# Editorial

# What's wrong with obedience?

This is an odd way, to be sure, of headlining an editorial that should be singing the praises of obedience training and its benefits. No doubt the positive aspects are legion. However, to quote 'Mehitabel', Don Marquis' unforgettable alley cat, nothing in this world is all assets and no liabilities. And obedience does have its liabilities. For example, let's think of those trials that are held in conjunction with a championship show and where the two rings, obedience and conformation, are adjacent. Both are in operation. Just as the handlers in the breed ring get their exhibits posed for the judge's examination, a great roar goes up next door - DOWN - shout a dozen handlers. Now, while the obedience dogs, through long weeks of training, have become conditioned to shouting, the breed dogs have not. Some of them bark back. The more timid drop tails between the legs and try to head for the ring exit. It takes a few pats and kind words to settle things down. Then, just as order has been restored, along comes the second command - STAY - shout the handlers, loud enough to get the needle spinning on a decibel meter.

In all conscience, is this racket necessary? Dog psychologists tell us that most dogs can hear sounds at 75 feet a human cannot hear at 17 feet. Should not obedience be putting this knowledge to work? Or are all obedience dogs hard of hearing?


Another sidelight to the obedience trial that goes over like a lead balloon with spectators and breed exhibitors alike are the handlers who take their frustrations out on dogs that 'goof' an exercise. Obedience people teach that timing is the key to effective training. A dog remembers the last thing he did. Not the second-to-last nor the exercise he failed five minutes before. So the last thing the animal does is to be led from the ring, dragged off to a corner. For that his handler hits him? The dog scene would be a sorry one

indeed if all the non-winners received a similar treatment.

And then there are the 'conditioned' performers. These are the dogs who are trained to behave themselves as long as they are on the rubber mats. But once outside the ring, look out! You can usually see one or two of these dogs at every trial being led towards the ring, the handler's fist tightly clamped around the muzzle lest the beast snap at a passing stranger.

Another long-standing criticism has to do with a form of inverse snobbery. Some dogs are taken into the ring looking like cross-bred 'whatizits'. They have brains, therefore they don't need grooming seems to be the attitude. Maybe not. But it certainly would help to smarten up the appearance of the obedience trial if all dogs were presented in a cleanly groomed condition. The trial is always the attention-getter that draws the largest gallery of spectators.

This is but a sampling of the type of criticism one hears of the obedience trial. And perhaps in asking "what's wrong with obedience" we've answered our own question. There's nothing wrong with it. As a sport it has much to commend it. But some of the people who play it could use a bit of help.

# Cover story

Since its inception, the name Nepachee (registered 1961) has meant, to most people, Samoyeds and obedience. This is the Obedience Issue and we have a Samoyed on the cover, so I would like to pay tribute to the working Samoyeds of Nepachee, past and present.

Our cover dog is Ch. Gol'Chikha of Nepachee CD, who exemplifies the type of Samoyed that we try to breed. Chikha is a show dog, with eight group placings to his credit, including a first, earned in limited showing; an obedience dog with two High Scores in Trial, (199.5 and 199); a very strong part of our winning three-dog racing team; a winner of a weight-pull contest (20 entries) the first time he tried it.

To date, 17 CD titles have been earned by Nepachee-owned dogs, 11 of whom were Samoyeds, five CDX titles, three of whom were Samoyeds, one Utility — a Samoyed

Outstanding workers, in addition to Chikha, have been his aunt, Silk Tassel of No. pachee CDX, who has been Top Samoved in Obedience twice - in 1974 when she was also 8th in the Working Group and in 1978 (although shown only one weekend) at the age of 71/2 years. In her career, Talley has had three High Scores in Trial, two in Novice and one in Open. Her sire, and grandsire of Chikha, Ch. & O.T. Ch. Nepachee's Snowdrifter (Rowdy) earned two High Scores in Trial, both in one day (199 and 197%) in Novice. Rowdy was lead dog on our team until his death four years ago. Rowdy's half sister, Nepachee's Nascapi CDX, won two High Scores in Trial, one in Novice and one in Open. Of interest is the fact that this line comes directly from Ch. (Can. & Am.) Baid Lucky Dee, imported by me from California in 1954 (pre Nepachee days) through his daughter Ch. Tragana's Snow Princess CD. owned by us and dam of Rowdy. Ch. Reales Darby Knowlton CD also won a High in Trial on his way to his CD title.

Thirteen champions have been finished over the years, eight of whom were Samoyeds. We are especially proud of Ch. Chiendor's Nepachee Avenger, who finished his championship in 1978 at ten months of agwith a Group 1st to his credit, two Bes Puppy in Group, and four Best of Breed. He also had a major in the U.S. at eight months of age. Watch for this grandson of Chikhain the obedience ring and as a Special when he matures. He has already had one season in harness.





# A look at obedience: its trials, tears, cheers and tribulations

he initial purpose of obedience training is to turn a dog into a well-behaved companion. Like children, a dog requires schooling, guidance and understanding. A well-trained dog makes a far better pet and is a greater source of pride than an annoying and unruly creature whose behaviour necessitates continual scoldings.

Enrolment in a reputable dog training club's classes is a good way of learning how to teach a pet both obedience and plain old manners. There are many fine schools with well-qualified trainers who are able to cope with any difficulties — both human and canine — which might be encountered. Some even have classes for young pups of three to six months where basics are taught with gentle, understanding methods and the youngsters can become socialized.

I sincerely wish that all training schools in Canada could be governed by the CKC and the trainers approved by that club. There are far too many classes run by self-appointed trainers who lack knowledge and experience.

When accessibility to a good training 8 school is impossible, then a good book on methods of training is the alternate solution. There are a number of excellent ones on the market. An updated new edition of the Complete Book of Dog Obedience by the late Blanche Saunders has just been released by Howell Book House. The author was one of the greatest authorities on dog obedience and helped to get obedience work started in the U.S. For over 30 years, she conducted thousands of dog training classes, held training exhibitions, originated obedience clinics and still found time to be both judge and writer.

An item in an obedience magazine recently announced a brochure called "Welcome Home, Puppy," which was created by the Mound City Obedience Training Club of St. Louis, Mo. Club members realized that many behaviour problems are caused by the improper handling of a new pup. This practical brochure deals with reinforcing good habits and discouraging undesirable behaviour—all done with lots of love, praise and constructive discipline. A public service project of the club, the brochure is available at cost—four cents each—from Mrs. S. Ganz, 20 Steeplehill Lane, Ballwin, Mo 63011.

From obedience training to obedience trial

is a step attempted by more and more people. An AKC regulation book defines the purpose of obedience trials as a demonstration of the usefulness of the purebred dog as a companion of man and not merely the dog's ability to follow specific routines in the ring. The basic objective is "to produce dogs that have been trained and conditioned always to behave in the home, in public places and in the presence of other dogs, in a manner that will reflect credit on the sport of obedience."

