CARBOHYDRATES IN THE FEEDING OF DOGS

For centuries men have fed their dogs carbohydrates — in the form of bread and potatoes. These carbohydrates are a primary source of energy for dogs, and today are obtained usually through the processed grains in commercial dog foods. Another source of energy, of course, is in fat and excess protein — that protein which is secured over and above the needs of the body.

Carbohydrates can be in the form of starches or sugars. Contrary to the opinions of some, starches can be digested and utilized for energy even though dogs do not secrete ptyalin — the enzyme found in the saliva of humans and some animals which aids in the digestion of starches.

However, dogs cannot digest milk sugar efficiently, and therefore abnormal quantities of milk cannot be tolerated. Too much milk in the dog's diet can result in soft droppings or even scours — that condition akin to diarrhea or dysentry in humans.

Dogs require energy for normal body functions and maintenance,

movement, work, temperature regulation and digestion.

Hardworking dogs such as sled dogs and lactating bitches require maximum energy intake — which can be provided by a small increase in the amount of fresh meat in the ration. This extra meat acts as a stimulant to the appetite and effectively increases food intake for both working dogs and lactating bitches.

Household pets, resting at normal temperatures, require the least energy expenditure. Fortunately, in this respect, food intake in dogs is regulated primarily by energy consumption and sugar level in the bloodstream; the intake increases or decreases to supply only the dog's need.


After breeding, the bitch increases her caloric (or energy) need only slightly until the last third of the gestation period — at which point her food intake should increase by 20% above the normal maintenance level. This high level is necessary for maximum milk production.

Another member of the canine family with a high energy requirement is the young puppy nursing his mother. At 8 weeks of age he eats enough dry food to equal approximately 8% of his body weight. By the time he is 3 months old his food intake is only one half what it was at the 8-week level (4% of his body weight per day), while at 4 months his food intake has declined slightly more, and continues to decline during the rest of the dog's life.

Energy utilization within the dog's body requires specific dietary vitamins and minerals. These are all supplied in the dog's normal ration.

A deficiency of energy makes for a thin animal, while an excess of energy is deposited as fat. Thus, inducements to encourage your pet to eat more than normal usually produce nothing more than obesity, and an animal prone to diseases and even a shortened lifespan.

So, feed your dog all that he needs to maintain good health and a thin muscular condition. Of course, dogs being readied for the show ring will require somewhat more food than normal. But never, never encourage or teach your pet to become a beggar or to eat more than he needs. This can only make him sluggish and inactive — a dull pet indeed.

Jai Alai finished his U.S. title in four straight shows with four Best of Winners and three majors — including a BW at the Miami Chihuahua Specialty in January, 1968. Bred, owned and shown by Don and Faye Fitzgerald.

Am. Ch. Pittores Peekaboo, bred, owned and shown to her American title by Pat Pittore at one year old, Peekaboo also has five points in Canada.

Luce's Ima Smartee has 13 points and two majors, his most recent win being Winners Dog at Westminster (February, 1969). He also has three points in two shows in Canada. Breeder, owner, Mrs. Rozel Luce, Kennedy, N.Y., U.S.A.

Ch. Brecon's Timid Tiger finished his championship at eight months of age with group placings. He has

just recently been exported.

Ch. Ladybird of Quantico, bred and shown to her Canadian title by Mr. and Mrs. Peterson of Trenton, Ont., finished her title at 6½ months, winning four out of six shows with four Best of Winners and two Best of Breeds (over Special), five Best Can. Bred Puppy in Group. Now owned by Carole Humfreys in California where in her first U.S. show she has a five point major and a group fourth. Watch for their new male, also an Individualist puppy, who has a Best Puppy in Sweepstakes win (defeating 94 all breed pups) and will start his show career this spring — called Crusaider.

Individualist is also the father of Ch. (Can. & Am.) Brecon's Demi Tasse (second top Chihuahua 1967) with lots of group placings and two Best Puppies in Show. Yawn was an International puppy Champion. Ch. Brecon's Cinammon Sinner — puppy Champion with a Best Puppy in Show as well. Faydon's Dulcie (eight points) litter sister to Jai Alai.

Not only a top show dog (second top Chihuahua to his kennel mate in 1965 and top Chihuahua the following year, 1966) he is now proving himself as a top producer as well. Watch for Wisherwood's Mischief O'Rika, a

How to Boost Scottie Interest
. The 1968 Scottish Terrier Specialty, held at Don Mills with the Scarborough K.C. Championship Show, could hardly be termed a resounding success with an entry of 11 Scots. It must be obvious to the Scottish Terrier Club that something is wrong. Each year less and less Scottish Terrier breeders, owners or kennels show their Scots. Why? Names synonymous with the Scot, kennels that once dominated the show ring, while still actively engaged in breeding top quality Scots have dropped out of showing.

Perhaps as an outsider, I could make a few suggestions.

Perhaps as an outsider, I could make a few suggestions.

First there is not enough publicity. Properly advertised across Canada I see no reason why scots from the west coast could not participate, and there are some very fine Scots out west and indeed all across Canada. Suitable advertising in the States would draw a large entry of dogs, since such a Specialty show, together with Burlington the day before and Scarborough the same day, could give enough points to finish a dog at one outing.

Secondly, I would suggest that the judge be picked by ballot at the club's A.G.M. (If that is not done now). And again why not occasionally invite one of the top Scottie people from England. There's been quite a few British judges over to the continent in the past few years. Mrs. Dallison, Gosmore, Mrs. Muriel Owen, Gaywayn and recently Dr. E. King, Brunnoch, each a Scottie Specialty Judge and a leading kennel owner and breeder in England.

Third on my list would have to be lack of appeal. The Scottish Terrier Club of England draws an entry of around 97 Scots with a total of about 200 class entries. What a sight that must be! There are literally dozens of prizes, trophies and something pretty nearly for everyone. Now for sure only two of these entries will get the male and female C.C. and two more the Res. C.C.'s, but that does not deter Scottie enthusiasts from entering and competing for the other prizes. How about this: For the best brindle bitch which possesses good pasterns and is sound in front and hindquarters. Best puppy under 9 months. Best Red or Wheaten bitch. And so the list goes on. I counted a total of 32 trophies, including one offered by a Canadian breeder for the Best Wheaten dog or bitch. Also not forgotten are the Veterans and Brace entries. Also produce Stakes for Bitches and Stakes for Studs and their progeny. And under English K.C. Rules a Ch. may still compete in the classes, thus making it that much harder to finish a champion. (I'm not

IN REPLY TO MR. FROST
... I was very interested in the advertisement in the February issue by Mr. G. W. Frost regarding removal of records from the Canadian National Live Stock Records.

I wonder if Mr. Frost has ever visited the office of the Live Stock Records on Queen Street in Ottawa. Certainly anything would be better than quarters in which they work. Desks with masses of paper so close together it is no wonder it takes anywhere from two months to seven months for registrations to go through.

After five years of registering dogs, I have had litters registered anywhere from 23 days to five months after forwarding papers to the Live Stock Records office. On one occasion I took a transfer paper in rather than mailing it in the hope that it might be processed a little more quickly. This was a transfer remember, and it took six weeks before I received the papers.

As for individual registrations, I have received these anywhere from two months up to seven months after they were mailed to the office.

I know the fact that the quarters for the Live Stock Records are so overcrowded, old and smelly certainly has some bearing on the efficiency of the personnel. However, if it is decided to leave matters as they now stand, i.e., having registrations, records and processing done by the Canadian National Live Stock Records, then we should certainly press for better working conditions for the employees. From what I have seen, these must surely be the worst in Canada.

