to attend a dinner meeting and take part in consuming the dinner and enjoying the program.

Those eligible for membership are not necessarily dog people or kennel club members.

The organizer of this club is the well-known all-breed judge, Lawrence Garvie. At the first meeting, Mr. Garvie said that the idea of such a club was not an original one but that it was fashioned from Harry Miller's Dog Fancier's Luncheon Club which meets periodically at Luchow's famous restaurant in New York City, where Mr. Garvie had been a guest.

The first meeting of the Dog Fancier's Club at Fredericton was attended by 52 persons who enjoyed the dinner, motion pictures and dinner music as presented by a local orchestra.

A feature of each meeting is the presentation of an engraved plaque known as the Dog Fancier's Dinner Club Award. This award is presented to persons who have contributed directly or indirectly to the promotion or welfare of purebred dogs.

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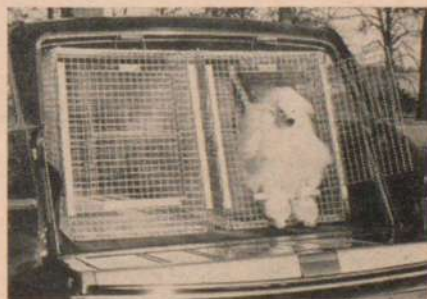

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THE OLD TIMER

"Breeder's in Canada are breeding quality equal to anything I've seen in England", maintains the Old Timer after a personal inspection. "I don't think I saw more than a dozen that could win at a Canadian show."

My business completed I'd been trying to get rid of some of the war-time nostalgia by visiting a few of the spots so popular with Canadians in England during the days of World War Two. One of my first ports of call was "The Two Chairmen" in a funny little street just off Berkeley Square where I and others had knocked back many a pint during war days.

As the barmaid filled the big glass tankard that had become just a memory in the 17 years since I had last seen London, I heard a familiar-sounding chuckle just behind me. I turned and there was the Old Timer—the last person I had expected to see in England.

"Yep" he said. "I get around a bit too. Decided to take the high cost economy tour and have a look at some English dogs during the off season in Canada."

"And have you been seeing any?" I asked.

"Some."

"And?" I prodded.

"So far I'm not too impressed," he said. "Mind you this is a little too early in the tour to form any definite conclusions, but my own impression up to now is that Canadians looking for dogs, except in certain of the breeds, will do much better right at home. The English-bred label, so far as what I've seen up to the present time, no longer is the guarantee of quality it used to be."

"For instance?" I suggested.

"Well yesterday I was at an open show here in London," he said. "Now let me make it clear, an open show is not a championship show. No challenge certificates are awarded. But it is several steps above our Canadian sanction shows. This one had an entry of about 275 dogs and was considered of sufficient importance to draw writers from the English dog magazines. As a matter of fact a number of the owners

told me they were using this show to school their dogs for showing at Crufts. So, while I wasn't seeing the cream of the English crop I was seeing a number that the exhibitors considered good enough for Crufts."

"And?" I asked.

"I don't think I saw more than a dozen that could win in a Canadian show. One gorgeous white toy Poodle, a couple of really top flight Whippets, several Basenjis that I think could meet Canadian and American competition, a good entry of Labradors, some better than average English Cocker and a fair class of Dobermans. Other than these I'm afraid they were a pretty run-of-the-mill lot. And I was completely lost in the judging."

"In what way?" I asked.

"Well," he said "in all those nearly 300 dogs only 11 breeds were judged as breeds. The others were lumped into what the English call 'all-variety' classes. For instance there was one class of open all-variety that had about 40 dogs representing 17 different breeds, and those 17 different breeds came from all groups. Dogs that had competed in their own breed specialty—and incidentally been beaten in that specialty—also competed in the all-variety class and beat dogs they had previously been beaten by. But the English appear to like it that way. It's their country so who am I to criticize."

"Any other comments," I asked.

"Just one," he said "and I make this because it may be indicative. A couple of months ago I read an article by Ben Burwell, the American handler, about measuring of toy Poodles. In that article he stated that in measuring many toy Poodles, the legs were stuck out fore and aft like a rocking horse and then the dog was pressed down at the shoulders to get it under the 11 inch English limit. After what I saw, this

DON COWAN, well-known bird dog man describes the work of R. Albee's veteran Pointer, Puckety Jeff, whose work left the gallery gasping and allowed no room for doubt in the mind of the Judges as to the 1961 Ontario Bird Dog Champion, over some of the most talented pheasant dogs on this continent.

Puckety Jeff, eight-year-old liver-and-white pointer, veteran of the field-trial arena, wound up his competitive career with as sharp a 45 minutes of bird hunting as this writer has witnessed to date to triumph over a field of 22 of North America's greatest pheasant dogs and emerge 1961 Ontario Bird Dog Champion.

This increasingly important Canadian titular event, held under the auspices of the Ontario Bird Dog Association and run over the fine King Township Preserve grounds November 11 and 12, featured a \$500 purse and attracted many of the top pheasant dogs from the United States. The opportunity to witness performing champions such as Jungle, Zeus, Huckleberry and Tyson's Skyhills Flash, all of whom

carry national honors won in white-hot field trial competition was indeed a treat for Ontario addicts who turned out en masse, coming from such distant points as Ottawa, Montreal, Windsor and London.

Judicial assignments were entrusted to two widely known and capable devotees of the class shooting dog, Walter Kogu of Brantford, Ont., and Irving Clarke of Lockport, N.Y. The conscientious manner in which these two seasoned arbiters closely observed and analyzed each and every contestant despite the long hours spent in the saddle served to instill a certain confidence in their judgement and emphasized the importance of this stake. Indeed

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DACHSHUNDS

HOW TO CHOOSE A STANDARD WIRE-HAIRED DACHSHUND PUPPY

General points to watch for in selecting Wire-haired Dachshunds are now the same as for all other Standard Dachshunds, but for the difference in coats. Choosing one though, is not so easy; there are not too many Wire-Haired Dachshunds on the market as yet, because breeding to type has been difficult.

This is explained by the long and complicated history of the Wire-haired Dachshund. Until quite recently there has been crossbreeding of the Smooth Dachshund with various terrier breeds and interbreeding of the three Dachshund coat varieties, resulting in different types of Wire-haired Dachshunds. Therefore before one can choose the desired puppy, one must consider the type preferred as well, in order to find the breeder who may have it.

It is better not to buy too young. Wire-haired Dachshunds mature slowly and sometimes more or less change in appearance during the first year. Whatever type, they should have bushy eyebrows and a beard, a short, harsh coat, which is easily groomed and needs little or no trimming. Some Wire-haired Dachshunds have longer, softer coats, which are less weather resistant and require more care; dogs with such coats are charming, very intelligent, and often preferred as pets, although every type is a wonderful companion, and always a hunter with much stamina and unsurpassed courage. For the field, however, he should have a thick, short, harsh coat.

Choosing a puppy as a show or breeding prospects from a conscientious breeder has sometimes brought good fortune, but no one can guarantee how close the puppy will conform to the Standard by the time it is full grown.

Future breeders are advised to study

authoritative Dachshund books in order to obtain a thorough knowledge of hereditary qualities and faults — ancestry — bloodlines — pedigrees, thus enabling careful selection for good foundation stock. This, combined with experience and some luck, will offer a chance to produce beautiful, uniform litters of Wire-haired Dachshunds without surprises from the past.

Any Wire-haired Dachshund puppy is a little bundle of love, faith, enthusiasm and courage; it has always a personality entirely its own, unique. I, personally, have never regretted a single moment in 25 years of life with Wire-Haired Dachshunds.

HOW TO CHOOSE A MINIATURE WIRE-HAIRED DACHSHUND PUPPY

In choosing a puppy of any breed the first thing to decide is the purpose the dog is to serve. If the pup is being selected as a pet and companion it is often a question of whether you choose the pup or the pup chooses you; this is as it should be. Health and temperament are the primary consideration and the fine points of conformation and exact size are of secondary interest. Go to a reliable breeder, select an alert, active pup at least two months of age and avoid a pup that shows any sign of shyness.

At this age the "woolly" pups with heavy whiskers and furnishings are by far the most appealing and are invariably the ones chosen by those who are looking for a pet. However, a pup with this type of coat usually ends up as

a soft-coated adult, whereas the young pup with sparse whisker and a tight coat tends to develop the true rough, hard-textured coat that is required.

If you are choosing a Miniature Wire-haired Dachshund for show and breeding, temperament is of course important, but size and conformation are equally so. It is almost impossible to guarantee the ultimate size of an eight-week-old puppy but as the Miniatures develop more rapidly than the Standard varieties, they are relatively mature at six months and their mature weight can be predicted with a fair amount of accuracy.

Sex is a matter of personal choice, as is color, which has little importance in the show ring. Fortunately the Miniature faults of pop eyes and apple heads are less common than a few years ago but the nine pound limit set upon size has too often resulted in light, shelly bodies and spindly legs. Whereas it is permissible for a Miniature Wire to be "somewhat higher off the ground" and lighter in body than the standard, I look for a pup with good bone, sound legs, feet not splayed and with tough pads. In heads, avoid a pup with a pinched, snipey muzzle. Look for a dark, oval eye, scissor bite and correct ear shape and placement, and a good top line. At six months the ultimate quality of the coat should be evident.

Whether you want a dog to show or just an intelligent, amusing companion, you cannot go wrong in choosing a Miniature Wire-haired Dachshund.

HOW TO CHOOSE A STANDARD SMOOTH PUPPY

I would choose a puppy very much as a judge goes over a Dachshund in the ring. First, the head, which should

be long and narrow, not too thick at the skull, slightly rounded at the top, but not apple-domed. There should be a little of the ram's nose — i.e. a small rise down the nose. Lips should be tight. The ears should be well-set, near top of head. Even in a puppy, if you bring the ears forward they should be the length of the nose. Look at the eyes. They should be oval and clear, but not protruding, and well-placed. As for color, they should be pretty well in keeping with the coat. For example, if you want to show your puppy you should pass up a dark-coated puppy with light eyes. The throat should be nice and tight — not dew-lapped.

In Dachshunds you can run into a lot of trouble with shoulders. They should be well laid back. I like to see a puppy with shoulders fairly tight and legs quite tight into the body. You can tell this best at six months. They shouldn't be "wingy" as the expression goes.

After examining the shoulders you should give good thought to the legs, keeping in mind the reason for the Dachshund's structure — his hunting work. With the deep, wide chest go short front legs with solid bone. The feet, even in a puppy, will be fairly big, but not splayed. They should be

good and tight and strong, because most of the Dachshund's work is with the front end. The feet (and this is a point of discussion with many people, particularly concerning show possibilities) should turn out slightly. The reason for this is that with straight feet the Dachshund would be digging dirt straight under him, instead of out and away from his body.

The body should be of good length, with a deep chest, but not nearly to the ground, as is sometimes seen. The tail should be set on right out from the back, continuing from the spine. It should touch the floor, even in the case of a youngster, when laid along one of the back legs. When selecting your puppy for show potential, watch that tail. I have seen some in the ring that were carried straight and high, like a Beagle. A puppy can be trained to keep it down, but it's difficult in an older dog.

As in the case of many breeds, you can't expect to see the adult Dachshund in a very young puppy; but by about four or five months the features are pretty well set. However, if you watch out for the major points set out here, you won't go far astray.

Mr. Burden is a well-known handler and judge, who has been particularly successful with Dachshunds.

