People envision them, nose to the ground, giving chase to an escaped criminal or runaway slave; then at the edge of a swamp or cliff the man is cornered and the hounds close in, fangs showing, in savage snarls. Until we can get this across to the general public, I say keep some of the shyness in the Bloodhounds.

This was our first year of showing dogs in Canada and we found the Canadian judges very understanding about this trait in the Bloodhound. I might also add that it won't be our last year of showing in Canada. We hope that the Dakota Bloodhounds will continue to grace the show rings of our neighbors to the North for many years.

TWO TYPES OF SLED DOGS

Would like to say something about sled dogs as there seems to be some confusion in the ranks on this subject. Today we have two types of sled dogs — those who race and those who work. The working dogs pull for fun or for their food. My only experience with working Samoyeds has been with my own dogs. Some of them are good and some of them are useless. Size, shape and pedigree have no bearing on the subject; and I quote, "it's not what they can pull, it's what they WILL pull."

On Jan. 23rd I marked 190 racing dogs here at Sutton. All these dogs were in the top teams in North American competition. (Alaska was represented by Gerry Riley, an Eskimo boy who is their best contender). Next week-end at Ste. Agathe there will be 250 dogs to mark. Each of these dogs is hand-picked for speed, stamina and desire. These racing dogs run against the clock and a team of 11 to 13 dogs pulls one man and one light-weight sled. They average 16 to 18 miles per hour over a 20 mile course — including mountain terrain — which means they are, without doubt, the greatest dogs in the world to run at top speed without a rest. (The Greyhound runs less than a mile and the Sporting breeds can pace themselves in the field).

I hate to be a spoil-sport or to disillusion anyone but after having been joed into this "marking" job for the past several years I've come to the conclusion that few people have seen as many really bad specimens — conformation wise — as I've seen, unless it's the All-rounder on a circuit! These dogs are in at the shoulder, out at the shoulder, cow-hawked, weak-backed, long-legged, short-legged, long-footed, cat-footed, small, medium or large — you name it! I also see dogs that I would pay BIG money to own. They could go Best-in-Show without any effort. Size

and Conformation have nothing to do with any given dog's ability to PRODUCE when the chips are down.

We breeders have spent years trying to produce good dogs and the emphasis has been on TYPE and CONFORMATION. We have lost sight of the fact that TEMPERAMENT, HEART and DESIRE are 50% of a dog.

TOM HUGHES' COLUMN

The column of Mr. Tom Hughes is one of the most valuable parts of *Dogs in Canada*. Because I have faith in his essential humanity, respect his intelligence and do not wish in any way to reduce the effectiveness of his continuing contribution to the welfare of dogs and the interests of their owners, I hesitate to write this letter. However, people are as important as dogs and must be protected from indiscriminate classification.

I was shocked and disappointed to read Mr. Hughes' emotional outburst on page 46 of the February '65 issue. "In my experience . . . both British Columbia and Ontario . . . not the average Canadian or British immigrant . . . guilty of abominable behaviour. The nationality . . . involved is the Italian . . . the average Italian . . . the incredible behaviour of . . . so called 'sportsmen' . . . the irresponsible element . . . (lack of) courtesy and consideration . . . lunatics who are capable of shooting dogs . . . idiot . . . coward in the bargain . . . simply not fit to own, possess or have anything to do with a dog."

How does one calculate the average of a group numbering hundreds of thousands of individuals and spread over the Canadian land area, the second largest in the world. Surely not from personal experiences. It is incredible that in this modern age we still question the privilege of Canadian citizens, of Italian or any other antecedents, to be referred to as British citizens of Canadian nationality. I expect that Mr. Hughes did not intend to provide fuel for the fires of bigotry. It is irresponsible and inconsiderate to associate such profusion of negative criticism with any generic label as broad and meaningless as "Italian". It is a potential smear of the fifth largest population group in Canada and of a nation equal in numbers to Britain, approximately 50 million. We are careful not to refer to Irish Hounds as vicious dogs simply because we know of cases. Let us be just as thoughtful with regard to people.

FROM THE EDITOR

WHAT could be more fitting! A breeder of Kerry Blue Terriers has won the Eileen McEachren Memorial Award. Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Gardiner of Orono, Ont. were made the recipients of this award at the Sportsmen's Show Toronto, March 20. The story appears elsewhere in this issue.

For the past three years this handsome trophy, honoring the memory of Mrs. Eileen McEachren, world-renowned breeder of Kerry Blue Terriers and "ambassador at large" in promoting goodwill for Canadian dogdom, has acclaimed a Canadian breeder.

The trophy was awarded to the Canadian breeder who had bred the

greatest number of dogs, in any one breed, which completed their Canadian conformation Championship during the preceding calendar year — regardless of who owned or showed the dogs. Championship points were not required to have been acquired in their entirety during the year in which the Championship was completed. In the case of a tie, the trophy was awarded to the breeder whose Champions earned the highest aggregate number of three point wins (or better) during the period each Champion was campaigned to his championship.

The compilation of these records was a gigantic task. No less than 1,004 dogs attained their championship during 1964. The records are based on The Canadian Kennel Club's published list of "New Titles Granted". It is becoming more difficult, from these lists, to trace the breeder

of these new champions as the information required to seek out the breeder is not in our possession. With the facilities at our disposal the problem involved in maintaining this particular award have proven to be practically insurmountable.

Therefore, after lengthy consideration, this award in its present form being terminated.

However, the Eileen McEachren Memorial Trophy will continue to honor a Canadian every year. The Canadian will be the man or woman who, in the eyes of the majority of other members of the Canadian dog fancy, has contributed the most to Canadian dogdom.

The basis on which this award to be made will be outlined in a forthcoming issue.

the old timer

"What would you think," said the Old Timer, "of a school that in half a dozen short years turned a failure rate of better than 90% into a record in which more than 90% of the students graduated and went on to do a useful job in society?"

"I'd say the age of miracles is not past," I answered, "but what brings that up?"

"This," he said, picking up a book. "It's by Clarence Pfaffenberger, vice president of Guide Dogs for the Blind at San Rafael, Calif., and it tells what his organization, working in co-operation with psychologists at the Roscoe B. Jackson Memorial Laboratory, at Bar Harbor, Maine, have learned about what makes dogs behave as they do. It's almost incredible, but when you take into account that what they have learned has resulted from observing literally hundreds and hundreds of puppies then I, for one, have to take what they say as fact."

I made no wisecracks. Obviously the Old Timer had been impressed and it was no time to be facetious. So I waited.

"For instance," he said, "did you know that the first 16 weeks of a puppy's lifetime can shape that puppy's character for all time — can make him either a confident, gay companion, a quarrelsome brute or a slinking coward — and if he becomes either of the last two in the first 16 weeks the likelihood of him ever becoming a well adjusted house pet is pretty remote."

I admitted that this was news to me.

"And did you know that those 16 weeks are divided into four very definite periods and despite the breed what happens in those periods is practically identical and will have a lasting effect on the dog's character?"

I again admitted ignorance.

"Tell me," I said.

The Old Timer reached for his pipe, filled it and lighted it carefully. "First," he said, get this. This book is not talking about theories. It's fact gained from months and years of work with hundreds and hundreds of puppies. The knowledge acquired has resulted in better than nine out of ten puppies picked at 12 weeks of age graduating to become guide dogs for the blind. Before the research started the success rate was about one of ten.

"Have you ever," he asked, "at-

tached any particular significance to the 21st day of a puppy's life?"

I said I hadn't.

"Don't feel badly," he said, "neither have I. But this book proves to my satisfaction that for the first 20 days of a puppy's life it's almost a vegetable. They proved this by attaching brain wave machines to the puppy and then trying to stimulate it to show a mental reaction. They gave electric shocks. They dropped pot lids. They handled the puppy. The machine showed practically no reaction."

"But on the 21st day — a miracle. With the same sort of thing the machine showed a strong, positive reaction. As the book says, for the first 20 days the puppy was like a house with the wiring installed but the switch not pulled. And then on the 21st day the current flows through and the lights go on. And this happened with hundreds of puppies, regardless of the breed and almost invariably on the 21st day — although there was some slight variation — a matter of hours between puppies carried for the full 63 day gestation period and those born four days early."

"The next seven days — from the 21st to the 28th — the researchers consider the most critical in puppyhood. It must stay close to its mother during this period. It definitely must not be weaned. But its training can commence by association with humans. The puppy can learn simple things and the researchers believe that what the puppy learns in those seven days are not easily forgotten."

"And then come three more weeks — up to the end of the seventh week — that are pretty important. While the puppy should stay with its mother and its litter mates during this period, to learn to socialize with other dogs, it should be getting a fair dose of human association, although humans should be introduced gradually."

"And here's an amazing thing — they've discovered that puppies taken from the litter before the end of seven weeks are frequently the dogs that pick fights with other dogs and it's difficult, sometimes impossible, to get them over it. They just haven't learned to live with dogs."

"But again, at seven weeks, a new critical stage develops. The puppy at this age should be separated from the mother and from the litter mates. Indeed this is the best time for the puppy to go to a new home. The brain is mature. It's capable of being trained — although the training should be through play and not too arduous. For if the litter is left together the most dominant dog is apt to become a bully — the least aggressive a permanent underdog."

"Indeed they have found that not one puppy permitted to grow to adulthood with its mother could be trained as a guide dog and if two litter mates were raised together only one was trainable."

HUMANELY "SPEAKING"

I am continuously asked to agree that I am a "dog lover". Just as frequently I shock or shatter the enquirer by replying that I do not 'love' dogs and that I feel that the emotion we call love is not the right way to describe my feelings for dogs and, for that matter, other animals.

I agree that some dogs are able to arouse great affection on my part but this doesn't and can't mean that I must therefore necessarily love all dogs.

I have had various degrees of experience of countless thousands of dogs. Dogs of all breeds, both sexes, every shape, color and temperament. Like people, there are nice dogs, happy dogs, miserable dogs, mean dogs, rough dogs, gentle dogs, thoroughly bad and vicious dogs and wonderful, perfect dogs that are a privilege to even know. If you happen to own or, rather, be owned by, such a dog, then you are indeed a truly fortunate person. I hope that you realize just how lucky and fortunate you are.