Mr. Frost decries against the efforts of R. C. Willis to sway the vote to have the records of pure-bred dogs moved from C.N.L.S.R. Ottawa to the C.K.C. in Toronto. However, Mr. Frost is relying on the same technique as did Mr. Willis, i.e. — a published letter to the membership — to achieve exactly the opposite effect. Further, Mr. Frost is one down in that he is trying to reverse a course of action that has been already voted upon and accepted. accepted.

Right or wrong as Mr. Frost may be, the fact remains that the voting membership of The Canadian Kennel Club HAVE HAD THEIR OPTION and that less than one-third of them care what happens to the records should now have no bearing on the matter. The fact remains that if even, as alleged, C.N.L.S.R. are victims of circumstances beyond their control, it still takes three months to process a domestic registration certificate. And this is very interesting as well because if the same dog had been for export, the export certificate can be processed in three days.

for export, the export certificate can be processed in three days.
Status Quo can be the death knell of any business. The present system is not working well so we must try for something better. This question of computerization of records is not new. It was one of the recommendations of the Warnock-Hersey Report to the C.K.C. in 1965 and the subject of much heated debate at the C.K.C.'s Annual Meeting in February of 1966.

Machine tabulation of certificates and records may not prove to be perfect but it will prove to be better, faster and more efficient and that alone will justify any increase in costs.

I favored this move in 1966, I favor it now.

. . . Several of our club members have drawn to my attention the detrimental effect on the promotion and popularity of the Basenji in Canada that could be caused because of an item in the December issue of Dogs in Canada "Breed Notes", page 18, paragraphs headed "Anemia Study in Basenjis."

The Basenji is one of the hardiest of all the known breeds of dogs and is the oldest known pure-bred breed in existence. The Basenji dates well beyond the Egyptian Dynasties of the Pharoahs. The breed had to be hardy to survive the primeval conditions in which it lived down through the ages.

Can you imagine your next door neighbor who is interested in owning a Basenji picking up the December Dogs in Canada and reading that item? People believe what they see in print and most do not realize the difference between a small percentage say of 25% and 0.0025%.

This anemia is said to be known only to Basenjis and is of a particular type affecting a very minute percentage of the breed. I am from "Missouri" that it may not be found in other breeds and despite the learned statements on the subject by Dr. John B. Tasker, Mr. Gene P. Seary, and the Morris Animal Foundation, what proof do we have that this is based on the scientific research work of experts or is it publicity surrounding the thesis of students rationalizing with little and limited pure research.

. The trials and tribulations of dedicated breeders are well known to most of us. Of the three Pr's in canine liturgy, pleasure is the only one relevant to breeding and showing dogs. Selling pupples is where we relinquish profit and prestige. There are breeders of ill repute listed in the kennel directory who sell pupples for less than half what it costs a reputable kennel to produce. These are sold without kennel (onn-breeding) contracts, which if employed more often would curtail a lot of competition from pet owners, the pet usually being unworthy of reproduction. Where is profit and prestige when our kennel directory is a media in distributing junk to the public, thereby cutting the throats of conscientious breeders! ON VITAMIN E
... The January issue of Dogs in Canada has just reached me here in Florida where I'm enjoying an extended vacation following judging assignments at Tampa and Orlando in January.

May I say I was amazed on reading the letter published over the signature of B. Sorrell D.V.M. I didn't know that there were veterinarians anywhere who were so totally unaware of the status of Vitamin E. As long ago as 1958 the Annotated Bibliography on Vitamin E, published by The National Vitamin Foundation, listed 4,585 titles, medical, veterinary and in the basic sciences. Since 1958 the number of articles has more than doubled. Yes, indeed over 10,000 scientists have been mining gold at the foot of "The Vitamin E Rainbow".

As early as 1946 Dr. N. H. Lambert of Dublin, Ireland, at that time president of the National Veterinary Medical Association, published in both the English and the American Veterinary Journals, his results in treating cardiovascular disease in dogs and cats and since then there have been something over 600 articles in the medical literature written by over 800 clinicians and investigators from 35 countries supporting the use of Vitamin E in cardiovascular disease.

Dr. Sorrell admits that the combination of selenium and tocopherol (Vitamin E) is an effective drug but limits its effectiveness to muscular diseorders! Yet many exceedingly well qualified veterinarians have carried the investigation of its use into other fields and have declared it effective in the treatment of blood vessel obstructions in horses, in some forms of arthritis and in some specific skin disorders. Other veterinarians have found it apparently useful in checking high dysplasia, when the condition was discovered and treated in time. All puppies are born with normal hip joints. Some go on to develop hip dysplasia. No one should presume to decide that the condition is purely genetic until the evidence is all in. To do so is to be most "unscientific". This is especially true in the current status of the knowledge on hip dysplasia

of cases.
I hope that when a cure for hip dysplasia is found there will be no "uninformed veterinarians". Certainly some of the profession are 23 years behind Dr. Lambert.

After he had completed the necessary certificates (finding the dog to be normal, incidentally, albeit somewhat nervous) both copies were passed to the ring steward, one for CKC and one for the owner, now standing outside the ring with her younger brother and parents, all looking quite mystified over the apparent fuss. When delivering the vet's certificate I attempted to explain the examination and its purpose and summarized this homily by saying that the judge had apparently some doubts or difficulty in making a decision and had (most properly) asked for a medical opinion, or in other words had asked the vet to "count the number of testicles present". At this, the exhibitor's mother asked in a tone of utter disbelief: "What! Up to two?"

MEET THE COLLIE -

"Lassie" waiting at the gate for the school bus is a familiar sight to many thousands across this country, not only on television, but it is also the sight they see every weekday as their own Collie waits for his children to return from school. Eric Knight's "Lassie Come Home" has immortalized the Collie for the present generation as Albert Payson Terhune did for the previous generation.

These heroic tales of courage and devotion are not as farfetched as some might think. Collies have been bred for several hundred years to herd livestock, to protect the farm or home and all its occupants, especially young children. The Collie watches over young children today with the same instinctive vigilance his ancestors devoted to their flocks. The Collie will patrol a hundred acres, but he can adapt to a city yard with ease.

There is a wonderful, but often misunderstood, trait of independence in most Collies that is a product of the herding background. The good herder handling large flocks often found himself working far away from his master, where he was thrown upon his ability to think and act for himself. This ability to act independently often became developed to the point where a confident, good-working, selfassured Collie would become sulky and "insulted" if given too much direction. It has been said that the Collie is the dog "with the keen mind of a man and the winning ways of a woman". He will not go out of his way to seek trouble but will capably meet it should it come his way.

The almost human, very intelligent forward look of the Collie can best be described by Terhune's famous phrase "the look of eagles" This, together with the arched neck and proudly carried head give him the appear-ance of always "looking over the top of, never through or under the fence". The long blunt wedge of the head (which fits so nicely into your hand when he wants attention or to comfort you) not only adds greater beauty and balance, it also enables the dog to nip heels of horses and cattle with little danger when herding.

The magnificent well-fitting coat provides protection from all weather and insulation against the heat, and the luxurious ruff protects the head, particularly those sensitive ears from the elements. The sight of such a dog makes an unforgettable impression

The regal bearing and the storied past of the Collie, however, does not prevent his being the ideal chum of ordinary humans.

AND THE SHETLAND SHEEPDOG

He is the smallest, and liveliest member of the Collie family. His name tells you where he came from and what job he was built to do. In the past fifty years, however, he has largely left his native crofts and has moved south, east and west, given up most of his work (though you will find him in obedience competitions everywhere), and has improved his appearance.

When you meet a Sheltie (that is what his friends call him) it is quite likely that his size will surprise you. He always seems to be smaller than you would expect; the top of his head is below the height of your knee. He has a full coat, with a gorgeous mane, and ample feathering on his forelegs and tail. His lines are delicate and graceful, but do not be deceived; there is nothing delicate about his constitution. He is a tough and tireless animal, and that superb coat of his is windproof and waterproof, besides being conviently dirt-repellent.