There's that matter of 'sport.' There are those who continually enter trials with the same high scoring dogs, trying for the top awards, and if this is done in a truly sporting and competitive spirit, that's fine. But dogs, like people, have their 'off' days and there is nothing more annoying than to see a handler scowling with anger when his dog makes a mistake and there's little doubt in some instances that the dog will be corrected with unnecessary harshness when he leaves the trial. These people have no place in the 'sport of obedience trials!

The old idea that obedience training spoils dogs for the show ring has certainly been disproved and now many breed champions hold

obedience titles as well. Obedience training kelps to promote easier handling in the show ing since the dog has been taught to gait on a lose lead, is steadier during examination as Rell as better mannered and more sure of himself, consequently making the exhibitor more confident and at ease.

But even the best trained dogs can decide to ham it up' at times. It happened several years 120 at a trial in New Brunswick. Professional handler Barbara Partridge had brought along a magnificent black Standard Poodle who was a remendous showman and an exciting obedience worker. A group-winning Canadian and American champion, he was competing in the Utility Class in obedience on this particular day and the devil was sparkling in his bright eves. He had already lost points for cutting up but when it came to the Seek Back exercise, he figured it was time to really start having some in. The heeling part was done quite well, the glove dropped, the about turn and halt executednicely and then, on command, he went out like a shot, returning immediately to sit in front of Barbara with the glove. As she was about to take it, he galloped off around the ring -tossing the glove in the air and catching it expertly, finally returning to Barbara - but mly long enough to tease her. Then he was off again, stopping at the far end of the ring in the inglorious position of front legs on the floor and rear end in the air while he proceeded to thew each and every one of the fingers out of that glove!

To the best of my knowledge, the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada was the first on his continent to introduce obedience, although not in the sense that it is presently known. The year after the founding of the club in 1922, the organization drew up rules and regulations for what were then called Field Thals. In 1932, the CKC sanctioned and approved a revised 'Order of Field Trials' for German Shepherds and recognized the title of Field Trial Champion, awarded annually to betop scoring dog in the Service Dog Class at the club's annual field trial.

Four years later, the American Kennel Club bok an interest in the sport, issued a more implified set of requirements and allowed all breeds to participate.

The G.S.D.C. of Canada provided three classes for competition — each one far more temanding than present day obedience reguations. The Puppy Class was composed of time tests while the Companion Dog Class was nade up of 13 tests including scenting or reracking. The Service Dog Class required the German Shepherds to pass 18 rough tests such strailing free with cross trails, signal work,



retrieving a five-pound dumbbell over a sixfoot-high obstacle and water work. In the latter test, a leather, child-sized dummy was placed in water and the dog expected to swim out and retrieve it. In one outstanding instance, the dummy was taken out into Lake Ontario for Ch. Gai Cherie of Northmere to retrieve. She battled rough waters to reach the dummy and had started to swim ashore with it when she was suddenly caught up in a very strong undertow. Though her owner, the late Alex Gooderham, shouted to her to drop the dummy and return, she struggled valiantly on with her burden until she reached the shoreline and collapsed. Alex waded into the water with tears streaming down his cheeks and carried her the rest of the way to shore where she gradually regained her strength.

In time, owners of other breeds became interested in obedience and the CKC drew up rules and regulations governing obedience trials for all purebred dogs in 1940. Gradually, the field trials for German Shepherds dissipated. For a long time, the G.S.D.C. of Canada conducted all breed obedience training at the Fort York Armouries in Toronto but eventually lost the use of the location.

In the latter part of the 1950s, this club organized the most imaginative and unique demonstration team that it has ever been my privilege to watch. It was composed solely of Shepherds and their handlers who gave many memorable performances. Tessa, a bitch, caught two balls at the same time, crawled on command, jumped over the arms, legs and back of a team member and balanced a piece of steak on her nose first before retrieving it to her owner, Ingrid Wauro. At a signal from Ann Peacock, the female Sheba went up through a tunnel, crossed a 12-foot ladder, caught a ball and retraced her route to deliver the ball to Ann. Kim, Shadow and Rory, owned by Andy Neilsen, Warren Parkinson and George Low, were all adept at scaling nine-foot walls. Paul Hudson's Kip would walk between platforms on two swaying inch-thick ropes. Mitzi Frohle's dog entertained with feats of scent discrimination while George Lucas' Ch. Pilot of Sandorea could retrieve balloons and raw eggs intact.

When all breed obedience trials first began in Canada, there were no approved judges as such and those who had been active in obedience training took on these tasks. Though rules and regulations had been drawn up by the CKC in 1940, they weren't well defined and interpretations were very often guesswork. I was one of those old timers and I believe that I am the only one of the 'originals' still officiating at regulation obedience trials.

Back then, there was nothing in the rules which specified that the three different articles retained by the handler to be used in Scent Discrimination in the Utility Class must be kept on the table until they were picked up by the handler. Nor was mention made that each must remain in sight until placed among the 12 other articles by the judge. There was one elderly, rather buxom lady who always wore a muumuu type of dress, gathered at the waist by a tight belt. She was a breeder of Welsh Corgis and a great obedience enthusiast. This dear old soul would simply drop all three articles down the front of her dress and then, as they were required, she would plunge hand and arm into the neckline of her gown and probe for the proper article lodged someplace amidships.

Assistance and guidance were badly needed by many obedience clubs and the showgiving clubs that were sponsoring trials. The Obedience Association (Ontario) was formed in 1953 to meet that need. One of the goals was on to have more uniformity and consistency in judging and they held classes for prospective judges. It was found that in scoring, some judges might only deduct 1/2 a point for an infraction while another judge might fail the dog for the same error. A vast amount of work and study resulted in a 'penalty guide' which the CKC approved for use. Classes for ring stewards were also held and the association supplied capable stewards for any clubs requesting them.

Because of the rapidly growing interest in obedience, the CKC set up a Standing Committee for obedience in '53, followed by an Obedience Council in 1957. I had the honour of being the first Chairman. All obedience matters were, and still are, forwarded to the council by the CKC so that it might return recommendations and sometimes decisions to the club. Obedience representatives are appointed by the CKC board to attend and report on trials in their local areas.

Since this was initiated, the marked improvement in obedience trials has been very obvious. Prior to 1954, almost anyone with a knowledge of obedience was permitted to judge, but this was altered shortly afterward and now applicants must pass both oral tests and written examinations. In addition, the aspiring judge must have trained and handled at least one dog through the particular degrees he or she hopes to judge. Three observers watch the new judge at his first regulation trial and report on his scoring, ring procedure, conduct and other relevant matters. Finally, even fully approved judges may have their approval withdrawn if a sufficient number of complaints are upheld.

