



English Kennel Club celebrates centenary

LONDON—This city, host to some of the world's most historical meetings, was the site May 2 for another memorable gathering—the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Kennel Club (of England).

Officials, noted breeders and persons outstanding in the affairs of dogdom came from 22 countries. Guests, numbering 650, were announced and photographed as they entered the historic Guildhall.

"Canada", reports Mrs. Hilda Pugh, President of The Canadian Kennel Club, "was accorded top

priority, respect and attention." She was placed at the head table within a few seats of the leading participants.

Her Royal Highness, The Duchess of Gloucester, was the regal representative. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, had previously unveiled a plaque marking the centenary.

The Princess Antoinette of Monaco, member of the Ladies Branch of the Kennel Club, responded to a toast proposed by John Varley, member of the Committee of the Kennel Club, by appealing to the Kennel Club,

the American Kennel Club and the F.C.L. to get together to produce unique standards of all the breeds to eradicate existing confusion and looked to the occasion as the beginning of yet another and equally successful era in British dogs. Her suggestion received enthusiastic applause.

John A. Lafore, Jr., President of the American Kennel Club, said he looked upon the occasion as the beginning of an even better international understanding in the world of dogs.

A touching toast to The Dog was proposed by Mr. Wilson Ste-

phens, member of the Committee of the Kennel Club, in which he traced the companionship of dog to man since the stone age.

Buck was imported from England from the world famous Dondelayo Kennels of Mrs. Ann Knight and finished his Canadian championship in four straight shows going Best of Breed each time while still a puppy.

His American title was earned with three 5-point majors in one weekend. In Canada, his record at the time of writing stands at five Best in Shows, 28 Group firsts, and many Best of Breeds and group placings. While in the United States he went Best in Show the third time shown as a special under the venerable judge, Mr. Percy Roberts, with an entry of almost 1,500 dogs. This is quite an achievement considering this was accomplished while still under two years of age.

THE ENGLISH SETTER

Sharing the spotlight at Lorricbrook is the handsome English Setter—Canadian and American Champion Lorric's Standing Ovation. Stan, while shown sparingly last year, ranks as one of Canada's top ten Sporting Dogs and is the number one winning English Setter for 1972.

During the years, this kennel has been interested in several breeds of dogs but has become especially interested in Whippets and Greyhounds, and has just imported a beautiful Greyhound bitch, Shafleet Sporting Story, which will be campaigned next year.

At present, we are quite excited about the promising young Whippet puppies Buck has sired. From his first litter have come Ch. Lorricbrooks Trade Winds and Ch. Lorriebrooks Buckshot, both awaiting CKC confirmation.

Others are already pointed.

Congratulations to Mrs. Phyllis Laventhal on winning BCBIS with Lorricbrook's Willow at Willow's very first show. Buck's most recent litter out of our Ch. Carousel Maxine shows great promise and will be shown in the Fall. Young show stock will occasionally be available to serious exhibitors and enquiries are welcome.

Much credit for this success must go to Carol Hollands whose expert handling and conditioning made this possible. A very special thank-you to Mrs. Susann Hearne who handled Buck on the western circuit when Carol was unable to attend.

those who have nothing to offer him except their company. He walks with kings and to the delight of our Queen; he protects the lonely and leads the blind, he shares our pleasures, our labours, our sports, our follies, our triumphs and disasters, our homes and our families....

"Your Royal Highness, Your Serene Highness, Your Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, to what I am about to propose there can be no response to

night, but it will not be denied us. When we go home there will be response in plenty. I give you the toast of 'The Dog'."

The printed program contained a color reproduction of a portrait of Mr. S. E. Shirley, M.P., of Ettington, founder of the Kennel Club, a short history of the club, menu, toasts, a list of representatives of overseas kennel clubs with which the Kennel Club has reciprocal agreements. Canada, of course, was included. A plan of the banquet seating was helpful in locating other guests.

The inscription on the plaque unveiled by Her Majesty reads: "This plaque was unveiled by The Queen, Patron of the Kennel Club, on the occasion of her visit on 28 March 1973 to mark the Club's Centenary."

The significance of the English Setter topping the plaque presented by Mrs. Pugh on behalf of The Canadian Kennel Club to the Kennel Club at the cocktail party the following day is of historical note. The breed owes its present day popularity to the dedication of Mr. Edward Laverack and Mr.

R. L. P. Llewellyn, circa 1825. The English Setter was the first dog registered by The Canadian Kennel Club, in 1888. "Also," states Mrs. Pugh, "it is a sporting dog and in the dog fancy we feel we are in a 'sporting game'."

"Our Royal Canadian Mounted Police also celebrate their centenary this year and it is considered most fitting that, as a world-wide symbol of Canada, the R.C.M.P. be included. Its members have always been most helpful to The Canadian Kennel Club."

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Editorials

First Great Dane to do it

The "Top Dog" spot flew back and forth across Canada last year like a tennis ball in a fast rally. And not until the final show report had been tabulated was it possible to declare a winner. Only then did we learn that the gorgeous Great Dane bitch Ch. (Can. & Am.) Davos Baroness Zareba had done it. This makes her the first member of her breed to capture the honor and just the second member of her sex to do so. What a beautiful way for a girl to retire!

Congratulations to her breeders, Drs. Sheila and Andy Fletch, her handler Lorna Jackson who, win or lose, was always Zareba's staunchest fan, and her owner Mrs. June Cowie who still can't quite believe it.

1972 was an interesting show year—bigger than ever before in numbers of shows, breed and show entries, and in number of breeds shown. But how did it rank with previous years in other areas?


To find the answer, *Dogs in Canada* asked six well known members of the fancy to give us their impressions of the show year just past. What they have to say appears on page 21. Lorna Jackson's introduction to her Non-Sporting Group review seemed to us to summarize the dog show scene so well, we have "borrowed" it to keynote all six reviews:

"The growth of our sport in a very short time has been fantastic. In 1938 there were 1200 members of The Canadian Kennel Club,

65 shows and 8000 dogs entered in championship events. In 1972 the Club had 10,000 members, 678 championship dog events (shows and trials) and 110,000 dogs were entered in championship events.

"What has this super-growth meant? When you have been in the game for many years you see changes in breeds—some good and some very bad. Many breeds have lost the characteristics for which they were bred and with that loss has gone appearance and, in many cases, soundness. The popularity of breeds also changes but 1972 registrations show a marked climb in all breeds. Puppies today bring much higher prices (of a necessity) and pet shops are importing breeds that are in limited supply in Canada as well as those that are not.

"Times change as do fashions and the popularity of various breeds. We lost our kindergarten when we lost benched shows. Today they are not considered practical with everything running in high gear. Novices can still learn by listening to the few knowledgeable old timers that are left and college courses are offering new learning opportunities. But the things that the dog game has lost—and there is nothing around to replace them, which is the saddest part of all—are the sport and the fun. Today, it seems, dogs are just "big business". Even so there still are some darn good dogs!"



A very significant speech

The president of the American Kennel Club, Mr. John Lafore Jr., is reported to have said: "We know the problems of the dog world. Now it is up to us to find the solution".

This is an encouraging statement, more so because Mr. Lafore has not been content to let it hang there, as political platitudes often do. In a speech entitled "The A.K.C. Today" Mr. Lafore defined

some of these problems—problems of which Canadians, too, are well aware—and told his audience what the AKC is doing to solve them.

Some of the solutions will affect Canadian exhibitors who show in the U.S. Others, such as the proposed supervision and control of mass production of pet puppies, may help to relieve a situation which is of growing concern to

many Canadian dog breeders.

Briefly touched on, too, were other areas of AKC activity—funding of research projects, breeder education and public awareness. All of which will have their impact on the Canadian scene.

More detailed excerpts from Mr. Lafore's speech appear on page 6 of this issue of *Dogs in Canada*.

Canadian bred classes

We, the Nanaimo Kennel Club, respectfully urge all kennel clubs in Canada who are in accord with the context of the following letter to write to The Canadian Kennel Club asking for the earliest possible compliance with the request contained therein:

"To the Dog Show Rules Committee of The Canadian Kennel Club,

Dear Sirs:

"The members of the Nanaimo Kennel Club have unanimously voted to send this request asking The Canadian Kennel Club to remove the Canadian Bred classes from championship show competition."

"We have noted that this has

been under consideration by the CKC for the past several years but that so far no change has been ratified.

"We feel very strongly that Canadian bred dogs can compete on equal footing with dogs from any other country, and that this "crutch" for Canadian exhibitors has long outlived any benefit it may have had in the past. In fact, at the present time it is regrettably apparent that these classes are occasionally even a detriment to Canadian dogs and to Canadian/American exhibitor relations.

"We therefore urge The Canadian Kennel Club to remove, with all expediency, the Canadian Bred and Canadian Bred Puppy classes from championship competition and bring all dogs into the ring on an equal basis.

"We are, however, in favor of the inclusion of a Best Puppy in Show award."—Mrs. Helena Savori, Corresponding Secretary

Permanent registration

The item regarding listings in the Kennel Directory, page 20, *Dogs in Canada*, April issue 1973, was brought to the attention of our membership by one of our members who is very concerned with the possible inferences that could be drawn from this item.

It has been inferred from your item that a "puppy farm" is any kennel which does not qualify for permanent registration, as required by the CKC. This is, of course, ridiculous and we feel quite certain that this was not the intent of the item under discussion.

May we suggest that you print clarification on this point, together with a sample of the "legend detailing the significance of permanent registration" mentioned.

While the conclusion reached by a majority of our membership may not be erroneous, we cannot help but wonder how this will af-

flect the attitudes of those previous subscribers to the Kennel Directory who cannot, for various good reasons, qualify for "permanent registration".—Mrs. J. F. Taylor, Burlington, Ont.

(The whole question of providing a potential puppy buyer with more information regarding the standard of any given kennel has been considered since the inception of the Kennel Directory. We felt "permanent registration" might be a clue but this is not foolproof, we have discovered, and it might in fact be misleading and possibly unintentionally discriminating. So, with the Kennel Directory as with any other directory—the buyer must investigate and make the final independent judgment. Ed.)

Historic importance

You probably have heard about the stir caused in Britain not so long ago by The Kennel Club having decided to remove American Cocker Spaniels from the Gundog Group and that later they relented to the extent of a two-year reprieve.

Then came two bombshells in quick succession: first one and then another American Cocker completed its full championship, i.e. bench and field. It is more than likely that these two achievements will prove of historic importance in regard to the breed in Britain as they will surely impress The Kennel Club and influence it not to take any action until the time comes.

We of the B. C. Cocker Spaniel Club are proud of the fact that these two American Cockers originate from the kennel of our active member, Mrs. Diane Lilley. She exported her Timothy's Black Fantasy in whelp to Britain (the second champion) and it was one of her pups, born in quarantine there, who was the first champion, under the name of Eldwyne Enchanted.

When youth and ambition love dogs, the result is "Dogs in Motion".

My love of dogs, dog shows and general pet welfare got together with my ambition and stubbornness and hit Halifax Cable TV Ltd. for a time slot on their local network for a "doggie" program. The station producer (a dog lover also) accepted my idea with open arms and gave me the full go ahead. It has been on (weekly) in Halifax and Dartmouth for about four months.

The content of the program is varied, and includes breed talks, obedience and conformation information on upcoming shows; past show winners, grooming, interviews with judges etc. With more equipment coming into the station steadily, the setting for the program (currently in the studio) can be anywhere, as early as this Fall.

I would like you to write to me with suggestions. If anyone is travelling here in the summer, I would like to interview them on the activities in their home cities. Salem Revisited

The spectre of the stake and the fire—screams of the innocent, the victims of overzealous and misguided inquisitors. One had come to think that the witch hunts had been nothing more than a brief but unpleasant chapter in American Colonial history.

But now not so! Today's inquisitors are breeders and the witches are dogs which carry the recessive gene for PRA. When PRA is verified in a dog, some breeders play the witch-hunt pedigree game. The rules of the game are actually quite simple and will afford the gamer with much gossip:

1. Find a dog with clinical PRA (claim two merit points).

2. Since PRA is a recessive trait, conclude that both parents of the dog at least carried the gene; this is consistent with genetic principles (claim three merit points).

