

TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS

BY JAKE GIACOMELLI

■ At the close of last month I mentioned that we would discuss some of the errors committed by exhibitors in the Sit and Down exercises — also, I would talk about a subject that I've purposely avoided!

The most common error I've noticed is the handler who intentionally gives the delayed "Stay" command after the group have given their "Stay" command — thus giving his dog perhaps a slight advantage over the others. Can you imagine if everyone delayed their Stay command! About ten seconds would elapse before the last handler would be able to give his Stay command and leave his dog. The Judge can penalize you for handler error on this one — remember, this is a group exercise and the command to Stay should be given as a group.

Another one I've noticed when exhibiting is the handler who touches his dog when giving the command and signal to Stay. Touching a dog when a signal is employed is completely out of order. Your Judge can either fail you or give you a substantial penalty, depending on how firmly you "pop" your dog on the nose when you touch him — once you've touched your dog you're entirely at the mercy of your Judge if he catches you doing it.

Occasionally exhibitors will ask you if they can be placed out of catalogue order because they happen to be beside a dog who appears to be antagonistic toward their dog and could cause it to break. Unfortunately the rules do not permit this. You must remember, a favor to one could be a penalty to another. However, as an exhibitor, if you are aware such a condition exists, do not be afraid to tell the Judge of your problem and he may very well allow a little extra space between your dog and the other dog in order to possibly prevent any developments. At the same time, being alerted to the situation he may watch the two dogs a little more attentively to ensure quick action being taken to prevent any incident.

Unfortunately, I do realize that some dogs who may be a little on the timid

side, once frightened by another dog, will not stay on that particular day even if given another chance.

A handler procedure I find most annoying is the slowpoke who takes his sweet time returning to his dog at the end of a Sit or Down exercise. I don't mean the physically incapable handlers — I mean the perfectly healthy ones who may have already failed, so really don't care if they ever get back. To me this shows a great lack of consideration for the exhibitors who have passed everything and are just anxiously waiting to hear the Judge say "Exercise finished"!

Personally I find that if I observe a deliberate slowpoke going back, I will call out "Exercise finished" when the group is back in position and penalize that one for any infraction his dog may commit before the handler has returned to the Heel position. I find it very difficult to accept that one single person has the right or the audacity to possibly affect the scores of 14 other exhibitors in a group exercise.

This particular type of infraction isn't perfectly spelled out, but a little common sense adjudication should take care of it.

We'll cover the more common infractions occurring in the Open Class at a later date — right now let's get into the other subject I wanted to talk about.

In the past occasionally, either as a Judge or as an exhibitor, I have either judged or exhibited at Trials where I felt the club had gone to so much trouble to make conditions simply ideal for the exhibitor that it was a pity I couldn't give that particular club a pat on the back in this column. I certainly do not intend to write about all of them, but do think it is high time the Obedience fraternity did hear about the odd club that has gone above and beyond the normal requirements, or perhaps have put on an unusual or special event that is worthy of mention.

To give you a small example of what I mean — normally at outside Trials in the Open Class for the Sit and Down group exercises the handlers usually have to walk a mile (or at least it seems that long) to go out of sight; thereby causing some of the more insecure dogs to break in this exercise. These same dogs, however, if they see their handlers disappear out of sight at a reasonable distance will usually stay and not break place or position.

I observed an example of thoughtful

considerations by a German Shepherd Specialty Club in April of this year near West Springfield, Mass. They had parked two cars or trucks (I forget now) a reasonable distance from the ring and had stretched a high, wide tarpaulin betwen the two vehicles. As a result, here was an ideal out of sight locale for the Open dogs which gave the exhibitors a greater chance of qualifying in this particular exercise.

The preceding is just an example of the sort of thing I intend to write about, when the occasion warrants it. However, next month I intend to cover the event which prompted my starting to write about this sort of thing and give credit where credit is due.

A ZEV DOG IS A WINNING DOG

NOTICE

From time to time our attention is drawn to the practice of some breeders who, when advertising or otherwise offering dogs for sale, indicate in some way that the purchaser of a dog sold as pure-bred will be required to make a higher, or additional, payment in order to be furnished with a certificate of registration. Such persons should note that the price at which a dog is sold, or the purpose for which a dog was purchased, has no bearing whatever on the obligation of the seller to supply the purchaser with a certificate of registration issued by The Canadian Kennel Club for a dog sold as pure-bred.