But luck only plays a minor part. True, picking a puppy is almost entirely a matter of luck. Even the most experienced breeders can, and all too often do, make a mistake and pick the wrong pup to keep for themselves, or sell the future champion as a "reject". However once the choice has been made the die is cast. Whatever the future holds is entirely the responsibility of the owner and/or trainer. Whatever the dog turns out to be it is the result of the actions and thoughts of the handler and owner.

A dog invariably reflects the character of the person who moulds the character of the dog. So if you happen to own a dog that is "unreliable" it probably means that you, dear reader, are a bit that way yourself. Since every dog begins as a small gentle puppy that doesn't have a mean bone in its body and certainly nothing bad in its mind, it follows that if you turn out a vicious dog you have made the dog vicious and that can only mean that you have been rough or even brutal to the dog. And you deserve

everything you get! In fact, bad luck to you. Unfortunately what will probably happen is that eventually your dog will get damn good and tired of putting up with your rough handling and will give you exactly what you deserve, a bunch of teeth in your backside. I say "unfortunately" because you will then scream to high heaven that the poor dog is "out of hand" or "untrainable" and you will either try to unload the animal on to some unsuspecting person or, if you have more ethics than that, you will give it away, probably to some animal shelter.

But, and this is the big BUT, will you remember to tell the overworked, over-abused staff at the Shelter that the animal is capable of biting or will you lie like a trooper and say that it's a complete paragon of virtue? It's amazing how many people who surrender their dogs to animal shelters suffer from complete loss of memory about the faults of their unwanted pets. And the staff at these Shelters have to take you at your face value. Worse still they have to tell the prospective future owner of your pet that the "previous owner said it had no faults at all". You can well imagine what happens in all too many cases. No wonder so many people become annoyed at the SPCA or Humane Society for having "misled" them. And this explains why so many dogs, once they have been ruined by the bad owner, spend the last few months of their lives on a vicious circle between the animal shelter and various new "homes". The circle has only one end; humane destruction. How much more humane if the original owner would be honest at the very beginning and admit the fault of the dog.

But this would mean admitting his or her own faults and shortcomings.

So when people ask me to confirm that I do indeed "love dogs" I must be honest and reply that I do not! If I have the time I explain my reasons; quite often I don't either have the time or the opportunity to explain. Which is one reason for this article.

I respect and admire dogs in general and I have varying degrees of fondness or affection for some dogs. And occasionally I am fortunate enough to have a dog that gives me every ounce of affection that he or she is capable of and a companionship which is priceless.

Even the hardened old professional kennel man, who is generally pretty cynical, will sooner or later admit that some particular dog or another is "something special". He will probably refuse to be sentimental about the dog and will content himself by saying that the dog, "would talk, if he could".

Thank heavens a dog can't talk. What a shock so many of us would get if they could. Except for that special dog. He would probably say "Gee, I think you're pretty wonderful" — and mean it!

"The next critical period lasts to the twelfth week," said the Old Timer. "It's the time when the human relationship should be set up strongly. The institute has found that at no time is the dog so receptive to training. It can be taught to heel, to fetch, to come, to sit and to stay and the lessons learned during this period are never forgotten. But the discipline, while there, must be easy. There must be no punishment."

"Then at 12 weeks the puppies are sent out into private homes — to members of 4H Clubs who give the dogs the home and family atmosphere that is needed and who carry on with the training. They consider this separation most important for they have found that puppies which stay with litter mates or the dam up to only 16 weeks, while trainable, never quite catch up with those sent out into private homes."

"And the opposite side of the picture?" I asked.

"Oh they've had their control groups," said the Old Timer. "They've kept puppies isolated until their twelfth week. When humans approached, the puppies cowered and huddled together. With maximum individual care and attention after that time they made some adjustment but the chance of them becoming confident dogs is pretty remote."

"And with this knowledge they turned a failure rate of 90% into a success figure of the same ratio?" I asked.

"Basically that," said the Old Timer, "but they also improved their stock. They selected sires and dams carefully. They inbred to one particular sire who had the qualities they needed for guide dogs. And they inbred that dog's progeny. Today, even though that dog is dead, the ones they are training still carry a high percentage of the genes he originally transmitted. And one more thing. They've reached a stage now where, at the age of 12 weeks, they can predict whether the puppy, at maturity, either as a sire or dam, will produce the kind of puppies they need to carry on their high percentage of success."

*Do research and tenacity pay off?
In the long run they surely do,
as this record testifies.*

CATHERINE (CASEY) and Dennis Gardiner, owners of Kerrycroft Kennels, Orono, Ont., were presented with the Eileen McEachren Memorial Trophy at the Sportsmen's Show. The manner in which the award was decided upon is described in the *Memo from the Editor* in this issue.

An interesting fact is that both Catherine and Dennis have been raised with dogs and have been familiar with other animals for most of their lives.

Casey's father had polo and hunting horses. That meant there were always hunting dogs in the barn—Setters, Curly-Coated Retrievers, and hounds. Her mother was partial to dogs as well. In the house were Boston Terriers, Pomeranians, Collies, always purebreds, which the children of the family showed. Dennis' family raised German Shepherds in England.

Kerry Blue Terriers are the only breed at Kerrycroft now. Beagles, Poodles, Border Collies, Maltese Terriers were all raised at the kennels but the Kerries outshone them all.

Fittingly, Kerrycroft Finians Finale was the last dog Mrs. McEachren was strongly campaigning and for whom she had great hopes when she died. Her hopes were well-founded. Finale was the top winning female in the United States in 1961. That year Kerrycroft's Mr. O'Rourke, sired by her Tailteann of Dorcliffe, was the top dog in Kerries.

Kerrycroft Kennels have been win-

ning consistently for the past 13 years, with last year no exception. Ch. (Can. & Am.) Bold Brigand has to his credit 28 BB, 26 Group placings, two all-breed BIS, a 2nd in Group and BCB in Show at the two All Terrier Specialties. He achieved his American title in two weekends, gaining four majors. His brother, Ch. (Can. & Am.) Kerrycroft's Benedict, owned and handled by Mrs. Zippy Fleisher, New City, N.Y., finished his American title by going from the classes to BOS at the Chicago Specialty. Benny and one of Finian's granddaughters won Best Terrier Brace in Group at Westminster, first time in a quarter century that Kerries have picked off this award. Three of Ben's youngsters have bested competition: Cara finished in Canada and at the time of writing has 11 points (3 majors) toward her American title. Confidence Man finished in Canada, Ch. Deal-Me-Aces, owned by Anne Morden, chalked up a Group 2nd at their first show together. Brigand's youngsters follow suit. Columbine finished her title last year and Candida, owned by Tony Pat, is fast gaining points. Louisella, now owned by Claude Dube, of Montreal, finished her title last year. Son, Ch. (Can. & Am.) Alexander was finished by Major Frances Reynolds, Fort Leavenworth, last year and his children are competing successfully, as is another daughter owned by the Fidges in Michigan. An interesting point is that Mr. Dube, who plans to

take a Doctorate in Statistical Genetics in the United States this Fall, became interested in the Kerrycroft inbreeding and the Record of Conformation, which was instigated by Mrs. Gardiner and other interested Ontario breeders.

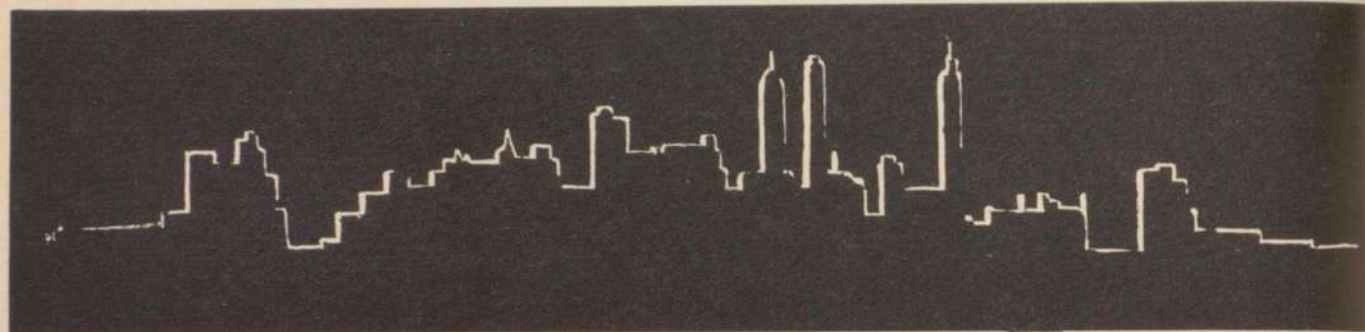
Also interesting is the fact that the majority of these winning dogs have also proven proficient in obedience. Mrs. Vardy of Bancroft, who trained her Kerrycroft's Kerry Lad in Peterborough, put him through his paces to earn his CD in three shows.

All these champions have had a Record of Conformation done on them, with reports going three to four generations back—executed by unbiased graders.

WESTMINSTER '65



FOR handler John Murphy of Allendale, N.Y., February 16 was a day of days. At the Gaines Breakfast for members of the Dog Writers of America Association he was presented with the "Fido" award as Dog Handler of the Year and received a commendation for his sportsmanship and care and condition of his clients' dogs. At midnight, thunderous applause still rang in his ears. He had piloted the spirited little Scottish Terrier, Ch. Carmichael's Fanfare, to Best in Show at Westminster KC's 89th annual event. After the show Murphy recommended retirement of Mamie to her owners, Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Stalter of Woodcliff Lake, N.J. The Stalters go along with his suggestion. She has had sufficient show life; now she will have her first litter.

Mamie's arch rival and the canine celebrity most mentioned in ringside conjecture was last year's BIS winner, the Whippet, Ch. Courtenay Fleetfoot. The pair produced an unusual circumstance in show wins last year. In the 1963 and 1964 shows, they had identical records. Each captured eight BIS awards the year before last and 21 last year.

The Scottie's win was over 2,572 other outstanding dogs, of which 1,006 were champions prior to the show. There were no classes for puppies or novices. Entries were limited to dogs which had won a blue ribbon or higher at a previous AKC-approved show. Included were three top winners from last year's event and 61 BB winners from last year.

And in this severe competition some of the 59 Canadian exhibitors fared very well.

In the Smooth Coat Chihuahua competition Shillmaine's Pocohontas, owned by Mrs. A. M. W. Samuels of Toronto went WB, BW. The Long Coat Chihuahua, Luce's Empress Carlotta, owned by Miss Judith Finch of Unionville, Ont., took the WB ribbon.