3. Conclude that all of the grandparents were carriers of the gene. Actually, only one grandparent on each side needs to have passed on the trait. However, ignore that and convince your friends that all of the grandparents were carriers. (For every grandparent implicated beyond the genetically required two, claim five merit points).

4. Find as many famous dogs as possible in the next generation back and destroy their reputations. (Claim ten merit points for each successful character assassination, plus a five point bonus for champions and ten points for top producers).

Whoever in your circle of friends gets the most points within a one year period will be awarded the 20th Century Witch Hunt Medal of Merit.

Actually, if anyone claims more than the five points under steps 1 and 2, and bases his reasoning on the single clinical PRA men-

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Changes being made

American Kennel Club today

Excerpts from a speech delivered by Mr. John Lafore Jr., President of The American Kennel Club

We have recently made some changes in the American Kennel Club. A few have been executed, some are in the stages of execution and others are still on the drawing board.

One of the innovations, a new concept of enforcement and education in the field, may solve many of the problems that worry dog breeders of America.

We have established a resident agent in the state of Iowa, the state which is the second largest breeder of commercial puppies in the United States. He will, because of his residency and wide acquaintance in dogs and government agencies in the state, work with consumer fraud units, the Iowa and federal veterinarians, local boards of health and humane societies to insure proper record keeping and identification of dogs.

Eventually we should have four or five men from the largest puppy production centers working as resident agents before the year is over. As we include more agents

in more states, we will have a strong impact on the thing that worries us dog fanciers so much—the mass production and sale of low-quality puppies.

A rule change in measuring procedures calls for elimination of measur-

ing committees, putting the responsibility in the hands of the judge in the ring. There will also be new equipment, in the form of a wicket, to make measuring more expeditious.

There will probably be a vote in the near future to eliminate combined sexes as a class. A study

showed that this class defeated its own purpose and caused some dogs to be deprived of major points.

The AKC has long granted funds to research projects in the area of dog health. We will continue to support:

1. Dr. Stephen Seager's work in storage of frozen canine semen. *When we feel the long-term preservation of dog semen is practical as a tool for breeding, we will establish the controls that will be necessary to prevent its being misused.*

2. A project at the Medical University of Southern Carolina which is seeking a simple and relatively safe method of eliminating the larval forms of the heartworm in the blood of infected dogs.

3. The diagnosis of rabies in its early stages. This project is under way at the University of Missouri School of Veterinary Medicine.

The American Kennel Club today is aware of the major problems which confront the dog fancy. Whether we know the answers, only time will tell. When we do find the answers, I assure you we will put them into operation.

Obedience

Obedience trials in our area are coming along fast and furious—singles, doubles and triples every weekend. Before you know it some of the trials are bound to receive low entries due to the great number of dogs receiving their degrees.

I was rather fortunate this year in the month of May—was home for most of it to either exhibit, observe or judge some of the shows in our immediate vicinity. Must say what I saw was heartwarming. Without any reservation whatsoever the "Choke Chain and Off Lead Award" would go to the following clubs I was fortunate enough to observe—the Centennial Dog Obedience Club of Galt, Burlington Kennel & Obedience Club, Belgian Sheepdog Club of Canada and The Hamilton Dog Obedience Club. To either the veteran obedience exhibitor or the novice exhibitor the strictly obedience ring layout was breathtaking and exhilarating. The rings were spotlessly clean, disinfected, with freshly painted standard equipment. Beautiful ring curtains separated each ring. All clubs had excellent stewards on the go and the trophy tables were really something.

Oh yes!—before I forget, the matting was more than ample.

If a person didn't earn a leg at these shows, his dog either wasn't ready or lady luck was against him. I heard many a murmur of appreciation from our American visitors for the excellent ring conditions. The Trial Superintendents of these shows, their assistants and their clubs have much to be proud of.

MONEY'S WORTH

For sheer spectator money's worth the Mid Canada shows and trials in Winnipeg had to be the greatest. They started early in the mornings and went late into the evenings—rings on the go all around you! The obedience rings and equipment were of high quality, including the stewarding—good matting and a houseful of exhibitors. The organizational requirements to run such an event have to be a bit mind-boggling! What a post affair! All the judges wore tuxedos in the evenings!

The German Shepherd Dog Club of Manitoba put on an exciting display with their Shepherds and what struck me even as much was the quality of the dogs they were working with. I just saw the end of the Manitoba Sled Dog Club demonstration and exhibit but what I did see was most enjoyable—spectators loved it all! It would take a complete column to give this show the accolades it deserves.

Before I run out of space I think we'd better discuss some of the new changes that will affect the obedience fancy on July 1, 1973.

1. Specialty clubs may now apply for and be granted permission to hold a specialty licensed obedience trial in conjunction with its specialty championship show, confining the entries to said trial only for the breed or breeds eligible for entry in its specialty championship show.

I'm very pleased with this change as I know there are many specialty breed clubs that have long been looking forward to the day when their own special breed alone could be feted at their own specialty obedience trial.

2. With regards to the new subsection 3 in Chapter I, Section 5, appearing in the May issue of Dogs in Canada, page 12—The best advice I can suggest here is to make sure that either your show or trial committee have one or two prospective judges who may be idle on the weekend of your event lined up, as well as perhaps a very knowledgeable obedience fancier that could fill in an emergency.

3. It's now spelled out exactly! The most you can use an obedience judge for is eight hours at any trial, which time shall include a one hour period for meals. However, if the entry exceeds the actual seven-hour judging period, it can only exceed it by 10%, which means exactly this seven hours is 420 minutes, 10% of this is 42 minutes. So, the very maximum you can use a Judge on July 1 and afterwards is seven hours and 42 minutes. The next problem is, how do you control entries when you know that where your club holds its trials you can only set up two rings and two judges, and you still want to get done on time?

HERE'S WHAT YOU DO

In your premium list where you name the judges and the classes they are doing you will also indicate that entries will close for each judge after the equivalent of seven hours and 42 minutes of judging has been reached, based on the judging formula of eight Novice, seven Open or five Utility dogs per hour. The seven hours and 42 minutes is the absolute limit for one judge. However, if you wish to cut your trial down to only seven hours of judging—so indicate in your premium list and control it with the formula mentioned above—it's quite simple!

If you throw entries wide open! Then you must be prepared for possible extra rings and extra judges at the last minute and this could hurt the quality of your trial. You know how hard it is to get the judges you want even a year in advance—so how lucky do you think you're going to be just before trial time? We'll discuss further changes next month.


Dow gets research contract

A \$275,000 contract has been awarded to Dow Chemical U.S.A. by the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, for work on mammalian reproduction to be carried out in the Toxicology Laboratory of Dow's Chemical Biology Research in Midland, Mich.

The objectives of the research, according to Dr. B. A. Schwetz (MIN '60), project director, are (1) to determine the effects of certain manmade substances which occur in today's environment upon the development and growth of the unborn and newborn of several animal species, (2) to determine how various forms of

stress during pregnancy may change the effect, and (3) to determine how the substances produced the effect.

Dr. P. J. Gehring (MIN '60), research manager of the toxicology section for Dow, commented: "Evaluation of the effects of substances on the unborn and newborn in animals and subsequently using the information to assess the potential hazard in man is a relatively new science in toxicology. Scientists at Dow and elsewhere have been conducting experiments to shed some light on this important aspect of toxicologic evaluation."



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

Symposium reports on dysplasia

This is the second of a three part series of abstracts which represents the current views on canine hip dysplasia expressed at a Symposium on Canine Hip Dysplasia, October 1972, St. Louis, Mo., sponsored by the Orthopaedic Foundation for Animals. The following are reprinted from the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association—April 15, 1973)

Etiology and pathogenesis of hip dysplasia

Results of studies conducted in Sweden showed that dogs with H.D. had several or all of the following characteristics: (1) rapid growth and development (2) slanting pelvis; (3) inward tilt of the pelvic side, giving poor support to the femoral head by the acetabulum; (4) unstable hip joints; and (5) poorly developed pelvic muscle mass.

It was evident that these characteristics were genetically influenced, but there were indications that dietary factors which promoted rapid growth and maturation increased severity of H.D.

Conclusion: Hip dysplasia has a multifactorial etiology. No single factor can be held responsible for the occurrence of H.D. Moderate hip joint instability is not enough of a disorder to cause H.D. if the

pelvis is wide and relatively horizontal. On the other hand, comparatively tight hip joints may become dysplastic if the pelvis is narrow and slanting—Hakan Kastrom, Stockholm, Sweden and Sten-Erik Olsson, Stockholm, Sweden and New York, N.Y.

Research on the developmental phases of degenerative hip joint disease in young dogs

Uncertainty exists about the basic mechanism underlying the pathogenesis of canine degenerative hip joint disease. Pups appear to have normal hip joints at birth, but through a series of insidious changes overt disease becomes manifested.

Developmental phases of H.D. were studied during the first year of life in breeds of dogs with a high natural incidence of the disease. Histochemical, ultrastructural and biochemical-metabolic studies of hip joint connective tissue were correlated with radiologic, nutritional and clinical studies. The period between three and eight months of age appeared to be important, because during this time the initial diagnosis of the

BITS & PIECES

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the Irish Setter National Trials. The list of bird dog things I have to do is increasing. However, while attending a recent field trial in New York I followed two Irish Setters around the course. One, an attractive well known field trial red dog, took off at the breakaway like he was late for the Orangeman's parade, reappeared seven minutes later 700 yards to the southwest going full tilt and continued rushing around the course like a comet until about the half-way mark he found the bird he was looking for and chased it. I was impressed with the run of this dog but would question his application to hunting. What a good feeling however, to see two fine Irish competing on even terms with other pointing breeds.

North American Versatile Hunting Dog Assoc.

On April 28 and 29 NAVHDA hosted a Natural Ability Trial in Ontario with 26 dogs tested. This was their largest entry yet in Ontario: 13 Pudelpointers, five Shorthairs, three Griffons, three Wirehairs, one Brittany and one Weimaraner competed. Over half of these dogs qualified in a prize class. Ed Bailey reports that the overall quality of the event was good. At the head of the list was Winterhelle's Early Bird, an 11½ month old Pudelpointer owned and bred by Bodo Winterhelle. Next was Marguerite Du Mareage, a Griffon owned by Dr. Philip Stuart, and third Dora, a German Shorthair owned by Ivan Gollett.

NAVHDA continues its winning ways with more trials, training and judging clinics scheduled through the summer and Fall. Information about this group may be obtained from Dr. E. D. Bailey, R.R. No. 1, Puslinch, Ont., New Brunswick.

Field Trial Assoc. Under sunny skies this active group conducted their trial May 20 and 21. The fine weather did not persist as the second day brought a rainy, cold and gusty day.

This was the largest trial held in N.B. Credit must go to the club and its hard-working publicist chairman, Carl Weston. 

It was more than a double victory for Mrs. Tripp because previous to BIS judging, the Borzoi brace that she was handling, Marymak's Deidre Phantom Lake and Marymak's Darien Phantom Lake, for owners Helen B. Ybarra and Phyllis B. Brettell, both of Bellevue, Wash., won Best Brace in Show, also both days.

These were the tenth annual North Shore K. C. shows and were held, this year, in the Forum at the Pacific National Exhibition grounds. As in previous years, an international panel of judges was on hand to pass on the entry. These included two Canadians, five Americans and Mr. Graham Head of Melbourne, Australia, who is the only judge in his country to hold an AKC license to judge all breeds in the U.S.

Another feature of these shows were the great number of booster shows, 13 altogether. Several of the participating breed clubs vied for the honor of being named the "best decorated breed display". This was won by the Rhodesian Ridgeback supporters for their outstanding display which was decorated to resemble a native African village. It featured a backdrop hung with animal pelts and African artifacts, an authentic straw-thatched hut and, of course, a dozen or more handsome Ridgebacks lounging comfortably on the floor which was covered with loose straw. The dogs appeared to be enjoying the attention their display was receiving from the spectators just as much as their owners were.

And, not to be outdone by the breed club displays, the North Shore K. C. members went to a great deal of trouble to bring a touch of B.C. spring indoors. The four large judging rings were encircled with a row of eight foot birch trees which were just coming into leaf. These little trees, which have become a traditional decoration with this club, were dug on the Island by club members, transported to the mainland and then carefully replanted in wooden tubs for the shows. The trees will eventually take up permanent residence in the various club members' gardens.