The Live Stock Pedigree Act, a federal statute, requires that when a person sells a dog as pure-bred, or contracts to sell a dog as pure-bred, he must furnish, or agree to furnish, a certificate of registration, together with fully-recorded transfer of ownership to the buyer.

Article XXXI, Section 3 of the By-laws of The Canadian Kennel Club reads as follows:

"A member may be suspended or expelled, or a non-member deprived of the privileges of the Club, if it is proven to the satisfaction of the Board that when selling, or otherwise disposing of a dog for a consideration (monetary or otherwise), the person disposing of the dog has asked or required the new owner to make any form of payment specifically for the purpose of being furnished with a certificate or registration."

To avoid possible prosecution under the Live Stock Pedigree Act and/or possible disciplinary action by The Canadian Kennel Club, members and others engaged in the selling of dogs as purebred are cautioned to refrain from the practice of quoting two selling prices for the dogs, one "with papers", the other "without papers", or to in any other way indicate that an additional payment is required for a certificate of registration.

This notice is published by an order of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club.

PREMIUM LIST REQUIREMENTS

1. Name of Show; Date; Place.



Novices, experienced breeders and exhibitors, breed clubs and members of The Canadian Kennel Club have had the unstinting benefit of the Laskey brothers' knowledge, time and energy. William was the first Maritimer to be voted President of the club — that was around 1920-21. Bobby was a director in the period 1925 through 1928 and later "about eight different times," he recalls.

Never a wealthy man (he was equipment maintenance manager with a construction firm and also worked in the wholesale drug business) this generous man must have given thousands of dollars in his day in helping clubs and shows he was active in founding. He'd be the last person to talk about that!

And so it was heartwarming to see the affection and real tenderness with which this man, small in physique but a giant in the giving of himself — was presented with a trip of a life-time. As our own mother frequently reminded — "Flowers are for the living!"

Let's put the poodle where he belongs

GIVE THIS FINE DOG A CHANCE TO DO HIS THING

by H. MALCOLM STEPHENS

■ In what passed for Latin in the XVI century he was first described as Canis Familiaris Aquaticus or common water dog. When it ceased to be considered indecent to write in the everyday speech he was described as Pudel or splasher. This was in Germany, his country of origin. When he moved over to neighboring France he became known as Chien Canard or duck dog. With the passing of time he became known as Caniche, a contraction of Chien Canard. In Germany today he is still known as Pudel, which has become anglicized as Poodle. In France he is known as Caniche.

In his early days he was a water dog or retriever. As such he quite rightly established a reputation throughout Germany. The history is obscure but there appears to be a real possibility that Mr. Justin McCarthy's Boatswain, who became the foundation sire of the Irish Water Spaniel, was a working Poodle. Mr. McCarthy always claimed that he had developed the breed in his own kennels and would never tell from what.

When he arrived in France the Poodle fell among thieves and became a fop and a dandy. Some frustrated hairdresser discovered that his coat lent itself to clipping in fancy shapes. This was the age of formal gardens with topiary shrubs trimmed to various shapes. It was only natural therefore to play games by having one's dogs trimmed to fancy shapes as well. Another way of getting one up on one's friends and neighbors.

In spite of this misfortune the Standard Poodle has remained a big, strong, intelligent dog to this day. Too big to be an economic proposition to the puppy factories which have taken over the smaller varieties of Poodle, he has remained in the hands of a relatively small number of breeders. Why should this fine big dog not be given the opportunity to do that which

he was bred to do? Standard Poodles in obedience and tracking have done excellent work. Present regulations bar them from retriever trials. These glibly restrict trials to retrievers and Irish Water Spaniels. These last probably should never have been called a Spaniel in the first place. A breed club in the Toronto area recently ran field training classes for its members. To take care of one or two of their own members who happened to have another breed of retriever plus a few friends who wished to bring their retrievers along provision was made for associate memberships for handlers of other breeds who wished to take part in the

retriever training. Consternation reigned at the first training session when an apricot Standard Poodle turned up who also happened to be a show champion. One or two individuals threatened to withdraw from the breed club completely if this animal was permitted to train with their "working" dogs. Fortunately, reason prevailed and the dog and his handler were permitted to join the select company.

Within a very short time it was soon very apparent that the Poodle was outretrieving all the retrievers. As a

result there is now a Standard Poodle ready for field trial competition with no competition for which he is considered fit and proper as a competitor. The accompanying picture shows "Joker" with a live pigeon in his mouth. A proper joker he has proved to be among retriever circles.