Canadian-bred Schipperkes swept the board in an entry of 15. Gerry and Laura McNally of Roxboro, Que., entered their Ch. Del Dorel's Elegante, top point-winning Schipperke in Canada, 1964 and his son, Ch. Geraura Dandi D'Elegante, last year's BB winner at the Garden. Under Judge Frank J. Landgraf of Bloomfield, N.J. Elegante (Alex) went to WD for a 4 point major to finish his American title. His litter sister, Del Dorel's Dorine of Keuka, owned by Andy and Hazel Hundly of Zionsville, Ind., went WB. Handler Malcolm Fellows of Pte. Claire returned Alex to the ring for BW. Alex's father, Am. Ch. Del Dorel's Stardom, top winning Schipperke in North America for the past five years, went BB, handled by

his owner, Mrs. Doris Lasser of Tinley Park, Ill. His daughter, Ch. Claret Demozet, went BOS. Greater excitement followed when Judge Haskell Schuffman pointed Ch. Del Dorel's Stardom to No. 2 position in a thrilling Non-Sporting Group. This is the first time in the history of Westminster, states Malcolm Fellows, that a judge has ever placed a Schipperke in the Group. The McNallys' brace, Alex and Dandi, were placed in second position.

Several Canadians came in for their share of the glory as breeders of some of the major winners. Mrs. Jean Lyle, (Wycliffe), Vancouver, B.C., was the breeder of the Standard Poodle, Ch. Wycliffe Xavier, which placed 3rd in the Non-Sporting Group. Owners are Frank and Susan B. Dale of Calabasas, Calif. Gaymitz Dariuson, owned by Mr. Matt Pierro of Birmingham, Mich. who went RW at both the American Boxer Club Specialty and Westminster, was bred by Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Northover of Stouffville, Ont. He is the first Canadian-bred male Boxer to attain this win since Edmar Ceaser August won Reserve in 1952, states Miss Jean Grant of Richmond Hill. He was sired by the late Ch. (Can. & Am.) Eldic Darius ex Ch. Gaymitz Dash O'Fire, a Blossomlea-bred female.

Ch. Tailteann's Blue Chrystal, BB-winning Kerry Blue Terrier owned by Mrs. Marie G. Greene, Huntington, West Va., was bred by the late Mrs. Eileen McEachren, Toronto.

PROLAPSE OF INTERVERTEBRAL DISCS IN DOGS

IT IS unlikely that people, in general, are aware of the fact that the majority of dogs with hind leg weakness or complete paralysis, seen in veterinary practice today, are victims of prolapse of the intervertebral disc. It was not until 1952 that Olsson and Hansen thoroughly described the causes and effects of disc degeneration and disc prolapse in dogs.

In order to understand what occurs, one must have an idea of the normal anatomy and function of the intervertebral disc. The discs are shock absorbers situated between each pair of vertebra of the spine. They lie beneath the spinal cord, which is the nerve trunk leading from the brain to all parts of the body. There are 26 discs in all and they cushion the movements of the vertebrae. Each disc is made up of two parts: a tough outer part (the annulus fibrosus), and a central softer gelatinous portion (the nucleus pulposus) (Fig. 1a).

There are two major forms of disc prolapse. Type 1 occurs as a result of total rupture of the annulus fibrosus and expulsion of the nucleus pulposus into the spinal canal (Fig. 1b). Weak-

ening of the annulus fibrosus is a result of disc degeneration. Mechanical factors serve only to precipitate prolapse. They determine where it will occur, not whether it will occur. The majority of prolapses occur where flexibility and mechanical strain is greatest, such as in the neck region, or at the level of the last rib. Type 1 disc prolapse is most prevalent and is characteristic for "chondrodystrophic" breeds. The Dachshund, Cocker Spaniel, Beagle, Bulldog and Pekingese are examples of the chondrodystrophic breeds. In such animals, the nucleus pulposus undergoes accelerated degenerative changes. At birth, the nucleus pulposus has a gelatinous consistency which, with age, becomes harder and calcified. It then can no longer fulfill its normal function as a shock absorber. The result is that the annulus fibrosus is exposed to forces great enough to cause it to weaken.

Type 2 disc prolapse occurs frequently as a senile change in most breeds. In this type, the annulus fibrosus does not completely rupture but becomes weak enough to allow the

disc material to bulge up toward the spinal canal (Fig. 1c). These prolapses produce only slight compression of the spinal cord and often no signs. An old dog may show a slowly progressing weakness of the hind legs.

The average age of individuals with Type 1 disc protrusions is between 6-9 years with a range from 3-11 years.

The signs and symptoms displayed by the dog can vary greatly, depending on the location of the protruded disc and the severity of the protrusion, that is, how fast it occurred and how much was expelled. Explosive expulsion of disc tissue into the spinal canal produces sudden and severe damage resulting in complete paralysis. A slowly protruding disc may merely cause slight pain and discomfort. Pain is usually a constant sign. The dog will resent being handled and may even snap at the owner.

A dog with protrusion of a disc in the neck region often has a typical history. The first signs may be noticed when the dog makes a quick movement, such as jumping from a chair, stopping quickly after vigorous running, or being stopped by a lead or chain. The dog is reluctant to move, seems stiff and sore and may stand with an arched back, with the neck held rigidly (Fig. 2). The dog may

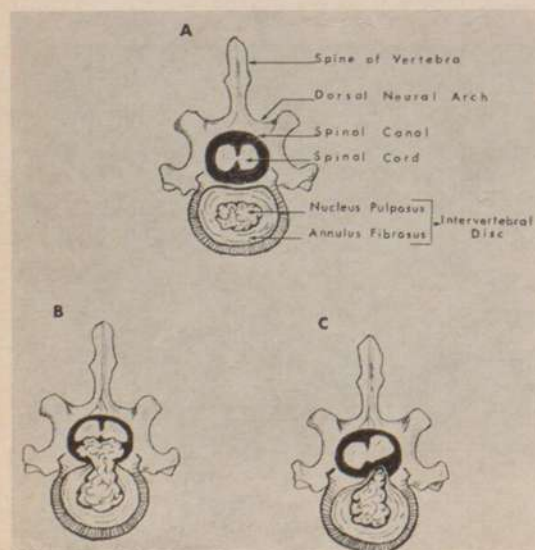

refuse to mount stairs or lower his head to eat. He is frequently apprehensive, seems restless and cannot become comfortable in a resting position. If the dog is in great pain, he will stand in one spot and not move for hours. All degrees of progress can occur, even to complete paralysis or even death.

With protrusion in the lower back area, the dog may exhibit pain, especially on being lifted, a reluctance to move or, as is so often the case, hind leg paralysis. Other functions, such as urination and defecation, may be impaired.

The diagnosis of disc protrusion is based on the history given, the breed, the signs shown by the animal and X-ray examination of the spine. X-rays usually show narrow space between the two vertebrae, from which

THE SECRETARY'S PAGE

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club was held in the Hotel Vancouver, Vancouver, B. C. commencing on Monday, March 1, 1965, with the President in the Chair and all members of the Board present.

There follows a summary of decisions of general interest reached at the meeting.

During the meeting the President read the following telegram, received from William H. Pym, the Club's Honorary President:

"GREETINGS, MAY YOUR SEVENTY SEVENTH ANNIVERSARY BRING PLEASURE TO ALL"

and the following telegram received from the publishers of "Dogs in Canada":

FINANCIAL MATTERS

BANKING ARRANGEMENTS

The Board considered the possibility of new banking arrangements to expedite the payment of expenses and the issuance of refund cheques to clubs holding shows and trials, but decided to defer consideration of this question until it receives the management survey report.

CANADIAN NATIONAL LIVE STOCK RECORDS

- The Board was informed that:
- (1) the total net operating expenses of the Live Stock Records in 1964 amounted to \$294,826.88 (budgeted for \$285,870.00);
 - (2) Live Stock Records Committee have budgeted for \$309,075.00 in 1965, this being 4.86% higher than in 1964;
 - (3) the Committee had set the Kennel Club's monthly levy at \$6,345 (as compared with \$5,575 in 1964), the increased levy being based on the anticipated increase in operating costs and an anticipated increase in CKC business at the Records Office.

INVESTMENTS

The Investments Committee (consisting of the President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer) were authorized to invest, or reinvest, the Club's funds in investments permitted by the Trust Fund Act and/or the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act. It was agreed, however, that the Committee would make no investments until the report of the management consultants, engaged to conduct a survey of the operations and management of the Club, had been received.

REGISTRATION, STUD BOOKS AND RELATED MATTERS

BREED STANDARDS

The Board received and considered the report of the Breed Standards Committee on a proposed standard format for breed standards. The Committee was authorized to carry on, and where any breed club is in the process of considering revision of its breed standard it is strongly recommended that it follow the format prepared by the committee. A copy of the format may be obtained by writing the CKC Secretary.

For many years it was the practice of the CKC to automatically adopt (with few exceptions) new breed standards (or changes in standards) approved by the AKC. In order to minimize alterations in the CKC's Book of Breed Standards published in 1963, the Board decided that the Club's standards would not be altered to recognize new standards and changes in standards adopted by the AKC since July 1, 1962. The Board also decided that the next referendum ballot would include a proposed amendment to Section 4 of Article XXVI of the Club's By-laws in order that the Board would not be required to consider changes in American standards.

On the recommendation of the Breed Standards Committee, a proposed new standard for the Vizsla, as submitted by the Vizsla Club of Canada, was referred back to that Club for further study with a recommendation that in the formulating of a new standard it follow the format recommended by the Breed Standards Committee.

The Board considered the report of the Breed Standards Committee in connection with a proposal that breed liaison councils be established. It agreed that such councils would not be established for all breeds but that the Breed Standards Committee may, at its discretion, establish one or more of these councils when, as a Committee, it is felt desirable to do so for the purpose of dealing with matters relating to any particular breed or breeds.

TATTOO IDENTIFICATION LETTERS

Having been advised by the Canadian National Live Stock Records that the number of three-letter combinations for identification purposes had been exhausted, it was decided that rather than allot four-letter combinations which might necessitate two tattooing operations per dog, there would be commenced the practice of allotting a breeder as identification letters, two letters and a numeral, e.g. A2A, A3B, A4D, etc.

