Samingo Kennels, Reg'd., (situated on Ridge Road just south of Aurora, exactly a half mile west of Yonge St.) had a most unusual beginning. About ten years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Ian Miller returned home late one night to be startled by a large furry animal leaping down at them from their top step. They took the dog in, washed him up, discovered him to be a good-looking white dog, friendly, hungry and tired. Although they had had Collies, they did not even recognize the breed, but learned it was a Samoyed. They had the dog in their care for only four weeks during which time they advertised, hoping against hope that he would not be claimed. But there was a final claim. The dog died of encephalitis, the aftermath of distemper. Even in that short time the Millers knew they must have a Samoyed in their home. Finally they obtained Belle from Mrs. Fred Tremere (see "Dogs and People" this issue) of Belleville. Belle is now "pensioned" but has produced some fine offspring.

At the present time Samingo Kennels consist of 11 adult Samoyeds, eight of whom are champions, three of which are at stud. Among them is Ch. Blairdale's Amon-Ra, "Mingo", after whom the kennels are named. This dog has won countless Best of Breed awards under Canadian and American judges and has sired nine champions to date and many more with points. His son, Ch. Samingo's Prince Charming, homebred, is a consistent winner and sire of Ch. Samingo's Anastasia pictured on the cover. His dam is Northern Belle. Also at stud is Samingo's Zero, the youngster shown on the cover, sired by Ch. Blairdale's Amon-Ra; dam, Ch. Questor's Tatjana O'Samoyedena.

Ch. Samingo's Sparkle, the exquisite female, was Best of Winners at The Canadian Samoyed Club Specialty Show in 1960, held at Burlington, finishing her championship the following day at Agincourt. She is of the same breeding as Samingo's Zero, from a previous litter.

Ch. Samingo's Anastasia, also homebred, first shown as a Junior Puppy, obtained her championship points in less than four weeks, going on to Best of Winners at The Canadian Samoyed Club Specialty Show, 1961. At this show she also went Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Show. Her sire is Ch. Samingo's Prince Charming; her dam, Ch. Bri-Pen's White Jade O'Samingo.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Miller are active in The Canadian Samoyed Club. ■

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FROM THE EDITOR

From time to time breeders lose a dog — not in the usual way of accident or carelessness, but through robbery. The theft takes place before their very eyes, during and after what appears to be a routine sale. The client usually appears as a well-dressed, well-spoken man or woman, sometimes there by appointment. The litter is admired, a few pleasantries exchanged, the puppy is carefully selected, feeding instructions are given, a cheque is written, and the new owners drive off. The sale is completed, but the payment is not. By the time the breeder attempts to cash the worthless cheque, the customer is miles away and the puppy heaven only knows where. The breeder has thus lost a puppy, which has cost him nearly a hundred dollars to raise, apart from time and care; he will never know whether the pup is being properly raised and he is out upwards of a hundred dollars reimbursement with no way of tracing the purchaser. He does not even have the car license to match up with the signature. The pup will probably be with the owners just long enough for them to make a sale — even if they were accosted, they could readily claim they had no such dog.

What protection has the breeder in such a fraudulent transaction? Must he be at the mercy of these professional crooks?

Dogs consulted the Toronto Better Business Bureau on the subject of worthless cheques. The advice was brief. "Accept only certified cheques in lieu of cash."

Any amount in the vicinity of \$100 or upwards is a considerable sum, respected alike by people with or without money. The Post Office, real estate and many other companies state flatly that a cheque must be certified and no one thinks the less of the establishment.

"Some people might be hesitant about requesting a certified cheque," said Mr. Vernon P. Dollard, but it is a respectable thing to do. The breeder is making a one-time sale. It is not likely that he will continue to do business with the individual or "service" the product. The breeder's chief obligation to the purchaser is to provide a sound, healthy puppy."

Mr. Dollard suggested that few people would take offense if, when making the appointment, the breeder suggests "We sell our puppies at such and such a price. Would you like to bring a certified cheque with you."

Since some puppies are purchased on impulse, albeit the thought of buying a puppy may have been on the purchaser's mind for months, a certified cheque cannot always be obtained. The Better Business Bureau suggests that in a case like this if a cheque must be accepted, the following information be listed on the back of the cheque: home address, business address, telephones, car license.

JUSTICE FOR SHEPHERDS

... After our move to Brandon recently from the Toronto area, I was very upset about some of the statements in the local Dog By-Law. For all males and spayed females, the license fee is \$4.00. For registered females the fee is only \$4.00, which is reasonable and sensible, but the fee for unregistered, unsplayed females is only \$6.00. However my great concern was the prejudice against German Shepherds. Shepherd friends back East will sympathize with me and understand my annoyance at the inaccuracies and unreasonableness of the following section of the By-Law:

"For male or female German Shepherds dogs, or German, French or Belgian Police dogs, or Alsations or Huskies, or any mongrel showing a strain of any of the foregoing breeds, the sum of \$15.00."

When this statement is boiled down, you find that they are speaking of the German Shepherd only, purebred and mongrel. (For the complete novice, a "Police Dog" is a dog of any breed, trained and used for police work.) Having my daughter's two Keeshonden with us, I was also concerned about the term "Huskies", but evidently this term applies to the heavy-coated Shepherd type of mongrel. Enquiring about the reasons for the discrimination, I found that 20 years or more ago Brandon was overrun by German Shepherds and the mongrel German Shepherd type of dog. A great many of them were uncontrolled and as a result they ran in packs and did great damage to livestock in the area. A license fee of \$25.00 was then imposed on this breed and mixture of breeds, which was later reduced to \$15.00 as the number of dogs gradually diminished because of this high fee.

Today, however, the complaints locally stem from the number of dogs, all breeds and mixtures of breeds, running loose. I have finally found a keen group of dog enthusiasts anxious to better the dog situation in Brandon, and was fortunate to be included in a meeting very recently to discuss the present by-law and to recommend certain changes to Council. The meeting was chaired by Mr. Glen Sutherland, Field Trial judge and former Field Trial Representative. The group included Mr. A. F. Robins, a CKC member, dog and Field Trial enthusiast for some 50 years; Mr. Harry Morse, Obedience Club President; Dr. Hugh Best, Sub District

Veterinarian of Canada Department of Agriculture, Health of Animals Branch; Dr. Herb Wyman, a Brandon veterinarian and breeder of very good Basenjis and Mr. Ross Metcalfe, a very new CKC member and Boxer enthusiast. This group was unanimous in the decision to recommend discrimination, not against breeds, but against the great number of uncontrolled dogs running loose, (particularly the unregistered, unsplayed female) and a very stiff fee was suggested for the latter, sufficient to make it almost prohibitive for the average owner. Thus the German Shepherd would come under the classification for all breeds and as I was particularly concerned about registered German Shepherds, this recommendation would remove any discrimination against them.