And speaking of club members, the incredible fact is that this club with just 11 members was responsible for a smoothly running two-day effort that would do credit to a membership five times that number. And that speaks volumes for the type of background organization the North Shore Kennel Club enjoys.

disease was frequently made. The disease remained once radiographic evidence was observed. Crossbreed offspring developed H.D. The abnormality essentially was restricted to hip joints and during the period of study was diagnosed as unilateral H.D. in a number of individuals. Course of the disease was not influenced by exercise, vaccination with modified live-virus vaccines, various dietary supplements and feeding pups a restricted dietary intake. Cesarean-derived pups, colostrum-deprived pups, and hand-reared pups which grew at a greatly reduced rate had a low incidence of H.D. Other results indicated that subjectively estimating hip joint laxity in young pups was not reliable for predicting either normal or dysplastic hip joints in adult dogs.

Dysplasia-affected dogs at all ages had arthritic lesions in cartilage of hip joints. Evidence suggested that an idiopathic stimulation of proteolytic enzymes was involved in the degenerative process in the connective tissues of hip joints.—George Lust, Ithaca, N.Y.

Prevalence of dysplasia according to radiographic evaluations among 36 breeds of dogs.

The prevalence of H.D. among pure-bred dogs is unknown. However, a comparison among breeds which can be characterized by a large number of radiographic evaluations for H.D. can help identify some breeds with a relatively high or low prevalence of H.D.

The results of the first 25,000 radiographs submitted to the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals for evaluation were tabulated according to radiographic classification. Only those breeds represented by more than 100 evaluations were included for comparative purposes.

Of the 36 breeds compared, the four breeds with the highest percentage of dysplasia evaluations were the St. Bernard, Newfoundland, Bullmastiff and Old English Sheepdog. The four breeds with the lowest percentage of dysplasia evaluations were the Afghan Hound, Belgian Tervuren, Siberian Husky and the German Short-haired Pointer.

In general, breeds with a high percent of dysplasia have similarities in size, type, conformation, movement and temperament. The same observation can be made for the breeds with a low percent of dysplasia—J. S. Larsen, Columbia, Mo.

Joint Laxity as Hip Dysplasia

If H.D. were an inherited condition in the dog, then there should be some early signs of this condition which could aid in the early detection of this condition.

ty in both young dogs and mature which radiographically had dysplastic hips.

When subluxation is present there is an accompanying joint laxity. When there is no laxity there is no subluxation. Joint laxity leads to abnormal joint articulation, which in turn results in degenerative joint disease. Pups with joint laxity have myopathy of the type II muscle fibers. The pectineus muscle does not lengthen at the same rate as the shaft of the femur; and due to its triangular relationship to the shaft of the femur, the femoral head is forced upward and outward. These forces result in joint laxity which can be detected by palpation. The normal structural development of the femoral head and acetabulum is altered due to joint laxity. External factors can further influence these structural changes, and influence the degree of dysplasia in one or two year old dogs.

Transection of the pectineus muscle at an early age could influence the development of dysplasia and the development of joint laxity.

Joint laxity is but one more factor to be considered in the development of dysplasia. Joint laxity can be used as a diagnostic tool in predicting a dog's predisposition for the development of dysplasia.—John W. Bardens, Lowell, Ind.

Palpation for the detection of joint laxity

The detection of H.D. has been difficult in pups under six months of age, and in many instances a definite diagnosis cannot be made radiographically until the dog is one or two years old.

In mature dogs with dysplasia joint laxity has been observed and in 90% of the cases palpation could be used to predict the radiographic evidence of dysplasia. The same technique was applied to pups eight to nine weeks old.

The same joint laxity was present in some individual pups. These pups eventually developed dysplasia by the time they were two years old.

In the course of performing palpations, the pectineus muscle appeared to be in contracture. Pathologic examination of the pectineus muscle revealed myopathy of the type II fibers. There appeared to be a correlation between joint laxity, and myopathy of the pectineus muscle, and eventual development of dysplasia.

I have used palpation as a diagnostic technique for 12 years in the larger dogs. Once the technique was developed and experience gained in its use, the technique appeared to be 80% accurate in predicting eventual development of dysplasia.

With proper training and after sufficient experience, others have been able to duplicate my results. It appears at this time palpation can afford the breeder a means whereby he can predict in pups the eventual development of dysplasia in about 80% of the pups examined.—John W. Bardens, Lowell, Ind.

Victor A. Nunn — 1168 Haig Blvd., Mississauga, Ont. — On a recent trip to England I was able to attend an open show (non-championship), but as the entry of Weimaraners was only 12 it was difficult to comment on Weimaraner quality in general. At this particular show the quality seemed very inconsistent, a problem which is a most pressing one in England. The lack of ring training was very evident and one young bitch inflicted a bite on the judge as he attempted to handle her. I was able to have a lengthy talk with Diane Oldershaw, who is attempting to popularize the long-tailed Wy, to the dismay of other Wy breeders and the English Kennel Club. Mrs. Oldershaw is motivated by humane interests but her crusade is creating minimal interest. She is a small breeder and other breeders take the attitude that if she is upset by tail docking, then she should change to another breed. While in England, I was able to photograph a Long-Haired Weimaraner—a dog which to my eyes looked most unappealing. Weimaraner owners in Canada

are reminded to support the Weimaraner booster at Barrie on August 5. If you are unable to show your dog, give him a chance to compete in the obedience trials on the same day. Members of the Weimaraner Association of Canada are encouraging entries from both Canada and the USA. A good entry will perhaps pave the way for an eventual Weimaraner specialty show.

to 10—As Beardies grow in popularity, we have a great many newcomers to the breed entering the show ring. Because there are comparatively few Beardies at shows (and also because it's hard to watch what other handlers are doing when you're in the ring with them), a lot of these novices are taking their handling techniques from other breeds. This is like expecting Fred Astaire and Rudolph Nureyev to wear the same kind of shoes just because they're both dancers.

One place I've really noticed this misplaced techniques is in the way hind ends are being set up. Many of our new exhibitors seem to have been watching Boxers and Doves being shown and are stretching their Beardies' back legs apart in the belief that this shows off a "good hind end". Well, it does in Boxers and Doves, but in Beardies it's all wrong. Unlike those two breeds, a Beardie is a very long-bodied dog whose working function requires him to cover great distances and keep up a good speed (for keeping cattle together and moving for distances of 100 miles or so). A Beardie with



the correct length of body who could stand naturally with as wide a base in the rear as a Boxer or Dobe would not be able to get his legs far enough under him to move properly. His gait would lack push and he'd give the impression of "tippy-toeing", among other things.

A Beardie should stand so that the distance between his hocks is the same as the distance from the hock to the ground. As Beardies are supposed to have well-set-down hocks, this gives you a dog who stands as he moves—comparatively closely behind. (I say "comparatively" because you don't want a dog whose legs are touching or crossing as he moves.)

I've done some sketches of Beardie hind ends and hope they'll help give you the picture.

A great many Beardies give the impression that they are down in pastern because of the way the hair falls around their feet. A

Beardie with shorter hair on his feet and legs (and markings can help this illusion) will appear to have tighter feet and be more up on his pasterns than his more floppy-haired brother. Under all that big-footed look, Beardies have small feet. Check with your hands here, not your eyes, as to whether the hair on the feet has been trimmed. It shouldn't be. An active Beardie can wear the long hairs off his feet, but they won't look blunt and neat the way a scissored foot will. Beardies must not be trimmed! They are shown in natural shag!

From England comes the warning that there is a tendency creeping in for Beardies to fall off in croup. One of the features of our breed is that very squared-off finish to the back and it would be a serious fault to lose it. I wanted to do some sketches of correct topline and croup for this issue, but I'm not one of the world's great artists and it takes a lot of time,

pencils and tongue-biting to get it right. So we'll do it next time.

Congratulations to the owners of the Top Beardies this year. In 1973 so far we have two more Beardies earning their first group placings, so competition for next year's Top Dogs will again be exciting!

No wonder then, that we sometimes lose sight of the whole dog and need to be led, or jolted, back to the importance of balance, proportion and the overall dog.

In "Mind's Eye View" by Louise Johnson, she points out the following, about the above illustration.

"The head should be approximately one third the length of the body from the chest to croup as in Figure 'A'.

The length of neck should at least equal the length of head as in Figure 'B'.

The hocks should not exceed twice the length of the pastern as in Figure 'C'.

The foreface and backskull should be equal as in Figure 'D'.

The width of the backskull should not exceed its length as in Figure 'E'.

The depth of backskull should not exceed its length as in Figure 'F'.

The circumference of the muzzle should not exceed the length of head as in Figure 'G'.

The underjaw should be approximately one third the depth of the whole muzzle as shown in Figure 'H'.

The section of the ear that tips

should not exceed one third of the whole as in Figure 'I'.

The distance between the eyes and ear carriage when "alert" should be equal as in Figure 'J'.

I found this a most interesting exercise in balance and proportion. In the interest of concentrating this month on the total dog, I would like to share a most amusing story that appeared in the Shetland Sheepdog Club of B.C. "Sheltie Tails", originally from the Rocky Mountain Schutzhund St. Bernard Bulletin

A Fairy Tale by Robert Hope

"Once upon a time, four St. Bernard exhibitors were coming home from a big show. They were driving over a mountain pass in the middle of a violent snowstorm when, suddenly, their car went into a skid, hit a guard rail, and went careening down a slope about a mile into a ravine. The trailer which they had been pulling, containing their four dogs, landed relatively undamaged next to their car. No one had seen the accident in the blinding storm. As luck would have it, the Saint

breeders were trapped inside their car! The door to the trailer, however had popped open!

"The first dog out was a very "typey" Saint, as this was what his breeder cared about most. He made it about a quarter of a mile up the slope before he was gasping for air and his nasal passages began to freeze because of his foreshortened muzzle. After another 200 yards, he was blind and hopelessly lost because the driving snow was piling up in his paws. The second Saint out of the trailer was bred for the "important things" like prettiness, size, color and perfect markings. He was a beautiful sight to behold, but unfortunately he too collapsed after only a few hundred yards from the ravages of hip dysplasia.

"The third dog to try to summon help had been bred for "soundness". His breeder wouldn't have dreamed of using a dog that wasn't X-rayed free of hip dysplasia. He made it halfway up the slope before he collapsed from exhaustion. He could not cope with the huge drifts. His breeder hadn't realized that there

was more to "soundness" than hip dysplasia and had neglected to include the head, neck, shoulders, fore-limbs, feet, chest, lungs, heart or hindquarters in his breeding for "soundness" . . .

"The fourth breeder was conscious by now and knew that at last, all those years of breeding would pay off. He had bred for type, being careful not to shorten the muzzle so far as to obstruct the breathing or ruin the bite. He was proud of his dog's "tight eyes". His dog had story book markings, a tall, strong and muscular figure. He had an OFA number, of course, but also big bone, a very strong powerful neck that was loaded with muscle, his shoulders were well-laid back. He had good rib spring, strong pasterns and strong, tight feet. He had perfect rear angulation, and his hocks couldn't have been any stronger. When moving he was absolutely flawless . . .

"With great pride and tears in his eyes, the breeder saw his big, beautiful, perfect Saint Bernard drive off into the blinding storm just like the Hospice dogs of old!"

"The last Saint made it up the slope to the road almost effortlessly. A passing State Trooper saw the dog and stopped to investigate. As he got out of the car, the dog attacked and ate him . . ."

KERRY BLUE TERRIERS

The Dogs of Ireland, by Anna Redlich, contains many interesting items on Irish dogs. The following is taken from the chapter on The Kerry Blue Terrier. By the way, for those who have enquired, I believe the book may be purchased in England but I found mine in a used book store.

Otter Hunting In The Blackwater.