Notice his ears. In repose, or when he is racing at speed, they lie flat against the head, but when he is at the alert they spring up, straining in every direction to catch the least sound, and are never still. The tips, however, hang gracefully forward.

One of his greatest assets is his expression: few dogs have such a winning look or can smile so sweetly! He has a way of tilting his head slightly to one side, and looking at you out of the corner of his eyes, which melts the sternest heart. The Sheltie certainly knows how to ask for what he wants.

He is an inquisitive animal, too; he was not given that tapering nose for nothing, and it is disconcerting to find how much it can get

Like all sheepdogs he tends to be a oneman dog, but he can nevertheless be very sociable. He mixes well with other dogs, is never happier than when romping in a pack with other Shelties, and takes well to children (especially if brought up with them). He should never snap and, unless over-excited, is not noisy. Nowhere, however, does breeding tell so much as in temperament, and the Sheltie is not a dog to buy from anyone but a recognized Sheltie breeder.

NOTICE

From time to time our attention is drawn to the practice of some breeders who, when advertising or otherwise offering dogs for sale, indicate in some way that the purchaser of a dog sold as pure-bred will be required to make a higher, or additional, payment in order to be furnished with a certificate of registration. Such persons should note that the price at which a dog is sold, or the purpose for which a dog was purchased, has no bearing whatever on the obligation of the seller to supply the purchaser with a certificate of registration issued by The Canadian Kennel Club for a dog sold as pure-bred.

The Live Stock Pedigree Act, a federal statute, requires that when a person sells a dog as pure-bred, or contracts to sell a dog as pure-bred, he must furnish, or agree to furnish, a certificate of registration, together with fully-recorded transfer of ownership to the buyer.

Article XXXI, Section 3 of the By-laws of The Canadian Kennel Club reads as follows:

"A member may be suspended or expelled, or a non-member deprived of the privileges of the Club, if it is proven to the satisfaction of the Board that when selling, or otherwise disposing of a dog for a consideration (monetary or otherwise), the person disposing of the dog has asked or required the new owner to make any form of payment specifically for the purpose of being furnished with a certificate or registration."

To avoid possible prosecution under the Live Stock Pedigree Act and/or possible disciplinary action by The Canadian Kennel Club, members and others engaged in the selling of dogs as purebred are cautioned to refrain from the practice of quoting two selling prices for the dogs, one "with papers", the other "without papers", or to in any other way indicate that an additional payment is required for a certificate of registration.

This notice is published by an order of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club.



TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS

I think this month I'll describe some of the unusual and perhaps, in some cases, comical happenings that I have seen occur or that have occurred in the rings that I have been judging in.

In the Directional Jumping exercise the handler was given the order from the Judge "Bar Jump to your right". Let me explain what lay in that direction: first, there was the Bar Jump, then about 21/2' further out was the side of the ring made up of 24" high solid fencing, then just behind the spectators was the edge of the stage platform and below this platform edge was a 6' drop. This particular ring was set up on a large stage overlooking all the other breed and obedience rings below. Got a rough idea of the set up? Well, anyway, the handler at this point has passed everything quite well, it's one of the last Trials of the year in the U.S.A. before all the new rule changes come into effect. He needs only one more leg to finish, so he desperately needs and wants this leg. (The dog, incidentally, was a large, rather happy working German Shepherd).

The handler, feeling the moment was right, shot his arm strongly to the right (with plenty of body English, I might add) and simultaneously exclaimed "Over"; whereupon his dog instantly took off for the side of the ring that was being pointed at, but instead of heading for the Bar Jump. leaped over the side of the ring between a small opening in the crowd and disappeared from view. There was an audible involuntary gasp from the spectators, followed by a moment of stunned silence. I guess everyone thought the dog had gone over the edge of the platform. Fortunately, our hero stopped short of the edge and someone was holding him when the handler went out to get him. Why the dog jumped towards the crowd and side of the ring, instead of the Bar Jump I'm not certain. It's not that it didn't like the Bar Jump, the owner said his dog didn't mind the Bar at all. The only conclusion I could come to in this particular case was that the dog was sitting at a slight angle facing the side of the ring and not paying too much attention, so when it received the command and signal the dog was startled into action and jumped the first obstacle it saw, which was the side of the ring. In any case it was an exciting few seconds, believe me!

How about the incident of the Belgian Tervuren in the GO portion of the Directional Jumping exercise! The ring was a beautiful outdoor ring on a

golf course in the Laurentians of Quebec, and the handler had just given his dog the command and signal to GO! The dog immediately galloped out straight as an arrow to the other end of the ring; whereupon the handler shouted "Fido. Sit". I believe the dog's ears flicked backwards as if it had heard the command - however, instead of turning around and sitting it cleared the strand of rope at the end of the ring, kept right on running until it disappeared from sight over the rise of the hill. After the few quick "Oh! Isn't that too bad!", everyone had a good laugh, including the owner, who was a good sport. How's the saying go? "You pays your money and you takes your chances.'

The Standard Poodle in the Drop on Recall exercise receives the "Down" command while coming in. Upon hearing the command, stops, does a full stretch (like it was yawning), then slowly lowers its front legs and chest touching the ground while his rear end is still in the upright position, accompanied by a tail wag that appears to be keeping time with an invisible metronome (I wish you could have seen the handler's face!)

Then there was the dog who, on the Retrieve on Flat did a perfect Drop on Recall at the midway point from where it had left its handler and the dumbell it was to retrieve. Apparently the dog must have heeded a "Down" command that was given to another dog about three rings away at the same time it was running out to retrieve its own dumbell. (It had to be given another command to retrieve).

In the Scent Discrimination exercise there was the little Boston Terrier that went right on past the articles to the other end of the ring, right under the ropes, did an exploratory sniff of two spectators, and then came right back into the ring and completed the Scent Discrimination exercise very success-

(I've seen this one often enough). On the Retrieve over High Jump, after receiving the command to "Fetch", the



UMANELY SPEAKING

Continued from February issue

Since this average man (described in last month's issue) with his wife and two children represents the group of people which own and possess more small animals than any other, he is a good example of the problem. This man simply cannot afford a veterinary bill of, say, \$100. If he was to purchase an item from the store for \$100, he would almost certainly have to take that payment on some easy credit terms. I do not know how many veterinary hospitals offer charge accounts, credit terms, revolving payments, call them what you will, but it does not matter whether they do or not; what matters is the mental attitude of the owner of the animal who simply looks on this additional expense as the straw that will break the camel's back. He cannot afford his other expenses, but he can avoid the veterinary bill by simply not taking his animal to the hospital.

As a result, the animal either gets better or suffers and gets worse. In every animal shelter run by the Humane Society across Canada, we see countless thousands of animals brought in for destruction which are the result of neglect of veterinary attention at an early stage in the development of the disease or problem.

The veterinarians, as a profession, prefer to be unaware of the problem. As a matter of fact, as recently as a few days ago I received a letter from the Toronto Academy of Veterinary Medicine which seemed to indicate that this group of veterinarians, at least, do not recognize the problem, or that it exists in any form, other than the animals owned by indigents, whatever they are. Can you wonder why the veterinary profession holds such a bad public image. Certainly they do everything they can to encourage a bad image, and nothing that I have ever seen to inform the public or to discourage that reputation. True, the Toronto Academy and the O.V.A. have, from time to time, put on displays at exhibitions such as the Sportsmen's Show, the C.N.E. and the Royal Winter Fair, but I have never noticed much emphasis in these exhibits towards this particular problem. In fact, I have never ever met a veterinarian who will even admit that it exists, at least, not publicly.