The keynote of all recommendations was that all dogs be "under control" at all times. Everyone was in agreement that a trained dog is a "controlled" dog. Perhaps out of all this we will find many new recruits for Obedience classes. As quoted in December *Popular Dogs*, "Lack of pet control will some day result in dogless towns — by law".

This same group was also very interested in my suggestion that the time was ripe for the formation of a Kennel Club in Brandon. Field Trial Work has been very active here for some time and an Obedience Club has recently been formed, so the idea of rounding out activities with the addition of work on conformation and, in time, the introduction of dog shows, was well received. Mrs. Gove, Manitoba Director, is very anxious to eventually establish a three-show circuit between Winnipeg, Portage La Prairie, where a kennel club already exists, and Brandon. With such an enthusiastic group to work with, I have great hopes for the future.

THE COLOR QUESTION

... With the proposed amendments regarding denial of registration to a dog due to color, and the probable denial of registration to its litter mates (although they may be true color), are we moving toward the day when only the progeny of champions will be eligible for registration? ...

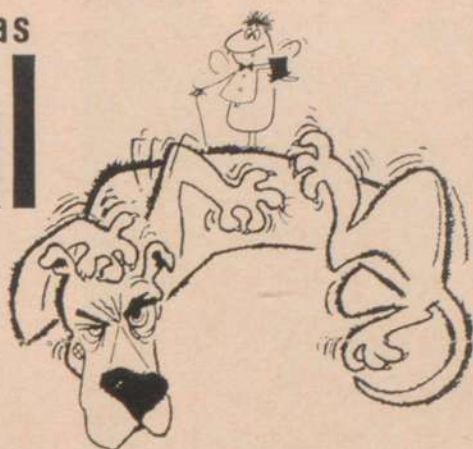
Entries in Obedience and Field trials would not decrease if this or a similar method of control were used.

THE OLD TIMER

If someone wants to propose that all white Poodles enter the ring with red-lacquered nails, said the Old Timer, that's his right. But common sense will prevent it.

"Perhaps," said the Old Timer "I've misunderstood the proposal."

I looked up from the Cocker Spaniel I was combing and my look must have indicated I was curious.

"Misunderstood what?" I asked when he volunteered no further information.

He hesitated a moment then pulled his pipe from his pocket, loaded it carefully and got it burning evenly. Then he sat down in his old tub chair, obviously prepared to let me continue the combing.

"Misunderstood what?" I asked again, and I too pulled out a chair and sat down. The Old Timer thought a bit longer, saw that I was not going to start work on the Cocker again and decided to talk.

"Did you read the minutes of the December meeting of the Board of Directors?" he asked. I admitted I hadn't. The Old Timer's look made it very clear what he thought of my lack of interest.

"Boy," he said. "You should read them. You've got a big investment in dogs—you show regularly and you should know what is happening. Now what I'm wondering about is this Minute 451 at the December meeting of the board. Can't figure out quite what it means, but if it means what I think it does I'm against it."

"But would you know they were members of The Canadian Kennel Club without checking through that long list of members?" he asked "and if you did find three from other provinces who met the requirements how would you explain the reason behind your amendment?"

"Guess it would have to be by letter," I suggested.

"Exactly," said the Old Timer "and are you prepared to sit down and write three long detailed letters to persons you've never met, explaining a principle to them and trying to enlist them as supporters of that principle?"

I scratched my head.

"Putting it that way," I admitted "I'd have to feel pretty keenly on the amendment."

"Exactly," said the Old Timer. "I think

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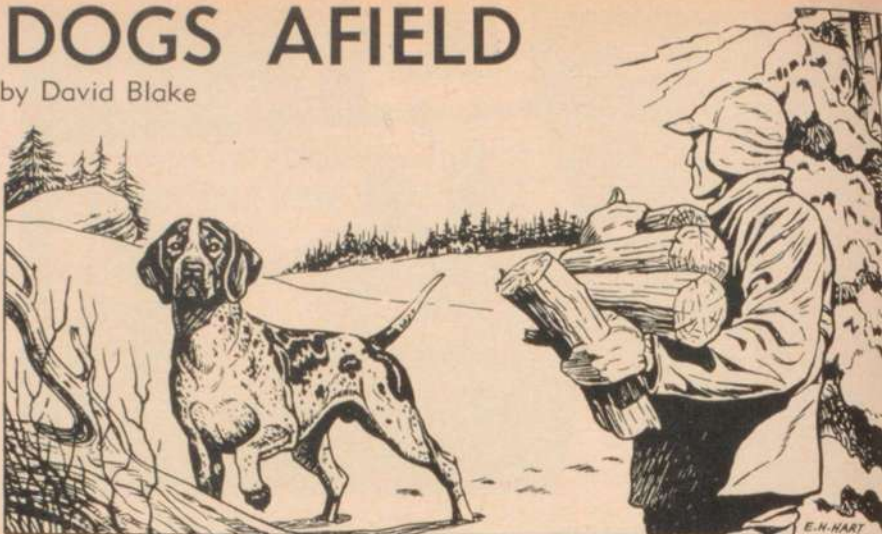
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DOGS AFIELD

by David Blake



The difference between a good companion in the field and a useless dog is often fear of the gun.

"He's as happy as a lark and loves to hunt, but just let me so much as pick up a gun and he runs off with his tail between his legs and hides."

This plaintive comment usually indicates the end of a friendship between an otherwise promising prospect and a hopeful hunter — and is heard too frequently to be dismissed as a rare occurrence. Could the fear of the gun have been prevented? What can be done if the condition already exists?

Much has been written about gunshyness and there are those who advocate a progressive conditioning of puppies until they are completely immune to gunshot. The method involves shooting a cap pistol at a distance then gradually closer, graduating to small bore firearms and eventually being able to shoot a 12-gauge smooth bore over the dog's head.

Doubtless, thousands of puppies have been "conditioned" to the gun in this manner and the method, therefore, has many advocates. In my opinion, the dogs that respond favorably to this routine are of a very stable or indifferent nature anyway and there is little chance that they would become gunshy if they were properly introduced to the gun in the field. There is a good chance, on the other hand, that some, more sensitive animals, would react unfavorably somewhere along this line of training and wind up shy of a gun and perhaps worse. It would only take one mistake to cause, in the kennel, that which might never be caused under normal conditions in the field.