HOW TO CHOOSE A MINIATURE LONG-HAIRED DACHSHUND PUPPY

Whether a puppy is being chosen as a pet or for breeding or exhibition potential, correct and sound temperament is of prime importance. However, for breeding and exhibition, it is the satisfactory marriage between temperament and conformation that is important and for the purpose of these few words we are considering the latter is our objective.

The choice of any animal not matured, whether puppy or else, for exhibition purposes involves a risk — will the promise of today be fulfilled in the future? For breeding purposes, the risks are greater due to all the hidden hereditary factors. Everything we do prior to the final choice of our puppy should be designed towards the reduction of all possible risks. The more research we do regarding such factors as the 'pillars' of the breed, breeding practices, the strength and weaknesses of certain established lines, knowledge of the Standard, et cetera, are all pieces of information which are going to help us reduce the risk in our final choice.

Now for choosing our Miniature Long-Haired puppy. It is our belief that the final choice of puppy may well be the least important decision. It is what is behind the pup that is important. In many instances, and due to the scattering of established kennels on this continent, the actual visual choice of pup may be impossible. It is our recommendation that either by correspondence or personal visits, one asks and obtains satisfactory answers to the following questions:

- 1) What has been the intercoat and intersize history of the kennel's breeding? The longer the purity of coat and size the better.
- 2) What has their success been in the show ring? Obtain details of the individual winning dogs.
- 3) If possible personally see as many adult dogs held by the kennel as possible. Check for temperament, type and soundness.
- 4) What litters of pups do they have or are expecting?

By now we have narrowed our choice to the kennel(s) and stock and the time has come to make our final choice. Many words of sound advice have been written, probably in this issue, on the

HOW TO CHOOSE A STANDARD LONG-HAIRED DACHSHUND

I started breeding Long-Haired Dachshunds in September of 1957. At the time, I was skeptical of the breed — but thought if they were similar to the Smooths in any way I could learn to like them. Although I love my Smooth-haired Dachshunds, my Long-Haired have wriggled their way into my heart and moved my Smooths over a notch.

The Long-Haired Dachshund has a combination of the elegance of an Irish Setter, the disposition of a Cocker Spaniel and the intelligence of the Dachshund, all in one sweet, compact dog.

In selecting a Long-Haired Dachshund

pup, look for the substance of an active and bold type. Check the angulation; feet, tight and pasterns stiff. The toes should be well arched and the pads thick. Neck should be long and muscular — not fatty or dewlapped. Head long, clean, no stop. The ears should neither be set on top of the head nor too low, but rounded, with no fold. The chest should have great capacity, deep and long. The body well ribbed up and the back straight. Hips and withers should be the same length; the hindquarters well bent in, stifle and hocks well apart. The oval of the eye should be dark, nose black, the coat glossy and silky, and last but not least, teeth with scissor bite.

The Dachshund is not a quarrelsome dog and will avoid a fight if possible, but if crowded will give an excellent account of himself.

In a Dachshund you find many qualities of courage, placidity and gentleness, making him a practical house or apartment pet. But most important, he is a loyal and devoted friend.

In my opinion, the Long-haired Dachshund is the aristocrat of the Dachshunds and if you have ever had one, the best of sales talks would not interest you in another dog.

RAISING MINIATURE DACHSHUNDS

There is much controversy on the rearing of miniature Dachshunds. Some breeders believe that by controlling food intake puppies can be kept small, others feel the feeding of vitamins tends to increase the size of puppies. We at Di-Mar believe that true bred miniatures with sufficient background of correct breeding, will stay small, given the best of diet.

We do not coddle our miniatures. Adults are fed a light meal in the morning, and have their main feeding late afternoon. We feed beef and dog kibble with added vitamins, exactly the same mixture as is fed to our adult Boxers.

In rearing a litter of Miniature puppies the same rules apply as in other breeds. The mother to be should be well nourished but not obese, be receiving vitamin supplement and be free of parasites.

Great care should be taken to obtain the services of a stud whose background is Miniature for many generations.

The day after the puppies arrive we start feeding vitamins, one drop of any of the well-known brands fed to human infants, placed upon the tongue. We feed the mother four times daily, beef milk and eggs.

As soon as the pups can lap we start them on infant strained beef, followed a week later by scraped raw beef, until they are old enough to eat finely chopped beef. By four and a half weeks of age the pups are fed four times daily, finely chopped beef for two meals and warm milk for the other feedings. Vitamins are added once daily. We do

not feed biscuit, kibble, or any cereal until about three months of age, as in very tiny puppies care must be taken that they do not clog the intestines. We leave the dam with the pups for about six weeks. As soon as the mother is removed we give serum every two weeks until old enough for vaccine.

Here we have almost no trouble with worms; however if worms are suspected

a sample of the stool should be checked by a veterinarian, and the puppy carefully weighed before worming.

We weigh puppies every week for our records. This is an advantage for dogs to be shown, as being placed upon a scale at shows comes as no surprise to them. Miniature puppies accept training easily, learn fast, and are always anxious to please.

MY SEARCH FOR DACHSHUND BLOODLINES

I started with my first Dachshund, Fritz, just as a pet, as I have always loved these little dogs. Then, of course, Fritz had to have a companion so I got a female, the first one I saw that was for sale. I knew little of bloodlines, nor had I any thoughts of future breeding.

What Jennie lacked in looks, she made up in gallantry. She had the true hunting spirit which she maintained until her death at 16 years, and which she passed on to her progeny.

Then the first litter. True, Jennie was bred to a champion, but only because he was readily available. Some of these pups I put in a show, as to me, they were beautiful. To me they are still beautiful but I then saw where they differed from the show Dachshunds they were meeting in competition. At one of these shows I met Mr. J. A. Irving of Vancouver, of Dachshund fame. On his advice, I bought books on Dachshunds and subscribed to Dachshund magazines. He talked bloodlines and pedigrees and then most generously gave me a lovely little bitch of his breeding. Now, I had to do her justice, so I wrote to the Dachshund Club of England and asked their advice on getting a male. They recommended three kennels. Writing to these, I finally made my selection, then had three English judges look the dog

over before shipping. So I acquired Ch. Zeug v.d. Howitt, a grandson of the famous Ch. Zeus von Shwaerenberg, who is considered one of the great pillars of the breed. Zeug was a very elegant dog, of lovely conformation but unfortunately was quite shy. So, I bred him to some of our game old Jennie's offspring with great success.

Then I had to have someone worthy of them. So it is a continuous search for bloodlines which will complement and improve what I already have.

I now felt I had amongst them the best of German and English breedings and I should look to the States. I have a granddaughter of Ch. Favorite v. Marienlust, giving me that bloodline which I have always admired. I bought Can. and Am. Ch. Double Stretch of the Walls, a fine dog of lovely disposition and great length of body. I also have a young son of Ch. Celloyd Daniel, Ch. Hemloch Hollow Marquis. These dogs all combine the best of American breeding.

In the last few months I was fortunate enough to get several dogs and bitches from Jake Irving whose bloodlines are tops in any country. For the future I plan to breed few litters, but each one will be carefully selected as to bloodlines, conformation and disposition.

While I naturally hope they will all be of top show quality, I hope to retain the quality and elegance of the breed while emphasizing the gay and affectionate nature of the Dachshund.

At the moment I have five varieties of Dachshunds. Both Standard and Miniature Smooth, Miniature Long-haired and Standard and Miniature Wires. I have been most fortunate in buying dogs sight unseen. They have nearly always been better than I anticipated. All three varieties combine what I feel is top in German, American, English and Canadian lines.

My advice to newcomers is to get the best bitch they can afford, and then send her to a really top male for breeding. Never breed down—always look for something better than you already have. And never lose sight of the main principle—a long, low, fearless little fellow, with the look of a true aristocrat in every line.

REARING YOUNG DACHSHUNDS BY HAND

Although each of the diverse activities involved in dog breeding has its own significance, to us one of the most important is that concerning the raising of the puppies and young stock. All the planning and forethought that decides the strain, the blending of bloodlines and types, the careful supervision and control of the breeding act, the whelping under the most meticulous and aseptic conditions, are of no avail if either the puppies fail to survive their first weeks or if their full potential is not reached through faulty nutrition or some other factor essential to their growth. It would be impossible to cover every aspect of raising young dogs in the space of this article, so I have selected one that has frequently played an important part in our kennel, that is, the hand-rearing of young puppies.

In the event of the death of the dam, the breeder is left little choice as to whether he will rear by hand or not, especially as foster mothers are rarely available just when they are needed. Or maybe the breeder feels as we do, that he prefers to raise by hand rather than risk infection or worm in-

festation from the foster mother. But there are other occasions when it becomes imperative, for example, when the dam has had a difficult delivery, or an infection, or when she has an extra large litter.

A Dachshund female should not be expected to raise more than four puppies unassisted. Dividing between eight what would more normally go into four, can only result in under-nourished pups. We feel that the start is the most important phase of the puppy's development and any deficiency at that point cannot be made up later. Such puppies have less stamina and less resistance to infection and no matter how good the stock or bloodline, they can never achieve their fullest potential. Our aim with every litter is complete uniformity and in our experience, supplementary nursing plays a big part in achieving this.

We have used various methods of supplementary feeding with the large litter (a) hand-rearing the weakest, (b) hand-rearing the strongest (leaving the weaker on the dam), (c) dividing the litter, half on the dam and half hand-fed (switching on alternate days). Of these, the first has proved the most successful. The extra care given the weakling, which would have only grown progressively weaker in its fight for a place against its stronger litter mates, has quickly brought it up to standard.

The whole secret of successful hand-rearing is warmth, hygiene and regular nourishment. It is a simple matter in these days of electric heating pads to keep a constant temperature for the young whelps. Puppies on the dam can be fine with a 70° temperature, but away from her they need 75°. We use a box that fits the pad exactly with high sides and cover the pad with pieces of clean blanket sheeting which are soft and warm and are easily laundered. Each pup must be made to pass urine after each feeding and feces at least after every second feeding, by wiping it with a piece of warm damp absorbent cotton. Careful check must be kept of the regularity of the bowel movements and their consistency so that the formula can be regulated accordingly.

The formula we use is: three ounces evaporated milk, three ounces lime water, ½ ounce corn syrup. We also give each pup, individually, each day two drops of Vitamin A and D concentrate and three drops of a Vitamin C concentrate (as used for human babies). Our timetable for feeds is:

First week: every two hours throughout the 24 hours.

Second week: every three hours.

Third week: six feeds in 24 hours at 6 a.m., 10 a.m., 2 p.m., 6 p.m., 10 p.m. and 2 a.m.

Fourth week: five feeds, omitting the 2 a.m. feed. We start them lapping and add Pablum at 10 a.m. and 10 p.m.

Fifth week: still five feeds, but 2 p.m. prefeed with a little raw scraped beef.

Sixth week: we replace the formula with an egg and milk mixture — two egg yolks to the pint of cow's milk.

Also add a little meal in milk or broth to the meat at 2 p.m.

Eighth week: we drop to four feeds a day; Pablum or meal and the egg and milk mixture for two, and the other two meat, meal and broth plus their vitamins.

NOTES ON THE MINIATURE LONG-HAIRED

The Miniature Dachshund is still in the making, as it were. While some are taking their places in their Group, they are still among the minority. We are grateful to the judges who have found merit in our "little ones". In past years judges were prone to feel the little one could not be as good as the well-known Standard. They have now altered their opinion as show reports in Canada as well as the U.S.A. have proven. Judges with whom I have spoken are amazed at the great improvement that has taken place over such a short period of time.