What is needed, and needed badly, are voluntary free animal clinics staffed by qualified veterinarians, using

facilities and premises provided by the State, or more probably the public through some effort organized by the Humane Society (who else?), to which a member of public could bring their pet without any form or reverse snobbery, and have the animal examined and some advice obtained, which might help to alleviate the suffering without breaking the man's bank account and putting him into debt. I am well aware of the reaction of the veterinary profession to such an idea. No doubt they can see dollars and dollars going out of the window. But I wonder if that would be the case. I doubt very much if it would. Surely the person who is prepared to make the sacrifice and spend the money now on a veterinary fee, is still going to do it. Indeed, a voluntary fee clinic in which the owner of the animal may make a contribution towards the cost of examination and some basic treatment might even be encouraged to go on to a proper veterinary hospital if he was aware of the actual cost involved. Some animal owners do not take their pets to a hospital because they have a mistaken idea of what it is going to cost. As a result, some animals suffering from a relatively minor condition are not treated when they could have had the condition cleared up for a relatively minor expense. When the condition has deteriorated further, if they do then go to a veterinary hospital, the expense is out of proportion. As a result, the animal is then killed.

Even killing animals is an expensive business. Everybody knows the cost of injecting protective serums.

Probably the injection of protective serums is considered the real gravy on the part of the veterinary practice, but I often wonder whether it is not short sightedness on the part of veterinarians. There might be a lot more pet animals kept if people were not so frightened of keeping pet animals by the cost of injecting against, say distemper.

CRISIS IN THE ONTARIO HUMANE MOVEMENT

For many years your publishers have been actively interested in the humane movement. This article reflects our deep concern with two bills now before the Ontario Legislature.

"The humane movement in Ontario will be destroyed if two Bills, 73 and 74, now before the Ontario Legislature, are enacted," states Tom Hughes, General Manager of the Ontario Humane Society.

If you want to protect pet animals from seizure by unscrupulous dealers, if you want to protect your animals against abuse in the medical research laboratories, if you want to maintain a humane movement in Ontario . . . then we strongly urge you to convey your thoughts to your local Member of Provincial Parliament by telephoning him, writing him, organizing petitions, protest meetings, picketing the Legislature and any form of protest you can

The main points of these two new and incredible bills is given later in

The Ontario Humane Society, at the present time, operates under the Ontario S.P.C.A. Act. This Act has been in force with amendments since 1919. As recently as 1955, the Government of Ontario re-defined the powers of the Society to prevent unnecessary suffering on the part of animals. Very briefly, the Act allows Inspectors of the Society to enter premises to investigate complaints of cruelty and to examine the animals on those premises. This authority has been jealously guarded and never intentionally abused. It has made it possible for the Society to intervene in countless thousands of cases of cruelty to animals. But for the intervention of the Society, these animals would have suffered unnecessarily. It has resulted in thousands of prosecutions for cruelty being taken, the majority of which have resulted in convictions. It is impossible to estimate the animal suffering that has been alleviated by this intelligent legislation.

During the last 50 years, the humane movement in Ontario has painfully and gradually built up a chain of modern Animal Shelters throughout the Province. At the present time there are 28 Animal Shelters with a capital investment running into millions of dollars. These Animal Shelters provide a haven for unwanted stray or abandoned animals. They are built to the highest possible standard and are operated efficiently and humanely. The standard maintained in these Shelters is as high as the average veterinary hospital. "By comparison." states Mr. Hughes, "there are hundreds of public pounds in Ontario which are a disgrace to the province and a living proof of the indifference and apathy of public officials, all of whom know perfectly well that these scandalous conditions exist but who have failed to take any action to remedy them.

"The Ontario Humane Society has repeatedly brought these conditions to the attention of the Government, both Provincial and Municipal, and yet today these shocking and scandalous conditions still exist, living evidence of a total lack of concern for animals on the part of public officials." Fifty years of progress toward a civilized community, in which animals are protected against cruelty and neglect, now appears to be coming to a dramatic and tragic end.

Mr. Wm. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, has introduced Bill 73 into the Ontario Legislature. Bill 73 is described as "An Act to Regulate the Procurement and to Provide for the Welfare of Animals Used for Teaching and Research". The Act will license dealers in animals for research and the premises in which animals are used

for experimentation.

The Research Animals Bill means very simply that any pound, or any Animal Shelter operated by the Humane Society, will be forced to surrender to research institutions AND TO DEALERS, ON DEMAND, ANY UNCLAIMED UNSOLD ANIMAL. Read that sentence again. It means that some of the unscrupulous dealers in animals for research can walk into any Animal Shelter and demand unclaimed, unsold animals. These dealers can then take these animals back to their own premises, keep them, sell them, resell them, and do anything they like with them. And to make certain that the Society cannot embarrass these licensed dog dealers or registered research facilities, the Act prohibits the Ontario Humane Society inspectors from investigating their premises. In other words, the Government of Ontario intends to legalize all dealers in pets and give special protection to the pet dealers.

The second piece of legislation, Bill

74, introduced by Mr. Arthur Wishart, Attorney General, who is an MPP for Sault Ste. Marie, Mr. Hughes states, is "clearly and simply intended to eliminate the Ontario Humane Society as an agency capable of enforcing the laws that protect animals in Ontario." tion

Bill 74 requires the Inspectors of the Society who receive a complaint of cruelty or neglect from the public, to appear before a Justice of the Peace. The Inspector will have to fill in a form describing the alleged neglect (which he has not seen himself!) and swear an affidavit, on oath, that he feels the complaint is reasonable, and ask for a warrant to enter and check the animals. How the Inspector can make such an affidavit without having seen the animals is a mystery. Where the Justices of the Peace are going to be found, to make these warrants available, is a mystery. Armed with the warrant, if he ever gets it, the Inspector will then try to carry out an investigation. Since in most country districts the presence of the Inspector is very soon known throughout the area, and since quite often the purpose of his visit is soon common knowledge, it seems reasonable to assume that most persons will have taken action to eliminate the animals, destroy the evidence or simply remove the cause for complaint. Presuming, however, that the Inspector does get into the premises where the animals are believed to be neglected, he may then, under the new legislation, decide that the animals are being neglected. If this is his opinion he will then have to call for a veterinarian. The Act does not say who is to pay for the veterinarian but nevertheless, he is to call in a veterinarian. If the veterinarian agrees that the animal has been neglected, the inspector may either feed the animal or may remove it.

The Act goes on to create a "Review Board". Who will sit on the Review Board is not known, but the Board will hear complaints from anyone who has been investigated by an Inspector of the S.P.C.A. or a Humane Society or whose animals have been removed. This Board may call witnesses and may order that the animals shall be returned to the person from whom they have been taken and may assess the costs of the seizure against the Society.

14/Dogs in Canada

This means, very simply, that Inspectors of the Society will be wrapped up in red tape, intimidated by the presence and potential action of the Review Board, and generally prevented from carrying out their job.

The reason for this two-fold legislation is pretty clear.

On the one hand, scientific interests are determined to obtain a cheap supply of animals, and they look to people's pets to provide this supply. Obviously, research is necessary, and must go on. But the method proposed by the Government to obtain these animals is tantamount to removing the rights of people to private property and giving police powers to dog dealers to force their way onto private property and to remove animals from that property. Remember that the Shelters are the private property of Humane Societies and the animals in the Shelters are the private property of the Humane Society.

On the other hand, agricultural interests are concerned with the increasing activity and efficiency of the humane movement, and see in the humane movement a threat to the increasing use of animals in production-line techniques in the research laboratories. The proposed legislation is disgraceful, totalitarian, un-Canadian. It is the sort of legislation one would expect in Russia, not in a democratic Canada, from a Conservative Government.