My answer to "how would you introduce to the gun?" is this. Carry an empty gun on exercising or training excursions and have your companions do the same. When it is time to shoot game, do so only when the dog is completely absorbed by the thrill of the game. Shoot only at a reasonable distance from the dog. Be reasonably sure that you can bring the game down by

having a good shot with you if you're not a good shot yourself. Use a reasonable load — a magnum shell in a sawed-off barrel would be enough to make anyone or anything shy of both you and the implement. A dog with a snootful of scent and an eyeful of bird or bunny is going to pay slight attention to the shot that brings them together. Henceforth, the shot and the bagged game will be associated.

Now comes the question; what to do with the occasional dog that does become frightened of gunfire even under optimum conditions? The step in consideration of a program is to evaluate the quality and/or potential of the dog otherwise. Decide if the dog is worth the time and effort necessary. It is not a good analogy, perhaps, but we are sometimes faced with the decision to make a major repair on a car or to get another. The car may have other shortcomings which make the major effort ill-advised. Such a decision should be made objectively and, of course, in terms of the availability of opportunity to tackle the project. Curing a promising pup or the dog with which you're stuck because of family affection or just plain loyalty to a dog that has affection for you is quite possible. It may not be easy, however, and the task must be undertaken with patience and perseverance. If the dog is the intelligent, hypersensitive type and you make the grade, you won't regret the investment.

One old and tried method of curing gunshyness is the starvation system. The dog is offered its daily dish of food and a gun is fired just as the dog starts to eat. A moderate distance is advised, of course. The dog will probably leave its food and run to its retreat. The food is removed and presented again the next day. This continues until the dog is hungry enough to eat despite the gun shot. After the fifth or sixth day, if the dog is allowed to bolt a mouthful or two of food, it is likely that the meal will be

continued shot or no shot. The gun is then fired at subsequent mealtimes until the dog pays no attention to it.

I have my reservations about this method, especially the fact that it may have to continue until the dog's condition is such that it is vulnerable to disease. If necessary to carry it to extremes, it certainly leaves the dog in no condition to keep itself warm in cold weather if housed out of doors. Like any drastic cure, it must be tempered with reason.

Another method, which can be used by a good swimmer on a stable or unsinkable boat, is to take the dog a distance from shore and fire the gun. The dog may go overboard. If it does, let it swim for a while, then help it aboard. Doing everything else possible to instill confidence in the dog is essential. The hope is, of course, that the dog will, before too many shots, prefer to stay aboard in spite of the gun, just as the hungry dog will at some stage consider the sudden noise the lesser of two evils.

The treatment I like best is described by Dave Elliot in his book *Training Gun Dogs To Retrieve*. Dave had a very intelligent but sensitive Labrador bitch. She seemed to have everything else he could wish for in a prospect, but she was gunshy — and not just a little. He took her on a crow hunt and tied her securely in the blind. Crows came over and he shot them, one after another. She cringed and endeavored to escape from the situation while the birds, which she naturally wanted to retrieve, fell all around. Finally her interest in the birds won out and Dave let her retrieve. She soon learned to associate the opportunities to retrieve the falls with the sound of the gun.

There are other treatments used successfully, each with its merits, and a modification may be developed particularly to dog, circumstances and season. Tranquilizers, too, are now available to the sportsman-trainer, but they should be considered only with a veterinarian's counsel.

Patient, understanding application to the problem can turn the trick. I wish you luck. ■

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What do you think of the Regulations in reference to the leash?

Chap. 2, Sec. 3. . . . All exercises, except "Heel on Leash", "Stand for Examination" and "Tracking", shall be performed off leash.

In the Novice and Open Classes the dog may be put on leash or guided gently by the collar between exercises and to get it into proper position for the next exercise. In the Utility Class the dog shall not be put on leash or guided or controlled by the collar at any time, and the leash shall be left on the judge's table from the time the dog enters the ring until it leaves.

Sec. 7, Heel Free. . . . The leash shall be left on the judge's table for all work done in the "Heel Free" exercise.

I wonder what the judge would do if someone in Open asked for the leash after the "Heel Free", put the dog on leash to guide it into position for the "Retrieve on Flat" and between each of the succeeding exercises?

I have never witnessed such a performance, nor do I think that any Obedience minded person would do such a thing. However it is an interpretation quite logical from this wording. Surely when one reaches Open there is no need for the leash and it should be on the judge's table at this stage of the game. I think the Regulations and Standards mean that the dog may be guided gently by leash in the Novice, guided gently by the collar in Open, and that the collar may not be touched in Utility. I think that the wording should be changed to make this quite clear. What do you think?

Chap. 2, Sec. 4 except that both arms may be used simultaneously to call the dog in the Recall Exercises . . .

Any dictionary will prove that the word 'Recall' is misused in Obedience. However each sport has its own terminology and newcomers quickly adjust to the meanings. What I question in this portion of the Regulations and Standards is that which has been left unsaid. Anyone would logically assume that having trained the dog to come with the use of both arms in Novice or Open that this would apply to the call in the Signal Exercise in Utility. This is not permissible. The Board of the CKC interprets that this portion of the Signal Exercise is not a 'Recall' and only one

arm may be used. Why is this not included in the Rule Book?

The entry fee paid might be forfeited by the innocent action of using both arms for the judge could fail it under the use of a double signal in a principal feature. How embarrassing for someone to enter the ring for the first attempt to display his dog's prowess in Utility and be corrected on this point by the judge? Or even be the proud possessor of one or two legs towards this coveted degree and then be informed of your ignorance. This is quite possible, as I have seen some judges show complete amazement when this CKC interpretation is drawn to their attention.

READERS' COMMENTS

I think that the Regulations and Standards should cover the point in this section so that anyone who troubles himself to read them is aware of it from the first day he trains his dog to come in. It would need only a short clause inserted, and its omission could mean embarrassment or extra work in retraining. What do you think? Address your replies to *Dogs In Canada*.

... At one time I felt that, as CKC recognized all AKC-approved judges, the AKC should, in turn, recognize all CKC-approved judges; i.e. a reciprocal agreement.

This might have been feasible when the Obedience rules were on a par. Recent changes in Canadian rules, at least, would indicate that AKC-approved judges should probably write CKC examinations for all classes they wish to judge, to be sure they are familiar with any and all such changes. I do not believe they should be required to serve apprenticeship.

However, it is just possible that under such conditions, and as mentioned in "The Old Timer" re breed judges; only the 'professional' judge would take the exams, and those who have helped us most by staging training clinics in conjunction with judging assignments, and who are in great demand anyway, would not bother.

The club to which I belong owes its present success to the availability and helpfulness of American judges who officiated at some of our first trials. Without them these early trials would not have been financially possible. Now that Obedience has found its feet here, perhaps all clubs would do well to emulate the Sportsmen's Shows' panel of Obedience judges: 'think Canadian'.