It is difficult to say what to look for in a Miniature. Weight seems to be the greatest consideration at the moment. Conformation and sociability are bypassed completely. I have never known a ribbon to be withheld for want of merit in a Miniature. Of grave importance is the disposition of a Miniature. An anti-social Miniature is a total loss in the show ring as well as at home. An extremely great number of "Minnies" are anti-social. Do pick a bold puppy. Coat in the Long-Haired is of the greatest importance as it is the only thing that differentiates it from its Smooth counterpart. Look for an Irish Setter coat with, of course, more profuse leg and chest feathering and above all, a smooth body coat. Far too many Longs, both Standard and Miniature, have too wavy a body coat as well as too dense. These coats should be penalized in my opinion. Many Longs are having their coats plucked to acquire the smooth body appearance for the show ring. In so doing we are acquiring nothing of lasting quality. Coat has to be bred in or out. Look for a flat body coat in the youngster.

Bad fronts are gradually being replaced by good strong shoulder formation but it still remains our number one fault. High ear-set plagues us as does the wide skull but is not of such grave importance as is the bad teeth formation in both sexes and monorchidism and cryptorchidism in the males. High-stationed Miniatures are prevalent also but are gradually being replaced by a heavier-boned, lower-on-leg representative. These problems must and will be faced with the same determination that bred out the roach backs and bad fronts. Great strides have been made in the Miniature over the past few years and I am confident that even greater strides will prove evident in the 1962 show ring. I know of no greater challenge in dogdom than the breeding of Miniatures for improvement. ■

"ANDREA" WINS NATIONAL

Giving a near-perfect performance, F.T. Ch. Trent Valley Andrea Of Athlorne, owned and handled by Thomas Atherton, St. Catharines, Ont., won the Second National Spaniel Championship Trials at Allanburgh, on October 14-15.

The National was held by the Spaniel Field Trial Association of Ontario; the host club being the Niagara Springer Spaniel Club, St. Catharines. This was a two-day trial run on the Hydro property at Allanburgh. The course was one mile long with varied types of cover and all dogs were run up-wind or into a quartering wind. Three land series on live pheasants were run on Saturday and also a water test of two retrievers. On Sunday, two more land series were held to decide the winner. The banquet held on Saturday evening was a happy affair where old and new friends met, dined, danced and swapped experiences with spaniels.

The National Trials were well organized and everything worked out smoothly. Field Marshall was Henry P. Nicholson; Stewards, Stuart Walton and Les Bunker; Game Keeper, Robt. Shakespeare; plus four excellent gunners and several qualified bird planters. Cloudy skies and a cold wind were to the dogs' liking but the handlers needed extra clothing. Contrasting with some ten years ago when most of the spaniels would break to flush or shot, most of the dogs were steady and only on exceptional cases did one break. This is better understood when one knows that all dogs competing had to qualify by placing in club trials held in Ontario in 1960-1961; and then were invited by The Canadian Kennel Club to compete for the National Spaniel Championship.

The Second National drew an entry of 16 Springers and one Cocker Spaniel; coming from Pittsburgh, Pa., Detroit, Mich.; Toledo, Cleveland, Ravenna, Ohio; Sudbury, Brampton, Peterborough, St. Catharines, Ont. So well trained were these Spaniels, the performances given by them made judging very difficult for Keith Van Dusen, Detroit, Mich. and Ivan Hare, St. Catharines.

The work of F.T. Ch. Trent Valley Andrea of Athlorne, was outstanding both on land and in the

water. "Andrea" is a small Springer with tremendous drive. She quartered the field widely and very fast, never leaving any ground that was not covered. The control shown over this dog while running a very fast pace was outstanding. She was stopped on running birds when necessary and then put back on them again. She used her nose well, and was steady to flush and shot. Her marking and retrieving was everything to be desired.

"Andrea" was sired by F.T. Ch. Dungarry out of F.T. Ch. Breckonhill Brightest. She is two and one-half years of age, placed 3rd in Sudbury 1960; 2nd in Port Colborne 1960; 2nd in St. Catharines 1960; 1st and 2nd in two trials held at London 1961; then on to "Canadian National Spaniel Champion 1961"; a great credit to the patience and efforts of her owner during long training hours.

Second and third places went to American Spaniels. Apache Clipper's Brown Ghost, Springer, owned by Jullian Collins, Ravenna, Ohio, gave a very even performance in all series and in the water to win second place. She is sired by F. T. Ch. Apache Magic Clipper, last year's Canadian National Spaniel Champion. Third place award went to a brown Cocker, Am. and Can. F. T. Ch. Berol's Petey's Boy, owned by J. W. Menge of Detroit, and handled by C. L. Windgate. "Petey's Boy" was declared the American National Cocker Spaniel Champion of 1960.

To remain in the running, a dog had to be almost perfect as the slightest error would displace him. The scoring on the judges' books was so close a few points would change the picture. Seventeen dogs competed in the first series, two were dropped in the second; three in the third; two more in the water test; until only six dogs remained for the final series. These remaining dogs gave the gallery some performances to be remembered. Andrea was at her best, and all the others improving on their former tests. Running in the final series beside the first three placed dogs were: Rogue O'Rock Acre, owned by Wm. Watts, Sudbury, who was a strong contender. This is a big, fast travelling, wide-ranging Springer who

- (1) in accordance with instructions given by the Board, he had sought to complete the picture gallery of Honorary Presidents and past Presidents of the Club, and there remained but two pictures to bring the gallery up-to-date;
- (2) the President had directed that the Board's wishes be sought with regard to substitution of portrait of one of the past Presidents.

ACTION: Following discussion it was agreed that a substitution would not be made, the present portrait being in keeping with the gallery.

9 A 7. AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

9 A 87. ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

REPORT: The Secretary reported that:

- (1) pursuant to resolution #399-61, Mr. Monaghan, Chairman of the Amendments Committee, had drafted, and submitted to members of the national Board for consideration and comment, proposed amendments to the By-laws setting forth the steps which would be

taken:

- (a) if a nominated member dies before election ballots are printed;
- (b) if a candidate dies after the ballots are printed but before balloting closes;

- (2) letters received from Mr. Dawson, Mr. Anderson, and Mr. Little indicated their approval of the amendments as drafted by Mr. Monaghan.

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed:

- (1) Mr. MacKendrick suggested that a proposed amendment to the By-laws be drafted and discussed at the next Annual General Meeting, the amendment to require that each member of the Board must provide proof, at the first meeting of the Board, that his or her membership fee for the current year had been paid;
- (2) it was suggested that a proposed amendment to the By-laws be drafted and discussed at the next Annual General Meeting, the amendment to make it clear that in connection with a partnership membership, only the authorized representative of the partnership is eligible to be a candidate for election to the Board;
- (3) Mr. Monaghan suggested that a proposed amendment to the By-laws be drafted and discussed at the next Annual General Meeting, the amendment to specifically provide for the date on which the first meeting of the Board would be held in January of each year.

MOTION #450-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:

"THAT, the proposed amendments submitted by the Chairman and the proposed amendments with regard to the three additional points be published in the January issue with notice that same will be placed before the next Annual General Meeting for discussion, the notice to seek comments of members."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

SUBJECT: A proposal that the By-laws be amended to require that a proposed amendment, emanating from the membership, be sponsored by members in several provinces in order to eliminate a proposed amendment arising from regional differences of opinion, and to ensure that the proposed amendment has some measure of support other than on a purely local basis.

MOTION #451-61

Moved by Mrs. Southcott, seconded by Mrs. Mack:

"THAT, we recommend to the incoming Board that appropriate action be taken to amend the By-laws to require that a proposed amendment emanating from the membership must be sponsored by members residing in at least four different provinces."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

9 A 96. ONTARIO SALES TAX

SUBJECT: A letter which the Club's solicitor received, in response to his further representations with regard to the application of the Ontario Sales Tax Act to the sale of dogs, advising that the Regulations are being adjusted from time to time and one of the adjustments would be a definition of the term or expression "livestock" in the Act in order that there would be no doubt about the legality of the imposition of the tax on the purchaser of a dog, whether the dog be registered or not.

MOTION #452-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, it be recommended to the incoming Board that a brief be prepared and submitted with regard to exemption of pure-bred live stock including dogs under the Ontario Sales Tax Act."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

9 A 97. C. K. C. DIAMOND (75th) ANNIVERSARY

SUBJECT: The Secretary pointed out that the 75th Anniversary of the founding of the Club would occur in 1963.

MOTION #453-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:

"THAT, we recommend to the incoming Board that consideration be given to celebrating, in a suitable manner, the Club's anniversary in 1963."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

9 A 98. CONVENTION RATES

SUBJECT: The Secretary:

- (1) reported that changes had been made in the procedures to be followed where convention rates apply to those attending meetings, where such rates are arranged;
- (2) sought instructions with regard to continuing arrangements for convention rates in connection with the Club's annual meetings.

DISCUSSION: During the discussion which followed it was pointed out that rarely does a member of the Club take advantage of the convention rates, and this is no doubt attributable to the fact that those who might be inclined to take advantage of such rates find it difficult to do so when they attend the Westminster Kennel Club Show.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to enquire of the Canadian Passenger Association whether a member, wishing to attend the Westminster Kennel Club Show after the annual meetings, may take advantage of the convention rates even though his itinerary would not permit his return home through Montreal, it being understood that if this could not be conveniently arranged, the Secretary would not arrange for convention rates for the Club's meetings in 1962.

9 A 16. STANDING RESOLUTIONS

SUBJECT: Mr. Monaghan suggested that it be recommended to the incoming Board that when it appoints a committee of any kind, the terms of reference of each committee be set forth in detail and the Standing Resolutions applicable to committees be amended accordingly.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to place a recommendation before the Board at its coming annual meeting.

10 MM 2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP

SUBJECT: Confirmation of the approval which followed the mailing, to members of the Board, of lists No. 45 to No. 51 inclusive.

"THAT, applicants for membership reported on lists #45 to #51 be admitted to membership."

Motion carried.

10 MM 30. MISCELLANEOUS MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

REPORT: The President, Chairman of the Membership Committee, reported that the Membership Committee recommended approval of the following:

- (1) the request of Mr. Harry Fraser that the present ordinary membership in the name of Mr. & Mrs. Harry Fraser be altered to Mr. Harry Fraser and Miss Marjorie Fraser without change of membership status;
- (2) the application of Mrs. Emerson Robertson, R.R. #3, Streetsville, Ontario, that she be permitted to continue the ordinary membership of the late Mr. Emerson Robertson (who died in 1960) by paying the 1961 renewal fee and otherwise carry on the membership;
- (3) the request of Mr. & Mrs. R. Dykes, Edmonton, Alta. that their present associate membership be altered to the name of their son, Robert Dykes, Jr.;

SUBJECT: A proposal that the understanding reached at the last semi-annual meeting of the Board, with regard to recommendations of the Membership Committee, be set up as a Standing Resolution and incorporated in the Book of Standing Resolutions.