The cure would appear to be to revise the retriever trial regulations to permit Standard Poodles to compete. Why restrict them even this much? Any dog which has been trained up to the standard necessary to conduct himself properly at a field trial should be permitted to compete. What about the Airedale? At home he early had a reputation as a water dog and a retriever. It is true that some of these were a rather nondescript lot as far as appearance went but these were the foundation stock for a fine breed. It is difficult to imagine a group of Poodle breeders combining with a similar group of Airedale breeders to storm the kennel clubs demanding the rights of their dogs to compete with the Labradors and the Goldens and the less numerous breeds of retrievers to show that retrieving is not confined to a few breeds but that there are many breeds which are capable of retrieving over land and water with the same skill as the so-called retrieving breeds.

NOTICE

There appears to be some confusion as to what actually constitutes the INDIVIDUAL registration number of a dog registered individually in the records of The Canadian Kennel Club. On the certificate of registration issued by The Canadian Kennel Club the INDIVIDUAL registration number appears in brackets immediately following the name of the dog.

In the case of a dog born in Canada there will also appear on the certificate the litter registration number of the litter of which that dog was part. The litter registration number can be recognized because the last two digits in the number represent the year in which the litter was registered. For example, litter number 7237 registered in 1970 would appear as #7237-70.

When completing applications for registration of litters and individual dogs and transfers of ownership or corresponding with The Canadian Kennel Club it is the INDIVIDUAL registration number which should be shown or quoted in connection with dogs named on the applications or in the correspondence.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

The Board considered the views of the Club's solicitor on the proposed amendment, approved by the Board at its annual meeting at Vancouver, dealing with the question of the Board having the power, under certain stipulated conditions and limitations, to increase fees. Following discussion, changes were made in a draft prepared by the Secretary on the solicitor's advice, and the Secretary was instructed to poll the entire Board on whether the revised proposed amendment would be included in the special referendum ballot to be conducted in August.

At its annual meeting at Vancouver the Board had considered the report of a Special Committee (Chairman, George W. Frost) which the Board had appointed to prepare a new Article XXXVIII of the Club's Bylaws (that Article dealing with the amending procedure), it being the feeling of the Chairman (Mr. Geo. N. Mehlenbacher) of the last Amendments Committee (By-laws) that the current procedure is cumbersome.

The Board authorized the Secretary to consult the Club's solicitor regarding any appropriate rewording of the proposed new Article XXXVIII before notice is given members of the Club that this proposed amendment will be included in the special referendum ballot to be conducted in August.

The Secretary was instructed to give notice in "Dogs in Canada" of a proposed amendment to the Dog Show Rules, Obedience Trial Regulations and Standards, the Field Trial Rules, and the Tracking Test Rules, increasing the recording fee from 50¢ to \$1.00, the notice to include an invitation to all interested members and clubs to submit their comments by

The President and Secretary were authorized to execute the necessary documents to sell \$15,000 Dominion of Canada bonds due in 1973, the proceeds to be deposited and employed in meeting operating costs.

The Secretary sought instructions with regard to preparation of a message to accompany the notice to voting members of the proposed amendments to be included in the special referendum ballot. It was agreed that the message would be simple and direct, and would be approved by the President before publication.

The Secretary reported that as instructed by the Board, he had sought the opinion of the Club's solicitor as to the protection afforded members of the Club by Section 8 of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, which reads: "The financial liability of a member of an association to the creditors of an association is limited to the amount due from him in respect of membership and registration fees. 1949 (Second Sess. c 28 s. 8). "The opinion of the Club's solicitor was to the effect that under the Section of the Act in question the liability of a member is limited to fees due from him in respect of membership and registration.

REGISTRATION DIVISION

The Club's solicitor, being present for the purpose, informed the Board of his discussions with the solicitor and representatives of Grace Computer Services regarding the computer system, and financial matters having to do with the Club's relations with Grace Computer Services. The Club's solicitor was authorized to proceed with his discussions with the solicitor and representatives for Grace Computer Services.

The Board considered the current situation where many exhibitors are required to pay listing fees when they could have avoided that cost had certificates of registration been issued by the Registration Division. It decided that, effective on July 15th, and until otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors, an exhibitor entering a dog at a show or trial held under the Club's rules may avoid payment of the listing fee if he can show a C.K.C. litter registration number.