Re the Broad Jump — "the handler will stand with his dog at the heel position in front of and within ten feet of the jump". I think that this specification "within ten feet" works a hardship on the heavy, long-bodied breeds, some of which find it difficult to gain enough momentum, in this short run up, to carry them over. Why not delete this and leave it to the handler's discretion, as in "retrieve over hurdle?"

CANADIAN SLED DOG

Raymond Thompson, executive editor of Outdoor Adventure Features, author and expert in fur trading, sled dogs and racing, writes about

THE saga of the Canadian Sled Dog is actually synonymous with the history of the white man in Canada. But for the sled dog much of the settlement of the Dominion as we know it today could well have been delayed over 200 years.

The raft, the canoe and later the steamboat, figured largely in early exploration in the north country, but they were only good for summer transportation. Since the Canadian North was first explored by white men pursuing the fur trade, the very

lifeline of this once stupendous business depended on the sled dog — the only source of power for winter travel and freighting.

As an example, let us consider one of the many fur trade routes, the main course and tributaries of the Saskatchewan River.

Rising in the Canadian Rockies from the very backbone of the Continental Divide, the great river pursues a tortuous course through Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

3 EXPERTS DISCUSS

1 PUPPY CARE AND FEEDING

By Betty Dickson, Ziska Kennels Reg'd., Dorchester, Ont., a Samoyed breeder of long standing in both Canada and England, and owner of the rarity, a champion Samoyed with a CD degree. Here she shares her proven feeding program.

All breeding kennel owners know, or should know, that proper feeding of the dam before and after mating is most essential to ensure a healthy litter of puppies, as these are fed through their dam.

Regarding weaning puppies, naturally owners differ but for Samoyeds, which I have been breeding both in England and Canada for over 35 years, here is our procedure at "Ziska". We do not like to "drain" the dam — so start weaning, or getting the pups to feed beginning of the fourth week, giving a good brand of baby food mixed with whole milk and a little good brand of meal, the consistency of gruel. I find that directly one puppy starts to lap, all the others follow and in a day or two are all lapping up well. At the beginning of the fifth week, pups are given less meals but extra quantity. At the end of the fifth week the dam is away from them completely, then the pups are given five meals daily consisting of the following:

1st meal at around 7.30 a.m. The meal is soaked in either broth, bovril and water mixed with raw hamburger and given the consistency of hamburger, never sloppy. Enough should be given for each pup to clean up in about 15 minutes. A few Milkbone biscuits can be put down for pups to chew on.

2nd meal, around 11.30. Same as first, with change from meat to cheap salmon

or any boneless fish and a little chopped vegetables, such as carrots, lettuce, left over peas, turnips; never potatoes or white bread.

3rd meal, around 4.30 Same as first with meat, raw for preference, not pork. A little beef suet given once a day is very good; no oily foods as they get this with the C.L. oil and malt. With each meal a dish of skim milk is given — as whole milk often gives pups diarrhea after being taken away from the dam.

4th meal, around 8 or 9, or earlier. These times can be altered to suit the home routine. Meal, soaked in water or broth with chopped hard-boiled egg, a little liver, (watch this, as liver does not agree with all puppies) and a little meat. Here we cook up quite a number of ox-tails with pearl barley and after bones are taken away and the fat skimmed off. Mix this with the meal, for variation.

5th meal. If just one puppy, give a good hard bone to chew, and small helping of dry kibbled biscuit, ample fresh cold water at all times. If a number of pups, advise leaving out the bone — just give the dry kibble.

The pups are given five meals daily until the 8th week then four until 12 to 14 weeks. Then we advise, (and give) three meals daily until six months, then reduce to two meals daily until one year,

2 TIPS ON SELLING

Mrs. Romaine Jones, Igloo is a well-known Samoyed breeder. Here is her unorthodox and successful way of selling Sam pups.

Years ago, as a novice breeder, I used to spend time and energy trying to convince a prospective buyer that there was no breed of dog like a Samoyed.

I sold lots of pups but also received lots of frantic phone calls from new owners. The result? A guilt complex that was a cross to bear. Today, older and wiser, I take the direct approach and the phone calls have ceased. The sales pitch goes like this and for results it can't be improved on as my books will show.

"Man, don't buy a Sam. He is disobedient by instinct. He is smarter than you are. He will not be subservient to you but will meet you half-way if he thinks there is good reason for doing so. Every time you leave a door open he will get out and run and you will spend the next two hours chasing him. When you catch him and start to give him the business he will laugh in your face. If you don't leave the door open he will pretty soon find out how to manage the door-opening process for himself.

"In desperation you will build a run that is foolproof. Overnight your Sam will turn into a mountain goat and start climbing! Before he is six months old you and your wife will stop talking in front of him and start spelling. Before you know it he knows what you mean when you spell W-A-L-K, C-A-N-D-Y and S-U-P-P-E-R. So then you spell

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P-R-O-M-E-N-A-D-E, S-W-E-E-T-S and D-I-N-N-E-R. He's no fool. That only works for the next week. When the both of you close a door with the dog on the other side so you can speak to each other in peace you realize that the time has come to take steps but just what they are you won't know until you are on your third Sam.

"If you wear dark business suits and your wife looks chic in black pitch the whole lot and go in for greys and beiges. The same applies to all your broadloom. Get rid of it. Lay new broadloom throughout the house in pastel shades otherwise the white hair will send you around the bend.

"When you leave the dog at home and go somewhere in your car don't be surprised to come home to utter destruction. Your Sam will teach you to leave him behind. He will chew the stuffings out of your favourite chair, the brim off your best fedora and the hell out of your thirty dollar Dack's shoes. He'll ignore your sneakers. What do you mean, is there anything good about the dog?

"He'll die for you, if necessary. What more do you want?"

Well, there is more, much more. A dog that seems to be smiling at you regardless of your mood, so proud of his appearance you're doubly proud to own him, a real dog — all dog.

When judging Samoyeds, as with other breeds, my first consideration is the over-all impression the dog makes. Does he present a pleasing picture of balance, soundness, breed character and fitness for the work for which he was originally intended? In order to determine these qualities, there are many things to be taken into consideration.

First, he should be within, or near, the Standard in size, 21 to 23½ inches at the shoulder in dogs, and 19 to 21 inches in bitches, and must have proper bone in proportion to size. An over-size, too heavy-boned dog would be useless in harness, as he would soon tire, and an under-sized, too light-boned dog would not have the pulling power necessary for a good sled dog.

The coat is important, not only from an aesthetic point of view, but also from the practical, as the Samoyed is primarily a Northern dog, capable of withstanding the most severe cold. The undercoat must be thick, soft and dense, with profuse off-standing outer coat.

