Dogs In Canada

Guelph research team does study of dwarfism in Alaskan Malamutes

ONTARIO—Two young veterinarians, Dr. Meg Smart and Dr. Steve Fletcher of the Pathology Dept., Ontario Veterinary College will present a paper to the

Canadian Veterinary Medical Association—American Veterinary Medical Association joint meeting to be held in Detroit July 18-21. The paper will outline their

findings to date on the problem of dwarfism in Alaskan Malamutes, a condition this research team has been studying since February 1970.

Dwarfism in Mal's, and in related breeds, has been known since the early sixties and has become quite widespread in the breed, so the researchers say. Investigation has been conducted at Washington State University in co-operation with The Alaskan Malamute Club of America but was a Canadian breeder who challenged the Smart-Fletcher team to try to solve the puzzle of

why two apparently normal parents could produce a dwarf puppy and otherwise normal litter. In February 1970 two affected puppies were donated to begin the study and, with the blessing of the College, research got underway. Today a colony of Mal's is living in a campus laboratory under the care of a competent animal laboratory technician. So far the investigation has produced some encouraging results.

The researchers are remarkably suited to the job. Both are interested in solving inherited problems in pure-bred dogs. The Malamute study is the first to be undertaken by a Canadian.

Are you a field trialer? If so, you have a fine dog for hunting. He is indicating by his body language that he is indicating where the bird is hiding. Then the challenge is not just to make him do it, but to control the direction of his nose. If you can do this, your strategy serves a very useful and often winning purpose. 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such that events approached the scene at full speed, head-on. The gun, obviously hearing the excited approach, no doubt contemplated a hasty flight away from this truck. The dog was very still and quiet. Away went Mr. Quail right into the legs of "Old Zeke" and away went Zeke in hot pursuit, giving audible tongue.

Had the handler circled the dog quietly and flushed the bird away from the dog, the events may have been hard to beat. Even cautious lateral approach might have succeeded. As it was, the dog was up to a supreme test

where most amateur dogs fail.

Another trick I have encountered is one sees the bird hidden in the grass. It is to caution the dog and slip the toe of your boot under the game and flip the bird into the air. Another useful custom is to reach down for the bird to hurl it airborn while taunting the dog with voice and free hand. These techniques have saved many a dog from hellish catastrophe of a running bird's breaking directly at the pointing animal. Few pointers can withstand such a blow between master and gun.

A shot from a blank pistol must be discharged in front of your dog's productive point. Amateurs in their joy of excitement seem to see this opportunity as a fast draw contest from "Dodge City". Frequently, no sooner has the bird appeared above the bay when a report rings out across the land. The dog is already started by the wing beats, his ears reinforced by the gun.

Some animals performing feats of skill, the very impressed onlookers usually associate with a human gymnastic group, and by the Manitoba Gun Dog Association which staged a brilliant retrieving exhibition. 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Books

THE WORLD OF DOGS—by Wendy Boorer—\$1.95
A "coffee-table" book that doesn't cost a fortune. Indeed, *The World of Dogs* is handsome enough to grace any table. However,

over, this well-presented new volume from England has a few more important functions—it is good enough to read!

Wendy Boorer has researched her subject well. Her text flows logically from early beginning to such chapters as dings, or cartoon dogs, "Land" odd jobs," "The chapter on the evolution of dogs in general and their functions are interesting, both to the new dog

owner and to experienced breeders. Her story of how dogs get their cold noses is most imaginative!

A section entitled "Pearls Dropped From The Lips of Her Imperial Majesty Fa-Hsi Dewa-ge, Empress of the Flowering Land" Confucius "must certainly be one of the earliest breed standards recorded.

Produced in England, the book

is coarse and heavy in English references, but is generally enough to be applicable in any country. The chapter on puppy and their selection is one of the better ones ever written and should be really helpful for the new owner. This also is illustrated with many extremely appealing photographs.

Illustrations are the backbone of many "coffee-table" book" and *The World of Dogs* is no exception. Illustrated with 220 photographs and a book that most them are in color. Unfortunately, the only bad one is on the cover. A black and white 1/2 color picture of an extremely badly groomed Afghan Hound which also does not look like a particularly good show specimen. This is sad, as on this very photogenic breed it is was the best they could do for a cover picture. However, once past the cover, the pictures are a joy.

Wendy Boorer has found and reproduced some lovely field prints of a post-revolutionary artifacts. There are also some unusual photos of dogs at work or play from various parts of the world, as well as a section on famous people and their dogs with such diverse personalities as Sophia Loren and Marceline Segretti with their pets.