"The pack of Otterhounds was accompanied by three terriers of pure Irish breed, whose duty it was to follow the otter to the burrow beneath the rocks, and start him for the hounds. The oldest of these terriers went by the familiar cognomen of Darby and was as queer and ugly-looking a specimen as could be seen from Brandon Hill to the Giants' Causeway. His head was half bald, and marked all over with scars, records of his numerous encounters with the otters in their fastnesses; his right foreleg was crooked from the effect of a fracture he has received in one of his early battles, his left ear had also been bitten off, but a comfortable coat of shaggy, grey hair still clothed his hard, compact body, and, as he limped in front of the pack and showed his teeth occasionally, when one of his younger comrades took some undue liberty

with him, he looked more than a match for the stoutest otter from Youghal harbour to the far-off spring of the Avonmore."

STAFFORDSHIRE BULL TERRIERS

This is an article by Doris Hughes Williams taken from the spring 1973 issue of 'The Stafford'.

Character and Temperament

"These days I see far too many Staffords that require a lot more firm and intelligent handling; a lot pull on their leads and take their owners' for a walk, instead of the owner exercising the dog.

"The dogs jump up at everyone, are noisy and destructive—in fact I think there is too much terrier temperament which should be watched for very carefully in future breeding programs.

"The Stafford should have the character and temperament of the Bulldog with only a dash of the Terrier to give it the extra required speed in a fight.

"I remember well, Morgan Blair's old Derry, who later in life had part of her bottom jaw missing from her fights with badger and foxes.

"In spite of her sporting temperament, her owner could take her all over London without a lead, walking beside him at heel and then sitting outside hotels, offices and shops while he conducted his business.

"I do write with knowledge on Derry because I had her son Gorm and Joe Mallen had his brother Good Lad. Gorm followed in his

mother's footsteps and I am sure Good Lad gave Joe Mallen great satisfaction.

"I do think a Stafford needs to learn things very early in life—2 weeks is not too early to start teaching a puppy as long as it is done gently and with great patience.

"With our top Terrier entries and wonderful Stafford puppy sales I do hope we spare a little time and think hard when breeding not only about appearance but about maintaining character and temperament of our great breed."

Pat Cooke and Pat Anderson of Terroo Stafforshire Bull Terriers are off to England to visit the top Staffords and their owners. While Norman is hard at work at home, the girls hope to take in a few shows and possibly bring back a Stafford or two or three... I told them to bring back a white or a pied but they have their hearts set on brindles and reds. Oh well, you can't win them all!

toys**CAVALIER KING CHARLES SPANIELS**

Elizabeth I. Spalding, Kilspindie Cavaliers, 190 Mountain Rd., Falmouth, Maine 04105, U.S.A. As a lover of Cavaliers, and an active breeder for the past 13 years, I feel I must respond to what I consider a totally irresponsible piece of "journalism", the Cavalier column in the May Dogs in Canada, by Mrs. Poppy Steel.

First, the writer has appropriated, with no quotation marks or credits, out-of-context phrases from Mrs. Kay White and Miss Yoxall, both of England, both writing of English Cavaliers. Mrs. Steel says, in her article, "Whole color Cavaliers are snapping and snarling at humans and dogs almost the whole time at shows." This must be a distorted quote from Miss Yoxall's recent critique in which she said, "At two shows recently the behavior of one (and please note that specific ONE) small whole color dog has caused more attention and remarks than the rest of the breed. I do not feel it is a good thing for a Cavalier to sit on a bench and snap and snarl at human or dog almost the whole time." How could Mrs. Steel have rewritten that remark as she did?

The article she quotes from Mrs. Kay White actually ends, though she gives no indication of this, at the bottom of the second paragraph in the Dogs in Canada column. Mrs. Steel then goes on to remark that in the U.S.A. Cavaliers have "no competition to help upgrade the breed." She can hardly be ignorant of the fact, published in Dogs in Canada, that for the past 12 years the American Cavalier Club has held an annual Specialty show, which for the past five years has had an entry ranging from 93 to 139 Cavaliers. If Mrs. Steel does not come to these specialties, either as an exhibitor or a spectator, she has no right whatever to imply that they do not take place! She says "No one knows what type of Cavaliers are being bred from" in the U.S.A. but I find it difficult to think how she can substantiate this statement, since almost all the breeding stock used in this country is exhibited at the annual specialty.

Rather than derogating the breed with vague statements and misquotations, anyone who is really interested in the breed, and the least bit knowledgeable about it, should be offering constructive suggestions. We can only beg anyone who reads Mrs. Steel's column to visit some Cavalier breeders in the U.S.A., to see the temperaments of the dogs who appear in our shows.

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CHIHUAHUA'S

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REGISTRAR'S FORUM



Because of publication deadlines, this month's column is being written as the initial edition of the *FORUM* is completing its maiden voyage and hopefully landing on friendly shores.

While awaiting your response and questions, this month's chapter will try to open the door to the "inner sanctum" of the Registration Division and provide some answers to frequently questioned practices and impart some useful insight that may expedite your applications and enquiries.

THERE IS METHOD IN OUR MADNESS!

Without a doubt, the most currently criticized custom is the manner in which individual registration certificates are returned to the breeder. A re-occurring complaint is, "I sent in six individual applications from the same litter and received three certificates in one envelope, one certificate in another envelope and the remainder in still a third envelope, over a period of several weeks". To adequately understand why and how these applications become separated (after their arrival here), it is necessary to follow them through the flow-line. I will attempt to keep this verbal tour brief but extensive enough to give you some knowledge of our operations here. The course of your individual dog applications in the Division are as follows:

1. First stop is the Revenue Section where your applications can travel one of four paths, the most desirable, of course, is the non-stop flight to the next location on our flow-line. There are three detours, however, that one or more of your applications may take:

A. Rejects—If your fees are insufficient to complete all your applications submitted at the same time, we will process what we can cover by your submitted funds, with the remainder going to the Communications Section to be rejected.

B. Non-Breeding—if the individual dog is of non-breeding stock, then it must be diverted and processed by itself.

C. French—if the application indicates that the certificate is to be issued in French then again it must travel a different road.

2. Litter Records Check—Here the applications are checked to confirm that the number of males and females in the "application package" agrees with the information on the litter registration record.

3. Magnetic Card Typewriters—At this station the individual dog information is extracted from the application and recorded on a magnetic card. These cards hold information from a maximum of five applications. If you have submitted six then, of course, one of those applications will go on a separate card (along with information on four other dogs born in the same year and month from another litter) and will most likely be separated in the flow-line.

4. The dog and kennel name check station is your next layover and here again your application may be separated because of rejection.

5. Your journey now takes you to the Identification Section where noseprints or tattoos are checked against the record with splitting occurring on occasion because of unacceptability or incomplete submission.

6. At this point your applications are returned to the Magnetic Card typewriters to be corrected and/or to be injected into the computer. There they are "mar-

ried" with the previously injected litter information to produce an individual dog Certificate of Registration which is printed in Ottawa.

7. Your final destination is reached at this point and your applications are matched with the printed certificates and they are proof read. Any final errors are caught and any certificates printed incorrectly could again be separated from their litter mates.

As you can see, from the above, there are many stop-overs and points where your applications can be divorced from each other. It was noticed, hopefully,

that the majority of the separations are the direct result of application rejection.

CAN THESE CERTIFICATES BE COLLECTED AND MAILED TOGETHER?

The answer to this is two fold. First of all, the cost and disruption to our system would be prohibitive, and secondly, it would mean delaying all your applications for the sake of one or two stragglers. I do not honestly feel that you would want this. While it is an additional postage expense and a further frustration to breeders to receive their individual certificates in "dribbles and drabs", it appears to be the best system. If you have submitted a "package" of individual applications from the same litter and received some certificates and not others, you should give the Division a good two to three weeks before enquiring about the remainder.

HOW ABOUT THAT SECRET CODING SYSTEM YOU USE?

Our "secret coding system" is no secret. It is simply a system designed to produce greater versatility in the assignment of litter and individual certificate numbers. While it may appear to baffle the mind, it is basically a program of substituting letter designations for the year and month of birth. These letter designations are called the "Alpha Code". Space here does not permit the publication of the entire Alpha Code, but I hope, by way of illustration, to explain its rudiments.

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THE GROUPS IN REVIEW - 1972

SPORTING GROUP

by EVE AND STAN WHITMORE
The top winning dog in Group I again this year was the Irish Setter, Ch. (Can. & Am.) Draherin Bachelor Boy. And fifth, seventh and tenth places were also captured by Irish Setters. This says a lot for the breed with four of the same in the "Top Ten." Entries have been good with some fine competition being seen.

In second place is the Springer Spaniel. This breed seems to be hanging onto its quality and popularity and placing each year.

Third and fourth placings are Labrador Retrievers. This breed did not place at all last year so this accomplishment speaks for itself. Obviously, with two placings, this breed is coming up again.

Sixth place went to a Golden Retriever, another breed which did not place among the "Top Ten" last year. Here again it would indicate that this breed is improving and coming into its own.

In eighth place was an English Sealy. This continues to be a fine breed which seems to merit a placing.

Ninth place went to an English Cocker, a breed that ranked somewhat higher last year. This is a fine breed and the fact that it made the "Top Ten" at all is a worthy accomplishment. Some breeders don't enjoy very large English Cocker entries.

Several of the other breeds in the Sporting Group are moving up in entries and there is a marked improvement in quality. Next year perhaps we will find that a few of them have made it into the Top Ten.

HOUND GROUP

It is very obvious from scanning the results of the top ten hounds that to the hound fancier this was indeed "the year of the Afghan" in that five out of the ten top hounds represented that breed.

The Afghan has certainly reached his peak in less than a dozen years and as I was researching recently through old show catalogues dating back into the late 1950s and early 1960s, many of the shows were void of even one Afghan entry. I wonder though, has this sudden popularity been an asset to the breed? Sometimes, with too many joining the bandwagon a very unhealthy atmosphere is created. As a judge of this breed I must say that the Afghan is becoming increasingly more difficult to grade in type. Far too many are away over the size limit or away under and how many Afghans do we find these days with a level bite or the dark almond eyes? That's what the standard calls for. Where do we end in the Afghan standard that must be dripping in coat and trimmed to perfection? Although here I do give a big gold star to just about 98% of the Afghan exhibitors for presentation of their dogs and for time spent in grooming.

Let us hope that the truly serious Afghan breeder will continue to strive for the correct conformation of their breed with the beauty aspect being a secondary factor. Far too many breeds have times been cast by the wayside due to popularity—let's not have this happen to the Afghan Hound who has been enjoying such prom-

inence in the show ring and is a joy to have around.

Topping the Hound group for 1972 we find another of the sight hound group, the Borzoi, another of the long-coated hound breeds. This breed is shown in its "natural" coat and thus requires little grooming. Lately, this breed has been enjoying increasing popularity but in a more discriminate vein and many excellent types have been seen around the shows. I do hope this upward trend continues for the Borzoi.

For those who fancy our northern hound breed, the Norwegian Elkhound, it will no doubt please them to find that their breed has ranked No. 10 among the Top 10. As far as I am aware there were at least two different Elkhounds winning Best in Show during 1972.

Although, south of the border it is not uncommon for this breed to continuously place in the Top 10 and even top dog in the country. I feel that congratulations should be extended to the Canadian breeders of this breed who are striving to lend dignity to the Elkhound and closely watch the standard of the breed and refuse to over populate the breed for breeding's sake.

We generally can expect to find the Whippet and Beagle somewhere in the Top 10, although over the past decade the Beagles in numbers have diminished from the show ring even though I understand this breed still ranks high in registrations. Although the number of entries seldom is over six, as compared to 25 or 30, 15 years ago, there are still a few excellent specimens around.

As for the Whippet, this little fellow leaves nothing to hide, even from the ringside. He is shown without profuse coat and even his most minor fault can be quickly picked out. A good Whippet is easily detected and is seldom left out of the group ribbons.

The Saluki and Irish Wolfhound have been holding their own and indeed there have been many pleasing specimens of these breeds to be appreciated in the show ring. Many have placed in the groups but just could not make the top ten.

In review, we only find five different hound breeds out of a possible 25, realizing of course that no more than ten different breeds could have ranked. However, very conspicuously absent from the Top 10 were the Basset Hound, Basenji and Dachshunds, all of which can generally be found among the ten best.

Absent, too, was the Harrier representation, although it was nice to see a litter brother and sister both win Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Show awards during 1972.

Is the Black and Tan Coonhound on its way back? In researching the files, I noted that this breed was well represented at Canadian shows 15 years ago and it was not uncommon to have an entry of 15 or more at shows and a group placement was not a rare thing.