Most important of all, he must have proper bone structure, for no dog can move well which is not properly put together. The front legs must be straight, with toes turning neither in nor out; the shoulders must be tight, with good lay-back, the elbows close to body; chest deep, ribs well-sprung; back level and good rear angulation, and, of course, no

sign of cow-hocks. If the dog can measure up in these requirements, then he will have the proper flowing, easy gait, free from any paddling, weaving or choppiness.

Head, expression and tail carriage are also important. There is nothing more pleasing to the eye than the typical "Sammy" expression, keen, alert, interested and friendly. The tail carried curved over the back adds the finish to the beauty of the dog.

There are several faults which one encounters in the ring. The Standard states that the foot should be "flattish", but too often one finds shallow, splay feet. The foot is extremely important in a working dog, and I urge breeders to make a definite effort to improve feet on the breed. Another fault seen too often is lack of angulation, both front and rear. That is, straight shoulders and straight stifles and hocks. Double-jointed hocks should bar a dog from the ring, but I have seen many!

Character and temperament are extremely important. I believe that any over-aggressiveness toward other dogs, or, on the other hand, shyness, should be severely penalized.

When you see a specimen that closely meets with the Standard, you'll recognize a Samoyed at his best — and there are few dogs to match a gleaming white, near-perfect Sam.

SLED DOG SPECIALTY

When a show dog judge is commended by skeptical sled dog racing men on his assessment of sled dogs, that is real judging. The compliment fell to Judge Stan Whitmore at the Second Annual Sled Dog Specialty Show held at Ste. Agathe des Monts, January 26, by the Laurentian Sled Dog Club, Inc. A well-known Working Dog judge, Mr. Whitmore had never before assessed dogs in the ring who also worked on a team. "He called it absolutely right," was the popular statement.

The show was held in the ballroom of the Vermont Hotel

where spectators sat around tables in cabaret fashion while outside snow fell upon deep snow.

A total of 28 dogs were entered; four Alaskan Malamutes, 13 Samoyeds, 11 Siberian Huskies.

Handler Lorna Jackson had a few moments of worry when just prior to the show some town dogs jumped Mala-Nor's Nordic's Joy, Malamute, inflicting a deep gash in the foot which bled copiously. A tight bandage enabled her to compete. Considering that most of the entrants were outdoor kennel dogs who had never before appeared in a warm crowded room they showed unexpectedly well.

Here is the story of an amazing club, formed just a year ago under great difficulties, yet training scores of dogs and gladdening lives of unfortunate children — as told by Mrs. J. C. Proctor

north york obedience story



The North York Obedience Club was formed by Mrs. Grace Probert and Miss Peggy Thompson after much careful thought and deliberation.

For approximately two years, several members of the Ontario Obedience Association had encouraged and pinned their hopes on Mrs. Probert to organize a club in Toronto as there was no group of this type in the Metropolitan area. This in itself was a big task but to a person like Grace Probert, who has only a dog's potentialities, its heart and soul in mind, this was a great challenge.

After much leg work and long hours of fact finding, she attempted to negotiate with several authorities to gain recognition or at least acknowledge this club, which led to no avail. Grace then held a meeting with K. Jensen and P. Thompson which led to the formation of the club.

There were many who said it could not be done, others said that it simply would not work out. Pessimistic they may have been, but not the old originals. All funds to start the club were obtained through Grace's previous training of dogs and their handlers.

The Club was inaugurated May 8, 1961, with 20 interested persons attending. A constitution was drawn up with the necessary assistance from the Ontario Obedience Association, which the club gratefully acknowledges. The aims of the club are as follows:

1. To be of service to the community by offering, at a nominal charge, obedience classes for all breeds of dogs.
2. To assist individuals with training problems and to give advice on the training of dogs.
3. To have ready at all times dogs which are trained in demonstration routines.
4. To hold Obedience Trials under C.K.C. rules.
5. To uphold and respect the by-laws of the C.K.C.

6. To encourage persons buying a dog to purchase only one that is purebred.
7. To donate a portion of the profits of the club to the Metropolitan Association for Retarded Children, the percentage to be decided by the general membership.

From this meagre beginning, how has the North York Obedience Club progressed and how have these aims been carried out? Let's take a look at the record.

First of all, some 50 dogs have been trained in three ten-week classes from May 61 to November 61 with the classes being held at the Finchurst Shopping Plaza, Willowdale, through the courtesy of their directors. Each class had its own graduation with all the trimmings of a regular trial. Participating judges at these three graduations were Mr. Clarke Diamond, Mrs. A. Langford and Mrs. H. Lang. Diplomas and trophies were awarded where a qualifying score was earned, as put down by the C.K.C. rules and regulations governing a trial. The last class showed how competent our trainers had become as five out of 11 trainees earned qualifying scores of 194, 188, 188, 183, 171. Three trophies were given by the club for the Best Performance, Best Handler and Greatest Improvement. Ribbons were given to fourth place in the class.

During training, any problems which arose were gladly talked over and individual attention given. Extra training sessions for anyone who cared to go and work out their problems were given by Mrs. Probert on Sunday mornings at the park on Finch. Trainers at these beginner classes were P. Thompson, D. Shepherd and G. Probert, all of whom gave freely of their time and received no gratuities. All monies obtained for training were turned over to club funds. During the third session of training for '61 a repeater class was formed for past classes

to brush up on the work they had already learned. This class was under the capable hands of Mr. Frank McPherson.

The demonstration team is truly one aim the N.Y.O.C. has at heart, but having had heartbreaking experiences at trying to obtain suitable quarters in which to train through the winter months, we have had to postpone all thoughts of a demonstration team until we can at least get some type of indoor facilities. The club is equipped with insurance to protect dogs and property. Quarters would be kept clean as these dogs are kept under control at all times. This is one very strict rule of the club. It is imperative for the club's future success that at least 3000 sq. ft., at a nominal cost, be obtained.

We are not yet advanced enough to hold trials licensed by C.K.C. but we have managed to hold three matinee shows and a mock trial all according to C.K.C. rulings, all of which were well attended and enjoyed thoroughly by spectators and participants.

The N.Y.O.C. is a Dog's League of Nations. Attending classes we had representatives from many breeds, too numerous to mention, but we had them all, the long, the short and the tall.

The Willowdale School for Retarded Children has been presented with an aquarium, on a pedestal, already equipped with tropical fish. It is hoped that in the very near future we will be able to present the school with enough books to start their library.

From the initial beginning the N.Y.O.C. has grown to a membership of 51 and more memberships are forthcoming at the time of writing.