MOTION #456-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mrs. Mack:
"THAT, pursuant to the understanding reached at the last semi-annual meeting of the Board, the following policies shall apply with regard to recommendations of the Membership Committee:
(a) a recommendation of the Committee may be submitted to the national Board along with, or independent of, a list of applicants for membership;
(b) if, within the ten days following the mailing of the recommendation to the national Board the Secretary does not receive an objection from any member of the Board, to the action recommended by the Committee, the Secretary shall proceed to implement the recommendation of the Committee;
(c) if, within the ten days following mailing of the Committee's recommendation to the national Board, the Secretary receives from a member of the Board an objection to the Committee's recommendation, he shall withhold action on the Committee's recommendation and shall place the recommendation before the next meeting of the Board for decision."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
Motion carried.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to place before the next annual meeting of the Board, a recommendation that resolution #456-61 be incorporated in the Book of Standing Resolutions.

REPORT: A report that the Membership Committee had noted that two members of the Club were advertising "Toy Fox Terriers" for sale, and an explanation had been sought from these members for their activity in selling dogs which are not eligible for registration in the Club's records, the "Toy Fox Terrier" not being a breed recognized by the Club.

A letter from one of the members was read requesting cancellation of her membership until such time as she had disposed of her present stock of "Toy Fox Terriers".

Mrs. Mack reported that, in response to the Secretary's letter, she had been visited by the other member, who was quite concerned about his position in the matter, and who had disposed of his "Toy Fox Terriers" in order to avoid prejudicing his status as a member of the Club.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to accept the resignation of the member who had offered it.

DOG SHOWS

11 D 1. JUDGES

SUBJECT: The Secretary sought rulings on the following questions:

- (1) May a person who, having passed oral and written examinations in seeking to establish his eligibility to judge all breeds in a group, has been approved to judge said breeds at ONE show, be approved to judge the same group at the group level at the ONE show for which he is approved as judge?

- (2) May a person who is an approved judge of two entire groups and who, having passed oral and written examinations in seeking to establish his eligibility to judge a third group, and has been approved to judge breeds in the third group at ONE show, be approved to judge Best in Show or other General Specials?

DISCUSSION: Following discussion it was agreed that the Board must rule that:

- (1) on the first question the answer is an affirmative one since in judging at the group level the applicant is apprenticing for the entire group, and his work in judging at group level would assist in determining whether his name should be added to the list of approved judges for that group;
- (2) on the second question the answer is a negative one since the applicant has not yet established his right to be added to the list as an approved judge of the third group, and is not therefore regarded as an approved judge of three groups (the minimum number of groups to be entitled to judge Best in Show or other General Specials).

MOTION #457-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mrs. Mack:
"THAT, these be the rulings of the Board."
FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
ABSENT (temporarily): Mr. MacKendrick.
Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary, pursuant to a previous instruction, placed before the Board a report on those judges from whom confidential critiques had not been received following engagements at championship shows held under the Club's rules.

DISCUSSION: Following discussion it was agreed that on a previous occasion the national Board had agreed that the submission of such critique books is a prerequisite to further approval to judge.

MOTION #458-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. Blyth:
"THAT, any judge, of a championship show held under the Club's rules, from whom completed critique books have not been received by The Canadian Kennel Club within ten days after the show at which he officiated as judge, shall be removed from the list of persons eligible for approval to judge at championship shows held under the Club's rules."
FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
Motion carried.

INTERNAL AND ADMINISTRATION

9 A 13. OFFICE PREMISES

-----Mr. Robert G. Langford and Mr. C. Clouter entered the meeting.
SUBJECT: Messrs. Langford and Clouter provided the Board with details of property available at Richmond Hill, and answered questions put to them with regard to the property in question.

They left the meeting after being assured that the information they had provided would be turned over to the Property Committee for its consideration.

DOG SHOWS

11 D 5. WEIGHING AND MEASURING

REPORT: A report that:

- (1) pursuant to resolution #415-61, the Chairman of the Amendments Committee had drafted proposed amendments to the Dog Show Rules with regard to the weighing and measuring of dogs at championship shows;
 - (2) a copy of such draft had been forwarded to members of the national Board for their comments;
 - (3) a copy of such draft had been included, as proposed amendment #4, in the December issue of "Dogs in Canada" (Page 44D).
- A letter from Mr. Anderson was read in which he stated that he is not in favour of compulsory measuring and weighing but if the majority of members demand it, he thought the proposed amendments as drafted would be satisfactory.

DISCUSSION: During the discussion which followed:

- (1) Mr. MacKendrick suggested that the proposed amendment to Section 4 of Chapter 12 should include provision for the publication in a premium list of the names of the official measurers, and a clear statement as to who shall handle a dog while it is measured;
- (2) Mr. MacKendrick suggested that the proposed amendment to Section 4 of Chapter 19, paragraph (2), should be reworded to require the show-giving club to provide adequate equipment for both weighing and measuring;
- (3) Mrs. Southcott suggested that the proposed amendment to Section 5 of Chapter 19, paragraph (1), should be reworded to provide that a dog under 18 months of age shall not be disqualified on the grounds it does not measure up to a minimum height, and the same paragraph should be reworded to indicate that it applies only to those breeds where height limitations "allegedly constitute a disqualification."

MOTION #459-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Blyth:
"THAT, we accept the recommendation of the Chairman of the Amendments Committee, with additions, and same be presented to the Incoming Board for their consideration following discussion at the next Annual General Meeting."
FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
Motion carried.

11 D 10. JUDGES' CONFIDENTIAL CRITIQUES

SUBJECT: The Secretary referred to the requirements of resolution #266-61, and sought instructions as to the procedure to be followed in the preparation of the analyses required by the Board.

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed it was agreed that:

- (1) if a thorough analysis is to be made and a comprehensive report is to be placed before the next annual meeting of the Board, it would be necessary for the Committee of which Mr. V. W. Williams is Chairman, or a sub-Committee, to thoroughly examine the crit-

- (2) ique books submitted by officiating judges; the Secretary would communicate immediately, by long-distance telephone with Mr. Williams, for the purpose of ascertaining whether he would be agreeable to the appointment of a sub-committee to make the analyses, and if so, whether he would care to suggest the personnel of such sub-committee.
- Mr. Monaghan pointed out that there had been several references to publication of critiques, but it had been understood by the national Board, when it instituted the present system, that critiques submitted by judges would be regarded as confidential to the Board, and having obtained the critiques after having given assurance of confidentiality, it would be a breach of confidence on the part of the Board to now publish them.

11 D 1. JUDGES

REPORT: The Secretary:

- (1) reported that, in accordance with an instruction of the Board (resolution #264-61), he had written The American Kennel Club following up an earlier conversation with regard to mutual recognition of judges;
- (2) read a reply advising that it is expected that this question would be examined with other policies now being studied.

11 D 25. DATES

REPORT: The Secretary reported that:

- (1) the Central Canada Exhibition had submitted its application for a new series of priority rights for show dates for 1963 to 1967 inclusive, the application indicating that it wished to reserve priority rights on August 31, 1963;
- (2) the Canadian National Exhibition had submitted its application for priority rights for a series of show dates for 1963 to 1967 inclusive, and their application included the dates of August 30th and 31st, 1963.

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed it was agreed that an effort should be made to resolve this conflict in 1963 dates.

MOTION #460-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, this question be referred to the Club's representatives to the Central Canada Exhibition Association and the Canadian National Exhibition Association in the hope that they may be able to resolve this question before the end of December."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

REPORT: The Secretary reported that:

- (1) the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada had submitted an application for permission to hold two championship shows and two obedience trials on April 28th and 29th, 1962, the applications having been approved;
- (2) through their show superintendent, the Ladies' Kennel Club had enquired whether it would be possible to regard these championship shows as unbenched shows, on the understanding that exhibitors desiring benching accommodation for their dogs would be provided with such accommodation if indicated on their respective entry forms.

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed the Board considered:

- (1) the reasons, advanced by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada, why they desired this arrangement;
- (2) the recommendation of the Director for Quebec, who felt that having regard for the high calibre of championship shows held by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada and the very high public attendance at that Club's shows, the Board should rule that their shows must either be benched in their entirety or unbenched in their entirety.

MOTION #461-61

Moved by Mrs. Mack, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, we accept the recommendation of the Director for Quebec."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

11 D 34. CHAMPIONS AND CHAMPIONSHIP RATINGS

SUBJECT: A letter from the Bermuda Kennel Club which:

- (1) pointed out that, effective with their championship shows held in October, 1961, a new schedule of championship point ratings had come into effect and there had been included a requirement that, in order to obtain a Bermuda Kennel Club championship, a three-point win is required;
- (2) enquired whether the show records should be revised to the extent that a previous two-point win, which constituted a major win under the old system, should be increased to a three-point win on the records;
- (3) enquired whether a three-point win would be retroactive to those dogs which had earned championship points under the earlier system but had not yet obtained championship status.

MOTION #462-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, this Board rules as follows with regard to the questions raised by the Bermuda Kennel Club:

- (a) all championship points earned are cumulative regardless of the system of championship point ratings effective at past shows;
- (b) there shall be no upward revision of points earned at past shows;
- (c) a three-point (major) win will be required for any dog which did not complete its Bermuda Kennel Club championship prior to the enactment of the requirement that there be a three-point (major) win;
- (d) a three-point win under the previous systems will be regarded as equivalent to a three-point win under the new system."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

11 D 46. RIBBONS

REPORT: The Secretary reported that an enquiry had been received as to whether ribbons for a championship show must include the date of the show.

ACTION: The Board ruled that this information is still required on championship show ribbons, the Board at no time having ruled otherwise.

11 D 72. OFFICIAL CLASSES

SUBJECT: A letter from Mr. George Gerigs, who:

- (1) stated that there has been "a lot of disagreement among exhibitors as to what was or was not permissible in the Bred by Exhibitor class";
- (2) suggested that the definition of the Bred by Exhibitor class be altered to read as follows: "The handler in the Bred by Exhibitor class must be the breeder-owner, or a member of the immediate family".

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed it was agreed that there is a misunderstanding among some exhibitors as to dogs eligible for entry in the Bred by Exhibitor class, and steps should be taken to clarify the present rule with regard to that class.

MOTION #463-61

Moved by Mrs. Southcott, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, it be recommended to the incoming Board that it take steps to amend the Dog Show Rules to provide that the Bred by Exhibitor Class shall be for any dog bred by and whelped the property of its owner."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

OBEEDIENCE TRIALS

12 OB 8. REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF OBEEDIENCE COUNCIL

REPORT: The following report (dated December 7, 1961) received from the Chairman of the Obedience Council:

"Letters of congratulations have been written to the Vancouver Island Gun Dog & Tracking Club on a very well run Tracking Trial held on September 10th, and to the Hub City K.C. and the Western Canada Boxer Club following reports of excellent obedience trials held on October 22nd and November 12th respectively.

"At a meeting of the Chairman's Standing Committee held on October 27th, Mr. Jake Giacomelli was appointed Chairman of a special committee to work on a Service Dog Class. It is hoped that a progress report will be made at the time of the annual meeting in February, 1962 on this subject. A letter of thanks was written to Dr. C. J. G. Mackenzie of Duncan, B. C., who sent in a number of excellent suggestions for this class. These suggestions, along with other data pertaining to the subject were handed over to Mr. Giacomelli for consideration.

"It was recommended that a letter of reprimand be sent to an obedience exhibitor who attended the London Canine Association Show and Trial on October 7th and about whom a complaint was received.

"It was recommended that when Chapters 2 and 3 of the Regulations and Standards for Obedience Trials are reviewed and revisions proposed, that Basset Hounds be included in the breeds required to jump only once their height at the withers.