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BACK TALK

"New Regulation only goes half way," says staff Breed judge Hans Brunotte



The selection of the Brunottes as subjects for this month's Back Talk seems particularly suited to the "Top Dogs" issue. Between them they have probably handled more top dogs to big wins than any duo in Canadian dogs. To date they have handled 173 dogs to their championships, 58 of them their own breeding and have shown 11 different dogs to Group 1st. Also July is the month of decision for our handler/judges. This new CKC regulation affects many—Hans among them. We were interested to learn his choice and his reasons for it.

Although one does not think of Hans and Andrena Brunotte as old-timers in the accepted sense of the word, their long association with dogs both as individuals and as a team certainly adds up to an impressive volume of years of dog activity. In fact, it is 30 years since Hans registered his first litter of puppies. To many of us the Brunottes are familiar figures. It is all continuing joy to watch them at work whether it be preparing, handling, judging or simply overseeing their canine charges in their kennels. The obvious delight with which their dogs respond to them speaks volume for their attitudes towards the dogs they show. When one visits Poodhall Kennels

in Caisson Centre a reception committee is usually on hand. This committee is composed of about half a dozen Miniature Poodles who are living it up on their own 30 acres—unfenced, unfettered, uninhibited and very friendly. These are the retainers. Older dogs, now retired, in happy group who, in close-clipped coats, spend their time running, swimming, hunting—living out their days just being dogs. The Brunottes believe that the breeder may be measured by the way he treats his older dogs. Cuthanasia, they think, should only be resorted to as an end to pain and suffering or as we become relieved from a terminal illness. They abhor the practice of those who dispose of their animals once their usefulness is past. A dog would not order his master's death, "reasons Hans. "Why should a master order death for a dog?"

It has been a long way for a little boy who had his first Airedale at the age of seven to the breeder and handler of Dan. & Am. Ch. Poodhall Gus who won 100 group firsts and 37 best in show awards during his career. The story is self-explanatory.

Hans' first dog, an Airedale bitch, was strictly pet but to his owner it was the best dog in the world. Hans' first sanctioning took place in 1956 with a stonewall

edly the best pet but certainly not the best Airedale. She placed third in a class of three. The judge being kind took time to tell Hans why his dog had not won. That day the desire to own a winner was born. Hans explained the sort of dog he wanted to his father and his father explained to Hans that the show dog would cost considerably more than a pet and perhaps he should forego small boy extravagances and save towards the purchase price. Hans did—almost. Rather made up the difference and another Airedale bitch was purchased. This time there was no question of her quality. At the age of eight, Hans handled his first dog at a championship show in Cologne, Germany that which the Airedale entry totalled 62. She placed first in her class and Hans' launched a lifetime in Canadas and has judged in Bermuda, Germany and Belgium also.



From time to time there has
been criticism voiced regarding
"Top Dog" awards. Some claim
that less popular breeds never
stand a chance to make it to the
"Top Ten". This year is pretty
convincingly refutes that argu-
ment. Other contend that so many
breeds have coat problems which
limits the number of shows in
which they may compete. This
cannot be denied. But the
problem common to every mem-
ber of the breed and in a top
group placing is improbable,
placing eighth in its breed is not.
Others are discouraged from
campaigning when American-
owned dogs make a few spectacular
wins early in the year. We

are reminded here of the story of
"The Hare and The Tortoise". A
glance at this year's top breed
winners shows what tortoises among them.

Even though one has to settle
for second best in the breed to be
the best Canadian breed in breed
is also worthy accomplishment itself.
This is especially true if the
dog has been bred and handled by
the owner.

Rather than discouragement,
we believe the challenge should
spur Canadian breeders to
greater effort. The field will wide
open as Boxer will be the name of
"Shad" Can. & Am. Ch. Scher-
Khoun's "Shadrack" is handsome
proof that can be done—not
only once but twice!

Surgery may be required if dogs given "people drugs"

A graphic example of the fact that drugs intended to relieve human distress do not always function as advertised when administered to dogs is illustrated in the May issue of *The Journal of The American Veterinary Medical Association*.

A dog was admitted for examination whose symptoms indicated acute digestive problems. X rays showed three apparently foreign bodies lodged in the animal's stomach. Surgery for their removal was indicated. However, when the stomach was entered the foreign bodies were discovered to be undissolved tablets of a type commonly advertised for the relief of stomach distress in humans. They were simply incompatible with the dog's chemistry and instead of providing relief they had added to the original problem which proved to be an intestinal tumor. Not only that because the owner failed to tell the veterinarian of the home remedy he had tried, accurate diagnosis was interfered with.

The moral is twofold. Do not give people drugs to dogs without first consulting with a vet.

Obtaining your vet's permission to do so. And when a dog needs medical help, be sure to tell your vet the whole history of the illness, not just the part you think he should hear.

Dr Harry Warren, 22-year veteran of the university of British Columbia's geology department, ignited the idea here, having learned of the success of canines' rock hunting in Finland.