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD
It was agreed that notwithstanding the Secretary's absence from the city on vacation, it would be advisable to hold a meeting of the Board on July 18th as previously scheduled.

BUSINESS ARISING OUT OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

INESS ARISING OUT OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING
The Secretary:
pointed out that at the annual general meeting held at Vancouver the
members, by resolution, had appointed Fairley, McCulloch, Bailey
& Co. as the Club's auditors and Election Commission for 1970;
read a letter (dated June 11th) from Mr. J. M. Fairley, advising
that the firm of Fairley, McCulloch, Bailey & Co. had been dissolved and that his practice had been merged with the practice of
the firm Campbell, Sharp, Nash & Field of Toronto;
pointed out that in his letter, Mr. Fairley had stated that if Campell,
Sharp, Nash & Field were appointed to serve as the Club's auditors
and Election Commission for 1970, the audit and Election Commission fees for 1970 would be \$750 and \$1,000 respectively, these increases being brought about by the addition of the necessity of auditing for the new Registration Division and for the greater number of
members involved in elections.

The Board, by resolution, appointed the firm of Campbell, Sharp, Nash & Field as the Club's auditors and Election Commission for 1970 at the fee stipulated by Mr. Fairley in his letter of June 11th.

SHOWS & TRIALS DIVISION
Mr. D. Stephen, Manager of the Shows & Trials Division, was present in the meeting when the Board dealt with matters relating to that Division

In response to a question, Mr. Stephen reported that he had, at his own expense, visited the offices of the Columbia Broadcasting System in New York City to discuss the possibility of a series of TV programs on dogs in Canada.

Mr. Stephen reported that he had made arrangements to participate in research on retinal patterns (as a potential method of identification of dogs) at the University of Ottawa and this would require his absence from the office for four days in each of three weeks commencing July 6th. The Board approved the commitment which Mr. Stephen had made in connection with the rearrange. tion with this research

The Board considered the request of the Pacific National Exhibition to use an entry form card which would follow the format followed on the official entry form. The request was approved on the understanding that this was on a one-year trial basis only.

DOG SHOW JUDGES

Mrs. Sarah Diamond, Chairman of the Chapter 7 Committee, reported that the Committee had studied the requirements of the new system of judging permits approved by the Board at its annual meeting in March, and stated that the Committee is of the opinion that the new system is too restrictive and that, as the Committee would like to present modifications at the semi-annual meeting of the Board, the Committee asked that the Board postpone, to a new effective date, the system ordered effective as of August 1st.

The Board decided that the new system on issuance of judges' permits would not become effective on August 1, 1970 as previously decided, and instructed that the matter be placed on the agenda of the semi-annual meeting of the Board, at which time the Board would consider recommendations to be submitted by the Chapter 7 Committee.

DEQUALIFICATIONS

The Board reinstated the Poodle JAYMINS I'VE DECIDED owned by Mrs. Audrey Jeffrey.

FIELD TRIALS FOR POINTING BREEDS

The Board considered a report received from Mrs. L. L. Hough,
Chairman of the Field Trial Council for Pointing Breeds, with regard to
proposed conditions and rules on a Woodcock trial which the New Brunswick Field Trial Association proposed to stage in the fall, the winner of
the Open Gun Dog Stake at the trial to be considered the "North American
Woodcock Champion".

The Board decided that the New Brunswick Field Trial Association would be informed that the Club is not prepared to grant permission for the staging of a trial under the rules and conditions as stipulated; however, the New Brunswick Field Trial Association be informed that it may apply for permission to hold a licensed field trial for Pointing Breeds on Woodcock under C.K.C. rules provided however, that any additional rules prescribed are not inconsistent with the C.K.C. Field Trial Rules and Regulations, and provided a title is not granted as a result of this single win.

SUBJECT: Recognition of the Bearded Collie

At its meeting held on August 19, 1970, the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club directed that, effective immediately, the Bearded Collie would be placed on the list of breeds recognized by the Club.

Specimens of this breed which have been registered in the records of the Club, or are eligible for registration in the records of the Club, are now eligible for entry at shows, obedience trials, and tracking tests held under the rules of the Club.

The following is the standard for the Bearded Collie as recognized by The Canadian Kennel Club:

CHARACTERISTICS. The Bearded Collie should be alert, lively and self confident, good temperament essential.