"Because of a letter which was received from a lady in the United States enquiring as to eligibility to enter various obedience classes, it was felt that clarification of various subsections in Section 6, Chapter 1 of the Regulations and Standards for Obedience Trials be put into the book of Standing Resolutions. This recommendation is laid out in a separate report.

"Questions on obedience matters which had been received from various people were discussed and suitable replies written.

"The Secretary requested that the Chairman list the duties of an Obedience Representative, and this has been done in a separate report.

"The files on a number of applicants to judge obedience were considered, examinations were reviewed, apprentice books and tracking charts were checked, and reports from officiating judges under whom the applicants apprenticed were considered. The following are the recommendations:

"That Mrs. Margaret Best be approved to apprentice for the Novice, Open and Utility Classes. Further, that she be approved as a "Junior Judge" at one Tracking Test.

That Mr. Clarence Zimmerman be approved to judge the Novice, Open and Utility Classes.

That Mr. Lawrence D. Shortreed be approved to judge the Novice and Open Classes in obedience.

That Mr. William Dawson be approved to judge the Utility Class.

That Mr. Clarke W. Diamond be approved to judge the Novice, Open and Utility Classes.

That Mr. J. Haggerty be approved to judge the Novice Classes only at obedience trials.

That Mr. George Donaldson be approved as a "Junior Judge" at one Tracking Test.

That Mr. Walter Konradt be approved as a fully qualified judge of Tracking Trials.

That Mrs. Marguerite Charter be approved as a "Junior Judge" at one Tracking Test.

"A report on obedience matters still under consideration will be made to the Board at the Annual Meeting in February, 1962."

MOTION #464-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:

"THAT, we adopt the Chairman's report."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.

Motion carried.

REPORT: A recommendation of the Chairman of the Obedience Council that the following interpretations be included in the Book of Standing Resolutions:

Chapter 1, Section 6 -- Classes and Tests.
 Subsection 1 (Novice Class A) - First sentence reading "The Obedience Novice Class A shall be for pure-bred dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of C. D. (Companion Dog)" to mean: "The Obedience Novice Class A shall be for pure-bred dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of C. D. (Companion Dog) IN ANY COUNTRY."

Subsection 2 (Novice Class B) - Last sentence, reading in part, "in another country may compete in Novice Class B" to mean: "in another country MUST compete in Novice Class B."

Subsection 4 (Open Class A) - First sentence reading "The Obedience Open Class A shall be for pure-bred dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of C. D. X. (Companion Dog Excellent)" to mean: "The Obedience Open Class A shall be for pure-bred dogs of any breed and of either sex which have not won the title of C. D. X. (Companion Dog Excellent) IN ANY COUNTRY."

Subsection 5 (Open Class B) - Last sentence, reading in part, "in another country may compete in Open Class B" to mean: "IN CANADA OR ANOTHER COUNTRY MUST compete in Open Class B."

- (2) reported that an application had been received from the United Counties Beagle Club to hold a licensed trial at Baltimore, Ont. on the same dates;
- (3) pointed out that Ontario and Quebec had heretofore been considered a single zone for the purpose of allocating field trial dates;
- (4) suggested that consideration be given to amending the present policy of regarding Ontario and Quebec as a single zone.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to seek the views and recommendations of the Beagle Field Trial Representatives in Ontario and Quebec.

REPORT: The Secretary:

- (1) reported that from the Thames Valley Beagle Club applications had been received to hold licensed trials on June 2nd and 3rd; August 25th and 26th; and October 27th and 28th, 1962;
- (2) reported that from the Wentworth Beagle Club applications had been received to hold licensed trials on June 9th and 10th; August 18th and 19th; and October 20th and 21st, 1962;
- (3) sought an instruction with regard to the processing of multiple applications until other Beagle clubs had an opportunity of submitting applications for 1962 trial dates.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to seek the views and recommendations of the Beagle Field Trial Representatives in Ontario and Quebec.

SUBJECT: A letter from The National Retriever Club of Canada:

- (1) pointing out that a by-law of the National Retriever Club of Canada as approved by the Secretary of State for Canada, reads as follows:
 "Section 3 - Number of contestants, eligibility and entry fees:
 (a) Contestants for the National Open Championship Stake shall be limited to those dogs which have won the qualifying places set by the Canadian Kennel Club in open, special, limited all age stakes or amateur all age stakes in trials licensed by the Canadian Kennel Club in the then

current calendar year, and the winner of the previous year's National Open Championship Stake. Dogs qualifying in an amateur all age stake must be handled by an amateur in the National Open Championship Stake."

- (2) requesting that the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club approve the qualification rules as set out in the above-quoted By-law of The National Retriever Club of Canada, pursuant to Section 2 of the "Special Regulations Applying to the National Championship Retriever Stake" (see Appendix in Field Trial Rules and Regulations).

The Secretary read letters from Mr. Anderson and Mr. Dawson suggesting that this matter be referred to the Field Trial Council for consideration and report to the Board.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to:

- (1) seek the views of all Field Trial Representatives for Retrievers;
(2) place the matter on the agenda of the next annual meeting of the Board.

13 FT 40. ENTRIES

SUBJECT: The Secretary:

- (1) reported that two clubs conducting licensed Retriever Trials had questioned whether recording fees and listing fees are payable on Retrievers which, while entered at a licensed trial, are "scratched";
(2) reported that in the case of licensed Retriever trials it had been the practice to assess a recording fee (and listing fee if applicable) on every Retriever and Irish Water Spaniel entered in a licensed Retriever trial whether such dog had competed or not, it being assumed that the club conducting such trial had collected these fees and entry fees for every dog entered in its event for which entries must close not less than three days before the commencement of the trial (Chapter 10, Section 2, third paragraph of the Field Trial Rules and Regulations);
(3) sought a ruling on the question.
- DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed it was agreed that:
- (1) a club conducting a licensed field trial is entitled to collect an entry fee for every dog entered in its trial, and any decision to refund an entry fee of a dog which does not compete is the responsibility of the trial-giving club;
- (2) the Field Trial Rules and Regulations require that a club conducting a licensed field trial under C.K.C. rules must collect and remit to The Canadian Kennel Club a recording fee for each and every dog entered in its trial, and collect and remit to The Canadian Kennel Club a listing fee for any dog not registered individually in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club.

7 R 10. BREED STANDARDS

SUBJECT: Notices published on page 48C of the November (1961) issue of "Dogs in Canada" with regard to the "Standard for the German Shepherd Dog" and with regard to "Registration of White Boxers" as such notices had to do with white specimens in these breeds, and a proposal by Mr. Monaghan, as Chairman of the New Breeds and Standards Committee, that there be published in the January issue of "Dogs in Canada":

- (a) an extract of a letter which he had received from Dr. C. G. Hickman;
(b) five questions designed to elicit comments and information from members interested in colour, albinism, and hybrid vigour.

The Secretary read letters received from Mr. Anderson and Mr. Dawson in response to a memorandum addressed to members of the Board with regard to Mr. Monaghan's proposal.

DISCUSSION: During a discussion which followed:

- (1) Mr. MacKendrick set forth the reason why breeders of Boxers are anxious to eliminate the white factor in the breed;
(2) Mr. Monaghan stated that if the Board is to reach a constructive decision on the requests which it has received and which had prompted the notices published in the November issue of "Dogs in Canada", then comments, and information and data which members of the Club may be able to supply, would likely be very helpful.

7 R 20. ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

SUBJECT: The Secretary:

- (1) pointed out the following news item which had been included in a recent issue of "Gaines Dog Research Progress" booklet with regard to preservation of dog sperm:
"Dog sperm can be preserved for eight months when deep-frozen with sodium citrate-egg yolk as the preservative, states N. Gutierrez Nales in a Portuguese doctoral thesis. Optimum results were obtained with one-third of the given solvent in 70% egg yolk. Glycerine is toxic to sperm unless added slowly - virtually drop by drop - with glycerine present in a ratio of 5:100 and the proportion of egg yolk 37.5%. The author points out that semen emission occurs in three stages, but that the second stage semen - representing only a small part of the ejaculate - consists almost exclusively of spermatozoa and is therefore the important fraction for dilution-preservation."
(2) read a letter from Mr. Little setting forth his views on the action which he believed should be taken to indicate the Board's appreciation for the information supplied by Dr. Hickman.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Monaghan reported that information which had been conveyed to him by Dr. Hickman had been obtained by Dr. Hickman while he was in Europe.

ACTION: It was agreed that no action be taken at this time, pending receipt of the report of the research being conducted at the Ontario Veterinary College.

(2) reported that The American Kennel Club does not now register kennel names for residents of Canada;
(3) enquired whether the Board considered that the present mutual understanding between The Canadian Kennel Club and The American Kennel Club might be prejudiced if The Canadian Kennel Club approved the application for registration of a kennel name submitted by a resident of the United States when such kennel name had not been registered with The American Kennel Club, or which The American Kennel Club may have rejected for any reason.

"THAT, it be recommended to the incoming Board that consideration be given to refusing approval of an application for registration of kennel name submitted by a resident of another country unless the applicant has registered said kennel name with a club or other organization, recognized by this Club, in the country in which the applicant resides."

REPORT: The Chairman of the Kennel Names Committee reported that as a result of a letter received from Mrs. I. Diamond, Ste. Genevieve de Pierrefonds, Que. (registered kennel name DI-MAR), an instruction had been given to the Canadian National Live Stock Records that it is not to permit, in connection with the registration of dogs born in Canada, the inclusion of the name DIO-MAR.

SUBJECT: The Secretary:

- (1) pointed out that in the Club's annual Litter Record and Stud Book there is included a list of kennel names registered with The Canadian Kennel Club, the list being an alphabetical one according to the kennel names registered;
(2) suggested that the Board consider the advisability of adding to the annual Litter Record and Stud Book, a list of registered kennel names, such list to be alphabetical according to the surname of the persons under whose names such kennel names are registered, this to facilitate the establishment, by anyone desiring that information, of the kennel name of any breeder who may have registered a kennel name with the Club.

ACTION: The Secretary was instructed to make this addition, commencing with Volume 65 of the Litter Record and Stud Books.

SUBJECT:

- (1) the following Standing Resolutions adopted by the national Board:

"THAT, with the exception of those kennel names registered as suffixes prior to May, 1951, the breeder or owner at birth making application for registration of a dog may only show his kennel name (whether registered or not) as a prefix; and if a purchaser wishes his kennel name (whether registered or not) shown as part of the dog's name it may only be included as a suffix."

"THAT, a person may not use a kennel name more than three times without registering same."

- (2) a report that the Kennel Names Committee had given consideration to the means by which these Standing Resolutions, and other policies with regard to kennel names adopted by the Board, could be effectively and thoroughly implemented;
- (3) the following recommendations of the Kennel Names Committee:
 - (a) When a person is admitted to membership send him an application for registration of kennel name and information and advice with regard to kennel names.
 - (b) Same information and advice is to be issued with each litter kit issued to a non-member.
 - (c) Suggested procedure with regard to an unregistered kennel name which has been used three or more times:
 - (i) make the usual checks and clear through the Kennel Names Committee;
 - (ii) clear through the A. K. C.;
 - (iii) publish in "Dogs in Canada" without names of person using such names;
 - (iv) after 30 days advise the person using the name that he has 30 days in which to apply for registration, following which a "stop" order card will be inserted in the records at Ottawa;
 - (v) send "stop" card to Ottawa where name not applied for, where name used conflicts with our policies or is an A. K. C. registered name.
- (4) set up files at the Live Stock Records office so that it can quickly identify those names which must be used as a prefix (names registered since May, 1951).
- (5) those entitled to use their name as a suffix be advised by letter that it would be preferable if they were to use their name as a prefix where appropriate.
- (6) instruct the Records Office that wherever a name appears and is suspected to be a kennel name it must be transferred to a prefix. For example: if application shows the name as DUKE OF FRODINGHAM HALL, then they would change the name to FRODINGHAM HALL DUKE;
- (7) recommend to the Board that the By-laws be amended to prohibit the use of a registered kennel name in such a way that it may be used by a person only when naming dogs born his property, and this applies regardless of the country in which a dog is born.