FREE PRIVATE BREEDING RECORD BOOKS

Having instituted the practice of supplying a free private breeding record book to each person now admitted to membership, it was decided that the Club would again repeat its offer of a free private breeding record book to any member who had not as yet asked for and been furnished with such a book.

KENNEL NAMES

In order to expedite the approval of applications for registration of kennel names, the Board approved the recommendation of the Kennel

Names Committee that the deadline for receipt of an objection to a kennel name applied for would be the last day of the month of the issue of "Dogs in Canada" in which the name applied for is published, except that if the issue is late in being mailed the deadline would be appropriately extended.

Section #3 of the "Regulations and Interpretations regarding Kennel Names" was amended by the addition of the following: "Where both husband and wife hold separate membership it shall be permissible for both to use a kennel name registered by either provided that the member who registered the name gives his or her consent to the arrangement."

ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

The Board agreed that when, some years ago, the Club had adopted regulations with regard to artificial insemination, such regulations did not contemplate the registration of a litter resulting from the use of imported semen. It therefore directed the Secretary to approach the Chief Registration Officer of the Department of Agriculture with regard to the feasibility and mechanics of importation of canine semen.

REGISTRATION OF DACHSHUNDS

In 1964 the Minister of Agriculture for Canada granted approval to an amendment to the Club's By-laws, the new By-law empowering the Board to prescribe, subject to the approval of the Department's Chief Registration Officer, regulations on the registration of Dachshunds. At its semi-annual meeting in July (1964) the Board considered a set of proposed regulations and directed that these be published in the official magazine and comments sought from those interested in Dachshunds; in the meantime the previous registration requirements and procedures on Dachshunds would continue in effect.

The Board was provided with a copy of all replies received in response to the invitation published, with the proposed regulations, in the October (1964) issue of "Dogs in Canada", and noted that the overwhelming preponderance of those who commented on the proposed regulations were opposed to any change in the existing requirements and procedures for the registration of Dachshunds in Canada.

After discussion the following resolution was adopted:

"THAT, no further action be taken at this time."

Those who voted for the foregoing resolution were: J. C. Anderson, G. M. Ashcroft, Walter Brown, Wm. Dawson, D. H. Duff, G. W. Frost, Robert Little, Mrs. Pamela B. Mack, G. N. Mehlenbacher, and W. J. Monaghan.

Voting against the resolution were: Tom Wells, Mrs. J. W. Anderson, Mrs. Edna L. Joel, and Wm. McDerment.

The Board noted that through an oversight a litter of Dachshunds whose sire and dam were not of the same coat and size classification had been registered. It ordered the registration cancelled and the recall of the certificate of registration.

SELECTIVE REGISTRY COMMITTEE

With a view to achieving advancement in the breeding and registration of pure-bred dogs the Board decided to establish a special committee to be known as the Selective Registry Committee, it being the duty of the Committee to place before the Board from time to time, recommended policies designed to further the activities referred to in Section 1 (c) of Article XXXVI (Improvement of Stock) of the Club's By-laws. This Section of the Club's By-laws provides that the Club may "adopt, amend, and enforce rules governing the setting up and maintenance of an advanced registry and of a system of inspection and grading of pure-bred dogs". The Board appointed Mr. W. J. Monaghan as Chairman of this Committee, the Chairman to report to the semi-annual meeting of the Board for its consideration, the mechanics of the Committee. The Board empowered Mr. Monaghan to appoint the Committee and agreed that, as Chairman, he may appoint sub-committees.

Mr. Monaghan, Chairman of the Selective Registry Committee, having been empowered by the Board to name the Committee, announced the following personnel of the Committee: Robert Little, Mrs. Pamela B. Mack, Mrs. Mary Weatherdon, Quentin N. Luffam, Mrs. Dennis Gardiner, Mrs. Irving Diamond, and Mr. Leonard Griesbach.

AGREEMENTS

The Board agreed that the Club's solicitor would be asked to draft a form of agreement for the use of those wishing to cancel an agreement, previously entered into and filed with the Club, that a dog which had been sold would not be used for breeding purposes, such cancellation of agreement being provided for in Section 2 of Article XXXI of the Club's By-laws.

REGISTRATION COMMITTEE

- The Secretary reported that the Registration Committee had:
- (1) authorized the registration of the St. Bernard CONTE'S BARON McDUFF (out of litter #9217-63), and the recording of transfer of ownership of this dog to the name of Messrs. Andy Moore and Terry McNamara, London, Ont., as of October 12, 1963; (RC-260)
 - (2) authorized the registration of the following Cavalier King Charles Spaniels owned by Miss Elizabeth L. Spalding, Portland, Maine, U.S.A.: SEA MAID OF KILSPINDIE, PARGETER PRUNELLA OF KILSPINDIE, PARGETER FERUS OF KILSPINDIE, SEA HOLLY OF KILSPINDIE, PARGETER MERMAID, KARMA OF KILSPINDIE, KILSPINDIE PRINCE REGENT OF CARAPACE, and KILSPINDIE UPSHOT; (RC-293)
 - (3) authorized the registration of the Poodle CINDERELLA bred by Miss Susan Elford, Toronto, Ont., and the recording of transfer of ownership of this dog to Mrs. Honey Blackman, Toronto, Ont.; date of transfer, June 13, 1964; (RC-302)
 - (4) authorized the registration of the Pointer (German Short-haired) BELLE DONARIA, imported from Germany, with required German certificate, by Mr. John H. Woltzik, Rouge Hills P.O., Ont.; (RC-305)
 - (5) decided that, in view of the requirements for the registration of an

imported dog, it could not assist Mrs. H. A. Robinson in connection with the importation from England of a Labrador Retriever, inasmuch as in the third generation of ancestry one dog is "unknown"; (RC-306)

- (6) decided that in connection with the Poodle which Mrs. Patricia C. Gotch, Montreal, imported to Canada, it would be necessary for this dog to first be registered in the records of The American Kennel Club since Mrs. Gotch imported this dog into the United States from England while a resident of the United States; (RC-307)
- (7) authorized the recording of transfer of ownership of the Boxer MAJOR OF KEM (467446) from the name of Peter H. Wellstood, Calgary, Alta., to the name of T. G. Deere, Calgary, Alta.; date of transfer, October 9, 1961. (RC-309)

The report of the Committee's decisions was ordered incorporated in the minutes of this meeting of the Board.

The Board considered the report received from the Quebec Provincial Police following their investigation of alleged forgery in connection with an application for registration of litter, and directed that the file be referred to a solicitor in Quebec for prosecution proceedings under the Criminal Code and/or The Live Stock Pedigree Act.

The Board considered a request that the Club recognize the "American Eskimo dog" and decided that no further consideration would be given this request until the breed is recognized by The American Kennel Club.

The Board considered the report of an inspection committee which, at the Registration Committee's request, had examined a dog in a registered litter, and decided that in view of the committee's report all dogs in the litter would be examined.

The Board reviewed the present regulations on the registration in the Club's records of Pointers and English Setters registered with the Field Dog Stud Book, and agreed that it would not alter the regulations to permit of the registration in the Club's records of a Pointer or English Setter registered in the Field Dog Stud Book on the basis of an "owner's affidavit" or where the sire and/or dam of such dog was registered with the Field Dog Stud Book on an owner's affidavit.

COMPLAINTS, CHARGES AND PROTESTS

SPECIFIC CASES

The Board considered reports received from five advisory committees which had conducted investigations on five complaints, and also a report received from the Department of Agriculture following an investigation conducted at the Board's request.

One person was denied the privileges of the Club, and the Board directed the Secretary with regard to appropriate letters to three defendants.

Two other complaint files were ordered held in abeyance pending receipt of reports from the advisory committees appointed to investigate the complaints.

Two complaints were ordered referred to advisory committees for investigation and report.

POLICIES

The Board decided to review the "Procedure for Conducting an Advisory Committee Hearing", each member of the Board to submit comments for consideration at a future meeting of the Board.

The Board noted that on occasion when it has referred a complaint or protest to an advisory committee for investigation and report, the complainant has failed to appear before the hearing and had otherwise failed to arrange for any evidence to be presented in support of the complaint. Consideration was given to the possibility of requiring that a complainant be required to make a cash deposit, and directed that this question be referred to the Complaints Committee for consideration, the views of the Club's solicitor to be obtained.

PROTEST FORMS

In order to ensure closer conformity with the rules regarding protests at shows and trials the Board decided that protest forms would be printed and supplied to clubs holding shows and trials under the Club's rules.

onto in late March or early April when it would not be convenient for the President to attend, he may name a deputy in order that the Club's full complement of representatives would attend the meeting. The President named Mr. Walter Brown to serve in his stead for the coming annual meeting of the Live Stock Records Board.

It was agreed that the appointment of Dog Show Representatives would be held over until the Board receives the recommendations of the Dog Show Council with regard to the duties of Dog Show Representatives.

The Board restated its policy that the Obedience Representatives and Field Trial Representatives appointed would take office on April 1, 1965 and hold office until March 31, 1966.

ANNUAL MEETINGS - 1966

The Board decided that the next annual general meeting of the Club would be held at Toronto on Saturday, February 26, 1966, the annual meeting of the Board to commence on Wednesday, February 23rd.

CKC ARCHIVES

The Board considered Mrs. Sheila Anderson's proposal that it consider the possibility of forming "a modest archive collection, this to be housed at the Club's headquarters and managed by a committee". It named a committee consisting of the President, Mr. Monaghan, Mr. McDerment, Mrs. Anderson, Mr. Duff, and Mr. Dawson to explore this proposal.

PROMOTION, PUBLICITY & PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Board received and considered the report of Mr. Ashcroft, Chairman of the Promotion, Publicity & Public Relations Committee, with regard to the newspaper advertising campaign, to be published in the pet columns of widely-read newspapers in Canada, drawing attention to the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

It was agreed that, in connection with the advertisement drawing attention to the requirement of the Act that when a dog is sold as purebred a certificate of registration must be provided, there would be added the words "without additional cost".

MANAGEMENT SURVEY

Mr. Anderson, Chairman of the Special Committee appointed by the Board to set the terms of reference and engage a firm of management consultants to conduct the survey of the operation and management of the Club, reported that the report was now in the final stages of preparation.

The Board agreed that when the Chairman of the Committee received the report he would arrange for a meeting of the Committee which would then review the report and submit a copy of the report and the Committee's recommendations to each member of the Board, the report and the Committee's recommendations to be considered at the semi-annual meeting of the Board.