GENERAL APPEARANCE. An active dog with long, lean body, and none of the stumpiness of the Bobtail and which though strongly made, shows plenty of daylight under the body and does not look too heavy. The face should have an enquiring expression. Movement should be free and active.

HEAD AND SKULL. Broad, flat skull with ears set high, fairly long foreface with moderate stop. Nose black except with brown or fawn coats, when brown is permitted.

EYES. To tone with coat in colour, the eyes to be set rather widely apart, big and bright. Eyebrows arched up and forward, but not long enough to obscure the eyes.

EARS. Medium size, drooping with longish hair, slight lift at the base denoting alertness.

MOUTH. Teeth large and white, never undershot or overshot.

NECK. Must be fair length, muscular and slightly arched.
FOREQUARTERS. Legs straight with good bone, pasterns flexible without weakness, covered with shaggy hair all round.

BODY. Fairly long, back level, with flat ribs and strong loins, ribcage both deep and long, shoulders flat, straight front essential.

HNDQUARTERS. Legs muscular at thighs, with well bent stifles and hocks, free from exaggeration.

FEET. Oval in shape, soles well padded, toes arched and close together, well covered with hair including between the pads.

TAIL. Set low, should be moderately long with abundant hair on brush, carried low when the dog is quiet, with an upward swirl at the tip, carried gaily when the dog is excited, but not over the back.

COAT. Must be double, the under one soft, furry and close, the outer one harsh strong and flat, free from woolliness or any tendency to curl. Sparse hair on the ridge of the nose, slightly longer on the sides just covering the lips. Behind this falls the long beard. A moderate amount of hair under the chin, increasing in length to the chest.

COLOUR. Slate grey or reddish fawn, black, all shades of grey, brown and sandy, with or without white Collie markings.

SIZE. Ideal height at the shoulder: Dogs: 21-22 ins.

Bitches: 20-21 ins.

IMPORTANT NOTICE SUBJECT: Registration of imported dogs

On March 3rd, 1969, the following addition to the By-laws of The Canadian Kennel Club received the approval of the Minister of Agriculture for Canada and became effective on that date:

If an imported dog was part of a single shipment which included two or more dogs of the same breed and sex, then notwithstanding the provisions of these By-laws the dogs included in the shipment are not eligible for registration in the Club's records unless:

- before each dog was exported to Canada it was tattoo marked in accordance with the provisions of Article XXVII of these By-laws;
- (2) the record of such tattoo markings appears on the certificate of registration (or export certificate) issued by a recognized Kennel Club or Stud Book in the country from which the dogs were exported to Canada;
- (3) each dog in the shipment was accompanied by its certificate of registration or export certificate.

BOBBY LASKEY DAY

Maritimers honor a fine man who has given so much to dogs

■ For anyone weary of helping others without receiving any indication of appreciation, this is a heart-warming

Bobby Laskey, 85-year-old pioneer in the Canadian world of dogs, was honored with a Bobby Laskey Day August 4 at the Lady Beaverbrook Arena in Fredericton, N.B. The setting was the Maritime Toy Dog Club (N.B. Division) 12th annual Specialty Show. This event was held in conjunction with the Fredericton KC and the River Valley Obedience and Field Trial club championship shows and Obedience trials (August 3, 4 and 5).

Bobby, whose picture graced the specialty catalogue, was named "dog's best friend". He has been the best friend of countless men and women, a guiding hand to new clubs and a ready and wise adviser to many a Maritime breeder and exhibiting novice.

To honor this fine man, who was instrumental in organizing both clubs, club members and friends in three countries sent donations to the Bobby Laskey Day Committee to a total of more than \$1,400 at last count. The fund provides Mr. Laskey with an airline ticket to the Crufts show in England next February, returning by way of New York to take in the Westminster Show. It also provided for a handsome piece of luggage, a certificate for hat, suit and shoes as well as expense money. There were individual remembrances as well. The presentation, officials believe, is the largest in stature ever made to anyone in the Canadian dog fancy.

Dogs in Canada had several long chats with this veteran during the show period — when he wasn't busy accepting congratulations, marking up his catalogue, caring for his Pom, which he showed successfully — at fourscore and five years!

"I'm going to have to get glasses," he remarked suddenly. "Never had to wear them before. Although the only thing I really need them for is reading the fine print in the English Dog World."