Etheridge had acquired a puppy in lieu of a stud fee, and the Committee had authorized the registration of the litter in order that a certificate of registration may be provided the present owner of the puppy which Mrs. Etheridge had acquired;
- (2) the Complaints Committee recommended that the Board recommend to the Chief Registration Officer that Mr. Harold B. Woodeson be not allowed to register any further dogs in the Club's records.

MOTION #477-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:
 "THAT, we approve and implement the recommendation of the Registration Committee."
 FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
 Motion carried.

REPORT: The Chairman of the Registration Committee reported that arrangements had been made for the Secretary to write department stores, discount houses, and other similar retail outlets, drawing their attention to the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act with regard to the furnishing, to buyers, of certificates of registration issued by The Canadian Kennel Club for dogs sold as pure-bred.

REPORT: The Chairman of the Registration Committee reported that the Committee had asked the Director of the Canadian National Live Stock Records to arrange, when blank certificates of registration are again printed, for a slight decrease in the depth of the certificate in order that a certificate, when folded once, would fit readily into a No. 10 envelope.

7 R 27. DACHSHUNDS

REPORT: The President, as Chairman of the Registration Committee, reported that pursuant to the Board's wishes (resolution #354-60) the Committee had considered the registration requirements for Dachshunds imported to Canada, and reported the following recommendations of the Committee:

- (1) REGISTRATION OF DACHSHUND IMPORTED FROM GREAT BRITAIN:
 - (a) the Export Certificate issued by the Kennel Club (England) must show the coat classification of all 14 immediate ancestors in the three generations shown on the certificate;
 - (b) all 14 immediate ancestors must be of the same coat classification as the imported dog;
 - (c) if the Export Certificate indicates, within the three generation pedigree shown on the Export Certificate, cross-breeding by coat, said dog would not be eligible for registration in the Club's records.
- (2) REGISTRATION OF DACHSHUND IMPORTED FROM GERMANY:
 - (a) the Certificate of Registration issued by the Deutscher Teckelklub must show the coat classification of all 14 immediate ancestors in the three generations required on the certificate of registration;
 - (b) all 14 immediate ancestors must be of the same coat classification as the imported dog;
 - (c) if, within the three generations shown on the certificate of registration, there is any evidence of cross-breeding by coat, said dog would not be eligible for registration in the Club's records.
- (3) REGISTRATION OF DACHSHUND IMPORTED FROM THE UNITED STATES:
 - (a) the dog must be registered individually in the records of The American Kennel Club;
 - (b) as The American Kennel Club would not be able to furnish a certified three generation pedigree setting forth the coat classification of each of the 14 immediate ancestors, the importer must submit a sworn declaration certifying that he has made sufficient enquiries to establish to his satisfaction that the dog which he imported and wishes to register in this Club's records is of the same coat classification as all of its 14 immediate ancestors;
 - (c) where the importer does not or cannot supply the sworn declaration referred to in (b) the dog will not be registered in this Club's records;
 - (d) upon the issuance of a certificate of registration by The Canadian Kennel Club, the importer is to be advised that the certificate of registration has been issued on the basis of his application and sworn declaration, and if, at any time, it is established to the satisfaction of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club that there has been cross-breeding, by coat, within the 14 immediate ancestors of the dog for which a certificate of registration has been issued by The Canadian Kennel Club, the Board has the right to cancel the registration of such dog and the Canadian registration of all descendants of said dog;
 - (e) The Canadian Kennel Club assumes no liability whatsoever for any loss which might arise through any of the cancellations referred to in (d), the entire responsibility for such action being in the hands of the person who imported the dog from the United States and who obtained registration of it in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club.
- (4) REGISTRATION OF DACHSHUND IMPORTED FROM ANY OTHER COUNTRY:
 - (a) the dog must be registered in a stud book or foreign record recognized by the Club or acceptable to the Registration Committee;
 - (b) the importer must furnish the documents required by Article XXX, Section 2 (d) of the Club's By-laws;
 - (c) the required three generation certified pedigree must show the coat classification of all 14 immediate ancestors in the three generation certified pedigree;
 - (d) if the certified three generation pedigree indicates that within the 14 immediate ancestors there has been cross-breeding by coat, said dog would not be eligible for registration in the Club's records.
- (5) REGISTRATION, AS A MINIATURE DACHSHUND, OF AN IMPORTED DACHSHUND:

As the Committee is of the opinion that Export Certificates or certified pedigrees furnished in support of an application for registration of an imported Dachshund would not show the size classification of all 14 immediate ancestors, it therefore recommends a continuation of the following policies, previously set by the Board, where an importer of a Dachshund wishes it registered as a Miniature Dachshund:

 - (a) the importer must submit a written statement certifying that the Dachshund which he imported is over one year of age and its weight does not exceed nine pounds;
 - (b) the importer must also submit:
 - (i) a certification, in writing, by the owner of the sire of his imported Dachshund, that the sire is over one year of age and its weight does not exceed nine pounds;
 - (ii) a certification, in writing, by the owner of the dam of his imported Dachshund, that the dam is over one year of age and its weight does not exceed nine pounds.

- (6) **REGISTRATION OF A DACHSHUND (NOT BORN IN CANADA) OWNED BY A RESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES:**
 (a) a resident of the United States wishing to register a Standard Dachshund in the Club's records must fulfill the same requirements as set forth in Section (3) above;
 (b) a resident of the United States wishing to register a Dachshund, as a Miniature, in the Club's records must fulfill the same requirements as set forth in Sections (3) and (5) above.

The Chairman of the Registration Committee further reported the following recommendations of the Committee:

- (1) each breeder of Dachshunds be provided with information as to the registration of litters, particularly where any litter includes one or more "off-coated" puppies;
- (2) each breeder of Dachshunds be provided with information as to the policies, which will apply in connection with the registration in the Club's records of an imported Dachshund;
- (3) each member of the Club who is a breeder of Dachshunds be provided with a copy of the translation, kindly provided by Mr. & Mrs. W. E. Kieser, of a booklet which the Club had received from the Deutscher Teckelklub (Germany).

MOTION #478-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:
 "THAT, we adopt the report of the Registration Committee and it be implemented."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
 Motion carried.

REPORT: The Chairman of the Registration Committee reported the following recommendations of the Committee:

- (1) that the application for registration of litter form be amended in such a way that the owner of a litter of Dachshunds would be able to disclose, on the application, the coat and size classification of all puppies in the litter;
- (2) the distribution of a memorandum to Dachshund breeders indicating the procedure which they should follow in seeking to obtain registration of a litter of Dachshunds, if such litter includes one or more "off-coated" puppies, pending printing of the amended application for registration of litter form, and the publication of an article in "Dogs in Canada" on this same question;
- (3) the distribution of a memorandum from the Live Stock Records office with each litter kit for a litter of Dachshunds, making it clear that, in the event that one or more of the puppies in a litter should develop a coat different than its sire and dam, that fact must be reported to the Canadian National Live Stock Records as soon as it is clear to the owner of the litter that one or more puppies are "off-coated";
- (4) the dissemination of information to the breeders of Dachshunds to the effect that when an "off-coated" puppy is registered according to its actual coat, its progeny may only be registered if the dog is mated to a Dachshund of the same coat and size classification as the dog has been registered in the records of the Club;
- (5) that the Board consider giving some leeway to the owner of a litter of Dachshunds in connection with the higher registration fee which applies to the registration of a litter where application is submitted more than 60 days after birth, where the owner of the litter is desirous of postponing litter registration in order that he can be reasonably certain that his application for registration of the litter will correctly disclose the coat classification of all puppies in the litter;
- (6) since all applications for registration of litters which include one or more "off-coated" puppies and all applications for registration of "off-coated" puppies must be referred to the Registration Committee before being finally processed by the Canadian National Live Stock Records, the Committee itself will insert the identification letters required by the new By-law dealing with the registration of Dachshunds;
- (7) that information to be disseminated to breeders of Dachshunds make it very clear that puppies resulting from cross-breeding by coat or size are not eligible for registration in the Club's records.

MOTION #479-61

Moved by Mr. MacCallum, seconded by Mr. Monaghan:
 "THAT, the report of the Registration Committee be adopted and it be implemented."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
 Motion carried.

REPORT: The Chairman of the Registration Committee reported that it was the recommendation of the Committee that the identification letters indicating an "off-coated" puppy must be included within the brackets which encompass the individual registration number allotted to the dog.

The Chairman of the Registration Committee also reported that the Committee had noted that some breeders of Dachshunds are indicating, by the inclusion of initials following the registered name of a Dachshund, the coat and size classification, and the Committee recommended that this practice be prohibited in order to prevent any confusion with the letters which the Board had approved by way of implementing the new By-law relating to the registration of Dachshunds.

MOTION #480-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. Blyth:
 "THAT, we approve and implement the recommendations of the Registration Committee."

FOR THE MOTION: Mr. MacCallum, Mr. Blyth, Mrs. Mack, Mr. MacKendrick, Mr. Monaghan, Mrs. Southcott.
 Motion carried.

REPORT: The Chairman of the Registration Committee reported that:

- (1) the Committee had reviewed the registration of the two litters referred to in resolution #355-61, and the Committee had unanimously decided that it was not prepared to recommend to the Board that the registration of the two litters in question be cancelled, nor was it prepared to recommend to the Board that it cancel the individual registration of such puppies in these litters which are of the same coat classification as their sires and dams;
- (2) the Committee is of the opinion that Mr. Stuart Roberts had exhibited, as listed dogs, dogs out of the litters in question, believing that such dogs would be eligible for registration according to their actual coat classification, and in these circumstances the Committee recommended that the wins of such dogs be allowed to remain on the Club's records.

MOTION #481-61

Moved by Mr. MacKendrick, seconded by Mr. MacCallum:

"THAT, we adopt the first part of the Committee's report."

AMENDMENT TO MOTION #481-61

COMPLAINTS, CHARGES AND PROTESTS

8 C 1. REPORT OF COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE (POLICIES)

REPORT: The Chairman of the Complaints Committee:

- (1) reported that the Committee had carefully reviewed the procedure followed in recent years in the handling of complaints received by the Club regarding the alleged failure of sellers of dogs as pure-bred to deliver certificates of registration to purchasers, and had reached the conclusion that, while its efforts in many cases had resulted in the delivery of certificates, the time and labour involved in the handling of such complaints by the Committee and the staff, did not justify the results obtained, and in most cases there was no evidence that those who had obtained the Club's help in this direction, appreciated the service rendered by the Club; the Committee had noted that most complaints of this nature involved non-members of the Club who had sold dogs as pure-bred and the fact that many such complaints had not been satisfactorily resolved could be attributed to the fact that the sellers, not being members of the Club or regular breeders, felt no personal loss if deprived of the privileges of the Club;
- (2) the Committee had reached the conclusion that the present policy should be amended by placing upon the purchaser, the onus of instituting prosecution proceedings under the Live Stock Pedigree Act, except where an individual is flagrantly violating the Act, in which case the Club could institute disciplinary proceedings;
- (3) outlined the suggested text of letters which could be addressed to the complainant, advising him of the course of action which he could take, and to the defendant, outlining the seriousness of his position in the light of the allegation that he had committed an offense under the Live Stock Pedigree Act, which, if established as an offense, could result in a fine or imprisonment.
- (4) **DISCUSSION:** During a discussion which followed Mr. Monaghan suggested that the complainant in each case, be provided with details of previous court cases where persons had been found guilty of violation of the law under the Live Stock Pedigree Act and/or the Criminal Code, in order that they would be in a better position to decide the course of action which they would take to obtain redress.