The most thorough training still can't prepare a judge for some of the oddball occurrences that happen in the obedience ring. While judging a Novice Class at a trial near Simcoe, Ont., I was confronted with a very nervous Chihuahua. As I approached her in the Stand for Examination exercise, she flew out to the end of the lead. Though she failed the exercise, I thought that if I might pat the little dog and reassure her, it might give her more confidence in her next trial. As I gently put out my hand, she quickly lashed out at me and sank her teeth in my chin. In a most sincere and apologetic manner, the shaken owner stammered, "Oh, Mrs. Southcott, I'm so sorry she bit you! Can I take you to the veterinarian?

At a trial held in conjunction with an Oakville, Ont., dog show, the rings were separated by yellow picket fencing which was raised about six inches above the floor. In the ring adjacent to the one in which I was officiating, a large Specials Class of American Cocker Spaniels were set up for the final decision. A fast, topnotch Weimaraner had progressed to the Retrieve on Flat exercise in the Open Obedience Class. The thrown dumbbell bounced to a standstill at the far end of the ring. On command, the grey dog sprinted to the retrieve, but his paw nicked it and the dumbbell slid under the fence into the next ring and came to rest beneath one of the posed Cockers. Without hesitation, the Weimaraner leaped

the fence, tucked his nose under the surprised



spaniel and tossed him aside. Then grabbing the dumbbell, he returned over the fence to give an otherwise flawless performance while leaving the Cocker crew in pandemonium.

Another incident concerns a little Cairn Terrier whom I bred and sold to a lady who took him through obedience. Toby enjoyed it immensely and always did well. On this occasion, I was judging Open Classes at an outdoor trial at Oshawa, Ont., and the dogs, Toby included, were in the midst of the Long Down. At the same time, Jake Giacomelli was doing Novice Class in the next ring, judging the only other Cairn entered that day. In the midst of the Heel Free, this little Cairn stopped, stared over at the group of 'downed' dogs, then bolted out of his ring. He ran directly over to poor, unsuspecting Toby and lifted his leg. Despite the distasteful innundation, Toby didn't budge. That was one time when I wish it was possible to add points to a score!

One of the more heartwarming sights in the obedience ring is the number of handicapped competitors who participate. Among the many I have judged in all the classes, ALL showed love and a close affinity towards their dogs — win or lose — and were always good sports. Many have taken their dogs through all degrees and some have been in the top placings. The Obedience Victrix at the huge German Shepherd Dog Club of America National specialities last year in Kansas City was a lovely seven-year-old bitch handled by Tom Sherman of Illinois who is a paraplegic in a wheelchair. The rules for this award call for a

blue ribbon in conformation plus the highest combined score in Open and Utility Classes, both of which must be scores of 190 or better.

Handicapped handlers may enter any of the regular obedience classes, but they are required to perform all parts of all exercises as described in the rules and are scored the same as any other participant. The handicapped who compete in obedience trials have a feeling of confidence, pride, an optimistic attitude and a sense of accomplishment.

Obedience trial regulations differ from country to country. Though quite similar in content, there are still a few differences between trials in the U.S. and Canada. Recently, the CKC has made a few changes which coincide with AKC rules but it still retains a number of its own regulations. For example, eligibility for entering and handling in the Novice and Open Classes varies somewhat and anyone intending to compete in both countries should study each of the rule books carefully.

As of the first of this year, the CKC requires that all measurements in the obedience ring must be made in the metric system.

I disagree intensely with the AKC rulethata minimum of six dogs competing in the Novice or Open Classes and three competing in Utility are necessary for any dog to be credited with leg on these degrees, regardless of how high the score. Thankfully, the CKC does not have this regulation.

Another AKC ruling which rankles is the matter of awarding the title of Obedience Trial Champion. In Canada, any dog which has

There are other minor differences such as the Stand for Examination being done 'on lead' in Canada and 'off lead' in the U.S. And the AKC demands that a dog must sit in front of the handler close enough for the handler to take a dumbbell from him without having to stretch. The CKC allows the handler to stretch forward as long as he doesn't move his feet.

Tracking is a separate entity in obedience but certainly extremely rewarding. Canada hastwoofficial tracking tests, that of Tracking Dog (TD) and Tracking Dog Excellent (TDX). A dog does not have to first acquire any other obedience degrees before competing in tracking though he must be certified officially that he is capable of performing the test. There is a non-profit organization in the U.S. called SARDA (Search and Rescue Dog

Association) which has branches in various parts of the country. They are always on call in cases of emergency or disaster and tracking dog and handler teams travel all over to locate disaster victims, missing persons or escaped criminals.

Another aspect of advanced obedience work is evidenced by the Schutzhund clubs. A Schutzhund dog is one that clearly demonstrates total working ability in tracking, obedience and protection work — a highly trained animal, sound and controlled, a perfect member of the family and a better canine citizen. Though this type of training originated in Germany, there are now numerous Schutzhund clubs in the U.S. and Canada and trials are held in both countries.

An off-shoot of advanced obedience work is the exciting sport called Scent Hurdle Racing which is gathering momentum in popularity. Four-dog teams compete against each other in clearing a series of hurdles and retrieving. Unlike regular obedience trials, handlers and spectators alike can vocally encourage the dogs. The sport originated in the U.S. but this activity is catching on in

Canada and numerous clubs have trained teams.

Obedience training takes so many different forms that it's difficult to find a fitting description that suits all. But the magazine of the Dog Training Club of Bermuda defined it by saying

#### Obedience is:

Finding out just how much patience you really have;

Trying to explain to your child's teacher that you cannot attend PTA meetings because you have to go to dog school;

Learning that you can hold your breath for three minutes during the Long Downs;


Griping because you have to get up at 6 a.m. on weekdays to go to work and then getting up at 5 a.m. Sunday to drive to a dog show:

Realizing that your dog enjoys watching you pick up the dumbbell for him;

Leaving your dog for the Recall and hearing the patter of little paws behind you;

Standing at the ring entrance and wondering why you keep putting yourself through this agony;

Worth every minute of it.



# Intelligence versus trainability

If you think the two go together, you're wrong

t is not until you own an intelligent dog that you realize the vast difference between trainability and intelligence. All breeds have some degree of breed intelligence or characteristics, even if it is demonstrated only by the dog putting his nose to the ground and following a scent until he is lost, as used to happen to a Beagle we once owned. Granted this does not show a very high degree of intelligence but it did show he was a hound and could follow a scent, a breed trait.

Some breeds are more trainable by the average obedience buff than others, because of their natural breed characteristics. However, all good obedience dogs should be blessed with a desire and willingness to please. Somehow, the whole exercise seems misguided if the dog is slinking round the ring doing what he has to but doing it reluctantly. Poodles and Shetland Sheepdogs are noted for their trainability, not to be mistaken for intelligence. I have known many a timid Sheltie or poodle who began their obedience career to

prepare them for conformation, and went on to garner several titles.