Tom Hughes, General Manager of the Ontario Humane Society, says, "There will be no Humane Society in Ontario within a short period of time if this legislation goes through. The public will not support any Society which abandons its principles in the interests of expediency. I foresee very clearly the closing down of the Animal Shelters in the province, or of them being taken over by Municipalities and run as dog pounds. I foresee, very quickly, the cancellation of the contracts between the Society and the Municipalities, under which the Society provides animal services for Municipalities. I foresee the Society releasing all its Inspectors because they simply will not be able to perform any useful

"Countless thousands of men and women have given their lives, money and effort into building up an efficient, humane organization, of which Ontario can justly be proud. The largest Humane organization in Canada is in danger of being destroyed by the thoughtless, arrogant action explicit in these proposed pieces of legislation by our Government.

"Despite the many briefs presented by the Ontario Humane Society to the Government of Ontario, including a plea for the proper licensing of all commercial horse establishments and PMU farms, and authorized regular inspections by Humane Society inspectors . . . at no time prior to the Government introducing this new legislation was the Ontario Humane Society consulted, or given an opportunity to discuss it, or even made aware that it was being considered.

"Only Governments can make laws and only Governments can repeal them. We appeal to you, as an individual interested in animal welfare, to stand up for your individual rights and voice your protest in every way possible to your local Member of Provincial Parliament. Help us to try to protect pet animals from seizure by dealers and abuse in the laboratories. With these new Bills, the Government of Ontario has, to all intents and purposes, served notice that they intend to destroy the humane movement. The public of Ontario must serve notice on the Government, quickly and emphatically by any legal means, if they do not wish this to happen. Act now or it will be too late."

It is difficult to rationalize the action taken by the Government, it is difficult to understand why they would ignore the work and accomplishments of the Humane Society, built up by individuals in an effort to conserve what is good and correct what is wrong and inhumane. It is difficult to understand why so many animals are required for medical research, in the tens of thousands or even hundreds of thousands annually. Doubtless there is duplication and repetitious testing in medical classes and between universities.

It is hoped that our elected Government will listen to the raised voice of informed public opinion and withdraw this ill-considered piece of new legislation.

Summary of Bill 73:

"The operator of a pound is required, except in certain specified circumstances, to sell any unclaimed dog or cat that is in the pound to a dealer or operator of a research facility within the specified time limits".

"Inspection of dealers' premises and research facilities is provided for, along with other ancillary matters." (The government appoints the inspectors).

"Pound includes premises that are used for the detention, maintenance or disposal of dogs or cats that have been abandoned, have strayed, have been impounded pursuant to a bylaw of a municipality or have been left at the premises to be disposed of by the operator thereof."

Except under the authority of a warrant under section 14 of the Summary Convictions Act, an Inspector shall not enter any part of a dwelling without the consent of the owner or tenant unless the occupant is a licensed dealer, or unless he has reasonable grounds for believing that the occupant is maintaining in such part animals that are used or intended to be used in research.

Sections 12, 13 and 14 of the Ontario S.P.C.A. Act 1955, do not apply in respect of animals in the possession of a licensed dealer or the operator of a registered research facility.

Subject to subsection 2, the redemption period shall be 48 hours, or such longer period as the regulations prescribe.

Bill 73 goes on to cancel out portions of the 1955 Ontario S.P.C.A. Act, Sections 12, 13 and 14 . . . those portions which specify that "If there is any reasonable ground for believing that an animal has been confined in any place without necessary food, water and attention for more than 15 hours, an inspector or agent of the Society may open and enter the building in which the animal is confined and may supply it with the necessary food, water and attention as long as it remains there without such necessaries or, if he deems it advisable, may remove the animal." (Section 12, 1955 Ontario S.P.C.A. Act). In the words of the proposed Act, these regulations are not to apply in respect of animals in the possession of a licensed dealer or the operator of a registered research facility.

POUND

A pound is a public place, owned or operated by a municipality, in which animals are impounded for having contravened a bylaw which prohibits these animals from being at large.

HUMANE SOCIETY ANIMAL SHELTER

is a building owned and operated by a Humane Society, in which unwanted animals are sheltered and made available for adoption to the general public, and to which the general public may deliver animals for euthanasia. These Shelters are sometimes used to house impounded animals under the terms of a contract between the Humane Society and a municipality, but the Shelter still remains the property of the Humane Society when this contract exists.

THE POUNDS ACT BRIEF

was presented by the Ontario Humane Society to the Hon. Darcy McKeough, Minister of Municipal Affairs. At no time prior to introducing this legislation (Bills 73 and 74) was the Ontario Humane Society consulted or given an opportunity to discuss it or made aware that it was even being considered.

Agriculture, repeals the same sections of the 1955 S.P.C.A. Act, and attempts to enact instead a regulation requiring that the inspector or agent of the Ontario Humane Society must obtain a warrant of authorization from a justice of the peace before be can enter the building or place; on this warrant, he must provide information on oath "that there are reasonable grounds for believing that there is . . . an animal that is in distress". Every warrant issued under subsection 1 shall be executed between sunrise and sunset, unless the justice by the warrant authorizes the inspector or an agent of the Society to execute it at night.

Section 14b of the proposed new bill announces formation of an Animal Care Review Board of three persons who shall be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor; whereby the owner or custodian of any animal deems himself aggrieved with the inspection of an animal by the inspector or agent of the Ontario Humane Society or by the removal of an animal, he may within five days of receiving notice of the order or removal, appeal against the order or request return of the animal. And where, in the opinion of the owner or custodian, the animal has ceased to be in distress, he may apply to the Board

to have the order revoked! Copies of these proposed bills may be obtained by writing the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, Room 110, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. Up to four copies may be obtained free; beyond that, they are 25c each.

A brief entitled "The Regulation and Control of Public Pounds in Ontario" was submitted to the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Province of Ontario, by the Ontario Humane Society, in January 1969. This brief detailed a survey of existing public pounds, a report on the Animal Shelters operated by Humane Societies, and a recommendation for a form of new legislation, in an attempt to improve the sometimes appalling conditions in local municipal pounds. The problems outlined in the Pound Brief were spelled out: (1) to ensure that any animal impounded under the authority of either Provincial legislation or municipal bylaw, is held in facilities which are adequate for the particular animal's reasonable requirements; free of risk of abnormal exposure to disease; provided with adequate food, water, shelter and care; (2) to ensure that any person whose property is impounded by the local authority has a reasonable opportunity to recover his property; and finally, (3) to guarantee a humane merciful death to any animal which has to be disposed of.

The brief suggested that "Given adequate Regulations, the Ontario Humane Society could easily bring to an end the present neglect and abuse of animals . . ." and pointed out that the inspection of pounds could be included in the duties of all inspectors. The cost to the Government of Ontario to provide the extra assistance to the Humane Society would only be a fraction of the expense which would be incurred by the Government if police officers were used to inspect pounds, or if some special force of 'inspectors' were created for the purpose. The Humane Society already has a trained force of inspectors and it has the organization to administer and supervise inspectors. The Province of Ontario would thus obtain expert enforcement at no cost to the taxpayer.

This brief was presented in January of this year to the Hon. Darcy Mc-Keough, Minister of Municipal Affairs for the Province of Ontario. There has been no reaction from the Department of Municipal Affairs, although the problem of animal control is certainly one of great concern to the municipalities.

Canine "Family" Control

A study into ways to control reproduction in dogs is being undertaken at the School of Veterinary Medicine, Colorado State University, by a team of veterinary scientists. The research will attempt to utilize a luteinizing hormone which is secreted by the pituitary gland. Efforts will first be directed toward attempting to develop a simplified technique for isolating the pure hormone. Immunization against the hormones which regulate testicular function in males and ovarian function in females might have a twofold purpose: reproductive processes might be delayed for a short period of time or be permanently halted if need be.