ACTION: The Committee's views were ordered referred to the incoming Board of Directors for consideration.

8 C 10. REPORT OF COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE (SPECIFIC CASES)

A number of complaints were then reported to the meeting and after discussion appropriate action was taken by the Board.

INTERNAL AND ADMINISTRATION

9 A 81. REFERENDUM BALLOTS

SUBJECT: Mr. Monaghan:

- (1) pointed out that when the Board authorizes the inclusion of a proposed amendment in a referendum ballot, notice of such proposed amendment must be given to members of the Club not less than 30 days in advance of the mailing of the ballot;
- (2) in accordance with instructions given by the Board, notice of a proposed amendment to Chapter 23, Section 1, of the Dog Show Rules had been given (as proposed amendment No. 6) in the October issue of "Dogs in Canada";
- (3) proposed amendment No. 6 was not exactly in accordance with the wording given in the October issue of "Dogs in Canada";
- (4) expressed the opinion that, inasmuch as the requirements of Section 17 of Article XXXVIII of the By-laws had not been complied with completely, the Board should rule that proposed amendment No. 6 is null and void.

DISCUSSION: The Secretary explained that when preparing the referendum ballot he noted that the wording of proposed amendment No. 6, of which notice had been given in the October issue, did not carry out the obvious intent of the Board's wishes, and he had therefore made a correction to ensure that the amendment as included in the ballot would carry out the Board's intention. It was agreed that the opinion of the Club's solicitor should be sought, and if he is of the opinion that the change in wording, however justified, was improperly made, then the Board would declare the amendment as null and void.

MOTION #488-61

Moved by Mr. Monaghan, seconded by Mr. MacKendrick:

"THAT, subject to approval of the Club's solicitor, the action being taken to amend a part of the Dog Show Rules by way of Proposed Amendment No. 6 be declared null and void and without legal authorization because the provisions of Section 17 of Article XXXVIII of the By-laws were not complied with EXACTLY."

Motion carried.

11 D 36. INTERPRETATION OF RULES

SUBJECT: Mrs. Southcott enquired whether, in the light of Chapter 19, Section 1, of the Dog Show Rules, a dog entered and competing at an unbenched show may leave when not required for further judging.

ACTION: It was agreed that at such a show a dog may leave, when not required for further judging, unless the premium list of the show provided otherwise.

9 A 31. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

SUBJECT: Mr. Monaghan referred to previous occasions when the Board, at its last meeting in the year, had decided on a recommendation to the incoming Board with regard to the first meeting of the new Board, and suggested that a recommendation be placed before the President-elect that the first meeting of the new Board be held before January 15, 1962.

"THAT, it be recommended to the incoming President that he or she arrange for the calling of the first meeting of the Board to be held before January 15, 1962."

RESULTS OF VOTING ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS
INCLUDED IN 1961 REFERENDUM BALLOT

For the information of members and others who may be concerned, the following information is given about the results of the voting on the proposed amendments included in the referendum ballot distributed to voting members last November.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS

Proposed amendment No. 1 -- a proposed amendment to Article XIII, Section 10, dividing British Columbia into three areas (Mainland, Island, and Interior) for the purpose of appointment of Field Trial Representatives. Approved by vote of 281 for, 110 against.

Proposed amendment No. 2 -- a proposed amendment to Article XIII, Section 11, deleting the words "the Board to consider recommendations from clubs holding obedience training classes and clubs holding obedience trials," and adding a third zone to be known as "British Columbia (Interior)". Approved by vote of 240 for, 159 against.

Proposed amendment No. 3 -- a proposed amendment to Article XXX, Section 4, to provide the Board with the power to prohibit the use of any name, for the purpose of registration of individual dogs, if, in the opinion of the Board, such name infringes on the rights of any person, partnership, or company whose kennel name has been registered with the Club or where such name is considered to be similar to a kennel name registered with any other national kennel club with whom The Canadian Kennel Club has working arrangements with regard to mutual protection of registered kennel names. Approved by vote of 545 for, 42 against.

Proposed amendment No. 4 -- a proposed amendment to Article XXXVIII, to alter the schedule of various dates set forth in that Article which deals with the procedure on amendments. Approved by vote of 339 for, 35 against.

Proposed amendment No. 13 -- a proposed amendment to Article XXIX, to provide for the cancellation of registration of litter in certain circumstances. Approved by vote of 495 for, 61 against.

Proposed amendment No. 14 -- a proposed amendment to Article XXX to provide for the cancellation of registration of an individual dog in certain circumstances. Approved by vote of 496 for, 60 against.

Proposed amendment No. 15 -- a proposed amendment to Article XXXVIII deleting the requirement that proposed amendments to the Field Trial Rules must be approved by referendum ballot, and adding a new Article to provide that the Field Trial Rules and Regulations are subject to amendment as provided in Chapter 21 of the Field Trial Rules and Regulations. See also note under heading "Proposed Amendments to the Field Trial Rules and Regulations". Approved by vote of 205 for, 55 against.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE DOG SHOW RULES

Proposed amendment No. 5 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter 16, Section 1, giving the Board the power to prohibit the use, when a dog is entered at a show held under the Club's rules, of any name which in the opinion of the Board infringes on the rights of any person who has registered a kennel name with the Club. Approved by vote of 535 for, 40 against.

Proposed amendment No. 6 -- the Board has declared this proposed amendment to Chapter 23, Section 1, a nullity on the grounds that the proposed amendment, as it appeared on the ballot, was not exactly the proposed amendment of which notice was given in the October (1961) issue of "Dogs in Canada".

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE OBEDIENCE TRIAL REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS

Proposed amendment No. 7 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter 1, Section 7, Subsection 2, giving the Board the power to prohibit the use, when a dog is entered at an obedience trial or tracking test held under the Club's rules, of any name which in the opinion of the Board infringes on the rights of any person who has registered a kennel name with the Club. Approved by vote of 393 for, 32 against.

Proposed amendment No. 10 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter I, Section 14, Subsections 2, 4, 6, which includes British Columbia with Ontario and Quebec as the zones in which three qualifying scores under THREE different judges for an obedience degree are required. Approved by vote of 312 for, 44 against.

Proposed amendment No. 11 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter I, specifying the returns which must be made to The Canadian Kennel Club within ten days after a licensed obedience trial held under the Club's Regulations and Standards. Approved by vote of 396 for, 9 against.

Proposed amendment No. 12 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter II, Section 13, deleting the 12" minimum in the Retrieve Over High Jump, and to provide for changing jump equipment to an 8" minimum. Approved by vote of 290 for, 25 against.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE FIELD TRIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Proposed amendment No. 8 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter 7, Section 1, giving the Board the power to prohibit the use, when a dog is entered at a field trial held under the Club's rules, of any name which in the opinion of the Board infringes on the rights of any person who has registered a kennel name with the Club. Approved by a vote of 393 for, 39 against.

Proposed amendment No. 9 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter 2, Section 1, which requires that application to hold a licensed field trial under the Club's rules must reach The Canadian Kennel Club at least three months prior to the date of the proposed trial. The amendment includes provision for change of date where necessary or advisable. Approved by vote of 319 for, 52 against.

Proposed amendment No. 15 -- a proposed amendment to Chapter 21 giving the Board the power to amend the Field Trial Rules and Regulations after it has carried out the procedure outlined in the new Chapter 21. Approved by vote of 205 for, 55 against. See also Proposed amendment No. 15 under "Proposed Amendments to By-laws."

Application has been submitted to the Minister of Agriculture for Canada for approval of the amendments to the By-laws. An announcement will be made in due course of the Minister's decision.

The amendments to the Dog Show Rules, Obedience Trial Regulations and Standards, and the Field Trial Rules and Regulations became effective on January 1, 1962.

(Explanatory notes) Commencing in 1951 adjustments were made in the rates on which the Club was charged with certain items. For example, in 1950 and previous years the Club was charged one full operational item for each notice of transfer of ownership which the Live Stock Records Office sent to the Secretary, but in 1951 the charge was decreased to 1/4 item per notice; thus, while there were 3644 transfer notices in 1951, we were charged with 911 operational items. The charge for such notices was decreased to 1/6 item in 1953. The Club is charged at the rate of 1/2 operational item for each re-issued certificate of registration. The Secretary is provided with a carbon copy of each certificate issued for dogs individually registered in the Club's records. Previous to 1953 the charge was 1/4 item for each such copy; but this charge was decreased to 1/6 item in 1953. Previous to 1955 the Club was charged 1/3 item for recording an agreement re conditional sale of a dog; this was changed to 1/2 item in 1955. Each extended pedigree issued by the Records Office is charged to the Club at 2 items. Commencing with 1958 the Club was charged at the rate of 1/2 item for each Import Certificate issued by the Records Office. The issuance of litter kits commenced in 1959 and the Club was charged at the rate of 1/6 item for each such kit in addition to 1 item for the litter certificate included in the litter kit. The additional charge to the Club for the issuance of a litter kit was reduced from 1/6 item to 1/10 item in 1960. Previous to 1955 the Club was charged at the rate of two items for the posting of a title on the records at Ottawa; this was reduced to 1 item in 1955. In 1960 the charge for Secretary's duplicate copy of registrations was reduced from 1/6 item to 1/10 item; however, the Club ceased to obtain these copies, and also Secretary's transfer copies in March, 1960, hence a considerable reduction in the number of these items charged against the Club in 1960.



Border Collies

Skip, champion British Columbia sheep dog and blind Shep, with their owner-trainer, Michael Williams, are known up and down the West Coast for their amazing skill. They are outstanding examples of the wisdom and work of the Border Collie.

Michael Williams is the owner of the present champion British Columbia sheep dog, a Border Collie named Skip, and breeder and trainer of both show and working dogs.

"There is a movement afoot to have the Border Collie registered with The Canadian Kennel Club, and every time I show my sheep dogs I hear some one say, 'What a pity they're not registered'", says Williams.

"People don't realize that they are registered—they're registered with the International Sheep Dog Society in Great Britain.

"It's true that no standards are set for the dogs. They set their own standards in working trials. The ones that do well are the ones that become famous and are used for breeding.

"In Great Britain, Border Collies are allowed to

compete in obedience trials of the British Kennel Club and have been some of the top winners over there".

Williams is an English-born Canadian who has been working with sheep dogs almost as long as he can remember, first as a boy on his father's farm in Shropshire, later as a sheep farmer in the Okanagan country of British Columbia and for the last four years as a dog trainer in Victoria, on the south tip of Vancouver Island.

He is the owner of four Border Collies, including the three times provincial champion sheep dog Skip, two young bitches acquired in Great Britain last fall and his blind veteran Shep, who at the advanced age of 11 has made a number of television appearances in addition to frequent demonstrations at

The high score of the two imported dogs, Ch. Whitebriar Journeymen and Am. and Can. Ch. Rannock Dune's Deputy, represents a real achievement as our system of scoring gives extra points for Westies bred in Canada.