Intelligence can be demonstrated by the antics of our aged Sheltie, Ch. Sovereign Bonfire (Flame). In her retirement years, her greatest interest was her food and she knew that prior to our dinner hour a pail of food for the puppies was put to soak in the basement. The door to the basement was visible from the dining room. The latch was shallow and with a push the door could be opened, but we would hear the click and check that Flame had not gone downstairs. However, Flame used her intelligence to advantage in her career of crime, and won out as many times as she failed. Flame would sleep on the carpet while we had dinner. When she was not noticed she would gently bunt the door to unlatch it, then lie back where she was sleeping. If we heard this gentle bunt, and shut the door again, she knew she would succeed the next time. If, however, we had not heard the bunt she would quietly push the door open enough to allow her to go down to the food. When we would notice the open basement door, Flame had already accomplished her task. That is intelligence

Dogs who have shown valour during fires and water accidents are intelligent dogs. Dogs who do not respond to commands when another action is indicated are demonstrating intelligence. A collie, sold when an adult, was in his new home only a week when he drove his mistress wild running around and around in a circle, barking all the while. Not responding to her orders to be quiet, she approached him with the broom to do some training on the spot, only to find her young daughter had fallen through an abandoned well. The child was rescued by firemen — thanks to a dog's intelligence.

The intelligent dog without the desire to please can also be untrainable. He has a mind of his own, knows what you want of him but refuses to submit to your wishes. It would seem that the willingness to please is of major consideration in choosing the obedience pup.

William Campbell, behaviourist specialist, has developed a puppy behaviour test that should be beneficial to those selecting a puppy for obedience.

1

First is the Social Attraction test, where, upon entering the test area the pup is placed in the centre of the area. Step away from the pup in the direction opposite the door or gate by which you entered. How readily the pup comes to you when you kneel down and gently clap your hands, reveals his degree of social attraction, confidence or social independence.

2

Second is Following. Starting from a position next to the pup, walk away in a normal manner. How readily the pup follows you reveals its degree of following attraction.

3

Third is Restraint. Crouch down and gently roll the pup onto its back, holding it, with one hand on the chest, for 30 seconds. How fiercely the pup objects to this or how readily it accepts this position indicates the degree of dominant or submissive tendency relative to social/physical domination. 4

Fourth is Social Dominance. Gently stroke the pup from the top of its head, along the neck and back. Whether or not the pup accepts this indicates its degree of acceptance of your social dominance or lack of it.

5

Fifth is Elevation Dominance. Bendover and cradle the pup under its belly, fingers interlaced and palms up, and elevate it justoff the ground. Hold it there for 30 seconds. This places the pup in a position of having absolutely no control at all, and the tester is in total control. How readily it does or does not accept this situation indicates the degree to which it accepts your dominance.

A test of my own with a puppy, whether for obedience or conformation, that indicates that all important desire to please, is to roll a small ball and value the puppy who will retrieve and bring it to you, giving it up readily. These seem to be the responsive, unselfish dogs that succeed in just about every phase of dogdom.

# obedience in review

For the thirteenth year obedience enthusiasts are treated to a comprehensive analysis of obedience activities. We are grateful to Mrs. Betty McHugh, and her assistant Caroline Shelley, for compiling these statistics.

e are pleased to present the top winning obedience dogs for 1978. Points are awarded every time a dog earns a qualifying score in either Open or Utility Classes, as these are the only classes in which a dog should be campaigned. Points were kept on a cumulative basis fortrials from January 1 to December 31, 1978, as reported in the Obedience Trials results appearing in the 'Yellow Pages' of Dogs in Canada.

Top Obedience Dog was won easily by last year's second placing dog, O.T. Ch. Promise's Bonnie Meg, Miniature Poodle owned and handled by Marjorie Parkinson of Toronto. Meg and Marjorie earned a total of 457 points, a new all-time high. Qualifying scores were posted in Open B and Utility Classes 79 times, earning 15 High Scoring Dog in Trial.

Second is the familiar Golden Retriever 0.T. Ch. Shadywell Mister Rip, owned by Clinton and Vera McEvoy of Ottawa, handled by Clinton. Rip earned a total of 375 points in the Open B and Utility Classes, posting 68 qualifying scores and earning five High Scores in Trial. The McEvoys also own Golden Retriever Shadywell MacRory CDX, who tied for ninth place with a total of 90 points.

Moving up from fourth place in 1977 to third this year is the Yorkshire Terrier O.T. Ch. Barbway's Marquis MacDuff, owned by Mrs. Laurie Mahood of Masset, B.C. This little fellow earned a total of 292 points, in

Open B and Utility, posting 54 qualifying scores and a total of five High in Trial.

From the Working Group is the Shetland Sheepdog, O.T. Ch. Bi-X-Elle, in fourth place. Owned by D. Bradley, Port Coquitlam, B.C., he earned his 210 points from the Open B and Utility Classes, posting 38 qualifying scores and five High Scores in Trial. The Cardigan Welsh Corgi, O.T. Ch. & Ch. Denbigh Commander Whitehead, owned by M.R. Graham of Victoria, B.C., is in fifth place with 166 points earned in Open B and Utility Classes. Qualifying scores were posted 32 times, and three High Scores in Trial were awarded to this little dog.

In sixth place is a nice working Labrador Retriever who earned ten High Scores in Trial in Open B and Utility Classes, Ch. Wimberway the Zealous Wendy CDX, owned by John Downton, Goulds, Nfld. Qualifying scores were posted 25 times.

In seventh place is another Golden Retriever, Lorkendale's Saffron Lady CDX, owned by David Skinner of Ottawa. This pair earned a total of 106 points in the Open and Utility Classes, posting 18 qualifying scores and earning one High in Trial.

The Airedale Terrier, Lukar Bengal Mac-Canna, owned by Martin McCann, Dundas, Ont., is in eighth place with a total of 94 points earned in the Open Classes, posting 17 qualifying scores and earning one High Score in Trial

Tied for ninth place is the Doberman Pinscher O.T. Ch. Bonnie Black Baker owned and handled by Mrs. Rita Valiquette of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., with 90 points earned in the Open B and Utility Classes, posting qualifying scores 16 times with one High Score in Trial.

In tenth place is the Standard Poodle Torbec Bartender of Topknot CDX, owned by Mrs. Joan Coyle, Bolton, Ont. His 83 points were earned in the Open B Class, posting 16 qualifying scores.

Once again, the Working Group had more than half of the Qualifying Scores posted in 1978, as seen by the following figures:



# Well-planned kennel

By Alice Bixler

arridale Reg'd is the split-level kennel that houses a happy horde of West Highland White Terriers. The kennel quarters are part of Harriet Sherman's home on the outskirts of Brampton, Ont., and reflect her careful planning as well as the clever solution to a perplexing problem.

The problem? The room that was to become the inside kenneling is part of the basement and is two thirds underground. Outdoor runs would be at ground level. So how does one get the dogs down one floor from outside to inside? Simple. Harriet just raised the basement floor.



August 1979

A wooden base, approximately three feet high, was constructed along the outer wall for 24 feet of the 30 ft.-long room. Six 4x6 galvanized steel Pan-L Pens sit atop the platform.