FEDERAL SALES TAX ON DOG FOODS

The Board noted that in accordance with an instruction which it had given, the Secretary had communicated with the Department of National Revenue, setting forth the Board's opinion that in view of the provisions of the Excise Tax Act (RSC 1952, c 100) dog foods should be exempted from any federal sales tax. The Board was informed of the reply which had been received, to the effect that the Department is of the opinion that exemption pointed out by the Board in the Excise Tax Act does not contemplate feeds for dogs. The Board was informed that the matter is under consideration by officials of the Department and it now appeared that the original order with regard to the 11% Sales Tax on dog foods would not apply to the wide variety of dog foods originally anticipated. The matter was held over for a further report.

BOARD MEETINGS

The Board decided that regular meetings of the Board would not be held in the months of April and May, and that its semi-annual meeting would be held at Toronto commencing on Thursday, June 10th.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

Carrying on a practice established some years ago, the President was authorized to address an annual message to members, such message to be mailed on December 28th along with the notices regarding renewal of membership for 1966.

PLAQUE TO EACH PRESIDENT

The Board decided that each living President of the Club would be provided with a plaque identifying the president by name, and showing his or her term(s) of office.

MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP

The Board noted a proposal, advanced by a member at the annual general meeting, that a person who has had 50 years of membership in the Canadian Kennel Club be granted an honorary membership in the Club. It agreed that inasmuch as there is no provision in the Club's By-laws for honorary memberships, this proposal could not be implemented.

APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP

The Board approved applications for membership reported on lists #1 to #12 inclusive mailed to members of the Board.

NOTICE

SUBJECT: AMENDMENTS TO THE FIELD TRIAL RULES & REGULATIONS FOR BEAGLE FIELD TRIALS

The following amendments to the Field Trial Rules & Regulations for Beagle field trials were approved by the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club on March 9, 1965. The effective date of these amendments will be July 1, 1965.

Rule #8 in Chapter 13 has been deleted in its entirety and the following has been substituted therefor:

RULE 8. SECTION 1. Should the pack split, hounds going away on different hares, the Judges shall order the Marshals to order and assist the handlers to get their hounds into the largest running pack, or to pick up all hounds and get a new start on fresh game. If too many splits occur in one locality, all hounds shall be ordered up and moved to a different location for a new start.

SECTION 2. After a class has been ordered up, all handlers shall have thirty minutes in which to group their hounds. All hounds in the handlers' possession after this thirty minutes may then be cast. Handlers of missing hounds shall then be allowed thirty minutes after fresh game has been started to get their hounds back into the pack. This thirty minutes does not apply to a hound that quits the pack while running and goes out to its owner or handler.

Under the heading **INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES** in Chapter 13 add the following:

Before each class the judges shall agree upon a uniform point system of scoring the hounds and at the completion of the class they shall make the score available to the handlers.

One application for membership was ordered held in abeyance, the applicant to be given the opportunity of electing a formal hearing with regard to his alleged failure to keep private breeding records. Three other applications were ordered held in abeyance pending reports to the Board on outstanding complaints against the applicants.

CHANGES OF MEMBERSHIP

From time to time the Club receives requests to alter membership by the addition of another person or persons. All such requests will be referred to the Board for consideration. Where an ordinary member requests the inclusion of another person in the membership and the Board approves, the membership will revert to an associate membership and after three calendar years as an associate member the amended membership may then apply for ordinary membership. Where an associate member requests the inclusion of another person to the membership and the Board approves, the amended membership must be an associate member for three calendar years before it may apply for ordinary membership.

The Board decided that when an individual member of the Club dies the spouse of such member may be elected to the same membership status as was enjoyed by the deceased member, all such requests for transfer of membership to be dealt with by the Board.

DOG SHOWS

DOG SHOW COUNCIL

The Board decided that it would be the duty of the Dog Show Council to consider matters relating to dog shows and to submit reports and recommendations to the Board from time to time as it sees fit or as the Board may require.

SHOW JUDGES

It was agreed that a member of the Board may serve on an examining committee conducting an oral examination of a person wishing to establish eligibility to judge one or more breeds, but in the event the applicant should appeal to the Board the decision of the examining committee, the member of the Board sitting on such examining committee would not be eligible to participate in the Board's consideration and disposition of the appeal.

The Board deferred for later consideration, the proposed draft of a new Chapter 7 of the Dog Show Rules as submitted by the Chairman of the Committee responsible for the processing of applications for approval to judge.

With a view to ensuring uniformity in procedures carried on by examining committees, it was agreed that the Chairman of the Committee responsible for the processing of applications for approval to judge would prepare and distribute a memorandum for the guidance of such examining committees.

It has been the policy for some years to permit a resident of the United Kingdom to judge at a championship show held under CKC rules only those breeds for which he or she had been approved to judge at championship shows held under the rules of the Kennel Club (England). The Board decided to vary this policy to include Open Shows held under KC rules.

The Board considered the recommendation of the Ottawa Kennel Club that it reinstate a previous CKC policy "in regard to judges not judging two shows in the same zone during a three month period". No action was taken, the Board agreeing that a club holding a show is free to contract with its selected judge (or judges) that he or she will not judge at any show within a stated area and time (before and after) its show.

The Board agreed that when a person is approved, on a one time basis (pending a final decision on an application to judge), his or her name (and breed or breeds for which approval is given) will be reported in "Dogs in Canada" for the information of show-giving clubs.

Arising out of the proposal, advanced at the annual general meeting, that The Canadian Kennel Club seek reciprocity arrangements with The American Kennel Club regarding recognition of dog show judges approved by either Club, the Board decided to invite the Executive Vice President of The American Kennel Club to meet with the Board during its semi-annual meeting to discuss this and other matters of mutual interest.

The Board considered the appeals, from decisions rendered by examining committees, received from two applicants seeking to establish eligibility to judge at championship shows. In one case it directed that the applicant may appear before another examining committee after the expiration of six months from the date of the original oral examination. In the other case it directed that the applicant be advised that he had been approved to judge, at one show, a number of specified breeds, and he may appear before a different examining committee for another oral examination on the remaining breeds for which he had applied.

SHOW DATES

In order that the Board may formulate policies at a later meeting the Secretary was instructed to seek the views of show-giving clubs with regard to the types of shows all-breed clubs and specialty clubs may hold, and spacing (datewise) between shows in a zone.

Mrs. Mack reported the formation of a specialty club for German Shepherd Dogs at Montreal, whose members are French-speaking. It was agreed that the club, some of whose members had previous experience in the staging of a specialty show, may stage a specialty show after having held one sanction show, and if the club wishes, all its material (including ribbons and premium lists) may be bilingual.

The Board noted that at the annual general meeting it was suggested that earlier approval of applications to hold championship shows would enable show-giving clubs to commence earlier than is now possible their arrangements for show venues and judges. The Board agreed that the Secretary may approve a show date up to one year in advance of the show dates, although this policy is to apply, for the time being, to dates in 1966 and 1967 only, this in order that clubs having priority rights may reinstate their priorities after the present schedule of priority rights expires with shows in 1967.

The Board considered the applications of the Bulldog Club of Central Canada, and Club Six, for priority rights on June 5, 1966 and June 4, 1967, and decided that in view of its long-standing record of shows on comparable dates, the application of the Bulldog Club of Central Canada would be approved.

The Board approved the application of the Regional Fair of Three Rivers to hold a championship show on August 14th, believing that because of distance, the show at Three Rivers would not conflict with the championship show to be held on the same date by the Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club. An added fact in the Board's decision was that the Three Rivers Fair, being a Fair, must work within fixed dates.

The Board agreed that the application of the Thunder Bay Kennel & Training Club to hold championship shows at Fort William on October 9th and 10th would be granted, believing that shows at that place would not conflict with shows to be held by the Essex County Kennel Club at Windsor on the same dates.

ENTRIES

The question having been raised as to whether or not a dog may be entered for both "Specials Only" and in an official class at a championship show, the Board has interpreted Chapter 4 of the Dog Show Rules to mean that a dog entered for "Specials Only" at a show cannot be entered in or compete at the same show in any of the official classes defined in Chapter 4, Section 2 (c) to Section 2 (h) inclusive of the Dog Show Rules.

VICIOUS DOGS

In order to clarify the provisions of Section 7 of Chapter 9, and Chapter 23 of the Dog Show Rules, the Board decided that if, in the course of judging a dog, the judge does not see fit to disqualify it on the grounds of viciousness, then a protest alleging viciousness must not be entertained by the show-giving club, and if the officiating judge disqualifies a dog on the grounds of viciousness, his decision shall be final for the show at which he disqualifies such dog.

SHOW CATALOGUES

For some time it has been the policy of the Club to require that each dog show catalogue be 6" wide by 9" deep and be saddle-stitched (stitched in centre). As some show-giving clubs prefer to mimeograph rather than print their catalogues and as these dimensions are not economical as far as available mimeograph paper is concerned, the Board decided that if a catalogue is mimeographed the paper size must be 5-5/16" wide by 8-1/2" deep and must be saddle-stitched.

SANCTION SHOW JUDGES

The Board noted that at the annual general meeting a member had proposed that a club holding a sanction show must obtain CKC approval of its selected judges. A motion which would require a club holding a sanction show to submit its list of proposed judges to the CKC was defeated.

CHAMPIONSHIP SHOW RIBBONS

Chapter 5, Section 2 of the Dog Show Rules provides that each ribbon or rosette shall be of such size and contain such information as may be prescribed by the Board.

The Board decided that each ribbon or rosette must carry the following information (or such information must be firmly attached to the ribbon or rosette): the name of the club holding the event, the award, and the full date of the event. The name of the officiating judge is optional.

The Board decided that where a club stages a sweepstake it may provide the regular championship show ribbons or rosettes for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th placements, and for junior handling classes it may provide 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th placements in the colors prescribed for sanction shows, with a green rosette for best junior handler.

NOTICE

SUBJECT: AMENDMENT TO THE FIELD TRIAL RULES & REGULATIONS FOR RETRIEVER FIELD TRIALS

The following amendment to the Field Trial Rules & Regulations for Retriever field trials was approved by the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club on March 9, 1965. The effective date of this amendment will be July 1, 1965.