Almost every member takes an active part in the club and its activities. Each newcomer is now going to be asked to assist on a particular committee so that

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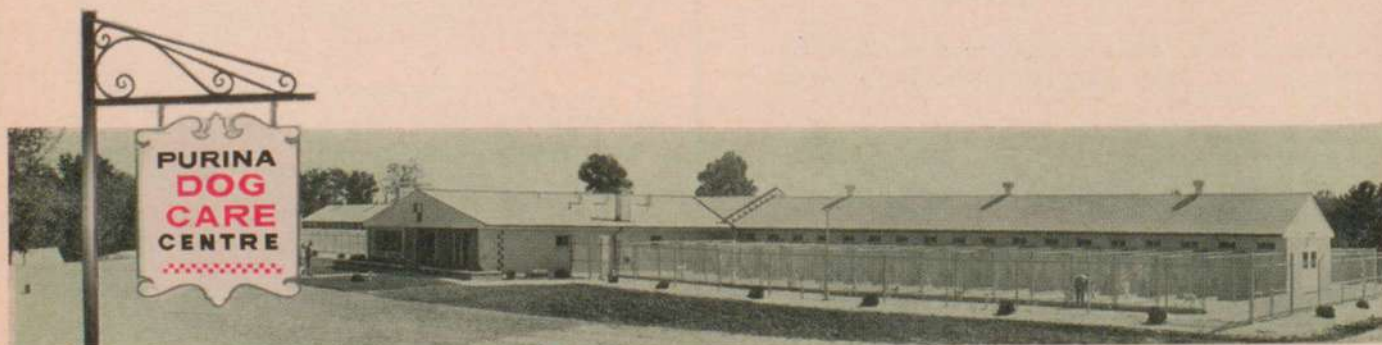

- (3) approve the application of the Grand River Beagle Club to hold a brace trial at Arthur, Ont. on May 12th-13th;

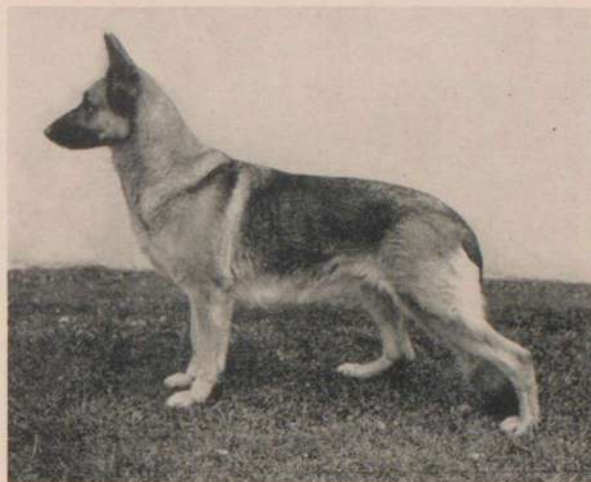

there are a lot of good amendments that would never see the light of day if this suggested procedure is adopted.

"Mind you, I'm sympathetic to the directors. In times past the referendum ballot used to be loaded with stupid amendments, many of them proposed by comparative newcomers to the dog game. To get these amendments before the membership and to tabulate the results costs money. But in my opinion the situation is not now nearly as bad as it was. The division of membership a few years ago between associate and ordinary members insured that no one would have full privileges before they were in the dog game as associate members at least three years. With that number of years behind them proposers of amendments are not nearly as likely to come up with hare-brained ideas born of enthusiasm

and lack of experience.

"No, I think that the result of an amendment such as this would be that for all practical purposes the only people who could propose amendments would be members of the C.K.C. directorate. That I'm opposed to because I'm convinced that in a democracy all should have the same rights. And if a person has been a member of the C.K.C. long enough to become an ordinary member I say it should be made easy for him to propose amendments—providing he can get a sufficient number of other C.K.C. members to second his proposal.

"Sure you'll get silly amendments. But if a member wants to propose that all white Poodles come into the ring with red-laquered toenails that's his right. The common sense of the majority will insure it never becomes law."

when one good meal of meat, biscuit and drink of either whole or skim milk is given, at around 6.30 p.m.

Times change with the seasons, also the quantity of feed is increased when the number is decreased. In colder months we give more fresh meat than biscuit, the fresh red meat giving the warmth they need.

Puppies should never be allowed to lie around damp. At "Ziska" all the sleeping quarters are three or four inches deep in cedar shavings. This not only soaks up any superfluous water the pups may pick up while playing out in the runs after rain or snow, but keeps them very clean.

If possible, keep the feedings at regular times. This helps both dogs and owners.

We do not let a puppy go to its new home till between eight and nine weeks. By that time it has been wormed properly and inoculated permanently against distemper and hepatitis, though we do suggest a booster shot at six months or sooner, if around a number of other dogs. As we have "Ziska" Sams in every province in Canada, we send a similar diet and advice with each pup or adult, but as pups differ in their likes and dislikes, we suggest "watch and learn". We are still watching and learning.

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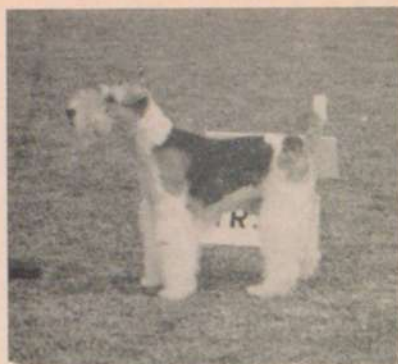
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huskies outrun crossbreds

Dr. Lombard won again at Maniwaki and then left for Alaska and the Sweepstakes at Fairbanks. Keith Bryar was second and Paul Jordan third — the persistent triumverate.

As always at Maniwaki, Donnie McFaul held open house at his Seppala kennels with drivers from all parts of Eastern Canada and the States dropping in to the tack room for sessions around the Quebec heater, to discuss the pros and cons of line-breeding versus in-breeding, conformation versus "heart" and as always, it boiled down to "heart", that indefinable quality that separates the men from the boys in the Husky breeds.

Three trucks left Maniwaki via Senneterre for Chibougamau across the winter road. Chibougamau is not too far from the Southern tip of James Bay and can be reached by canoe after the ice moves out of the lakes and rivers at the end of June or by plane and bush pilot. This is Quebec's largest northern town and boasts a population of 9,000 hardy souls who face life with the spirit and vision of the frontiersmen. 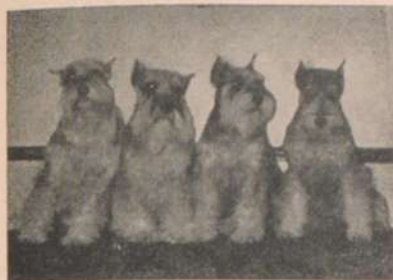

... Re eligibility of Obedience judges: use only Canadian judges. There are few instances now where it is desirable to use American judges.

In Western Canada a few years ago it was a financial necessity to have Americans judge the trials. At one time the nearest Canadian judge was at Edmonton, a distance of roughly 900 miles. American judges were available in Duluth or Minneapolis, 200 miles and 450 miles from Winnipeg.