We talked about his early background. Bobby and his brother, the late William (better known as "W.W.") were born in Saint John, N.B. Both were dedicated to the promotion of pure-bred dogs and breeding and showing most of their lives.

Bobby in particular. For years he was well-known for his prize pigeons. And Persian cats. For a time he was President of the Canadian Cat Association. He used to handle a great many dogs, taking as many as 12 to a show in Halifax, all sizes, ranging from Pomeranians to St. Bernards.

That was long before travel was as efficient as it is now.

"You must have judged over a long period," we suggested. "Only 25 years," twinkled this show veteran. When he was judging in 1936, he recalls, it was the first time judges' books were set up. Formerly the judge was required to write everything down as he moved from dog to dog. And there were fewer shows in the Maritimes at that time.

Bobby was wearing The Canadian Kennel Club long service pin. So were his longtime pals, J. G. Cavanaugh and Judge Gerald G. McCarthy. Other Maritimers who have been so recognized were Sam Kominsky and the late Mrs. Percy A. Margesson, well-known judge. Bobby, we were reminded, was actively instrumental in getting the long service club inaugurated.


A phenomenal thing about Bobby, as well as other veterans in the dog "game", is their memory. Ask them about a dog, many generations back, and they'll promptly give you the show, judge, family background, almost anything pertaining to a dog or incident.

With Bobby, the mind and memory for detail is not confined to dogs. It includes sports and music. If this redoubtable fan can't get to a game, he'll watch it on television.

"There's only one thing that would keep Bobby from viewing a football game," friends told us with affection, "And that would be a hockey game. Or a dog show, of course." He knows what team conquered which competitor and the performances of the players. And then there's music. His interest here takes him to music festivals where he also scores the competitors and has an astounding background of music, composers and artists.

Flies (Mosquitoes, Gnats) On Dogs

When a dog snaps at the air, jumps up, runs, and tucks under his tail, chances are flies are the reasons for his actions.

How To Identify

The adults of flies, mosquitoes, and gnats have two wings and six legs. They range in size from almost microscopic to larger than one inch in length. The insects above are the most common ones that are a problem with dogs.

How Dogs Attract Flies

These insects have keen sensory organs. Unlike humans, they have their sensory organs located on different parts of their body. These flying insects are generally attracted in the following manner. Flies or mosquitoes passing downwind may pass a dog at close range. After passing the dog, however, they pick up the dog's heat radiation rays, gasbody odor, or light rays. Using one or a combination of their sensors, these insects will fly back upwind to the dog. A mosquito honing in on a man or a dog makes a humming noise. This high frequency noise may signal other mosquitoes that a meal has been located and to follow the noise for food.

General Life History

Flies, mosquitoes, gnats have complete life cycles: egg, maggot, pupa, and adult. These insects have either piercing-sucking type mouth parts or sponging-sucking type mouth parts. Those with the piercing-sucking type are the biters. The foods of the biters consist of blood and body fluids. Those that do not bite live upon animal excrement, waste foods, and other organic debris. The immature stages of these insects are usually found within one of three habitats: organic debris, water, or living plant and animal tissue.

Damage To Pets

Flies, mosquitoes, gnats can cause death to pets. Their feeding habits cause annoyance and irritation, but it is the microorganisms which they transmit to the animal which is the principal danger. They can transmit most pathogenic animal diseases associated with bacteria, viruses, funguses, protozoa, and worms, such as distemper, heartworms, diarrhea, and eye infections. The flies' prime purpose on this earth is to keep animal populations in balance and to assist plant and animal decomposition.

Fly Control Methods

Fly, mosquito, gnat control on animals is no different than on humans. To prevent their annoyance and bites, the animal must be treated with insecticides or repellents. In locations where control is not feasible, it is necessary to maintain animals in special screened housing or restrict them inside the home. To prevent fly breeding around dog pens and kennels, animal excrement and waste must be removed. To prevent disease, strict sanitation practices must be followed.



How The Mosquito Bites

The mosquito has piercing-sucking mouth parts. Their double syringe-like probe pierces the skin to a blood supply and sucks blood. During the feeding process, anti-coagulant and salivary fluids are secreted into the blood. These materials cause swelling, irritation, and itching.

Oddities

House flies are filthy; researchers have found up to 500,000,000 bacteria on the outside of their body, and an additional 333,000,000 bacteria inside their body. The progeny of two house flies would cover the earth to a depth of 47 feet in one season if they all survived. The mosquito must have blood before it can reproduce.