Where are the Foxhounds, Otterhounds, Bloodhounds, Greyhounds, Scottish Deerhounds and Rhodesian Ridgebacks? Except for one persistent exhibitor of Scottish Deerhounds in the east, seldom are they ever seen at any dog shows. The Rhodesian Ridgeback seems to be holding its own on the west coast but too few are seen here in the east. Less than three or four years ago several beautiful specimens of that breed were seen placing well into the groups.

Last but not least, where oh where is the Drever Hound—has anyone seen one lately? Not in the show ring I am sure, as I was the last judge to judge this breed in

Canada and that was in 1968 at the Ontario County Kennel Club show.

It has become quite obvious from my judging trip across Canada and from my own personal standpoint as a hound breeder that many breeders in this country have been extremely persistent with their breeds and year after year one can detect improvements in their bloodlines, generation after generation. It is most interesting to observe a hound fancier start with an average specimen, take the time to learn about his breed and then not hesitate to spend a dollar and watch him slowly, but surely, rise from breed wins to groups, to Best in Show.

The "quantity" breeder may bring in the dollars but the "quality" breeder gains the satisfaction of knowing he is doing something for the breed he is truly interested in and I say, which is more important to you?

WORKING GROUP

Great Danes received a big boost last year with a Great Dane being top winning working dog and also "Top Dog" all breeds. This was a well earned award. Danes have steadily improved in past years. Entries have generally been up and quality is keeping pace.

Second and sixth placings went to Boxers, another breed which has again held its own in good specimens, overall good entries and top wins.

In third place was a German Shepherd. This breed seems to have dropped a little in entries. Specialty show entries have held well but, in some cases, quality was down.

A Collie held fourth spot. This breed is improving and some nice specimens are taking on some top winning. Entries are up in most areas—good news for supporters of this lovely breed.

In fifth, seventh, and eighth place were Doberman Pinschers. This is another breed whose entries are increasing. Quality seems to be improving with every show as many fine wins at the group and Best in Show levels indicate.

In ninth place was the Giant Schnauzer, a new breed to place in the "Top Ten." We are seeing more and more of this breed in the show ring; quality continues to appear good.

Tenth on the list is the St. Bernard. These big fellows are a challenge both to breed and show. But last year saw some very large entries. Quality of the show specimens seen appears to be improving and throughout the year several very nice wins were scored.

Generally, the breeds in the Working Group appear to show improvement in quality and competition at the group level has continued keen. To those breeds who didn't make it into the "Top Ten"—keep trying. Maybe 1973 will be your year.

TERRIER GROUP

Terriers in Canada showed strongly in the fore in 1972. Although often accounting only for approximately 10% of a show's total entry, they claimed over 20% of the year's Best in Show awards, and terrier puppies took roughly 18% of the Best Canadian Bred Puppy

in Show awards.

This might be called the Year of the Westie since, in addition to claiming the top terrier, Eng. Ch. Lymehills Special Edition of Linden Hall, with his 15 Best in Shows and 27 Group wins, 22 of the 45 Best in Shows won by Terriers and 64 of the 220 Terrier Group wins, were taken by Westies. They also had a breed entry at every all breed and terrier show during the year including the Yukon, where a Westie took BIS at two of the three shows, and with a total of 71 dogs in the show two of the five terriers entered were Westies!

Regarding breed entries and activity, very rarely absent from the shows were Airedales, Cairns, Fox Terriers, Lhasa Apsos, Miniature Schnauzers and Scottish Terriers. There was increased activity in Bull Terriers, Staffordshire Bull Terriers (who staged their first specialty show), Border and Manchester Terriers, although the latter were still seen comparatively rarely. Lowest on this list was the Staffordshire Terrier with one American champion entered at one show in British Columbia!

Taking statistics, 45 BIS awards went to a total of 24 terriers representing 12 breeds. Other than the leading Westie, there were few "repeaters" in 1972. The Kerry Blue, Ch. Kel-Tara's Star Jubilee and the Westie, Ch. (Can. & Am.) Broadbridge Bearer, each scored three, the Smooth Fox Terrier Ch. Watteau's Kingfisher, the Miniature Schnauzer Ch. Tannenbaum's Purse Snatcher and the Westie Ch. Norwesties Wee Piper, each scored two; one Bull Terrier, four Wire-haired Fox Terriers, three Lakelands, one Lhasa Apso, one Miniature Schnauzer, three Scottish Terriers, one Sealyham, one Skye, one Welsh and two Westies each scored one. These wins were well divided up across the Continent. I regret space prevents mention of individual dogs.

The group winners represented all breeds except Border, Manchester, Norwich, Staffordshire and Staffordshire Bull Terriers, although a Border and a Staffordshire Bull did make group placements.

Eleven Westies claimed 64 group first, with nine Lhasa Apsos taking 39, 11 Scottish Terriers taking 16, four Kerry Blues taking 15, ten Wire Fox Terriers also taking 15, three Lakelands taking 12, six Cairns taking 10, two Bull Terrier's seven, one Sealyham, three Airedales, two Bedlington, and three Welsh, in each case accounting for five, three Smooth Fox Terriers for four, one Skye for three, one Irish for two, and an Australian and a Dandie Dinmont for one each. Breeds with individual winners of five or more groups were Bull Terrier, Kerry Blue, Lhasa Apso, Sealyham and West Highland White. Again space prevents names!

Puppy activity was interesting. Fifteen breeds were represented by 82 puppies in Best Canadian Bred Puppy in Group awards; 11 breeds shared the Best Puppy in Show honors. Outstanding during the year were the Miniature Schnauzers Tannenbaum Purse Snatcher and Sylva Sprite Extra Dry, and the Lhasa Apso Kyma of Abbotsford, who all went on as champions in adult competition to become Best in Show winners during the year.

There were five terrier specialties in 1972—that of the B.C. All Terrier Club held in Vancouver with 112 dogs representing 21 breeds (only the Irish and Welsh were absent) which was won by the Sealyham, Ch. (Can., Am. & Bda.) Polrose Pacesetter. He also won the All Terrier Club of Alberta specialty held in Calgary at

which 116 dogs represented 20 breeds. The Red River Terrier Association specialty, held in Winnipeg, with 71 dogs representing 15 breeds, was won by the Kerry Blue, Ch. Bluestone's Ready Raider. The Terrier Breeders Association of Canada, held at Toronto, with 128 dogs representing 18 breeds, was won by the Dandie Dinmont, Ch. Graymorn's Geordie MacBagpipe. The Rideau Terrier Club Specialty, held at Kars, Ontario (near Ottawa), with 81 dogs representing 17 breeds, was won by the Cairn Terrier, Ch. (Can. & Am.) Cairndania Brigey's Berry-Red.

Breed specialties are still limited to five in number. 1972 saw three of them hosted by the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show when the Airedale Terrier Club of Canada specialty, with 24 competing, was won by Serendale's Amulet Attoppa; that of the Miniature Schnauzer Club of Canada, with 12 competing, was won by Ch. (Can. & Am.) Sylva Sprite Snowy Mittens; while the Canadian West Highland White Terrier Club specialty, with 23 competing, was won by Eng. Ch. Lymehills Special Edition of Linden Hall. The Canadian Scottish Terrier Club held their specialty at Don Mills, with Ch. The Laird's Jock of Ayr topping an entry of 14. The Staffordshire Bull Terrier Club of Canada held their first specialty at Ottawa, with an entry of 20, topped by Ch. Rossille Hussy of Terro.

The obedience results again reflect very satisfactory terrier activity from coast to coast. Miniature Schnauzers were still in the lead with 79 legs completed in Novice classes (CD), 23 legs in Open Classes (CDX) and three in Utility (UD); Airedales were next with 44 legs completed in Novice and six in Open. Kerry Blues completed 16 legs in Novice and 11 in Open, Westies 23 in Novice, Wire Fox Terriers 17 in Novice and three in Open, Bedlington 18 in Novice, Scottish 13 in Novice and three in Open. Other breeds were Border Terriers, Cairns, Irish, Lakelands, Lhasa Apsos, Norwich and Welsh. In addition, terriers were represented nine times in Highest Score in Trial honors—twice by the Airedale, Muffin Man of Drury Lane (200 and 197.5), twice by the Miniature Schnauzer, Wicklow Dragonair Serendipity, once each by the Border Terriers, Bandersnatch Boojum (199.5) and Dalquest Sundance Kid (199.5), the Miniature Schnauzers Cindy's Tammy of Summerhill and Gay Meadows Wendolin Whiskers, and the West Highland White Terrier, Teacher's Wee White Cream.

An additional surprise in going through trial records was to find that two terriers completed the Tracking Tests: the Miniature Schnauzer, Wicklow Dragonair Serendipity, at Calgary, and the Bedlington, Blue Suede of Uxbridge, at Oshawa.

If the present suggestion that the Lhasa Apso should be transferred to the Non-Sporting Group goes into effect, it will be interesting to see the results in show records, since this breed has done so much winning over the past years.

Although we are still without a terrier specialty club in the Maritimes, terrier interest and activity, and the quality of terriers, are high across the country. More breed clubs seem to have been taking advantage of Booster shows and educational meetings to promote general interest. The terrier is an ideal companion, in whatever shape or size you may

NOTICE

SUBJECT: Policies governing submission and consideration of a proposed new breed standard or a proposed change in a breed standard.

For the information of those interested there follows the policies which apply on the above subject.

- When a club or group of individuals wishes to modify or replace a breed standard, they must submit the proposed new standard or change in standard together with reasons and advantages for the change to the Breed Standards Committee of The Canadian Kennel Club.
- When a club requests a change in a breed standard it must supply a current list of club members and it must state the percentage of its whole membership which is in favour of the proposed change.
- When a change in a breed standard is proposed by a group of individuals, the names of those individuals must accompany the application.
- If the Breed Standards Committee considers the changes and the reasons for the changes to be valid, the proposed new standard or change in standard shall be published in three consecutive issues of the official organ of The Canadian Kennel Club, and on each occasion the publication shall be accompanied by an invitation to those interested to submit their comments. The time limit for the receipt of comments shall be six months from the first date of publication.

- At the expiration of the six months period all comments will be considered by the Breed Standards Committee.
 - The proposed standard with the revisions accepted by the Breed Standards Committee following its consideration of the comments received, shall then be published in two consecutive issues of the official organ, and a further period of four months from the date of the first publication shall be allowed for the receipt of further comments.
 - All further comments will be considered by the Committee which will then submit its recommendations to the Board of Directors.
 - If the Committee considers a submission to be one that does not warrant serious consideration, or finds that the sponsors are not prepared to accept changes suggested by the Committee, then the Committee will submit its recommendations to the Board and Sections No. 4, No. 5, No. 6 and No. 7 of these policies will not apply.

NOTICE

SUBJECT: Requirements for the recognition of a breed not heretofore recognized by The Canadian Kennel Club.

For the information of those interested there follow the policies which apply when a person or group of persons seek C.K.C. recognition of a breed not heretofore recognized by the Club.

- There must be a minimum of 25 dogs of the breed before the Board will consider recognition, all 25 to be eligible for registration according to the Club's registration requirements, although not all 25 need be imported dogs;
- In the case of an imported dog it must be registered in a stud book recognized by the C.K.C., and the importer must be able to furnish documents, issued by such recognized Club, which furnishes all the information required in the case of an imported dog of a breed already recognized by this Club (see Article XXX, Section 2 (3) of the Club's By-Laws).
- In the case of a dog born in Canada its dam (and sire if imported to Canada) must be registered individually in our records and litter registration in the usual way is required. If the sire is not owned in Canada (dam was bred before export to Canada) then the sire must be a dog which would be eligible for registration had it been imported to Canada, and the owner of the dam must supply, on official documents in the way required by Article XXIX, Section 3 (3), the information necessary to register the litter;
- The Board, which is in office at the time of recognition, will decide what breed standard shall be adopted. If it is already a breed recognized by the A.K.C. and the applicant for recognition has no objection, priority may be given the A.K.C. standard; otherwise the Board will consider the standard in effect in the country to which the breed is considered indigenous;
- The applicant(s) for recognition of the breed will pay a fee of \$100.00 (non-refundable).
- No breed is to be recognized simply on the grounds that a resident of any other country is anxious to show, at Canadian dog shows, dogs of a breed not yet recognized by the C.K.C. (No. 95-71)

NOTICE

SUBJECT: Junior handling competitions.