With the exception of the Bermuda trials, all Obedience judges in 1961 were Canadians. . . . I note the Sportsmen's Show again has Canadian Obedience judges.

It would be wise to have judges write the examination before their first trial in Canada, but no restriction should be placed on those who have already judged here and proved their worth. Trial committees choose the judges and it is up to them to obtain the best. One sure solution is to get a Canadian who has passed the rigid requirements of the CKC.

... Only the handler should handle or interfere with the placing of articles used in Obedience Trials, once an exercise has begun (allowing for Scent Discrimination). How can a judge decide whether the handler would throw better under ordinary circumstances? What if

the dog only noticed the throw when the judge moved the dumbbell? A dog should be accustomed to returning from any position to allow for such incidents. The judge is required to mark dogs' and handlers' actions *at the time*.

There are times when the judge would re-direct the handler, i.e. when he fluffs a right, left, or about turn. Would he go over and loosen the leash if he thought the dog would be marked for tight leash and he didn't think the handler would do it under ordinary circumstances? Why would he move the dumbbell in case the dog went around the jump?

Re judging exuberant dogs' work . . . if there were a few slightly crooked sits, how can one judge dock heavily at an average of 1/2 point off per sit, as is usual? . . . If a handler can bring a dog up to the high standard (of Utility) he should be able to slow the dog to perfect the sits. The second judge would be correct in not deducting too heavily if the sits were only slightly crooked. The fact that it was so gay should not cancel out other mistakes . . . I agree that a plus should not be given for willingness and happiness as (this) is stipulated . . . Can a dour-faced, businesslike Bulldog, even though a fast and precise worker, show the same gaiety as a prancing Sheltie? What about actual tail-set? . . . Give them all careful consideration before making snap judgments.

Early Hudson Bay Companies established on the Saskatchewan Cumberland House and Forts nearer the river's source, at Edmonton, and Fort Saskatchewan. The thousand upon thousands of square miles of territory between the Canadian Rockies and Hudson Bay were accessible to the trappers and fur traders all year 'round' because of the sled dog.

Today, the sled dog has been, to a great extent, replaced by the airplane. The use of dogs on northern traplines has been further curtailed by the continuing low prices paid for even the finest of Canadian raw furs. Where once the silver fox, the fisher and the marten were readily exchanged for sizeable amounts of foods or trade goods, now these choice furs are sadly neglected at fur auction sales. The staple furs like the beaver, mink, and muskrat, still sell in sizeable quantities, but the airplane is frequently used to fly trappers and their supplies right into the heart of the trapping territory.

This amazing change has taken place within the lifetime of fairly young persons.

As recently as 1928, Professor S. Hadwen, of the University of Saskatchewan, published a summary of his years of study of "The Sled Dogs of the North Country" from which we quote — courtesy of the *Saskatoon Daily Star* in which the summary appeared —

"The main purpose of this article," Professor Hadwen wrote, "is to encourage the breeding of northern dogs — not from the point of view of the dog fancier — but from the utility standpoint; and also to try and discourage the promiscuous introduction of alien blood into such a useful animal as the Husky. The Eskimo, or Husky, is a dog who has followed his master through all the hardships of the north. He has lived on short commons and sheltered like a wild animal, so that he has survived owing to his fitness. The writer advocates the introduction of the Siberian dog, not so much as a work dog — because he is smaller than the Husky — but for the use of travellers, the police and others who desire to move rapidly from place to place."

The amazing inference in the quotation from Prof. Hadwen is his fear that the native sled dog was fast losing his identity, and hence his usefulness, "through the introduction of alien blood into such a useful animal as the Husky."

During the period when Professor Hadwen was making his study of the Northern Sled dog, this writer was engaged in the fur trade and trapper supply business with headquarters in Edmonton. I had also owned and operated small trading posts on the Athabasca

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ca River and its tributaries. Thus I can, from experience, assess Professor Hadwen's observations, and on the score of Husky deterioration as a breed of sled dogs, heartily agree with the Professor.

I often saw trappers and fur buyers outfitting in Edmonton and knew that many "alien dogs" were taken into the Northwest Territory, and on into the Arctic regions. That these dogs should be cross-bred to dogs already in the north was inevitable. And now that the need for good sled dogs has greatly declined during the past few decades, the survival of the native dog of the north is indeed a matter of concern. I for one regret that I did not join the very few champions of the Arctic dog years ago.

Professor Hadwen's description of the northern sled dog is most interesting. In particular it points up the fact that considerable confusion existed, even among so-called authorities, relating to the difference between the Malamute (Alaska), the Eskimo dog (Canada) and the Samoyed and Siberian (Husky) from Siberia.

Under the title "the Eskimo Dog — Huskies or Malamute" Professor Hadwen wrote:

"Malamutes, as they are usually called in Alaska, are unfortunately now a mixed breed. It is not easy to find dogs along Bering Sea which do not show traces of hound or other breeds of dogs, and as one goes south towards the Yukon, it gets worse or better, according to individual taste. There are dogs there, generally speaking, larger and there is an evident admixture of heavy breeds. In some parts of Canada, the Husky has remained somewhat purer than he is in Alaska because in such districts there have not been gold rushes or other influxes of white men. In Labrador, the writer saw several good Huskies, and from reports he has received, there are probably plenty of good dogs round Hudson Bay.

"The Husky may be described as a good sized hardy dog of 75 pounds or over with prick ears and a good rough coat running to greys with yellow, white and brown, generally with black along the back. His feet are good, generally round and he stands well up on his toes. In some cases, the foot is longer, but usually it is compact and well furred between the toes.

"A dog with an open flat foot is inclined to pick up snow and to ball so that an open foot is a very bad fault. The Husky is heavy in the quarters and has a good pair of shoulders, but his neck is rather short as a rule. The curve of the flank is not great. He is a strong long distance dog, and not built for speed. Generally, he is a good-natured dog and is seldom vicious; his voice is high pitched and he delights in howling. When a Husky is approached, he will often raise his head and howl or gurgle a greeting which is meant in a friendly spirit. It is evident that the wolf has interbred with the Husky, and in 1921, along the Yukon, there were several teams of half breeds and of