The study is supported by the Seeing Eye, Inc., Morristown, N.J. and the Scaife family of Pittsburgh through the Morris Animal Foundation, Denver, Ohio.

Organization of a Junior K.C.

N June of 1967, the Ottawa Kennel Club held a special general meeting with a panel discussion regarding the formation of a Junior Kennel Club. The panel consisted of Mrs. Pat Randal, Saskatoon, Mrs. June Monyhan, and Mrs. Doris Courtney of Ottawa, with Dr. F. George Walker chairing the discussion.

During the winter of 1967-68 a series of eight meetings were held for junior members of the O.K.C. to determine the response to an educational program on dogs for juniors. Our attendance averaged 18 juniors.

The enthusiasm of our junior members made it abundantly clear to the O.K.C. Executive that there was a definite need for a Junior Kennel Club in the Ottawa area.

To this end, the O.K.C. Executive gave terms of reference to two of their members, Bob Tape and the writer, to draw up guidelines for the formation of a junior club. A deadline was set so that, following approval by Executive, the suggested guidelines were to be presented to the October general meeting.

After approval of the guidelines by the general meeting, advertisements were placed in the local Ottawa papers announcing formation of a kennel club for juniors, the date and location of the organizational meeting and a phone number for information.

Mrs. Thora Brown (formerly Miss Thora Britten), well-known in Toronto dog circles, was appointed advisor to the new junior club. The writer was appointed O.K.C. Director responsible for the junior club. The organizational meeting was held November 9 at which time the objectives and structural guidelines were presented to the juniors, and they were asked for suggestions on subject matter for the winter meetings.

The second meeting, held November 16, was devoted to discussion, conducted by Mrs. Brown, of duties at dog shows. Then duties were assigned to the juniors for the O.K.C. November 23 and 24 shows.

At the November shows 20 members of the new Ottawa Junior Kennel Club effectively carried out assignments as Assistant Ring Stewards; Runners, issued arm bands to exhibitors and sold show catalogues.

December 7, at their third meeting, they elected their own Executive: President, Michael D. Pritchard; Vice-President, Miss Sera Willis; Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Iveagh Munro; Directors, Miss Carole Willis and André Dubé.

Later in December, the Executive drew up the following program for the current winter: Handling and Grooming; Mechanics of a Dog Show; Anatomy of a Dog; Films on Obedience; Movement and Faults; Show Rules and Entries; Diseases and First Aid; Show Care; Standards Study Sessions; and for the final meeting, before people go to cottages or take dogs on holidays, they will have a lecture on rabies.

All meetings are held on Saturday mornings to avoid conflict with school studies and our final winter-spring meeting will be held in mid-May to avoid conflict with preparation for school examinations.

WESTMINSTER AND A BLIZZARD

THE annual pilgrimage of dog people, some with dogs, to New York City had a new focal center in 1969. The new Madison Square Garden Center was waiting to receive them for the first time. It is difficult to express an opinion about the absentees. Some were due to the storm but many were undoubtedly the usual "get your name in catalogue whether you go or not", ones. Collies, with 28 entered, had 13 present. Because of the major win requirement to qualify for entry, most of the entries were specials. Points were scarce in almost all breeds.

Joy and Charlotte go way downtown to the Olympic Bowling Club once a week where, under the auspices of the Runnymede United Church Second Mile Club, she still bowls over 100. Generally Mrs. Symons drives her, but during a recent spell of heavy weather the tiny twosome made the long trip by bus and subway.

There are apparently three color variations: the Irish marked, which is mostly colored with white trim on the tail tip, feet, legs, and/or face; the particolor, which has patches of color on a white background; and the solid color. Has anyone actually seen a solid colored Saluki? Although they apparently exist, there does not seem to be any good evidence to prove it. The Irish markings appear to be dominant, but dominance in coat color is, to the best of my knowledge, unknown.

One of the many interesting things in breeding Salukis is not knowing what colors will result in your litter. When my fawn Irish marked bitch (whose father was a tri-color) was bred to a tricolor, there were four fawn males, one tricolor female, and one cream female, all Irish marked. The nearest cream was the sire's grandsire and the bitch's great-grandsire, Baytor Beda. Cathy Chemago's litter had seven tricolors and one cream, if my memory is correct, and her bitch is red and white spotted while the sire is a tricolor. In the case of Ch. Warm Valley's Niki of Macksons ex Sumeru's Lockni Yani Macksons, both dogs were Irish marked and have produced, in two litters, a mixture of 13 solid pups with Irish markings and six particolors, indicating that both parents carried both genes.

Maybe some day there will be enough known to predict litter color, but when that day comes, a lot of the excitement of predicting litter characteristics will have gone.

With Spring just around the corner and every red-blooded dog breeder eager to get that young hopeful in the show ring, it seems a good time to reflect on the process of learning to evaluate our dogs.

Recently a Collie breeder, judge and author, wrote of a good example of negative thinking regarding one of her bitches. This bitch is described as a "flyer" who finished her Championship at about ten months of age defeating many "nearly flawless" individuals.

On the negative side the owner writes that this bitch had two rather prominent white haws; her eyes were a fairly light amber color instead of the preferred dark brown; she had no stop at all; she had a white blaze that ran all the way from her nose, up between her ears; her ears were rather low and placed wide apart; she had a somewhat too wide front, tended to turn out at her elbows and she had a slightly swayed back.

Please remember this description is the owner's and not my own. Now the novice begins in dogs by invariably

learning the faults. Some unfortunately never progress beyond this stage regardless of how many years they are breeders and exhibitors. At ringside they loudly proclaim the faults of the winning dogs. Their ideal is the faultless specimen and they are doomed to disappointment and mediocrity.

One Collie here at Sovereign was as close to "faultless" as I have encountered and she never ceased to amaze me because she was so plain. As compared to the Collie described above, she was flat in skull, full in muzzle with correct stop, she had dark eyes, correctly tipped ears, well placed; good spring of rib, straight back and moved adequately. On the negative side, she had absolutely no style; her eyes were slightly larger than desired, she lacked animation to give her the elegant head carriage of the Collie and she had no expression. Although her faults were minor, she was mediocre.

The battle of knowledge is not won when we can successfully fault a Collie or Sheltie but when we can recognize the positive virtues. Great dogs with many virtues will be remembered by the "negative" breeder for the one or two obvious faults, rather than the degree of perfection that give the dog his greatness.

To finish the owner's description of the first mentioned bitch, she is referred to as a glamourous creature. The things about her which made her outstanding were her lovely expression, her great coat of glorious texture and color, her arch of neck, her style and showmanship, her beautiful balance, her graceful way of moving; all these things added up to a winner.

Correct evaluation of a good Collie or Sheltie is in developing an eye for the virtues as well as the faults and measuring the degree of excellence against the seriousness of fault.

The mail has been extremely heavy this month and I love it, as long as you do not expect answers. I wish I could write to each of you to acknowledge your letters but I will have to take this way of thanking you.

Many of the letters requested topics for discussion in this column and I am thankful for your suggestions. Because of your letters we will be discussing Kenneling, Collie and Sheltie ears, the Bearded Collie and beginning a kennel and breeding program. If there is a subject you would like discussed in this column just drop me a line.

Before the good weather comes you may have time for a good book and I would like to recommend very highly, The New Knowledge of Dog Behavior by Clarence Pfaffenberger. This book was awarded Best Technical Dog Book of 1963 by the Dog Writers Association of Amercia and it should be "required reading" for all breeders. We do much to influence the popularity of a breed by the temperament of the dogs we offer for sale.