At its recent annual meeting the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club approved the report of the Junior Kennel Club Committee in which report the Committee set forth its recommendations on rules to govern a nation-wide junior handling competition. The Rules are as follows:

- The present Junior Handling competition rules stand, as is, for competitions held within each Province.
- Selection of judges for these events to be left to the Junior Club holding the event. (i.e.) Any person would be eligible to judge if the club invited them, provided they are in good standing with the C.K.C. In the case of the National competition the host club will submit the names of four (4) persons to the Junior Kennel Club Committee, who will then select two (2), who will be appointed to judge this event.
- Where a Junior Competition is held in conjunction with a Championship Show notice of the event, the time it will take place and the name of the judge must be in the Premium list.
- Where a Junior competition is held in conjunction with an event sponsored by an adult club or Association, the club or association will only supply the space required for the competition, and the time it is to be held. The junior club will be responsible for organizing the event and running it.
- Points will be awarded for each event as follows: 1st Place, five pts., 2nd place, four pts., third place, three pts., fourth place, two pts. It will be the responsibility of each junior to report to his or her club any points that they may win. It will be the responsibility to record each and every point won by a member. Only points won at competitions held within the Province of residence will be counted. If a person not belonging to a Junior club in the province wins the competition then no points will be awarded.
- At the end of each Calender year, each club will nominate its top scoring handler to the Provincial Competition. Only persons nominated for this may compete.

- (7) When totalling the points at the end of the year for top handler of a club the following formula should be applied. The junior must have competed in a minimum of three competitions held within the Province of residence. Take the total amount of points won and divide by the number of competitions that the person competed in. The number that is left will be the total points awarded to that person.
- (8) At no time should an entry fee be charged for junior competitions because this can be a hardship for children from large families.
- (9) In order to see that junior events are run to the rules it is proposed that a person from each Province be appointed by the chairman of the junior committee to be chairman of a sub-committee with power to add two people of his or her choice. This sub-committee will be responsible for all junior events and activities run by clubs in the Province, and will be answerable to the junior kennel club committee appointed by the board of directors of the C.K.C.
- (10) The Provincial Competition must be held on or before March 31st of the year following. (ie.) Points won by handlers in 1973 will count towards the Provincial Competition held in 1974.
- (11) Each club will be responsible for monies needed to enable their top handler to compete for the Provincial competition.
- (12) The winner of the provincial competition will be deemed the Top handler for that province, and will be eligible to compete for the Top junior handler of Canada.
- (13) The Top Junior Handler of Canada competition must be held on or before May 31st. This event will rotate around Canada.
- (14) The Provincial sub-committee will be responsible for organizing and collecting the monies needed to transport the top handler, a dog and a chaperone to the national competition.
- (15) For the purpose of competitions the maximum age for a junior is 16 yrs. A person will be considered 16 yrs. until the day of his or her 17th birthday. All points won before this day will be eligible to be counted.
- (16) If a person becomes the top handler of a club, but before the Provincial competition is held they reach their 17th birthday they will be eligible to compete. The same applies for the national competition.
- (17) The ribbons awarded in all competitions should be as follows: 1st Place, light blue; 2nd place, maroon; 3rd place, light green; 4th place, brown.
- (18) The Canadian Kennel Club will donate a suitable trophy and a rosette for the top handler in Canada.
- (19) The Ralston Purina Company have agreed to donate the sum of \$250.00 to the Top junior handler of Canada, such award to be given as a scholarship.

Clubs, judges, and competitors in Junior Handling Competitions should note the following rules on the judging of Junior Handling Competitions:

- (1) The overall impression is most important. The judge should look for a junior handler appropriately dressed, who presents his/her dog in a manner which will show off its particular breed advantage. He/She must endeavour to have the dog hold the correct stance for the breed. *THE CONFORMATION OF THE DOG IS NOT TO COUNT.*
- (2) Specific details.
- a) Only members entered in Senior Handling should be asked to exchange dogs. Junior Handlers competing for Best Handler may be asked to exchange dogs in the event of a tie, depending on the size and manageability of the dogs involved.
- b) The judge should inspect each dog individually, to check that its handler knows how to show a dog at close quarters, its expression and bite for example, but should have to handle the dogs very little. For example, he might only place a foot incorrectly to see if the handler corrects the fault.
- c) The lead should be held in the hand nearest the dog at all times. The lead must be folded up (not wrapped around the fingers), without any end trailing.
- d) The dog must be between the handler and the judge at all times. Customarily the handler enters and circles the ring with his/her dog on his/her left and gaits the dog individually on his/her left.
- e) The dog should be moved with smoothness at the correct speed for the breed.
- f) When handlers are moved individually, the same pattern should be used for each handler. A pattern which requires a lead change from hand to hand, such as the crossover, is desirable.
- g) As a handler comes out to move his/her dog individually, he/she should present his/her dog to the judge, allowing the dog to pose naturally. After gaiting, the handler should again allow the dog to pose naturally before the judge.
- h) The handler and the dog should function as part of a team, unobtrusive but efficient. A handler may encourage his/her dog, but must be severely penalized for forcible discipline in the ring.
- i) The judge must give credit for a handler who has to deal with a difficult dog but is nevertheless handling the problem well. Sometimes the handler who is handling a highly trained dog is appearing to do a good job when in reality the dog is handling itself. Similarly a judge should give credit for a handler displaying a breed that is less glamorous or requires less posing than another breed, if the handler is still proficient.
- j) Four placings should be made in each class. If entries are sufficient, the club may provide separate classes for boys and girls. Seniors (14 to 16 years inclusive)

- and Juniors (13 years and under). A best handler must be selected from the winners of these classes.
- k) The judge should look for that elusive extra in the handler's showmanship, the ability to give that feeling of pride in the dog and to show with a flair.
- l) When showing his/her dog in the ring a handler chewing gum and talking unnecessarily to other competitors or the judge is to be penalized.
- m) A handler and his/her dog should not interfere with any other handler and his/her dog. Good sportsmanship must be shown.
3. The selection of a judge for Junior Handling Competitions shall be at the discretion of the club holding the competition.

The Board accepted all five recommendations made in the report, to become effective July 1st., 1973.

IMPORT PERMIT FOR SEMEN:

The Board discussed the desirability of an extension of present time limits imposed by the import permit for semen.

Representation will be made to the Canada Department of Agriculture to extend the validity of the import permit of semen from the present three months to six months from date of issue.

THE WHITE GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG:

A letter from Mr. W. G. Robinson, Chief Registration Officer, Canada Department of Agriculture regarding the status of the White German Shepherd Dog in Canada was considered. The position of The Canadian Kennel Club is as follows:

1. The White German Shepherd Dog is eligible for registration in the Club's registration records provided of course that our registration requirements are complied with.

2. For the purpose of dog shows held under our rules the following section of the breed standard applies: "Strong rich colours are to be preferred with depigmentation and without the appearance of a washed out colour. White dogs are not desirable and are to be disqualified if showing Albino characteristics."

3. The White German Shepherd Dog is eligible for entry in Obedience Trials held under this Club's rules as colour has no bearing on its eligibility to earn obedience degrees and title.

COLOUR AND COAT DESIGNATIONS:

The Special Committee on Colours and Coat Designations reported:

1. That colour and/or colour pattern description for registration purposes be limited to a specific maximum number of letters and spaces, that maximum number to be determined by the Registrar and approved by the Board.

2. That colour and/or colour pattern description for registration purposes be chosen by the registration applicant and to conform within the maximum number of letters and spaces as given in Recommendation No. 1, except that descriptions which are clearly a disqualification in the breed standard be rejected.

3. That this committee be dissolved.
The Board essentially concurred.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED DECEMBER, 1972:

The Treasurer, referred to the set of financial statements drawn up for the fiscal year ended December 1972 and copies distributed earlier to all Members of the Board.

A report giving a break-out of percentages with regard to expense items was distributed to the meeting.

The Treasurer then went on to give the Board percentage ratio of individual expense items to total expenses compared to prior years and noted that in most cases, ratios were holding favourably.

The Board directed that this statement of the distribution of Income and Expense be made available to the Membership at the Annual General Meeting, including the comparative 1972 figures.

PRELIMINARY BUDGET ESTIMATES FOR 1973:

The Treasurer presented the preliminary estimate for 1973 as developed by the Management Team in consultation with the Finance Committee and answered a number of questions related to specific items set out in the proposed budget.

The budget estimate was accepted by the Board after amendment to several items.

DIRECTORS' ALLOWANCES:

SUBJECT: The Board then entered into a thorough discussion of geographical considerations and other factors that would affect the fair and equitable distribution of expense allowances to Directorships by province. A suggestion was made that expenses of representatives could be disbursed at the discretion of the Provincial Director.

A proposal was made to the Board to consider the existing resolution governing Director's Allowances and set forth a suggested scale.

It was the direction of the Board that a Special Committee be established to enquire into the matter of Expenses of all Committees and Councils and report brought back to the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board.

STUD BOOKS:

A request was made from the Board as to any indication as to when the Club may expect to return to the publication of a Stud Book.

The Manager of Shows & Trials replied that based on observations made during his recent time spent in the Registration Division, that to produce a Stud Book at this time is still an impossibility.

The matter was referred to the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board.

COMPLAINTS POLICY:

It was confirmed that all Board Members had received a copy of policy recommendations developed in the Complaints Committee that were subsequently accepted by the Board with the view that such policies would eliminate frivolous or unreasonable complaints.

Upon clearance by the Club's Solicitor, the policies to be implemented immediately.

The Secretary carried to the Board a recommendation originating in the Complaints Committee that a fine be imposed against a Club involving an infraction of the rule of



having one Judge judge in excess of one hundred and seventy five (175) dogs per day.

The Board concurred with the recommendation of the Committee.

MEETINGS IN PLACES OTHER THAN TORONTO:

A notice of Motion was read to the Board calling for the approval, in principle, of holding regular Board Meetings in major Canadian centres other than in Toronto in 1973 and 1974 with the object of improving the communication between the Board and the Members of the Association. The notice further recommended that the Promotion Committee be given the responsibility of organizing such meetings and suggested that the first regular Board Meeting be held outside of Toronto in the Province of Saskatchewan to allow direct supervision by the Chairman of the Promotion Committee, with the second of such meetings to be held in 1974 and be located in the Maritimes.

Inquiry by the Board into the suggestion and the details involved revealed a number of factors operating against the practicality of such a proposal and notice of Motion was not carried to a decision by the Board in the form presented.

The Promotion Committee was directed by the Board to look into the possibility of Annual Meetings, and Semi-Annual Meetings of the Board being held in locations other than Toronto.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD 1974:

It was the Board's decision that the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors for 1974 be held in Halifax, Nova Scotia on March 27, 1974, and the Annual General Meeting on March 30, 1974.

SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD:

The attention of the Board then turned to the matter of a suitable date for the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board in 1973 and various dates were examined spanning the last two weeks of September through to the first week of October, 1973.

The date of commencement of the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board was set for September 24, 1973.

LOCATION OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING:

Reference was made to a letter received from the President of the Alberta Kennel Club in which information was given concerning the 100th Anniversary of the City of Calgary, and the 70th Birthday of the Calgary Alberta Kennel Club, and the request made that the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club consider Calgary as a possible site for the Annual General Meeting of the Board.

The letter was referred to the 1974 Annual Meeting of the Board.

PROMOTION COMMITTEE:

The Board, in reviewing the content of the Alberta Kennel Club letter, felt that possibly the Terms of Reference of the Promotion Committee, should be expanded to include study, recommendation, and arrangements for meetings in centres of Canada other than Toronto.

The Board expanded the terms of reference of the Promotion Committee to include designation of the City of which the Semi-Annual Meeting will be held in 1973 and to make arrangements for such meeting.

TELEPHONE LISTING—ALL MAJOR CANADIAN CENTRES:

A Director's letter was read in which request was made of the Board to consider the listing of The Canadian Kennel Club Business Office and Registration Division in telephone directories in all leading cities; a review of the request to be made at the Annual Meeting of the Board.