Section 4 of Chapter 4 is amended by the addition of the following:

"When a trial-giving club finds it necessary to secure the services of a substitute judge it must meet the requirements as laid down by the Board of Directors for combined experience for any stake or stakes which the substitute judge will judge. (When a substitute judge is appointed for a stake the handlers in that stake shall be called together and informed of the substitute before the running of the first test.)"

DIRECTIVES - SHOW OFFICIALS

The preparation of a printed directive outlining procedure of setting up a show, and information regarding the duties of the show superintendent and ring steward, was left in the hands of the Dog Show Council.

VETERINARY INSPECTION

The Board noted a proposal, advanced by a member at the annual general meeting, that a show-giving club be required to have its official veterinarian on hand only until the end of regular breed judging, after which he must be within easy call. The Board agreed that the requirements for providing a veterinarian at a show are set out in Chapter 14 of the Dog Show Rules, and noted that a number of members had submitted a proposed amendment to Chapter 14 which may be included in the next referendum ballot.

CHAMPIONSHIP REQUIREMENTS

The Board noted that at the annual general meeting a member had proposed that Chapter 21 (Champions and Championship Point Ratings) of the Dog Show Rules be amended as follows:

- (1) the one dog, one point arrangement continue in effect, but that the total points required be increased to 15 including two three-point wins;
- (2) the schedule of point ratings be revised annually on the basis of breed entries;
- (3) the sexes be combined in breeds where less than four dogs are entered in the show.

The Board decided that these proposals would be considered when considered possible proposed amendments to Chapter 21 of the Dog Show Rules which may be included in a future referendum ballot.

AMENDMENTS TO DOG SHOW RULES

Ordered referred to the Dog Show Council for consideration and report to the Board was a report of a committee, appointed by the Board in 1963, to consider and place recommendations before the Board regarding desirable amendments to the Dog Show Rules, that committee's report having been considered by the Board at its previous semi-annual meeting.

TRACKING TESTS

TRACKING TEST COUNCIL

The Board decided that it would be the duty of the Tracking Test Council to consider matters relating to tracking tests and to submit reports and recommendations to the Board from time to time as it sees fit or as the Board may require; the Council to have the power to reach final decisions on applications to establish eligibility to judge tracking tests subject only to the right of an applicant to appeal to the Board in the event his application is not approved by the Council.

PROCESSING APPLICATIONS TO JUDGE

The Board considered the Chairman's recommendations with regard to the processing of applications of those wishing to establish eligibility to judge tracking tests. The Chairman's recommendations were approved on the understanding that his recommended procedure would require a resident of the United States wishing to qualify as a tracking test judge to follow the same procedure as is now required of a resident of the United States wishing to establish eligibility to judge one or more obedience trial classes.

QUALIFYING CERTIFICATES

The Chairman of the Tracking Test Council was empowered to make such arrangements as he deems advisable to implement the provisions of Subsection 8, Section 7, of Chapter 1 of the Tracking Test Rules regarding the issuance of qualifying certificates for dogs whose owners wish to enter them in licensed tracking tests.

OBEDIENCE TRIALS

OBEDIENCE COUNCIL

The Board decided that it would be the duty of the Obedience Council to consider matters relating to obedience trial classes and submit reports and recommendations to the Board from time to time as it sees fit or as the Board may require; the Council to have the power to reach final decisions on applications to establish eligibility to judge obedience classes, subject only to the right of an applicant to appeal to the Board in the event his application is not approved by the Council.

PROCESSING OF JUDGING APPLICATIONS

The Board directed that, effective immediately, the prescribed procedure for the processing of an application to establish eligibility to judge one or more obedience classes would be amended to require that upon approval by the Obedience Council, and after apprenticeship had been completed, the applicant will be required to fulfill one judging engagement after which a final decision would be made on his application, the work of the applicant at the one trial to be observed and reported on by a committee of three appointed by the local Obedience Representative. It was agreed that when a person is approved on a one-trial basis his or her name would be reported in "Dogs in Canada" for the information of clubs selecting judges for their trials.

TRAINING CLASSES

The Board noted that at the annual general meeting a member had proposed that "training classes should at least be able to state that they are approved by The Canadian Kennel Club", and directed that the matter of control of training classes be referred to the Obedience Council for consideration.

JUDGES

A proposal, advanced by a member at the annual general meeting, that all existing obedience trial judges in British Columbia be re-examined each and every five years was ordered referred to the Obedience Council and Obedience Representatives for consideration and report to the Board.

UNOFFICIAL CLASSES

The Board ruled that except in the determination of winners of prizes offered for an unofficial class, scores earned in an unofficial class at a trial held under CKC rules must not be counted in the determination of other prizes offered at the trial. For example, a score earned in an unofficial class would not be counted when determining the winner of a prize offered for the highest score in the trial.

OBEEDIENCE TRIAL REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS

Subsection 1 of Section 20 of Chapter 1 of the CKC Obedience Trial Regulations and Standards provides that amendments adopted by The American Kennel Club to its "Regulations and Standards for Obedience Trials" shall automatically become amendments to the CKC Regulations and Standards except where such amendments, in the opinion of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, conflict with any specific amendments to the CKC Regulations and Standards as have been adopted by the CKC since January 1, 1948.

The American Kennel Club having adopted (effective July 1, 1964) new Obedience Regulations, the Board decided that all changes in the AKC Regulations and Standards would be published in "Dogs in Canada", the comments of those interested in obedience trials would be sought for the consideration of the Obedience Council and the Board, after which the Board would then decide which of the AKC's changes in its Obedience Regulations would then become effective for obedience trials held under CKC rules.

FIELD TRIALS

The Secretary was authorized to communicate with The American Kennel Club seeking arrangements which would enable the entry, as listed dogs, of Canadian-owned dogs at licensed field trials held under AKC rules. The American Kennel Club at present requires that all dogs to be entered in licensed field trials held under their rules be AKC registered before entry.

FIELD TRIALS FOR BEAGLES

On the recommendation of the Beagle Field Trial Representative for Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, the following were appointed Official Measurers:
Newfoundland area: Robert Nutbeam, Richard Moores, Richard Fricke, Safford Crummev.
Cape Breton area: Ben Dickson, James Poirier, Roderick McKinnon, George Sampson.
Halifax area: Alf Beaver, H. N. Downey, Richard Duggan, Ellis Davis.

On the recommendation of the Field Trial Council for Beagles, Jack Paddon, Hamilton, Ont., was appointed an Official Measurer, replacing an Official Measurer no longer active.

On the recommendation of the Field Trial Council for Beagles the Board approved the addition of Roy D. MacLean, Cobourg, Ont. and Frank Record, Jr., Kitchener, Ont. to the list of persons eligible for approval to judge Beagle (pack) field trials.

On the recommendation of the Field Trial Council for Beagles and after clubs and persons had been given an opportunity of submitting their comments thereon, the Board approved two amendments to Chapter 13 of the Field Trial Rules for Beagles, and declared the effective date of the amendments to be July 1, 1965. Notice of the amendments approved by the Board appears elsewhere on The Secretary's Page.

Mrs. Joel, Chairman of the Field Trial Council for Beagles, reported that Mr. Ray Yearwood had passed away recently and stated that Mr. Yearwood had rendered excellent service to the Club both as a Field Trial Representative for Beagles and as a member of the Council.

It was unanimously agreed that the Secretary would address a letter of sympathy to Mrs. Yearwood and convey the Board's appreciation for Mr. Yearwood's contribution to the Club and to the Beagle Field Trial fraternity in particular.

FIELD TRIALS FOR POINTING BREEDS

The Board considered a proposal, advanced at the annual general meeting, that clubs holding licensed field trials for pointing breeds under the Club's rules be required to have a specified number of its members as members of The Canadian Kennel Club, or that a certain percentage of its members must be members of The Canadian Kennel Club, and decided to ask the Directors and Field Trial Representatives to take this proposal into consideration in their discussions with clubs holding licensed trials for pointing breeds under the Club's rules.

This offer is restricted to ONE free book per member. Additional such books may be obtained at 50¢ per copy.

The Board noted a proposal, advanced by a member at the annual general meeting, that the Field Trial Rules for Pointing Breeds be amended to require that every dog entered in a licensed trial for pointing breeds must be CKC-registered prior to entry, and agreed that it would take no action on this proposal in view of its prior decision to approach The American Kennel Club with regard to the listing of Canadian-owned dogs at trials held under AKC rules.

FIELD TRIALS FOR RETRIEVERS

A request for funds to help defray expenses of holding judges' clinics during the year, organized by Retriever clubs in Ontario, was ordered referred to the Field Trial Council (Retrievers) for consideration and report to the Board.

The question of whether a particular judge may be approved to judge all-age stakes at trials conducted by one or more clubs on consecutive dates was ordered referred to the Field Trial Council (Retrievers) for consideration and report to the Board.

The Board noted that at the annual general meeting a member had proposed that the Field Trial Rules for Retrievers be amended to require 15 points for a field trial championship and that the winner of the Junior Stake be allotted one championship point (with a maximum of two to be counted towards a field trial championship), and the winner of the Qualifying Stake be granted 1-1/2 championship points (with a maximum of three points towards a field trial championship). It directed that this proposal be referred to the Field Trial Council for Retrievers for consideration.

On the recommendation of the Field Trial Council for Retrievers, and after giving clubs and persons an opportunity of submitting their comments thereon, the Board approved, and declared effective on July 1, 1965, the following amendment to the Field Trial Rules for Retrievers:

Section 4 of Chapter 4 is amended by the addition of the following: "When a trial-giving club finds it necessary to secure the services of a substitute judge it must meet the requirements as laid down by the Board of Directors for combined experience for any stake or stakes which the substitute judge will judge."

As suggested by a Field Trial Representative the Board directed that to the foregoing amendment there would be added, in brackets, the following:

"When a substitute judge is appointed for a stake the handlers in that stake shall be called together and informed of the substitute before the running of the first test."

The Board directed that a question relating to the eligibility of spayed bitches and castrated dogs to compete in licensed trials would be referred to the Council for consideration.

GOOD AND WELFARE

JUNIOR KENNEL CLUBS

The Board noted a proposal, advanced by a member at the annual general meeting that, with a view to encouraging Junior Kennel Club activity, arrangements should be made for interprovincial competitions. This recommendation was referred to the Committee on Junior Kennel Clubs for such action as it deems advisable.

RESEARCH

To grants already allocated to the Ontario Veterinary College for research on finding ways and means of storing canine semen, the Board authorized the allocation of a further \$1,000.