"It took the flooring company two
weeks to prepare the surface," says
Harriet. They applied coat after coat of
special surfacing compounds to seal the

wood and to make the base impervious to stains or odours.

A drain which empties into the septic tank runs the length of the platform just below the front of the pens. The platform top slants gently toward the drain for easy scrubbing down.

Extending from the front of the platform is a wide ledge about half its height which

doubles as a seat or a step down for the short-legged Westies.


From the platform top to the ceiling is just over five feet — enough height to allow Harriet to stand up when cleaning the pens. Just below the ceiling are six spring-mounted doors — one per pen—which open at ground level into six 4x20 feet Pan-L Pen runs set on a concrete base








Outside, the doors are protected by wooden, three-sided affairs that keep them from being blocked by snow and ice in winter and also double as shelters from wind, rain or searing sun. The doors are opened from the inside with rope and pulley arrangements and the Westies scury down rubber-matted ramps into their respective pens.



They also scurry back up the ramps to peer over the top of the two-ft. high solid metal dividers between the pens and check out the activity in the adjoining areas.



At the far end of the room, Harridale Poppyzeb
Jonathan, future specialty winner, is the lone
occupant of the floor-level puppy pen. Tiny
but totally fearless, ten-week-old Jonathan —
Harriet's West Highland White Hope — can
barely peer over the high entrance to the corner pen.
The kennel room is brightly lighted with fluorescent
fixtures. A tap on the inside wall provides
hot and cold water and there are plans to add a
utilitarian sink. The room is warmed by
electrical baseboard heaters in cold weather
but a built-in fan is all that's needed to keep
things comfortable on the hottest days.





 a. Only if a Club had previously been granted permission to hold a championship or licensed event under CKC rules would permission be granted to hold such an event.

b. If a Club had been granted permission to hold a sanction show or trial then it may be granted permission to again hold such an event.

c. If the Club had not held any event under CKC rules, then permission

would not be granted to hold any event.

d. The policies as set out above would no longer be effective when a Club had obtained registration of its title and thereafter it may apply and a decision would then be reached on whether or not its application would be approved.

It was agreed that the foregoing represented the correct interpretation of the Board's intention when adopting Motion #127-3-79

At the Meeting of the Board of Directors held June 16th, 1979, the Junior Kennel Club Committee submitted the following proposed Junior Kennel Citio Committee Submittee and Interesting Proposed Regulations Governing Junior Handling Competitions. Rules on Judging of Junior Handling Competitions. Judging of Junior Kennel Club Obedience Handling Competitions, and Suggested Rules on the Formation and Operation of Junior Kennel Clubs. These proposals are set out in detail hereunder.

All interested persons and clubs are invited to submit comments with regard to these proposals. Letters of comment are to be addressed to the Secretary-Treasurer, The Canadian Kennel Club. 2150 Bloor Street West, Toronto, Ontario, M6S 4V7, so as to be received not later than November 30th, 1979.

Please note: Group petitions will not be considered.

#### REGULATIONS GOVERNING JUNIOR HANDLING COM.

(1) The junior handling rules as set forth in this booklet apply to competitions held within each zone. The zones shall consist of the same areas as set out in the CKC point system, as stated in 1978 Rule Book.

(2) Any club that is approved to hold a licensed all-breed point show or obedience trial may also hold a Junior Handling event with each show or

trial

(3) Selection of judges for these events will be the responsibility of the Kennel Club sponsoring the show and/or trial; any person would be eligible to judge if the club so invites them, providing he/she is in good standing with the C.K.C., and should be familiar with all aspects of Junior Handling.

(4) The regular Junior Handling Classes shall be as follows:

NOVICE JUNIOR - For boys and girls who have reached their eighth birthday

but not yet attained the age of twelve, and who have not won a total of three first place in this class under three different judges.

INTERMEDIATE — For boys and girls who have reached their twelfth birthday but not yet attained the age of lifteen, and who have not won a total of three first place in this class under three different judges

SENIOR - For boys and girls who have reached their fifteenth birthday but not yet attained the age of seventeen, and who have not won a total of three first place in this class under three different judges.

JUNIOR — For boys and girls who have reached their eighth birthday but not yet attained the age of twelve and who have won a total of three different judges in Novice.

first placings under three different judges in Novice.

INTERMEDIATE — For boys and girls who have reached their twelfth birthday but not yet attained the age of fifteen and who have won a total of three first placings under three different judges in Novice.

SENIOR - For boys and girls who have reached their fifteenth birthday but not yet attained the age of seventeen and who have won a total of three first placings under three different judges in Novice. Best Handler shall be chosen from all of the first place winners in each of the abovementioned six classes.

(5) Points will be awarded for each event as follows: 1st place - five points, 2nd place - four points, 3rd place - three points, 4th place - two

points. Best Handler to receive ten additional points.
(6) The Junior Handlers shall use the armband numbers that the dog has been assigned by show giving club as appears on the entry form and

catalogue.
(7) A Club that has decided to offer Junior Handling must list the event in its premium list, with a description of the classes requirements, and a full judging list. Judging schedules are to be received by all Junior Handlers. The time for Junior Handling judging shall not coincide with any all-breed or trial judging. There must be sufficient space on an all-breed entry form to include name, birthdate, address, dog's name, and class

(8) To be acceptable each official CKC entry form must be completed in full and reach the show secretary no later than the closing date of the corresponding show and/or trial. Entries received later than the closing date will not be acceptable.

(9) The Competitor's fee will be set at the discretion of the Show Giving Club, with the CKC assessing the Show Giving Club \$1.00 per Junior Handler entered which will finance the National Competition, including one competitor from each zone, their chaperone, and the dog they will be handling in the National Competition.

(10) It shall be the responsibility of the dog show representative, or their appointee, who could be a Junior Dog Show representative, to see that the Junior Handling Competitions are run according to the rules. All Junior Handling could be controlled to the CKC Junior Handling results, for every event, must be submitted to the CKC with the official judging sheets. The results will be published in official CKC publication CKC published in official sheets. CKC publication following each show and/or trial with which the Junior Handling event was held in conjunction with the Show. The Show secretary will post one copy of judging sheet in appropriate location following the completion of each day's Junior Handling Competition.

(11) The ribbons awarded in all competitions should be as follows: Ist place — Light Blue; 2nd place — Maroon; 3rd place — Spring Green; 4th place — Brown.

(12) A Junior Handler shall only be eligible to compete in the Zone in

which he/she resides. A win in another Zone shall not count.

(15) If a person becomes the Top Junior Handler of a Zone but before the National Competition is held that person reaches his/her seventeenth

National Competition is field that person reaches his/her seventeenth birthday, he/she will be eligible to compete.

(16) Only the Top Junior Handler from each Zone will be eligible to compete in the National Competition. If there is a tie, the total points of the competitor will be divided by the number of shows entered and the highest score will be declared the winner of that Zone. If the tie still exists, then both competitors would attend the National Competition.