It was the decision of the Board that the matter of telephone listings be referred to the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board.

REPORT OF THE PROMOTION COMMITTEE:

The Committee Report dealt with two main topics, the first of which concerned bursaries for students in veterinarian colleges and made reference to the Board's earlier decision to award bursaries of \$300 (three hundred dollars) each to three designated veterinarian colleges in Canada for the academic year 1973-4.

The Report went on to outline the very favourable response received from the colleges concerned.

The second part of the Report sketched the origin of the recommendation that Regular Board Meetings, from time to time, be held at locations other than 111 Eglinton Avenue East.

The Report ended with a recommendation that the work of the Promotion Committee be expanded to include not only promotion of the C.K.C. amongst the Memberships, but that it also involve promotion among non-Members and the public at large.

The Chairman, Promotion Committee, then spoke to the Board regarding the functions of the Board, the changes in Executive Staff, and major changes generally that have taken place recently and made mention of the need to view the function of the Board alongside the By-laws and in view of the changes in the Executive Staff.

A special committee was then established to consider the function of the Board of Directors.

BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING:

Dog Cosmetic Surgery

The Board turned to a discussion of Dog Cosmetic Surgery as it had been raised at the Annual General Meeting.

It was directed that a request be made of the Canadian Veterinarian Medical Association for permission to have a Canadian Kennel Club Observer present at their Annual Meeting when the subject of Ear Cropping Considerations is discussed.

An Observer, chosen from amongst the Directors, was authorized to attend should the reply to the Club's request be favourable.

In a continuing discussion of Dog Cosmetic Surgery, a decision was made to reactivate the Committee on Cosmetic Surgery to operate within the same terms of reference as the previous Committee.

KENNEL NAMES:

An enquiry was introduced from the floor of the Annual General Meeting as to what reciprocal agreements, if any, exist between the C.K.C. and the A.K.C. in the matter of the protection of kennel names.

The Manager, Shows And Trials reiterated to the Board his statement made at the Annual General Meeting that no formal agreements exist and that present mutual cooperation is based on a "gentleman's understanding."

Instruction was issued to Management to pursue the matter of Kennel Names with The American Kennel Club.

VARIATIONS IN JUDGING STANDARDS:

The Board reviewed a member's remarks from the floor of the Annual General Meeting having to do with the differences that exist between the understood standards in many of the breeds amongst judges of the C.K.C. and the A.K.C., and his request for a get-together with these Clubs with a view to standardizing.

The Manager of Shows & Trials was asked to follow the matter with regard to The Canadian Kennel Club disqualifications being sent to Foreign Judges, together with any other relevant information.

BREED STANDARDS:

Review was made of a request from the floor of the Annual General Meeting that a get-together be arranged with The American Kennel Club and The Kennel Club with a view to standardizing Breed Standards within the three Clubs.

It was decided that no action would be taken in changing Standards to conform with either The American Kennel Club or The Kennel Club standards.

REPRINTING OF THE BOOK OF BREED STANDARDS:

Discussion of the Board turned to the reprinting of The Canadian Kennel Club Book of Breed Standards.

Management was instructed to proceed with the printing of the Book in accordance with the format approved at the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board, October, 1972, without delay.

REGISTRATION MATTERS:

The Board then referred to observations of a Member made at the Annual General Meeting concerning a recommendation a Member had made with regard to the Registration of the Long and the Short-Coated Chihuahua to be registered as two separate Breeds.

The Board directed that the Member's letter regarding the matter be sent to the Breed Standards Committee for study and report.

ALLOCATION OF PRIORITY DATES:

The Manager of Shows & Trials, addressed the Board regarding the matter of Allocation of Priority Dates.

It was suggested that Reports of Dates requested by Clubs be circulated to all Directors, and thirty days given in which to register any objections to the dates as listed.

Resolution was made that an up-to-date list of all Priority Date Applications be sent to all Directors with a note that if no objection is registered within thirty days, the Manager of Shows & Trials would proceed to approve such dates.

PRIORITY DATES—SANCTION MATCHES:

Discussion of the Board then turned to the matter of priority dates for sanction matches as introduced from the floor of the Annual General Meeting.

An Ontario Director spoke against priority dates for sanction matches and was joined by the Director for British Columbia who stated that the Ontario Director should resolve the matter and not saddle the rest of Canada with rules where this item is not a problem.

Mr. Brown affirmed that sanction matters are an Ontario problem and concentration should be on the breed clubs rather than the variety clubs.

The Ontario Directors will hold a meeting to discuss the matters of Sanction Shows Dates in Ontario and that the Manager of Shows and Trials will take action on their recommendations.

PUBLICATION OF COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES IN DOGS IN CANADA:

The Board referred to an item introduced from the floor at the Annual General Meeting suggesting that Minutes of Committee proceedings be published in Dogs in Canada. The Board ruled that publication would not be undertaken of such reports unless so directed by the Board.

COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE WORK—FORM LETTERS:

The Board considered remarks made by a Member from the floor at the Annual General Meeting with regard to what was described as a threatening letter sent to him by the Club in connection with a Complaint.

Direction was given the Secretary to assemble a kit of all form letters in use by the Complaints Committee at the present time for review and recommendations of the Board.

REGISTRAR'S PAGE IN DOGS IN CANADA:

Suggestion was made that a yellow page be set aside in Dogs in Canada for the publication of material having to do with Registration matters.

Decision of the Board was made that a page in the Official Business Section of the Magazine be set aside and designated as the Registrar's page and used to publish information regarding Registration matters.

ETHICS—CANADIAN BREEDERS:

The Board then moved on to a discussion of a Member's observation at the Annual General Meeting that Canadian Breeders are foisting off poor specimens on the Public and

his inquiry as to what the Board intends to do about it. It was directed that no action be taken on the subject introduced by the Member at this time.

ABANDONMENT OF NOSE-PRINTING:

Board attention was directed to the suggestion by a Member from the floor of the Annual General Meeting that nose-printing as a form of identification be discarded. The Board ruled that no action be taken at this time in the matter of discarding nose-printing.

MULTIPLE SHOWS:

The Board reviewed a Member's suggestion made at the Annual General Meeting to eliminate three shows on Weekends and confine them to one show as is done in the United States and some areas of Canada to avoid a cluttered calendar. The matter of multiple shows was referred to the Dog Show Council.

OPEN SHOWS:

Suggestion had been made at the Annual General Meeting that The Canadian Kennel Club institute something like an English "Open Show", which would serve to train Judges and free-up calendar dates. The matter of Open Shows was referred to the Dog Show Council.

SANCTION SHOWS FOR SPECIALTY CLUBS:

A Member had suggested at The Annual General Meeting, Saturday, March 31, 1973 that Specialty Clubs should be allowed to hold Sanction Shows.

The matter of Specialty Sanction Matches for Specialty Clubs was referred by the Board to the Dog Show Council.

CONFLICT OF DATES:

Again, at the Annual General Meeting, a Member remarked on the difficulty to get Show Dates in view that Shows could not be held within a 200 mile radius.

An Ontario Director was able to correct this misimpression and advise the Annual General Meeting that such Shows could now be held within a 100 mile radius.

Decision was made that the matter of conflicting dates be referred to discussion by the Ontario Directors in consultation with the Director for Quebec.

PROFESSIONAL HANDLERS IN SANCTION MATCHES:

Inquiry had been made at The Annual General Meeting as to why Professional Handlers cannot function at Sanction Matches.

The Board referred the matter of Professional Handlers and Sanction Matches to the Dog Show Council.

LUNCHEONS AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS:

An observation had been made from the floor at the Annual General Meeting that prior to the Club's financial troubles free Luncheons had been provided at the Annual General Meeting. The Member went on to suggest that at the next Annual General Meeting the practice be re-instituted only the Members could pay their own costs.

Examination by the Board revealed that it was the consensus of Board opinion that the idea was unmanageable and impracticable and, that no action be taken on the motion from the floor concerning provision of a Luncheon.

LISTING OF COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN:

At the Annual General Meeting an inquiry had been made regarding the practicality of providing a listing of Committee Chairmen to the attendance at an Annual General Meeting.

Study of the matter by the Board revealed the necessity to make appointments the very first day of the Annual Meeting of the Board in order to have such a listing available for the Annual General Meeting and that such action was not feasible; accordingly, the Board ruled that no action be taken to produce a listing of Committee Chairmen and Appointments for distribution at an Annual General Meeting.

SIZE OF BREED RINGS AT CONFORMATION SHOWS:

Suggestion was made by a Member at the Annual General Meeting that the Size and Design of Breed Rings be studied and further suggested that the Ring might be in the shape of a triangle rather than a square to provide more Ring size.

The Board referred the matter of Size and Design of Breed Rings to the Dog Show Council.

NON-BREEDING DOGS IN SHOW:

A Member at the Annual General Meeting had drawn to the Board's attention the matter of dogs covered by non-breeding contracts being shown in Shows.

Board decision in the matter that the requirements of a non-breeding registered dog remain "as is".

VOTING RIGHTS FOR HUSBAND AND WIFE PARTNERSHIPS:

A question had been raised at the Annual General Meeting as to Voting Rights in a Husband and Wife partnership.

The question of Voting Rights in such a partnership was referred to the By-Laws Committee, for study and report back to the Board.

PUBLICATION OF MINUTES IN FULL:

The Board of Directors then returned to consideration of the matter of publication of Minutes in full in Dogs in Canada such subject having been tabled by a previous motion by the Board. After discussion in depth of cost factors, and the format of presentation of the Minutes in full, decision of the Board was made that full Minutes of the Meeting be published in Dogs in Canada subject to recommendations by the Club's Solicitor regarding content. The final decision of the Board was that the Minutes of Board Meetings would be presented in Dogs in Canada in a reportorial form, i.e. "subject then decision".

REGISTRAR'S REPORT:

The Registrar sought out Board comment with regard to the

tour made of the Registration Division by the entire Board Thursday afternoon, March 29, 1973.

A free exchange of views, recommendations, and explanation was then entered upon.

The Registrar's Report was finalized with the Board having been given a detailed Report of the operations of the Registration Division.

REGISTRATION COMMITTEE:

The Chairman, Registration Committee, reported proceedings of a Committee Meeting held March 27, 1973 at which formulation was made of a number of proposed changes in the existing By-Laws as they pertain to registration matters.

The Board entered into a point by point discussion of the proposed changes and agreed in principle with the first two pages of the report noting the desirability to consult with The Kennel Club, The American Kennel Club, and the Club's Solicitor on the proposed changes.

The Report was referred back to the Registration Committee with recommendations as noted above.

NON-BREEDING CONTRACTS:

Board discussion returned to an item touched upon in the Registrar's Report dealing with Non-Breeding Contracts (Form 201).

The Board ruled that the present 10¢ for the Form 201 be dropped immediately and that the change be advised to the Membership in "Dogs in Canada".

CHANGE OF ADDRESS:

The Registrar made suggestion to the Board of printing a change of address coupon in "Dogs in Canada", in a form that could be clipped out and forwarded to The Canadian Kennel Club and designed for Member convenience.

The Board directed that such a coupon be designed and published in the magazine.

PROPOSED BY-LAW AMENDMENTS:

The Special Committee on By-Law Amendments brought before the Board a number of proposed changes to the By-Laws affecting Article XX—Meetings of the Board; Article X—constitution of the Board; Article XII—Elections and Quinquennial Adjustments; Article XIII—Committees, Representatives and Appointments; Article XIV—Discipline.

Decision of the Board was made that such proposed

amendments receiving approval of not less than eleven Members of the Board, and clearance by the Club's Solicitor, will be placed on a Special referendum Ballot to be conducted concurrent with the next Election of Officers and Directors.

DOG SHOWS:

The Chairman, Chapter 7 Committee submitted a Report to

the Board dated February 9, 1973 in which the first item

recommended a shortened application form for extensions

of approval to judge to be taken into use immediately.

Concurrence of the Board was given the recommendation.

The balance of the Report having to do with any proposals for change in the Dog Show Rules, classification of Poodles, Dachshunds, Chihuahuas or Collies as one breed, and Reports on Judges by clubs was referred to the new Chairman of Chapter 7 Committee.