She recently returned from the Border Terrier Specialty at Greenwich, Conn., where they had an entry of 24 with Robert Hall of the famous Deerstone Kennels in England judging. Mr. Hall found his BB from the classes in Henry Mosle's Rose Bud of Lothian. His WD and BOS was the import, Hawkesburn Bison of Dalquest, bred by Mrs. Marchant and sired by the famous Eng. Ch. Hawkesburn Beaver. Beaver also has a Working Certificate with the Duke of Beaufort Hunt. Here, as the Border breeders are so anxious to keep the working type and temperament, June quotes from a letter from Mrs. Marchant:

"From a working point of view we have no trouble getting our dogs to ground. We live in 36 square miles of badger and fox-ridden land. The foxes come up to inspect the hen houses at night, sometimes in broad daylight. Then, if someone carelessly leaves a gate open, there goes Beaver. It is worrying as there are so many earths one cannot always easily find him. I fear he has had the edge taken off his looks by these encounters and is, at the moment lying rather sleepily in his box recuperating after yesterday's events when he went to ground in a water-logged, clay-bound meadow, with a drain laid in graded levels across the length — a beastly place to put a dog. The hounds had run the fox to ground, then the two Hunt Terriers were sent in, but came back pretty quickly, saying "Nothing doing", so old Beaver was called for and certainly worked the whole length, emerging finally soaking wet and covered in clay with a huge dog fox by the throat. My heart was in my mouth for fear we might lose him. The Duke of Beaufort was in quite a tizz for the same reason. No show ring win has ever won such applause. As the Terrier man said, 'It is all because Beaver has a brain that makes him so outstanding as a worker. Many can go in, yap, and come out, but precious few repeatedly come out with

A marvellous story, June, although I must admit I have mixed emotions about working Terriers these days. On the one hand it's a wonderful thing to know that they can do what they were first bred for, but on the other hand there are just so few wild animals left these days. Certainly though, one cannot help but admire the courage of "Beaver".

June also had some good news about a bitch she sold to Miss Van de Veer, Secretary of the Border Terrier Club of America. Birkfell Penelope won a Group 1st at a recent Sanction Match in Connecticut, then went on to a point show to take WB and BW for a 3-point win. Marvellous news, June and try to keep us in touch with Border "doings" from time to time.

A cute news clipping from Margaret McClory, headed "KENNEL CLUB ELECTS TOP DOG", referring to her husband Allan becoming President of the St. Catharines club. As Margaret notes, "What do you suppose the headline will be if they ever elect a woman as President?" Food for thought, what?

Some good show news for the Mc-Farlanes at the Genesee Valley and Buffalo shows. At Genesee and Buffalo their Ch. (Can. & Am.) Cannycairn's Fergus, was BB, while at Buffalo their Badenoch's Goldruf's Shaun was RWD.

On now to some Schnauzer news from George and June Tegman, Teg-Hall Reg'd. "About this time last year you mentioned some news about our Black and Silver Miniature Schnauzer, Ch. Sylva Sprite Rebecca. Perhaps it would be of interest to you that her seven-month-old female puppy (out of Becky's first litter) was awarded a Group 1st at the Crocus Obedience Club Sanction Match at Shilo, Man. This puppy, Teg-Hall's Tugboat Annie, is also a black and silver and this was her first time in the ring. It was also our first time out as breeder-owner-handlers"

Now a letter I always love to receive, from Margaret Hunter, Thunder Bay, Ont. "Big news — Obedience — a Terrier - in fact a Scottie. Kitchener-Waterloo Kennel Club

Honored: Dr. Jean L. E. Flipo of St. Hyacinthe, Que., a pioneer in veterinary orthopedic surgery. He was presented with the 1970 Gaines Veterinary award - a specially designed gold medallion and cash award - at the annual meeting of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association at Winnipeg.



In April he was honored by the Association of Hospitals and Clinics of Quebec with a plaque proclaiming him "Veterinarian of the Year". Dr. Flipo has had numerous works published internationally and is particularly distinguished for his work in the reduction

of complex fractures.