(17) No person competing in the National event will be permitted to compete in any other Junior Handling Competition held the week-end of

the National event.

#### RULES ON THE JUDGING OF JUNIOR HANDLING COM-PETITIONS

(1) The overall impression is most important. The judge should look for a junior handler appropriately dressed, well groomed, who presents his dog in a manner which will show off its particular breed to advantage. He must endeavour to have his dog hold the correct stance for the breed. The conformation of the dog is not to count.

(2) Specific details:

(a) The judge should inspect each posed dog individually, to check that its handler knows how to show a dog at close quarters, its expression and bite for example, but should have to handle the dogs very little. For example, the judge may place a foot incorrectly to see if the handler corrects the fault

(b) The lead should be held in the hand nearest the dog at all times. Customarily the handler enters and circles the ring with his dog on his left and gaits the dog individually on his left.

(c) The dog must be between the handler and the judge at all times. (d) The dog should be moved with smoothness at the correct speed for the breed.

(e) When handlers are moved individually, the same pattern should be followed for each exhibitor. A pattern which requires a lead change from hand to hand, such as the cross-over, is desirable.

(f) As a handler comes out to move his dog individually, he should present his dog to the judge, allowing the dog to pose naturally. After gaiting, the handler should again allow the dog to stand naturally before the judge.

(g) The handler and dog should function as part of a team, unobtrusive but efficient. A handler may encourage his dog, but must be severely penalized for forcible discipling in the ring.

severely penalized for forcible discipline in the ring

(h) The judge must give credit for a handler who has to deal with a difficult dog but is nevertheless handling the problem well. Sometimes the exhibitor who is handling a highly trained dog is appearing to do a good job, when in reality the dog is handling itself. Similarly, a judge should give credit for a handler displaying a bread that is less than a rother. breed that is less glamorous, or requires less posing than another breed, if the handler is still proficient.

(i) The judge may question the handler in reference to the dog's

general anatomy

(j) Four Placings Should Be Made In Each Class

Classes: Novice: Junior Novice: Intermediate Novice: Senior

Open: Junior Open: Intermediate Open: Senior

(k) The judge should look for that extra in the handler's showmanship, the ability to give that feeling of pride in the dog and to show with confidence

(l) When showing his dog in the ring a junior handler chewing gum and talking unnecessarily to other competitors or the judge, is to be penalized.

(m) A junior handler and his dog should not interfere with any other

handler and his dog. Good sportsmanship must be shown.

JUDGING OF JUNIOR KENNEL CLUB OBEDIENCE HANDLING COMPETITIONS

(1) The main emphasis in judging should be placed on handling. The dog should be handled with smoothness and gentleness. Handler and dog should present a team, the handler offering praise and the dog responding by working happily and eagerly. Loud, harsh commands are un-

necessary and must be penalized.
(2) C.K.C. Obedience Trial Rules should be observed, but may be relaxed, especially in the case of beginning trainers, or in the case of trainer and dog working at a high standard and demonstrating com-

petency but failing an exercise.

(3) Classes may be offered at any level suitable for those competing Pre-Novice, Novice, Graduate Novice, Open, Utility, Brace, and TrackSUGGESTED RULES ON THE FORMATION AND OPERATION OF JUNIOR KENNEL CLUBS

(1) A Junior Kennel Club should be sponsored by an All-Breed Club.

(2) Appoint a Committee or Advisor from the Senior Club to help and advise the Juniors.

(3) Membership in a club shall be confined to boys and girls under the age of eighteen years. Each Junior Kennel Club shall elect its own officers annually, namely, President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

(4) Elect a Junior Committee and Junior Officers and Directors with the help of the Senior Committee or Advisor.

The Junior Committee and Junior Officers should go over the by-laws of the parent club and work out by-laws for the Junior Club, or ask for CKC Model Constitution.

(6) Make the membership fee as reasonable as possible.(7) Let the Juniors run their own club and have the adult committee or advisor sit in to advise and work with the Junior members.

(8) Invite all Juniors who are interested in becoming members to a

meeting, and serve refreshments.

meeting, and serve refreshments.

(9) Invite veterinarians, professional dog handlers, ring stewards, active dog breeders. Humane Society official, CKC Director, Conformation and Obedience Judges to give a talk on the field they cover.

(10) Secure many of the films available on the dog world, from dog food manufacturing company, and American Kennel Club. Arrange field trip to dog kennels and veterinary hospitals, and encourage attendance to All-Breed Obedience and Conformation Seminars, etc.

(11) The parent club should invite the Junior Club to accipt at the should

(11) The parent club should invite the Junior Club to assist at the show they hold. It has been proven that the Juniors can get the most ads. do the most work in the shortest time, and have the most endurance throughout the day that will help make the show a success.

(12) The parent club should let the Juniors hold their own Sanction Match, Correction Obedience Match, and seminars.
(13) Junior Kennel Clubs should hold regular educational classes, regu-

lar obedience and conformation handling classes.

(14) General Care Class: For the proper selection of a puppy, the feeding, breeding, grooming, and general first aid.
(15) Ring Steward Class: Build the class around the proper way to

steward a class at a show.

(16) Veterinarian Class: This class will help Juniors who feel they would like to know more about the care of a dog, or who want to become veterinarians.

#### NOTICE

SUBJECT: Recognition of breeds.

The following are the current Requirements for the Recognition of a Breed not Heretofore Recognized by the Club, as revised by the Board of Directors at the Annual Board Meeting in March 1979.

Recognized by the Club, as revised by the Board of Directors at the Annual Board Meeting in March 1979.

1) There must be a minimum of twenty-five dogs of the breed before the Board will consider recognition. The twenty-five applications for submission must be from at least three different provinces, and the Board feels, with advice from the Breed Standards Committee, the registerable specimens are from a wide enough genetic base to ensure future success for the breed; 2) In the case of an imported dog it must be registered in a stud book recognized by the C.K.C. and the importer must be able to furnish documents, issued by such recognized Club, which furnishes all the information required in the case of an imported dog of a breed already recognized by this Club (see Article XXX, Section 2 (3) of the Club's By-Laws.

3) In the case of a dog born in Canada its dam (and sire if imported to Canada) must be registered individually in our records and litter registration in the usual way is required. If the sire is not owned in Canada (dam was bred before export to Canada) then the sire must be a dog which would be eligible for registration had it been imported to Canada, and the owner of the dam must supply, on official documents in the way required by Article XXIX. Section 3 (3), the information necessary, to register the litter.

4) The Board, which is in office at the time of recognition, will decide what breed standard shall be adopted. If it is already a breed recognized by the A.K.C. and the applicant for recognition has no objection, priority may be given the A.K.C. standard; otherwise the Board will consider the standard in effect in the country to which the breed is considered indigenous;

5) The applicant(s) for recognition of the breed will pay a fee of \$100.00 (non-refundable).

6) No breed is to be recognized simply on the grounds that a resident of any other country is anxious to show, at Canadian dog shows, dogs of a breed not yet recognized by the C.K.C.