PERMIT JUDGING:

The Board referred to the letter of a National Director in which was set forth the contention that the required number for permit judging in the initial stages should be a multiple of six rather than the figure of twenty as it exists at present.

The letter was referred to the Chapter 7 Committee for study and report.

VETERAN HANDLERS BECOMING ALL-BREED JUDGES:

A letter dated February 19, 1973 from a National Director outlined proposals to do with the requirements necessary for a veteran handler to become an all-breed judge.

The matter was referred to the Chapter 7 Committee.

PUBLICATION OF JUDGES' ASSIGNMENTS IN "DOGS IN CANADA".

The Board referred to a letter dated March 14, 1973 from a National Director asking that consideration be given to publishing Judges' Assignments in "Dogs in Canada", in a similar fashion to the practice carried out in the American Kennel Club Gazette.

It was decided that no action would be taken on the proposal at this time.

INCORRECT ENTRIES AT SHOWS:

The Board entered into a discussion of incorrect entries at shows as referred to this Annual Meeting of the Board from the Semi-Annual Meeting of October, 1972.

The ruling was made that: The Provincial Director, or

Dog Show Representative, be empowered to request of the

Secretary of the event to show

all entries of that event at any

time after entries close.

That all Directors and Dog Show Representatives be given authority to indicate their powers in the matter, and that the resolution be referred to the Dog Show Council for incorporation into the re-write of the Dog Show Rules.

REPORT OF THE DOG SHOW COUNCIL:

The Chairman, Dog Show Council, referred to his Council Report dated February 27, 1973 and explained to the Board that the Report was submitted largely for information only since the Council is now involved in a re-draft of Dog Show Rules and is only awaiting the opportunity to meet with the Manager of Shows and Trials so that the draft may be finalized for distribution to all Directors of the Board, and subsequent publication in "Dogs in Canada", to solicit Membership comment.

The Board received the Report of the Dog Show Council as information. It was noted by the Board that it should be clearly understood in the publication in Dogs in Canada that these are simply "proposed rules" at this time.

PREMIUM LISTS:

The Board referred to a suggestion regarding the elimination of Prize Lists for Booster and Specialty Shows.

A Director made the suggestion that interested parties could write in for the List, or have it posted at the Show.

The matter was referred to the Dog Show Council.

PROFESSIONAL SUPERINTENDENTS AND PROFESSIONAL SECRETARIES:

The Chairman of the Special Committee struck to inquire into Professional Superintendents and Professional Secretaries advised the Board that while the Committee is of the opinion that regulations should be set for Professional Superintendents and Professional Secretaries no positive action could be taken until the Board receives and accepts the new Dog Show Rules.

The Board received the Report as information pending receipt and acceptance of any changes in the Dog Show Rules and referred the Report to the Dog Show Council.

FULL SHOW RESULTS:

The Board referred to a Director's inquiry regarding the feasibility of publishing full Show Results in Dogs in Canada.

The Board examination of the subject revealed that such publication would be impractical at the present time but, the Manager of Shows and Trials advised that he is under consideration a method whereby such information could be carried to the Membership.

The matter was left that the Manager of Shows and Trials would look into the matter with a view to the publication of full Show Results when possible.

TITLES AWARDED:

A Director's letter dated February 9, 1973 requested the Board to consider the re-instatement of the practice of publishing the Sires and Dams of new Champions in "Dogs in Canada".

The Board directed that this matter be considered within the terms of reference of the Directive given to the Manager of Shows and Trials under the preceding heading "FULL SHOW RESULTS".

CARBON IN PAGES OF JUDGES' BOOKS:

Board attention was directed to the unsatisfactory type of carbon in use in Judges' pages as currently used and suggestion made of a return to the use "self carbon".

A directive was issued to the Manager of Shows and Trials that a return be made to the former style of page in Judges' books for better clarity of carbon impression as present supplies are used up.

REPORT OF THE OBEDIENCE COUNCIL:

Two proposed amendments to Obedience Rules were suggested to the Board in the Council Report and appeared as follows: Page 23—Chapter 2, Section 19—on line 10 after "will stand", and before "or pose", insert "and", so that the line will read "handlers will stand and/or pose their Dogs".

Chapter 2, Section 3—after first paragraph insert a separate paragraph to read "all Dogs must enter the Ring in leash".

Concurrence of the Board was given the Report of the Obedience Council and recommendation made that the proposed amendments be published in Dogs in Canada with Membership comments solicited. Observation was made of the report of the Council that Crests should not be worn in the Ring and such a ruling should include Ring Stewards. Reference was made to Club uniforms being worn.

The matter was referred back to Obedience Council for further study and report to the Board.

REPORT OF THE FIELD TRIAL COUNCIL FOR BEAGLES:

An extensive Report of the Field Trial Council for Beagles was presented to the Board and outlined a number of proposals for change in existing rules.

The Board moved through a point by point consideration of the recommendations and concurrence was granted all proposed changes.

It was ordered by the Board that the proposed changes be published in Dogs in Canada and Membership comments solicited.

FIELD TRIALS—FOXHOUNDS:

A Report of the Field Trial Council for Foxhounds dated March 15, 1973 was read by the Committee Chairman and noted activity on a moderate scale in some of the local Clubs; however, there still appears to be a shortage of healthy Foxes.

The Board received the Report as information.

AFFILIATION OF CLUBS:

A letter dated March 20, 1973 from the Chairman of the Committee on Affiliation of Clubs was read to the Board having been tabled by an earlier motion of the Meeting.

The letter was received as information and the decision made that a new Committee be set up to inquire into this area of the Club's concern.

REPORT OF THE TRACKING TEST COUNCIL:

The Chairman of the Tracking Test Council presented to the Board his report dated March 22, 1973 and noted that Tracking activity has not increased by any significant amount and any upward trend will be of a slow nature; however, all facets are well in hand.

The Report was received by the Board as information.

GOOD AND WELFARE—RELATED MATTERS:

Board attention then turned to the services rendered by The Canadian Kennel Club Staff at both office locations during the course of this Annual Meeting of the Board, and the Annual General Meeting, and the general agreement that an expression of recognition and thanks would be in order to the people who man the daily operations of The Canadian Kennel Club. The Secretary was instructed that Congratulations be communicated to all Members of the Staff both at 111 Eglinton Avenue and 2 Eva Road on the tremendous improvement noted and the extreme satisfaction with the progress being made.

CONCLUSION:

A Member of the Board thanked Mrs. Hilda F. Pugh, Chairman, for her handling of the Annual Meeting of the Board and the Annual General Meeting.

A second Member of the Board stated that he had wished to extend his thanks to the President in both of these matters, however, the other Gentlemen had ably expressed his feelings in the matter and therefore he would wish our President well in her forthcoming trip to England and remarked in making the trip that Mrs. Pugh was acting as an Ambassador both for The Canadian Kennel Club and for Canada, and that in his mind there could not be a better choice.

The Chairman thanked both Gentlemen for their remarks.

The Annual Meeting of the Board for 1973 adjourned April 5, 1973.

NOTICE**PROPOSED NEW STANDARD FOR THE DALMATIAN**

A proposed new standard for the Dalmatian is published hereunder. This proposed new standard will be considered by the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club. Persons and clubs having an interest in the proposed standard are invited to submit their comments for the consideration of the Breed Standards Committee and the Board of Directors, all such letters to be addressed to: The Secretary, The Canadian Kennel Club, 111 Eglinton Ave. E., Toronto 12, Ontario, so as to be received not later than October 31, 1973. When writing please refer to file 7 R 10.

1. ORIGIN AND PURPOSE—The Dalmatian is thought to be of Central European or Mediterranean origin and is known at least from the middle ages. Because of its affinity for horses and capacity to travel great distances at a steady pace, it came to be used as a dog to run with and guard coaches and was known as a stable dog. Even later, the Dalmatian became popular as a dog to travel with and guard horse drawn fire fighting equipment especially in the United States of America.

2. GENERAL APPEARANCE—The Dalmatian should be a well balanced, strong, muscular and active dog, free from coarseness and lumber; capable of great endurance and speed compatible with its purpose.

3. TEMPERAMENT—A lively, active dog of good demeanour.

4. SIZE—Overall balance is of prime importance and the height of dogs ideally is 22 - 24 inches, bitches 21 - 23 inches.

5. COAT AND COLOUR—The coat should be short, hard, dense and fine, sleek and glossy in appearance, but neither woolly nor silky. The colour and markings are most important. There are two acceptable colours: white with black spots and white with liver spots. The ground colour should be pure white. Black spots should be as deep and rich as possible. Liver spots should be of a colour closer to chocolate than to tan or yellow. The spots should not intermingle, but be as round and well defined as possible, the more distinct the better; in size they should be from that of a dime to a half dollar. The spots on the face, head, ears, legs, tail and extremities should be smaller than those on the body.

6. HEAD—Should be of a fair length exhibiting a moderate amount of stop, and not in one straight line from the nose to the occiput bone.

a) **SKULL**—Flat, rather broad between the ears and moderately well defined at the temple. It should be entirely free from wrinkle.

b) **MUZZLE**—Should be long and powerful, never "snipey"; the lips clean, fitting the jaws moderately close.

c) **NOSE**—In the black-spotted dogs, should always be black; in the liver-spotted dogs, always brown.

d) **MOUTH**—The teeth should meet in a scissors bite. The incisors of the lower jaw should touch very lightly the bottom of the inner surface of the upper incisors.

e) **EYES**—Should be set moderately well apart, and of medium size, round, bright and sparkling, with an intelligent expression, their colour greatly depending on the markings of the dog. In the black-spotted dogs, the eyes should be dark (black or brown); in the liver-spotted dogs, they should be lighter (amber or light brown). Blue or partly blue eyes are undesirable and should be penalised.

The rim around the eyes in the black-spotted dogs should be black; brown in the liver-spotted dogs. No dog should have flesh-coloured eye rims.

f) **EARS**—Should be set on rather high, of moderate size, rather wide at the base and gradually tapering to a rounded point. They should be carried close to the head, be thin and fine in texture, and always spotted, the more profusely the better. Solid black or liver is undesirable.

7. **NECK**—The neck should be fairly long, nicely arched, light and tapering and entirely free from throatiness.

8. FOREQUARTERS

a) **SHOULDER**—Should be well-laid, not straight, and should be clean and muscular denoting speed. It should be laid flat against the body.

b) **LEG**—The forelegs should be perfectly straight, strong and heavy in bone; elbows close to the body.

c) **PASTERNS**—Pasterns should be straight.

d) **FEET**—Forefeet should be compact, with well-arched toes, and tough elastic pads. Nails in the black-spotted dogs should be black or white; or a nail may be both black and white; in the liver-spotted dogs, brown or white; or a nail may be both brown and white.

9. BODY

a) **TOPLINE**—Should be level and may arch slightly over the loin.

b) **CHEST**—Should not be too wide, but very deep and capacious, ribs moderately well sprung, never rounded like barrel hoops (which would indicate want of speed).

c) **LOIN**—Should be strong and muscular.

10. HINDQUARTERS

a) **UPPER THIGH AND LOWER THIGH** muscles should be clean, powerful and well defined.

b) **HOCKS**—Should be well let down.

c) **STIFLE**—Should be moderately well bent.

d) **FEET**—As for the forefeet.

11. **TAIL**—The tail should reach the hock, being strong at the base and gradually tapering towards the end, free from coarseness. It should not be set on too low down and should be carried with a slight upwards curve but never curled. It should preferably be spotted.

12. **GAIT**—The Dalmatian should have great freedom of movement; a smooth, powerful, rhythmic stride and action with a good reach and drive. Viewed from behind, the hind legs should track the fore with no indication of the body moving at an angle to the point of direction. A short stride and/or a paddling action are incorrect.

13. FAULTS

Partly flesh coloured nose.

Cow hocks.

Flat feet.

Incompletely coloured eyerims.

Any eye colour other than black, brown or amber.

14. **DISQUALIFICATIONS**—Patches, a patch is defined as a solid sharply defined mass of black or liver that is appreciably larger than any other of the markings on the dog. Several spots that are so adjacent that they actually touch one another at their edges do not constitute a patch.

Tri-colours.

Any colour other than liver and white.