Dewsa Kennels are back in operation at Locust Hill, Ont. Mrs. G. McKenzie and brother-in-law T. R. Dewsbury are enjoying their new home which was rebuilt on the site of their former kennels which were gutted some months ago. Both have recovered from the serious burns which sent them to hospital for many long weeks. They are active in Borzois with a recent litter and in Bulldogs, with litters coming in the fall, and will return to the show

Travellers: Returned from a visit with her sister and mother in Vancouver is Mrs. John Loftus, (Pugs) of Stittsville, Ont. . . . After registering about 12,000 miles on a trip and judging assignment to Prince Edward Island, Herb and Jean Fletcher of South Burnaby, B.C., took off for a trip for Alaska, with barely time between for a refreshing of clothing. These Dachshund specialists rarely travel without at least two Dachsies, one of which is always their Miniature Smooth, Ch. Fletcher's Wee Hans . . . Meta Loveridge, formerly of Toronto and now of Vancouver, has been visiting with friends and relatives in California.

"Grizzly Bear", an extremely gentle St. Bernard from Denali, Alaska, was named the winner of the Ken-L-Ration gold medal as America's Dog Hero of the year for 1970. His full name is Polar Blu Samaritan von Barri, "Grizzly Bear" saved the life of his 24-yearold resort owner mistress, Mrs. David Gratias, when a mother grizzly bear attacked her near her cabin behind the main lodge building. As the young woman raced toward the house to protect her little daughter, she slipped on icy ground, half-stunned and helpless. The young Saint crashed into the back of the huge bear as it was about to add more injury to Mrs. Gratias' grazed cheek and badly damaged shoulder. The dog smartly maneouvered and kept between the enraged bear and the prostrate woman. Mrs. Gratias, overcome with terror and loss of blood, lapsed into unconsciousness. When she



came to, the dog was trying to revive her by licking her face. The bear had

disappeared.

Another dog hero: In Hamilton, Ont., Fabraena's Uram, a three-year-old German Shepherd watchdog, was shot dead while trying to protect a store and factory. Thieves gained entrance to the building (but fled empty-handed) only after fatally shooting the dog. Uram was bred and trained by ex Ticat John Fabian.

Monsters: Three boys who lured a German Shepherd puppy from its home in Mississauga, Ont., and held it on the GO train tracks where it was cut in two . . . At Manseau, Que., a man reported that his Poodle was missing during the time of the recent pop festival. "There is no point in looking for it," an officer told him. "They ate him." Police found the dog's carcass amid the rubble left by festival fans.

Recuperating: Faye Fitzgerald, wellknown exhibitor and handler of virtually every breed, in hospital in Kingston, Ont., at the time of writing. Husband Don told Dogs in Canada at the Fredericton KC shows that this was the first time in 20 years he had exhibited at a show without Faye.

Personalities: Among the many delightful people the writer met in

Fredericton recently were Vic Martinson, Chairman of the Show Committee, and his wife Rita, whom you may recall was one of the original Gaines Award winners with her outstanding Borzoi. Rita, who originally was a Whippet fancier before she became interested in Borzois, can't resist animals. particularly those needing a good home. On their farm the Martinsons have 14 horses, some standardbred and work horses, three Mexican burros, two Borzois, a squirrel monkey, a goat and two kids, a Dorset Horn ram, a cow (who provides milk for the crowd) and her heifer, three pigs, 65 hens, six ducks, three Bantam hens, 25 rabbits, five geese, Java Temple birds - all this at the time of writing, and as much as they could remember offhand!

We chatted with Judge Gerald Mc-Carthy of Saint John, N.B., who assessed the Maritime Toy Dog Club Specialty in Fredericton. He showed his first dog in 1903, a St. Bernard puppy, at the age of eight. Cockers became his next love and at one time or another, during his long career in the canine field, has owned, bred, and shown most breeds. His English Setter was the first Canadian-bred dog to win his Canadian championship, we're told. Mr. McCarthy, together with J. G. (Gerry) Cavanaugh, Vice-President of the Maritime Toy Dog Club (N.B. Division) are among Old-timer Bobby Lasky's pals (see story elsewhere in this issue). Gerry, who is the possessor of antiques museums would find desirable, was recalling that dogs were shown in Saint John in 1881. Seven years later The Canadian Kennel Club was formed at Tecumseh House in London, Ont. The New Brunswick KC was formed in Saint John, in 1907 and held its first show that year. Except for 1908 (no funds) and 1953, the club has held shows continuously.

Her father and her six-year-old son were on their way to Peterborough, Ont., on a fishing trip when a motor accident proved fatal to the young lad. Mrs. Scobie's father was seriously injured but is now recovering.