? ? The Question Box ? ? Marge Scott of Campbellville, Ont. writes "Was wondering if you have any suggestions for putting weight onto a male Collie. We have about exhausted our ideas and have to hold him out of shows because of weight problems."

Well, this is a problem that cannot be solved overnight and what works for one will not work for the next. You might try some of the following and stick with what brings some results. First you must restrict his exercise, keep him quiet in a stall or pen except for regular, short exercise periods. Usually these dogs are fussy eaters and will not touch their food if there are additives or supplements mixed in it. Try giving them their supplements in pill form until the appetite improves.

You are undoubtedly using a good quality meal or kibble now but perhaps if the meat ration is increased it might be more palatable. A very economical food that we use for all puppies and adults alike, is a powdered milk replacer. This is used to raise calves without a mother, so is a good rich milk and cheap source of protein. Offering food frequently works for some and puts others off completely. I remember when Int. Ch. Sovereign Dougie's Choice went through a "thin" period when a year old and my dear grandmother would feed him a buttered chopped egg from her hand each morning and she is certain it was this bit of babying that started him eating everything in sight. Fortunately once they start to eat it is somewhat easier to get them to eat more than they require for maintenance. We feed them quietly in their own stalls first, then the dogs we want heavier are put out in a large run together with fresh pans of food. Whether it is greed or the sight of others enjoying the food, the dog will usually eat a great deal more this way.

I will be expecting more news of new Champions after the Sportsmen's Show so be sure we hear about your winner.

Why Must It Be A Doberman? Part II

(translations from the Dobermann Verein Booklet)

The Doberman in a home

Is the Doberman suitable as a house dog in a family home? First of all let's examine his exterior appearance. He has short, close-lying hair, therefore he does not suffer as much from heat in summer as long-haired dogs do. Hence no hesitation exists with a Doberman to take him out for a walk in the sun, on holidays or weekend trips. There is no reason to exclude him from these enterprises. On the other hand during rainy weather, snow and mud, he doesn't bring any dirt into the house. His short, thick hair cannot soak full of water as the coat of a long haired dog does. Briskly rub with a towel and his wet hair is dried quickly and free of odor. His long legs keep his body well above rain puddles, snow, mud and wet grass, thus his belly

Richard and Barbara Webster 26306 Roberts Rd., R.R. 1, Aldergrove, B.C. (604) 856-2448 doesn't touch the ground as the small breed dogs do; therefore cold-sicknesses are as good as non-existent. Outside the dog is in continuous movement - in the house he dries quickly again.

The housewife knows the value of a smooth coat with regards to furniture and carpets. The Dobe doesn't lose hair which bothers a tidiness-loving eye. Even the feared change from winter coat to summer coat in long-haired varieties passes imperceptibly in our Doberman. His coat needs almost no special care; you couldn't ask for a cleaner dog in a home.

How is his relationship with children?

To that, first of all, it has been established that the Doberman is a dog requiring love and something to lean on. He is happy in people's company and subordinates willingly. Usually he considers the children of the house as playmates, who are in need of his strong protection. Additional babies to the family he accepts without digression and often feels competent to guard their sleep in the crib, their play pen and garden. Give him a feeling that he belongs; should he become a member of a family he should be treated as one of the children, who is not favored but also is not neglected, so in a little while you wouldn't want to miss him as a member of your family.

He loves to go for walks, especially where he can have a romp. Moving about is his life element. For this reason his master must find time for him regularly. A dog is not a stamp album, that could be put aside when not in the mood for it. Get him used to being near his family at an early age, so there is no fear that he might wander away during his walks, for he is drawn to be near his family. He will be forever concerned that his members of the family stay together. This is especially noticeable when the family divides into two groups. He will be running from one group to another, undecided as to which group he should join.

Because of his sharpness and incorruptibility he is a dependable protector of family, house and home. In his company a person feels secure. You can leave the apartment or house in his care without any worries. No unauthorized person would risk putting his foot past the door if he is confronted by a Doberman. He accepts house friends when he sees by the action of his master that they are welcome guests. Good upbringing is essential; naturally this applies to every dog or child. The dog must be brought up correctly. A bad-mannered dog becomes uncivil and thus a menace. When properly brought up and trained, the family grows fond of their affectionate companion and wouldn't want to be without him.

Can a Doberman also be kept in a kennel?

This question too could be entirely answered with a "yes". About half of the members of the Dobermann verein keep their dogs in kennels. The

short coat of the Doberman is no reason to prevent him from living in a kennel. As in any other animal that is exposed to permanent influences of the weather, his coat adapts, depending on the environment (I must point out though, the winters in Germany are in general much milder than in Canada). Besides, the kennel dog is not unprotected. His dog house must be built in such a manner that no rain could penetrate. The sleeping quarters should be protected from draft and cold east winds. The dog should not sleep on stone or concrete. He loves wood - (no oak wood because of tannic acid) - or a heap of straw on a wooden plank bed. Warning: do not use felt as bedding. Felt settles easy and quickly in the intestines and can cause serious trouble. The dog is very grateful for an appropriate run, which lets in sun and also has shady places.

However, a kennel dog needs to be taken out. No matter how spacious his kennel and run, it is no substitute for a one hour walk, romp or trotting beside the bike. The Dobe always waits for the person who is taking him out for his walks. With a thankful look the dog goes back to his kingdom after a good romp or a short bike trip especially when he always finds a clean kennel.



There is one lesson we have learned and that is not to expect a judge to recognize that the Puli takes up to three years to develop its long heavy corded double coat. However, perhaps as more Pulik are shown and the breed gets the recognition that such an easily cared for, intelligent, hardy, and devoted one deserves, the judges will gain more experience and knowledge of the unique character of this ancient breed.



The other day I was glancing through a 1945 CKC stud book and of course turned to the Newfoundlands. It is very interesting to note that in 1944 only 24 Newfoundlands were registered. Of these only 17 were born in 1944 and the other three were born in 1943 and 1939. The full pedigree is given with most of these, which makes it all the more fascinating as there are certainly some interesting pedigrees. These include the famous names of Shelton, Mill Creek, Kenmount and Waseeka, all of which I'm sure appear in most of the pedigrees of today, in Canada.

Speaking of pedigrees, how many of you read and study the pedigree of the dog you intend to use for stud? I know of some breeders who use the dog around the corner because he is pure-bred and it won't cost anything to ship the bitch away off somewhere. A pedigree is half the battle in improving our breed, so let us take a little more care in our choice of studs. Just because a dog is good-looking does not mean he is going to produce good puppies. However if his parents and grandparents behind him have produced good type Newfs then it stands to reason that he probably will too. However you must also check what is behind your bitch. If she is a really good bitch then you should breed to something which is equally as good from the same strain to improve what you already have. If your bitch has three or four faults, then breed to a stud which does not have these faults, preferably from the same strain but not too closely bred to your bitch. If your bitch is really not good at all, then don't breed her!

It is with much regret that I report the death of Mrs. Maxine Rice and her

"We had three Booster shows during '68 held in conjunction with the Montreal, All Terrier and Ottawa shows. BB at the first two was our Ch. Terrco's Dickie the Kid, while the third show went to Phylis Gent's imported bitch, Ch. Bandit's Angelique. Plans are now underway for the third Annual Gen-eral Meeting which will be held in Ottawa this year. The American SBTC report that their membership is steadily growing and they hope to be admitted to the Miscellaneous Class sometime this year or at the latest 1970. We certainly wish them well and will support them in any way we can. Thanks Dr. Cooke, your club certainly seems to be gaining by leaps and

Well, it's Westie time and who do you suppose has made the front page again - you're right, Jeannie, Angus, Maggie and Alex with a darling photograph on the front page of the Halifax Mail-Star. Apparently Boots went in one day on business with the four of them trailing along as usual. The news staff were so enthralled that this picture with the four of them at the news desk in front of a typewriter resulted. Boots, I've often wondered, you wouldn't like to undertake a publicity campaign for Welsh Terriers, would you? Boots and his wife figure that Jeannie and Angus have travelled about 100,000 miles with them, while Maggie and Alex are just novices, they're only up to about 30,000!