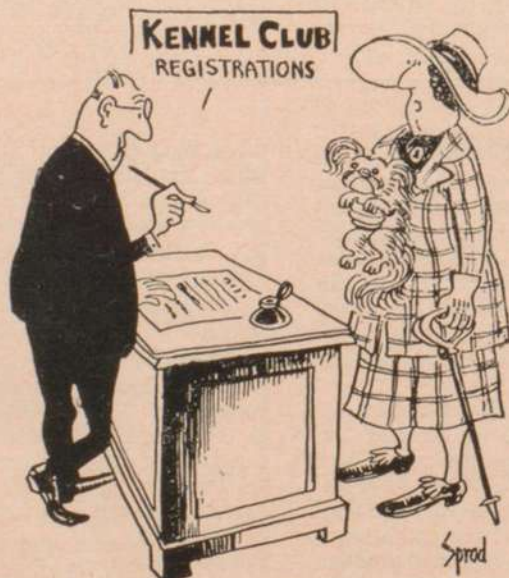

MOST POPULAR BREEDS

Poodles again topped the list of registrations with the American Kennel Club in 1961. Beagles held second place in popularity while Dachshunds rose from fourth place in 1960 to third last year. Chihuahuas placed fourth with German Shepherds remaining in fifth place. Pekingese again rated the sixth most popular breed, while Collies moved up from eighth place in 1960 to seventh in 1961. Cocker Spaniels exchanged position to become the eighth most registered. Boston Terriers moved up to ninth place as did Pomeranians, while the Boxer moved down from ninth to tenth place and Basset Hounds climbed to 11th from 12th place. Fox Terriers moved up one notch, while Labrador Retrievers and Miniature Schnauzers climbed two places, the latter now the 14th most registered breed.

Among noticeable increases: Miniature Pinschers, which moved from 28th position in 1960 to 22nd last year, Great Pyrenees up nine, Maltese Terriers gaining eight positions, Borzois up seven places, Vizsla six places, Keeshonden five, Bloodhounds, Standard Schnauzers, Whippets, Basenjis and Old English Sheepdogs up four, Alaskan Malamutes, English Cocker Spaniels, Pointers and Lhasa Apsos up three.

While comparative figures for Canadian breed registrations are not available at the time of writing, the trend follows so closely that the above placings will serve as a guide to breed popularity in this country.

DOGS MAKE STRANGE NEWS

A young female Bloodhound in Withamsville, Ohio, became the object of a search in the midst of her training to hunt missing people. State Highway Patrolman N. C. Ward had to ask for help in locating the six-months-old wanderer whose scent skill did not bring her home.

In Doncaster, England, Butch, a dog who just can't shake the cigarette habit, has been banned from smoking in taverns. He spits out butts and has become a fire hazard.

Dog catchers in the Hamilton, Ont. suburb of Stoney Creek and surrounding township have found a way to catch up with dogs that previously out-galloped them. Dog-catcher R. G. Dastous has been equipped with a rifle that fires tranquilizer-loaded darts into the dog's rear end. Theoretically dogs thus compelled to stop will stay stopped for two hours. But the science of this is that the right sized dart must be used for the right dog.

At Sudbury, Ont., three district Humane Society employees were suspended on grounds of funds improperly handled. One of the men, a kennelman, had to be reinstated a few days later — there was no one to look after the animals.

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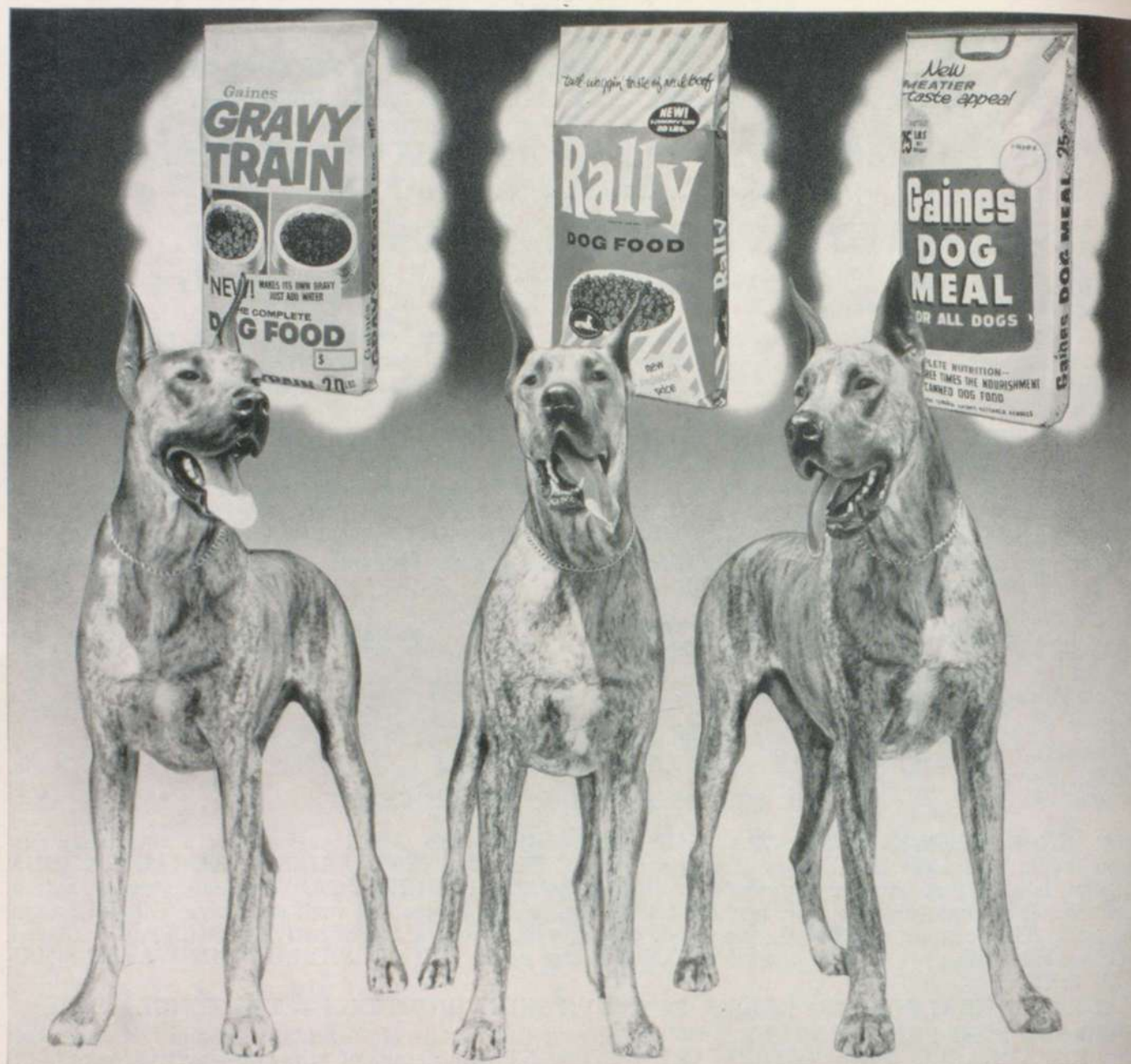
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