#### NOTICE TO MEMBERS LATE DELIVERY OF APRIL ISSUE OF "DOGS IN CANADA"

A large number of complaints were received about non-delivery of the April issue of "Dogs in Canada". This matter was investigated and it was confirmed that the C.K.C. was not at fault in that the correct membership information was supplied to the publishers.

From discussions with the publishers it would appear that the problem lay with the Post Office. The matter was raised with the Post Office and although a reply is still awaited, it is of interest that since then members have reported the April issue arriving within a few days of the May issue.

SUBJECT: Proposed amendments to the Dog Show Rules.

At their most recent meeting of June 16th, 1979, the Board of Directors considered proposals on the subject of amendments to the Dog Show

Rules. These proposals are set out in detail hereunder.

All interested persons and clubs are invited to submit comments with regard to these proposals. Letters of comment are to be addressed to the Secretary-Treasurer, The Canadian Kennel Club, 2150 Bloor Street West, Toronto, Ontario M6S 4V7, so as to be received not later than October 31st, 1979.

Please note: Group petitions will not be considered.
(1) IT IS PROPOSED THAT: Chapter 8, SELECTION OF JUDGES, be amended by the addition of the following paragraph to the proposed new Section 6 published in the May issue of Dogs in Canada:

"When a judge is scheduled to judge both conformation classes and obedience classes on the same day the combined total of judging breed classes and obedience classes shall not be for a period of longer than eight hours including a one-hour period for meals. To determine whether the total entries under the judge would exceed that time limitation the determination of how many dogs (either conformation and/or obedience) will have to be transferred to another judge(s) will be determined on the following basis: Allow 2½ minutes for each dog entered for conformation (175 dogs maximum in any event), allow 8½ minutes for each entry in the Open obedience class, and allow 12 minutes for each entry in the Utility obedience class. When the total thus obtained exceeds 420 minutes then sufficient conformation and/or obedience entries must be transferred to another judge(s) in order to reduce the required time of judging to 420 minutes."
(2) IT IS PROPOSED THAT: Chapter 15, PREMIUM LISTS AND

ENTRY FORMS, be amended by the deletion of Section 3 in its entirety.

SECTION 3. At the time of distribution of premium lists to prospective exhibitors the show-giving club shall forward two copies of the premium list and entry forms to The Canadian Kennel Club, and it shall also forward a copy of the premium list and entry form to each member of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club and to each C.K.C. Dog Show Representative located in the province or electoral zone in which the show

(3) IT IS PROPOSED THAT: Chapter 18, THE CATALOGUE, be

SUBJECT: RECOGNITION OF THE AUSTRALIAN CATTLE DOG At its meeting held on May 16, 1979, the Board of Directors approved immediate recognition of the Australian Cattle Dog for purposes of registration

The Board further approved the breed standard for the Australian Cattle Dog as set forth hereunder. This standard is effective January 1. 1980, and specimens of this breed registered in the records of the Canadian Kennel Club, or eligible for such registration, are eligible for entry in shows and obedience trials under C.K.C. rules held on or after January 1, 1980.

The Australian Cattle Dog has been placed in Group III - Working

Standard for the Australian Cattle Dog

ORIGIN AND PURPOSE: The Australian Cattle Dog was developed to ordigin and purpose: The Australian Cattle Dog was developed to assist with the development of the cattle industry in early Australian conditions. The principal requirement was a strong biting dog capable of mustering and moving wild cattle. The long distances to be travelled made it essential that such a dog possess great stamina. Although there is still some disagreement as to the actual breeds used, it is generally thought that the Cattle Dog developed chiefly from cross-breeding a Dingo and the Blue Merle Collie.

GENERAL APPEARANCE: The general appearance is that of a sturdy, compact, symmetrically-built working dog. With the ability and willingness to carry out any task, however strenuous, its combination of substance, power, balance and hard muscular condition to be such that it

nvey the impression of great agility, strength and endurance TEMPERAMENT: The utility purpose is assistance in the control of cattle, in both wide open and confined areas. Ever alert, extremely intelligent, watchful, courageous, and trustworthy. With an implicit devotion to duty, making it an ideal dog, its loyalty and protective instincts make self-appointed guardians to the stockman, his herd, his property, whilst suspicious of strangers, must be amenable to handlinging show ring

SIZE: The desirable height at the withers to be within the following:
Dogs: 18-20 in. (45.72-50.80 cm.)
Bitches: 17-19 in. (43.18-48.26 cm.)

Dogs or bitches over or under these specified sizes are undesirable. Dogs over 20.5 in. (52.07 cm.) or under 17.5 in. (44.45 cm.) and bitches over 19.5 in. (49.53 cm.) or under 16.5 in. (41.91 cm.) are disqualified.

Desirable weight: 33-50 lb. (15-23 kg.)

COAT AND COLOUR: The weather resisting outer coat is moderately short, straight and of medium texture, with short dense undercoat Be hind the quarter, the coat is longer, forming a mild feathering. The tail is furnished sufficiently to form a good brush. The head, forelegs, and hindlegs from hock to ground are coated with short hair. The Australian Cattle Dog should be shown in natural state. The coat is not clipped or

There are two recognized colours in the breed:

BLUE - The colour should be blue or blue mottled with or without other markings. The permissible markings are black, blue, or tan markings on the head, evenly distributed for preference, the forelegs tan midway up the legs, the hindquarters tan on the inside of the hindlegs and inside of the thighs, showing down the front of the stifles and broadening out to the outside of the hindlegs from hock to toes. Tan undercoat is permissible on the body, providing it does not show through the blue outercoat.

The colour should be of good even red speckle all over. including the under coat (not white or cream), with or without darker red

markings on the head. Even head markings are desirable. olid red or solid black markings on the body are not desirable

HEAD: A blunt wedged-shaped head, in balance with other proportions of the dog, and in keeping with its general conformation, is broad of skull, and only slightly curved between the ears. flattening to a slight but definite stop. The cheeks are muscular, but not coarse or prominent. The under jaw is strong, deep and well developed. The foreface is broad and well filled in under the eye, tapering gradually to a medium length, a deep, powerful muzzle. The nose is black irrespective of the colour of the dog. The lips are tight and clean. The teeth should be sound, strong and regularly spaced, gripping with a scissor-like action, the lower incisors close behind and just touching the upper. Undershot or overshot jaw should be disqualified. The eyes to be oval shaped and of medium size. neither prominent nor sunken, and must express alertness and intelligence. A warning or suspicious glint characteristic. Eye colour is brown with a very dark pupil. Yellow eye is disqualified. The ears should be of moderate size, preferably small rather than large; broad at the base, muscular, pricked and moderately pointed (not spoon or bat ears). Ears are set wide apart on the skull, inclined outwards, sensitive in their use and firmly erect. The inside of the ear should be fairly well furnished with

NECK: The neck is of exceptional strength, muscular and of medium length, about 1/2 the length of the body, broadening to blend into the body

free from throatiness

FOREQUARTERS: The shoulders are broad of blade, sloping, muscular and at the point of the withers should be well laid back. The upper arm is well angulated to the shoulders. The lower arm should have strong round bone, extending to the feet. They should be perfectly straight viewed from the front. The pasterns should have no weakness between the feet and lower arm and should show a slight angle with the lower arm when regarded from the side. The feet should be round, toes short, strong, well arched and held close together. The pads are hard and deep and the nails must be short and strong, (cat paws). Dewclaws are found on the front feet only and may be removed.