A follow through now on Ruth Hehr's letter on TATC of Alta., a most progressive club as I've mentioned before. They are now getting ready for their first Specialty to be held in conjunction with the Alberta KC shows in February. As this young club has gone first class all the way so far, I'm sure their first show endeavor will be a great success. Ruth

goes on to say, "The Club has been in operation for two years now. We have had guest speakers from all across Canada and we are hoping to have many more in the next year. We also correspond with other clubs both in the U.S. and Canada trying to gain more knowledge. The club has 35 members representing 12 terrier breeds and our monthly meetings always have an educational segment!" Hallelujah to that last statement Ruth, so many clubs fall short in this area. Do let us know the results of the Specialty.

Here's a fascinating hypothetical question posed by Joan Morden of Tannenbaum Schnauzer fame, who has also done such outstandingly good jobs at both Sanction and Sweepstake Terrier judging. How about it Joan, when are you going to take the big plunge? Mind you after your question, I can see some of your reservations. She says, "Let's pretend we have just become the owners of a pretty Bedlington bitch. Those in the know say we'll have no trouble finishing her. Let us further pretend that we set about learning all we can of this engaging animal.

Step one - Learn your Standard, All goes well in this department until we come to this: 'EARS - Moderate size, filbert shaped . . . with a fringe of silky hair at the tip.' We ask in vain for an explanation of this filbert shape. Perhaps there is a long-forgotten definition such as "molera", a word only the Chihuahua people can interpret? The most reasonable seems to be that it refers to the shape of the fringe or pompom or whatever, hanging at the end of the pendant pinna not the pinna itself. Oh, well!

"To add to our confusion research brings us to the latest edition of Visualizations of the Standards which describes the ears so - 'triangular, tips rounded, low set . . . with a small tassel at the tip.' No mention of that kooky filbert. In fact a comparison shows that the AKC Standard is dated 1967 and reads quite differently from our CKC version. What to do? We, I guess, have to assume that Canadian judges are filbert men, whereas Americans are triangulars!

"Further checking shows that eight of the current Terrier Standards in our CKC book of Standards are at variance with those of the AKC. The Bedlington and Lakeland (whose American Standard is a great improvement over our 14 line version) are extreme cases. But isn't it time the breed clubs concerned requested a bit of up-dating over here. If we had a good Bedlington that was an also-ran in Canada because its ears failed to look like filberts, we would, after all, have only ourselves to blame. A nutty situation — and no pun intended!" It surely is a hard nut to crack, isn't it Joan? Oh dear, that really was terrible, but I just couldn't resist!

I agree with you, we simply have to do something about updating our Standards - my CKC book is dated 1962 and there have been many changes in both Canadian and Amer-

ican Standards since then. Certainly the new Lakeland Standard is a perfect example, there is simply no comparison to the old one and it's been in effect in the U.S. for at least two years now. I've never been one to go along with everything the U.S. does, but I do think Standards should be the same in the two countries, someday maybe even worldwide, but that's looking a little too far in the future. As it is now there's just too much travel-ling back and forward across the border to have variances in Standards.

What I also can't understand is that why, when these new Standards are being compiled that the CKC and AKC don't get together on them and insist that clubs stick to a definite format, i.e. (1) General Appearance (2) Head (3) Neck, etc., etc. Judges must just about go out of their minds if they have to look something up quickly in a Standards book as things are now. If these descriptions were only uniform for each breed, it would be a cinch.

This is the ideal time to start with so many Standards being revised, but on just reading two new Standards that have just been approved by the AKC for Irish and Westies, I don't hold out much hope. The Irish starts with Head and lists General Appearance second to last, while Westies start with General Appearance, don't list Head at all, but do list Skull somewhere along the line!

I know I've taken up a lot of your time this month, but I have to include this "doggy tale" from Mavis Ritchie, Devil's Own Scotties. "During the show-and-tell period in the third grade, Mike mentioned that his pet Beagle was expecting puppies. From then on the class eagerly awaited the news of their birth. When the day arrived Mike announced glumly, 'Well, they're here'. It was obvious that he was disappointed, but because of the intense interest of the class in the puppies, the teacher asked, 'What's wrong, Mike? Tell us more'. 'Well,' he said, 'I wanted a Collie and my sister wanted a Poodle and all we got were Beagles and, well, we've already got a Beagle!""



and do not want to go through the same routine again, with all the heartbreak this incurs.

The whole area requires fresh thinking and the thinking must come from the veterinarians. I know perfectly well how they want to be considered as "Doctor" so and so, and I know how much they want to have their status clarified and improved within the community. A good step towards this path would be for the Veterinary Association to appoint a professional public relations organization to spend some of their fabulous money that they earn collectively on this important aspect of modern communications and at the same time try to cultivate a change in attitude towards the whole problem of sickness and ill health, or less than normal health in a small animal in the community as a whole. Who knows if these steps were taken within the not too distant future the veterinarian could acquire within the community the reputation and the status of the "friendly veterinarian." The alternative might well be that the goose will stop laying the golden eggs because the goose will have died from a disease known as greed.





PROFILE OF YOUTH

Sherrill Ferens

This is the sixth in a series of brief profiles featuring up-and-coming young people in the dog world.

Readers are invited to send in their nominations for this series. The people they nominate must have shown outstanding ability and sincerity, and must be under 30.

This month's profile is a compact

bundle of blonde energy. Sherrill Ferens received her start in dogs when she became a junior member of the Ottawa Kennel Club. Characteristically, she plunged in with both feet and attended classes on handling, breeding, genetics and obedience over a period of two years. During this time she was top junior handler in the club.

Her first good pure-bred was an Irish Setter bitch given her by the late Mrs. Blanche Bleeks Walters as a reward for training one of her young dogs. This launched Sherrill and her parents on a restricted program of breeding Irish Setters. Marriage and two children interrupted her doggy activities.

In 1962 the purchase of two German Shepherds put Sherrill back into dogs in a serious way. These were trained in obedience first under Mrs. Lorna Casgrain at the Mountain City and subsequently under Gerald McNally at the Lakeshore Obedience Club. Like so many successful handlers Sherrill moves like a ballet dancer when handling a dog. Her success with her own dogs led to requests from friends to handle their dogs. In 1964 a switch from Shepherds to Samoyeds was made

with the purchase of a foundation bitch. This met with almost instant success when Ch. Fer-View's Hi-Star, bred, owned and handled by Sherrill was the top Samoyed in Canada.

Since 1964 Sherrill has handled 15 dogs to their championships and bred seven champions. During the same period she handled three dogs to their CD and also the first Samoyed owner-trained and handled to its TD. All this with two small children. Now you see where my opening sentence had its foundation.

Sherrill's interests in dogs center on Samoyeds and Shepherds but extend to the whole Working Group with a secondary interest in Hounds and gundogs. Her long term ambition in dogs is to breed better Samoyeds and to open a modern boarding kennel with grooming and training facilities plus handling on a professional basis. With her drive and energy these should come to pass before too long.

Outside activities have been centered on horses, both in the hunting field and the show ring. Back injuries necessitated recent surgery and terminated any further active riding. The Ferens have a Samoyed sled team comprising all their dogs which is raced whenever opportunity presents. Swimming and water-skiing fill in any idle moments in the summer.