HIP DISPLASIA

The Board considered a report on "Control of Hip Displasia in Dogs" which it had requested of Dr. A. J. Cawley, Professor and Head, Small Animal Division, Department of Clinical Studies, Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph. In a letter which had accompanied Dr. Cawley's report he had reported that he would be in Britain this coming summer and would attempt to investigate the Swedish program both at The Kennel Club's offices and the Veterinary College in Stockholm. The Board therefore decided to invite Dr. Cawley's further report on hip displasia following his return from Europe.

WORLD'S FAIR - 1967

Mrs. Mack outlined suggestions with regard to possible shows and trials at the 1967 World's Fair at Montreal, and was asked to prepare and place detailed proposals before the Board at its semi-annual meeting in June.

CLOSING RESOLUTIONS

The annual meeting of the Board adjourned on Wednesday, March 10th, with the adoption of the following resolutions:

- (1) "THAT, we congratulate Mrs. Elsie Murray and the Junior Kennel Club for the splendid way it staged its sanction show on March 7th."
- (2) "THAT, the President be thanked for his endeavours, and the splendid way we have been treated in British Columbia during these annual meetings."

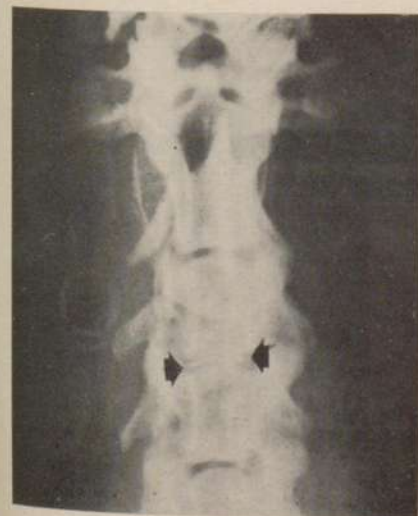


Fig. 4. An X-ray of the vertebrae in the neck region taken with dog lying on his back. The arrows point to a calcified prolapsed intervertebral disc.

the disc has protruded and/or disc calcification in the neural canal (Figs. 3 & 4).

Some dogs recover from the effects of prolapse without treatment. Even those with severe paralysis can recover completely. This may seem difficult to understand, as a prolapse never disappears. However, compression of the spinal cord is not only due to the pressure of the disc tissue alone but also the pressure of the inflamed tissue which has swollen around the extruded disc material. The disc is as much a foreign object there, as a bullet in a leg. Pressure on the spinal cord decreases as inflammatory swelling regresses and the prolapsed material undergoes organization and contraction.

There are two forms of treatment used in attempt to relieve the symptoms of disc protrusion.

The first is the more conservative of the two. The medical treatment consists of rest, good care and sufficient immobilization to prevent further expulsion of the nucleus pulposus. The drugs used in conjunction with the above are those which reduce pain and accelerate healing.

If the conservative method is unsatisfactory or if it is deemed necessary at the onset of the condition surgical repair is performed. One method is that of fenestrating and

scraping out any disc material left in the intervertebral space. The disc material which has already herniated cannot be removed. Adjacent discs may also be removed to prevent future herniation.

As a last resort, a "hemilaminectomy" may be performed. This involves removal of the lateral walls of the dorsal arches of adjacent vertebrae, thus exposing the spinal cord. This results in relieving the pressure in the area. The procedure is very complicated and more risk is involved than in the previous procedures. □

The Eye of the Labrador

There is a vague ill feeling which overcomes some people at the first whiff of a rather well-aged cheese. Others feel roughly the same emotion on encountering a yellow eye in a Labrador, particularly a black Labrador.

I confess to belonging to the latter group, but I doubt if there are very sound reasons, other than aesthetic ones, for the prejudice. There are clinging associations with the cur-like yellow eye of the mongrel, or the sinister yellow eye of the cat, but beyond that rational explanations for a distaste for yellow are few. It is sometimes claimed that a yellow-eyed Labrador tends to have a poorer sense of vision than those with hazel eyes but good scientific evidence for this is lacking. Perhaps yellow-eyed Labradors are just as effective in their natural setting, the hunting field, as their dark-eyed brothers.

Probably the major reason for the Standard's preference for a dark eye is the tremendous impact of the typical Labrador's expression. Whether or not the expression is invariably a true guide to temperament, it is certainly one of the most immediately compelling features of the dog. A yellow eye is unlikely ever to contribute very much to the depth of a typical Labrador's expression.

The Future Of Irish Setters

Why all this controversy over the size of Irish Setters? I have been breeding them for 35 years and in my opinion there is nothing more magnificent, more impressive or more eye-catching than the big red dog. Let us breed them as always having in mind balance as the deciding factor. Let us forget about the giants and the mid-gets.

Hunting is fast becoming a lost art due to the ever-changing conditions of life. With an abundance of all kinds of meat in Canada and United States the need for game birds for the table is nil. Where there is no need there is no logical reason for the destruction of these lovely birds, hence, there is no need for myriads of trained bird dogs. But for the few who wish to besport themselves of a days meander through the long grass any size of Irish Setter will furnish

enough birds to please the most aspiring nimrod.

While all this argument goes on regarding size, a far more serious condition stares us in the face and so far as I know nothing is being done about it. I refer to an imperfection in the hair pattern which usually appears on the arch of the dog's neck and which runs reversely sometimes from the base of the occiput to the withers. Sometimes they are smaller and occasionally they take on the pattern of a whirl.

I saw the first one about ten years ago and thought nothing of it. I now believe the prime cause of these marks are mutations and that they have become inheritable factors.

I am greatly perturbed over the rapidity with which these imperfections are now being reproduced. I heard of an entire litter of ten all being badly marked and I have seen several part litters so bad that the breeder sold them at reduced prices for pets only.

If, as I believe, these imperfections are hereditary they could and would be a serious setback to our breed. I would appreciate knowing just how alarmed other breeders are and if they can throw any light on this subject.

We have come a long way with our Setters and have made the red dog a symbol for beauty and elegance. It would now be irony to have to accept these imperfections as an established fault in our breed.

Bloodhounds and Tracking

The various methods which can be
used to train a Bloodhound to track
invariably teach the dog to expect to
find a human, the track layer at the
end. This gives incentive and eager-
ness. Due to their disposition they
enjoy meeting people which makes
them very suitable for searching for
lost persons. This must be the premier
aim in training Bloodhounds, saving
of lives being of foremost human-
itarian value.

The present tracking test of the
CKC lays stress on the finding of
objects and articles and is based on
the assumption that in the majority
of work dogs are called on to do, there
can be very little chance of finding
persons. Rather it is a case of look-
ing for clues to assist police and
other agencies in reconstructing

peoples' movements, in which instance
finding articles or weapons dropped
in passage are of great value.

The test also seems to make allow-
ances for the dog who around the
home acts as a watchdog, being
taught to reject strangers, making it
impossible to have practical discrim-
ination and identification made of the
track-layer.

This gives several approaches to
tracking, to train dogs to search for
people, dropped articles or both, each
method having advantages under
certain conditions.

Smooth Dachshund Coats

It seems that the Smooth Dachshund in Canada today is suffering from a very grievous fault. That of too sparse a coat.

The Standard runs something akin to the following: Hair: short, thick, smooth and shiny; no bald patches.

If one makes a detailed examination of the house pet and the show dog, they are apt to find the hair is sparse over the entire animal and that in many cases a bald spot will be found concealed under the forelegs. The stomach in most cases is devoid of hair completely. The chest is frequently extremely sparse in front and if the animal is turned over an actual bald spot will be found running the length of the chest.

These faults could and sometimes are passed off as normal wear and tear but are they? Are they not the result of a poor coat? If a Dachshund of close German ancestry is placed next to one of a long Canadian lineage, the differences in the two coats will be most evident.

The one of close German ancestry will first and foremost have hair on its stomach. Not a very heavy growth but enough to cover it completely to ward off any light dampness. This stomach hair gradually thickens until it covers the upper and lower portions of the dog's body with a short, thick, smooth, shiny coat. Nowhere is there any evidence of bald patches. Each hair is placed so that when one runs their fingers up the dog's body against the hair the underlying skin cannot be seen unless the dog is examined closely. These coats do not wear off in any area, no matter what the case may be.

This all boils down to the fact that in the show ring and elsewhere not too much attention has been paid to the coat of our Canadian Dachshund. The emphasis is placed primarily on conformation. Are our Dachshunds in Canada eventually going to be running around in a naked condition? It certainly appears so,

unless more attention is paid to the consistency of their coats.

Boxer Back Line

Recently I have had enquiries regarding "back lines". There are three "lines" on every breed of dog — top line, body line and back line. It is possible to have a short-backed long bodied dog, or a long-backed short bodied dog.

The top line begins at the base of the skull, runs along the neck, over the shoulders, along the back line to the base of the tail.

The body line begins at the base of the neck and extends to the base of the tail.

The back line begins at the withers and extends to the rump (where the

pelvis bones are joined to the backbone or the coupling). It does not include the rump.

Gait in the German Shepherd

Being a working dog, a German Shepherd is often required to cover long distances without tiring and so an effortless gait is an important part of the standard and of the dog.

The standard, or "ideal gait", is not nearly as common as one would imagine. The closer an individual dog approaches the breed standard the more likely that same dog will, at least, be a good mover. From observation I would say that not over 5% of this breed in North America possesses "the gait" but a much higher percentage are very good movers. These good movers are but a fraction below the standard.

If your dog has "the gait" plus temperament you may own a near perfect specimen of the breed.

Great Dane Back, Loin, Hindquarters

In seeking the correct topline on a Great Dane we should look for a nearly level back in the section between withers and croup. This section is known as the coupling and includes the loin.

An absolutely level back is not possible since the Standard calls for an imperceptible rise over the loins, meaning of course that one must be aware of this *slight* rise over the loins without being offended by it creating a roach, which is one of the most unsightly faults a Dane can have. If the dog is properly balanced in height and length he will most probably have the correct length of back.

However, a dog can have the correct length of back and still appear too long if he lacks depth of brisket or if he is too shallow in depth of loin (tuckup). Both these faults can cause the optical illusion of too long a back.

On the other hand, if the dog is too short in coupling he will appear stilted and higher on leg than is called for.