BODY: The length of the body from point of the breast bone in a straight line to the buttocks is greater than the height of the withers as 10 is to 9. The topline is level, back strong, with ribs well sprung and ribbed back. (not barrel chested). The chest is deep and muscular and moderately broad. The loins are broad, deep and muscular with deep flanks and showing strength joining the fore and hindquarters. The croup is slightly sloping, broad, strong and muscular. The abdomen does not cut up into

HINDQUARTERS: The line from the point of the hip to the point of buttock is rather long and sloping. The upper thigh is long, broad and well developed. The lower thigh is long and well muscled. They should have a moderate bend of stifle.

TAIL: The set of the tail is low. Following the slope of the croup, and at rest, the tail should hang in a slight curve of a length to reach approximately to the hock. During normal movement it may be raised but a gay tail should be severely penalized. The tail is never docked.

GAIT: Soundness is of paramount importance. The action is true, free, supple and tireless. The movement of the shoulders and forelegs, with the powerful thrust of the hindquarters, should be in unison. Capability of juick, sudden movement is essential.

FAULTS: Any tendency to grossness or weediness is a serious fault. Ears

- Ears other than pricked. Colour - Solid red or black markings on the body. Tail - Gay tail is a fault. Other - Stiltiness, loaded or slack shoulders, straight shoulders, weakness of elbows, pasterns or feet, straight stifles, cow or bow hocks must be regarded as serious faults.

NOTICE PROPOSED MORATORIUM ON EXISTING **BREED STANDARDS** 

The Canadian Kennel Club is planning to publish a hardcover, illustrated breed standards book. Since no-one would want to purchase a book which is out of date as soon as printed, it has been proposed that a 6-year moratorium be placed on alterations to existing breed standards, with an effective date some time in 1980.

All interested persons and clubs are invited to comment on the above proposal to the Secretary-Treasurer, Canadian Kennel Club, 2150 Bloor Street West, Toronto, Ontario M6S, 4V7, so as to be received not later than October 31, 1979.

NOTICE

The following are the current Policies Governing Submission and Consideration of a Proposed New Breed Standard or a Proposed Change in Breed Standard, as revised by the Board of Directors at the Annual Board Meeting in March 1979.

1. When a club or group of individuals wishes to modify or replace a breed standard, they must submit the proposed new standard or change in standard together with reasons and advantages for the change to the Breed Standards Committee of The Canadian Kennel Club.

2. When a club requests a change in a breed standard it must supply a current list of club members and it must state the percentage of its whole membership which is in favour of the proposed change.

and it must state the percentage of its whole membership which is in favour of the proposed change.

3. When a change in a breed standard is proposed by a group of individuals, the names of those individuals must accompany the application, and each of those individuals must own a registered specimen of that breed and be actively involved with that breed.

4. If the Breed Standards Committee considers the changes and the reasons for the changes to be valid, the proposed new standard or change in standard shall be published in TWO SUCCESSIVE issues of the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club, and the publication shall be accompanied by an invitation to those interested to submit their comments. The time limit for the receipt of comments shall be THIRTY DAYS from the second date of publication.

5. At the expiration of the thirty days period all comments will be considered by the Breed Standards Committee.

6. If there are no negative comments the Committee feels are worth acting on, she proposed standard shall at this time be brought before the Board of Directors for their final approval. If, however, it is felt that modifications to the proposed standard are in order, the amended standard is to be published in TWO SUCCESSIVE issues of the official organ of The Canadian Kennel Club, and the publication shall be accompanied by an invitation to those interested to submit their comments. The time limit for the receipt of comments shall be 30 days following the second date of publication.

7. All further comments will be considered by the Committee which will then submit its recommendations to the Board of Directors.

8. If the Committee considers a submission to be one that does not warrant serious consideration, or finds that the sponsors are not prepared to accept changes suggested by the Committee, then the Committee will submit its recommendations to the Board and Sections #4, #5, #6 and #7 of these policies will not apply.

#### POLICIES APPLICABLE TO THE DETERMINATION OF FEES

#### Schedule of Fees

The schedule of fees applicable to services provided by the C.K.C. through its Registration Division is divided into two sections, one applicable to applicants who are "ORDINARY" members of The Canadian Kennel Club, the other to applicants who are "ASSOCIATE" or "NON-RESIDENT" members of the C.K.C., also, those applicants who are not members of The Canadian Kennel Club.

#### Who is the applicant?

#### Litters:

In the case of an application for registration of litter, the **applicant** is the owner of the litter at its birth, or the lessee of the dam of the litter where the lease of dam is registered with the C.K.C.

#### **Individual Dogs:**

Dog born in Canada: The applicant is the owner of the dog at its birth.

Imported Dog: The applicant is the person who imported the dog to Canada. (NOTE: Such ownership must be recorded on foreign certificate of registration submitted with the application for registration.)

Dog owned in the United States: The applicant is the owner of record shown on the American certificate of registration.

#### Transfer of ownership:

In all cases the applicant is the person from whom the dog is being transferred, NOT the person to whom it is being transferred.

#### Registration of Lease:

The applicant is the recorded owner of the dog, not the person to whom the dog is leased.

#### Registration of tattoo identification combination:

The applicant is the person to whom the combination is to be allotted.

#### Order for certified pedigree:

The applicant is the person submitting the request for a certified pedigree.

#### **Registration of Kennel Name:**

The applicant is the person in whose name the kennel name is to be registered if the application is approved.

#### These points should be noted:

- If the applicant is an individual person, membership rates apply only if the applicant is currently an individual "Ordinary" member of the C.K.C.
- 2. If an individual applicant is part of an "Ordinary" partnership membership, membership rates do **not** apply, regardless of the relationship to the other persons in the partnership membership.
- 3. Membership privileges are not transferable from one person to another. For example: If the husband is a C.K.C. "Ordinary" member, but it is his wife who is the applicant, these membership rates do **not** apply unless the wife is also a C.K.C. "Ordinary" member.
- 4. If the applicant is a partnership, membership rates apply only if the partnership is currently a C.K.C. "Ordinary" member, **OR** if each and **every** person in the partnership is currently a C.K.C. "Ordinary" member.
- 5. A person, partnership or company, is not a C.K.C. "Ordinary" member until they have been C.K.C. "Associate" members in the three years immediately prior to the payment of the "Ordinary" membership fee.