The names of 36 Westies appeared on our score sheet, total entry 389 in 93 shows (unofficial count), the largest entry at the WHWTC Specialty, Scarborough, September 24 with 31 and next Vancouver Island Terrier Club, September 7, at Victoria B.C. with 20 entered.

Westie wins for 1961 include one BIS, four Best Canadian Bred in Show, 27 First in Group, and not included in scoring, two Best Puppy in Show for Manderley's Playboy owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. Willis and Best Brace in Show for Mr. Cox's Westies in Greater Vancouver, B.C. Show.

In addition to the Challenge Trophy the award for the Westie with top total score for Obedience Trials will be presented for the second time to Mr. R. K. Alexander, Chippawa, Ont. with 192,

195.54 and 195 scored when he won his Canadian CDX. This trophy has been given four times — first to Fons of the Rouge (Breeder Mrs. Daniell-Jenkins), next to his daughter Demeter, trained by Mrs. H. Flanagan, third to Variatus Toby when he won his Canadian CD in 1960. Toby is grandson of Fons bred by Mrs. Joan Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Ont., sired by Mrs. Adams' Ch. Rose-neath Commander.

We all hope that the keen competition which was stimulated by the Daniel-Jenkins Jeudwine Memorial Trophy in 1961 will continue and even increase in 1962, and in Obedience. I understand there are several challengers in training.

The Chow Chow is not a breed that one finds on every street corner, nor do you see a Chow sitting in a pet shop window; for this we are grateful.

The Chow breeders in Canada do not number in the hundreds, there are but a handful. This handful of people are trying to make it possible for you, the individual owner, to purchase a puppy that you will be proud to own, a puppy that the breeder is proud to say "I bred that little fellow". They are trying to have puppies available when you need one to fill that empty void in your life when your Chow has passed on to greater glory.

So the next time a reputable breeder asks you to let him breed your dog — think carefully. Who knows, perhaps after being a human "parent" to a litter of fluffy Chow Chows you, too, will be bitten by the bug and that would be but the first of many litters!

agricultural fairs across the province.
"Border Collies have the style, the
strong eye, the ability to move to signals
—their whole life is taken up in herd-
ing sheep, or cattle, or whatever they
have to work," Williams states.

"The distinctive thing that has been
bred into them is their flanking ability.
They don't run at the sheep, they run
around them. They don't have the
average animal's hunting instinct to
chase the sheep, instead they herd
them. They don't bite or bark.

"It's significant that the Border Collie
is, to the best of my knowledge, the
only dog being imported by the Rus-
sians for working their stock. There
isn't any doubt that the Border Collie
has the recognition of the world for its
superlative ability as a sheep dog."

When Williams came and settled on a
sheep ranch near Vernon in the interior
of British Columbia, he was already well
versed in working with Border Collies.
He had started training Collies three
years before with a dog his father had
brought back to England from a sheep-
buying trip in Wales.

Two years after arriving in Canada
he bought Shep, at 12 months not yet
much more than a pup. It was the
beginning of a long association.

Williams trained him to respond to
whistle signals, and so well did Shep
learn them that even after he began
to go blind at about the age of four
years, he could herd sheep at distances
of up to a mile as long as he could
hear the whistled commands.

Left behind in the mountains to help
sheep herders move flocks to new graz-
ing areas, Shep would wait until the
new camp had been made, then make
his way back to the ranch and his
master by himself, a trek of about 40
miles.

In camp, Shep would scent a grizzly
bear on the prowl long before it neared
the sheep or the herders, so that Will-
iams and his sheep herders were always
prepared to take a shot at the intruder
by the time he arrived.

Shep had been totally blind for about
a year when Williams set up his kennels
in Victoria in 1958, and had begun his
career as a performer in obedience
demonstrations where he would man-
euver his way through and around
obstacles, following the whistled instruc-
tions of his master.

When the Canadian Broadcasting
Corporation made a film of one of these
demonstrations recently for its Kennel
Club television program, the studio re-
ceived over 400 telephone calls, a record
for the show.

"Any dog registered with the Inter-
national Sheep Dog Society or the
North American Sheep Dog Society"
Williams said, must have a certificate
as a working dog in addition to its
registration paper before it can be used
for breeding purposes, so that in order
for a dog to be registered with the
society, both its parents must have work-
ing certificates.

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"The International Sheep Dog Society was formed in 1905, and since then, except in war years, has held national trials in England, Scotland and Wales, the top 12 dogs from each country competing in the international sheep dog trials held in one of the three countries.

"The chief aim of the society is to produce a useful dog for farmers, a dog whose renown is based on ability.

"In no breed of dog in the world have the working abilities been so highly developed.

"In Britain, the Border Collie is often called the wisest dog in the world."

Michael Williams is an English-born Canadian, 31 years of age, who emigrated to Canada from his native Shropshire in 1950. Besides breeding sheep dogs, he competes in dog obedience trials and has many 'highest points in trial' scores to his credit. In the recent Vancouver Island Dog Fanciers' Association obedience trial, he attained a perfect score of 200, in CDX. His German Shepherd, Shadow, was the first dog in western Canada to pass the CKC tracking test. ■

MORE VETERINARIANS NEEDED

The lack of qualified veterinarians was a serious problem under discussion at the 88th Annual Meeting of the Ontario Veterinarian Association held in Toronto January 10-12.

Dr. James Archibald of the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph, Ont., was chairman of the workshop wherein the latest methods of bacterial diagnosis and disease control were demonstrated.

Skin abnormalities of dogs received considerable attention. It was pointed out that skin irritations, loss of hair and "summer exzema" could be caused by mange, flea allergy, excessive bathing, other allergies and under — or over-nutrition.

Flea allergy is produced by the development of irritation at the site of flea bites. This condition may prevail even when fleas are not observed by the dog owner. Flea control measures frequently result in complete recovery, it was stated. Excess supplementation with some vitamins may also produce allergy-like conditions.

Dr. Robert Kirk of Cornell University reviewed the field of canine pediatrics and presented the most recent developments in the care and management of newborn pups.

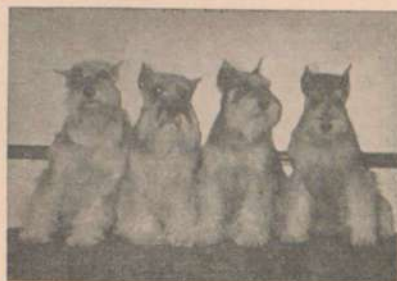

I can well believe, for to me the English 11 inch toys in many cases were nearer 12 inch miniatures. Indeed the only true toy, in my opinion, was the little white I've mentioned earlier. This one was about eight inches, beautifully made up in body, and the gayest little fellow I've seen in a long time. Indeed in Canada I'm sure it would be a group winner and get a lot of consideration for Best in Show. But in England it did not win its class.

"And the reason?" I asked.

"Well I talked to the owner after," he said. "She knew that if she were showing her dog in Canada or the United States it would be a top one. But she doesn't ever expect to win in England because, she said, English judges fault it, not on conformation but because they believe it is too small to fit into a breeding program. So she now considers it as what she describes a 'gimmick dog', so unusual that it gives her a lot of word-of-mouth advertising. And it too, is going to Crufts—not because she expects to win but because she is hopeful it will create enough interest that eventually the English toys will become true toys."

"And the English kennels?" I asked.

"I've seen only a couple," he said. "I intend to see more. I've seen a couple of dogs I've liked but I suspect that the price went up as soon as the breeders heard my Canadian accent. But I haven't seen enough yet to be positive in any statement except one."

"And that one positive statement?" I asked him.

"That the breeders in Canada are breeding quality the equal to anything I've seen in England. There are of course good dogs in England but the good ones come high. There are dogs that would help a Canadian breeding program. But those dogs have to be found. And they can only be found in my opinion, by personal inspection or by buying through a reliable agent, who has a knowledge of what is required in the Canadian show ring. I, for one, would not buy sight unseen."

THE WINNER AND OTHERS

Puckety Jeff, who is owned by Bob Albee of Elmira, N.Y. and piloted by popular professional Wink Griffin, is a scion of the renowned grouse champion, Puckety Village Boy. Epitomizing the class shooting dog standard that is rigidly emphasized in this stake, Jeff literally drafted out a plan as to how this King Township course should be hunted as he skirted the feeder strips and bore through the swales, cementing this performance with two corking bird finds each a calendar point with skyward head and tail. An amazingly fleet and fiery performer who crackles his tail with every jump, Jeff displayed ample evidence of his biddability as Griffin repeatedly drew him in from distant flings to handle through the tight birdy pockets that speckle the course.

On Jeff's last find his stock soared dizzily as he performed a masterful piece of pheasant work on a wily old cock that sought to escape his original stand. Sent on by Griffin to relocate, Jeff swung wide like a pendulum then zeroed in to nail down his bird.

This brilliant piece of work had the large gallery gasping, but was somewhat marred by the handler who did not express full confidence in his charge as he seemingly delayed his shot, allowing the bird to fly well out of normal gun range before firing. Puckety Jeff is known to be a commendably composed dog on point and appears to possess all the polish that is demanded in this stake, yet such incidents can be heavily penalized with much justification.

Although the judges did not elect to allot runner-up honors, the 13-year old Canadian-bred pointer, Tyson's Skyhills Flash, must have been under tight consideration. Flash, as many will remember, is the Toronto dog who scaled the bird dog's Olympus south of the border with National wins on grouse, quail and pheasant. Many, including this writer, questioned the advisability of returning the gallant old champion from his long retirement to the field trial wars, but as

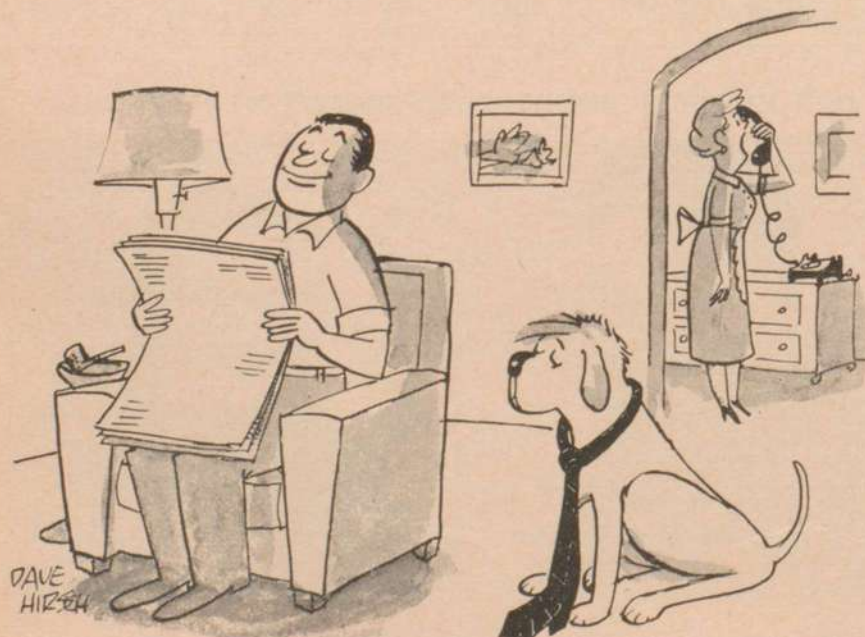