The slight rise over the loins should slope off gradually into the croup which should be at about a 30 degree slope to give a nicely rounded croup. When the croup slopes off too sharply it appears to throw the hindquarters out of balance.

The tail set is lowered, the stifles usually are over-angulated, producing

a weakness which is conducive to cowhocks. If the dog is too flat in croup he is usually straight in stifle and the tail seems to be set on a straight line with the backline.

So it is easy to see how important the proper angle of the croup is to the whole back assembly.

Again, our Standard fails to call for a definite degree of angle in the stifle stating only a well-rounded croup and a moderately bent stifle. The most attractive appearance is given when the stifle is a little more than moderately bent but not over-angulated. Dogs with this in-between degree of angulation seem to move better and with more drive. A well let down hock is called for (which probably means a short hock) ending again in good tight feet, with well arched toes.

COLOR — Any of the Standard colors are correct if they are good, clear colors. Some people prefer the golden brindles, others the dark seal brindle, some prefer the stag red fawn with jet black mask, others are devotees of the lovely clear golden fawn with lighter mask. Some prefer the solid blacks and then there is the staunch fancier who prefers the harlequin.

This is the one personal choice the Standard leaves us. In all other respects we all should try and follow what our Standard calls for, even though there are some points in it

Samoyed Size

The following is taken from the American Samoyed Bulletin and was written by the late Miss J. V. Thomson-Glover of England. Miss T. G. was one of very few real authorities on the breed. She was a specialty judge and her opinions were respected the world over by old breeders and novice breeders. Perhaps this might be of some help at the present time.

"Size is an unimportant factor compared with type or soundness. If an exhibit has balance, powerful easy movement, deep broad chest, well-sprung ribs, good front and hind-quarters, coupled with a beautiful head, off-standing and weather-resistant coat, and good feet, an inch more or less hardly counts. A thing I do find though is, that the owner of a small dog with type but perhaps a narrow chest, too light bone, indifferent shoulders and pasterns and softish coat, is apt to complain of great clumsy creatures above the standard and quite wrong, utterly ignoring their being far nearer the standard in essentials than their own exhibits. Owners of big dogs are, on the other hand, prone to view the wins of the small fry with surprised contempt, even if their own are leggy, plain and shelly in body. Whatever comes nearest the standard at all points, whether big or small or medium, is the one who should win."

Shetland Sheepdogs — Establishing a Winning Strain

First, buy one or two good, linebred females from a winning bloodline and buy the best you can afford. If possible, also buy a proven, related male, preferably a show winner.

Ronas Hill began with the purchase of two sable female puppies and an adult male that had started his show career and had won championship points. These three were from the Alford Kennels and all sired by Ch. Alford Wee MacGregor, a combination of Page's Hill and the English Wizbang strains. At the same time, the three year old blue merle female, Am. Ch. Pocono Trinket of Windy Oaks, was imported immediately following her win at Morris and Essex and she won her Canadian Championship in three straight shows within nine days of her arrival in Canada. Two of the original three from the Alford Kennels became champions

and the remaining female set an enviable record by producing seven champions.

A tricolour male, Magic Talisman of Pocono, was then purchased. He was sired by a brother of the blue female, Trinket, and he, too, quickly became a Canadian champion. The Pocono strain excelled in temperament, profuse coats, naturally tipped ears and sound movement. The Alford strain supplied refinement of head and beautiful, small, dark eyes. These strains blended beautifully and produced many champions.

Later, the Helensdale strain was introduced, with the purchase of the top-winning female in Britain, English Champion Helensdale Wendy, a daughter of the great Ch. Helensdale Ace. This strengthened the eye quality, lean backskulls, tremendous coats and temperament and added the glamour that only a Helensdale can impart. Wendy won her Canadian championship and produced five champions. Int. Ch. Chatawae's Fox Fire, a son of Int. Ch. Robin of Ronas Hill, was imported from the States, primarily as a mate for Wendy and the combination of bloodlines of these six purchased Shelties has produced 21 homebred champions in 15 years. Of these 21 champions, five were American champions.

The latest imports are Eng. Ch. Francehill Dry Ginger, Sumburgh Flame and Sumburgh Suzannah, all descended from Ch. Helensdale Ace. Ginger is already an International Champion; thus, of the nine Shelties purchased in the past 15 years, six have won their championships and the two Sumburgh females will be shown this year. —Mrs. Helen Lovett

Pembroke Welsh Corgis Today

It is now 37 years since the first Corgi was registered at the Kennel Club in the United Kingdom. During that time the Corgi has multiplied until it is one of the leading breeds in the U.K. and Australia, and is recognized in nearly every country in the world. In Canada until recently most of the Corgis were confined to Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia, but in the last few years with the population explosion they are now found in good numbers all across the Dominion.

It is easy to see how Corgis have achieved this popularity. They are a small dog weighing from 20 to 30 pounds. They are attractive in their alert and intelligent expression, as well as their bright coats. The predominant color is red in varying shades, usually with white markings, but some are black with red and/or red and white markings and these have become increasingly popular recently.

Their most unique feature is their short legs which, coupled with their good length of body, gives them a most distinctive appearance especially

ly when seen amongst a group of working dogs. The head is roughly triangular in shape, well chiselled out below the eyes, with a definite foxy appearance, although the expression should be soft and kindly.

The quality of our Canadian Corgis is high. This is apparent from the very good showings they make in the USA. For example, the Winners Bitch at the Golden Gate Pembroke Welsh Corgi Fanciers' Specialties in California the last four years has been either Canadian owned or bred. Since Corgis are a minor breed it is not easy for judges to get enough background on them to interpret the standard uniformly. This has resulted in considerable variation, particularly in type and heads amongst the winning dogs.

The increased popularity of the breed is the cause of considerable concern by many breeders. We all know what happens to breeds which become overly popular. It is the responsibility of every serious breeder to see that only top quality females and dogs are used for breeding so that we may produce ever better Corgis.

few, all have climates similar to ours and all have their fair share of winter shows. Frankly, I would prefer to show in the winter when, unless you're a ski enthusiast or a Barbara Ann Scott type, there's not a great deal to occupy oneself with, while the summer weekends don't, at times, seem to have enough hours to cover all activities. It seems to me as well that the weather during the winter months would be more conducive to showing, both for dogs and humans! Some of those summer shows are MURDER!

I understand one of the reasons for the lack of shows during the winter is that a good many of our shows are held in arenas which are reserved for hockey during the colder months — surely though, we must have other facilities throughout the country that could be used — in this way we might even elevate dog shows above the hockey level? If it is impossible to hold several shows during the winter, why not one REALLY big one? It's just about time for Canada to have a real PRESTIGE show! They hold one for horses, why not dogs?

Attended a Sanction show in Ottawa recently, beautifully set up with four rings going at once. Terriers again were few and far between but the ones that were there were nicely put down. Why, oh why, though do Terriers always get left to the end at Sanction shows? Possibly it's my imagination, but at nine out of ten Sanction shows Terriers are judged last. Not only is it hard on the puppies but by the time they finally do make it to the ring all the spectators have set off for home. We Terrier people would like the public to have a chance to view our breeds as well as the Collies, Poodles, Setters, etc. How about it Clubs?

Betty Hyslop of Cairndania fame has recently returned from Glasgow where she judged the Cairn Terrier Specialty (the first member of the CTCA to be invited to do this show, so I understand) — her critique of the CC winners Shea's Redstocks Kelly and Selynn Sheba was glowing, as was her description of the entire show and trip as well!

Anyone interested in a comprehensive picture of the Kerry Blue should try and acquire a copy of Casey Gardiner's "Record of Canine Characteristics" — "The Kerry Blue". This book has taken years of research to compile and it covers the Kerry right through from Basic Functional Anatomy to Gait. The artwork in the book can only be described as fantastic and as the drawings are reproduced to one half scale of an actual Kerry one has no difficulty in following the measurements. This book is not for Kerry breeders alone — any breeder of any breed can certainly benefit from it! As I understand copies are limited, I would suggest that clubs try to obtain one for the use of all their members. In Dr.

Montgomery's words, "Casey's work will set a standard for all breeds to follow"!

noses we try to avoid?). Neither of these infusions can be classed as Non-Sporting.

My own experience with the breed is that they have a natural instinct to retrieve, excellent noses and soft mouths. If you stack them up beside a German Short Haired Pointer there is very little difference beyond the spots and length of tail.

As regards size — I have heard it said that the Dalmatian should be under 23" as otherwise he could not run under the axles of the carriages. This will not hold water as that phase of their history was a short one when the English adapted them to that, then fashionable, use. They were not bred specifically for this and at any rate there are no longer any carriages. He is an adaptable character who has managed to come through the centuries without too much tampering at the hands of mankind and his spots still remain a mystery lost in the dark ages.

I do hope this may start the ball rolling and be the beginning of articles on Dalmatians, even if it's a blast from the experienced breeder cutting me down to size. Over to you.

The Poodle Tops America's Top Ten

The Poodle, for several years Ameri-
ca's most popular purebred dog, rang
up another phenomenal increase in
new registrations during 1964, ac-
cording to latest figures released by
the American Kennel Club. They
showed a rise of approximately 20%.
German Shepherds solidified their
second place ranking with an increase
of about 17%. Beagles, ranking third,
easily kept that position, no doubt
partially due to the tremendous pub-

licity aroused when President Johnson
demonstrated his method of lifting
Beagles — by the ears.

Fourth to ninth places in populari-
ty remained pretty much the same,
going, respectively, to Dachshunds,
Chihuahuas, Pekingese, Collies, Cock-
er Spaniels and Pomeranians.

Tenth place rated a real "dog
fight", with the Basset Hound holding
a slight lead over the fast-rising
Miniature Schnauzer for the spot oc-
cupied last year by the Boston Ter-
rier. This breed, once the most popu-
lar in the United States, failed to
come up to his 1963 rating and
seemed, at the time of writing, des-
tined for 12th.

An increase of around nine per-
cent in new registrations of purebred
dogs was scored for 1964.

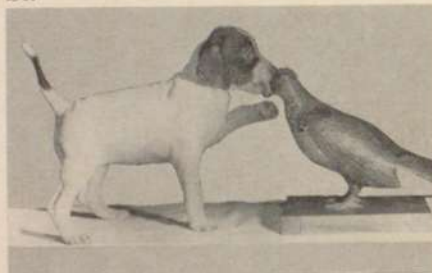
DOGS & PEOPLE
